STATE COLORED NORMAL SCHOOL, FAYETTEVILLE.

HISTORY.

This institution was established by the State Board of Education, under an act of the General Assembly of 1876–797, for the training of teachers for the colored schools of the State. It has completed sixteen school years of nine months each, in which there has been enrolled 760 different pupils, from sixty-six counties of the State.

One hundred and seventeen (117) have completed the prescribed course. Of this number only a few have failed to devote themselves to the educational work. A large number of the undergraduates also engage in teaching. The character of this work is exerting a beneficial influence for good throughout the State.

LOCATION.

The school is located at Fayetteville, on the Cape Fear River. Fayetteville is a very healthy and pleasant town, accessible by rail from Wilmington and by the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley Railway from Greensboro via Sanford, where connection is made with the Raleigh and Augusta Railroad. Also by the Southern extension of the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley Railway to Maxton, where connection is made with the Carolina Central Rail Road, and the Wilmington & Weldon Rail Road from Wilson.

The school is taught in a large and commodious building, furnished free of rent by the colored people of Fayetteville

MANAGEMENT.

The management of the school is vested in the Principal and the Local Board of Managers, who are appointed by the State Board of Education.

NATURE AND DESIGN.

A Normal School is neither a college, a law, nor a theological school, but a school for the thorough instruction and systematic training of students who wish to become teachers; hence the design of this school is

I. Thorough instruction in all the branches required to be taught in the public schools of the State.

 The best methods of teaching these branches and governing the schools, and

III. The cultivation of the habit of thinking clearly and systematically, and the practice of delivering the thoughts and explanations in a lucid and pleasant manner. To accomplish this our course of study, practice in teaching, professional library and rhetorical exercises are admirably adapted.

QUALIFICATIONS OF A GOOD TEACHER.

1st. Good health, good common sense and sound judgment.

2nd. A thorough knowledge of the branches he pro-

3rd. Aptness to teach. He may be rich in knowledge, but it will be of little value to his pupils unless he has the skill of communicating it to them.

4th. Perfect self-control. He cannot govern others when unable to govern himself.

5th. Love for his calling. Any work is easily done when prompted by love. Whatever one does willingly is no trouble.

CONDITIONS OF MEMBERSHIP.

Every applicant for admission must present sufficient evidence of good moral character, and pass a satisfactory examination in Reading Spelling, Writing, the fundamental Rules of Arithmetic and Fractions to enter the lowest class. For the higher grades proportionately higher scholarship will be required.

Students must promise, upon becoming members of the school, to observe the Rules and Regulations; to provide for themselves the books necessary for their instruction; and, also, to teach in the public schools of the State for three years, as far as practicable.

EXPENSES, AID, ETC.

Tuition is free to all residents of the State.

Board, including lodging, fuel, lights and washing can be procured in private families at reasonable prices.

Students will be received at any time, but are especially requested to enter, if possible, at the beginning of either the Fall, Winter or Spring term. The examinations held at those times will enable the teachers to properly classify the candidates for admission.

DISCIPLINE

Students are required to conduct themselves as ladies and gentlemen. They are treated with confidence from the first, and the effort is made to govern rather by the law of mutual respect than by severer methods of discribing.

Students must attend school regularly unless prevented by imperative necessity. A daily record of attendance and deportment is kept, and any student who falls below a certain percentage is dropped from the roll.

Intemperance, profane or ungentlemanly language is positively forbidden.

Students are liable to be suspended or expelled at any time for violation of the rules, or for unsatisfactory conduct in any respect, this being a Normal, not a Public School.

EXAMINATIONS.

Oral and Written Examinations of all the students will be held during the first week of each term, and Public Examination and Exhibition annually, at the close of the session.

CERTIFICATES.

Students who complete the course of study prescribed for the third year, and whose deportment, while members of the school, has been satisfactory, will receive certificates of recommendation as teachers for Public Schools. Those who complete the studies of the Junior and Middle years will be entitled to receive certificates of higher grade. Those who complete the prescribed course satisfactorily will be entitled to Diplomas.

LIBRARY, APPARATUS, ETC.

The school has a small but well-selected Library, including the Encyclopædia Britanica, and is supplied with the necessary Maps and Globes; Musical, Historical and Writing charts; and, in addition to these, a set of apparatus for the Illustration of Physics or Natural Philosophy.

SOCIETIES.

The Normal Literary Society, which meets Friday evening of each week, and the Normal Band of Hope (Temp.) which meets monthly, are Societies formed among the students, and subject to their own control, under the supervision of the teachers. They are excellent means for drill in parliamentary usage and business habits.

NON-SECTARIAN.

The school is not conducted in the interest of any religious denomination or any political party. The teachers

belong to different churches, and students, while expected to attend some church, are allowed to make their own choice. All the leading denominations are represented by churches in town.

GENERAL REMARKS.

During the past school year the students have been deeply interested in their studies, and as a rule have given their teachers very little trouble in the administration of discipline.

The school enjoys the moral support of the citizens of the community, and is exerting an elevating influence upon

the people of this and surrounding counties.

The course of study, as will be seen from the curriculum, has been ratised from year to year. It is such as will enable the teacher to do practical work in the school-room, and at the same time to lay the foundation of scholarship in the Greek and Latin Languages. This has been done to meet the demand of the steadily advancing teaching force of our public schools, and the popular sentiment, everywhere to be observed, in favor of more proficient teachers.

The Normal School is open to inspection at all times, and teachers and friends of education are cordially invited

to visit it at their convenience.

We hope to profit by their criticisms, favorable or otherwise. We are advocates of progress, and are ready to alter or amend our system whenever it can be done to advantage.
