Cerritos Avenue Property Owners Refuse to Stand For Any Assessments

COLLOWING a discussion before the City Council last night, lasting more than an hour, there is every indication that the new Southern Pacific Company depot will NOT be located opposite the end of Cerritos avenue, if that avenue be opened.

Further, there is every indication that the depot, which is to cost about \$87,000, will be located at Eulalia street, almost where the present station serves the traveling public. Property owners on Cerritos were present last night to protest to the council against being assessed for the proposed street opening. After the lengthy dis-cussion, Mayor Spencer Robinson called for a vote of the audience, and it was agreed that the Southern Pacific Company might erect the depot at the foot of Cerritos, provided the cost of the street opening was not assessed against the property owners. Also, it was agreed that the Southern Pacific might put the structure at Eulalia, where there is already an approach. It was agreed the council should so inform the rail-

Passed to Railroad

Briefly, the property owners took the view that the railroad should meet the expense of any improvements; that the depot would not increase valuations in the immediate vicinity; that the move to locate the depot at Cerritos is backed by some hope for personal profit; that the city has no legal right to assist in meeting the cost of the proposed street opening; that any attempt to form an assessment district will be met with a court action and so delay the depot's construc-

tion for many months.





All of which, it was stated at the city hall today, means that the depot will be erected where the company originally intended to put it, in the vicinity of Eulalia





## AIRPORT CAUSES

Planes Make It Impossible to Raise Peaches, Says Owner of Ranch

W. H. Thompson filed a com-munication with the City Council of Glendale last night in which he protected against the establishment of an airport in a certain portion of the Scott tract, in the northwestern section of the city. His communication was ordered filed, the council taking the view that the matter complained of was a question for the courts to settle. Mr. Thompson wrote:

"I wrote you a letter on March 26, 1923, protesting against the establishing of an airport by the city of Glendale on Lots 4, 5 and 6, Rancho Providencia and Scott tract. Since then, as you know, this port has been conducted by private parties.

"This port has been conducted in a manner which, if continued, will ruin the value of my property, and it is now a menace to

ife.
"The planes when rising make so much dust that it would make it impossible for me to raise

Break Trees, Claim
"Also, the field is so small, that the planes constantly fly over my property at a height of eight or

ten feet from the ground, and have already hit some of my peach trees and broken them.
"This state of affairs, as I have said, is a menace to the life of everyone who is working in my

field, and is covered in most progressive cities, where the question has come up, by an ordinance fixing the height below which a plane may fly. "I suggest, therefore, that you pass an ordinance to the effect

that no plane shall fly over the city of Glendale at a height of less than 150 feet, except where rising or lighting upon a field provided for that purpose.

"I suggest that you pass another ordinance providing that no

plane shall start at a distance of less than 400 feet from adjoining property lines, on account of their throwing dust, gravel and any other material that happens to be on the ground, thus ruining ad-joining property and being detri-"W. H. THOMPSON.

The final check on election returns, as given out by B. B. Martsolf, clerk of the Eagle Rock district, show that 974 of the total 3000 registered voters expressed themselves at the poles, Tuesday,

This sprinkling of voters in the main reflected the sentiment of Los Angeles, favoring the Board of Education and City Council voted in by the larger municipality and polling majorities in favor of all bond issues, including the \$35,000,000 power bonds and plans for a Pershing Square subway and north end Administration

Councilman Wheeler ran heavier in Eagle Rock than elsewhere. polling 506 votes; while the power bonds, turned down emphatically by Los Angeles, received their sanction here by a margin of thirty-seven votes.


