> Cazadero.-At the inquest over all that was found of the three members of the Kendall family, the theory was advanced that Yamagachi, the Japanese suspected of the triple murder, first shot his victims, then hacked the bod-ies to pieces with an ax and gave the flesh to the hogs.

> In no other way can the District Attorney account for its disappearance, as it could not have been burned up with the facilities the murderers had at their command. Never previous to the discovery of the disappearance were the 40 or more hogs allowed inside of the inclosure about the ranch house, for there the Kendalls had one of the finest gardens in the valley.

> When the ranch house was found deserted the hogs had been let into the garden and the gates closed behind them. They had devoured between July 23d, when the murder was com-mitted, and July 31st, when the disappearance was discovered, every vestige of the garden vegetables.
