NEW MANAGEMENT PROVING SUCCESS

Intercolonial Under Commission is Making Money Rapidly.

Ottawa, July 29.—According to figures obtained at the department of railways and canals, the operation of the Intercolonial railway system by independent commission in place of the old method is proving a success.

The road, it is stated, has more than paid its way in the first three months of the fiscal year, and it is hoped on the whole year's operations to break even after wiping out the deficit carried over from last year.

SPRINKLING WITH OIL KEEPS DOWN THE DUST

Hamilton and Toronto Find It Useful; Why Not Victoria?

Hamilton, July 29.—City Engineer MacCallum and Secretary Brennan, of the board of works, are busy figuring out the cost of using oil to lay the dust on macadam roads.

Toronto is well satisfied with the experiments it has conducted this year. It claims the credit of being the first Canadian city to use oil on the roads.

One sprinkling of oil will lay the dust for a whole season and it is very beneficial to the road, giving it a hard surface. On very warm days when the wind is brisk a road dries out after a watering cart has been over it and there are frequent complaints about the dust.

HONOR D'ARCY MCGEE.

Ottawa Will at Last Have Statue of Great Irishman.

Ottawa, July 29.—A statue of D'Arcy McGee, the distinguished Irishman, politician and poet, who was assassinated in Ottawa, will be placed in the most prominent situation in the capital, on a plaza which is to be created on a space which will be bounded by the post office, the new Grand Trunk hotel and the new station.

RE-TELLING STORY OF TACOMA TRAGEDY

Beat Girl Into Insensibility to Prevent Her Drowning Him.

Tacoma, July 29.—Investigation into the death of Miss Margaret Cuvreau, who was drowned in the bay Sunday afternoon while boating with John Flynn, has been commenced by the coroner.

Young Flynn, who was with the girl when her death occurred and who admits that he beat her into insensibility in his attempt to rescue her from drowning after their boat had capsized, told a straightforward story on the witness stand.

Despite his reassuring words, Flynn declares, the girl became panic-stricken when the boat capsized and seized him in such a way that she pulled him under the water several times. "All the time Miss Cuvreau was screaming and crying 'Oh, save me, John; oh, save me,' she repeated this several times," said Flynn.

He then told how he dragged her ashore, tried to revive her, leaving the body on the shore he went back to the picnic camp where the girl's family was and told of the drowning.

TO SAVE A MOMENT'S TIME.

Window Cleaner May Die as Result of Foolish Move.

San Francisco, July 29.—Two men are seriously injured and may die as a result of a window cleaner's attempt to save a moment's time. Pedro Pagan was cleaning windows on the fourth floor of the City of Paris store, when he attempted to step from one ledge to another. He lost his footing and fell headlong down a light well, through a skylight and into the main salesroom of the big store.

MRS. PARKHURST IS COMING TO STATES

English Suffragette Leader Will Put Ginger Into Campaign.

New York, July 29.—Preparing for the warmest woman's suffrage campaign ever waged in America, leaders of the movement here to-day are planning a reception to Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the celebrated leader of the English suffragettes.

The American women who have the cause at heart have been anticipating a lively campaign, but the coming of Mrs. Pankhurst insures a gingery time for opponents. Mrs. Pankhurst will appear first at Carnegie hall under the auspices of the League of Self-Supporting Women.

Mrs. Pankhurst's reputation as a "terror to mere man" is world-wide. Her audience, therefore, probably will be surprised to see a small, quiet woman, about 50 years of age, face them as leader in a great movement.

IMPERIAL VISTOR.

Will Crooks, M. P., Expects to Come to Canada This Fall.

British Columbia is to be visited this fall by many prominent British public men. Among them will be several members of the Imperial House. Will Crooks, M. P., is starting from London on September 16th on an extended tour in Canada and Australia.

"I'm going to see a bit of the Empire," he told a newspaperman in London recently, "but have made no arrangements binding me to address meetings anywhere. It is my first visit to any of the colonies, and I'm going with my wife, the best of all possible companions."

"I've had many offers to accompany me, some for payment, and others from strangers who wish to make the trip with me just for friendship."

"I hope to spend some twenty days in Canada, and then to leave for Sydney. If possible, I shall visit several of the Australian colonies, and leave for home on December 24th. I hope to learn something of the spirit of the colonies. I am visiting, to note events and conditions which may be useful to me in my political life."

MISSOURI GETS APPEAL.

Will Ask U. S. Supreme Court for Decision.

Kansas City, July 29.—Judge McPherson, in the federal court, has granted the state's appeal to the United States supreme court in the two-cent fare and maximum-freight-rate cases.

The case against the Burlington was appealed by the state because it was thought it afforded the best chance of success.

It is estimated that the relief in freight given by the new British industry equipment will be equal to several million a day.

WIRELESS TO BE EXTENDED
LOCAL STATION IS TO BE IMPROVED
Superintendent Edwards Has Gone North to Look Over Sites.

The two wireless telegraph stations at Victoria and Pachuca are to be enlarged at a cost of \$5,000 each.
