They Will Be Illuminated To-Morrow and Wednesday Evenings and Be Dressed Throughout Day.

One of the most interesting features in connection with the Royal reception will be the part played in it by the hips of

the Royal Navy stationed here under the mimander-in-chief, Rear-Admiral Bickford. For the purposes of the reception the ships have been divided into two squadrons as follows;

First Division. Second Divis First Division. Second Division./ H.M.S. Warsplte (flg). H.M.S. Fineton. H.M.S. Amphion. / H.M.S. Condor, H.M.S. Sparrowhawk. Torpede boat No. 39, D.G.S. Quadra.

D.G.S. Quadra. Most of the above proceeded to Van-couver on Saturday, and there awaited for the arrival of the digtinglished party, To night at 6 o'clock the first division and T. B. D. No. 30, sat sail from the Terminal City, the Warspite proceeding direct to her anchorage at Esquinalk, and the Amphion coming to Victoria. The second division and the Sparrow-hawk will couvoy the Empress of India from Vancouver. When within a few miles of Victoria the Phaeton and Con-dor will proceed ahead of the Royal

miles of Victoria the Phaeton and Con-dor will proceed ahead of the Royal steamer and anchor in position off the outer wharf, dressing ship and saluting as the Empress steams up to her an-chorâge. The Sparrfowhawk accompanies the Empress until she makes fast to the wharf. After the party has landed the whole facet will proceed to E-squimalt. The ships both at Victoria and at Esqui-malt will be dressed rainbow fashion. As the Empress approaches the outer Main will be dressed rainbow fashion. As the Eupress approaches the outer wharf, the saluting ships will fire a Royal salute of 21 guas, the junior ships following the second gun of the senior officers' ships. 
