## THE ROYAL VISITORS REACH VANCOUVER

### WERE RECEIVED WITH GREAT ENTHUSIASM

### Large Crowds Gathered on Streets of Terminal City to Greet Their Royal Highnesses.

(Special to the Times.)  
Vancouver, Sept. 30.—The Royal train, left Banff at 8:35 o'clock on Sunday morning. The day was an absolutely perfect one to view the glories of Canada's great range. Not a cloud was visible in the sky, which showed deep blue above peak and valley.

### Disturbance at Barcelona.

Mob Threw Stones at Police, Who Opened Fire on Crowd.

(Associated Press.)  
Madrid, Sept. 30.—The anniversary of the revolution of 1808 was celebrated at Madrid and other towns yesterday. At a meeting of 20,000 Republicans and Socialists at Barcelona, the crowd proceeded to lay a wreath upon the monument of Gen. Prim, the once famous insurgent leader in Spain. The mob collided with the police, who fired in response to a volley of stones. Three of the persons participating in the demonstrations and two police officers were wounded.

### FILIPINOS KILLED OVER FORTY SOLDIERS

United States Troops Attacked While at Breakfast—Natives Lost One Hundred and Forty.

(Associated Press.)  
Manila, Sept. 30.—Gen. Hughes, from the Island of Samar, reports the arrival of Sergeant Markley and one private at Tannan, from the fight at Halangine, where over forty men of Co. G, Ninth Infantry, were killed by insurgents who attacked the troops while at breakfast on Saturday last.

### ARRIVAL AT VANCOUVER

Vancouver, Sept. 30.—The Royal party arrived at Vancouver at 11:45 to-day, completing their railway journey across the continent exactly on time. The train with Her Excellency Countess of Minto, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the pressmen and Eastern Canadian politicians aboard, arrived half an hour earlier, and had only just pulled out of the platform when the whistle of the Royal train was heard. Each train consisted of ten cars.

### SOLDIERS' HOME BURNED.

(Associated Press.)  
Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 30.—The Confederate soldiers' home was destroyed by fire to-day. There were no lives lost but several narrow escapes. About seventy veterans were inmates of the building. The loss, \$25,000, is covered by insurance.

The Duke's reply was brief and formal, and most of the time was taken up in shaking hands of the Royal guests.

Then the procession went down Hastings street, towards the east end, and returning through Cordova street, and then to the drill hall, where the Duke opened the hall and presented medals to South African heroes.

Lunch was served at 1 o'clock in the different apartments of the drill shed.

In the afternoon the party went for a drive to Hastings mill, and later to Stanley park.

Coming down this morning from Kelowna, guards were in sight of one another all along the line, and stood at attention with lanterns and flags as the train passed.

### CRAZED FARMER'S CRIME.

Fractured His Wife's Skull and Afterwards Committed Suicide.

(Associated Press.)  
Hobart, Ind., Sept. 30.—Fred W. Hartman, an aged farmer, living near here, fatally wounded his wife, aged 59, by striking her several times on the head with a piece of iron, leaving her for dead, he went into his bedroom and committed suicide by shooting himself. Mrs. Hartman's skull is fractured. The couple had been married 45 years, and had raised a family of five children. Of late they had quarreled over money matters.

### ATTEMPT TO WRECK M'KINLEY'S VAULT

### ONE OF THE GUARDS ATTACKED LAST NIGHT

Assaulted By Two Unknown Men, One of Whom Carried a Mysterious White Package.

(Associated Press.)  
Canton, Ohio, Sept. 30.—Private Depond, doing guard duty beside the vault in which the body of President McKinley rests, was mysteriously attacked last night by two men. Capt. Biddle, in command of the company of regulars, thinks an attempt was made to blow the vault to pieces, as one of the men carried a white package. While one of the strangers engaged the attention of the sentinel the other struck him over the head and also attempted to stab him.

It was nearly 8 o'clock when Guard Depond saw a prowler in the rear of the vault behind a tree and in a shadow. Upon being challenged, the soldier, who remained motionless behind the tree, was then about forty feet from the soldier. Depond advanced, made a second challenge and put up his gun ready to fire. The man in the darkness dodged to a second tree about ten feet distant from the first. The soldier renewed his challenge and was cut as he did so a hard blow was given the gun and his aim missed. A second man had stealthily come up to the soldier and dealt the blow, at the same time striking the soldier with a heavy instrument in the back and attempting to stab him. A gash about two inches long was cut through the clothing, including the overcoat, and a small scratch was made on Depond's body. The blow was so hard that Depond was knocked down a small hill and was unable to gain his feet before the men disappeared in the darkness.

Lieut. Ashbridge, who was officer of the day, as soon as he heard the challenge and shot, rushed to the assistance of the sentinel, followed by other soldiers. The sentinel attacked, however, was in the rear of the vault on a hill, and before the relief force could climb the hill the men had escaped. A hunt was made for the prowlers but no trace could be found of them.

The vault is but a short distance from the west edge of the cemetery, and the men evidently escaped from there into the fields and woods nearby.

Will Be Investigated.

Canton, Ohio, Sept. 30.—Friends of the family of the late President McKinley emphatically discredit the belief in the idea that the shot reported fired by Guard Depond at West Lawn cemetery last night was an account of any attempt to desecrate the tomb. They do not attempt to explain the strange story of the guards, but they do not believe that two men would undertake to make an attack on the vault with soldiers on guard or near at hand.

It is believed that the military authorities will make a thorough investigation. There are unconfirmed rumors that the shot was fired on account of an accidental fall, and also that the shot was the result of personal differences. The officers in charge have issued instructions that the soldiers are not to talk of the affair. The statement of the guard on Sunday night was made in the presence of the officers and with their knowledge.

### FREIGHT TRAINS COLLIDE.

(Associated Press.)  
Bridgeport, Conn., Sept. 30.—Two freight trains on the Berkshire division of the New York, New Haven & Hartford railway, collided head on at Long Hill this morning. Three men were killed and two seriously injured.

## GENERAL BOTHA IN COMMAND OF BOERS

### DETERMINED ATTACK ON BRITISH FORCE

### Fight On Border of Zululand Lasted Nearly All Day—Commandant Opperman Killed.

(Associated Press.)  
Durban, Natal, Sept. 30.—A force of 1,500 Boers, commanded by Gen. Botha, made an attack which lasted all day long on September 29th on Portiatala, on the border of Zululand.

The burghers were repulsed, but at a heavy cost to the garrison, whose losses were one officer and eleven men killed and five officers and thirty-eight men wounded.

In addition sixty-three men are missing, of which number many are believed to have been killed or wounded.

The Boer commandant, Opperman, and nineteen burghers are known to have been killed.

### A QUIET DAY.

Big Yachts Remain at Moorings—Poor Outlook for To-morrow.

(Associated Press.)  
New York, Sept. 30.—A splendid breeze from the southwest was blowing this morning when the captains and crews of the cup defender Columbia and the challenger Shamrock II, were roused from their bunks shortly after daylight. The wind was about ten miles an hour and as steady as a clock, and all were wishing for the same blow to-morrow. The two yachts remained at their moorings to-day.

### Light Winds.

Washington, Sept. 30, 10:30 a.m.—Off Sandy Hook on Tuesday the weather will be fair, with light to fresh northerly winds in the morning, which will be diminished in force and become variable in the afternoon.

Feeling in England.

London, Sept. 30.—"Both antagonists are to be congratulated on proving themselves so worthy of each other," is the message Lord Dufferin, the former governor-general through the Associated Press. This epitomizes the general comment of the afternoon newspapers here on the first cup race. They agree that both yachts were handled with consummate skill and that nothing remains but to congratulate Columbia and wish for a stiff breeze, in which some people think Shamrock will have a good chance of winning.

### CUSTOMS RETURNS.

Returns for Three Months Show Increase of \$488,924 Over Same Period Last Year.

(Special to the Times.)  
Ottawa, Sept. 30.—The Dominion revenue derived from customs for three months ending September 30th, today amounts to \$8,953,694. This is an increase of \$488,924, or nearly half a million dollars over the same time last year. The increase for the month over September, 1900, was \$82,810.

### RAISINS LOWER.

(Associated Press.)  
Fresno, Cal., Sept. 30.—The directors of the California Raisin Growers' Association have cut prices, and have entered into a contract with a new packing company to handle the crop. The prices announced are on a basis somewhat lower than those of the sweat box, but are made without any guarantee that these prices will be maintained.

### NEW DANISH LOAN.

(Associated Press.)  
Copenhagen, Sept. 30.—The Danish government has announced that the minister of finance, Alfred Hage, will this week recommend the Rigsraad to authorize a government loan of thirty million crowns. Americans are interested in the loan, as they were in the recent loan of \$10,000,000 floated by the city of Copenhagen, which was furnished by New York capitalists.

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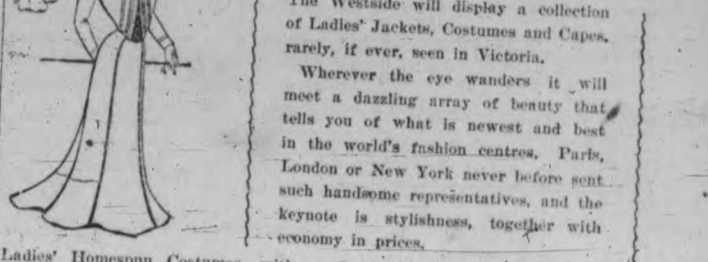

OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENTS.

Full Particulars of Procedure to be Followed at Reception and Other Functions.

The following official announcements are made by the Lieutenant-Governor:

The Lieutenant-Governor's dinner will be held, by command, to-morrow, instead of Wednesday evening.

Only officials mentioned in order of precedence will be admitted to the outer wharf to-morrow morning.

The entrance to the building for the Royal reception for the general public will be at the west entrance printing office.

The dressing room for ladies will be the executive chamber, provincial secretary's department. The dressing room for gentlemen will be the room now used for the Natural History Society.

Dressing rooms will be provided in the corridors behind the chamber, and these will be numbered one, two, three and four. They will be used as follows:

No. 1—For officials, including bishops, privy councillors, judges, senators, M. P.'s, and M. P.'s, Col. Grant and staff, Col. Holmes and staff, and His Worship the Mayor.

No. 2—Lady Lathimers and party.

No. 3—Wives of officials and of officers.

The Speaker's room will be used by H. R. H., and that adjoining it for his suite.

The ministers' room at the end of the corridor will be used by H. R. H., the Duchess, by Lady Minto, and by members of H. R. H.'s suite.

The clerks' room will be used by the Lieutenant-Governor and staff, Admiral and staff, and Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Wives of officials invited to the Governor's office to view the presentation of address and medals to-morrow morning are asked to use the entrance by the east wing, where they will be met by Mr. Scholfield.

No one will be admitted to the public gallery. This decision was reached at a meeting of the cabinet, yesterday. The public galleries are being dismantled, and other plants installed therein.

The method of presentation is contained in an announcement in another column. Officials will be introduced at the outer wharf by the names being called by an aide de camp, or by His Honor's secretary, and they will then be presented by His Honor.

Home for them will subsequently present His Worship the Mayor and address at the parliament buildings.

Above Government Street. The civic decorations on Yates street from Government to Blanchard are similar to those on the main of the city artery.

Rows of electric lights span the thoroughfare which, when lighted, will give a very pleasing effect. Along each side and forming an avenue are festooned bunting and evergreen, while rows of flags are suspended every few feet.

The arch at the intersection of Yates and Douglas street bears the inscriptions "Victoria's Greetings," and "Long Life and Happiness." The arch at the corner of the same street and Blanchard bears similar inscriptions.

An excellent effect is produced by the display of Fred Carre, Jr., and the Magnificence on the corner of Yates and Broad streets. It is very much out of the ordinary, and breaks the general monotony of the eternal tri-colored bunting and flags.

It consists of an evergreen portico with arched sides, bunting crossing the space diagonally and caught at the centre of a tri-color paper rosette. Cunningly concealed among the branches are innumerable incandescent lights, which in the night will shine out like so many stars in a green cope.

A liberal display of flags and lanterns heighten the general effect which, although brilliant in the day-time, will be much more so in the night. Messrs. C. C. McKenzie and Thos. Schl are responsible for the arrangement.

The other merchants are also appropriately decorating their premises, and business heads have been all day scheming.

There is another arrangement of bunting, and on each pillar a shield, and at each extreme cornice a shield holding five flags.

All will be completed by this evening, and the tout ensemble will be surpassed by none.

The majestic Driard also presents an imposing appearance. The coping of each story is bordered in different colors, while beneath every window varicolored flags are crossed, red, white, blue and yellow pennants being suspended from the angle. A large number of private residences are gaily decorated.

**Government Street.**

Government street is assuming a beautiful appearance. Spire will not permit of individual mention of more than a few of the artistic effects which have been produced by flag, bunting and evergreens. The post office is particularly striking in appearance, and reflects great credit on J. C. Richards, designer and contractor, who has displayed great taste in his work.

The old post office and old custom house are included in the contract, and all have imposing decorations.

Weller Brothers are another firm which are not sparing expense in artistically draping their fine premises.

The C. P. R. ticket office will present a capital appearance when the lights are turned on. The familiar shield of the C. P. R. and the words "From Ocean to Ocean" and "To the Orient" are picked out in beautiful incandescent lights. Spencer's Arcade, the Westside, the White House, and others of the large enterprises have shrouded the front of their buildings in a wealth of bunting and flags.

The banks have not been behind the commercial houses. The Bank of Montreal has a number of electric light effects, including the monogram of Cornwall and York and ensigns suspended on spires, which are beautiful indeed. Over the Bank of Commerce there is also a striking electric effect. The bank of B. N. A. is draped in red, white and blue and Royal purple.

The C. P. R. and Western Union tele-

graph offices, the Savoy and indeed every business house in the main thoroughfare have been liberally treated by the decorator. E. G. Prior & Co. have installed very pretty effects.

Chinatown has wakened up since learning that the route of the Royal procession from Esquimalt will pass that way, and if the city authorities would turn a few men in to clean up waste paper, the streets would look exceedingly pretty. The merchants have all combined, and the streets throughout the Chinese quarter in consequence will be outlined in Chinese lanterns. Many of the wealthy merchants, too, have treated their stores in a manner peculiarly Oriental and striking. Across Cormorant street they have stretched a banner with the words, "Welcome," and this is flanked with dragon and British flags.

The E. & N. station, and the offices of Dunsmuir & Son have been lavishly decorated with bunting and evergreen. At the end of Government street on Cormorant the Street Railway Company have installed the handsome design which was so much admired during the Ladysmith celebration.

The wholesalers on Yates street have contented themselves with a modest effort, as the procession does not pass near there.

Fort street has not been forgotten, the merchants and others residing there having on short notice installed suitable decorations in view of the procession passing that way.

**The Outer Wharf.**

The outer wharf, where the members of the Royal party are to disembark to-morrow, has been prettily decorated under the direction of Capt. Wise. ### BOVINE TUBERCULOSIS.

The injection of tuberculin is an almost infallible test of the presence of tuberculous in cattle. It is safe to say that for all practical purposes it may be thoroughly relied upon. We have thus an easy means of separating the diseased animals from those that are sound. In this lies the solution of the whole question. For present purposes it will be sufficient to consider the case of dairy cows—or what applies to them will apply equally to all other cattle—as among them will be found almost all the affected animals. It is a notable fact that it is comparatively rare to find tuberculous in cattle kept much in the open. This is why horses are so fit

the subject of tuberculous—they live an outdoor life; but if they be kept closed up in crowded stables, without adequate outdoor work, they are as liable to the disease as are dairy cattle. It is therefore only necessary to speak of these latter, as that will practically cover the field of treatment. Milk certainly is the chief source of danger. Diseased meat is also dangerous, but in a much less degree, as proper cooking renders it harmless, though we cannot always be sure that it gets properly cooked.—The Westminster Review.
