Mother of Local Resident Passes Away

On March 9th last there died at San Juan, in San Benito county, within a few hours of each other, Frances Arcello and the venerable Father Closa.

Mrs. Arcello was the grandmother of Mrs. H. M. Clevenger, a resident of Carmel, and is survived also by two children-Mrs. Elizabeth Twitchell mother of Mrs. Clevenger, and John Estrade; a brother, several grandchildren and great grandchildren are also left to mourn her loss.

Mrs. Arcello was born about 1830 near Laurellas, some sixteen miles from Carmel, at which place her father farmed one hundred acres of land acquired by means of a Spanish grant in recognition of military service.

It is interesting to relate the fact that Mrs. Arcello was baptised at Carmel Mission by Rev. Father Ramon Abella, during the presidency of Jose Bernardo Sanchez.

For many years the deceased was an intimate friend of Father Closa, and frequently in late years they would speculate as to which would survive the other. The former died at 4:30 in the morning and the latter at 2 in the afternoon of the same day.

A misleading statement has recently become current to the effect that the federal Department of Agriculture had suspended the enforcement of the regulations under the migratory bird law, and thereby has enabled sportsmen, under the state laws, to shoot wild fowl.

Protecting the Buyer

For the first time, this year growers of berries will be obliged to standardize their boxes and baskets. The state sealer of weights and measures has instructed county sealers of weights to demand a standard weight of berries when offered for sale in containers.

According to a law recently enacted berries must be packed in the various containers which shall hold berries in the following amounts: Eight and twelve ounces, one and two pounds. The minimum contents must approximate the true net weight.

Notice to TAXPAYERS

All taxpayers are required by the constitution to annually make and deliver to the Assessor a statement, under oath, setting forth specifically ALL the real, personal, or other class of property, owned by such persons, or in their possession, or under their control, as the same stands of record at 12 o'clock Meridian on the first Monday of March.

The Political Code provides, that all property must be assessed at its "full cash value," and defines "full cash value" as being "the amount Monterey is the second largest at which the property would be cheese producing county in taken in payment of a just debt

Unsecured Personal Property

The taxes on all unsecured personal property are due and payable and must be paid at the time the assessment is made.

Exemptions

Any person or association, claiming any property to be exempt from taxation, MUST make the claim and affidavit, for such exemption, every year, in the manner provided by law. This applies to the \$100 allowed on personal property of householders; the \$1000 allowed soldiers, sailors marines, etc., and property used solely and exclusively for religious worship.

Assessments

Any information desired relating to assessments will be gladly furnished on application, and all objections should be made before the Board of Equalization adjourns, instead of waiting until it is time to

Remember, that if you fail to make a statement you fail to comply with the law and you lay yourself liable to arbitrary assessment, which is expensive to yourself and causes much trouble to others.

Over Cites the Law

In reply to a published statement to the effect that the fish and game law relative to gathering of abalones is being violated by catching them with writes as follows:

There is no law probibiting the catching of abalones at that point with diving appar-

The only law existing on abalones in Districts 17 and 18, which constitutes the coast from Santa Cruz to the southerly line of San Luis Obispo county, prohibits the use of a spear in catching abalones and makes no mention of diving

Fishermen are not allowed to gather abalomes for commercial purposes in District 10, which comprises waters and tide lands to high water mark of that portion of Monterey bay lying to the south of a line drawn from the extreme northerly point of Point Pinos in a straight line Easterly to the eastern shore of Monterey Bay to a point north of Sesside, said point being marked by a permaneut monument placed by the United States government surveyors and designated as "Montorey N.O.T.C. and G. S. Station."
