VOTE SUPPORTS LLOYD GEORGE

British Commons Divided 235
to 26 After Genoa Report

London, May 25.—Premier Lloyd George appeared in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon, made a statement on the Genoa Economic Conference and his share therein, eloquently answered criticisms from different parts of the chamber and received the support of the House in what was considered the equivalent of a vote of confidence.

The House, by an overwhelming majority of 235 to 26, rejected an amendment moved by Rupert Gwynne, Unionist, to the motion on which the debate was based. Gwynne had offered his amendment as a means of expressing the dissatisfaction of the House with the Premier's exposition. Gwynne had been most vehement in his denunciations of the Government, asserting the Premier had spoken only on what might have happened at Genoa, not on what really did happen there. For an hour and a half Premier Lloyd George gave a calm exposition of the conference proceedings, to which the veteran, H. H. Asquith; the Labor leader, John Robert Clynes, and Lord Robert Cecil replied, criticizing the six weeks' session at Genoa as having accomplished little or nothing toward the rehabilitation of Europe.

Given Cheers

The criticism aroused the Premier, and he thundered answers toward the opposition benches.

France.

Mr. Lloyd George displayed great impatience with those critics who advocated going along without France. He exclaimed:

"You can't settle the reparations questions unless you carry the judgment of France along with you, and you cannot do that by flouting the Versailles Treaty and trying to ignore France."

Asquith's Viewpoint

Mr. Asquith thought Mr. Lloyd George had provided the Boisheviks with high authority for the principle that a basis for conservative society in Russia might be found in the adoption of a policy of confiscation. He contended that the Genoa Conference had resulted in nothing of importance except the truce pact, but the real fact was that a more solemn and enduring pact had already been entered into by all those nations except Germany and Russia in the covenant of the League of Nations.

Mr. Asquith made a great play with the Premier's picture of the nations of Europe preparing to march large armies against each other. He reminded the House that only quite recently, in replying to questions on that very subject, another member of the Government had asserted that the Government knew nothing about it, and he wanted to know where Mr. Lloyd George got his information.

Mr. Lloyd George, interrupting, said he got it from the Premiers of Poland and Roumania.

Mr. Asquith asked why the knowledge of this had been kept from the House, and pointed out that Russia and Poland had entered into an understanding on March 1 not to attack each other, and therefore it could not

Russian Opinion.

Of the expression of the opinion of the masses of Russia, Mr. Lloyd George said:

"There is only one public opinion in Russia that matters—the opinion of the workmen in the towns, who represent but a small percentage of the whole population. Talk about nationalism in Russia is all humbug."

PAPERS MAY PRINT COURT PROCEEDINGS

Judge Explains Libel and
Slander Law

Says Journals Must Be Pro-
tected from Fake Actions

Vancouver, May 25.—B. A. Olds was directed to pay into court \$200 security for the defendants' costs as a condition precedent to the continuance of his libel action against The World Limited and the editor of The World newspaper by Mr. Justice Morrison.

The application was made on behalf of the defendants by Gordon Sloan, who asserted that in the event of his clients being successful at the trial, the plaintiff possessed no assets from which costs could be realized. George Housser contended that an order for security should not be made when the libel complained of involved a criminal charge, unless the action was trivial or frivolous.

"There are no restrictions upon publishing anything going on in courts of law, provided it is reported correctly," said Mr. Justice Morrison.

The alleged defamatory publication concerned a charge preferred against Olds in the Police Court, of which he was subsequently acquitted.

"The published statement hurts you no more than the actual charge," remarked His Lordship to Mr. Housser. Referring to the Libel and Slander Act, the judge said:

"The section here is a protection to newspapers—considered a medium which must not altogether be driven out of existence—from fake actions."

"If we have to put up security it means an end to our action," said Mr. Housser.

In spite of this protest the order for \$200 security was made by His Lordship.

CHARGE OF MURDER IN SASKATCHEWAN

Man Surrendered to Police
After Shooting on Farm

Regina, May 25.—William Ineson was shot and killed at Twin Valley, Sask., yesterday morning and John Corcoran, on whose farm the shooting occurred, is under arrest at Willow Bunch, charged with murder. Ineson was to have been tried yesterday afternoon on a charge of having assaulted Corcoran several days ago.

After the shooting Corcoran drove to Willow Bunch and surrendered himself to the Saskatchewan provincial police.

According to a statement that Corcoran is alleged to have made to the police, he and Ineson had a quarrel some time before and the latter threatened to kill him. Yesterday morning Ineson rode to Corcoran's farm on horseback. While he was still several hundred yards away Corcoran shouted at him to keep back, but Ineson paid no attention. Corcoran ran into his house and brought out his rifle. He again shouted to Ineson to stop, but when his warning was ignored he opened fire, his second bullet passing through Ineson's heart.

MANITOBA REJECTS BOND ISSUE OFFER

Winnipeg, May 25.—The highest offer, that received from the Dominion Securities Syndicate, of 86.17 for the Manitoba Government 30-year five per cent. \$2,500,000 bond issue, was rejected yesterday. It was stated by Hon. Edward Brown, Provincial Treasurer. Eight other bids were received.

The fact that the \$100,000,000 issue recently made by the Federal Government had not been entirely absorbed by the market, was responsible, in the opinion of Mr. Brown, for failure to receive par for the Manitoba issue. While in Eastern Canada the Treasurer was offered 100.50 for the present issue by private sale, he stated.

DAYLIGHT SAVING BY-LAW QUASHED

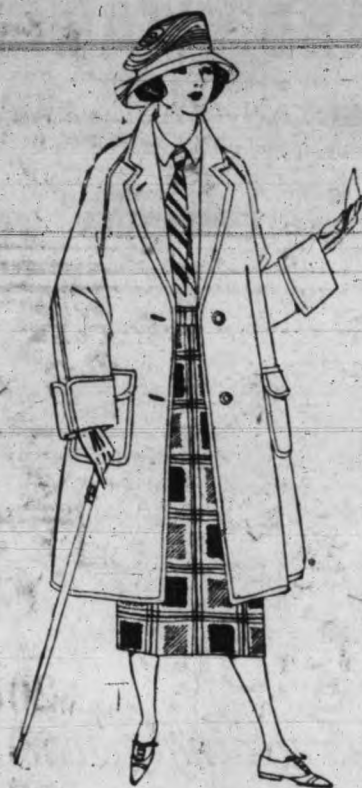

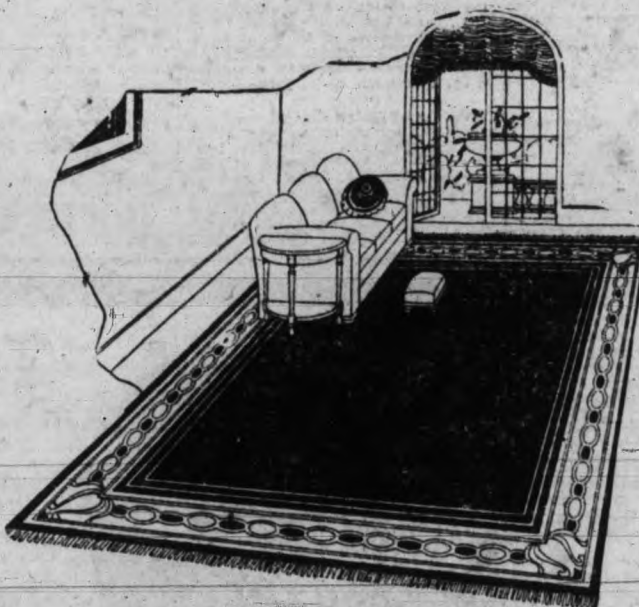

did not authorize the plebiscite is what" demanded Mr. Cross.
"He," the councillor, cried, "Mr. Cross pointed out that the plebiscite vote was the heaviest polled in the city's history, and the plebiscite had carried with a majority of 14,000 more than Mayor Marchant's election total. He said the question was not a political one. All denominations and political parties were strongly represented in the Anti-Blue Sunday League.
Up To Council.
Oscar C. Bass spoke of the "Kaiser-like methods of the morality squad," and pointed out that the Police Commissioners have no right to try and enforce the law as it exists with the Council to move in the matter.
Tom Dooley said that the Mayor was taking an extraordinary interest all of a sudden in the working man's day of rest. "Trade unions are strong enough to look after themselves without Mayor Marchant. Where is the tolerance and broad-mindedness of the Mayor and Mr. Staneland? It is the biggest clique and a small clique of the church that is trying to run us," said Mr. Dooley, who claimed it was bad business for the church to dabble in politics.
H. D. Twigg averred that no religious body in the world had any right to tell a man how to spend his Sunday so long as he was living within the law. Speaking for the Amalgamated Veterans, and he thought he was safe in including all ex-service bodies, they were entirely against the Blue Sunday order. "We want freedom and the right to do on Sunday those things which we feel we are entitled to do," said Mr. Twigg, who then introduced the resolution calling for the Mayor and Mr. Staneland to resign. 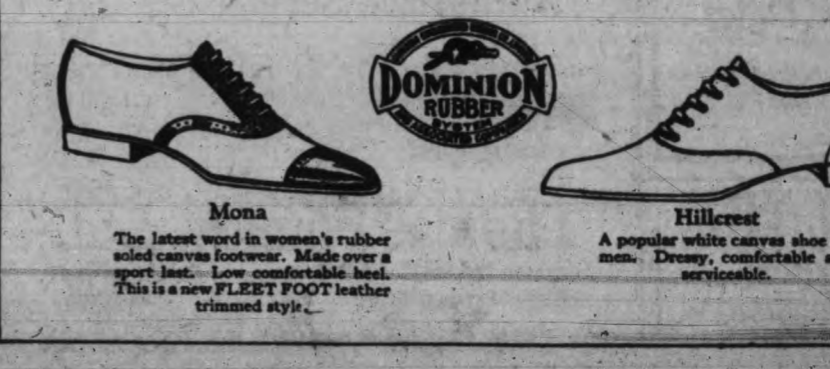

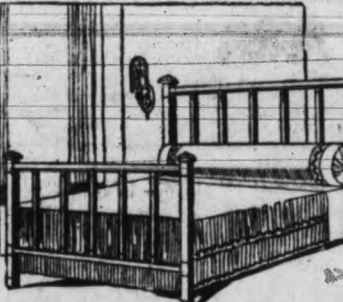

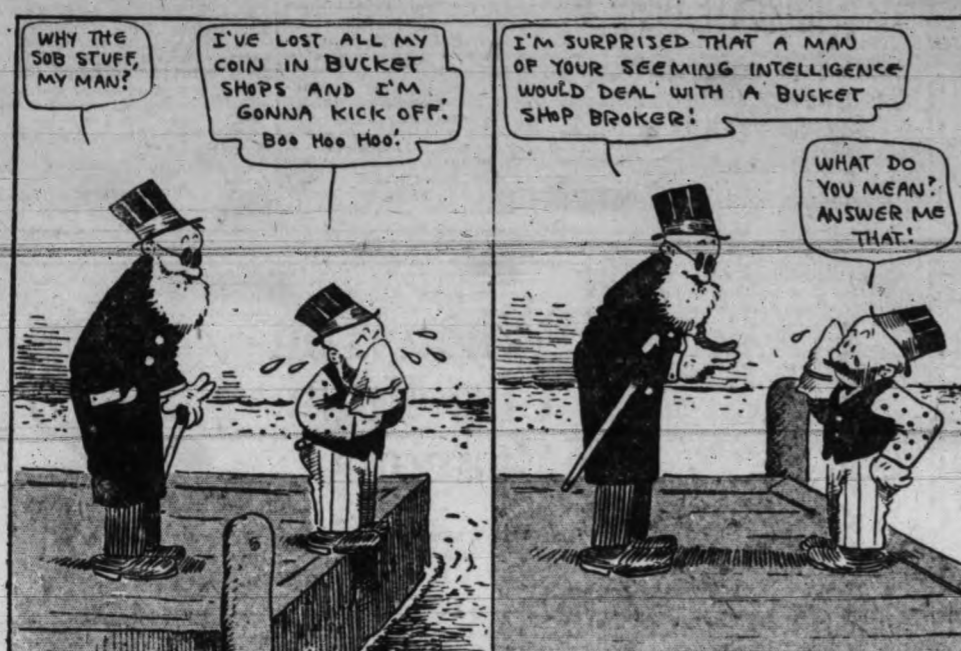
