

Of the general progress of the war he knows nothing. What he does know is that he is tired and hungry. If he is personally engaged on any definite day the difference may be very little. Momentous questions of sleep, baccy, scraps of biscuit, the chance of a chicken, the prospect of fatigue or outpost duty when he gets in still occupy his mind, together with a score of little material details of work or physical comfort, which affect him every day alike. I do not mean that such things affect his keenness and ardor in fighting. Fighting and the rest are all in the day's work. He may, indeed, if he is lucky, find a day's fighting a positive rest and relief. He will certainly have less distance to march, and mere mechanical marching 'bulks big' in a soldier's life. If an infantry soldier he may be in support, and lie on his back snoozing and smoking peacefully half the day, never under fire or firing. If a mounted man, he may be holding horses or watching a flank with plenty of eleisure. DISCUSSED PLANS FOR COMINC YEAR

SEALERS PREPARING FOR ENSUING SEASON

Advisability of Sending Two of Fleet to Cape Horn Considered-Vessels Sail in November.
