ROBERT JOINER CARSON was born, near Louisburg, Franklin county, N. C., in the year 1809. His mother was a very pious member of the M. E. Church, and through her influence he was brought to embrace religion while but a youth. He obtained a good English educa-tion, and at twenty years of age was admitted on trial into the Virginia Conference, February, 1829. He traveled Williamsburg, Gloucester, Charlottesville, Amherst, Buckingham, Prince Edward, Campbell, and Chesterfield Circuits. At the Conference of 1837, when the Virginia Conference was divided and the North Carolina Conference was set off, he was placed on the Roanoke District, North Carolina Conference, to which work he devoted all his energies of soul and body for four consecutive years. In 1840 he was married to Mrs. Mary Williams, of Martin county, N. C., a lady in every respect well qualified to make his life happy, and whose companionship, next to religion, he regarded as the richest honor God ever gave him. She still lives, and keenly realizes the heavy loss she has sustained in the death of such an affectionate and devoted husband. In 1841 he was Presiding Elder on the Newbern District. In 1842-3 he was returned to the Roanoke District, its name having been changed to Washington District. The next year he was agent for Randolph Macon College. For five years following he had charge of the Roanoke Mission to the colored people. Then he was Presiding Elder on the Washington District; then the Wilmington District; then the Washington District again, which was his last effective appointment. In 1858 he was placed upon the supernumerary list, and shortly after was transferred to the Virginia Conference, and remained in the supernumerary relation until his death. He was a member of the Louisville Convention of 1845, and of the General Conference of 1846. In person he was a true specimen of Nature's nobleman—tall and erect in form, and of a very commanding appearance. He was a fine preacher, often over-whelmingly powerful, and yet as simple as a child. He had many seals to his ministry, many souls for his hire. His sweetness of spirit made him a charming companion and a steadfast friend. He loved the Church for which he lived and labored, and for which he spent his life and his means. He was loved and admired by the whole community in which he had lived from the time of his marriage. The few last years of his life his health was somewhat improved, and he labored more earnestly, preaching regularly every Sabbath, building up the churches within reach of his home. Last winter his only child (Dr. Wm. Carson, living near Weldon, N. C.) was very sick. Brother Carson hastened to his bedside through a terrible storm, which exposure brought on a fatal attack of pneumonia. He died at his post, as he had lived, triumphing over death through faith in Jesus.

Our friend is restored to the joy of his Lord,
With triumph departs,
But speaks by his death to our echoing hearts:
Follow after, he cries, as he mounts to the skies,
Follow after your friend
To the blissful enjoyments that never shall end.
Through Jesus' name our comrade o'ercame,
And Jesus is ours,
And arms us with all his invincible powers;
He looks from the skies, he shows us the prize,
And gives us a sign
That we shall o'ercome by the mercy divine.

George Newton Guy was born, in the city of Richmond, Va., July 13, 1839, and died, at the parsonage in the town of Hertford, Perquimons county, N. C., April 6, 1873, aged thirty-three years. He was the son of George F. Guy, well known in the city of Richmond as a pious Christian gentleman, and a member of old Trinity Church until a few years before his death, when he removed to the county of Henrico. His mother, Mrs. Sarah E. Guy, an estimable Christian lady, still survives, to mourn the loss of her son. George was the subject of early religious culture. That good training will produce good results was fully realized by his parents. He was never prodigal, but, in the language of his mother, "always a good boy." He was converted to God under the ministry of the Rev. J. A. Duncan, D.D., at old Trinity Church, in 1858. Here his life

of consecration to God began. Under the training of his faithful pastor, who no doubt plainly saw gifts and graces which would render him a useful and acceptable minister, he was licensed to exhort, and then to preach, by the Quarterly Conference of Trinity Station. He exercised his gifts as a local preacher until he was received as a probationer in the Virginia Conference, held in the city of Norfolk in November, 1861. In 1862-3 he traveled Dinwiddie Circuit; in 1864-5 Coalfield Circuit; in 1866 he was at Cambridge Station; in 1867-8 Smithfield Circuit. March 28, 1867, he was married to Miss Bettie S. Taylor, of Chesterfield county. In 1868 he was returned to Din-widdie, now known as West Dinwiddie; here he spent four years-1869-70-71-72-laboring with great zeal and acceptability. At the Conference in Petersburg, 1872, he was ap-pointed to the Hertford Circuit. He was early at his post of duty, and entered with cheerfulness upon his work. In the brief space of four months he had greatly endeared himself to the people of his charge, and hope and ex-pectation were high with both people and preacher. Brother Guy had complained of a slight indisposition for several days before he was taken ill, but not enough to disqualify him for his work. He preached in Hertford on Wednesday night, and on Thursday attended to his usual duties. Thursday night, April 3, he was attacked with what he and the family supposed to be bilious colic. The physician saw him on Friday morning, when he was very ill. He was supposed to be better on Saturday, and no one apprehended serious results. He was worse Saturday night, and Sunday morning it was evident that his disease had baffled all remedies, and his end was approaching. He was aware of it, and frequently said to his physicians, in paroxysms of pain, "No remedy." He was rational at intervals, but so careful was he of the comfort of his wife, who is in deli-cate health, he said nothing of his approaching end, nor complained amidst his intense sufferings. But what testimony to the truth of our holy religion, and of his acceptance with God, like that of a pious, consecrated, unselfish life! This testimony George N. Guy bore until he fell asleep in Jesus, on Sunday night, April 6, at half-past seven o'clock. George N. Guy needs no eulogy from us, but his Christian and ministerial excellences justly entitle him to more than we can say of him in this brief tribute to his memory. We know nothing of his early educational advantages, except that he was a good classical scholar. His personnel was very fine, and continual sunshine rested upon his manly brow. He was as unaffected and unselfish as a little child. He made no effort to be popular, and yet he was always so. He moved along among the people, and drew them to him by the kindness of his heart and his sanctified, intelligent piety. As a preacher he was a gifted man; his style was simple, clear, and forcible; his manner always earnest and impressive. He was emphatically a gospel preacher, and not unfrequently displayed more

than an ordinary degree of pulpit oratory. He was a successful preacher, and many souls were brought to Christ through his instrumentality. An evidence of his popularity and success as a preacher is found in the fact that he spent six years out of eleven of his ministerial life in Dinwiddie, where the people are still devoted to him. The death of such a man, in the vigor of his manhood, looks like a calamity to the Church, and casts a shadow over the hearts of his brethren in the ministry and in the laity; but it falls heaviest upon his young wife, three small children, aged mother, brothers, and sisters. They find consolation only in the gospel, and in the confident hope of reunion in heaven. The Presiding Elder, being in that part of the District at the time, was called to officiate at his funeral. respect to the deceased, all places of business in the town were closed, while from the coun-try appointments, ten and fifteen miles distant, the people came to attend his funeral, sympathize with his afflicted family, and pay their pastor a token of respect. His funeral-sermon was preached to a grief-stricken congregation, and the Masonic fraternity, of which he was a member, bore his remains to their temporary resting-place in the church-lot, where they were interred according to the burial-service of the Order. His friends contemplate the removal of his remains to Hollywood Cemetery, Richmond. May God bless his afflicted family!

MATTHEW MAZE DANCE departed this life March 8, 1873, in the eighty-fourth year of his age, at his residence in Prince Edward county, Va. He was born Jan. 29, 1790, in the county of Dinwiddie, Va. He was the youngest of nine children. His father, Matthew Dance, was the elder of two sons of Stephen Dance, and was brought up near Petersburg, Va. His great-grandfather was one of the earliest settlers of Virginia, and assisted in building the first house in Jamestown colony. He was one of the few survivors of the trials, dangers, and diseases through which that colony passed, and is said to have attained the extreme age of one hundred and twenty-five years. There is a tradition in the family that he walked ten miles after he was one hundred years old. He brought up seven sons, several of whom settled near Petersburg, and among these was M. M. Dance's grandfather, Stephen Dance. father was a member of the Protestant Episcopal Church, under the care of that evangelical preacher, the Rev. Devereaux Jarrett, who, before Methodism was known in Virginia, established classes in his parish similar to those in-stituted by Wesley in England. In this Church his father was a lay-reader, or preacher, for some time, but dissevered himself from that communion and joined the Methodist a short while after that devout man of God, the Rev. Robert Williams, preached the first Methodist sermon, printed the first Methodist tract, and organized the first Methodist society, in Virginia, in the year 1772. In 1774 Mr. Williams visited Petersburg, and during that year organ-

ized the Brunswick Circuit, then extending from Petersburg to Mecklenburg. bounds of Bath parish, over which the Rev. Devereaux Jarrett presided, he organized societies, and it is probable that Matthew Dance connected himself with the Methodist Church that year, and became a local preacher in its communion. In 1794 he removed to Lunenburg county, when Matthew Maze was about four years old. At nine years of age the subject of this notice was sent to a boarding-school in Charlotte county, taught by the Rev. Wm. Spencer, whose rigid discipline served to curb the impetuosity of his ardent impulses, and whose character left a lasting impression upon his young mind. He continued at this and other schools until 1804. In 1807 he accepted and taught a school of twenty pupils. In this year his Christian life began. Brother Dance referred his first decided religious impressions to a prayer-meeting for the colored people on the plantation of one of his brothers-in-law. So powerful were his convictions, and so deep his sense of guilt, that he despaired of mercy, and, prior to his conversion, he stood up and warned the people not to do as he had done, and sin away their day of grace. The five years following his conversion were spent in teaching school, and diligently improving his mind, and earnestly studying the Holy Scriptures. He joined the Virginia Conference at its session in Richmond, February, 1812. His first appointment was Bertie Circuit, then containing six counties, traveling about three hundred miles, and preaching twenty-eight times in four weeks. In 1813 he was sent to the town of Manchester, and was the first stationed preacher in that place. In 1814 he was appointed private secretary to Bishop Asbury, who was in the habit of stationing all the preachers himself. This custom prevailed until the death of Asbury, in 1816, when Bishops Roberts and George introduced the present plan of using the Presiding Elders as counsel. At this Conference, held in Norfolk, 1814, Bishop Asbury ordained him deacon, and he was admitted into full connection. From this Conference he was appointed to the Raleigh Circuit, then including the city of Raleigh, N. C. The following year he was elected Secretary of the Virginia Conference, which post of labor and honor he filled with faithfulness to the Church and creditably to himself until 1822, when he located. From this Conference (1815) he was stationed in the city of Richmond. He was at this time the only Methodist preacher in that city. Here he was successor to the then distinguished Jesse Lee, and, although still quite a young man, he maintained his position creditably. At the Conference held in Petersburg, February, 1816, he was elected to Elder's orders, and was ordained by Bishop McKendree. By this Conference he was elected to the second delegated General Conference, which met the ensuing May in the city of Baltimore. He was stationed this year in the city of Petersburg, where he laid the foundation of a new church; and in 1817 he

was appointed to the Cumberland-street Church in Norfolk. In 1818 he married the accomplished Miss Susan T. Redd, daughter of John Redd, Esq., of Prince Edward county. His married life was one of continued happiness. He was blessed with a large family, numbering thirteen children, five of whom, with his aged widow, survive him. The succeeding two years were spent on the Mecklenburg Circuit. In 1820 he was the second time elected to the General Conference, which met in Baltimore. He was elected on the first ballot, receiving every vote of the Conference except two, and one of these was his own. This year he was sent to Brunswick Circuit, and in 1821 he was again returned to the Mecklenburg Circuit. In 1822 his family circumstances necessitated a location, and he settled in Prince Edward county, where he resided for fifty years, respected and loved by all who knew him. The year before his location he was elected Secretary of the Meherrin District Conference, which office he held until 1826, when the District Conferences, ordered by the General Conference of 1820, went into disuse. In 1840 he resumed his connection with the Virginia Conference, and labored for some time as a missionary to the colored people in his neighbor-hood. In later life he was much afflicted. Repeated attacks of paralysis so shattered his constitution that he had to desist from the active work of the ministry. The loss of his voice was a great trial to him, for he loved to preach; but the grace of God enabled him to submit so cheerfully that others were constrained to glorify God in him. For years he was on either the supernumerary or superannuated list; but, while he could not work for God in the pulpit, he was still "a living epistle known and read of all men." When a young man he was handsome; he was urbane and polished in his manners, and grew old gracefully. As a preacher he was terse, emphatic, and persuasive; he was pointed and chaste, adding accurate exposition to touching pathos, and wherever he went he seemed clothed with an unction from on high. The force of his personnel is seen in these facts: 1. His becoming Asbury's secretary before he was admitted into full connection. 2. His election to the office of Secretary of the Virginia Conference as soon as he became a member of that body, and his continuance in that office until his location. 3. His election to the General Conference as soon as he was eligible, and his reëlection, almost unanimously, to the ensuing General Conference. The good old man, the faithful preacher, the kind husband, the devoted father, the true friend, is dead. The spotless purity of his life, the genial evenness of his temper, the transparency of his character, and his un-wavering faith in God, make his memory blessed, and give us to feel that he was one of the links that bind us to a generation of fallen heroes. For sixty-one years he was a minister of the Methodist Church. The last hours of Brother Dance were just what we might expect from so devout a life-calm, peaceful, tri-

umphant. A few days before his death he said to his daughter, who had waited on him for years, "You must not, with your kindness, keep me back from my rest." He said to a brother minister who visited him, "I am dying—my limbs feel cold and dead, but my faith in God is stronger than ever." So died this venerable man. His funeral-sermon was preached from the text (Philippians i. 21), "For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain."

JEREMIAH MCMULLAN was born, Nov. 2, 1815, in Orange (now Greene) county, Va. He received but a limited education in early life, yet, being a man of a practical, inquiring mind, he was enabled in a measure to supply the defects necessarily resulting. He was converted when eighteen years of age, and, though family influences opposed, he connected himself with the M. E. Church. From his earliest recollection he was impressed with the idea that he was to become a preacher. However, this idea did not develop sufficiently to prevent him from assuming the responsibilities of the married state; and this, necessarily, directed his attention more fully to secular pursuits. Absorbed by these, he measurably lost sight of his call to the ministry; but, his house becoming a home for the preachers, he was soon induced to exercise his gifts as a class-leader, with which alone he thought to satisfy his conscience for three years. Conscience, however, would not excuse him, and he commenced and continued the study of theological works, in the midst of much mental distress, until the spring of 1841, at which time he determined to devote himself partially to the work of the ministry. Accordingly, he was then licensed, and preached as a local minister for five years. He now made application to his Quarterly Conference for a recommendation to the Virginia Annual Conference, to be received into the traveling connection, but, having a large family, his application was refused. He then determined to study law; but God laid his afflicting hand upon him, and he was very near to the grave. His life, however, was spared, and upon his recovery he was employed by the Presiding Elder to travel the Blue Ridge Mission. Here his labors were owned and blessed of God to such an extent that his Quarterly Conference unanimously recommended him to the Annual Conference, by which he was received on trial. To this same field he was sent, where he labored during the years of 1851-4. Perhaps no man of that day had greater difficulties to encounter or severer trials to endure. It was a region in which Methodism was scarcely known at all, and the strongest prejudices existed against it. As he boldly pressed forward in the prosecution of his work, these prejudices often developed themselves in various forms of persecution; yet none of these things moved him so as to frighten him from his work. God blessed the word preached, and there are to-day in that field men and women, standing as pillars in the Church of God, who own Brother McMullan as their spiritual father.

Indeed, the present faithful incumbent of the Piedmont Mission having gone to hear him preach, with the intention of chastising him unless a better opinion of him should be formed, was powerfully convicted and converted under the first sermon he heard. This spiritual son, though unable to read, was placed in the work; and after diligent study he was licensed to preach, and through his instrumentality more than fifteen hundred souls have professed conversion, and the greater part been added to the Church. Thus the seed sown by Brother McMullan has sprung up and produced more than a hundred-fold. Three churches, through of Madison Circuit, and praise, as a sweet savor, still lingers around their altars. After leaving this field of labor he was sent to Hanover two years, Mecklenburg two, Albemarle two, Princess Anne two, Hertford four, Bertie three, Halifax four, and in 1872 to Boydton. Here he finished his labors on earth. When taken sick he seemed to be aware that his end was nigh. Calling his family around him and giving them his dying injunctions, he took leave of them with the assurance of a blissful immortality. Thus, in the fifty-eighth year of his life, the thirty-second of his ministry, and the twenty-third of his Conference connection, he passed away. "His sun set while it was yet day," but no cloud arose to hide the rays that lingered even after the glorious disc had disappeared. Brother McMullan did not forget his brethren of the Conference even while in the arms of death—he sent a message of love to every brother.

ROBERT Fox was born, in Culpepper county, Va., Oct. 29, 1826, and died, in Guyandotte, West Virginia, July 1, 1873. In early boyhood Brother Fox's father died, and left him a. destitute orphan, with but little means and limited education, to work out his own destiny. When but a young man he came to Western Virginia and sought employment as a schoolteacher. In this important trust he found time for improvement, and laid the foundation on which, in subsequent years, he reared a temple of elegant English literature. As a teacher he was deservedly popular, of irre-proachable moral character. Though a strange wanderer on the world's highway, his habits of industry and economy gave him access to good society, a cordial welcome to the homes and patronage of all the good. Amid his pursuits in Western Virginia he met with the la-mented Rev. L. G. Wood, then of this body, but now no more; his record is on high. Under the ministry of that man of God he was converted, and united his fortunes with the M. E. Church, South. In 1858 he was admitted on trial into this body, and assigned to Elizabeth Circuit, which he traveled two years. His next charge was New Martinsville; here

he was embarrassed much by the late unhappy war, and found it prudent to retire from his circuit, and seek employment elsewhere. His first charge after the close of the war was to Little Kanawha Circuit, on which he traveled three years. In all the charges to which he was assigned he was eminently useful, adding many to the Church, and building up our cause on a firm basis. As a pastor he was unexcelled, humble, pious, and affectionate. He loved to look up the poor and afflicted of his charge, and point them to the cross of Christ for comfort and hope. From this feature of our brother's history let others learn the way to success. In his pastoral intercourse he inspired his people with love for the class-room and love for all the institutions of Methodism. He rarely failed to make a good impression on all with whom he came in contact, and his name will long be gratefully cherished by the people of those mountain circuits. The class-room, the Sunday-school room, and the sick and dying chamber, all conspire to proclaim Robert Fox a man of God. Well posted in the usages of Methodism in Europe and America, he was prepared to meet every objection, and to resist every innovation. Brother Fox never compromised, at the bar of popular prejudice, the distinguishing features of Methodism. In all grades of society, and amid all the fluctuations of public sentiment, he was a Methodist preacher. He was artless, unsuspecting, and confiding; his attachments were strong, and he yielded to the first indications to make the amende honorable. His sagacity and superior knowledge of men suggested him as suitable for the responsible office of Presiding Elder, and at the Point Pleasant Conference, in 1869, Rev. S. K. Vaught, president (in the absence of the Bishop), appointed him to Guyandotte District. No purer or better man was ever selected to lead the marshalled lines of Methodism. Brother Fox continued the course so happily inaugurated by his predecessors: desolated fields were reclaimed, crumbled temples of religion were rebuilt, every part of the District was well organized, and every department of the Church, from the Quarterly Conference to the mountain Sunday-schools, moved like a well-regulated machine. His eloquence filled with delight admiring thousands, from Mud River to Tygart, from the Upper Big Sandy to the Ohio. His advent was everywhere hailed as the harbinger of success. The purity of his life and the fervor of his piety quickened the devotions of the Church, while his business capacity imparted an improved aspect to the finances of every charge. The sternness of his executive ability, his unyielding devotion to the moral code of his Church, some-times gave offense; but our brother was conscientious, and looked only to the glory of God in all his administration. At our last Conference Bishop Kavanaugh appointed him to Barboursville, Guyandotte, and Huntingdon—an important charge. To large congregations he preached with more than usual acceptability. All that experience and talent could suggest

was done to advance the cause of the Redeemer's kingdom in those growing towns; but "God moves in a mysterious way." His health, never very vigorous, soon gave indications of decline, and he was destined soon to leave the outer walls of Zion for the inner courts of his Muster's temple. His faith was strong. He lived near the divine and sacred center of the cross, only a sojourner here-his home was in heaven; though no land or cottage was his, he had a house on high. Two days before he died he left the parsonage for his usual employ, bade adieu to wife and children, commending them to God, never again to cheer their hearts and diffuse light and joy through that loved home-circle by his return. At night he was arrested by malignant disease; medical aid was called in, but all in vain. The wife of his bosom and the mother of his children was soon at the bedside of the battle-scathed husband and father, and nursed him with that tenderness which a wife and mother alone can exercise. His tabernacle was falling; earth was receding and eternity breaking on his dying vision. To his sorrowing wife he said, "Trust in God; he will care for you and our children." To a minister at his bedside he said, "Religion has been my stay and comfort in life, and now death opens the gates of glory and lets me in."

JOSEPH L. McGEHEE was born, in Smythe

county, Va., June 6, 1844. In 1858, when but a boy, under the ministry of James W. Dickey, he made a profession of faith in Christ, and was received into the M. E. Church, South. He was licensed to preach Feb. 16, 1869. In October, the same year, he was admitted on trial into the Holston Conference, and appointed as junior preacher, under Jacob Brilhart, on the Sweetwater and Philadelphia Circuit. In Oct., 1870, he was appointed in charge of the Madisonville Circuit. To this work he was reappointed the following year. In Oct., 1872, he was appointed to the Morristown Circuit, where he remained but a few months, when, by a severe attack of diarrhea, he was forced to give up his work. With this wasting disease, which became chronic, he suffered eight months, until Sept. 18, 1873, at his father's residence in Smythe county, Va. He died in great peace. Brother McGehee was no ordinary young man. With a high order of intel-lectual endowments, which were in early life dedicated to God, and trained to his service by intelligent Christian parents, he seemed called to much higher destinies in the militant Church; but a mysterious providence has or-dered otherwise, and this strong young work-man God has called from the walls of Zion to the palaces of the heavenly city. During the time of his illness and intense suffering he was never known to complain of the chastenings of his Father's hand, but, with strong faith and great resignation to divine will, he was enabled to give marked evidences of the supporting grace of God to his suffering children. He was visited during his last illness by a member of this Conference, who ever found him exulting in the hope of the gospel which he had so often preached to others. The day before his death he was asked, in view of his early dissolution, if he had any message to send to his brethren of the Holston Conference. He reflected a moment, and said: "They all know me; tell them that I now feel, as I stand so near eternity, that I have too little faith; that I have been a very poor preacher—yea, a very poor Christian; and yet I do feel that I have tried to hold fast my profession, and thank God that by his grace I am what I am, and that I delight to contemplate the rest promised me in the gospel of God's dear Son." An hour before his departure his voice, which for fortyeight hours had been scarcely above a whisper, returned, and, calling around him father and mother, brother and sister, with what friends were present, he spoke of the vast importance of religion in a dying-hour, and trged all present to possess it. He then exclaimed, "Glory to God! Amen. Come, Lord, and receive thy child! Amen. Come, Lord Jesus, come quickly!" And his spirit departed.

WILLIAM HOLMES was born, in Princess Anne county, Va., June 18, 1798; was licensed to preach, in Suffolk, Nov. 15, 1823, by Benj. Devaney, Presiding Elder of the Norfolk District; joined the Virginia Conference at its session held in Petersburg March, 1824; or-dained deacon at Norfolk, 1826, by Bishop McKendree; ordained elder at Raleigh, 1828, by Bishop Soule. In 1824 he was on Suffolk and Surry Circuit; in 1825 on Sussex; 1826 on Yadkin; 1827-8 on Caswell; 1829 on Charlottesville; 1830 on Granville; 1831 on Tar River; 1832 again on Granville, which was his last effective appointment, as he was placed on the superannuated list, and was never afterward effective. He was never very robust, and at the time he received a superannuated relation it was thought he was sinking rapidly with consumption; but he survived for forty years, frequently able to preach, which he did occasionally until a few years previous to his death. He died, in Henderson, June 8, 1873, from injuries received two days previously by being caught between a car and the platform at the depot, whither he had gone to settle a freightbill for some shingles, just received, to put on our church there. He labored efficiently for many years in the Sunday-school, where his services will be much missed. He was able to give wise instruction, as he was well-read in theology and familiar with the doctrines and history of the Church. For nearly half a century his name has been regularly heard at the roll-call of our annual sessions. It has now been done for the last time. He leaves a widow and several children.

ALFRED NORMAN was born, in Washington county, N. C., April 22, 1804. In the year 1823, at the age of nineteen, he sought and obtained pardon from God, and united with the M. E. Church. He began at once to labor for the salvation of souls. In that year he was licensed as an exhorter; next he obtained license to exercise his gifts as a local preacher. He joined the Virginia Conference at its session in Raleigh, N.C., in the year 1828. When asked, "Where do you wish to be sent?" he replied, "Send me where there are sinners." His first appointment was as junior on Portsmouth and Ocracoke Circuit. In 1829 he was junior preacher on Black River Circuit. In 1830 he was senior preacher on Trent Circuit. In 1831, while laboring on Banks and Islands, he was attacked with typhoid fever, from which he suffered for fourteen weeks, and narrowly escaped from death. His appointments were as follows: 1832 Stokes, 1833 Randolph, 1834-5 Camden, 1836 Gates (at the separation of the Virginia Conference he remained in the North Carolina division, and was sent in 1837 to Tarboro), 1838 Duplin, 1839 Guilford, 1840 Raleigh Circuit, 1841 Chatham, 1842-3 Franklin, Va. In this year, on Nov. 27, he was married to Miss Mary L. Racker, who shared the toils and triumphs of his subsequent ministry with beautiful devotion; and in July, 1873, only six weeks before his own departure, she peacefully finished her course and ascended to her eternal rest. In 1844 he was sent to Caswell, 1845 Patrick, 1846-7 Davidson, 1848 Tar River, 1849 Stokes, 1850-1 Franklin, Va., 1852-3 Pittsylvania, 1854-5 Granville, 1856-7 Halifax, Va., 1858-9 Wentworth, 1860-1 Leasburg. In the latter part of this year, under the fearful excitements of the war, superadded to his unsparing labors, he was stricken with paralysis of the face, and, at the instance of his friends, reluctantly retired from active work. He then purchased a home and settled in Caswell county, N. C. His health having improved, he resumed his labors in 1867, serving Alamance Circuit in 1867-8. In 1869 he was appointed to High Rock Mission, where he toiled with trembling limbs and a martyr's heart till he was overcome by his last sickness. He fell asleep Aug. 20, 1873, and was buried, with the honors of Masonry, by the side of his sainted wife, in Caswell county. For fifty years he was a watchman on the walls of Zion; for forty years he received the annual appoint-ment of the Bishop. Whether we view his character or his labors, we must exclaim, "Well done, good and faithful servant!" Genuine integrity was the foundation of his character. True humility, sincerity, simplicity, honesty, and moral courage, were signally revealed in his walk and conversation. He was tender and devoted in all the sweet relations and offices of home-life. No one ever doubted his piety. He was eminently spiritual in his religious

experience. He was no slave to the world, with its bribes and temptations; he rose and remained above its vain ambition. He moved through life with the firm yet placid mien that bespoke a quiet conscience and an assurance of the smiles of God. He was a good man, a devout Christian. Now, think of the long roll of his appointments, and consider that every appointment marks a twelve-months' campaign in lowland, or midland, or mountain-with weary marches through sunshine and storm, in health and sickness, with frequent conflicts with the passions and prejudices of the world and the principalities of hell. He was sure, when possible, to be at his post. He was cheerfully fond of his arduous duty, and unmurmuringly obedient to the authorities of the Church. He received his appointments as a good soldier receives his orders. He was peculiarly earnest in his manner in the pulpit; he was full of exultant zeal when amid the scenes of revivals. He was a missionary in spirit—"Send me where there are sinners" was the motto of his entire ministry; he felt it his duty, to the last, to carry the gospel to the people, and not wait for them to seek it. He never wavered, through all his difficulties, trials, and privations. His preaching was owned of God; his sermons were plain, pointed, practical, clear, and convincing, glowing with evangelical fervor, and sometimes full of overwhelming power. His intellect was of a superior order. He was one of the most successful revivalists of his day; he measured the path of his circuits with a chain of apostolic triumphs, whose golden links were glorious revivals; he counted his spiritual children by thousands. He was specially instrumental in the conversion of several of our ministers—I. F. Keerans, L. S. Burkhead, N. H. D. Wilson, and Numa F. Reid. Who can calculate the value of such a life? How vast its influence for good on earth and glory in the eternal world! His death was not sudden; for weeks he watched its slow approach. To the last his intellect was unclouded. While suffering intense pain, he exclaimed, "If it is the will of the Lord that I should suffer, I would not, if I could, have my sufferings lessened." Even in his last hours he arranged his temporal affairs with most impressive calmness and precision. With him faith was clear, un wavering, triumphant; it rose with the dread demands of the momentous ordeal. At one time he raised his arms and cried, "Will that gospel that I have so often preached to others sustain me in this trying hour? Yes, it will—it does sustain me." Looking in the weeping face of his son, he said, "Tell my brethren of the North Carolina Conference that I died prepared, and tell my brethren everywhere that I died, as I lived, in the faith of the gospel of Christ." Again, he said, "It may be that before I expire I shall be unable to speak; but I tell you now, that you may know then, while you look at me speechless bear in mind that all is well." How such words, in such an hour, ring with the melody of heaven! What grand testimony to the truth and glory of our religion!

Yes, it is all well with the faithful old veteran of the cross—all well forever!

WILLIAM BARRINGER, son of Gen. Paul Barringer, was born, in Cabarras county, N. C., Feb. 18, 1816. After taking the usual academic course, he pursued his studies at Chapel Hill. He then entered the mercantile business at Concord. About the year 1842 he attended a camp-meeting near Concord, and was deeply convicted; a few days afterward, while sitting in the counting-room engaged in meditation and prayer, he was most powerfully converted. He soon felt that it was his duty to preach; he yielded to the call, and prepared for his life-long work. He lived within the bounds of the South Carolina Conference, which he joined Dec., 1844, at Columbia, S. C. He was ap-pointed to Wadesboro Circuit, under the Rev. Samuel Leard. He served the following appointments-viz.: 1845 Charlotte Station, 1846 Charlotte Circuit (under the Rev. C. H. Pritchard), 1847 Cheraw Station, 1848-9 Presiding Elder on the Fayetteville District, 1850 transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and Presiding Elder on the Wilmington District, 1851-4 Presiding Elder on the Greensboro District, 1855-6 Presiding Elder on the Salisbury District, 1857-8 Agent Greensboro Female College, 1859 Yanceyville Circuit, 1860-2 Presiding Elder on the Raleigh District, 1863-4 Presiding Elder on the Trinity College District, 1865-8 Greensboro Station, 1869-72 Presiding Elder on the Hillsboro District. After his return from Conference at Fayetteville he entered upon his work with great zeal and hope, and completed the first round of quarterly-meetings. He had been confined to his house for about a week with influenza, which somewhat enfeebled him. On March 11 he was superintending the work on Greensboro Female College; when passing out of the window of the third story to the gangway, his foot slipped, and he fell about twenty-eight feet. His right thigh was broken, and his right arm and face were considerably bruised. The fall produced concussion of the brain, which caused his death. He was conscious for several hours on the day of his fall, and about one hour on the 16th. He did not, apparently, suffer much, except occasional paroxysms of pain. During his lucid moments he gave satisfactory evidence that he was ready to depart and be with Jesus, which he did at 10 minutes past 7 o'clock P.M. Monday, March 17. His funeral-sermon was preached on the 18th, and he was buried by the side of his dear wife, who had preceded him about seven years. He leaves five sons and one daughter, and a large circle of relatives and friends, to weep over his death. He has left them a rich legacy in the pure and faithful life which he lived. Experimental religion was his great theme, and he exhibited it as the controlling power in all relations of life. In every field of labor he was very diligent, acceptable, and successful. He thoroughly comprehended and devotedly loved the doctrines held and usages practiced

by the Church of his choice; and his Church loved and honored him. He was elected to every General Conference since 1852, either as a delegate or reserve. He was prominently connected with all the interests of the Conference, and was ever faithful to the interests committed to him. He was wise in counsel and solid in his piety, transparent in his principle of action; hence, he won the respect and confidence of the multitudes with whom he mingled. A good and great man has gone. Let us follow him as he followed Christ.

NUMA FLETCHER REID was born, in Rockingham county, N. C., July 3, 1825. His parents were the Rev. James Reid (of sainted memory in the North Carolina Conference) and Martha Reid, daughter of the Rev. George R. Edwards. N. F. Reid was the second of nine children, and survived all of them but one. When a boy he was remarkable for unvielding integrity, genial affection, and attachment to home, and especially to his mother; nor did these amiable qualities cease with childhood, but became stronger and still more beautiful as they adorned graceful, gifted, useful manhood. In early life his educational advantages were confined to the small public and private schools common in that section of the country. At the age of thirteen he entered Emory and Henry College, where he remained three years. He left the institution without graduating, though he had accomplished most of the academic course of study. He was a hard student at College, and so continued to the end of his life. He was eminently a scholar in mental discipline, mental development, knowledge of the scholar's resources and their use, clear conception of systems of thought, and an unusual comprehension of men, opinions, and tendencies. He saw quickly and clearly, discriminated wisely, argued with directness and force, and rarely, on any occasion, was wanting in information, arrangement of ideas, or facility of expression. Mentally, he was greater than the work he did; and his works are worthy of any man or of any Church. Physically, he was delicate from childhood; was often prevented from protracted study or great efforts, and never experimentally knew or enjoyed the immense advantages of vigorous, mind-sustaining health. His body was never at all equal to his soul's wants and needs, and many a sermon did he preach, and many a duty perform on the Conference-floor, when nothing but indomitable energy kept him from confinement to his bed. He once said that experience had proved to him that prayer was as beneficial to his body as to his soul, for that without prayer his body would not have lasted till his thirtieth year. At the age of seventeen he commenced a school at Thompsonville, in Rockingham county, the Rev. James H. Brent being at that time one of his pupils. Afterward he taught at Salem Church, near Reidsville, and in 1846, in connection with Mr. F. L. Harriss, he opened an academy at Wentworth. Mr. Harriss withdrew at the end of the first year, but the school

was continued five years by Dr. Reid with great success. During this period he had some inclination to study law, and was strongly urged thereto by gentlemen of the bar, residing in that county, who knew him well, and predicted that he would attain great distinction in that profession. While teaching at Wentworth he received the degree of Master of Arts from Randolph Macon College; and in 1866 the University of North Carolina unanimously bestowed upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity. These and other honors he appreciated becomingly, sustained nobly, and wielded all for the glory of God. In 1847 he was licensed to preach, and traveled the Wentworth Circuit two years as a supply. In 1851 he joined the North Carolina Conference, at Salisbury; was ordained deacon the same year, and elder in 1853. The labors of his ministry were as follows: 1852-3 Tar River Circuit, 1854 Front Street, Wilmington, 1855-6 Raleigh Station, 1857 Greensboro Station, 1858-9 Presiding Elder of Salisbury District, 1860-3 Presiding Elder of Greensboro District, 1864-7 Presiding Elder of Raleigh District, 1868-71 Presiding Elder of Greensboro District; 1872 he was appointed Presiding Elder of Raleigh District, but, his health becoming greatly impaired, with the consent of the Bishop he exchanged work with the Rev. William H. Bobbitt, on the Greensboro District, and continued on that District till his death. He was four times elected to General Conference, and three times headed the list of delegates. In 1846 he was married to Ann Eliza Wright, eldest daughter of James Wright, Esq., of Wentworth. Eight children were born to him; seven are still living. His wife died April 15, 1869. He was married a second time Sept. 3, 1872, to Sallie I. Wright sister of his first wife. In all the L. Wright, sister of his first wife. In all the relations of life he was a model man, and everywhere, by his actions, fully and forcibly commended the gospel which he preached. As a preacher he preached the gospel with learning for the understanding, with logic to convince, and with a divine unction to move the heart; as a presiding officer he was courteous, though decided, looking carefully after all the interests of the Church, and was eminently successful in always having them in good condition; as a member of Conference he was genial, diligent in business, and fair to all; in social life he was lively and pleasant, somewhat fond of well-polished repartee, but was never known to use or countenance rough jesting or coarse allusions. He was in an especial manner interested in our educational enterprises, and was connected with every movement made for their establishment and advancement. He was a trustee both of Trinity College and of Greensboro Female College; he attended all meetings, and was a chief man in devising and maturing all plans. To Dr. Reid more than to any other man is Greensboro Female College indebted for its existence. In all respects all our colleges owe much to Dr. Reid; he loved them, and labored for their good. Our Advocates, through all their varied fortunes,

he sustained by speeches before the Conference and the public, by contributing to their col-umns, and by financial help from his own resources. He firmly believed in sustaining all Conference enterprises, his motto being that we live for the Church and our families, the two being identified in all their interests. He was an honored member of the Masonic Fraternity, had much influence among Masons, and was greatly respected by them. One of the finest productions of his life was his ad-dress at the centennial anniversary of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina. Such were some of the virtues of our deceased brother. Not many such men, so gifted and so useful to the Church and the public, are given to any one age of history. At the Charlotte Conference, 1871, he contracted a cold, from which he never finally recovered. At the close of the last Conference his health was greatly injured by fresh cold. He attended his appointments till February, and struggled hard to continue on, but could not. He then proposed to the brethren to resign his District, but they dissuaded him from that step. In March he told the writer of this that his work was done. He said, "I should like to preach a few more times; I would call for penitents every time I preached; I could tell the people better about eternal things. I am waiting by the river, and feel and know the reality of what I have loved and preached. If I never go to Conference again, tell the brethren I loved them better and still better at the last, and bid them good-bye till we meet in heaven." He continued still able to walk about the house till June 4, when he was confined to his bed, and lingered there till 8 o'clock Friday morning, June 6, when he died peacefully and triumphantly. For the last two days he rejoiced almost continually; his mind was clear and his faith strong. He told his attendants not to give him stimulants—he wanted to free death with an unclouded mind. wanted to face death with an unclouded mind, and a Christian's faith. His last words were, "Frank, I shall see your mother and my mother." His funeral-sermon was preached at Wentworth, on the next Sabbath, before such a multitude as has not often assembled in any State. All the people loved Dr. Reid. His fame and good works are in all the Churches, and his memory is a rich legacy to the whole country.

NICHOLAS TALLEY was born, near Richmond, Va., May 2, 1791, and was converted to God at Burke's Camp-ground, Green county, Ga., Aug. 5, 1810. The immediate occasion of his conversion was a powerful exhortation by the Rev. Hope Hull. He entered the traveling connection in 1812, and was sent in charge of the Little Pedee Circuit, then more than one hundred miles in extent, and containing twenty-eight appointments and seven hundred members. Brother Talley belonged to what

may be called the heroic age of Methodisman age that seemed to inspire courage, selfabnegation, and sacrifice. He had practically "learned to suffer and be strong" under persecutions and trials of which we of more recent times are experimentally ignorant. He was the compeer of those saintly men, Pierce, Andrew, Capers, and Kennedy. Of the sixty-two years of his ministry he was twenty-two on Districts, twelve on stations, nine on circuits, fourteen on missions; and for the last five years of his life he sustained to the Conference the superannuated relation. His brethren de-lighted to honor him. They elected him for many successive sessions as a delegate to the General Conference. Trained for business, and with many of those adaptations for it which would have insured him success in the accumulation of wealth, many tempting proposals were made to him to induce him to locate, at a time, too, when location was the rule rather than the exception; but, firm as a flint, his face was turned from all that might jeopard his usefulness as an itinerant preacher; and the journeyings, hardships, and inconveniences of the itinerancy were all as nothing, so that he might preach Jesus and the resurrection. In his manners he was ever calm, self-possessed, dignified, and refined. The character of his preaching was what might be called hortatory, and yet at times it was powerful in its denun-ciation—the powers of darkness seeming to give way before his strong, energetic assaults. For many years he kept a diary. His last entry was made May 2, 1873, as follows: "My birthday! Eighty-two years I have lived on the bounty and goodness of God. I feel grateful and happy to believe he doeth all things well." Early in the morning of May 10 he was put in possession of his heavenly inheritance. He fell, where he most desired to fall, "at his post," ceasing at once to work and to live: for while his funeral-service was being performed on one Sabbath, on the previous Sabbath, at the same hour, he was officiating in the pulpit and at the altar—having preached with unusual power and vigor, from John xiv. 1-4; then, consecrating the elements with his wonted pathos and solemnity, he administered the emblems of the broken body and shed blood of his crucified, but risen, Lord. Fit close of his labors for his blessed Master. His death was in keeping with the serenity of his life—his last words being, "Calm, calm."

## Calm on the bosom of his God, He gently passed away.

His burial-service was deeply impressive, a number of ministers of his own Church and of other Churches participating in the solemnity. The text on the occasion was 2 Tim. i. -selected by himself a short time previous to his death, when, while musing on it, he felt that he had received a fresh baptism of the Holy Ghost. Interred by the freshly-made grave of his sainted wife—solong united to him in life, and in death divided from him for so short a time—he waits the resurrection of the just.

CHARLES WILSON was born, in Barnwell District, S. C., Nov. 21, 1802, and died, in Orangeburg county, S. C., April 14, 1873. His conversion was very marked, as well as very clear and thorough. Not long after this event he was licensed to preach, and admitted on trial into the South Carolina Conference about Feb., 1831. He passed regularly into the office of deacon, into full connection in the Conference, and into the order of elder. He labored faithfully, usefully, and well for forty-three years, and, in Eastern Orange Circuit, ended his course in peaceful triumph and blissful hope of a lot in the heavenly inheritance. Our departed brother, constrained by the love of Christ, served his generation for fourteen years on circuits and twenty-eight on missions to people of color. His preaching was simple, sensible, and instructive. His spirit was pure, artless, loving, and invincibly faithful to the principles of a Christian life. His name is as ointment poured forth. Many are the souls, of both whites and blacks, that will appear, doubtless, as stars in his crown of rejoicing.

JOHN LEE DICKSON was born in Kershaw county, S. C., and died, while pastor of the Pacolet Circuit, in January, 1873. It was Brother Dickson's misfortune that he was not converted in early life; yet his conversion was clear, alike in his own inward consciousness of the change and in the necessary outward effect upon the opinions of others. Men saw the spirit of evil and of Christ manifested in the same life, in different stages of its development, and glorified God as the only cause and means of a change so salutary. Soon after his conversion Brother Dickson was called to the ministry, and after serving the Church as a preacher on trial in the Conference for nearly two years, he retired to the local ranks. He engaged in mercantile pursuits, to which he devoted the powers of his mind and body. The result was that, while his temporal interests were not improved, his ministerial usefulness was in some measure hindered. In the early part of the year 1872 a vacancy occurring in the Pacolet Circuit, Brother Dickson was induced to accept it, and thus entered a second time upon the itinerant ministry, in which he continued until he died. We bless God that he was permitted to reënter the regular work, though to do but little else than to die in it. While in the local ranks he preached often, and in his pastoral relation to the Conference he magnified at once his Master and his mission. He was, from the first to the last of his ministry, earnest, faithful, useful.

William J. Parks. 1.

WILLIAM J. PARKS was the son of Henry Parks, a native of Virginia. His religious education was limited, as his religious privileges were few. The first sermon he ever heard was preached by John Majors, in Elbert county, Ga., when he himself was a married man with a family. His early associations were for the most part with the Baptists, in North Carolina. The family removed to Kentucky before the revolution. Here they were exposed to such depredations by the Indians, they were compeiled to leave the country and return to North Carolina. About this time began the war be-tween England and the Colonies. Henry Parks was a "minute-man," and was active in the stirring scenes of those times. He was a man of great physical powers of endurance—a brave man and a good soldier—and was seriously wounded in the battle of King's Mountain. Martha Parks, whose maiden name was Justice, the mother of the subject of this memoir, was a Virginia lady, of excellent judgment, even temper, and great activity. She was an Episcopalian by education, but hearing a Methodist preacher, she was convinced of sin, obtained religion, and joined the Methodist Church. About 1783 the family settled in Elbert county, Ga., where they heard Humphreys and Majors, Methodist preachers, in 1786. Henry read the Bible, and found it taught the doctrines of these preachers, obtained religion, joined the M. E. Church, and, for the greater part of fifty-nine years, was a class-leader and exhorter in that Church. Henry Parks died in Jackson county, Ga., in 1845, at the advanced age of eighty-seven years. Martha Parks died in 1815, over sixty years of age. She died in triumph, shouting the praises of God. This fact impressed William, a lad at that time, and was, perhaps, one fact among others that first awakened religious thought and conviction. William Justice Parks was born in Franklin county, Ga., Nov. 30, 1799, the youngest of eight children. While he was quite a child, he gave evidence of more than ordinary mind, and seems to have been gifted with a remarkably retentive memory. When with a remarkably retentive memory. about five years old, he was sent to school two miles from home. He learned the alphabet the first day, and in due time acquired a knowledge of reading, writing, and arithmetic, as far as the Rule of Three. His first teacher was an old man, an old teacher, and an old drunkard.

He was kept at school with various teachers at intervals of a year or more, walking often several miles to the school-house, or the Academy, as it was called. While at school he read the Bible through twice, and committed some chapters and select verses, which he retained through life. By the time he was sixteen years old, he had acquired a fair education for the times, and in 1817-18 he became a school-teacher himself, supporting himself by hard work and a poor remuneration. He was converted when only eight years old. The family attended a campmeeting in Elbert county, forty miles from home, and his brother and sister embraced religion. After returning home—all the family happy in God—William felt serious, retired to his room for prayer, and prayed until all sadness left him, wept aloud for joy, and experienced a change of heart. For months from this time he enjoyed peace, but gradually, by neglect of prayer and other duties, he lost his happiness, and never regained it until the fall of 1818, at a camp-meeting near his father's house. He came to this place less religiously concerned than he had been for a long time. Samuel Sewell, then going to school to him, was exhorting in the altar; he (Parks) was convicted of sin, fled to the woods to pray, shouted aloud in the joy of his restoration to the favor of God, and returned to tell the glad news to his father and friends. He joined the Church at the first opportunity, felt impressions to do good and to preach the gospel, carried his case by prayer to the throne of grace, and read good books and the Bible with reference to the subject. In 1820 he went to Salem, Clarke county, to study English Grammar under Mr. J. C. Paulette, teacher in the Academy. He boarded with the Rev. Joseph Tarpley, Presiding Elder of the Athens District, who conversed freely with him-learned his impressions, encouraged him, and gave him license to exhort. He immediately began his work with old Uncle Toliver, a colored Baptist preacher, often walking seven miles to his appointments. In 1821, at a District Conference, he was licensed to preach, and recommended for the itinerancy to the next Annual Conference, to be held at Wilmington, N. C., Feb., 1822. Previous to receiving recommendation, he notified his Presiding Elder that if he was received at the Conference it must be as a married man. He was married to Miss Naomi Prickett, Feb. 14, 1822. He was admitted on trial and sent to the Sparta Circuit, Thomas Sanford being senior preacher with him. He preached his first sermon in the M. E. Church, in Powelton, Hancock county, Ga., Feb., 1822. In 1823-24 he was alone on the Gwinnett Mission, a newly settled country, where for miles he found not even a settler's blaze to direct him. Then men and women walked six and seven miles to church, or rather to a pole cabin, the house of some friend. These were happy, successful years, but full of hardships, trials, and even perils, and some persecutions. Many souls were converted, congregations or-ganized, and log-churches erected. In the first

of 1824 he and his wife went to housekeeping in Franklin county, Ga., forty miles from his nearest preaching-place the greater part of his time, having twenty-six appointments, preaching thirty times in twenty-two days, and riding about three hundred miles in a month. The few days at home were not "rest days, but days of manual labor—working with his hands even to blistering in order to provide for his family. In 1825 he was on Broad River Circuit, Isaac Boring being his colleague as junior preacher his first year. In 1826 he was on Grove Circuit, receiving \$80 all told for his year's work. His "whole soul was itinerant," but from stress of circumstances he determined to locate for one year to prepare for the regular work the rest of his days. In 1827, the preacher on the circuit that year failing in health, to relieve him he again consented to travel. This interfered with his plans, so that he was compelled to remain local in 1828. He was readmitted in Jan., 1829, and sent to the Gwinnett Circuit among his old friends of the former mission. In 1830 he was on the Walton Circuit, formerly a part of Gwinnett Mission. In 1831-32 he was Presiding Elder on the Athens District. In 1833, at his own request, preferring a circuit, he was put on the Apalachee Circuit, John C. Oliver being his colleague as junior preacher. In 1834 he was on the Milledgeville District, his nearest appointment in Franklin county being sixty miles distant from home, the lower end of the work being about two hundred and fifty miles away. On this District he had twelve appointments, forty-eight quarterly-meetings, and about five thousand miles of travel per annum, visiting his family about eight times in the year. We present a summary of his work up to 1865, in which year we find him permanently superannuated. He was missionary two years; Presiding Elder, fourteen years; on stations, four years; Agent for American Bible Society, one year; Agent for Georgia Conference, one year; on circuits, ten years; Agent for Emory College, eight years—a period of forty-three years—in which he was local two years and superannuated one year, 1856. Hc was a member of all the General Conferences from 1832 to 1844, the memorable Conference in the history of the Church. He was elected delegate to the Louisville Convention in 1845, but owing to the death of his aged father he did not attend. He was elected also to the first General Conference of the M. E. Church, South, at Petersburg, May, 1846, but owing to personal injuries did not attend. He was delegate to the several General Conferences from 1850 to 1866, held at St. Louis, Columbus, Nashville, and New Orleans, respectively, but being unable to attend the last he resigned his place to his son, H. H. Parks, first on the list of reserved delegates. Bereaved of his second wife, who died in Oxford, May 30, 1865, he spent the time from February to August of this year in visiting his friends and relatives in North-east Georgia, among whom he found much satis-faction in preaching to them as he was able.

Alone in his old age, he often felt himself to be a stranger among friends, and homeless though at home. After prayer and counsel with prudent and reliable friends, he was married to Mrs. Dolly S. Burge, of Newton county, Ga., Sept. 13, 1866, in which marriage, as in the former two, he recognized a wise and gracious Providence guiding him and providing for his greatest happiness and usefulness. On Nov. 30, 1869, we find him seventy years old, physically feeble, but able to preach almost every Sabbath, in tolerable health and good spirits, comfortable in circumstances, and celebrat-ing his birthday in happy social reunion with his wife and six children, and nine grandchildren, out of a larger circle not present, happier still in the Christian's faith and hope, retrospecting the past with pleasure, and with cheerful contentment looking joyfully to the life to come. Honored by his brethren in his old age as a delegate elect to the General Conference at Memphis, he anticipated much pleasure in attending this Conference. In Sept., 1870, conscious of a rapid decline, and anticipating death in less than twelve months, with a soul overflowing with gratitude, full of faith, anxious to depart, he gives expression to his peace of mind in the words of the hymn he loved, "Happy if with my latest breath." He hoped to be able to attend the session of the North Georgia Conference at Athens, in 1871, but his health was insufficient, and he declined going. He preached his last sermon in Scpt., 1870, and a year afterward is still hoping to preach. Now laboring under disease involving his heart and lungs, superinduced by about fifty years of excessive ministerial labor, his rejoicing is this, that he was "not worn out in the service of sin, but in the service of his Master, into whose gracious keeping he commits all for time and eternity." On the verge of the grave in 1872, he is hoping to preach, happy that he had kept his early vows of consecration to the ministry, able and delighting to read the Bible, but lamenting his failing memory. His journal abounds with expressions of gratitude, and prayer, and praise, and couplets of hymns. There are evident signs in his chirography of increasing paralysis. Up to June, 1872, paralysis increases—he cannot walk nor stand, and is lifted about as a little child. He is anxious to attend the Conference at Atlanta, but has no hope of such pleasure. He rejoices in God's goodness, and in the unremitting kindness of his wife, and daughter, and friends. Dec. 1, 1872, dates the last record in his journal, and he writes: "I do not expect to see another birthday. May I be found ready when the Master calls, and able to respond joyfully, 'Here am I.'" So ends the record, written in pen and ink with his own hand. This will perish with all transitory things, but the record of his life, written on immortal souls, and in the Church in the results of his labors and life, will live forever. As a man, physically, he was endowed with an iron constitution and a strong frame, to which he owed his wonderfal powers of endurance. He was tall, well proportioned, and

commanding in person—his face impressive and benignant. Intellectually, he was a giant in strength, a hard and laborious student in his early Christian ministry, and had developed his mental capital by extensive reading and acquirements in later life. In his social and family relations he was mild, genial and affable, always cheerful and hopeful; a man of large heart-power, and wealth of affection, grave and stern in his deportment where gravity and severity were necessary; wise among the wise, and a child among children, loving and beloved by all who knew and appreciated him. As a counselor and advocate in the Church, he was equal to any occasion and responsibility, fearless and firm in his positions, but never offensively arrogant and obtrusive in advocating his views. Possessing a strong mind and a clear judgment, with a large stock of common sense, and the advantages of extensive observation and experience, his opinions were generally accurate and reliable. He was wise, prudent, cautious, strongly conservative, but always ready for true progress and real reform. In the progress of the Church he feared for the future, but rejoiced in all her tried elements of a sure prosperity. As a preacher, he was concise and perspicuous in style, without effort at rhetorical display, solid and rich in his subject-matter, and forcible and persuasive in his conclusions and appeals. He was profound in doctrine, eschewing fanciful interpretations, and eminently spiritual and practical, convincing his hearers, and making the truth desirable, and was satisfied only with spiritual results. As a Christian leader in society, he identified himself with all that was good and lovely, and contributed through a long life of usefulness to every social, moral, and religious enterprise which he could indorse, according to his ability. He was a man not of words, but of deeds, and his influence was ever Above all he loved the Church. for good. Only a few days before his death he attended a Church-service for the children, speaking to them kindly, urging the importance of doing well whatever they attempted—insisting on early conversion and religion. He loved the cause of education, and was a warm patron of Emory College during his life, and on the day of his death visited the institution and spent most of the day with the Faculty. Returning home in the evening of the same day, he was, as usual, pleasant and agreeable in social intercourse with his family; the Rev. John P. Duncan praying with him, and he responding with a fervent "Amen!" Soon afterward, as his friends were helping him to bed, paralysis came on; he complained of breathing hardly, and in one hour from that time he was dead. For two years he expected every day to be his last, but there was no fear. Every day was full of prayer, and gratitude, and Christian patience, and of counsel and advice to others. He had no solicitude save a desire to depart and be with Christ; to live and suffer was Christ; to die was gain. So he passed away, giving beforehand special instructions as to the

details of his burial and funeral, recommending extreme simplicity, and dictating his own epitaph. So died, on the evening of Oct. 16, 1873, this man of God, as a true philosopher and Christian, in the faith of that gospel he faithfully proclaimed for half a century, and in the glorious hope of that heaven and immortality which sustained him "even down to old age," and made the darkness of death as the twilight of heaven, and as the valley of Beulah. His good name was better than rubies, and his life and example are a glorious legacy for the Church and the world. He is gone; but as the waters of Jordan flow back over the unfaltering steps of this patriarch and prince of Israel, behold a flood of glory pours down from heaven through the valley of death, and the involving shadows of eternity are all alive with angelic forms of light and beauty, who come to receive his spirit and escort him to God; and as he enters upon his reward and rest, to his own bereaved family circle, and to this Conference of ministers and laymen, and especially to his old friends and associates who labored with him in doctrine and the councils of the Church, as well as to that larger circle of spiritual children whom he loved, if our spiritual ears were opened, we might hear, perchance, descending as from heaven, this last message and benediction: "These things ye have heard and seen in me, do-follow me as I have followed Christ-be faithful unto death, and the God of peace be with you all evermore!"

This faithful old hero, so noble and brave, May sleep with his sword in the conqueror's grave! A servant so true to his Master may rest, For his end is in peace and his memory blest!

WILLIAM McCall Kennedy was born, in Bullock county, Ga., May 18, 1817, and died, in Jefferson county, Ga., July 27, 1873. Of his parentage, early life, and training, we know but little more than that he was the subject of religious impressions when but a small boy. When about fourteen years of age he united with the M. E. Church; when nineteen or twenty years of age, while at a manual-labor school, two hundred miles from home, and in the full enjoyment of religion, he felt called to the work of the ministry. In a conference

held with some of his friends on this subject he was led, from a remark made by some of them, to doubt whether he was really called to be a minister. Of this he said, in after years, "I do wish I had engaged in the performance of that duty." He left home, entered into business with a purpose to make money, grew cold, and finally backslid. He remained in this condition for about six years. In 1843 he was reclaimed, and appointed to the office of steward and class-leader in the Church. Coincident with the return of the love of God to his heart was the return of the conviction upon his mind that it was his duty to preach. Against this conviction he struggled for two years. In Dec., 1844, he was licensed to exhort, and in Oct., 1845, he was licensed to preach. Then came another struggle. He felt it to be his duty to enter the itinerant ministry: with this conviction he warred for two years, when he obtained his full consent to give himself wholly to the work of God. In Feb., 1848, he was admitted into the Florida Conference. His first appointment was Black Creek Circuit. He remained in that Conference, filling the various appointments assigned him-circuits, Districts, a station, and a college agency-with acceptability and usefulness, until the close of the year 1866, when he came to the South Georgia Conference with the retrocession of that part of Georgia which belonged to the Florida Conference prior to that time. From this time until his death he continued an acceptable and efficient member of the South Georgia Conference, filling with fidelity and zeal the various appointments assigned him. In his manner and spirit he was genial, kind, and sociable; in his Christian life he was sincere and constant; and in his ministerial life he was devoted, faithful, and useful. Without those shining talents which command the applause of men, he ranks high in that estimable class of devoted laborers through whose instrumentality, mainly, the Church is built up and the number of its converts is steadily increased. A goodly number of his spiritual children, doubtless, greeted his ransomed spirit as it entered heaven, while many still in the flesh follow on, animated with the hope of joining him at the end of the journey. There was not a member of the South Georgia Conference, at its last annual session, whose appearance authorized more confident hope of a long life than did that of Brother Kennedy. Robust and active, he gave promise of many remaining years of usefulness. At the last Conference he was appointed to the Louisville Circuit, to which he went, and upon which he entered, in the early part of the year, with good heart and hope. He labored until July, when he was attacked by pneumonia, and after ten days, calmly and without a struggle, he fell sweetly asleep in Jesus.

James L. Cotten was born, in Edgecomb county, N. C., June 1, 1817. In early life he was remarkable for the simplicity, truthfulness, and purity of his character. His sensibilities were tender, his feelings ardent, and his affections strong. His home-life was beautiful, and he filled a warm place in the hearts of those who knew him best. As he advanced in years, and opportunities were afforded him for intellectual culture, he developed rapidly. His memory was retentive, his judgment clear, and his faculties, even in the spring-time of his existence, gave promise of a manhood of no ordinary type. He became a complete English scholar, mastered with great rapidity the rudi ments of classical literature, and if liberal acar

demic facilities had been granted him he would have distinguished himself in almost every species of learning. He was converted when quite a young man. From this time forward our departed friend was "a new creature; old things had passed away, and all things had become new," and there opened around him a new world. Heaven and earth were filled with a heavity which his one had to see the force and a beauty which his eye had not seen before, and his sensitive ear heard ravishing strains of swect and holy melodies; he saw fully, for the first time, his destiny as an immortal being— Christian faith opened its eyes, heavenly peace flooded his heart, all the resources of religious life poured their treasures at his feet, while the hope of eternal salvation shed its brightness upon his spirit and permeated his heart by its sacred warmth. He did not long enjoy the blessings of the new and everlasting covenant without an earnest and irrepressible desire to bring others into the "liberty wherewith Christ had made him free." A dispensation of the gospel of Christ was committed to him, and soon he felt "woe is me if I preach not the gospel." When the divine call fell upon his ear, from the depth of a consecrated soul came forth the response, "Speak, Lord, for thy servant heareth." Henceforward he conferred not with flesh and blood. He gave himself to God for the work of the itinerant ministry, and entered the Alabama Conference in the year 1845. From that period to the time of his death he passed up through all the grades of circuit and station-preacher to the rank of Presiding Elder, which responsible and important office he filled from 1864 to the last year of his life. He was married to Miss Lucy Curtis, of Cahaba, Ala., in 1852. Their union was a fortunate and happy one. Sister Cotten, who preceded her husband to the "rest that remaineth to the people of God" by more than twelve years, was indeed a "helpmeet" to the man of her heart. She was a crown of grace to his head, and her influence was shed forth as warm sunbeams through his home and his life. In the domestic circle Dr. Cotten was a model husband and father. Love was the law of his house, and kindness had utterance in every word of his mouth. He was careful and discreet in his expenditures, he and his family always living within his income as a Methodist preacher; no useless extravagance or unre-deemed financial pledge ever clouded his char-acter or blighted his ministry. He ever left behind him, as he went to new fields of labor, the light of a pure example and the aroma of a sanctified heart. As a man of intellect and learning the deceased had few superiors in either his native or adopted State. He "intermeddled with all wisdom," and grappled with the representative men of his age, in his efforts to apprehend and unfold the unsolved problems in the great realm of mind. His knowledge of the past and present was accurate; in drawing new conclusions from the data which this information furnished his logic was severe, his analysis complete, and his conclusions clear and palpable even to ordinary minds. In his pero-

ration, his argument having been finished, as he turned loose his imperial imagination his auditors were borne aloft upon its broad, bright wings to visions and hopes that were enchanting to the soul. On such occasions the Christian philosopher forgot himself in his theme, and his hearers, for the moment, lost sight of the fact that they were denizens of our own dark little world. As a preacher Dr. Cotten had few superiors in the Church of his choice, while in this Conference he had for years been without a peer. Besides the scope and power of his mind, which so admirably fitted him for the discussion of the great cardinal truths of our holy and blessed religion, he possessed a wealth of diction and a poetic felicity of expression that were marvelous. On great occasions, when the thousands of our Israel were gathered around him at the quarterly and camp-meetings, in the midst of his inimitable discourses his glowing sentences would take fire and burn at white heat; the speaker would stand transfigured before his brethren, while they would alternately lean forward trans-ported with joy and hope or sink back into their seats pale and transfixed with fear. The majesty and glory of God, the condescension and infinite compassion of our Lord Jesus Christ, the light and grandeur of heaven, and the blackness and horrors of hell, have rarely ever been more impressive and overwhelming than in the discourses of Dr. Cotten. The purely biblical element in his sermons was always large. He preached "the word" and proclaimed it "in demonstration of the Spirit." He never burnt "strange fire upon the Lord's altar," and ever strove to give to each of his hearers "his portion in due season." brother had his weaknesses—he was a man; but even these appeared to have their origin in the richness of his endowments and the fecundity of his genius. His powers of concentration and abstraction, which brought to his aid in moments of excitement the intellectual stores of almost his entire life, rendered him seemingly careless and absent-minded, and his exalted appreciation of the immortal spirit within caused him to

> Be forgetful of his house of clay, And treat the hovel as beneath his care.

On the whole, we shall never see the like of our ascended brother until we come "to the house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." Emory College, Georgia, which conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity, honored itself in placing upon him its seal. It was an honor to us that his name was upon our Conference-roll, and it is an honor to the State of his adoption that his precious dust sleeps within her soil. At the close of our last Conference, held in the city of Eufaula, Dr. Cotten was stationed at Union Springs. He went at once to his work, and, by his piety, ability, and zeal, he soon drew around him the confidence and affection of his people, and secured for himself the admiration of the eager multitude who crowded to their seats in his congregation. In

the midst of his usefulness, while his bow was still abiding in strength, and his people were turning their eyes above in eager expectation of the outpouring of the Holy Ghost upon his labors and the revival of the work of God, Dr. Cotten was called away on business. at Durant, Miss., he met the Rev. G. W. Brown, an old and esteemed friend. The reunion called up the recollection of the past and caused the Christian soldier, now about to lay down his weapons forever, to look forward to the future. He had known temptations and trials; late trials had tested the genuineness of his faith and sent its roots deeper down into the truth as it is in Jesus, but in every trial deliverance had come, and the ripe Christian was ready to be gathered into the heavenly garner. He spoke of his preparation to depart and be with Christ. With these words of triumph upon his lips the shafts of disease pierced his mortal frame. His illness at once became alarming, and the premonition that his time had come seized his mind. As long as he could arise from his couch he knelt down for secret prayer at the usual hours. Until the fires of life and consciousness were quenched in the cold waters of disease and death not a cloud rested upon his spirit. New friends ministered to him in his last hours, and the hands of strangers wiped the dew of death from his brow and closed his eyes upon the light of this world forever. But Cotten, the pure, the great, the gifted Cotten, "is not dead, but sleepeth." And when we get home, shall we not find him in the glory of his manhood, a radiant spirit in the kingdom prepared for the children of God?

GREENBERRY GARRETT was born, in Williamson county, Tenn., July 24, 1800; converted to God Dec. 10, 1821; licensed to preach in 1822, and in the same year joined the Tennessee Conference. The first eleven years of his ministerial life he spent in the Tennessee Conference, and three of those years were employed in mission-work among the Cherokee Indians in North-eastern Alabama. In 1833 he was transferred to Alabama, and was one of the small company that composed this body at its organization. It will be seen, from these early dates, that our brother entered the itineracy while yet the times and work tried men's souls. At the organization of this Conference much of the country was new and thinly settled, the Church scattered and comparatively unorganized, the work hard, and the compensation of the laborers small; so that while serving the Church, in Montgomery, he was obliged to have recourse to secular business to secure bread for his family. The people of this day owe an immeasurable debt to the men who stood by their convictions and principles through these days of hardships. When he through these days of hardships. When he served the Mobile District, 1839-42, it extended from Selma to Mobile and Pensacola. Over this field our brother traveled on horseback; indeed, there is hardly any portion of the State which he has not traversed in the same

way, patiently toiling through heat and cold, miry and sandy roads, to carry the message of salvation to perishing men. Many now in middle life, and others verging upon old age, have recollections of his visits and prayers mingling with the memories of early childhood. Brother Garrett was not only a faithful but a true man; he was not content with mere routine work, but looked for open doors for doing good, and wherever he saw one he en-tered it. He and another brother started the idea of a centennial celebration and services, in this Conference; in 1839 wrote a communication to the Church-paper, and sent circulars to the leading members of the Conference, calling the convention that met in Greensboro in July of that year, and which devised and adopted the programme which raised the funds that established the Centenary Institute, which has so widely blessed the Church for more than thirty years, and laid the real foundation for the Preachers' Aid Society, which has distributed thousands of dollars in donations to needy brethren. Thus he left the impress of his zeal and labors upon the institutions of the Conference. Over the Centenary Institute Brother Garrett watched for more than thirty years, as a trustee, with the interest of a father for his offspring; and though he enjoyed few opportunities for early improvement, he had none of those prejudices that bar the way of so many to progress and improvement. Principle he would never yield, but methods and measures willingly, when shown those better than his own. New financial plans, Ministe-rial Education Society, and every other measure calculated to advance the interests and usefulness of the Conference and Church, found in him a ready and hearty supporter. Our brother was not a great but a good man and true; he had none of the arts or resources of the orator, but he had what is far better-sterling integrity and fidelity to principle and conviction. His preaching was simple, earnest, spiritual, and scriptural; full of gospel truth and Christian experience, it comforted saints and often awakened sinners, and believers grew in grace under his ministrations. The Church in Alabama never had a truer son in her household than Greenberry Garrett. His brethren knew this, and loved, trusted, and honored him. He was elected to, and stood by principle in, the General Conference of 1844; he was also a member of the convention that organized the Church in 1845, and in the General Conferences of 1846, 1850, and 1854. From increasing infirmities Brother Garrett took a superannuated relation in 1865; but this did not cause his interest in the institutions and welfare of the Church to abate—all its operations were still dear to his heart and watched with interest. He continued to preach as often as he had opportunity and strength to do so. The prayermeeting, Sunday-school, and class-meeting were met punctually by him whenever he was able to walk to them. He suffered much and patiently for several of the last years of his life; in these years his increasing spirituality and the mellowing, beautifying power of grace were very manifest to all his friends who were conversant with him. His views of the atonoment were clear, his apprehension of faith scriptural, and both came graciously to his aid and comfort in his hours of need, sustaining his spirit and confidence to the last. Though he could talk but little during his last illness, yet his few utterances were all that could be desired. In response to the question if he felt peace, he replied, "Peace—all is well;" and in reply to the inquiry, another time, if he felt the Saviour precious, he answered, "Yes; precious, precious." In this faith, so often preached and so long enjoyed, he was steadfast unto the end—March 20, 1873. Thus died our brother, a faithful man. "Servant of God, well done." In the ripeness of faith and of Christian experience he passed away.

GEORGE R. TALLEY was born, in Tennessee, March 12, 1818, and died, near Plantersville, Ala., Aug. 2, 1873. He experienced the blessing of regeneration at Lexington, N. C., in Oct., 1832, and was admitted on trial into the itinerating ministry of the South Carolina Conference in Jan., 1837. On Jan. 13, 1839, he was ordained a deacon by the venerated and glorified Bishop Andrew, and on Feb. 14, 1841, was by the same Bishop ordained to the higher office of an elder. In Dec., 1853, he was admitted by transfer into the Alabama Conference, and stationed as pastor of the church in the town of Auburn. It is said of him that he never had a doubt touching his call to the sacred ministry; and, indeed, so clear and strong were his convictions in this regard that he felt, with peculiar impressiveness, "Woe is me if I preach not the gospel." So impelled was our departed brother by this internal conviction that his life-work was to call sinners to repentance that he was ever at the post of duty, and even amid physical indisposition and suffering has been known to reach the appointed place for preaching the gospel of his ascended Master. For several months previous to the death of our brother his health failed rapidly, but he often spoke of the great goodness of God to him, and gave unmistakable expressions of entire resignation to the divine will. His consolation so abounded in the hour of his death that all fear and gloom were banished from his mind, and as the waters of life's last river were being reached by his advancing footsteps his mouth was filled with expressions of sacred joy. and, with a voice rendered feeble by wasting disease, he sang Mr. Wesley's sub-lime and glorious hymn, "Jesus, lover of my soul." Said his now stricken widow, "When his bark was far out on death's river I asked him if he could yet trust the Saviour, and if all was yet bright with him. 'O yes, O yes,' was his reply; 'yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: thy rod and thy staff they comfort me." Thus died the faithful preacher, the affectionate father, the devoted husband. He rests with God.

JOHN J. CASSADY was born, in Chesterfield District, S. C., Nov. 6, 1827, and died Oct. 26, 1873. He was in infancy dedicated to God in baptism, and joined the M. E. Church in 1840, and, after having served as class-leader and exhorter, was in 1856 licensed to preach the gospel. In the winter of 1858 he was received into the Alabama Conference, continuing his connection with it five years, and then retiring to the local ministry to attend to the demands of his deceased father's estate. While in the local ranks of the ministry our brother did not forget that the vows of God were upon him, but exercised the functions of his sacred office with fidelity. He was readmitted into the Conference Dec., 1870, and appointed to serve Green wood Circuit, Florida; and, without specifying the several fields of labor to which this true yoke-fellow in the gospel was appointed, we may truly say of him he was ever found faithful to the work assigned him. Notwithstanding the opportunities for early literary culture were in his case menger, yet he served his pastoral charges with great acceptability, and not unfrequently his pulpit ministrations evinced much more than ordinary ability. Many souls were converted to God through his instrumentality, and many stars will doubtless shine upon his crown of rejoicing. At the session of last Conference our sainted brother was appointed to labor on the Choctaw Corner Circuit, and though too feeble to preach from the pulpit the word of life, he, however, made an entire round upon his charge, obeying the command of the Master as far as his failing strength would permit. Disease was, however, making such severe and fatal inroads upon him that he was soon compelled to desist from the work he loved so much, and return to his home to die. For the space of eleven months our glorified brother was the subject of severe physical suffering, but through this protracted season the grace which he had preached to others was his support and consolation. No sound of murmuring ever escaped his lips, and such was the sweetness of the repose of his spirit upon the Saviour that he could say, in the language of his adorable Lord, "Not my will, but thine, be done." Thus he fell asleep in Jesus, and now rests from labor, pain, and

STEPHEN FATHERLY PILLEY was born, in Edgecomb county, N. C., July 4, 1805; was converted and joined the M. E. Church in 1833, and was married the same year to Miss S. B. Graham. He was licensed to exhort March 14, 1834, and to preach March 14, 1835, and at the close of that year was received on trial into the Alabama Annual Conference. In the due course of time he attained to the orders of deacon and elder, and during his connection with the Conference served the Church as follows: 1836 Leaf River Circuit, 1837 Cedar Creek. 1838-9 Bellville, 1840 Escambie Mission, 1841 Presiding Elder on Pensacola District, 1842 Irwinton (now Enfaula) Station, 1843 Irwinton and Glennville, 1844 Montgomery

Station, 1845-7 he was superannuated, 1848-9 La Fayette Circuit, 1850 Auburn Station, 1851-2 again superannuated, 1853-6 Presiding Elder on the Eufaula District, 1857-8 Enon Circuit, 1859 Villula, 1860-1 Presiding Elder on the Pensacola District, 1862-7 superannuated, 1868-9 South Butler Circuit, 1870-1 again superannuated, 1872 Monroeville Circuit, 1873 South Butler. In the foregoing we have but the facts of his conversion, and entrance upon his holy vocation, and the mere outlines of the numerous and extensive fields in which he rendered ministerial service; but it is proper to enter, to some extent, upon a fuller notice of his religious and official character. Brother Pilley had a nature cast in the finest mold, and the sanctifying effects of the Christian religion were consummated in his disposition and character. He was regardful of all the amenities of ministerial life, ever deferring to the authority that was over him, and scrupulously observant of what was just and generous in his relations with his peers. In honor he preferred others; never was he an aspirant for place or position, nor was selfseeking ever suspected of him. No one ever grew old more gracefully or yielded more humbly and sweetly to the inevitable limitations and abatements incident to infirmity and age. By the ingenuous simplicity of his manners, as much as by his fine intelligence and his judicious judgment, he became a favorite with all who knew him intimately. Unobtrusive and modest, others had to seek him, but he was accessible to the humblest. He had fully mastered the Wesleyan theology, and in conversation on the salient points was most instructive and interesting. As a preacher he was clear, cogent, and convincing. His style was all his own, and it was well-nigh faultless. He was no actor; he did not affect sanctimony, and yet was so impulsively and ingenuously holy that in his presence men were constrained to do homage to the truth he embodied and illustrated. Despite extreme feebleness he performed the duties of a pastor with great fidelity and assiduity, even until stricken down with his last illness, which was characterized by great painfulness, disqualifying him for several days for intelligent converse with his family; but it is gratifying to know that his last distinct utterances were in earnest, fervent prayer for his Church, for his family, for his country. O he was a dear, dear old man! The love we bore him in life was ardent, and now that we are to greet him on earth no more fills us with sorrow; but it is joy to know that we have yielded him up to a higher realization of the truths which absorbed him here, and that peace, and rest, and glory now are his. Tearfully do we acknowledge the goodness and mercy of God in vouchsafing to us for so long a time one whose qualities of head and heart were so enriching to the brotherhood. His name will ever be "as ointment poured forth," and the halo of his exemplary life an abiding and treasured memory. His death occurred Nov. 22, 1873.

Joseph D. Adams was born, in Williamsburg District, S. C., Dec. 26, 1820. He joined the Church July 19, 1831; professed religion at a camp-meeting Sept. 24, 1837. His father having died, he removed with his mother to Randolph county, Ga., in 1835; was appointed class-leader at Salem Society, June 27, 1838, and in the same Society was licensed to exhort May 12, 1841, and was there licensed to preach, and by the same Quarterly Conference was recommended for admission on trial into the traveling connection Nov. 14, 1846. He was admitted on trial into the traveling connection

by the Georgia Conference Dec., 1846, and appointed as junior preacher to the Dahlonega Circuit, Marietta District. His second year he was on the Jacksonville Circuit, at the close of which he was received into full connection, and ordained deacon by Bishop Capers at Augusta, Jan. 14, 1849, and appointed to the Irvington Circuit. This year he was married to Miss Sophia Sinclair, daughter of the Rev. Jesse and Sophia D. Sinclair, of Twiggs county, Ga. In 1850 he was appointed to the Watkinsville Circuit; in 1851 he was ordained elder, and appointed to the La Fayette Circuit; in 1852, to Fort Gaines; in 1853, to Chattahoochee Mission; in 1854, to Stewart Circuit; and in 1855, to Hamilton Circuit. At the close of this year he located, and engaged in farming. In 1858 he removed to Louisiana, and was readmitted into the traveling connection by the Louisiana Annual Conference, at Mansfield, Feb., 1858, and was appointed to Waterproof, Tensas Parish. In 1859 he was appointed to St. Joseph and Wesley Chapel, in 1860 to Wesley Chapel, in 1861 to Waterproof, in 1862, 1863, 1864, and 1865 to New Iberia, in 1866 to Washington and Bayou Bouff, in 1867-68 to Plaquemine Brulie, in 1869, 1870, and 1871 to Opelousas District, in 1872-73 to the Moreau Street Station, New Orleans. Brother Adams was twice married. The time and place of his first wife's death we have not ascertained. Two sons and a daughter still survive her. His second marriage was with the widow of the Rev. A. T. M. Fly, in 1862. She and two daughters of tender years are left to the sympathy and care of the Church. Brother Adams died at Biloxi, Miss., on the morning of July 26, 1873. He had been in failing health for several months, and for nearly two months before his death, unable to preach regularly, though about, and usually present, at the regular services. Ten days before his death he was persuaded to visit the Gulf shore, but he grew rapidly worse after leaving the city, and his death was unexpected even to those who were acquainted with his failing health. But a week previous to the final summons, he sent his report to the Quarterly Conference. The same envelope contained also a communication to his stewards, in which, amongst other things, he mentioned that, feeling that he might die at any time, he had carefully examined himself, and believed that his acceptance with God was entirely clear-that for himself, he was perfectly resigned to live or die, but that he found it difficult to avoid anxiety about his wife and children. A paper found in his pocket-book after his death contains the following rules: "1. Keep your mind fixed on the object of your preaching—the salvation of man. 2. Remember it is the word of Christ, and not yours; therefore claim strength of Christ. 3. Be more earnest than eloquent; the subject will attract attention, and not you. 4. Feed the flock of God over which the Holy Ghost hath made you an overseer; not by constraint, but willingly." Another paper found with the above has this passage: "Look unto Jesus continually. I will pray for sanctification till I obtain it. I will be happy and satisfied with nothing less than perfection." It will be seen that his ministry extended through a period of twenty-seven years, fifteen of which were spent in the Louisiana Conference. From our personal knowledge and estimate, we can say that he was one of the purest and best of mena man of true refinement and spirituality of soul; an Israelite in whom there was no guile; a man who habitually walked with God, and lived and enjoyed the religion which he preached. He was an excellent preacher: his sermons were richly instructive, abounding in solid thought and apt illustrations, and always attended with much unction. In exhortation and prayer he had few equals. In the pastoral work he was diligent, and most careful and solicitous in looking after the afflicted. For more than average qualifications, general effectiveness, and amiability in the itinerant work, he belonged to that type of Methodist preachers of which no Conference ever has enough. He deservedly held a high place in the love and esteem of his brethren, and his death creates a void in their ranks which may not soon be filled, and entails a loss upon the Conference that it will be difficult to repair. His last hours were peaceful and assured. His dust sleeps on the sea-shore in full view of the water, and where the winds and the waves lift up their voices. The grave has been tastefully cared for, and we know of no spot where one would choose rather to be laid to rest.

JOHN D. WILLIS was born, in Monroe county, . Ga., Dec. 31, 1824. He was married to Miss Elizabeth Parks, of the same county, in 1844, and removed to Alabama in 1847, and from thence to Newton county, Miss., in 1852. In 1854, under the pastoral labors of the Rev. Edwin Mortimer, he was awakened, converted, and became a member of the Church. soon realized that he was called of God to the ministry. He was licensed to preach and admitted into the Mississippi Conference in 1855. For seventeen years he continued to labor among us as an obedient and diligent son in the gospel, filling a variety of appointments, among both the white and colored populations. Previous to the close of the war a large portion of his time was appropriated to the colored churches and congregations in Jefferson Not always obtaining a competent county. support for his family from his pastoral charges, especially during and after the war, he was compelled to engage, occasionally, in secular pursuits, in order to supplement a deficient salary; but his obligations as a minister were promptly met, and his appointments regularly filled. His beloved and faithful wife having preceded him to the grave, and his three sons having become sufficiently grown up to support themselves, he was entering more fully into the work of the ministry than ever before, when he was wholly disabled by the disease of which he died. At our last Conference he was appointed to Covington Circuit, in one of the eastern parishes of Louisiana. He went immediately to his circuit, and commenced his work, but soon had to desist on account of failing health. He then repaired to Newton county, Miss., where he had some near relations, who, he knew, would tenderly care for him in his extreme feebleness. He lingered until Aug. 16, 1873, when he fell asleep in Jesus. His disease was chronic diarrhea, which, while it reduced his body to perfect weakness, did not enfeeble nor derange his mind; so that his descent to the tomb was most triumphant. He seemed to have the most impressive views of the justice mercy, and love of God. For weeks before his death he seemed to "dwell in God,

and God in him." He triumphantly told his relatives and visiting brethren that he enjoyed the most perfect assurance of his acceptance in Christ and of his future glory. He diligently exhorted all who visited him during his protracted illness to seck their happiness in God and lay up their treasure in heaven. He died at the residence of his brother-in-law, E. K. Moore, and, after having been a wandering itinerant seventeen years, was buried within fifty yards of the place where he professed faith in Christ.

JOHN GREENBERRY DESKIN Was born, in Tazewell county, Va., Feb. 21, 1799. He was married June 17, 1819, after which he lived a number of years in Alabama. In the autumn of 1823 he attended a camp-meeting in Morgan county, Ala., where he was awakened to feel the importance of leading a new life. He immediately committed himself as a seeker of salvation by uniting with the Church. Soon after taking this initial step his conviction of sin became so deep pungent, and overwhelming that speedy deliverance from its pollution, oppressive guilt, and intolerable burden was, with him, a matter of imperious necessity. He turned his whole attention in that direction; he wept and prayed day and night for immediate liberation from sin's degrading power; and before the close of the meeting he was clearly and satisfactorily converted. He returned home a new creature in Christ Jesus; established the usual forms of family religion in his household; attended all the private and public means of grace, and soon began to take an active part in the social meetings of the Church. Strange and unlooked-for impressions were soon made upon his heart, and intruded themselves into all his thoughts. it be possible that he was moved by the Holy Ghost to preach the gospel? How could this be, when, in his own estimation, he had none of the qualifications, either natural or acquired, for such a work? He tried to forget and banish from his mind all such impressions, and suffered much spiritual loss by the effort; but, alarmed at the thought of his long delinquency and hesitation, in Sept., 1832, he consented to receive license to exhort. He succeeded better than his fears had led him to expect, and was happy in his new employment. His talents as a public speaker began to be developed, so that in a short time he was licensed as a local preacher, which relation he actively sustained until 1837. In 1835 he removed to Yallabusha county, Miss., where he settled, and divided his time between farming, teaching school, and preaching among the new settlers. In the meantime, he had become quite an effective preacher; but his mind was not at rest: he felt that his providential place was in the itinerancy, and, accordingly, applied for and obtained admission into the Mississippi Conference, in Dec., 1837. For twenty-three years he was an acceptable, zealous, and useful laborer in the central parts of Mississippi. In that time lie traveled eleven different circuits and

two missions, and nearly half of them for the entire pastoral term of two years. His work lay altogether in the Choctaw Purchase, so that he was familiar with new settlements, long rides, bridgeless streams, log churches, and all the usual inconveniences of a new country; but he was doing the work of an evangelist, and he faltered not. He was instrumental in bringing many sinners to Christ, and adding many members to the Church. When about sixty-two years of age he was so worn down by incessant labor that he was no longer able to do effective work, and was very cordially placed on the superannuated roll by his brethren. This relation he sustained until his death, which occurred, at the residence of his son, in Yazoo county, Sept. 5, 1873, in the seventy-fifth year of his age, and the thirty-niuth of his ministry. He was noted for his quiet and inoffensive life. He was warmhearted and affectionate among the people of his charge. His educational and theological attainments were not above mediocrity, but he was a good expositor of the word of God, and dealt faithfully with all who sat under his ministry. His declining years were years of increasing mellowness and sweetness of spirit. He thought less and less of earth, and more intently and constantly of heaven, until finally his pilgrimage ended, and his sun went down without a cloud.

John Young was born Sept. 17, 1781; was converted to God in 1802, and licensed to preach in 1814, by Learner Blackman; was ordained a deacon in Huntsville, Ala., by Bishop Roberts, and an elder by Bishop Andrew, at Holly Springs, Miss. He was, for the most part of his ministerial life, a laborer in our home missionary fields, principally among the people of color. His labors were owned of God, and hundreds of souls were brought from darkness to light through his instrumentality, and will rise up in the judgment of the great day and call him blessed. He possessed but little of that beauty and strength which education gives to the mind and the life, having had few, if any, advantages in early life; but he had an earnest, fervent spirit, always alive to the promotion of the glory of God among the congregations which he served, and to the fullest extent of his powers and attainments

he did the work of a preacher in his own plain and simple style, being instant in season and out of season. He maintained a spotless moral character in the Church of God for upward of seventy years, and a life of ministerial usefulness without reproach for fifty-nine years. He was regarded by those who knew him most intimately as having grown in piety as his years increased. Hence his path was as that of the just that shineth more and more unto the perfect day. He passed peacefully and triumphantly from the Church on earth to the Church in heaven, May 23, 1873, aged ninety-one years, eight months, and six days.

MILES HARPER FORD was born June 24, 1822. He embraced religion and joined the M. E. Church, South, in 1846; was licensed to preach in 1848, having filled the office of class-leader the two years preceding. He joined the Mem-phis Conference in 1850. His death occurred Dec. 27, 1872. He had filled the Grenada, Coffeeville, Paris, Pontotoc, Okolona, Oxford, Houston, Salem, Chulahoma, Marshall, and Byhalia Circuits, and Byhalia and New Salem Station. Our brother was an able minister of Jesus Christ. He had a comprehensive understanding of the whole system of Christianity, and was an able and ready defender of the faith. His earnest prayers, his gift of song, his logical sermons, and persuasive exhortations, achieved glorious results. Many and gracious were the revivals in which he was the chief instrument. Souls were won for Christ, the Church was increased and strengthened, the work of God prospered in his hands, and his soul was satisfied. The hardships of twentytwo years of itinerant life, the sacrifices he made, what he did for the world, what he suffered in his conflicts with the powers of darkness, how he wrestled for the mastery, his defeats and his triumphs, his joys and his sorrows -all these are with God, and he will reward according to his own righteous goodness. A life so nobly spent must have a triumphant close. At the last session of the North Mississippi Conference he was returned to the Marshall Circuit, and immediately began the toils of the year. The Sabbath next preceding his death he attended his last appointment, and the next day went home, never to renew the contest. For months his health had been feeble, and now, attacked by one of the most violent of diseases, his already overtaxed constitution rapidly gave way beneath the strokes of the destroyer. His sufferings were intense, but he bore them with perfect resignation, gently chiding the beloved ones who were weeping around his bed, and endeavoring, with repeated references to the inspired word, and quotation after quotation from the precious hymns of the Church, to prepare them for the terrible trial just ahead of them. As nearer and nearer came the fatal hour, resigning himself into the hands of God, he called up all his strength, and, struggling upon the brink of the grave, he gave out, as significant of triumph, that grand utterance of the Psalmist: "I shall be

satisfied when I awake with thy likeness." And when the final moment came, his faltering lips murmured in low but distinct whisper these joyous words, "Nearer, my God, to thee, nearer to thee;" a change transcendently beautiful passed over his countenance, and the soul, dismissed from the body, was borne by angels to join the company of the saved at God's right hand. Thus lived and died one of the truest of Christian men—one whom his brethren all devotedly loved.

JOHN T. BASKERVILLE was born, in Mecklenburg county, Va., Feb. 17, 1803, and graduated in medicine, in the city of Baltimore, in 1822. He made a public profession of faith in Christ and joined the Methodist Church, under the ministry of the Rev. John W. Childs, in 1833. He was licensed to preach at a Quarterly Conference held at Jackson, Tenn., Feb. 11, 1839, by the Rev. Thomas Joyner, now of the Memphis, then of the Tennessee, Confer-The papers furnished do not state when or where he was admitted on trial into the traveling connection, but it is known that he was ordained a deacon by Bishop Andrew, at Jackson, Tenn., in the autumn of 1840. The Doctor was stationed in Somerville, Tenn., 1841-3, two years. At the close of his useful pastorate in that place he was most happily married to Miss Margaret P. Malone, the mother of his three surviving children. His next appointment, it is believed, was to the agency of the Memphis Conference Female Institute. His services were invaluable in establishing that old and prosperous school of the Memphis Conference. He was subsequently agent for the La Grange College, then the joint property of the Memphis and Tennessee Conferences. In the financial interests of those two institutions of learning he traveled, as the appointee of his Conference, from 1843 to 1849. From the latter date to 1851 he was the preacher in charge of the Wesley Circuit, and 1851-3 he traveled the Somerville Circuit. He often referred to those circuits with just pride as the very best representatives of the great missionary enterprise of the At the Conference of 1853 he was placed on the supernumerary list, which relation he sustained to the Conference until the close of his useful life, May 1, 1873. It is proper to state, in this connection, that he was married the second time, in 1857, to Mrs. A. T. Hare, a lady of much devotion to the Church, and of fine accomplishments, who survives to mourn her great loss. Dr. Baskerville has often been heard to state, in public and in private circles, that he was a great sinner, saved by grace. In grateful expressions he would acknowledge the influence of his deeply pious Presbyterian mother as the chief instrument in turning him from excessive wickedness to a life of decided piety. Those qualities that made him chief among sinners would,

when properly directed, make him a prince in the Church of Christ. More than half of his valuable life was given to the interests of the Church, which he loved with all the ardor of his warm and impulsive nature. His last years were spent in an appreciative review of the standard authors of the Methodist Church, and his conversations and pulpit ministrations showed familiarity with those profound thinkers and writers of Christian theology. The Doctor made an impression for good on the generation which he faithfully served. It would follow, from the foregoing, that this servant of God would be ready when the summons should come; and so he was. Just before he died he sent a message to an old friend, who was in age and feebleness extreme, that he (the Doctor) would be the first to get home. He expressed much affection for his brethren in the ministry; and for his two sons, both of whom are members of the Memphis Conference, he could desire nothing more than that they should be faithful embassadors for Christ. In many aspects of his character we admired our Brother Baskerville while living, and we revere his memory now that he is dead. His place among us is vacant. We miss him, and would only add:

Servant of God, well done—
Rest from thy loved employ;
The battle fought, the vict'ry won,
Enter thy Master's joy.

GEORGE WASHINGTON DAVIDSON HARRIS was born, in Montgomery county, N. C., Jan. 25, 1797. He was married to Miss Elizabeth Davidson, Sept. 19, 1819, with whom he lived in love and peace for over fifty-two years. We are not able to state the time and circumstances of his conversion—that event which changes man's heart and destiny; but it must have occurred before he had passed the freshness of youth, for we find him responding to the heavenly call and receiving license to preach the gospel in 1824. This was under the eldership of William McMahon, of illustrious memory. A full list of appointments traveled by George W. D. Harris, from his admission into the Tennessee Conference in 1824 to the end of his long career, would occupy too much space in this memorial. His first appointment was Pond Spring, in 1825 Bedford Circuit, 1826 Winchester Circuit, 1827 Lincoln Circuit, 1828 Stone's River, 1829-30 Nashville Circuit. In 1831 he was appointed Presiding Elder of the Paris District, which office in the Church he continued to fill, except one year, when he was agent for Andrew College, until the accumulated infirmities of age compelled him, at our Conference in 1870, to accept a superannuated relation. This he did with painful reluctance, grieving to cease from active labors in his Master's vineyard, but with hope that a year's rest would restore him to his "loved employ." Alas! that hope was vain. His physical powers gradually yielded under the weight of years, until a severe attack of pneumonia brought a final release from life's toils, Dec. 9, 1872. This event—so sad to us, so joyons to him-occurred at his residence in Dyersburg, Tenn., in the midst of friends, brethren, and children. A career so long and conspicuousa life so devoted to man, to the Church, and to God—a name so honored and so historical surely deserves a more extended and minute memorial than can be now and here presented. "His works do follow him;" and, should his biography never be written, his own handwriting on the age which he adorned will send his name down to posterity wreathed with rev-erence and love. Dr. Harris was, in many respects, one of the fathers of our Conference. "When the Memphis Conference was constituted, in Nov., 1840," says one of our Bishops, "G. W. D. Harris naturally found his place at the head of it, and his brethren had the wisdom and the grace to keep him there. His decision, his practical wisdom, his love of the Church's welfare, and his jealousy for its honor, commanded for his opinions marked deference. 'Unto him men gave ear, and waited, and kept silence at his counsel." He was a man of great strength of will and firmness of purpose -of clear perceptions, deep and honest convictions, untiring energy, ardent and holy zeal, a fervent spirit, and reverent piety. In the pulpit-whether in the city or under the campground shelter-he had few peers and fewer superiors. He was a powerful preacher-in gigantic thought, in forcible utterance, in authoritative delivery, in spiritual unction—a powerful preacher. He was a model of orthodoxy; he loved simple Bible truth with all the fervor of a great and confiding heart, and preached it to the people as the message of God. Perhaps no one in his age brought more sinners to Christ, established and organized more churches, inducted more young men into the ministry, than did this ever-active minister of the gospel. But his labors were not limited by the narrow bounds of the Memphis Conference: Dr. Harris was known to the entire Methodism of the United States as one of their wise, safe, and sagacious counselors in the General Conference, of which he was a working member in 1832-36-44, when the Church was divided, and then in 1846-50-54-58-66; was a member of the Southern General Convention in 1845, and was elected to the General Conference of 1862, which failed to meet because of the civil war, and to the General Conference of 1870, which his own ill health prevented him from attending. In these assemblages of the chief council of the Church he held a noble place; his opinions were respected, his talents were admired, his force in debate was acknowledged, his safe and conservative counsels were valued. The impress of his clear and discriminative intelligence is stamped upon the Methodist Discipline in every department of our practical economy. He possessed, in a large degree, the talent of organization and administration. In the office of Presiding Elder, which he held through a generation, in spite of his seeming dignity and sternness, he was kind, gentle, and fatherly to the young

preacher, and respectfully affectionate toward his elderly brethren. He knew and practiced the happy art of getting the most efficient work out of the preachers of his charge, and seldom indeed did his District fail to bring up an honorable report. In these and in many other respects he was a model Presiding Elder. But time fails us to enumerate the many virtues that ennobled the life and labors of Father Harris, and we must close this sorrowful sketch of his life with the record of his death. This event, as before stated, occurred in Dyersburg, Tenn., Dec. 9, 1872. He was taken ill the day after his return from our last session at Somerville. His sufferings were great, but his unmurmuring patience and steadfast faith were greater. He said it was all right, and that the religion he had so long recommended to others sustained him in this last affliction. Being conscious of approaching dissolution, he expressed a perfect willingness to depart and be with Christ. He had preached his last sermon -a rich exhibition of divine truth-on Sunday afternoon of our last session, and now comes to lay down his charge with his well-worn body, "And cease at once to work and live." He niet death as he had niet the responsibilities of life—calmly, fearlessly, trusting all to God in Christ Jesus.

MARK WILSON GRAY was born, in Maury county, Tenn., Feb. 11, 1811; he professed faith in Christ about the year 1827; he soon felt it to be his duty to labor in the cause of Christ, and to warn sinners to flee from the wrath to come; he was licensed to exhort Aug. 24, 1828, by the Rev. Elias Tidwell, who has gone to his reward; Nov. 8, 1828, he was licensed to preach, the Rev. Thomas Smith being the Presiding Elder; he was ordained deacon by Bishop McKendree, at Pulaski, Oct. 10, 1833; he was admitted on trial as a traveling preacher at Columbia, in the autumn of 1836, and was ordained elder in 1839. He continued an itinerant preacher till the day of his death, occupying many important fields. Among those circuits and stations which he filled, mention may be made of Dover, Dixon, Goose Creek, Summer, Harpeth, Mount Pleasant, Franklin, Nashville, Mill Creek, Wesley, Middleton, Antioch, Versailles, Fayetteville, etc. In all these charges Brother Gray was useful and, in a measure, successful, and for thirty-seven years was a faithful and zealous laborer in the Master's vineyard. In many of his pastoral charges he witnessed gracious revivals of religion, and saw the cause of God prosper under his ministrations. Brother Gray's early literary advantages were not great, yet he was a man of good sense, sound judgment, and had an improving mind. He became a solid, successful preacher of the gospel, and was honored and respected by the people whom he served. In person, Brother Gray was portly, with light hair and florid complexion; his voice, in the days of his vigor, was full, and his manner in the pulpit natural and easy. He was remarkable for his modesty, and always seemed to esteem others better than himself; yet, when in the pulpit, and fired with his subject, he became bold and fearless, and was eloquent in fervency and powerful in his appeals. He shunned no duty, but went forward in the Master's work, often under serious embarrassments. He had a large family, and the pecuniary support given him was often very small; yet he persevered, continued in the work, brought up his family in respectability, lived to see them well provided for, and had the pleasure of seeing one of his sons enter the Christian ministry, and become a beloved member of the same Conference with himself. Brother Gray was confiding in his nature, and very unsuspecting in his disposition, hence he was frank, loving, and communicative. His social qualities were excellent, and his company always pleasant. Few men had more friends and fewer enemies. All classes among his brethren loved and respected him, and many will now say, A good man, a faithful preacher, a devoted Christian, and sincere friend, has passed away. His memory will be cherished by thousands in the Church, and his virtuous life leave a beautiful example to his children and grandchildren. At the last session of the Tennessee Conference, Brother Gray was appointed to the Middleton Circuit; here his health, which had been precarious for some time, entirely failed, and he went home to die in the midst of his family. He died of heart-disease, May 28, 1873. His end was peaceful, and his hope full. A few days before his death he said to one of his breth-ren in the ministry, the Rev. R. R. Jones, "I know in whom I have believed, and am persuaded that he is able to keep that which I have committed unto him against that day." When nearly gone, he said, "Let us go home,"

and sweetly fell asleep in Jesus. By his request he was buried in Rose Hill Cemetery, Columbia. Thus he was interred where he was admitted into the Conference, and sleeps in his native county. The Rev. R. G. Irvine read the burial-service, when his Masonic brethren laid him away with the ceremonies of the Order.

JOHN D. WINN was born, of respectable parents, Sept. 15, 1805; he was admitted on trial in the Tennessee Conference, Nov., 1827; he traveled successively the Dover, Smith's Fork, Lincoln, Red River, Caney Fork, Shoal, Smith's Fork again, Caney Fork the second time, Winchester, Forked Deer, and Paris Circuits. In all these fields of labor he was acceptable and useful. He was a man of ordinary capacity, but improved his talent, and made full proof of his ministry. But, alas! he was overtaken by sickness, which resulted in the prostration of his mind, and he was placed on the superannuated list in the year 1838, where his name has stood ever since. all his derangement he was generally quiet and harmless, and he never lost sight of the fact that he was a minister of the gospel. He oftentimes attempted to preach, and his last sermon seemed to be consistent, and gave evidence of power. For nearly thirty-five years Brother Winn was mainly supported by appropriations from the board of finance of the Conference. He, however, found many friends who aided him in his day of gloom and solitude. He was an incessant reader of the Bible, and could recite chapter after chapter without any apparent difficulty, and seemed to care for no other books, save the Methodist Discipline, to which he was deeply attached; and although insane during the many years he sojourned in Clifton Circuit, his walk was blameless and upright.

THOMAS R. MALONE, who suffered so long

and so patiently, died, at the residence of his son, the Rev. Joseph S. Malone, in Louisville, Ky., Feb. 20, 1873. He was the youngest child of Winn and Jane Malone. He was born, in Barren county, Ky., Nov. 30, 1810; born of the Spirit at Anticoh Comp ground Mont the Spirit, at Antioch Camp-ground, Montgomery county, Tenn., in Aug., 1831; and was licensed to preach, by the Rev. George W. Taylor, on Barren Circuit, Ky., in the summer of 1832. After having preached on the Danville and Lebanon Circuits, by the appointment of a Presiding Elder, he was admitted on trial into the traveling connection, by the Kentucky Annual Conference, in Sept., 1835, and appointed to Henderson Circuit. In 1836 he was sent to Morganfield Circuit. In 1837 he was ordained deacon, by Bishop Roberts, and appointed to Burlington Circuit, but, at the close of the first quarter, was changed to Lexington Station, on account of the ill-health of the Rev. William Holman, who had been stationed in that city. In 1838 he was appointed to Covington Station. In 1839 he was ordained elder, by Bishop Soule, and sent to Georgetown Circuit; in 1840 to Germantown Circuit, 1841 to Cynthiana, 1842 to Lancaster, 1843 to Taylorsville. While serving this circuit his pious and beautiful young wife died (Feb. 19, 1844), leaving her bereaved husband, an infant daughter, and son. To this excellent lady, daughter of Joshua Jones, Esq., of Cynthiana, Ky., Brother Malone had been married but about four years. The sorrowing husband re-turned from the grave of his wife suffering from inflammatory rheumatism of the most dreadful type. After that melancholy journey he was utterly helpless, and subject to unceasing pain. He was literally drawn into knots, and for twenty-nine years was unable to get his hands to his head, or his feet to the floor. He had to be fed and lifted like an infant. Unable to hold a book or paper, in order that he might read it was necessary, for several years, to have the volume placed in a swing attached to his bed-post. On the Taylorsville Circuit his active labors ceased-not so his Christian usefulness: it was a privilege to hear his cheerful voice, and gaze on his happy countenance, and study and admire the grace of God in such a sufferer. No murmur or complaint passed from his lips; the will of his di-vine Master was his will. Perfected through sufferings, in him patience had her perfect work. He was a constant reader of the word of God, and had committed to memory large portions of it. The atonement, in all its completeness, was the theme of his thoughts and the ground of his hope. He realized that Christ had, with himself, freely given him all things. During his illness he referred with grateful joy to the fact that through all his helplessness his ever-faithful Saviour had never allowed him to lack for any thing. As an example of conscientious self-denial, he at one time discontinued the use of the various preparations of opium which were so necessary to mitigate his sufferings, because he felt and feared the growth of the sinful opium appe-

tite. The last twelve years of his life were spent in the happy home of his affectionate Prior to that time he had lived five years with his cousin, Mr. James H. Roberts, near Clarksville, Tenn. The preceding eleven years were spent among different friends in Kentucky and Tennessee; but wherever he went the divine blessing went with him. Since the commencement of Brother Malone's sufferings nearly all of his fellow-laborers in the ministry have passed away. Only eight of those who welcomed him into the itinerancy are now connected with the Kentucky and Louisville Conferences. His younger brethren sympathized with him in his sufferings, and gladly aided in making him as comfortable as possible. They will continue to cherish his memory, and to rejoice that our divine Master will give bright crowns to faithful, patient sufferers, as well as to active, successful laborers.

L. C. Danley died July 27, 1873, of cholera, near Garnettsville, Ky. He was received into the Kentucky Annual Conference, at Bardstown, in 1840, and sent to Minerva as junior preacher. From 1840 to 1849 he traveled various circuits, embracing Greenupsburg, Hodgensville, Williamsburg, Prestonsburg, Lockport, Orangeburg, and Germantown. In 1849 he located, and lived in Louisville. In 1855 he was reädmitted, and appointed to Poplar Plains. From this place he went to Owingsville, thence to Crittenden. In 1859 he was made supernumerary, and in 1860 superannuated—in which relation he continued until his death. He was a faithful minister of Christ, ever ready for his work. He died in faith, but we have no particulars of the closing scene.

WILLIAM H. Morrison was born in Fayette county, Pa., Feb. 25, 1823. He was married first by the Rev. A. Young to Miss Matilda

Smith, daughter of James C. and Julia A. Smith, in Union Town, Fayette county, Pa., Nov. 16, 1843. She died in July, 1862, and he was again married by the Rev. J. F. Redford to Mrs. Mary Eliza Leavell, daughter of John and Nancy A. Lauder, at Salubria Springs, Christian county, Ky., Dec. 13, 1865. He died at his home near Casky's Station, Christian county, Ky., March 4, 1873, aged fifty years and seven days. He professed religion and connected himself with the M. E. Church when about ten years of age. He was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of the Greenville Circuit, in the Louisville Conference, Feb. 16, 1847. He was admitted on trial into the Louisville Annual Conference in Oct., 1847, was ordained deacon in Oct., 1849, and elder in Oct., 1851. He was connected with the Conference twenty-five years and about six months. He was effective twenty-one years, supernumerary two years, and superannuated two and a half years. During his effective ministry he was one year on a mission, nine years on circuits, and eleven years on districts. After coming to Kentucky, and before he entered the ministry, he worked at the tailoring business, and from the date of his superannuation, which occurred in 1870, to the time of his death, he was engaged in farming. Brother Morrison was, in every sense of the word, a gentleman-his instincts were noble. his impulses generous, his sense of propriety refined, his manners dignified, courteous, affable. He had, in a rare degree, the faculty of adapting himself to any company into which he might be thrown, and hence was a great favorite in social life. It was pleasant to meet him and greet him, and be with him. Families vied with each other in their efforts to secure his company, and cherished the recollection of his visits as among the most pleasant episodes of their home life. He was also a safe man. A sound judgment enabled him, after maturing a subject well, to reach a correct conclusion, and a tender, well-trained conscience aided him in the rendition of a righteous verdict in almost every case submitted to his arbitrament; and these, united with a rare prudence, made him no mean diplomatist, and invested him with the attributes of a most trustworthy counselor. Hence his peculiar fitness for the Presiding Eldership, a fact soon discovered by his brethren who suggested him for the position in which he so long and so faithfully served the Church. He was a solid man-truthful, candid, unbiased, "extenuating nothing and setting down naught in malice." His statements on all subjects were worthy of the fullest credit. Once assured that he was right, he clung to any cause which he espoused, through "evil report and good report," with a tenacity from which he could not be driven by fear, favor, or affection. Supremely unselfish, "seeking not his own, but the things of others," his integrity was as incorruptible as gold. Starting early, and being blessed of heaven with a clear, well-defined personal religious experience, his piety, while not whimsical, was sufficiently emotional to impart a pleasant glow to his enjoyments, and in process of time ripened into the most implicit confidence in God, which begat an unswerving devotion to his service. It sufficed to keep him amid trials and temptations most severe, and developed a perfection and uprightness whose end was peace. As a preacher, he was clear, sound, practical. His sermons, while not ornate, were pointed and effective. He gave himself unreservedly to the strictly legitimate work of his calling-was successful in winning souls to Christ, and in building up the interests of the Church in his various fields of labor; and after nearly twenty years of active service in his Master's vineyard, has gone to dwell forever with the Lord.

ALISON AIKEN was the son of Robert and Rosanna Aiken. He was born in Maury county, Tenn., Sept. 9, 1814, and died in Caldwell county, Ky., Oct. 17, 1872. He was brought up under the influence of family religion. His first religious impressions were made while his own father was praying around the family altar. At twenty-five years of age he was converted at a Cumberland Presbyterian campmeeting, soon after which he united with the Methodist Church, and was appointed a leader of the class in which his parents were members. He was not long in this work before he felt himself called of God to preach the gospel. When he received his first license is not known, but he was received into the Tennessee Conference in 1841, at Clarksville. He was ordained a deacon in 1844 by Bishop Paine, and in 1846 Bishop Soule ordained him elder. His fields of labor in the Tennessee Conference were Wayne, Dover, Cypress, Centerville, Dickson, Montgomery, and Trinity, Ala. In most of these charges he was successful, adding numbers to the Church, and building up her interests. He was an earnest, faithful man, and the people counted him an able minister of the New Testament. He impressed them that he was an embassador for Christ. In 1855 he was transferred to the Louisville Conference, with which he was connected until his death. The odor of a good name still survives on Eddyville and Empire Circuits, the Smithland District, and other fields of labor which he so faithfully served. He never located, and when failing health and strength made him supernumerary, and then superannuated, he still retained a lively interest in the glorious work, and listened eagerly to the song of the reapers, and rejoiced to see them bringing in the sheaves. His last illness was congestion, with which he suffered much; but the grace of God was suffi-He endured affliction with patience, cient. and calmly resigned himself to the will of God. His end was peace. A little while before he died his faithful wife asked him how he felt in regard to the future. He answered, "My trust is in God; I'm not afraid to die." At one time he said, "If I miss heaven, I shall be the most disappointed man that ever lived." He leaves a widow and three children to lament

R. W. STONE was born, in White county, Tenn, in the year 1846. He professed relig-ion and joined the Baptist Church in 1869. During the same year he joined the M. E. Church, South, under the ministry of the Rev. W. F. Harwell, and was soon after licensed to preach, and recommended to be admitted into the traveling connection by the Quarterly Conference of the New Roe Circuit. He was admitted during the session of the Louisville Conference at Owensboro, in 1869, and appointed to the Wayne Circuit, where he labored faithfully and successfully. In 1870 he was appointed to the Marion Circuit, where he did a good work. In 1871 he was appointed to the Oakland Circuit, where he succeeded well for a part of the year, when he was attacked with a hemorrhage of the lungs, and was constrained to desist. His health seeming to be greatly improved, he was appointed, in 1872, to the Litchfield Circuit. He entered upon his work with his accustomed zeal and energy, and the prospect seemed to be bright for a year of great success, but in a few months he was again stricken down. His work was done. He was able, with his family, to reach the residence of his father-in-law, Mr. W. O. Snow, of Allen county, Ky., where he lingered for some weeks, suffering much, but bearing his affliction with the utmost Christian resignation. He died in great peace and triumph, Feb. 24, 1873. Brother Stone was a young man of more than ordinary mental endowments, and pretty well educated. He was a devoted student, and entirely consecrated to God, and to the work of the ministry, to which, doubtless, he was called. He had studied medicine, and had attended one course of lectures, but fully believing that God had called him to labor in another sphere, he abandoned his cherished profession, and was obedient to the heavenly calling.

Andrew Peace was a native of Kentucky, and commenced his labors as an itinerant Methodist preacher in the Kentucky Conference about the year 1828; two or three years thereafter he was transferred to the Missouri Conference. In this Conference, or rather that portion of it now embraced in the St. Louis Conference, he spent the remainder of his life, and, with the exception of a few years during which he was local, was one of our most laborious and useful circuit-preachers-much esteemed and loved by those who knew him best. His early educational advantages were poor; but this deficiency was to a great extent over-come by his deep piety and the zeal and fervor of his soul, which were so conspicuous in his public ministrations-especially in his exhortations and prayers. Scores, if not hundreds, of redeemed souls will, we believe, rise up in the great day and call him blessed, as the instrumental cause of their awakening and conversion. He was taken sick, or rather had a relapse of fever, during the sitting of our last Conference at Arcadia, and died a few days after its adjournment, at his boarding-place, exclaiming, "Blessed Jesus! Blessed Jesus! All my hope of heaven is through the blood of the cross." Thus died our brother—full of years, full of fruitful labors, and full of the "hope of the gospel." It is not amiss to state here that his second wife, daughter of the Rev. John McFarland, one of the pioneer Methodist preachers of Missouri, was by his bedside, ministering to him in his last sickness, and, being stricken down herself by the same malady, followed her husband, in a very few days, to the land of rest.

WILLIAM ALEXANDER, precious in the memory of all who knew him, was a faithful preacher

of the gospel of Christ, and a "workman that needed not to be ashamed." He served the Church as a traveling preacher in the St. Louis Conference from 1852 until Dec. 15, 1872, when he died in peace, in the bosom of his family, on the Jackson Circuit, to which he had been appointed, at the preceding Conference, for the third time. Always hopeful, always trusting, he never seemed to waver for a moment in his strong conviction that all the precious promises of God to his people would be fulfilled. He was a man of good preaching abilities, and the unction which accompanied his ministrations imparted to them peculiar sweetness. He was a man of much prayer. The pathway that leads to heaven seems plainer and more practicable as we see it marked by the footprints of such men as William Alexander. May we emulate his many excellent traits of Christian and ministerial character, and present as good a record when the Master shall call us home! Brother Alexander has left behind a most estimable wife and five children, to whom we owe a debt of sympathy and the tenderest regard.

WILLIAM ASBURY MAYHEW was born, in Darksville, Va., April 28, 1822. In his youth he was brought to the saving knowledge of Christ, and united with the Church he loved so well and served so faithfully, at Williamsport, Md., Jan., 1842. Possessing rare business qualifications, he sought the West, that he might amass wealth and secure the honors of this world. He settled in St. Charles county, and first engaged in teaching, but afterward turned his attention to mercantile pursuits, for which avocation he had been specially educated; but God had other work for his servant, and, obedient to the heavenly call, he left all to follow Christ. Having been duly recommended, he was admitted on trial into the Missouri Conference, at Hannibal, Mo., Sept., 1846. He was ordained deacon by Bishop Andrew, at Weston, in 1848, and was ordained to the office of elder by Bishop Capers, at Fayette, in 1850. From his entrance upon the itinerant work until the close of his life he was always effective, and served in every position in the Conference-work with usefulness and fidelity. As a companion he was very agreeable, being well informed upon general subjects, and especially so upon the history and doctrines of the Church. As a preacher he was eminently evangelical; the staple of his sermons was Christ crucified, and the experiences of the heart in receiving, following, and glorifying his illustrious Lord. It was in the office of Presiding Elder that our brother excelled; for this delicate and responsible place he had peculiar fitness, and he magnified the office. Always prompt, methodical, and painstaking, no interest of the Church suffered in his hands; the entire business was attended to, and, by wise and judicious measures, he set forth the cause in every charge. The young pastor was instructed and encouraged, the Church was rallied to his support, and his quarterly visitations were anticipated with pleasure. The latter years of his ministry were perhaps the most successful of his whole career. There was an unction and a tenderness about his preaching that told more plainly than articulate language could have done that he was in earnest. The last appointment that our brother received was to Palmyra Station; and never did he enter upon his work with more spiritual zeal, nor did he ever more auspiciously open his mission among any peo-While in the discharge of duty he contracted a cold, which immediately fixed itself upon his lungs, and for a week he suffered severely with pneumonia. All that the best medical skill and the most patient and tender nursing could do proved unavailing. The pathetic prayers offered from day to day by loving, sorrowing hearts were doubtless heard,

and although not answered in the restoration of the sufferer, they were answered in his abundant entrance upon the higher service about the throne. It seemed that our friend's work was done. On the morning of Nov. 29, at half-past four o'clock, he breathed his last. Spiritually, he was fully prepared to go; and we entertain the most assured hope of his safety and bliss. When told by his physician that he must die, he said to Brother Thomas E. Thompson, who has since gone to join him, "My brother, it is a hard thing to die—to leave our loved ones, and give up the work of the Church; yet, what the Lord does is right-I submit to his will. I had hoped to do much good at Palmyra, but my time is short—I must leave you in God's hands. I wanted to make some arrangements for my family-it is too late now; this grieves me, but all is right—the Lord's will be done. Saved by grace! Saved by grace! Thanks be to God for his unspeakable gift." Our ripest and most experienced men are being removed from the walls of Zion; but they "rest from their labors, and their works do follow them."

John W. Duskey, a probationer in this Conference, was born, in Kentucky, March 3, 1819; was converted, and joined the M. E. Church, South, in Sullivan county, Mo., Feb. 20, 1845; was ordained local deacon by Bishop Kavanaugh, Sept. 13, 1868, at the Conference held in Weston; was admitted on trial, at Columbia, Sept. 19, 1870, and received his first appointment to Bethany Mission. At the next Conference he was appointed to Stewartsville, and at our last Conference was returned to the same field. The past year was one of great suffering to this earnest man of God, but he labored in much pain until he was compelled to desist. After having faithfully served his generation, by the will of God he "fell on sleep" Jan. 26, 1873. Religion comforted him in life and refreshed him in death.

From that date to the time of his death he was successfully engaged in the grand enterprise of "spreading scriptural holiness through these lands." He has doubtless been the means of much good to the Cherokee people. As a minister of the gospel, he was esteemed by all; as a citizen, he enjoyed their confidence, having previously held various offices in the Nation, and being District Judge at the time of his death.

WILLIAM ALEXANDER MCKENDREE COBB was the son of the Rev. Jesse B. Cobb, formerly of La Grange, Tenn. Brother Cobb was born Sept. 2, 1817, in Granville county, N. C., where he lived with his parents to about his sixteenth year; his father then removed to La Grange, Tenn., where he settled, and lived until his death, some years past. Brother Cobb was baptized in infancy by Bishop Mc-Kendree, and became religious at an early age; after which he was very studious, and acquired knowledge rapidly. His early advantages were not very good. From the best information, he was licensed to preach about the autumn of 1838. In 1839 he traveled a circuit in the Tennessee Conference-perhaps near La Grange. In the autumn of 1839 he was transferred to the Arkansas Conference, and appointed to Fayetteville Circuit, where he made rapid proficiency in his studies, commencing a Greek and Latin course. In the autumn of 1840 he was ordained deacon, at Little Rock, by Bishop Waugh. He pursued his studies very closely, in both the literary and theological courses, and greatly advanced therein. In 1842 he was ordained elder, at Helena, by Bishop Andrew. In 1843 he traveled the Huntsville Circuit, and on May 16 was mar-ried to Miss Susan M. Brodie, of Washington county, Ark., a very reputable and worthy lady, who proved to be a helpmeet indeed; a lady every way worthy of a Methodist preacher -the life of the family circle, the governor of the household. Brother Cobb continued to labor in the Arkansas Conference with success up to the autumn of 1849, when he was transferred to the Indian Mission Conference, and stationed in the Creek Nation as preacher and teacher. He served the Cherokees as missionary in 1850-3. His health failed, and he retired from the regular work for the years 1854-7. He removed to Florida, but soon left that State, and settled at Trenton in 1858. In Jan., 1861, he undertook the presidency of a female school in Cross county, Ark., where he rendered important services till broken up by the war in 1864. In 1866 he reëntered the Conference and took regular work. In 1867-9 he labored very successfully on circuits, and in 1870-1 he served on the Harrisburg District. He was very popular and useful. In 1872 he was attacked with cancer, under the influence of which he suffered for near two years, bearing his affliction with great resignation. His good wife died May 14, 1870. For a time, it seemed, he could not be reconciled to his loss, greatly desiring to die with her; and after his attack he murmured not, as he appeared to think the messenger had come for him. He was prevailed upon by his friends to go to Memphis for treatment, in Oct., 1871, and he remained there fourteen months, subject to the attention of the best physicians of the city. During this period he gratefully enjoyed the hospitalities of Col. D. C. Cross, Dr. Mallory, Mr. Brewster, Mr. Kimble, and various others, who are entitled to our sincere acknowledg-ments for their kindness. His stay in the city was spent in reading, meditation, and prayer, with such other exercises as tended to ripen his spirit for reunion with his beloved wife and the friends who had preceded him. His whole time was thus employed. About the first of Dec., 1872, Brother Cobb found that he must soon die. He desired to die at home and be buried by his wife, at Mount Zion. In company with his son, L. B. Cobb, he set out for home, and traveled on the train to Forest City, where he spent a day. The Rev. J. J. Prather carried him in his buggy to the house of Brother Seth G. Yarbrough. Here he stopped for the night. He grew worse, and observed to Sister Yarbrough that it seemed he must die at her house-that he could not reach home; and so it proved. He lay there till Jan. 20, 1873, at 8 o'clock A.M., when he breathed his last. He was calm and bright to his latest breath. Sister Yarbrough, who was always ready at his call, was summoned to his bed. He asked if they thought him to be dying; his son Jesse answered him that he was. He asked to be raised up; he looked Sister Yarbrough in the face for a few minutes, and asked to be laid down-and his spirit departed. His mind was clear and composed. His remains were interred by the side of his wife, in Mount Zion Cemetery, Cross county, Ark., Jan. 22, 1873. A more successful preacher we have never lost.

JEFFERSON SHOOK was born, in Madison county, Mo., May 20, 1820. He was converted Oct. 15, 1838, and joined the M. E. Church Nov. 2, of the same year, in Arkansas. He was licensed to preach Sept. 18, 1841, and was admitted on trial in the Arkansas Conference the same year, and was appointed to the De Kalb Circuit, in the then Republic of Texas. In 1842 he was appointed to Mountain Mission. In 1843 he was ordained deacon, and appointed to Clarksville Circuit. In 1844 he was transferred to the Texas Conference, and appointed to the Paris Circuit. In 1845 the Conference was divided into two, and he fell into the East Texas Conference, and returned to the Paris Circuit. In Feb., 1846, he was ordained elder, and appointed to the Boston Circuit. In 1847 to Jefferson Circuit—in 1848-9 to Crockett Circuit-in 1850 to Liberty Circuit. The next four years he was Presiding Elder of the Woodville District, during which time his health failed, and for several years he sustained a supernumerary relation, after which he was appointed one year to the Rusk Station, and one to the Melrose Circuit. His health continuing bad, he was again placed on the supernumerary list, in which relation he continued until his death, which occurred Dec. 20, 1872, in the fifty-third year of his age. Brother Shook served this Conference as Secretary, as one of the Publishing Committee of the Texas Christian Advocate, as Treasurer of the Conference Missionary Society, and as our representative in the General Conference. In all these relations he proved a faithful servant of the Church. Brother Shook's capacities were above mediocrity, both as a preacher and writer. His pulpit-style was rather polemic in its nature. He investigated his subject closely, defended the doctrines of his Church sternly, and clung to what he believed with tenacity. As a writer, he rather excelled, wielding a vigorous pen in vindication of truth, and in the expulsion of error. Brother Shook fell away from home and loved ones, but was well cared for in his last illness, and died in great peace.

Acton Young was born in Kentucky, came to Texas in 1841, embraced religion in Sabine county in 1845, and joined the M. E. Church, South, the same year. He was licensed to exhort in 1847, and to preach in 1849, and was received on trial in the East Texas Conference in 1850. For want of information we cannot give in detail the various fields of labor to which he was assigned; but with pleasure we can state that he filled, with faithfulness and acceptability, numerous circuits within our bounds, after which he was made Presiding Elder of the Woodville District, in which capacity he served for four years with accepta-bility and great usefulness to the Church. During this time his throat became diseased, and he was compelled to request a supernumerary relation, in which relation he continued, serving the Church to the best of his ability, to the end of his life. Brother Young, in his last illness, when approaching the hour of his demise, speaking of his preparation, said: "All is right. Tell my brethren I love them—counsel my children to meet me in heaven." He fell asleep in Jesus at his residence in Woodville, Tyler county, Texas, in 1873. Brother Young was a sweet-spirited man: he loved God and the Church, and always exhibited great attachment and tenderness to his brethren. His house was emphatically the itinerant's home. As a preacher, he delivered his message with great force and telling effect upon his audience. He was no ordinary man. He will long be remembered by the members of this body and the people whom he served.

LEVI R. DENNIS.—As we are not in possession of the data in reference to his early history, we can only speak of him advisedly from the time of his transfer from the Tennessee Conference to this, in 1855. He was appointed to the Jefferson Station the first two years, after which he served in the various relations of circuit and station preacher, and Presiding Elder, up to the day of his death, which occurred at his residence in Tyler, on Sunday morning, April 26, 1873, sword in hand and armor on. Brother Dennis was lovely in his disposition, ardent in his attachments, and untiring in his kindness to his family and friends. He stood high among us as a preacher, and was a leading member of this Conference. He was an able expounder of the doctrines of the Church, well versed in the Scriptures, and understood well our standard authors. As an elder, he was an able administrator of the ordinances and discipline of the Church; flinching from no responsibility, prompt in every department of duty. He died triumphantly, and rests from his labors.

NAPOLEON W. BURKS was born, in Greensboro, Green county, Ky., Oct. 8, 1809, and embraced religion in Sabine county, Texas, July 4, 1843. He was licensed to preach in 1844; joined the East Texas Conference in 1845; was appointed to the Shelby Circuit his first year, and to the Marshall Circuit the

second. In 1847 he was ordained deacon by Bishop Paine, and reappointed to the Marshall Circuit. In 1848 he was sent to the Clarksville Circuit. In 1849 he was ordained elder by Bishop Andrew, and continued to fill the various appointments to which he was assigned as circuit and station preacher, Presiding Elder, and President of Fowler Institute, until 1871, when he asked and obtained a superannuated relation. He also represented us in the General Conference. In all of these relations he proved a faithful and successful servant of the Church. In a letter to Brother J. C. Woolam, dated Aug. 29, 1873, he says: 44 I am still in bad health, and am patiently waiting the coming of the Master. All is clear as a sunbeam in that direction. I do not fear it in the least, but rather look forward to that event with sweet and bright anticipations." Brother Morse he said, just before his death: "Tell my brethren of the East Texas Conference that there is not a cloud between me and my Saviour. All is well! Tell them I love them-to be faithful and meet me in heaven." He sweetly fell asleep in Jesus, at his residence, in Henderson, Rusk county, Texas, Oct. 15, 1873. Brother Burks was a man of fair literary attainments, and an excellent preacher; and his ministry was abundantly blessed in the awakening of sinners and the conversion of

THOMAS J. HUTSON was born, in Scott county, Miss., about the year 1837, and died, at Port Sullivan, Texas, Oct. 28, 1873. Brother Hutson was the son of a Baptist minister, and was brought up in the faith of the Baptist Church. He professed saving faith in Christ, at Shiloh Camp-ground, and united himself with the M. E. Church, South, in 1856. In his conversion his religious opinions were changed, and he could not be a Baptist without sacrificing his views of the atonement. After joining the Church he was appointed class-leader, and in that relation he served the Church faithfully for two years, at the close of which time he obtained license to exhort, and in 1861 he was licensed to preach. He was admitted on trial into the Mississippi Conference in 1867. His first appointment was Hillsboro Circuit. In 1869 he traveled the Trenton Circuit, and was transferred the same year, as a probationer, to the North-west Texas Conference. In 1870 he traveled the Hillsboro Circuit, 1871 Richland, 1872 Mount Calm and East Waco Mission, 1873 Cameron and Port Sullivan Circuit, on which he finished his work. The literary advantages of Brother Hutson were very limited, but he labored faithfully to do acceptable work in the sight of God. He gloried in nothing save the cross, and was always willing to make every necessary sacrifice for the salvation of sinners. Many souls were converted under his ministry in Mississippi and Texas. He was a good pastor, and but few excelled him as a disciplinarian. He was ready to give an exact account of his work at every Quarterly Conference. He was zealous, had strong faith, and possessed every evidence of his acceptance with God. His sickness was of short duration; he was attacked with black jaundice, which baffled the skill of the physician, and terminated his useful life. He bore his affliction with much patience, feeling assured that it was all right, and that he would soon realize an "eternal weight of glory."

THOMAS KNIGHT HOWELL was born, in Pope county, Ark., Sept. 17, 1843, and died, in Copperopolis, Cal., Dec. 3, 1872—passing away in the prime of his manhood and in the morning of his usefulness; unbuckling and laying aside his armor while still eager for the fight. In early life he evinced the most ardent desire to be a Christian, and to hold actual communion with God in prayer. Laying aside a formula that he could not understand for a simple petition that expressed the desire of his heart, he prayed fervently, "O Lord, make me a good boy; help me to obey my mother; and when I get to be a man make me a good Christian." God heard and answered this petition at its first offering. When about sixteen years of age he became deeply concerned about his soul's salvation, and night and day he wrestled with God for the evidence of his acceptance with him; and, while raking hay in his father's field, God did let in the sunlight of his smile, and thrilled him with the consciousness of pardon. With this blessing came the call to work for Jesus. At once he began to cast about in his mind as to how he could best fulfill the will of God. To fit himself for the work he felt that he must first secure an education. entered Pacific Methodist College, and, after encompassing all the course prescribed in that institution, graduated in the year 1867. He was soon called to a chair in the Visalia Seminary, which he filled, to the entire satisfaction of all concerned, for the space of three years. In the autumn of 1870 he was admitted on trial into the Pacific Annual Conference, and sent to Visalia Station, where he labored with great acceptability among the people with whom he had lived the three previous years. In 1871 he was sent to Vacaville Circuit, winning all hearts by his zeal for his Master and by his diligent labor to build up his cause and kingdom. Here he had spent his college-life, and so uniform and consistent had been that life that it only opened his way for usefulness among the people. At our last Conference he was appointed to Petaluma Station. The first

Sabbath after Conference he spent in his new charge, preaching with great acceptability. He then returned to Vacaville to wind up his affairs in that circuit, and went to Copperopolis to visit his parents, when he was stricken down by sickness. The attending physician pronounced the disease intermittent congestive fever, accompanied with hemorrhage of the lungs. All were anxious and alarmed except himself; like a true soldier, he was "tranquil amid alarms," and calmly arranged all his worldly affairs, and quietly awaited the approach of the destroyer. He said, "My trust is in God; I have trusted him in life—I will trust him in death; the Lord is able to give life to the dead." And again, "I have to do all the Lord wills. I only wish to live to work for him." During his entire sickness, whether delirious or in the possession of all his faculties, he talked of nothing but the Church and its interests. The zeal of God's house had consumed him. As his end approached there was such a hallowed influence in the room where he lay that all who entered felt it. Just before he breathed his last he exclaimed, in the rapture of the moment, "Jesus, precious Jesus! My race is almost run. I have followed Jesus faithfully. I shall soon be in heaven. God bless you all!" Listening, his dying ear caught the sound of heavenly choristers, and he cried, "Do you hear the singing of that band of angels?" About an hour before the departure of his happy spirit he raised his feeble voice and sang two stanzas of the hymn, "There is a fountain filled with blood." Then, clasping the imaginary hand of a brother minister, he stepped into the heavenly chariot and left us for glory.

ASBURY PARKS BLACK was born, in Cherokee county, Ga., Nov. 8, 1842, and died, in Tuolumne county, Cal., March 3, 1873. His was another example of early piety. He joined the Church at the age of nine, but was not converted until in his thirteenth year. He was a sweet-spirited child, always obedient to his parents, and by a most affectionate disposition endearing himself to all. The foundation of his religious character was laid deep and strong. He was engaged in teaching when the late war between the States occurred. He was then but nineteen years of age. Promptly closing his school, he enlisted as a soldier; and, although so young, his virtues were so much appreciated that he was placed in various positions of trust and responsibility. But amid all the excitement, turmoil, and temptation of that awful period he never forgot that he was a soldier of Jesus Christ, nor that his first allegiance was to him. His Bible was his constant companion, and night and morning, in his tent, he read its sacred words of comfort and consolation. In the year 1866 he was li-censed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of Calhoun Circuit, North Georgia Conference. Here he labored as a local preacher for several years; and the high esteem in which he was held is indicated in the fact that when the news

of his death reached his old home a special funeral-service was held in memory of him. In 1869 he came to California, and located in the bounds of the Millerton Circuit. The following year he was recommended to the Pacific Annual Conference by this circuit, and admitted on trial by that body at the same time with Brother Howell. He first labored on the Stockton Circuit. Though in feeble health, he worked with great zeal and faithfulness, leaving the impression upon both saint and sinner that he was a good man—one man (a foreigner) remarking, "I think he is the best man I ever saw; if all preachers were as pious, earnest, and faithful as he is, they would convert the world." In 1871 he was sent to the Sonora Circuit. Here he soon won all hearts, working diligently and prayerfully for his Master. His labors at the close of the year culminated in a glorious revival of religion. Although the people of the Sonora Circuit felt that his health was hopelessly gone, yet they desired his return to them the next year; accordingly, he was sent again to that work. He preached but five sermons after Conference, when he turned his steps to the little parsonage that an affectionate people had fitted up for him, to await the end. For two long months, or more, he had to wait and suffer the will of his divine Master. During this period of waiting he talked to all who came to see him, impressing them with the fact that it was good to trust the Saviour and be resigned to his will. On one occasion, seeing his wife weeping, he raised his feeble voice and sung, "Weep not for me when I am gone." When the final hour came, he called his wife and children to his bedside, pronounced a blessing upon them, and, with the expression "Blessed Jesus!" upon his lips, calmly entered the presence of angels and of God. -

GRANDISON CURTIS was born, in Ohio, July 22, 1818; died near La Grande, Union county, Oregon, Jan. 21, 1873. In early life he made a profession of religion and joined the Baptist Church. In 1850 he came to the Pacific Coast, and, like too many others, in his search for gold he lost his religion. In 1862, under the ministry of the Rev. R. C. Martin, he was reclaimed, and joined the M. E. Church, South. As soon as his probation expired he was licensed to preach. In 1869 he was employed under the Presiding Elder of the Uma-tilla District to travel the Grande Ronde Cir-cuit; 1870 he traveled the Powder River Cir-cuit. He was admitted on trial in the Columbia Conference in Sept., 1871, and ordained deacon by Bishop Keener. He was appointed to the Grande Ronde Circuit. In Aug., 1872, he was appointed to the Boise and Powder River Circuit. He was detained from his work by severe sickness; after partially recovering he started to his work in December, was overtaken by a severe snow-storm, took cold and died of typhoid pneumonia. Brother Curtis was a man of deep and consistent piety. As a preacher, he was noted for his great earnestness and devotion to his calling. His death was triumphant.

# MEMOIR OF BISHOP EARLY.

[BISHOF EARLY died Nov. 5, 1873. We were going to prepare a memoir of the late venerable Bishop for the General Minutes, but we have been favored with the following excellent tribute to his memory by the Virginia Conference, of which he was so long an honored member, and we cannot do better than adopt it as the memoir.]

JOHN EARLY was born, in Bedford county, Va., Jan. 1, 1786, and died, in the city of Lynchburg, Va., on the morning of Nov. 5, 1873, aged eighty-seven years, ten months, and four days. He was converted April 22, 1804, under the ministry of the Rev. Stith Mead. His parents were Baptists, but he united with the Methodists, and gave early promise of his devotion to the Master's cause. "In 1806 he was licensed to preach. Among those who re-ceived the benefit of his first labors were the slaves of President Jefferson. He began his ministry by preaching the gospel to the poor, and doing the duty that lay next to him." After a few rounds on the Bedford Circuit, under the direction of the Presiding Elder, he was recommended for the work of the itinerant ministry, and admitted on trial into the Virginia Conference, Feb., 1807. The Conference embraced at that time a large portion of the State of North Carolina, and its session was held in Newbern. Then and there, with six-teen other young men, John Early was enrolled as a Methodist itinerant preacher. In 1809 he was admitted into full connection with the Conference and ordained deacon; after two years farther probation he was ordained elder. His appointments were: 1807, Cumberland Circuit, Richmond District, Archibald Alexander, John Early; 1808, Camden Circuit, Norfolk District, Benjamin Devany, John Early; 1809, Tar River Circuit, Newbern District: 1810, Caswell Circuit, Relaigh District: trict; 1810, Caswell Circuit, Raleigh District; 1811-12, Greensville Circuit, Meherrin District. In each of the last four appointments there were also two preachers, but John Early's name stands first, showing that from the date of his deaconate he was put in charge of work. Bishop Asbury and Bishop McKendree per-ceived his administrative ability, and in 1813-14 he appears on the minutes as Presiding Elder of the Meherrin District, reaching from Richmond to Lynchburg. In 1815 he located—a step not uncommon in that day, whenever the care of a family came upon the preacher, and one necessitated by the inadequate support furnished by the Church. In 1821, however, he reappears as Presiding Elder of his old District, and continued such for three years. In this field of labor his zeal flamed out afresh,

and was crowned with abundant fruits. Great and gracious revivals succeeded each other on the various circuits, and hundreds of souls were converted. He describes it as "a time of unction generally." He was "like a general with his eye on the whole field, and pushing the battle all along the line." He not only wrought himself but he energized at her work. wrought himself, but he energized other workers. He formed five branches of the Missionary Society, and projected four others, thus kindling the missionary spirit throughout his District. As a revelation of his own interest in and appreciation of the missionary work, we quote the following from his own language of that period: "Cold is the heart that takes no interest in the missionary cause, especially if it be found among the prophets. Let my right hand forget its cunning if I forget thee, O Jerusalem! Let my tongue cleave to the roof of my mouth if I prefer not Jerusalem above my chief joy." These words from his own pen reveal his spirit, and furnish the clew to his after zeal and wonderful success in the work of the ministry. On the Greensville Circuit he received five hundred members into the Church, and at the ever-memorable camp-meeting held at Prospect, in Prince Edward county, Va., it is said one thousand persons were converted. Weems, in his "Life of Washington," and who was present at the campmeeting, makes special mention of its extraor-dinary power. From 1824 to 1826, inclusive, he was Conference Missionary; in 1827 one of three preachers on Bedford Circuit, and in 1828 he was left without appointment, at his own request. From 1829 to 1832 he was again at work as Presiding Elder. From 1833 to 1840, inclusive, he was agent for Randolph Macon College. He was one of a committee, in 1825, who drew up a report on education, out of which the college grew. He was for many years the president of its board of trustees. From 1841 to 1846 he again appears as Presiding Elder on the Lynchburg and Petersburg Districts. This brought him down to the first General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, held in Petersburg in 1846. In 1812, six years after his entrance into this Conference, he was sent as one of eleven delegates to the first delegated General Conference,

which convened in the city of New York. He was a member of the General Conferences of 1828-32-36-40-44. To his practical wisdom we owe what has been aptly termed "those time-saving and convenient institutions"—standing committees. The first General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, which convened in Petersburg in 1846, resolved to enterprise a Book Agency. The Northern Book Concern not having paid us our share, we were without money to start it. The demands of the Church for our publications, however, required the enterprise, and its inauguration required a man of superior tact, judgment, and capacity. Attention was at once directed to the Rev. John Early as the man needed, and he was accordingly elected. He opened his office in Richmond, and carried on the work successfully until 1854, when the Publishing House was established in Nashville. From this agency he passed into the episcopacy. At the General Conference which met in Columbus, Ga., in 1854, he was elected Bishop. For twelve years, from 1854 to 1866, he was actively engaged in the onerous duties of his episcopal office. At the General Conference of 1866, held in New Orleans, along with Bishops Soule and Andrew, he was voted a superannuated relation. It will thus be seen that he stood firmly at the post of active duty up to his eightieth year; nor did he then cease to work: as long as strength and opportunity afforded he went in and out among the churches, preaching the word and urging onward the hosts of our Israel. In 1866 he was severely hurt in a railroad accident, and for awhile it was feared he would die. The vigor of his constitution, however, triumphed, but left him greatly disabled. From that time onward to his death his physical forces gradually failed, and his public ministrations became less frequent. The opinion has often been expressed that but for the shock which his nervous system sustained by that accident he would probably have reached his one-hundredth year. His tenacity of purpose and resoluteness of will often sustained him when other signs prophesied imminent death. The weight of years and the repeated shocks of an old malady at last wore him down, and on the morning of Nov. 5, 1873, at a quarter to nine o'clock, he sweetly and calmly "fell on sleep," and passed away to the rewards of a well-spent life. For twelve months, or more, before his death he was unable to attend upon any of the public services of the Church; but through all his long confinement, and amid all its alternations of suffering and repose, he manifested wonderful cheerfulness, patience, and resignation. The secret of these was found in his abiding, unshaken faith in God. He never seemed for a moment to question either the wisdom or goodness of God in his dealings with him. As to death, he regarded his life-work as a preparation for it, and betrayed no fear of its approach. When he spoke of it it was with a calm composure, and when he looked beyond it it was often with the joyful anticipations of

assured victory and glorious greetings of the loved ones who had preceded him. were several things which came out with such pleasing emphasis during the last years of his life, and down to the last week thereof, that they deserve mention in this paper. 1. We notice the readiness and zest which he always entered into any act of religious worship. The visits of Christian friends, and especially his brethren in the ministry, the singing of the songs of Zion, and prayer around his family-altar or at his bedside, never failed to arouse the deeper responses of his soul. 2. The frequency and fervor with which he spoke of his being at peace with his Maker and all men were often touching, and especially to those who knew of the many trying and stormy periods of his active life. His noted strength of opinions and independent boldness in their expression had often led men to misconstrue his motives, misinterpret his spirit, and form harsh judgments concerning him, and therein to antagonize him in both feeling and action; but over all these asperities, engendered by such conflict of judgments, his soul had triumphed, and its holy impulses had gathered in peaccful benediction upon all men. Another feature marking him was his fatherly spirit toward his younger brethren in the ministry; for them his tenderness seemed to deepen as his days grew apace, and his respectful and even deferential manner toward them gave a mellowing charm to his intercourse with them. Then, too, there was conspicuous to the last his deep interest in the general prosperity of the Church. Truly, his soul loved our Zion. the opening up of our mission fields, and especially that in Mexico; in the growing prosperity of our educational interests, and especially that of Randolph Macon College; in the success of the ministry, in the signs of a growing spirit of unity between the different Protestant Churches, and in the welfare of the young-of all these he was wont to speak often, and in such terms as showed the fires of a holy zeal still burning upon the altar of his heart; and they burned there to the last. Of him it may be truly said, "He had fought a good fight, and kept the faith." The result was, his end was peace. Quietly, from the bosom of his family and from the home which had sheltered him for fifty years, he passed away to his heavenly home. His death produced a profound impression upon the community of Lynchburg. There, where he had been so long and so well known, his character had made a deep impression. Presidents of the United States, Governors of his own beloved State, politicians and citizens, had time and again invoked his superior practical wisdom for the management of important civil trusts; but he yielded to none, save in an incidental way. Not that he was wanting in devotion to the material as well as spiritual prosperity of his beloved State, but it is a significant fact, and one which serves to illustrate his remarkable character, that, while he responded to some of theso calls, he never allowed them to interfere with

his ministerial duties; nor did his participation in any public State interests compromise his standing and influence as a Christian minister. The natural result was, respect had blended with esteem until it ripened into veneration for him. To strength of opinion and fearless-ness in its expression he had so uniformly added evidence of integrity and high-mindedness as a Christian that all classes, however different in their opinions, had learned to cherish him as a man, as a patriot, as a Christian, and as a faithful minister of the gospel of Christ. When he died, therefore, public sentiment testified that a great and good man had fallen. His funeral-obsequies furnished another evidence of the high esteem in which he was held. The closing of business-houses and the post-office, the adjournment of the circuit court, then in session, by its judge, the public and private expressions of grief, the large concourse at his funeral, all bespoke the public sense of loss occasioned by his death. In other cities and places such action was taken by our ministers and people as shows that our one sentiment as a Church is, "A great man and a prince has fallen in our Israel." His name had long

been a household word through our borders. He was one of the great historic characters of American Methodism, and especially of Southern Methodism. With this Conference he had been identified in labors and love for sixty-six years. But two of our members survive who entered the Conference before him, and none who were so long engaged in the active work of the ministry. We therefore feel ourselves bereaved of an honored leader and a conspicuous landmark; but our rejoicing is this: that he was not only spared to us so long, but that the grace of God abounded toward his aged servant, and, through a long and most eventful life, enabled him to work a mighty work. Thousands were brought to Christ through his ministry; and his flaming zeal, his unshaken devotion, and his peaceful end, are the beaconlights to guide us, and the heritage of our memories, over which we are given to rejoice, and through which, though dead, he yet speaketh. Of him we may well say:

Servant of God, well done!
Rest from thy loved employ;
The battle fought, the vict'ry won,
Enter thy Master's joy.
