GPO Micropublishing Future Prospects

The Government Printing Office has been assisting several Federal agencies with their plans to convert hard copy documentation into microfiche. Such assistance has been provided to the National Park Service, Naval Hydrographic Office, Occupational Safety and Health Review Commission, and the new Office of Personnel Management.

Last year saw the conversion of over 5,000 non-GPO publications to over 2,000,000 microfiche. These were disseminated throughout the depository library community. As of June 28th, GPO had converted over 15,500 titles and distributed over 6,500,000 diazo fiche to depositories.

Almost everyone is now familiar with GPO's conversion of the Code

of Federal Regulations and the House and Senate bills. Looking to the future, microfiche conversions will include the bound *Congressional Record*, as well as the House and Senate Reports on Public and Private bills.

GPO will also issue all Department of Energy/Energy Information Administration publications for 1978-79 in microfiche format. In addition, the General Accounting Office is converting the entire Legislative History File, starting with 1921, to microfiche. This will go out on distribution to depository libraries; and it involves 48,000 fiche.

Also on the horizon is the Department of Commerce which through its Patent and Trademark Office will issue in fiche the Patent Classification Definitions. The National Institute of Health will add to fiche by making Health Science Serials available on a quarterly basis.

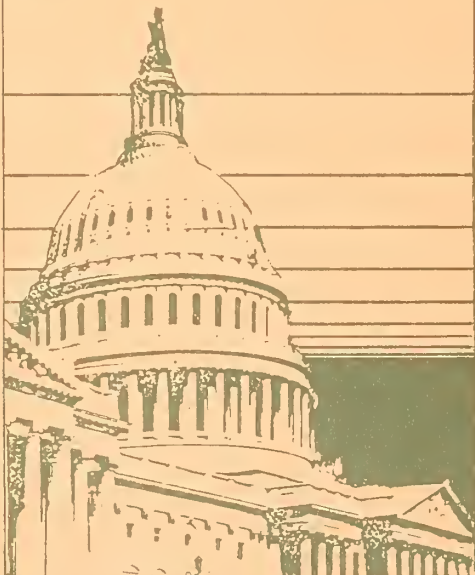
These are just a few of the microform prospects which depository libraries have in their future.



A Microform Approach to House and Senate Bills

Since January and the opening of the 96th Congress, GPO has been converting all House and Senate bills to microfiche. According to a GPO survey of depositories, over 70% of libraries prefer bills in fiche format rather than hard copy. A cumulative hard copy finding aid has been distributed with each new shipment of fiche.

To expedite retrieval of bills, librarians have found it useful to file the fiche in numerical sequence in each category (i.e.: House Bills, House Resolutions, House Joint Resolutions, House Concurrent Resolutions, Senate Bills, Senate Resolutions, Senate Joint Resolutions, Senate Concurrent Resolutions). Librarians or patrons can then use the finding aid for the proper Congress and session, go to the point of filing and quickly select the proper fiche. This is a most economical way of using your fiche to store and retrieve bills.



Questions and Answers



Q. The most frequently asked question these days among depository librarians seems to be, "What is a 'Joker Box?'"

A. For the past few months the term "Joker Box" followed by a number has been appearing on many shipping lists in the upper left hand corner. The numbers run in a sequence from 1 to 100 and then repeat.

The origin of the term is twofold. When suitable stocks of documents are available, prior to preparing a shipping list a box is filled as a model holding not-yet classified documents. The box is brought to the classifiers who examine the documents and assign appropriate SuDocs numbers. These numbers then become part of the finished shipping list.

For some time past, Regional depositories have said to the Library and Statutory Distribution Service that it would be a convenience to them to know the exact sequence of complete shipments for claiming

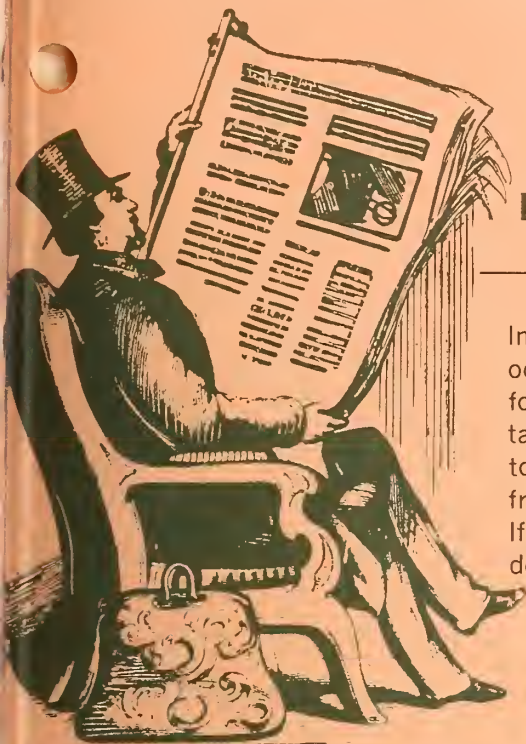
purposes. To help them, the GPO internal control number has been added. Partly to distinguish it, the internally used term, "Joker Box," accompanies the number.

HIGHLIGHTS Editor inquired as to the etymological roots of the term and was told it derived from the card game of Polka. Since the "Joker" as a "wild" card is different from all the others, yet can assume the likeness of any other card, a GPO worker once referred to a box filled for classification rather than distribution as the "Joker Box," and the term stuck. So chalk up to Polka the introduction into speech of yet another term, joining ranks with "blue chip," "call your bluff," "high stakes," etc.

Monthly Catalog Corner

Since its inception in October, 1977, the Name Authority Cooperative Project has gradually been expanding. Under the Project's guidelines, GPO established headings are submitted to the Library of Congress for incorporation into the official catalog and then distributed as part of LC's automated name authority files. All headings are established in the Anglo-American Cataloging Rules form and used by GPO for cataloging in OCLC and the *Monthly Catalog*. For the short term, the joint effort minimizes cataloging differences between LC and GPO in the area of name headings. Our long range goal is the complete merger and compatibility of name authority files for use under AACR 2.

The following statistics reflect the growth of the project during the 21 month period October 1977 through June 1979.

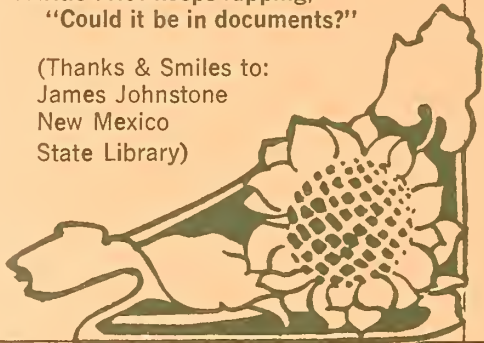
A manual has been written to guide GPO and LC staff along with training procedures for coding work-forms needed in LC's automated name authority system. This summer training will be provided GPO catalogers in order to enable them to begin establishment of AACR 2 name headings for the next phase of the project. These headings which will be established will not be immediately used, but instead held in a separate authority file until the new cataloging code is adopted in 1981. This will be the initial step in GPO's adoption of the revised cataloging rules for use in the *Monthly Catalog*.

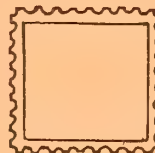
