AGREEMENT OF ALLIANCE OF 1911. BETWEEN JAPAN AND GREAT BRITAIN

Signed at Iondon, in English, July 13, 1911 (44th year of Meiji).
Published July 15, 1911.

PEFAMBLE.

The Government of Japan and the Government of Great

Britain, having in view the important changes which have taken
place in the situation since the conclusion of the Anglo-Japanese
Agreement of the 12th August, 1905, and believing that a revision of that Agreement responding to such changes would
contribute to general stability and repose, have agreed upon
the following stipulations to replace the Agreement above
mentioned, such stipulations having the same object as the said
Agreement, namely;

- (a) The consolidation and maintenance of the general peace in the regions of Fastern Asia and of India;
- (b) The preservation of the common interests of all powers in China by insuring the independence and the integrity of the Chinese Empire and the principle of equal opportunities for the commerce and industry of all nations in China;
- (c) The maintenance of the territorial rights of the High Countries in the regions of Eastern Asia and of India, and the defence of thir special interests in the said regions:

ARTICLE I.

It is agreed that whenever, in the opinion of either Japan or Great Britain, any of the rights and interests referred to in the preamble of this Agreement are in jeopardy, the two Governments will communicate with one another fully and frankly, and will consider in common the measures which should be taken to safeguard those menaced rights or interests.

ARTICIE II.

The preason of unprovoked attack or aggressive action, wherever arising, on the part of any Power or Fowers, either High Contracting Party should be involved in war in defence of its territorial rights or special interests mentioned in the preamble of this Agreement, the other High Contracting Party will at once come to the assistance of its ally, and will conduct the war in common, and make peace in mutual agreement with it.

ARTICIE III.

The High Contracting Parties agree that neither of them will, without consulting the other, enter into separate arrangements with another Power to the prejudice of the objects described in the preamble of this Agreement.

ARTICLE IV.

Should either High Contracting Fart conclude a treaty of general arbitration with a third Power, it is agreed that nothing in this Agreement shall entail upon such Contracting Party an obilgation to go to war with the Power with whom

such treaty of arbitration is in force.

ARTICIF V.

The conditions under which armed assistance shall be afforded by either Fower to the other in the circumstances mentioned in the present Agreement, and the means by which such assistance is to be made available, will be arranged by the Naval and Military authorities of the High Contracting Parties, who will from time to time consult one another fully and freely upon all questions of mutual interest.

ARTICLE VI.

The present Agreement shall come into effect immediately after the date of its signature, and remain in force for ten years from that date.

In case neither of the High Contracting Parties should have notified twelve months before the expiration of the said ten years the intention of terminating it, it shall memain binding until the expiration of one year from the day on which either of the High Contracting Farties shall have denounced it. But if, when the date fixed for its expiration arrives, either ally is actually engaged in war, the alliance shall, ipso facto, continue until peace is concluded.

In faith whereof the Undersigned, duly authorised by their respective Governments, have signed this Agreement and have affixed thereto their Seals.
