With money from a New York State Higher Education grant, a series of four laboratories for the year-old Electromechanical Technology program have been established at RIT's Metropolitan Center. The laboratories, with their newly purchased equipment, were recently dedicated, in ceremonies involving students, faculty, and members of the Industrial Advisory Council, which assisted in starting the program last year. The labs cover Electronics, Mechanical Components, Machines and Power Systems, and Electromechanical Devices and Systems. The two year course enrolls about 150 students.
