

II. Activities and developments made for juveniles and homeless persons.

Efforts will be made toward the guidance and protection of juvenile with smooth development of children welfare works.

A plan has been made for constructing dwelling houses for homeless persons with the state subsidies of 1948 fiscal year, and applications for grant of subsidies and allotment of houses have been suit in. So far in Komatsujima and other town places, some houses have been allotted and such poor persons will be soon taken in.

With regard to the reception of forlorn repatriates, Komatsushima Cho and Kofu Cho already proposed to take care of such repatriates. So that some of them will be sent there where accommodation installations are now under construction.
