

## **Ag-DISCOVERY:**

Investing in the Future of Veterinary Science

June 11 – June 30, 2006



## What Is Ag-DISCOVERY?

Ag-DISCOVERY is an outreach program to help teenagers learn about careers in plant science and veterinary medicine. The program allows students to live on a college campus and learn about science from university professors and practicing veterinarians and animal health technicians working for the U.S. Government. For 2006, this 3-week summer boarding program targets students 12–16 years of age who are interested in learning more about animal science and/or veterinary medicine. Students chosen to participate in Ag-DISCOVERY will gain experience through hands-on labs, workshops, and field trips. Students will also participate in character- and team-building activities and diversity workshops.

# Who Is Sponsoring the Ag-DISCOVERY Program?

Alcorn State University and the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS)—an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA)—are joining forces to sponsor Ag-DISCOVERY. Many of the Federal Government's professional veterinarians work for APHIS. The National Civil Rights Leadership Committee of APHIS' Veterinary Services program is funding Ag-DISCOVERY, and Alcorn State is hosting program participants on its campus in Alcorn State, MS. The university will make a variety of animal species available to Ag-DISCOVERY students. Every participant will work with live animals. Dr. Cassandra Vaughn, of the Alcorn Department of Agriculture, will facilitate the program.

## How Much Will It Cost?

Students selected for the 2006 Ag-DISCOVERY summer session will pay only the cost of their transportation to get from home to Alcorn State for the start of the session on June 11 and back again at the end of the session on June 30. The cost of tuition, room and board, and lab supplies for the whole session will be covered by the National Civil





Rights Leadership Committee of APHIS' Veterinary Services program.

## How Do I Apply?

Students between the ages of 12 and 16 are eligible to apply for admission to Ag-DISCOVERY. *Note:* You must be at least 12 and no older than 16 as of May 31, 2006.

You must submit a complete application package to USDA-APHIS **before April 28**, **2006**. Packages postmarked after that date will not be accepted.



## Here's what to put in your application package:

- A two-page essay entitled "What I'd Like To Know About Animal Science and Veterinary Medicine, and Why." In the essay, include information on your interests, hobbies, and plans for the future. Be sure to include your full name, age, home address, and home telephone number.
- Three character references—letters from people not related to you who know you well. At least one of the three references must come from a teacher or counselor.
