CITY AND STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

Mrs. Anais Denis de Lagarde, wid- ow of Major Richard J. Evans, died Tuesday following an illness of three days. The funeral will follow a re- quiem mass at St. Louis Cathedral at 2 o'clock Wednesday morning. Very Reverend Father Racine, pastor of the cathedral, will officiate. Mrs. Evans was a native of New Orleans and comes of an old Louisiana fam- ily. She was the daughter of Althe- naise Demilly and John Baptiste Lagarde.

There is positively no authority for a general reopening of any class of cases arising out of the selective draft, and no case should be re- opened except upon proper applica- tion, duly made, according to in- structions Tuesday from Projost- Marshal General Crowder to Adju- tant General McGroarty. This would indicate, thinks General McGroarty, that after all the provost marshal general did not intend that all mar- tial men should be released from military service.

Commissioner Glenn had a call Tuesday from General Manager Brown of the New Orleans Railway and Light Company, who told the commissioner the public need not become impatient over the promise of the railway company to put Maz-

da lamps in the street cars, as it was being done as fast as circumstances permit. Mr. Brown said that a num- ber of cars on the St. Charles and Tulane boulevards and Prytanis lines have already been equipped with Mazdas, and as fast as a car can be run into the barn for repairs it comes out equipped with the new lamps.

Commissioner Lafaye stated at the meeting of the council Tuesday that if property holders in streets upon which bids for paving are now being advertised desire to have all bids rejected on account of high prices that the city will welcome such an action. Property holders have until November 9 to choose the kind of pavement desired.

Mr. Lafaye made this statement in connection with a petition pro- testing against paving. There were three petitions of property holders filed with the council Tuesday pro- testing against any bids being ac- cepted for paving at this time, owing to the high cost.

A strike of all the old field work- ers, the roughnecks, as they are known, affecting 1500 men in the Shreveport district and 3900 in Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas is scheduled for November 1, unless the oil companies, big and little, recognize the Oil Field Workers' Union, according to reports circu- lated in Shreveport Tuesday.

Invoking act 139 of 1916, Assis- tant District Attorney Stanley Tues- day morning filed an information in the Juvenile Court against Osie Cooper, 1421 Fern street, the father of Irwin Cooper, the 13-year-old boy who ran down and fatally injured Morris Weisz on Saturday. In the information against Mr. Cooper it is charged that had not the accused permitted his son to operate the car the accident probably would have been avoided.

Judge Foster of the United States District Court Tuesday issued final decree in the case of Mrs. Louise Stone Bost vs Mrs. Camilla Putnam Parkerson, testamentary executrix of the estate of William S. Parkerson. The decree was entered in favor of complainant for the sum of \$9,963.49.

The New Orleans Americanization Movement Commission formally was launched Monday at a meeting of the Association of Commerce, when an organization was perfected and officers elected as follows: President, Justin F. Demehaud; first vice pres- ident, John P. Mayo; second vice president, Mrs. Herbert M. Moser; secretary-treasurer, E. P. Guemard.
