

gers. Aboard was Francis S. Mayer, who enjoys the distinction of being the first American ever extradicted by an Oriental nation. He is being taken to Yokohama by Deputy United States Marshal W. E. Grunshaw, of Minneapolis, to answer to a charge of forging and uttering forged bonds in Yokohama. Mayer left Japan for the United States early last November and his alleged forgeries were discovered while he was on his way across the Pacific. A cable-gram was sent to Deputy Marshal Tyler, of Seattle, but the man had left fown before a warrant could be served. He was easily traced to St. Paul and arrested there as he stepped from the train. His wife and child were with him when he was apprehended. Mayer at once began a long legal battle to prevent extradition, but the courts decided against him and the start for the Orient was begun a few days ago. It is claimed by the Japaneses government that Meyer, while manager of the Japan Herald, forged ten bonds of a laundry company in which he was the managing director. The charse is made that when he ordered the bonds printed for the company he had ten extra ones printed, and upon these ten bonds and other securities that were good he berrowed 6,000 yen from the Russia Chinese bank. The value of the disputed bonds is \$250. Mayer made a hard legal fight in Minneapolis, chiming that he had done nothing that his authority as managing director of the company did not give him a right to do. He lost his case, however, and his extradition, the first since the adoption of the treaty with Japan in 1886, was ordered. The secretary of state at Washington-signed the papers and the Japanese consul appointed S. Saiki, of Chiengo, the representative of his government, to accompany the prisoner to Japan.


