ECLIPSES OF 1859.

There will be Six Eclipses this year;—Four of the SUN, and Two of the MOON:

I.—The first will be a very PARTIAL ECLIPSE of the SUN, on Wednesday, February 2d day, invisible to us.

II.—The SECOND will be a TOTAL ECLIPSE of the MOON, on Thursday, February 17th day, and visible here:—First contact with the Penumbra, at 3h. 21m; beginning of Total Phase, 5h. 15m; middle of the Eclipse, 6h. 3m; end of Total Phase, 6h. 52m; Moon sets Eclipsed, at 7h. 3m.—Mean time, morning.

III.—The Third will be a PARTIAL ECLIPSE of the SUN, on Friday, March 4th day, invisible to us.

IV.—The Fourth will be a PARTIAL ECLIPSE of the SUN, on Friday July 29th day, visible to us:—Beginning, at 5h. 26m; End of the Eclipse, 6h. 33m. Mean time, evening.

V.—The Fifth will be a TOTAL ECLIPSE of the MOON, on Saturday, August 15th day, invisible to us.

VI.—The Sixth will be a PARTIAL ECLIPSE of the SUN, on Sunday, August 28th day, invisible to us.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS OF 1859.

The Planet *Venus* (♀) will be *Morning Star* until September 27th; then *Evening Star* until the end of the year.—*Mars* (♂) will be *Evening Star* until June 21st; then *Morning Star* to the end of the year.—*Jupiter* (♃) will be *Evening Star* until June 25th; then *Morning Star* to the end of the year.—*Saturn* (♄) will be *Morning Star* until January 29th; then *Evening Star* till Aug. 8th; then *Morning Star* to the end of the year.

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LIGHT HOUSES.

Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.—Robert W Crookshank, John Ward, Isaac Woodward, Lieut. Charles Hare, R. N., John James Robinson, R. N., and Donald Clark, Esquires.

Isaac Woodward, Esquire, Surveyer of those Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy belonging to New Brunswick, and also of those belonging to Nova Scotia which are partly supported by this Province.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof. A plain white light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the west side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin—A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Bearings and Distance by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House.
This Light bears from the Light house on Brier Island, N. N. W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W.
22 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor E. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. distance 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, off White Head Island,
N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan,
N. N. W. $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges,
N. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

To the Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, W S. W.
2 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W and by N $\frac{1}{4}$ N.
13 miles.

NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westward, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker called the *Bull*. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. 18 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles
The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable, Seal Islands S. and by W. 3 $\frac{1}{4}$ miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed *white* lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, (British or American) Both the Buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz:

- To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly.
- " Gannet Rock Light E. by S. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. 13 miles.
- " Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.
- " Northern Head of Grand Manan. N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.
- " N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.
- " Little River Head, N. by W.
- " Libby Island Light House, (American,) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the lights.

[It is recommended that the Ship's Compasses should be well compared and adjusted (particularly in new ships), before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westerly, or (1 $\frac{1}{2}$ points) it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay (South Channel) between the Old Proprietor and N. W. Ledge, is S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S., but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light, (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed *white* light. The building is painted White, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet—Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and *white*. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed *white* light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes.

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Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed *white* light. The House is white and black, in stripes vertically.

Quaco.—A revolving *white* light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain *white* light. The House is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

West Quiddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light—On Cape Forchu, on the western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova-Scotia), in lat. 43,39, N. long, 66,S. W. It exhibits a plain revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

SIGNALS.

Displayed at Partridge Island, on the approach of Vessels to the Harbour of Saint John.

- One ball close, for one square-rigged Vessel,
- One ball half hoisted for two ditto.
- Two Balls close, for three Vessels
- Two Balls separated, for four ditto
- A Pendant of any colour, for five ditto
- A ditto under a Ball, for six ditto
- A ditto over a Ball half hoisted, for seven ditto
- A ditto under two Balls close, for eight ditto

A ditto between two Balls separate, for nine ditto

A Flag of any colour, for ten or more ditto

The above are displayed at the East or West yard arm, according to the direction in which the Vessels are at first observed, and as soon as their rig can be distinguished, descriptive Colours will be hoisted at the mast head, in the following order :

A Union Jack for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.

“ with a Red Pendant over, for a two-decker

“ with a Blue Pendant over, for a Frigate

“ with a white ditto, for a small armed vessel

A blue Pendant for a Merchant Ship

A red ditto, for a Merchant Brig

A white and blue ditto, for a Foreign Vessel

A white ditto, [without a ball,] for a Topsail Schooner or Sloop.

A blue Flag pierced white, for a steamboat from Saint Andrews or Eastport.

A Red Flag pierced white, for a Steamboat from Digby

A Red Flag with a white square, for a Steamboat from Boston

A Ball at the mast head, Vessel is on Shore or in distress

RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John—passed 3d August, 1848.

Five Shillings per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and Five Shillings per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by Virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing Vessels from any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hundred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Vessels over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, Ten Shillings; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three Hundred Tons, Fifteen Shillings; and for all Vessels over Three Hundred Tons, the sum of Twenty Shillings.

First Distance.—From Partridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing North West, Five Shillings per foot.

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point LePreaux, bearing North West, Six Shillings and Threepence per foot.

Third Distance.—From Point Lepreaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West—or North Channel, bearing South East, Seven Shillings and Sixpence per foot.

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Fourth Distance.—From the North Head of Grand Manau—or North Channel as aforesaid—to Machias Sea Island, bearing South, or Brier Island bearing South South East, Eight Shillings and Ninepence per foot.

Fifth Distance.—Any where outside the aforesaid distance, Ten Shillings per foot.

On Vessels of 30 Tons and under 50, 2s. 6d.; Vessels of 50 Tons and under 75, 3s. 9d.; 75 and under 100 tons, 5s.; 100 and under 150 tons, 6s. 3d.; 150 and under 200 tons, 7s. 6d.; 200 and under 300 tons, 10s.; 300 and under 400 tons, 12s. 6d.; 400 tons and upwards, 15s.; Decked Vessels, under 100 tons, owned and registered at Saint John, and all British Vessels under that tonnage trading within the Bay of Fundy, or arriving from Ports to the Northward of Cape Cod, or the Westward of Cape Canso, or from any Port in Nova Scotia, to pay annually as follows: Under 30 tons, 3s. 9d.; over 30 and under 50 tons, 5s.; over 50 and under 75 tons, 6s.; over 75 and under 80 tons, 10s.

RATES OF WHARFAGE, established by Act 5 Vict. cap. 49, in the City of Saint John and Parish of Portland.—For every decked vessel, or wood boat, of the burthen of 40 tons and under 1s. 6d. per day; above 40 tons, and under 50, 1s. 9d.; above 50, and under 60, 2s.; above 60, and under 70, 2s. 3d.; above 70, and under 80, 2s. 6d.; above 80, and under 90, 2s. 9d.; above 90, and under 100, 3s.; above 100, and under 120, 3s. 6d.; above 120, and under 150, 4s.; above 150, and under 180, 4s. 6d.; above 180, and under 200, 5s.; above 200, and under 220, 5s. 6d.; above 220, and under 240, 6s.; above 240, and under 260, 6s. 6d.; above 260 and under 280, 7s.; above 280, and under 300, 7s. 6d.; above 300, and under 320, 8s.; above 320, and under 340, 8s. 6d.; above 340, and under 360, 9s.; above 360, and under 380, 9s. 6d.; above 380, and under 400, 10s.; above 400, and under 450, 11s. 3d.; above 450, and under 500, 12s. 6d.; and 1s. 3d. for every additional 50 tons.

RATES OF SLIPPAGE AT THE CORPORATION SLIPS.

All Decked Vessels, same rates as for Wharfage; Wood Boats, and other Boats, or undecked Vessels, having standing Masts, and all Scows, and not lying at the wharves on either side of Slips, to pay the following rates:

Every Woodboat of sufficient burthen to carry 10 Cords of Wood, or under, 1s. 6d.
ditto ditto upwards of 10 Cords, and not more than 15, 2s. 6d.
ditto ditto upwards of 15 Cords, and not more than 20, 3s. 9d.
ditto ditto upwards of 20 Cords, 5s.

The above to be paid each trip, and if any such Vessel remains over six days, an additional duty to be paid of from 2s. 6d. to 5s. daily, according to the burthen. Other Boats and Vessels without decks, and having fixed or standing masts, and all Scows, to pay 1s. 6d. each trip and 1s. 6d. additional per day, if suffered to remain over three days.

RATES OF FERRIAGE ACROSS THE HARBOUR OF ST. JOHN—Foot passenger, 2d.; Child under twelve years, 1d.; Horse, 3d.; Ox, or other large animal, 3d.; Elephant or Camel, 1s. 3d.; sin-

RATES AT THE PUBLIC WEIGHING MACHINES—Every load not exceeding One Thousand Pounds Weight, One Shilling; and One Penny for every additional Hundred Weight; payable, half by the seller, and half by the purchaser.

HACKNEY COACH FARES.—For conveying one passenger from any public stand to any part of the City, or from any one part of the City to any other part thereof, 1s.; and for every passenger exceeding one, 6d. additional; and if any driver of any Carriage or other vehicle, shall be detained at any place by any passenger, or shall make any agreement for carrying any passengers by the hour, he shall be entitled to ask, and receive the following rates, viz:—For any time not exceeding half an hour, 1s. 3d.; and in that proportion for every half hour that such Carriage, or other vehicle shall be detained or employed. Provided always, that in case any driver shall be required to cross the Ferry to Carleton, he shall, in addition to the foregoing fares, be entitled to demand and receive the ferrage for himself, his carriage and horses, both going and returning.

PUBLIC PORTERS AND HAND CART MEN—For loading carrying, and housing any goods, or any other article on any Hand Cart, from the Market Slip in King's and Queen's Wards, or from any other place within the limits of the first district, to any other place within the said several Five districts, the rates of prices are as follow:—For the first district 3d.; second district 3½d.; third district 4d.; fourth district 4½d.; fifth district 5d.

MARKET TOLLS.—Beef, per quarter, 2d.; Calf, Sheep, Hog, Goat, Lamb, Kid, or Shoat 2d.; Tub, Pail or Jar of Butter, 1½d.; Firkin, 3d.; every 10 lbs. of Roll Butter, 1d.; Cheese, ½d.; load of Potatoes under 15 bushels, 3d.; ditto over 15 bushels, 6d.; load of Oysters in shell or tub, 6d.; Turkey, Goose, or dozen of Pidgeons, ½d.; pair of Ducks, Fowls or Partridges, ½d.; bag of Flour, Meal, Oats, Peas, or Beans, ½d.; Ham or Shoulder, ½d.; Eggs, per 10 dozen, ½d.; and all other articles in like proportion.

FISH MARKET DUES.—For every Salmon, 1½d.. Codfish, Pollock, Bass, or Shad, each ½d.; Hallibut, not exceeding 20 lbs. 1d.; exceeding 20 lbs., and for every 20 lbs., 1d.; every Lobster, ½d.; dozen of Haddock, 1½d.; every 100 of Gaspereaux, Alewives, Herrings, or other small fish, 1½d.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS—(near Saint John.)—The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

AGRICULTURAL.

DIFFERENCES IN SOILS.— Soil is the earth wherein crops of every kind are produced. The component parts are argill, sand, water, and air. Argill is the soft and unctuous part of clay. Argill and sand contain each, in nearly equal degrees, the food of plants. There are different kinds of soil, which may be divided into four classes, namely: clay, sand, gravel, and what is termed peat earth. There is, however, another kind of soil called garden mould, but as it is mainly of artificial creation, it can hardly be ranked with natural or original soils. Loam, too, has been considered by some as an original earth, but in reality it is an artificial soil, produced by calcareous matters, and animal and vegetable manures. In process of time the strongest clay may be converted into a loam, by repeated application of the substances just mentioned. Sandy soils may also be converted into light loams by the application of lime, chalk, marl and clay. And even peat may be turned into a black, soft loam, and rendered fertile and productive.

A clay soil differs from all other soils, and is tough, wet and cold, and requires a good deal of labour to render it fit for bearing artificial crops of corn or grass. When once wetted it does not soon dry, and when thoroughly dry it is not easily wetted. When it is ploughed in a wet state it sticks to the plough like mortar, and in a dry summer the clods can scarcely be broken or separated by the heaviest roller.

Sandy soils are managed with much less trouble, and at an expense greatly inferior to what clay soils require; but the crops which are produced from them are generally of smaller value. There are several varieties of sandy soils, and in some artificial plants will not thrive, unless a portion of good earth is previously mixed. A true sandy loam resting upon a sound subsoil, is called the most valuable of all soils upon which all kinds of grain may be raised with advantage, and no soil is better adapted for turnips or grass. Sandy soils thoroughly invigorated with clay and marl, by judicious management, may be made to produce the largest crops.

Gravelly soils freely imbibed moisture, and part with it with great facility. From the lightness of their texture, they are neither expensive nor difficult in the means of cultivation. They are usually barren, but by frequent applications of manure, and by frequent returns of grass, they may be made fertile and prolific. Deep ploughing is essentially necessary, so that the surface soil may be augmented, and greater room given to the growth of the plants cultivated on them. If shallow ploughed, it is either burned up in a day or two of drought, or equally injured by an excessive fall of rain.

Peat earth, probably, is an artificial soil, made and produced by certain substances deposited upon the surface of the earth. Philosophers, however, disagree on this point. By one it is called primitive earth; by another, a vegetable which grows and increases, and continues to increase until it destroys all other soils;

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and by a third, that it consists of ligneous and aquatic plants. It has been said that one-fourth of the habitable globe is peat, or moss earth, and it is, perhaps, surprising that so little is known on a subject of so much importance. This soil is friendly to the growth of oats, if previously it has been summer-fallowed and enriched with manure. A heavy crop of wheat, if the season is favourable, may also be obtained.

As to the uses to which soils may be most advantageously applied, it is requisite that clay soil be kept rich and full of manure, which qualifies it for carrying crops of wheat, oats, beans, and clover. Usually, clay soils require great industry and care, and a thorough knowledge in the dressing, to keep them in a proper condition. No soil is so ungrateful as this one, if allowed to get into a sterile condition; but if manure is profusely appropriated, with an occasional summer-fallowing, it will yield the heaviest and most abundant crops.

Upon light soils the case is somewhat different. The facility with which they are cultivated, furnishes encouragement to keep them under the plough. Grasses flourish the best, and summer-fallow is rarely required. The best method perhaps, of procuring wheat, is to sow upon a clover stubble, which gives an artificial solidity to the soil, and is thereby rendered capable of sustaining this grain until it arrives at maturity.

SOAP SUDS.—Save the suds from the sink and the laundry. If you do not want it for purposes of irrigation, let it be conveyed to manure heaps, or mixed with materials of compost. No article of a liquid nature possesses more powerful alimentary properties, and its economizing will be found a source of considerable profit to any one who will properly use it. It contains the food of plants in a state of solution, and therefore is prepared to act at once, and with energy. By mixing it with suds, chip manure, muck, refuse straw, green vegetable matter, or, indeed, any kind of decomposed rubbish, and allowing the whole to ferment slowly, a most excellent fertilizer for Indian corn may be prepared, and one that will bring forward the crop with greater vigor than almost any other article that can be named. It is also very valuable as a manure for culmiferous vegetables—melons, squashes, cucumbers, &c.

CURING CLOVER HAY.—As the time of cutting and curing clover hay is near at hand, I have felt it my duty to write a few lines describing the true manner of curing clover hay.

To begin with, never cock your hay until it is dry enough to go into the stack or barn. If the grass ever heats or sweats in cock or stack, it must necessarily be dusty and damaged. And for myself, I had as leave it would sweat and burn in the mow as in the cock. Clover hay is always cut when it is green and full of juice, and of all the grasses, needs the most careful curing. I think there has been ten tons of hay spoiled for the fear of rain, to one of actual rain. Cut your clover and let it alone until one side is cured thoroughly by the sun, and then turn it over and

let that dry, and then gather it up as soon as possible and secure it in the stack or barn. In the first place, it is not half the labor that attends the cocking system; it is not half the work to rake dry hay as it is wet grass, because it is not more than half as heavy. But some are foolish enough to say that the sun will burn your clover all up, and that the best part, the leaves, will all be lost. In regard to the first objection, it is not true. Clover when dry is light, and particularly so when cock or mow burned. The truth is that before the following spring it must be dry or rotten, and the man that flatters himself, that because he draws into his barn twenty tons of hay and ten tons of water, that he has got thirty tons of hay, is deceived. And in regard to the second objection, the loss of leaves is comparatively nothing, as what few do fall off upon the ground will not hurt the ground at all; at least those that believe in plowing in clover will agree to it. But, says the objector, what are you going to do in a catchy or rainy time? All you have to do, is to let your grass lay in the swath until it does dry; but in case there is danger of moulding, turn it over; but it will stand rain a great while without moulding, for there is not quantity enough together to give chance for heating and destruction. And for leaching the hay to injure it, that is all humbug. I have had grass lay in the swath two weeks, and yet made good hay, but I had to turn the grass over occasionally. In conclusion I say to all new beginners, to try it on a small scale at first, and they will become satisfied; but I have little hope of convincing anybody against their will. "Make hay while the sun shines."

TO PREVENT SOWS KILLING THEIR PIGS.—A correspondent of the *Maine Farmer*, speaks of several cases of sows destroying their pigs, which, indeed, is not unusual, and commends as an easy and sure prevention "to give the sow about half a pint of good rum, or gin, which soon produces intoxication, and the drunken mother becomes entirely harmless toward her young, and will ever accommodate her position to the best advantage of the pigs," retaining this disposition ever afterwards. The editor confirms this statement from cases within his own knowledge.

COLIC IN HORSES.—Colic in horses is a very common disease, and if taken in time may be easily cured in most cases. It is not unfrequently confounded with inflammation of the bowels, but is easily distinguished as follows:—Colic has no increase of the pulse, which is not over fifty a minute; the animal often rolls; the disease intermits, and there is but little fever. With inflammation of the bowels there is much fever; the pulse is sometimes a hundred a minute, the attack is gradual, and the disease does not intermit.

When colic arises from bad food, a pint or so of a solution of saleratus will often afford entire relief. As it assumes more of a spasmodic character, peppermint and ginger may be added. We have used with entire and immediate success, a small spoonful of saleratus, the same quantity of ginger, and a tea-spoonful of peppermint, added to a pint of nearly hot water, and given from a

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junk bottle. Powdered charcoal is one of the best and safest mediums for any disease resulting from derangement of the digestion, and two or three ounces or more mixed with water, may be given at any time with great advantage.

Inflammation of the bowels is generally increased and rendered fatal by irritating medicines. A drink of slippery elm, hourly, to allay irritation, giving the animal but little food, and that weak gruel, and keeping him quiet, is good and safe treatment.

MILKING YOUNG COWS.—It is said that young cows, the first year they give milk, may be made, with careful milking and good keeping, to give milk almost any length of time deemed desirable; but that if they are allowed to dry up early in the fall, they will, if they have a calf at the same season, dry up at the same time each succeeding year, and nothing but extra feed will prevent it, and that but for a short time.

THE PROPERTIES OF A GOOD HORSE.—A good horse should have fifteen properties and conditions, viz.: three of a man, three of a woman, three of a fox, three of a hare, and three of an ass. Of a man, bold, proud and hardy; of a woman, fair-breasted, quick hearing and easy to move; of a fox, a fair tail, short ears and a good trot; of a hare, a clear eye, a dry head and a well formed body; of an ass, a big chin, a flat leg and a good hoof.

MISCELLANEOUS.

REMARKABLE WORKS OF HUMAN LABOR.—Nineveh was 15 miles long, 8 wide, and 40 miles round, with a wall 100 feet high, and thick enough for three chariots abreast. Babylon was 50 miles within the walls, which were 76 feet thick and 100 high, within 100 brazen gates. The temple of Diana, at Ephesus, was 420 feet to the support of the roof. It was a hundred years in building. The largest of the Pyramids was 481 feet high, and 653 on the sides; its base covers eleven acres. The stones are about 60 feet in length, and the layers are 208. It employed 330,000 men in building. The labyrinth in Egypt presents ruins 27 miles round, and 100 gates. Carthage was 29 miles round. Athens was 25 miles, and contained 320 thousand citizens and 400 slaves. The temple of Delphus was so rich in donations that it was plundered of £12,500,000, and Nero carried away from it 200 statues. The walls of Rome were 13 miles round.

EVENING HOURS FOR MECHANICS.—What have evening hours done for Mechanics who had only ten hours toil? Harken to the following facts:—One of the best editors the *Westminster Review* ever had, and one of the most brilliant writers of the passing hour was a cooper in Aberdeen. One of the editors of the *London Daily Journal* was a baker in Elgin; perhaps the best reporter of the *London Times* was a weaver in Edinburgh; the editor of the *Witness* was a stone mason. One of the ablest ministers in London was a blacksmith in Dundee; and another was a watch-maker in Bauff. The late Dr. Milne of China, was a herd-boy in Rhine. The principal of the *London Missionary*

Society's College at Hong Kong, was a saddler in Huntley; and one of the best missionaries that ever went to India was a tailor from Keith. The leading machinist on the London and Birmingham railway; with a salary of £700 a year, was a mechanic in Glasgow; and perhaps the very richest iron founder in England was a working man in Morap. Sir James Clark, Her Majesty's physician, was a druggist in Bauff. Joseph Hume was a sailor first, and then a labourer at the mortar and pestle in Montrose; Mr. McGregor, the member of Parliament from Glasgow, was a poor boy in Rosshire. James Wilson, the member from Westbury, was a ploughman in Haddington, and Arthur Anderson, the member from Orkney, earned his bread by the sweat of his brow in the Ultima Thule.

UPPER STORIES OF THE PROFESSION.—A young man is said to have inquired of Daniel Webster whether there was any room for him in the legal profession. His answer was, that there is room enough for thousands in the upper stories of all the professions. To a casual observer, the professions all seem to be full; they seem, indeed, to be crowded to excess with young aspirants. The reason is because we look only at the lower stories of the professions; the more exalted and intellectual portion of them do not come under our notice. When a man, therefore, tells us that there is abundance of room for more lawyers, preachers, and doctors, we are ready to pass it as hyperbole. We find it hard to bring our mind to believe that a single individual can elbow his way through the hungry crowd that throngs every professional business within our acquaintance. Yet it is doubtless true that the higher grades of mental culture exist nowhere in too great profusion. Whether we make our inquiries among the professions, the sciences or the literature of our country, we shall find a paucity rather than a surplus of finished talent. Is there any danger of scientific acumen being soon at a discount from a want of subjects of further investigation? Could not a few more accomplished jurists and diplomatists find employment yet in the various departments of Government? Could not a physician of superior attainments find employment almost any where without infringing on the rights of others in the same business as himself? Indeed, there is no employment known to civilized society, where the occupants of the most talented and accomplished circles would have any occasion to disturb one another's equanimity in consequence of a closeness of contact.

The fact is, the best, the most talented, the upper stories of all the employments are not overrun. There is room enough for all the young people now in our schools. The world is asking for a lofty but practical talent, for noble, generous-hearted patriotism, and for resolute, unflinching moral endowments. Those possessing these qualities cannot fail to find ample opportunities of *labors both useful and profitable.*

One of the finest specimens of laconic speech on record is that of Rochejacquin—"If I advance, follow me; if I fall, avenge me; if I flinch, kill me."

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THE LOVE OF HOME.—It is only the shallow minded pretenders who make either distinguished origin a matter of personal merit, or obscure origin a matter of personal reproach. A man who is not ashamed of himself, need not be ashamed of his early condition. It did happen to me to be born in a log cabin, raised among the snow-drifts of New Hampshire, at a period so early that when the smoke first rose from its rude chimney and curled over the frozen hills, there was no similar evidence of a white man's habitation between it and the settlement on the river Canada. Its remains still exist. I make it an annual visit. I carry my children to it, and teach them the hardships endured by the generations before them. I love to dwell on the tender recollections, the kindred ties, the early affections, and the narration and incidents which mingle with all I know of this primitive family abode. I weep to think that none of those who inhabited it are among the living; and if I fail in affectionate veneration for him who raised it, and defended it against savage violence and destruction, cherished all domestic comforts beneath its roof, and through the fire and blood of seven years revolutionary war, shrank from no toil, no sacrifice, to save his country and to raise his children to a condition better than his own, may my name and the name of my posterity be blotted from the memory of mankind.—*D. Webster.*

WHAT WILL RUIN CHILDREN.—To have parents exercise partiality. This practice is lamentably prevalent. The first born, the only son or daughter, the beauty or wit of a household, is too commonly set apart, Joseph-like.

To be frequently put out of temper. A child ought always to be spared, as far as possible, all just cause of irritation, and never be punished for wrong doings, by taunts, cuffs, or ridicule.

To be suffered to go uncorrected to day for the very thing for which chastisement was inflicted yesterday. With as much reason might a watch, which should be wound backward half the time, be expected to run as well, as a child thus trained become possessed of an estimable character.

To be corrected for accidental faults with the same severity as if they were those of intention. The child who does ill when he meant to do well, merits pity, not upbraiding. The disappointment to the young projector, attendant on the disastrous failure of any little enterprise, is of itself a sufficient punishment, even were the result brought about by carelessness. To add more is as cruel as it is hurtful.

To be made to feel that they were only burdens. Parents who give a child to understand that he is burdensome to them, need not be surprised should they one day be given to understand that they are burdensome to him. They should bear with childhood.

"Show me how a young man spends his evenings," said a wise and good merchant, "and I will tell you at once his future prospects."

CORRECT SPEAKING.—We advise all young people to acquire, in early life, the habit of using good language, both in speaking and writing, and to abandon, as early as possible, any use of slang

words and phrases. The longer they live, the more difficult the acquisition of such language will be; and if the golden age of youth, the proper season for the acquisition of language, be past in its abuse, the unfortunate victim of neglected education is very probably doomed to talk slang for life. Money is not necessary to procure this education. Every man has it in his power. 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THE AMOUNT OF FOOD CONSUMED BY A MAN DURING HIS LIFETIME.—M. Alexis Soyer, the celebrated professor of the gastronomic art, entered into a calculation, which he published in the London *Times*, as to the amount of flesh, fowl and fish eaten by a man in an average lifetime, and among the items we find the following enormous quantities:—30 oxen, 200 sheep, 100 calves, 200 lambs, 50 pigs; in poultry, 1,200 fowls, 300 turkeys, 150 geese, 400 ducklings, 263 pigeons; 1,400 partridges, pheasants and grouse, 600 woodcock and snipe, 600 wild pigeons and teal; 450 plovers; ruffs, and reeves; 800 quails, ortolan and dotterills, and a few guillemots and other foreign birds; also 500 hares and rabbits, 40 deer, 120 guinea fowl, 10 peacocks, and 360 wild fowl. In the way of fish, 120 turbot, 140 salmon, 120 cod, 260 trout, 400 mackerel, 300 whittings, 800 soles and slips, 400 flounders, 400 red mullet, 200 eels, 150 haddock, 400 herrings, and 5,000 smelts; and some hundred thousands of those delicious silvery whitebait, besides a few hundred species of fresh water fishes. In shellfish, 20 turtle, 30,000 oysters, 1,500 lobsters or crabs, 300,000 prawns, shrimps, sardines, and anchovies.

DON'T FRET.—It is unamiable. A fretting man or woman is one of the most unloveable objects in the world. A wasp is a comfortable housemate in comparison; it only stings when disturbed. But an habitual fretter buzzes if he don't sting, with or without provocation. "It is better to dwell in the corner of a housetop than with a brawling woman and in a wide house." LENGTH OF THE GREAT WALL OF CHINA. — Huc, ("Christianity in China,") represents the Great Wall, Wang-hing Tching, as 10,000 leagues in length. Instead of leagues it should be li, a Chinese measure of 1,750 feet. Ten thousand leagues are more than the earth's circumference, whilst ten thousand li are equal to 3315 miles, more than twice the real length of the wall, an extension of masonry, however, sufficiently marvellous without supposing it in fact, what it is not, continually of the same dimensions and material throughout. Were the wall double for its whole length, it is partly so, the 10 000 li of the Chinese would be a sufficient approximation to the truth. Nine li are nearly equal to one league. 1500 English miles are very nearly the actual length of the Great Wall.
