CITY ENGINEER SMITH READY TO BEGIN WORK

Job is Estimated to Cost About \$7,000-Work Will Occupy Two Months' Time

Now that the dry season has about passed, the long-deferred repairs to he big reservoir on Smith's Hill may, n the opinion of the city engineer, be indertaken almost immediately, and purpose the work will be taken in hand at a very early date. The estimated cost is in the neighborhood of \$7,000, and the job will take about two months to complete.

It will be recalled that in the latter part of March fast, about two weeks before Angus Smith, city engineer, asity engineer, submitted a report to the city council in which he estimated that the cost of effecting repairs would be \$30,000. This sum was included in the estimates.

On April 18th Mr. Smith submitted a report to the board in which he esti-mated that the reservoir could be renwatertight and thoroughly dered watertight and thoroughly-efficient for a much less sum, namely, \$7,000, but he recommended that in view of the dangers from a conflagra-tion during the dry season no attempt be made to effect repairs until the fall. In the interim he proposed to fill the reservoir to its greatest capacity and make a study of where the leakages make a study of where the leakages developed. This was done with the most developed. This was done with the most interesting results. For upwards of a month the big basin, though almost full of water, developed little or no leakages whatever. As time passed, however, the same faults again manifested themselves and the level of the vater was lowered to about 7 feet, water was lowered to about I feet, where it has remained up to the present time. Though the leakage is comparatively light with this depth. It would be greater were the level raised, and hence it is considered desirable to make the repairs at the earliest possible date.

The billiard definition is: "An amateur is one who has not at any time earned his living, or any part of his living, by playing or scoring games played on a billiard table."

Like the M. C. C. the Lawn Tennis Association does not officially define an amateur, but the L. T. A has a clause in its constitution which gives the council wide powers in dealing with players who do anything they disapprove of, and, unofficially, the L. T. A has very strict views on what constitutes genuine amateurism.

After the usual provisions in regard to competing for money, the A. S. A. be bars the swimmer who engages in, teaches, cfc., swimming or any other athletic exercises for gain; sells, etc., any prize won, asks for or accepts, any approve of, and, unofficially define at the text of Bundy and Mc.



However desirous we may be as business men to increase and improve our opportunities for foreign trade, we have no desire to advantage ourselves in that dito increase and improve our opportuni-ties for foreign trade, we have no de-sire to advantage ourselves in that di-rection if it is going to involve any sacrifice of trade now enjoyed with us by the mother country. There are many reasons which prompt us to wel-come the recent convention with France. There are many reasons which prompt us to acknowledge that the still more recent concessions to the United States were justifiable. Simi-larly there are reasons why the per-United States were justifiable. Similarly there are reasons why the perpetuation of the surtax against Germany was unjustifiable, but the fact remains that by every one of these moves we have diverted a certain volume of trade from Imperial channels into foreign channels, to that extent weakening the Imperial connection and discrediting the policy with which we started out.

In the expression of my views I do

In the expression of my not wish it to be assumed that I am of the opinion that any serious harm has already been done. My object has rather been to call attention to a tendency which seems to be leading to misunderstanding and into dangerous or the more especially since it has now misunderstanding and into dangerous paths, more especially since it has now brought us face to face with what is after all the most important issue confronting us as business men to-day. I refer to the desire of the United States a treaty of reciprocity with us.

Splendid as has been the progress of our manufacturing industries under the progress of the production they are still the state of policy of protection, they policy of protection, they are still dwarfed in comparison with the gi-gantic establishments operating on the other side of the border. By the con-solidation of capital and by the special-ization of output the United States in-dustries have grown tremendously powerful, so powerful indeed that in time of depression, despite our tariff wall they can sween this country from wall, they can sweep this country from end to end, leaving idle machinery, un-employment and poverty in their track.
