General MacArthur rejected at once the charge made by Mr. Oscar Hammerstein II, President of the Authors' League of America, that certain books written by John Hersey and Edgar Snow had been banned through censorship proceedings from Japan. The General's radiographic reply to Mr. Hammerstein is as follows:

" 6 April 1943.

"TO : Mr. Oscar Hammerstein, Esq.,  
President, Authors League of America, Inc.  
New York, New York.

Reports that Hersey and Snow books have been banned from Japan are without the slightest basis in fact. They seemingly stem from a maliciously false propaganda campaign aimed at producing the completely fallacious impression that an arbitrary and vicious form of censorship exists here, whereas American literature, even though critical of the occupation, is subjected to no censorship control whatsoever.
