*** The following list can be considered as nothing more than a preliminary catalogue to serve as a basis for future work toward a full and complete Bibliography of the Historical Literature of North Carolina. The collections of the State in Raleigh, of the University at Chapel Hill, of Trinity College, and Wake Forest College, of the Johns Hopkins University, the Maryland Historical Society, and the Peabody Institute of Baltimore, have been examined, besides numerous private collections. The work, begun in 1887, has been done at odd moments and under difficulties, for complete sets of magazines, like the North Carolina University Magazine, Our Living and Our Dead, Land We Love, and South Atlantic, which contain much material on our history, are very rare and almost impossible to obtain. There is, moreover, no large collection of the pamphlets and shorter papers on our history in existence. Some titles have been taken from book catalogues, but whenever possible the collation has been from the book itself.

Adair points out various customs of the Indians having a striking resemblance to those of the Jews; and the great object of his work appears to be to prove that the aborigines of America are descended from that race. Some distrust seems to have fallen upon his statements, although he himself says that his account is neither disfigured by fable nor prejudice.—RICH.

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Ash was clerk on board the "Richmond," which was sent out in 1680, with instructions to inquire into the state of the country, and returned in 1682. This, like the work of Samuel Wilson, published the same year, is a glowing description of the soil, climate, and productions of Carolina. He considers it a "rich jewel, which it has pleased God to add to the crown of his king." It is reprinted in Carroll's Historical Collections, vol. ii.

Carroll, R. B. Historical Collections of South Carolina. New York. 1836. 8°. 2 vols.

These volumes could have been called, and with better propriety, "Historical Collections of the Carolinas and Georgia." They contain many rare and valuable pamphlets and other documents relating to the history of these States from their first discovery and settlement to 1776. Vol. i. has a map of the Carolinas accurately copied from the map of James Cook, London, 1771, and Henry Mouzon, 1775. (These were both, as well as others of this period perhaps, made from that of Wimble in 1738, and were out of date and incorrect. Dunbibin's was made from actual surveys in 1764.)

Caruthers, Eli W. (-1865), A.M., D.D. A Sketch of the life and character of the Rev. David Caldwell, D.D. Near sixty years pastor of the churches of Buffalo and Alamance. Including two of his sermons; some account of the Regulation, together with the Revolutionary transactions and incidents in which he was concerned; and a very brief notice of the ecclesiastical and moral condition of North Carolina while in its colonial state. This volume contains much rare and valuable material for the social life of the colony.

The first volume is devoted to the earlier days of the Revolution and its causes. The Tary movement in North Carolina and its origin is treated fully; much attention is given to the battle of Moore's creek and to the career of Col. David Fanning. Vol. ii. contains an account of the British invasion of 1781; a defence of the conduct of the North Carolina militia at Guilford Court House; miscellaneous incidents and personal sketches, with a map showing the routes of Cornwallis and Greene, and a plan of the battle of Guilford Court House. The volumes do not purport to be grave history, or to treat the more important events fully, but are made up of "incidents" gathered from the mouths of the people, tales, legends, and romances of the olden times, and are of much value for social life. Catesby, Mark (1679-1749). The Natural History of Carolina, Florida, and the Bahama Islands, with figures colored after the life. London. 1731. f°. 2 vols. 220 plates.

This important work was begun this year and continued in numbers or parts until 1748, when the appendix completing the work was finished; second edition in 1754; third in 1771; text in English and French. The edition of 1771 was revised by Mr. Edwards, and a Linnean index of animals and plates was added. f°. 2 vols. 220 colored plates. Catesby's plates were etched by himself from his own drawings and colored under his inspection. The second and third editions are considered inferior to the first in respect to the beauty of the plates.

Catesby spent the years 1710-1719 travelling in America. He came out again in 1722 and remained until 1726. A German edition of the history appeared at Nüremberg, 1756.

"Chalmers' account in all cases of the kind must be received with great hesitancy. The coloring is always wrong; the facts usually perverted. He writes like a lawyer and disappointed politician, not like a calm inquirer. His statements are copied by Grahame, obscured by Martin, and, strange to say, exaggerated by Williamson."—BANCROFT.

Not until the publication of these records has it been possible to write an accurate account of any particular phase in the historical development of North Carolina, for the original records in the office of the Secretary of State in Raleigh were remarkably incomplete, and of the first fifty years almost nothing remained.

This was due very largely to the lack of towns and of suitable buildings where such records might be preserved. This lack of materia historica has been long felt, and as early as 1827 the Governor was instructed by the Legislature to procure from the British Government copies of all papers relating to the colonial history of the State. Correspondence was begun, and in that year minister Gallatin forwarded to Gov. Burton a list of such papers as related to North Carolina. This list was printed in 1843 [see supra]. Other efforts were made in 1849, 1855, 1857, 1859, and 1861, to further the work, but nothing was accomplished. In 1881 the Legislature directed the Trustees of the Libraries to print what colonial documents were then in the State. The gaps in these records were found to be so many and so great that the Trustees determined to ask the State for aid toward making the records more complete. This aid was given by the Legislature of 1883. Col. Samuel McDowell Tate of the House, and Hon. James L. Robinson of the Senate, being especially instrumental in securing its adoption.

The work of compiling and editing devolved on the Hon. William L. Saunders, LL.D., the accomplished Secretary of State, who brought to it a tireless energy, a love that knows no bounds, and a devotion unsurpassed. "How he has performed the task thus assigned to him it is not for him to determine. He can only say, that for near seven [eleven] years he has devoted himself to it, and that he has done the very best he could, without reward, or the hope of reward [and this when suffering untold agonies from rheumatism, a part of the proof being read while lying on his back and unable to turn from side to side], and solely because of the love he bears to North Carolina and her people."—Preface to vol. i. p. vii.

Mr. W. Noel Sainsbury, of the British Record office, was employed to search the British archives. His work was thoroughly done, and there are perhaps few papers in England relating to North Carolina of which copies have not been secured. Unfortunately the work does not seem to have been so thoroughly done on this side of the Atlantic. A supplementary volume containing omitted documents is much needed. The prefatory notes by the editor form a running political history of the colony. Of editing, in the exact sense, there is none. There is very pressing need for an accurate and full index.

In 1590 De Bry published Hariot's narrative with a map and twenty-three plates from the drawings of John White, and to secure more profit had the text printed in English, Latin, French, and German, thus offering four editions to the public. This was the only part of his collection of "Voyages" that appeared in English. It was after the publication of this work that De Bry conceived the idea of his "Great Voyages." Hariot's narrative forms the first part of his "Great Voyages." Hariot is perhaps best known from De Bry's English and Latin editions.

The first history was written by Elders Lemuel Burkitt and Jesse Read [q. v.], and published in 1803. The second by Joseph Biggs [q. v] in 1834. In 1876 C. B. Hassell was appointed to pre-

pare the third edition, and also a history of the church from the creation. He had prepared nearly all the Kehukee and special Primitive Baptist history and the history of the church from 4004 B.c. to 350 A.D. at his death, April 11, 1880. His son was appointed to complete the work. He revised his father's manuscripts and brought the history down from A.D. 330 to 1885.—Preface.

The idea of preparing this work occurred to Judge Martin as early as 1791, and was strengthened by his employment in 1803 to publish a revisal of the laws, when he had access to the records of the State. It appears from his preface that materials had been collected to bring the story down to 1810, but the continuation was never published. The materials on which his work was based were carried to Louisiana, and probably lost.

Martin had no ambition to write a philosophical history. There is no attempt to set forth events in the relation of cause and effect, nor to state them in such a way that this relation will become obvious. The work is thrown into the form of annals; the succession of paragraphs often seems to be determined by nothing else than the juxtaposition in time of the events they contain; events occurring in distant parts of the globe are inserted which have no connection, except in proximity of time, to the history of North Carolina. His readers will not often imagine that the author was ever very severely tempted to mistake a fact for the sake of an antithesis, or to sucrifice the truth of history to elegancies of style. The utmost he seems to have aimed at is clearness and precision. He sometimes rises to a rude picturesqueness of description, but it seems to be done unconsciously. The work has certainly great merits. There is a large accumulation of materials. The statements are made with much perspicuity; but the structure of the work betrays many marks of haste and carelessness. He closes with the Declaration of Independence. - Prof. F. M. HUBBARD in address before N. C. Hist. Society. N. C. Univ. mag., 1852, i. 350.

Mr. Wallis denounces all as "liars and slanderers" who call in question the meeting of May 19th and 20th, 1775, and the Declaration then said to have been proclaimed, or who assert that John McKnitt Alexander, the writer's grandfather, did not act as secretary of that meeting, or that he did not act honorably and honestly as custodian of the papers.

This severe denunciation applies, so far as the secretaryship is concerned, to Gen. George Graham, Wm. Hutchinson, Jonas Clark, Robert Robinson, Isaac Alexander, and Col. Wm. Polk.

Mr. Wallis also offers "personal satisfaction" to any such individuals.

Mr. Wallis was the son of Rev. James Wallis of Providence settlement, and says he remembers seeing his father stamp on Williamson's *History of North Carolina*, because it did not contain a carefully prepared account of the Declaration by J. McK. Alexander.

Communication in National Intelligencer, Nov. 6, 1857, from Allen White, Starkville, Miss., calling the editor's attention to the McRee-Brevard statement [supra] in Presby. Mag., Feb. 1852, and reproducing it.

This affirms that Adam Brevard wrote the Mecklenburg Declaration and took the Westminster Confession as his guide. Dr. Welling, the editor, remarks that he can see no trace of the Confession in the Declaration.

"Respectfully shows, that he has been engaged for several years in collecting and arranging materials for an extensive Historical and Scientific Work on North Carolina. His success thus far has equalled his expectations; but he finds himself unable to prosecute this work to its completion, without the munificent aid of your honorable body. Few gentlemen in North Carolina have estates sufficient to bear the expenses and losses of such an undertaking. For independent of the direct expenses in travelling over several of the adjoining states, and carefully exploring every section of this State, for the purpose of collecting materials; and the further direct expenses of engaging the services of eminent men in science, in the department of geology, mineralogy, and botany, the author must in a great degree abandon all other pursuits and devote his time and attention to this alone. Such a work will be

voluminous, and cannot be expected to yield a profit to the author, particularly if published in a style worthy of the State. . . . When completed it will add something to the general literature of the country, and much to the credit of North Carolina." Dated Dec. 5, 1825.

Judge Murphey then submits a plan according to which he proposed to write the history. This outline is admirable. He divides his work into seven parts: i. An account of the discovery of America; ii. The aboriginal history of North Carolina; iii. The colonial history of North Carolina; iv. History of North Carolina from the time of her becoming a sovereign State in 1776; v. Physical geography, soil, climate, and meteorology of North Carolina; vi. Geology and mineralogy of North Carolina; vii. Botany of North Carolina. The sylva, flora, and fungi of the State. Under iii. and iv. the social history of the State was fully developed.

Judge Murphey's appeal was an idle one. He died a few years later and his collections were scattered.

There were no numbers for Jan. and Feb. 1876, and the publication was suspended after the March issue for lack of support. It is devoted principally to the history of North Carolina in the civil war, other States and other subjects not being excluded, and contains a mass of valuable material in the form of company and regimental histories, etc.

This Roster is made up mainly from the N.C. "Roll of Honor" and from the muster rolls of N.C. troops in the Confederate service, which were captured in Richmond in 1865, and are now in the Archives office of the War Department. Many of these were very imperfect; many omitted names; scarcely one had full accounts of casualties. There were sixty-eight regiments of original volunteers. these are to be added the four regiments of Senior and Junior Reserves, which, with the battalions, will increase the sum to the equivalent of eighty full regiments. In 1860, N.C. had polled 112,586 votes, and the white population was about 600,000. Many company lists and one whole regimental list (the 68th) are missing; with these lacunae the numbers recorded foot up 104,498. Maj. Moore thinks that 150,000 would not be an overestimate of the force. Others have put the figures at 125,000.

According to Lt. Col. Fox's Regimental Losses of the American Civil War, 1861-1865, North Carolina lost from wounds and disease 40,275 men, out of a total loss for the Confederacy of 140,821. In 1861 the State had a military population of 115,369. The State loss assumes, then, the heroic proportion of nearly 35 per cent.

University Magazine, North Carolina.

This publication has had many ups and downs of fortune, and the value of its contents historically varies as much as the conditions of publication. Under the administration of Gov. Swain, considerable interest was manifested; it was the organ of the State Historical Society, and the ante-bellum volumes are a store house for colonial history. Nearly all the shorter articles of value published between 1852 and 1861 on the history of North Carolina saw the light through its pages. It was killed by the war; was resurrected in 1878, and died at the end of the year. It was again revived in 1882; but, being under the entire control and direction of students, was of very little value for some years. About 1886 it began to improve, and the next three or four volumes contain a number of valuable papers, and some portraits.

The following is a complete list of the volumes and numbers issued:

The first number appeared in March, 1844, 80, pp. 48. Numbers appeared in that year for Mar., April, May, June, July, Aug. and Sept. (one), Oct., Nov., and Dec., 10 nos. in 9, pp. 495, with appendix, pp. 120, 76. The publisher was not aware of the custom of issuing only ten numbers of college papers, and had promised twelve. To redeem his promise, he took the Indexes to Colonial Documents (80. pp. 120), published in 1843, and the Proceedings of the Safety Committee of Wilmington (8°. pp. 76), published 1844, put a Magazine cover on them, labeled them December, and presented them "by way of Appendix to the Magazine proper." With this appendix "the publisher closes the publication of the Magazine under considerable pecuniary loss, and hope [sie] that those who are in arrears will now remit the amounts due, and lighten the burdens of this profitless enterprise." This volume is very rare.

It thus became possible for the overmountain men to leave their homes and strike a blow at the British and Tories at King's Mountain, thus turning the tide of war in the South in favor of the Americans.

This volume will appear in the fall of 1895 as an "Extra Volume" in the Johns Hopkins University Series of Studies in Historical and Political Science. It will deal with the Society of Friends in Virginia, the Carolinas, and Georgia. A map indicating in colors all sections of those States where there now are or have been settlements of Friends at any time in the past, and marking the location of every meetinghouse, will be added.

The effort has been made not only to write the history of the Society in those States from its first organization to the present time, but also to trace its relation to other religious bodies and contemporary institutions, and to show how the opposition of Friends to slavery caused them to become prominent in the settlement of the Western States, particularly Ohio and Indiana. Their migration was so great that the Society has entirely disappeared from South Carolina and Georgia. In 1843 the Virginia Yearly Meeting was laid down and since that time the history of the Quakers in these States has been little more than the history of the Society in North Carolina. This has been brought down to date, including the decline of the Society before and during the war period, and its rapid recovery and improvement since that time.

Dr. Weeks has ready in MS. a paper complementary and supplementary to his "Press in North Carolina in the Eighteenth Century" on "Libraries and Literature in North Carolina in the Eighteenth Century." This is an account of all the public and private libraries known to have existed in the State, and a history of the domestic literature with biographical sketches of the authors.

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NOTE.

This Bibliography contains 1491 different titles, representing 625 different authors. Of these, 863 titles are to be found in the collection of the compiler. There are two other collections, which, although probably not containing as many titles, are doubtless as valuable. These are the collections of the Hon. Kemp Plummer Battle, LL.D., professor of history in the University of North Carolina, and of the Right Reverend Joseph Blount Cheshire, Jr., D.D., Bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina. The collections of the University of North Carolina and of the State Library are the next in size. The compiler knows no other considerable collection.

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
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
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
