Mocha Cakes .- Bake sponge cake o any kind in a sheet; cut when cool inte squares or rounds spread mocha frosthe over the top and sides of the little cakes, then roll, to cover the sides, in shredded cocoanut, or in walnut or pe-can meats chopped fine. With pastry bag and star tube coil mocha frosting, round and round, to cover the tops of the cakes. Finish with a candied cherry in the centre.

Mocha Frosting—Wash the salt from a cup of butter, dry on a cloth, then beat to a cream; gradually beat in two cups and a hair of powdered sugar and coffee extract to taste. Black coffee reduced by boiling may replace the ex-tract, but a good coffee extract is bet-

Chocolate Layer Cake.—Beat one fourth cup of butter to a cream and the yolks of two eggs until thick. Ther gradually beat half a cup of sugar in to each, and combine the two mixtures Add four ounces of chocolate melted over hot water. Then, alternately, half a cup of milk and one cup and a half of sifted flour, sifted again with two level teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Lastly, beat in the whites of two eggs. beaten dry, and a teaspoonful of va-nilla extract. Bake in two layers about lighten minutes. But the layers to eighteen minutes. In the villages of the Oberstelermark, not very many miles from Ylenna, bread is seldom seen the staple food of the people being sters, a kind of porridge made from ground beach nuts, which is taken at breakfast with fresh or curdled milk, at dinner with broth or friend in lard, and with milk again at supper. It is Said Abdul Hamid Was the Latest Owner

The London Times gives as interesting history of the Hope diamond, which was sold in Paris the other day for \$80,000, whereas it is valued at \$125,000, the stone weighing \$44\carasta caraba combined with valuable tonics and antiseptics. Jean Bap-tiste Tavernier, who was born in Paris in 1605, and who died at Moscow about the year 1686; he was the author of "Voyages en Turquie, en Perse, et aux Indes." Travernier, on his re-tura from the east, sold 25 large dia-monds to the Grand Monarque in 1688. monds to the Grand Monarque in loss, and among them the diamond known by the name of Hope. Tavernier's son involved his father in such unfortunate speculations that he was compelled to sell his estate to pay his debts, and at the age of 81 to start on a fresh tourney to the east; but he was attacked by fever and died. This forms ragedy number one in the history of

tragedy number one in the history of the Hope diamond.

When it became part of the Crown Jewels Madame de Montespan was in monopoly of the King's affections, and he yielded to her request to wear the famous blue diamond. But by a curlous coincidence her influence over the lous coincidence her innuence over the king declined from about this time, and Madame de Maintenon took her place. Nicolas Fouquet, Superintend General des Finances, borrowed the diamond from Louis XIV. for one of those costly fetes which he gave, and those costly fetes which he gave, and which appear to have roused the jealousy of the King. He kept it for some time; he fell into disgrace, was imprisoned, and, as the Gazette de France, of April 5, 1680, briefly anrounced: "On nous mande de Pignerol (whence Fouquet was permitted to go-(whence Fouquet was permitted to go to take the waters) que le Sieur Fouquet y est mort d'apoplexie." The diamond lay for a long series of years during the Regency with the other 'Crown Jewels, until Marie Antoinette became, Queen of France. She heard of its extraordinary beauty, and by the comtraordnary beauty, and by the con-mand of Louis XVI, it was given to her. She wore it, we are told, about her throat at a great ball at the Tuil-orles; the Princess de Lamballe, her Losom friend—the friend for whom the historic Gainsborough hat was first made—occasionally borrowed and wore the blue diamond. Marie Antoinette was beheaded and the Princesse de amballe was done to death by a Paris

mob.

For nearly 40 years the diamond remained perdu, so far as the public was concerned. Its actual history in was concerned. Its actual history in that interval will probably never be fully told. It is said that Wilhelm Fals, an Amsterdam diamond cutter, had been commissioned to cut it, and that it was stolen from him by his son—the former was rulned and the latter committed, suicide. The younger Fals to the forther said to have given it to further said to have given it to a hman. Francois Beaulieu, a na Frenchman, Francois Beaulieu, a na-tive of Marseilles, who came to Lon-don, and, when in the last stages of destitution and ill-health, sent for Dan-iel, Eliason, a London dealer, and of-fered it for sale, Eliason paid the price asked, and took the diam the next day Beaulieu died of starva-tion. There can, however, be no doubt tion. There can, however, be no doubt about the fact that the diamond was purchased from Eliason about the year 1830, for £18.000 by the late Henry Thomas Hope, of Deepdene, son of the distinguished author of "Anastatius," and famous picture collector. The stone was "considered by good of the stone was "co was "considered by good judges to be worth a great deal more," and West-rop's estimate of £38,000 was probably "not an excessive figure considering its absolutely unique character, faultless texture, and exquisite form."

The diamond does not appear to have exercised any evil influence on Mr. Hope, who occasionally lent it to great public exhibitions. The Deepdeme estate, with its pictures and works of art, became with the diamond the entailed property of Mrs. Hope's grandson, Lord Henry Francis Hope, who in 1894 married the actress Miss. Yohe, whom he divorced in 1902. Lord Francis Hope obtained permission to sell the diamond, and in 1901 it passed out of his possession. It was purchased by Mr. Well, the well known London diamond merchant and by him sold almost at once to Simon Frankel, a jeweller of Maiden nd does not appear to

Lalcaca, the Parsee gentleman who died in a brave effort to save the life of Sir Curzon Wyllie from the assassin's hand, was taid to rest in the little Parsee burying ground at Brookwood.

This little burying place, hidden away among the heather and pines of Brookwood's 500 acres, is the only Parsee cemetery in Europe, and many distinguished members of the ancient Aryan race of Persia "lie here peacefully under the far-off sky of wide-famed Britain," as the inscription on one magnificent mausaleum has it.

In the centre, a few yards from the

In the centre, a few yards from the flower-heaped grave of Dr. Lalcaca, stands the tiny temple of the Zoroastrians, where the simple service took place. According to the strict Parsee rites the dead may neither be burned nor buried, but their bodies are brought to round towers called Towers of Si-lence, where they are eaten by the vul-tures which infest them. Ordinary earth burial is, however, practiced in the English Parsee burying ground; the coffin being of the lightest possible description.

Many Indian friends and admirers of the dead man's heroism, both men and women, the latter wearing picturesque native robes, journeyed to Brookwood. Lord Welby's Phrase in Regard to the Race for Armaments.

London, July 29.-A "slient war" Lord Rosebery termed the present internabrase Lord Welby, presiding at Caxton. hall, Westminster, over the annual public meeting held by the international arbi-

meeting held by the international arbitration and peace association, described the position as a "veiled war."

In a time of profound peace throughout the world, said Lord Welby. It seemed as though nations were determined to talk of nothing but ships and duns, and to direct their energies towards throwing away millions of public money. The only slight consolution to be found in the situation was that there was a certain refluctance on the part of was a certain reductance on the part of all classes in all countries to meet the growing expenditure which the demand

all classes in all countries to meet the growing expenditure which the demand for increased armaments involved. Politicians and press joined in working upon the creduity and passion of the multitude, and the effect of this was to alienate nations, to lead to a wasteful expenditure of public money, and to produce strife among the peopie who were called upon to meet this expenditure. The opening of the twentieth century, contrasted with the last quarter of the last century, would be significant in history by the fact that humanity should be so degraded by these efforts to create an "armed peace." He would rather call it a "veiled war." It was a mad career of extravagance and destruction.

A resolution was passed regretting the succession of Anglo-German panics, and urging the British government to approach the German government of approach the German government with a view to an arrest of the competition in naval construction, and the establishment of a cordial understanding similar to the entente cordiale between England and France.



Yesterday marked a black chapter in

Spain's history, for there was tragedy both at home and abroad. The King both at home and abroads the King reached here in time to learn that part of his army at Meillia had a bloody battle with the Moors, which, though the final victory was with the Spanish, cost the lives of 21 officers and a total of 200 Spaniards killed or wounded

The censorship makes it impossible to learn the number of killed and wounded in the rioting, which has been extensive in such widely separated places as Barcelona, Alcoy, Calaharra, Saragossa, Vendrell, Rioja, Port. Bom and Lianson, A general strike was de-clared at Biscaya, At these places there has been much destruction of property, relading bridges and public building The centre of the rebellion is Baro

The centre of the rebellion is Barce-ona, to which place the government is rushing extra troops, both infantry and naval marines. Dispatches yesterday morning said the Barcelona revolution-sis had been defeated as a result of lesperate charges by the troops, but a lispatch at noon announced that fighting had begun again, the artillery us

ing heavy guns to demoish the barri-cades. The peaceful portion of the population field in fright to their homes and locked and barred the doors. A military proclamation has been is-sued in the city that no life is safe, and warning peaceful citizens to re-main under cover to avoid the fire of the treons. he troops.
