Pauline Frederick, NBC News United Nations correspondent--who has received almost as many awards as the UN has had problems--will be featured speaker for the 87th Annual Commencement exercises of Rochester Institute of Technology. She will address some 2,500 graduates at ceremonies in the Rochester War Memorial on Saturday, June 10, at 10:30 a.m.

In her second decade with NBC, Miss Frederick has gained an eminence in a field traditionally dominated by men, reporting major news events in her calm, authoritative voice. She has been the recipient of 13 honorary degrees and numerous awards.

From the UN she has reported on upheavals in Korea, Suez, Hungary, the middle East, Laos, Congo, Cuba, Cyprus and the Dominican Republic. She also has reported on the Nuremberg trials of German war criminals and national political conventions and elections.

As UN correspondent for NBC-TV and Radio, she has appeared on such programs as "Today," "Huntley-Brinkley Report," "Meet the Press," and news specials. She

has a daily radio news program and appears three times a week on "Emphasis" as well as being available for UN reports on other radio and TV news programs.

Miss Frederick was named "Woman of the Year" for 1964 by the American Association of University Women for her "contribution to international understanding." During her career she also won the Theta Sigma Phi National Headliner Award as the outstanding woman in radio, the George Foster Peabody Award for her contribution to international understanding in covering the UN, the DuPont commentator's award for "outstanding work in the field of interpretive radio reporting."

She was twice named for McCall's Golden Mike Award as the outstanding woman in radio and television, and was honored by the University of Missouri for Distinguished Service in Journalism.

'Games Educators Play' Is Urbanarium Project

"Games Educators Play," the first Urbanarium program offered through a new collaborative arrangement by RIT and the Environmental Simulation Laboratory of the University of Michigan, in cooperation with the Rochester Museum and Science Center, will take place May 13 from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the RIT Metropolitan Center, 50 West Main Street.

A workshop on the use of educational games and simulations in urban related studies, the program is designed to help educators and others--such as trainers, community organizations and students of urban studies--to experience simulation gaming, and to explore ways in which simulations could be useful as a learning strategy. Participants will learn to adapt or design simple games for specific purposes useful in meeting their organizational objectives.

This gaming and simulation workshop, in keeping with the concept of the Urbanarium, was designed after consultation with many neighborhood, civic and educational leaders within the Monroe County area, Gene DePrez RIT Director of Communications said. The program was partially made possible with assistance to the Museum and Science Center from the New York State Council on the Arts.
