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

PROVINCE HELPLESS UNDER AID PROPOSAL

British Columbia Still Responsible but Will Lose Control of C. N. R. Rates

Ottawa, May 28.—Correspondence between Premier Borden and Sir Richard McBride in regard to the C. N. R. agreement has been laid on the table of the house to the effect that the British Columbia premier requests that the agreement does not override that the agreement does not override the province's control of the rates on the C. N. P., otherwise the Dominion must take over the provincels guarantee.

on May 8, Sir Richard McBride wired as follows: "Have before me copy resolutions Canadian Northern Pacific with regard to rates over line in British Columbia. See provincial statutes 1910 and 1914. Respectfully submit provision be made in federal act in order to adequately recognize position of province with regard to agreement."

Premier Borden replied to this telegram as follows: "Referring to your telegram of 8th. Dominion aid principally justified by fact Canadian Northern transcontinental line. It would be practically impossible to assist unless entire line from Atlantic to Pacific became subject to control of federal parliament and federal railway board. We believe that you fully realize this, while we also realize our duty to give every consideration to arrangement made by Pacific company with your province. Have you any suggestion as to any suitable proviso by way of safeguard? British Columbia statutes 1914 not available."

Sir Richard followed this up with a lengthy letter explaining British Columbia's position, and asking that a clause be inserted providing that, as long as British Columbia is a guarantor of bonds nothing in the act shall supersede the province's legislation in regard to the C. N. P.

To this Premier Borden replied that they did not feel able to press legislation unless the entire system from the Atlantic to the Pacific was declared to be for the general advantage of Canada. They felt sure this to be to the advantage of the bondholders and the province as guarantor. He regretted that "we cannot accept the proposed amendment, as it practically excludes from control of the federal railway board of an important portion of the system on which a large part of the proposed aid will be expended."

If in the opinion of the federal government it is essential to place the Canadian Northern Pacific under control of the railway commissich, I would submit that some proviso be included in the legislation contemplated giving special recognition to the province with regard to rates over this line, otherwise that the dominion take over provincial guarantee."

A final telegram was sent by Premier Borden on May 25 stating that the proposals would be carefully considered, and he regretted that they did not believe them practicable. He repeated that the position of all the provinces is materially strengthened by the proposals, and adds: "As a large part of proposed aid must be expended in completion of C. N. P., that portion of system should obviously be declared a work for general advantage of Canada. Unless such a declaration is made no part of the proposed aid could be so expended."

After practically two weeks of discussion, the C. N. R. resolutions were given a first reading in the afternoon, and now stand for a second reading. Then the bill will be introduced and at the second reading stage it is expected there will be a number of divisions.






PLANS CALLED FOR.
