THE NEW UNITED STATES TARIFF.

The following is the text of the Clauses of the New United States Tariff Bill which relate to import duties:—

DUTIES UPON IMPORTS.

All persons are prohibited from importing into the United States from any foreign country any obscene book, pamphlet, paper, writing, advertisement, circular, print, picture, drawing or other representation, figure or image, on or of paper or other material, or any cast, instrument, or other article of an immoral nature, or any drug or medicine, or any article whatever, for the prevention of conception, or for causing unlawful abortion. No invoice or package whatever, or any part of one, in which any such articles are contained shall be admitted to entry: and all invoices and packages whereof any such articles shall compose a part are liable to be prosecuted against, seized, and forfeited by due course of law. All such prohibited articles in the course of importation shall be detained by the officer of Customs, and proceedings taken against the same as prescribed in the following sections: Provided, That the drugs hereinafore mentioned, when imported in bulk and not put up for any of the purposes hereinbefore specified, are excepted from the operation of this section.

Whoever, being an officer, agent, or employé of the Government of the United States, shall knowingly aid or abet any person engaged in any violation of any of the provisions of law prohibiting importing, advertising, dealing in, exhibiting, or sending or receiving by mail obscene or indecent publications, or representations, or means for preventing conception or procuring abortion, or other articles of indecent or immoral use or tendency, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall for every offence be punishable by a fine of not more than five thousand dollars, or by imprisonment at hard labour for not more than ten years, or both.

Any judge of any district or circuit court of the United States, within the proper district, before whom complaint in writing of any violation of the preceding sections is made, to the satisfaction of such judge, and founded on knowledge or belief, and, if upon belief, setting forth the grounds of such belief, and supported by oath or affirmation of the complainant, may issue, conformably to the Constitution, a warrant directed to the marshal, or any deputy marshal, in the proper district, directing him to search for, seize, and take possession of any such article or thing hereinbefore mentioned, and to make due and immediate return thereof to the end that the same may be condemned and destroyed by the proceedings which shall be conducted in the same manner as other proceedings in the case of municipal seizure, and with the same right of appeal or writ of error.

The importation of neat cattle and the hides of neat cattle from any foreign country into the United States is prohibited: Provided, That the operation of this section shall be suspended as to any foreign country or countries, or any parts of such country or countries, whenever the Secretary of the Treasury shall officially determine, and give public notice thereof, that such importation will not tend to the introduction or spread of contagious or infectious diseases among the cattle of the United States; and the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby authorised and empowered, and it shall be his duty to make all necessary orders and regulations to carry this law into effect or to suspend the same, as therein provided, and to send copies thereof to the proper officers in the United States, and to such officers or agents of the United States in foreign countries as he shall judge necessary.

Any person convicted of a wilful violation of any of the provisions of the preceding section shall be fined not exceeding five hundred dollars, or imprisoned not exceeding one year, or both, in the discretion of the court.

No watches, watch-cases, watch movements, or parts of watch-movements, or any other articles of foreign manufacture, which shall copy or simulate the name or trade-mark of any domestic manufacture, shall be admitted to entry at the Custom House of the United States, unless such domestic manufacturer is the importer of the same. And in order to aid the officers of the Customs in enforcing this prohibition, any domestic manufacturer who has adopted trade-marks may require his name and residence, and a description of his trade-marks to be recorded in books which shall be kept for that purpose in the Department of the Treasury, under such regulations as the Secretary shall prescribe, and may furnish to the departments concerned of such trade-marks; and thereupon the Secretary of the

Treasury shall cause one or more copies of the same to be transmitted to each collector or other proper officer of the Customs.

No goods, wares, or merchandise, unless in cases provided for by treaty, shall be imported into the United States from any foreign port or place, except in vessels of the United States, or in such foreign vessels as truly and wholly belong to the citizens or subjects of that country of which the goods are the growth, production, or manufacture; or from which such goods, wares, or merchandise can only be, or most usually are, first shipped for transportation. All goods, wares, or merchandise imported contrary to this section, and the vessel wherein the same shall be imported, together with her cargo, tackle, apparel, and furniture, shall be forfeited to the United States; and such goods, wares, or merchandise, ship, or vessel, and cargo shall be liable to be seized, prosecuted, and condemned, in like manner, and under the same regulations, restrictions, and provisions as have been heretofore established for the recovery, collection, distribution, and remission of forfeitures to the United States by the several revenue laws.

The preceding section shall not apply to vessels, or goods, wares, or merchandise imported in vessels of a foreign nation which does not maintain a similar regulation against vessels of the United States.

There shall be levied, collected, and paid on each and every non-enumerated article which bears a similitude, either in material, quality, texture, or the use to which it may be applied, to any article enumerated in this title as chargeable with duty, the same rate of duty which is levied and charged on the enumerated article which it most resembles in any of the particulars before mentioned; and if any non-enumerated article equally resembles two or more enumerated articles on which different rates are chargeable, there shall be levied, collected, and paid on such non-enumerated article the same rate of duty as is chargeable on the article which it resembles paying the highest duty; and on all articles manufactured from two or more materials the duty shall be assessed at the highest rates at which the component material of chief value may be chargeable. If two or more rates of duty should be applicable to any imported article, it shall be classified for duty under the highest of such rates: Provided, That non-enumerated articles similar in material and quality and texture, and the use to which they may be applied, to articles on the free list, and in the manufacture of which no dutiable materials are used, shall be free.

Upon the re-importation of articles once exported of the growth, product, or manufacture of the United States, upon which no internal revenue tax has been assessed or paid, or upon which such tax has been paid and refunded by allowance or drawback, there shall be levied, collected, and paid a duty equal to the tax imposed by the internal revenue laws upon such articles.

A discriminating duty of ten per centum *ad valorem*, in addition to the duties imposed by law, shall be levied, collected, and paid on all goods, wares, and merchandise which shall be imported on vessels not of the United States; but this discriminating duty shall not apply to goods, wares, and merchandise which shall be imported in vessels not of the United States, entitled by treaty or any act of Congress, to be entered in the ports of the United States on payment of the same duties as shall then be paid on goods, wares, and merchandise in vessels of the United States.

There shall be levied, collected, and paid upon all articles imported from foreign countries, and mentioned in the schedules herein contained, the rates of duty which are, by the schedules, respectively prescribed, namely:—

Ditto, above that, and not exceeding sixteen by twenty-four inches square ... 4c per sq ft
Ditto, above that, and not exceeding twenty-four by thirty inches square ... 6c per sq ft
Ditto, above that, and not exceeding twenty-four by sixty inches ... 20c per sq ft
Ditto, all above that ... 40c per sq ft
Unpolished cylinder, crown and common window glass, not exceeding ten by fifteen inches square ... 1½c per lb
Ditto, above that, and not exceeding sixteen by twenty-four inches square ... 1½c per lb
Ditto, above that, and not exceeding twenty-four by thirty inches square ... 2½c per lb
Ditto, all above that ... 2½c per lb
Provided, that unpolished cylinder, crown and common window glass, imported in boxes containing fifty square feet, as nearly as sizes will permit, now known and commercially designated as fifty feet of glass, single thick and weighing not to exceed fifty-five lb of glass per box, shall be entered and computed as fifty lbs of glass only; and that said kinds of glass imported in boxes containing, as nearly as sizes will permit, fifty feet of glass, now known and commercially designated as fifty feet of glass, double thick and not exceeding ninety lbs in weight, shall be entered and computed as eighty lbs of glass only; but in all other cases the duty shall be computed according to the actual weight of glass.
Fluted, rolled, or rough plate-glass, not including crown, cylinder, or common window-glass, not exceeding ten by fifteen inches square ... 75c per 100 sq ft
Ditto, above that, and not exceeding sixteen by twenty-four inches square ... 1c per sq ft
Ditto, above that, and not exceeding twenty-four by thirty inches square ... 1½c per sq ft
Ditto, all above that ... 2c per sq ft
And all fluted, rolled, or rough plate-glass, weighing over one hundred lbs per one hundred square feet, shall pay an additional duty on the excess at the same rates herein imposed.
Cast polished plate-glass, unsilvered, not exceeding ten by fifteen inches square ... 3c per sq ft
Ditto, above that, and not exceeding sixteen by twenty-four inches square ... 5c per sq ft
Ditto, above that, and not exceeding twenty-four by thirty inches square ... 8c per sq ft
Ditto, above that, and not exceeding twenty-four by sixty inches square ... 25c per sq ft
Ditto, all above that ... 50c per sq ft

Cast polished plate glass, silvered, or looking-glass plates, not exceeding ten by fifteen inches square ... 4c per sq ft
Ditto, above that, and not exceeding sixteen by twenty-four inches square ... 6c per sq ft
Ditto, above that, and not exceeding twenty-four by thirty inches square ... 10c per sq ft
Ditto, above that, and not exceeding twenty-four by sixty inches square ... 35c per sq ft
Ditto, all above that ... 60c per sq ft

But no looking-glass plates or plate-glass, silvered, when framed, shall pay a less rate of duty than that imposed upon similar glass of like description not framed, but shall be liable to pay, in addition thereto, 35% ad val upon such frames.

Porcelain and Bohemian glass, chemical glassware, painted glassware, stained glass, and all other manufactures of glass or of which glass shall be the component material of chief value, not specially enumerated or provided for in this Act, 45% ad val.

SCHEDULE C.

Metals.

Iron ore, including manganiferous iron ore, also the dross or residuum from burnt pyrites ... 75c per ton
Sulphur ore, as pyrites or sulphuret of iron in its natural state, containing not more than three and one-half per centum of copper ... 75c per ton

Provided that ore containing more than two per centum of copper shall pay, in addition thereto, two and one-half cents per pound for the copper contained therein.

Iron in pigs, iron kentledge, spiegeleisen, wrought and cast scrap iron, and scrap steel ... 3-10c per lb

But nothing shall be deemed scrap iron or scrap steel except waste or refuse iron or steel that has been in actual use and is fit only to be remanufactured.

Iron railway bars, weighing more than twenty-five pounds to the yard ... 7-10c per lb

Steel railway bars and railway bars made in part of steel, weighing more than twenty-five pounds to the yard ... \$17 per ton

Bar iron, rolled or hammered, comprising flats not less than one inch wide, nor less than three-eighths of one inch thick ... 8-10c per lb

Ditto, comprising round iron not less than three-fourths of one inch in diameter, and square iron not less than three fourths of one inch square ... 1c per lb

Ditto, comprising flats less than one inch wide, or less than three-eighths of one inch thick; round iron less than three-fourths of one inch and not less than seven sixteenths of one inch in diameter, and square iron less than three-fourths of one inch square ... 1-1-10c per lb

Provided, that all iron in slabs, blooms, loops, or other forms, less finished than iron in bars, and more advanced than pig iron, except castings, shall be rated as iron in bars, and pay a duty accordingly; and none of the above iron shall pay a less rate of duty than thirty-five per centum ad valorem.

Provided further, that all iron bars, blooms, billets, or sizes, or shapes of any kind, in the manufacture of which charcoal is used as fuel, shall be subjected to a duty of twenty-two dollars per ton.

Iron or steel rails, weighing not over twenty-five pounds to the yard ... 9-10c per lb

Iron or steel flat rails, punched ... 8-10c per lb

Round iron, in coils or rods, less than seven-sixteenths of one inch in diameter, and bars or shapes of rolled iron not specially enumerated or provided for in this Act ... 1-2-10c per lb

Boiler or other plate iron, sheared or unsheared, skelph iron, sheared or rolled in grooves ... 1½c per lb

Sheet iron, common or black, thinner than one inch and one-half, and not thinner than number twenty wire gauge ... 1-1-10c per lb

Thinner than number twenty wire gauge, and not thinner than number twenty-five wire gauge ... 1-2-10c per lb

Thinner than number twenty-five wire gauge, and not thinner than number twenty-nine wire gauge ... 1-5-10c per lb

Thinner than number twenty-nine wire gauge, and all iron commercially known as common or black taggers' iron, whether put up in boxes or bundles or not ... 30 % ad val

And provided, that on all such iron and steel sheets or plates aforesaid, excepting on what are known commercially as tin plates, terne plates, and taggers' tin, and hereafter provided for, when galvanised or coated with zinc or spelter or other metals, or any alloy of those metals, three-fourths of one cent per pound additional.

Polished, planished or glanced sheet-iron or sheet steel, by whatever name designated ... 2½c per lb

SCHEDULE K.

Wool and Woollens.

All wools, hair of the alpaca, goat and other like animals, shall be divided, for the purpose of fixing the duties to be charged thereon, into the three following classes:

Class 1, Clothing Wools.—That is to say, merino, mestiza, metz, or metis wools, or other wools of merino blood, immediate or remote, Down clothing wools, and wools of like character with any of the preceding, including such as have been heretofore usually imported into the United States from Buenos Ayres, New Zealand, Australia, Cape of Good Hope, Russia, Great Britain, Canada, and elsewhere, and also including all wools not hereinafter described or designated in classes 2 and 3.

Class 2, Combing Wools.—That is to say, Leicester, Cotswold, Lincolnshire, Down combing wools, Canada long wools, or other like combing wools of English blood, and usually known by the terms *lawn* used, and also all hair of the alpaca, goat, and other like animals.

Class 3, Carpet Wools, and other similar wools—such as Donskoi, native South American, Cordova, Valparaiso, native Smyrna, and including all such wools of like character as have been heretofore usually imported into the United States from Turkey, Greece, Egypt, Syria, and elsewhere. The duty on wools of the first-class which shall be imported washed shall be twice the amount of the duty to which they would be subjected if imported unwashed; and the duty on wools of all classes which shall be imported scoured shall be three times the duty to which they would be subjected if imported unwashed. The duty upon wool of the sheep, or hair of the alpaca, goat, and other like animals, which shall be imported in any other than ordinary condition, as now and heretofore practised, or which shall be changed in character or condition for the purpose of evading the duty, or which shall be reduced in value by the admixture of dirt or any other foreign substance, shall be twice the duty to which it would be otherwise subject.

MACHINERY FOR REPAIR.

Machinery for repair may be imported into the United States without payment of duty, under bond, to be given in double the appraised value thereof, to be withdrawn and exported after said machinery shall have been repaired; and the Secretary of the Treasury is authorised and directed to prescribe such rules and regulations as may be necessary to protect the revenue against fraud, and secure the identity and character of all such importations when again withdrawn and exported, restricting and limiting the export and withdrawal to the same port of entry where imported, and also limiting all bonds to a period of time of not more than six months from the date of the importation.

ART IMPORTATIONS.

All paintings, statuary, and photographic pictures imported into the United States for exhibition by any association duly authorised under the laws of the United States, or any State, for the promotion and encouragement of science, art, or industry, and not intended for sale, shall be admitted free of duty, under such regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury shall prescribe. Such bonds shall be given for the payment to the United States of such duties as may be imposed by law upon any and all of such articles as shall not be re-exported within six months after such importation.

All works of art, collections in illustration of the progress of the arts, science, or manufactures, photographs, works in terra-cotta, Parian, pottery, or porcelain, and artistic copies of antiquities in metal or other material, hereafter imported in good faith for permanent exhibition at a fixed place by any society or institution established for the encouragement of the arts or science, and not intended for sale, nor for any other purpose than is hereinbefore expressed, and all such articles, imported as aforesaid, now in bond, and all like articles imported in good faith by any society or association for the purpose of erecting a public monument, and not for sale, shall be admitted free of duty, under such regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury may prescribe: Provided, That the parties importing articles as aforesaid shall be required to give bonds, with sufficient sureties, under such rules and regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury may prescribe, for the payment of lawful duties which may accrue should any of the articles aforesaid be sold, transferred, or used contrary to the provisions and intent of this Act.

SHIPBUILDING MATERIALS.

All lumber, timber, hemp, manila, wire rope, and iron and steel rods, bars, spikes, nails and bolts, and copper and composition metal which may be necessary for the construction and equipment of vessels built in the United States for foreign account and ownership or for the purpose of foreign account and ownership or for the purpose of being employed in the foreign trade, including the trade between the Atlantic and Pacific ports of the United States, after the passage of this Act, may be imported in bond under such regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury may prescribe; and upon proof that such materials have been used for such purposes no duties shall be paid thereon. But vessels receiving the benefit of this section shall not be allowed to engage in the coastwise trade of the United States more than two months in any one year, except upon the payment to the United States of the duties on which a rebate is herein allowed: Provided, That vessels built in the United States for foreign account and ownership shall not be allowed to engage in the coastwise trade of the United States.

All articles of foreign production needed for the repair of American vessels engaged exclusively in foreign trade may be withdrawn from bonded warehouses free of duty, under such regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury may prescribe.

RAW AND UNMANUFACTURED ARTICLES.

There shall be levied, collected, and paid on the importation of all raw or unmanufactured articles, not herein enumerated or provided for, a duty of ten per centum ad valorem; and all articles manufactured, in whole or in part, not herein enumerated or provided for, a duty of twenty per centum ad valorem.

GOODS IN BOND.

That all imported goods, wares, and merchandise which may be in the public stores or bonded warehouses on the day and year when this Act shall go into effect, except as otherwise provided in this Act, shall be subjected to no other duty upon the entry thereof for consumption than if the same were imported respectively after that day; and all goods, wares, and merchandise remaining in bonded warehouses on the day and year this Act shall take effect, and upon which the duties shall have been paid, shall be entitled to a refund of the difference between the amount of duties paid and the amount of duties said goods, wares, and merchandise would be subject to if the same were imported respectively after that date.

In respect of all articles mentioned in Schedule E of section six of this Act, this Act shall take effect on and after the first day of June, 1883.

Beyond this, it will be seen that two additional columns have been inserted in the Stock and Share Tables. These will record the Highest and Lowest prices of 1883 to date throughout the current year.
