Mr. John O'Donnell, President of the O'Donnell Steel Track Co. and a railroad commissioner of New York state in 1883, died at his home in New York city, on Aug. 11, aged 71 years.

WESTERN SOCIETY OF ENGINEERS.—At the meeting on Aug. 2, Mr. L. L. Stimpson, a Chicago lawyer, described a plan for a high-level bridge over the Chicago River to connect the boulevard systems of the North Side and the South Side. His bridge was to be 85 ft. high, with approach grades of 3½%, and to comprise two 10-ft. sidewalks, a 20-ft. bicycle path, a 35-ft. roadway, and a 25-ft. space for electric railway tracks. Mr. Oscar Bluemner also suggested a high-level bridge, but with elevators instead of inclined approaches. He cited the Tower Bridge, in London, as being on this plan, which is a mistake. That bridge is a low-level structure, but with a fixed high-level crossing for foot passengers, to be used when the draw is open. As a matter of fact, however, most people wait until the draw is closed, and the overhead bridge is practically neglected.

WATER SUPPLY AND IRRIGATION PAPERS of the U. S. Geological Survey.—No. 21, Wells of Northern Indiana. By Frank Leverett; pp. 82. No. 23, Water-right Problems of the Bighorn Mountains. By Eliwood Mead; pp. 62. No. 26, Wells of Southern Indiana. By Frank Leverett; pp. 64. Paper; 9 x 6 ins.; illustrated.

No. 26 is actually a continuation of No. 21, and both deal with the underground water conditions in this state as affected by the geological formations. A detailed examination by counties is given, along with geological maps. No. 23 starts with the statement that in the arid states it is the mountains, and not the plains, that control agricultural development; for from the mountains come the streams that alone make agriculture possible. The Bighorn Range performs this service for a large section of Northern Wyoming, and Mr. Mead says that the records of the State Engineer's office show 1,051 adjudicated rights to water flowing from these mountains; with 269 claims not adjudicated, but recorded and approved, and perhaps 100 ditches using water for which no claim is filed. As the demand for water from any source increases and the limit of supply is about reached, priority of claim becomes an important question, and the practice in Wyoming is here set forth in detail and illustrated by prominent cases.

By resting the bell directly upon the tank floor, except where a depression is made to give the water access to the siphon, the whole contents of the tank are discharged at each flush. The short leg of the siphon is brought up to the floor of the tank and capped, and the outlet to the sewer is also near the floor, thus making these parts readily accessible for inspection.

This pamphlet describes a cheap form of railway designed by its inventor for use on country roads and for light electric car service, etc. The principal feature is the use of a rail made by tilting the head off from a worn out T-rail. The web is then held between two timbers and the inverted foot of the rail furnishes the wearing surface. The scheme appears to exist as yet only on paper.
