

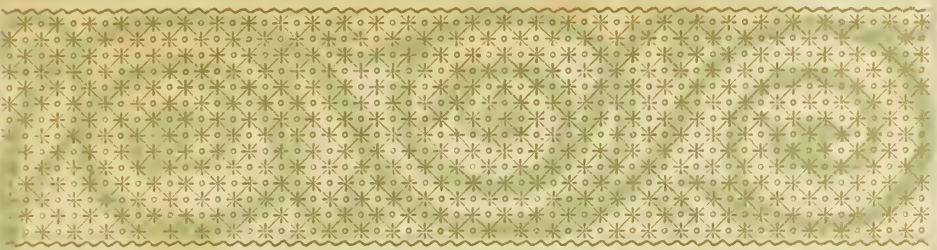

THIS PLANT, of recent introduction, has been one of the most attractive subjects in our hardy border during September and October, and is without doubt one of the best of the hardy Marguerites. The engraving shows the bloom at two-thirds the natural size, and gives a very good idea of its attractive character; the large bold flowers, three inches across, are pure white, with a bronze yellow center. The blossoms are borne on strong stems, three to five feet high, presenting an appearance of picturesque raggedness which is very attractive. ANEMONE JAPONICA.

Coreopsis Lanceolata.

(The Perpetual Golden Coreopsis.)

We have great pleasure in offering this valuable hardy perennial, which is destined to have a wide and well-deserved popularity. The annual varieties of Coreopsis are well known to all lovers of flowers. This being a perennial at once recommends itself over the annuals, requiring, as it does, but one purchase of the plants to have them always in the garden from year to year. The flowers are from two to three inches in diameter, of an intensely clear golden yellow, borne at the end of a long, straight stem, ten to sixteen inches long. The plant commences to bloom about the first week in June, being at once covered with a wreath of flowers, and continuing in full bloom until hard frost. By cutting the flowers as they mature, the number of blossoms will be greatly increased. It will prove a most valuable acquisition for bedding in masses, or planting singly in mixed borders, or among shrubbery, in any of which situations it will form a conspicuous and lasting ornament.

It makes a dense tuft of glossy foliage, which is rich and bright till hard frosts, and out of this mass of foliage rises a constant succession of tall, slender stems, two feet high, bearing blossoms of the most brilliant golden yellow conceivable, and as large as a silver dollar. The beauty of these flowers is unequalled by any yellow flower that I know of, and the long stems fit them for cutting for the house, so that there is, perhaps, no other perennial so valuable for summer cutting. Add to this superior beauty and perpetual bloom the fact that they are entirely hardy, and will grow in any soil, and you will have a veritable floral treasure."

INTRODUCTORY.



IN former editions of this catalogue we have so fully described our business and the manner of conducting it, that we shall devote the space this year to a partial description of our FLOWER SHOW and CHRYSANTHEMUM EXHIBITION.

The Chrysanthemum is of such marvelous beauty, and is cultivated in such variety of size, color and shape that Chrysanthemum Shows are becoming a regular institution throughout this country, as they have been an important feature in horticulture and fashionable society in England for years. These shows become more important every year.

In order to popularize and encourage the cultivation and improvement of this flower, we held an exhibition last November, the success of which was all we could ask. In fact, its appreciation surpassed our most sanguine expectations. The photo-engraving on the opposite page shows the character of the display, but gives little idea of the extent or beauty of the exhibition.

The following notes of the show are taken from *The American Florist* of December 4th, 1890:

"Adjoining the flower store and in connection with it, Mr. Chaapel has four large greenhouses, each 70x22. In these were placed, in masses of color, all the best plants of Chrysanthemums on the place, palms being effectively placed through the houses to give foliage contrast. The greenhouses as well as the store were brilliantly lighted by electric arc lights in the evening. In the store, the side walls, ceilings stairways, and chandeliers were artistically trimmed with the southern wild smilax, and in connection with heavier greens used the effect was very pleasing. A large canopy trimmed with white Chrysanthemums with a ball of the same flowers suspended, hung in a recess of the room, surrounded by long needle pines and other tropical foliage from Alabama. A small stand stood under the canopy bearing a bouquet of Bride roses and lilies of the valley tied with white satin ribbon, the whole illuminated by a massive piano lamp with a colored shade. Some handsome vases and baskets of orchids and beauty roses and other choice flowers were shown with some fine specimens of plants in Leedsware vases of *Cocos*, *Arecas*, *Pandanus Veitchii*, etc. On a shelf above this, hung a large oil painting draped with wild smilax, which added greatly to the effect. Choice varieties of Chrysanthemums in pots were grouped on a table opposite, with palms and tall needle pines as a background. In front were bowls of cut blooms of Chrysanthemums and near the center under a colored light were placed two handsome baskets filled with selected blooms of white "Ostrich Plume" Chrysanthemum, Mrs. Alpheus Hardy and Louis Boehmer, the new pink "Ostrich Plume."



Hardy Everblooming Climbing Roses.

In reply to many inquiries for Hardy Climbing Roses, which are also constant bloomers, we would say the varieties named below are the best grown, and we think will give good satisfaction; most of them bloom the first season, but they bloom better and more profusely after being out over winter and getting well established. 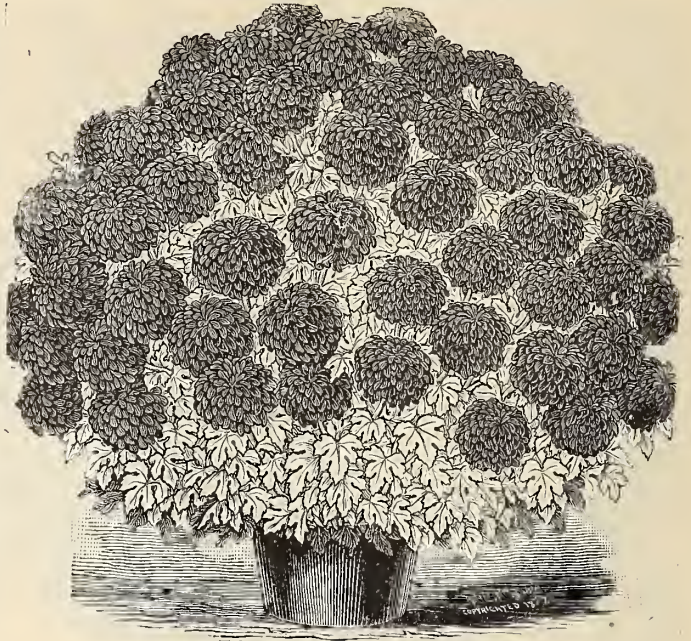

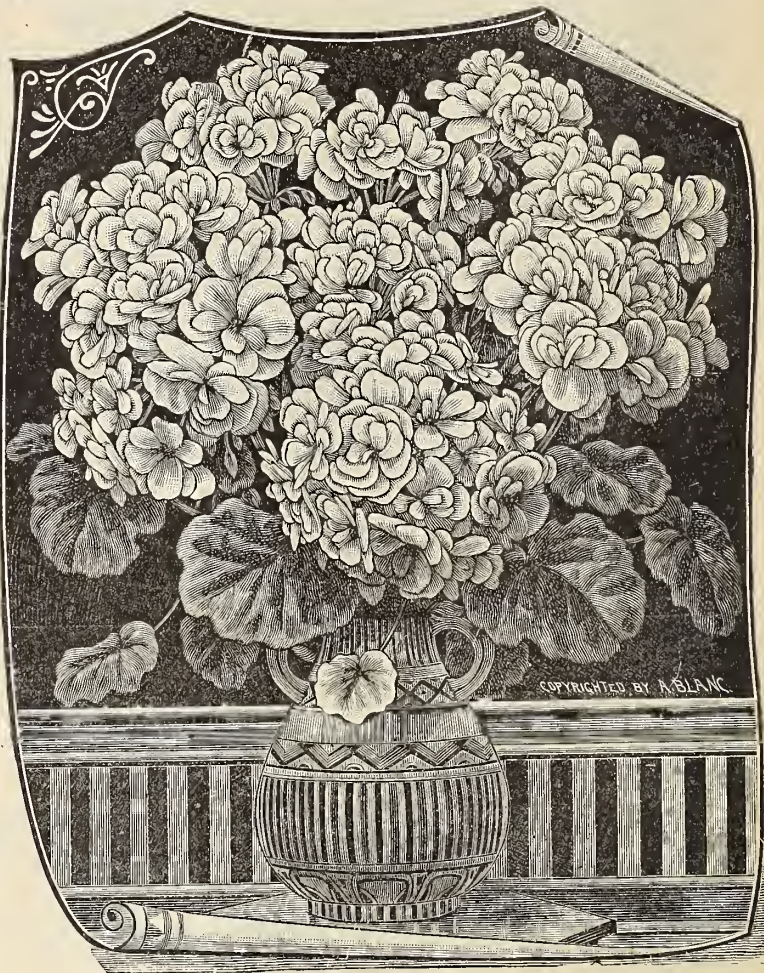

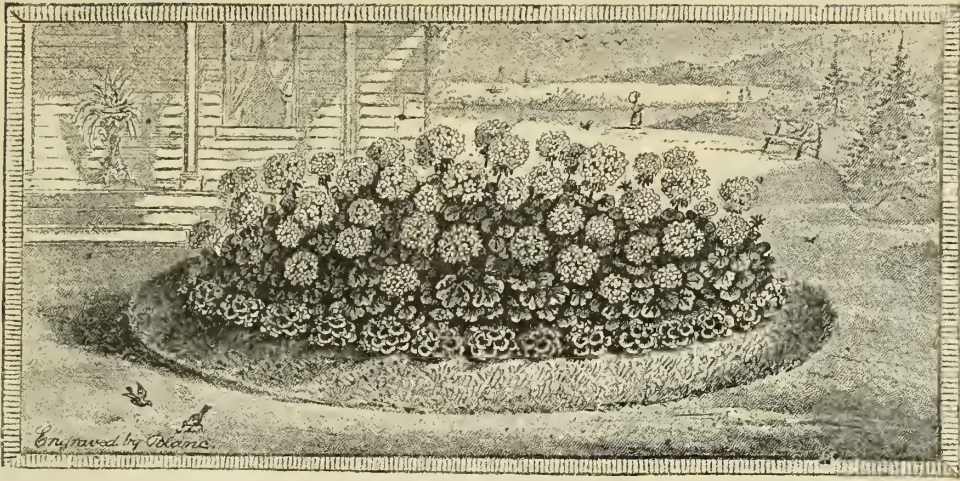

TREATMENT OF PLANTS WHEN RECEIVED.

The plants, if in the least wilted, should be placed with the paper around them in shallow pans with water comfortably warm to the hand, where they should remain twenty minutes to half an hour; this restores their vigor, revives their leaves and increases their vitality.

If it is the season when they can be planted out-doors, the ground should be first well dug up and pulverized; the plants when set out should be first well firmed about the roots, copiously watered once only when planted, and shaded for two or three days when the sun is out. No further watering should be done, but a mulch of moss, manure or leaves around the roots would be beneficial.

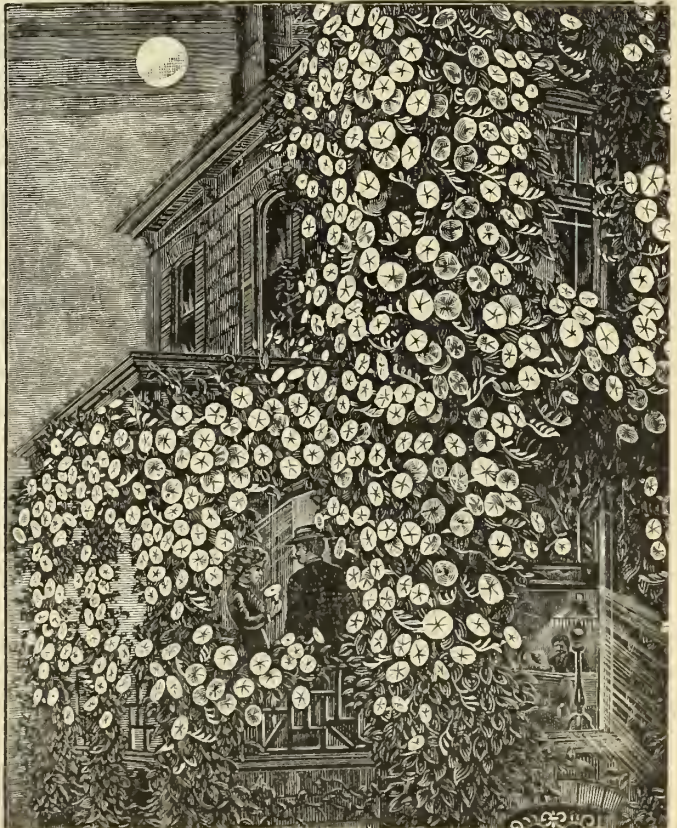

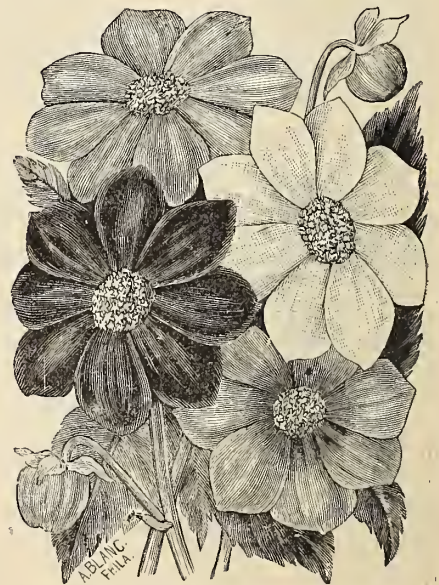

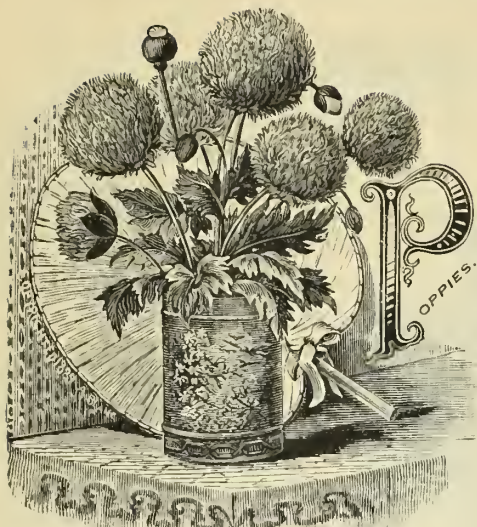

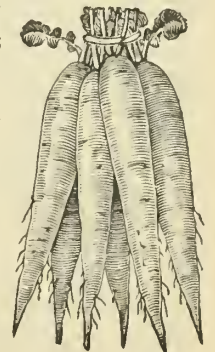
