

**VOTE FOR BONDS**

**FIVE GOOD REASONS WHY LOYAL GLENDALE PEOPLE SHOULD VOTE FOR THE BONDS**

Vote for the grammar school bonds and have nine months of school instead of eight, because:

(1) Our children will be handicapped in their work for several years to come if we have only eight months of school this year.

(2) We owe our teachers back salary for last year. This is a just debt and we ought to pay it. Moreover, we ought not to ask our teachers to remain idle four months next summer.

(3) We cannot afford to get the reputation of being a district which maintains only eight months of school. We have the reputation of having good schools. Let us keep that reputation. It will attract home-seekers.

The deficit in school funds is due to very easily understood causes, namely:

(1) An unjust method of apportioning state and county funds. These apportionments are based on last year's average daily attendance. If a district grows it is at a disadvantage. The average daily attendance of this district doubled in four years.

(2) The very crowded conditions of last year which rendered it necessary to spend money on temporary buildings.

(3) The recently enacted law requiring the district to supply all books and materials that the child uses and not providing increased revenue to take care of these things.

(4) The recently enacted law compelling boards of trustees to establish kindergartens upon presentation of proper petition, and not providing any funds to pay for the kindergartens.

(5) The repeal of the poll tax. Last year this district received from the poll tax approximately \$3000. This year we shall receive from the part of the poll tax which was delinquent and collected after July 1, 1914, approximately \$1700.

The conditions which rendered this bond election necessary are not confined to Glendale, but are general. Pasadena and Santa Ana have already carried bond elections called for the same purpose as ours and a number of other districts will have to do the same thing or shorten their school term.

These conditions will not prevail another year because it is practically certain that the present legislature will enact some remedial laws.

If these bonds carry, the immediate increase in taxes will be six cents on the thousand dollars of assessed valuation, i. e., on twenty-five hundred of actual value.

There is every reason to vote for these bonds and no good reason whatever to vote against them.

To the voters of the 61st Assembly District:

**AFTERNOON SERVICES TO PROVE A BOON AND BLESSING TO CHRISTIANS**

It will take more than ordinary rains to wash away the Brown and Curry crowds attending the big tabernacle meetings in this city. At least one thousand flocked to the service on Tuesday evening and the patter of the rain on the roof of the well built, well heated and altogether comfortably appointed temple made everyone feel much at home. No one need fear bad weather once they get inside the huge tabernacle, for there the sun is always shining. Already a tremendous feeling of optimism prevails among the ten churches co-operating and the "best ever" is the universal comment.

The two services a day program was inaugurated Tuesday. Several hundred were present at the first afternoon service despite the bad weather, and right here it is to be noted that there is a distinct atmosphere about these afternoon meetings not found at the evening service. The afternoon messages it is understood are chiefly for Christians.

The first of the series of afternoon discourses was based on the text, "Now the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, that ye may abound in hope, in the power of the Holy Ghost," Rom. 15:13.

The preacher stated many good reasons why the believer should be hopeful and made it very clear that Mr. Down-in-the-Dumps did not belong to the forces of righteousness and that viewed from every possible standpoint the worker for God should be sanely optimistic.

The theme at the evening service was drawn from Mt. 5:13-16. Christ who is the light of the world points to his followers as lights over which must not be flopped the bushel measure.

Few people out of the church read the Bible printed on paper; their Bible is the life we Christians live.

The home is the hardest place to shine for Christ. If there is victory in the home, there will be victory in every other sphere of life.

When the devil flops a bushel basket over you light up and send the basket on in fire and smoke. A thimble would easily snuff out the light of the average Christian.

The light of the Christian is in principle, love; in essence, faith, and in development, service.

A quiet, reasonable faith is the need of the hour, not a visionary, wonder-working faith.

Faith and works go together. There is no contradiction between Paul and James. We demonstrate our faith by our works. We should not pray for God to send the sinner in, but rather let us pray, "God send us to the sinner."

Many mistake worship for service. More than church going is needed to do the work of God. A faith that has muscular action sufficient to move the feet, and travel to the finger tips is the kind that gets there.

Brown and James agree that the fellow who says he has faith and does nothing is sadly off the track.

Altogether both services on Tuesday were unique. The experience of the evangelist, so eloquently worked into his messages, added greatly to the human interest and all the time Brown is talking he is saying something so that his hearers literally hang on his words. Knowledge of the word of God and deep Christian experience seem to have worked the messenger into a living, burning epistle. Truly Brown is sent from God.

Curry's new song book is making a great hit with all. The chorus seems never to have enough of it, and but for the restraining hand of the leader, some might stay till midnight. Take for example that second coming hymn entitled "What If It Were Today?" Brother Edmonds remarked Tuesday evening that it was undoubtedly the best he had ever heard on that blessed theme. Did you say "Brighten the Corner Where You Are?" Is that your favorite? It certainly is splendid both to sing and practice. No, don't mention any more of them just now, for they are all good. And what a happy time we are having! The chorus is simply great. God bless Brother Curry and prosper him in his magnificent service of song. We'll be there every time and our only unpleasant thought is the brevity of our great opportunity.

**WAR AND EARTHQUAKES**

European countries are not having their troubles confined solely to war losses, but the gigantic earthquake is coming in for its share of prominence. Renewed shocks are adding to the horrors of the inhabitants of Italy. In a message under date of Feb. 15, the statement is made that renewed earthquake shocks occurred in parts of the district in Central Italy visited by seismic disturbances several weeks ago. One person was killed and six persons were injured in the collapse of a house at Nazhano. At Rocca Sinibaldi the belfry of the convent of Santa Maria fell upon several houses, burying ten persons.

Cittaduale was entirely wrecked and at Veroli several houses were rendered uninhabitable.

Since the recent disaster the district almost daily has been shaken by earth shocks. Monday's disturbance occurred at ten minutes after 2 o'clock, but it was only Monday evening that it was learned that much damage had resulted and that at least one fatality had occurred.

The population of Cittaduale is camping in the open air despite the torrential rain that is falling. There are about two thousand people in the town, which is in the province of Aquila, five miles east of Rieta.

**PLANT BREEDING**

Differences in production may be due to environmental factors, or to hereditary differences in the plants. Plant improvement depends upon hereditary differences.  
Performance records are indispensable to certain improvement.  
Comparative tests are necessary to secure reliable performance records.  
In comparative tests all sources of error must be eliminated or accounted for.  
All principles of crop production must be reckoned with in testing plants.  
Selecting individual plants and testing their progeny separately is the shortest method by which improved varieties may be produced in crops propagated by seeds.  
If vegetative propagation is practicable, selecting a superior individual may originate an improved variety.  
Hybridization or cross-breeding is the most effective method of producing hereditary changes.  
Hybridization is promiscuous, uncertain, unscientific, if uncontrolled; superior individuals are occasionally secured, however, by growing large numbers of hybrid seedlings.  
The scientific hybridizer usually works with one or two characters at a time when crossing varieties of the same species.  
Testing hybrids in plants propagated by seeds should be continued at least to the second generation.  
First-generation hybrids between varieties or strains are usually more vigorous than either parent.  
If superior first-generation hybrids can be propagated vegetatively, an improved variety has at once been established.

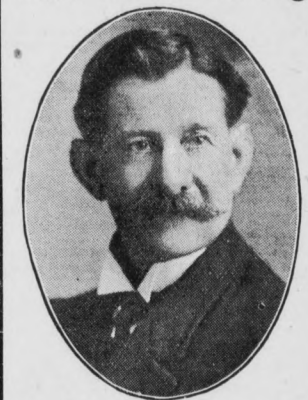
