### Judge Curtis D. Wilbur

#### The Most Probable Candidate for Judge of the Supreme Court

Judge Curtis D. Wilbur made good as a High School scholar, and was therefore tendered an appointment to the U. S. Naval Academy.

He made good there in his studies, graduating third in his class. He received the highest mark in his class for "activity aloft," aboard ship, the highest mark for practical work called "aptitude for service," was a member of the Naval Academy football team, and achieved a national athletic record.

One year as a teacher of mathematics in this city, and then for 16 months Judge Wilbur studied law at home, laying out his own course, and preparing for his examinations without assistance. A few weeks after entering a law office he was admitted by our Supreme Court to practice law (Oct. 13, 1890.)

He then came to Los Angeles, and without local friends, money of influence, commenced the hard task of building up a law practice.

After nine years of successful private practice, he was appointed Chief Deputy District Attorney. During the four years he advised the county, and cared for all its civil litigation the county only lost two suits, one of trifling importance.

The opinions written by Judge Wilbur while acting as Deputy District Attorney fill three printed volumes.

As Judge of the Superior Court Judge Wilbur has tried cases of every description, probate, civil, both law and equity, criminal and juvenile.



For six years he has had the juvenile court in addition to all other work. Here his work has attracted national attention. Judge Lindsey of Denver says of Judge Wilbur's work: "It is greatly appreciated and highly commended among juvenile court people all over the United States, who look upon your court in Los Angeles as one of the very best, and in obtaining results I do not know of any better, or if indeed they can approach you."

He was re-elected to his present position by the highest vote given to any man on the ticket, after receiving the highest vote before the County Convention, and before the Bar Association.

He is a candidate for the Supreme Court, and if nominated and elected, will no doubt make good there. He is peculiarly fitted for judicial work. He has no entangling alliances, owns no corporate stock and is neither director nor officer in any corporation except charitable ones. In these he is prominent, being a director in the following: Union Rescue Mission, Bethlehem Benevolent Board (for Bethlehem Institutional Church), Florence Crittenden Home, Young Men's Christian Association, Juvenile Improvement Association, President of the Shinkevin Young Men's Home Association and of the Southern California Seaman's Friend Society. An officer in the First Congregational Church, a trustee of the Hollenbeck Home trust, a teacher of a boys' Sunday School class. These activities indicate his spare time is spent for the betterment of his fellow men, and point to the verdict of the boy who explained to an other coming before the juvenile court, "He is all our friends"—or another, "If a boy don't make good with all the chances that Judge Wilbur gives him he ain't no good." It also indicates why he has taken so much interest in the plan of adult probation. More than two hundred men have made good under Judge Wilbur.—Los Angeles Citizen.

### Union Stops Work on Mr. Thomas' House

Work on the fine new home of R. K. Thomas which has been under construction for several months, has been delayed because of a misunderstanding about the painting. It was arranged and understood when the contract was let for the carpenter work that the painting would be done by Chas. Sutter, but recently the agent of the union at San Jose came out and interfered, with the result that the painting will be delayed until the carpenter work is out of the way.

### William C. Alberger for Surveyor General

The friends and comrades of Colonel Wm. C. Alberger ask you to vote for him for Surveyor General on the Republican ticket at the Primary Election. Is prominent Grand Army man, and in 1906 was Department Commander and directed the noble relief work of that order at the time of the San Francisco conflagration. His capable and sympathetic help in that crisis endeared him to many new friends.

Educated as a civil engineer, after the war he became chief engineer of the Great Southern Ry., then Superintendent of the Hannibal & St. Jo Ry., and in 1883 came to California. Here he has been engaged in many great engineering projects, chiefly in late years as consulting engineer to whom others bring their problems for expert help. In more than half the states he has been called in on great engineering works.

Col. Alberger has never held office, and comes into this campaign with no political "organization" to back him. His old comrades of the war and his friends have taken the opportunity afforded by the new primary law to put him before the people as a candidate worthy and deserving of the office of Surveyor General. He will bring to that office a thorough knowledge of the management of the land bureau of the State which he has acquired with his practical engineering experience and will, beside, conduct it as a brave, upstanding, clear minded man should.
