Good, rich, deeply worked soil, either of a friable texture or thoroughly drained, is as necessary for the production of a perfect lawn as for garden crops. Early and frequent mowing and rolling, as well as the liberal application of water, which should be applied in the early morning or late afternoon during dry seasons, is one of the secrets of maintaining beautiful green turf from early Spring to late Fall.




