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CANADA AND THE TARIFF.

Mr. John Hendry, President of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, in his address to that body in Vancouver yesterday, dealt somewhat fully with Canada's trade relations with the Motherland and foreign countries.

"There is no true Canadian but will heartily endorse the stand taken by our government in declaring the right of the Dominion to regulate its own trade relations, but in the negotiations of such treaties we should always see carefully to it that the value of the preference is not impaired."

Mr. Hendry scents danger to the British Preference in the possibility of reciprocal tariff relations between Canada and foreign countries. He takes the ground that Canada cannot afford reciprocity with the United States except in a limited number of natural products.

There is no basis for any apprehension concerning the British Preference. That policy was adopted by the present government for two reasons. One was to give the manufacturers of Great Britain a larger share of the Canadian market; the other to fulfill the promise of tariff reduction.

The tariff question is one of the most difficult problems with which this country has to deal. Our interests are so diversified that only after exhaustive inquiry and thorough consideration a policy satisfactory on the whole, can be evolved.

Forty-two Conservative vans recently left London on an open-air speaking tour throughout England and Wales. The tour will last three months and will embrace ten thousand meetings in four hundred constituencies.

That Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his party created a striking impression upon the people of the Canadian West has been made manifest by the bitter attacks upon him by rabid Tory journals since his return home.

NO PERMIT FOR SLAUGHTERING
 The Saanich council at the last meeting disposed of an unusually large amount of business. Several important matters were dealt with; amongst them the proposed Chinese slaughter-house on the Tolmie estate, situated on the banks of the Colquhoun river, near where it empties into the harbor. Owners of adjacent property petitioned against its establishment. The health and morals committee reported against it and the council adopted their report.
 The petition from Gordon Head requiring signatures of fifty per cent. of assessed value of ward 3 before council would open the road to Marguerite Bay beach, was short two and a half per cent. of this amount and, after an animated discussion was turned down on the casting vote of the reeve.
 The new road to open out Prospect lake to the public from the West Saanich road received a slight setback. Mr. Oldfield, whose property is affected by it, objected to the so-called private road now in existence being turned into a public thoroughfare. The council does not share his opinion of its privacy and ordered the work proceeded with, giving the objector thirty days to remove the obstruction. The new road roller and rock crusher were examined by the council after the meeting and favorable comments were made on the fine appearance of the machinery.
 Arthur Noakes submitted a plan of subdivision of block B, extension A, Cloverdale. This was found to be in order and accepted.
 L. McRat, Tolmie avenue, asked that the drain running through lots 16 and 17 be covered. Letter received and filed and he will be notified that the matter is being attended to.
 An invitation was received from the president of the Tranquille sanitarium to attend the opening of that institution. The letter received and acknowledged.
 Mrs. Ball, Charleton road, complained of the water lying near her property and also of the bad state of the road. The matter was referred to the road superintendent.
 J. A. A. Alkman, solicitor, advised that the award re cleaning Cloverdale ditch was still operative, and where it affected municipal property the council ranked the private owners and had a right to remove any obstruction which caused the flooding of the streets. The road superintendent was instructed to clean out ditch where it interfered with Cloverdale avenue drainage. The letter was received and filed.
 Alva Von Alvensleben, Ltd., forwarded a corrected plan of a subdivision, and as it now conforms to the council's former requests the reeve will sign it.
 G. J. Goward, manager of the B. C. Electric Railway, inquired as to which officer he should apply for information concerning the placing of poles. He will be informed that the road superintendent has this power.
 Sidney Williams, Chiloquit, directed the attention of the council to a promise formerly made to grant the road near his property at Mount Tolmie. Letter received and he will be informed that the work will be done in due course.
 Heisterman, Forman & Co. protested against proposed slaughter house to be established near the Kerr estate and overlooking the Gorge. They will be informed that the council will not allow any slaughter house to be established there.
 H. T. Oldfield wrote in respect to opening a road on the north side of Prospect lake and objected to a public road through his property. He will be informed that the council intend to proceed with the road and asked to remove a fence obstructing it within thirty days.
 Mr. Baxter reported that he had inspected steam plant No. 1113B and found it in good order, also including his bill. Letter received and filed.
 Mr. Pace asked permission to drain water off his property through the public road. The request was granted subject to the approval of the road superintendent.
 Geo. and J. Deanes and I. Somers, trustees of Mt. Tolmie Presbyterian church, asked to have the taxes levied on the church property rebated, as no other church in the district is taxed. It was agreed to rebate this tax.

 Other church owners in the vicinity of Royal Oak complained against the Telephone Company setting their staving posts in the fields. The complainants will be notified that the council has given no permission to trespass beyond the road allowance.

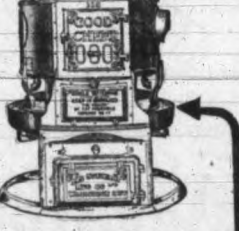

TESTING ATLANTIC WINDS.

and interest on debentures, etc. Separate journals will be kept for each department showing expenditure incurred and warrants passed for payment against these appropriations, the balances unexpended being shown from month to month in these journals, which will be available for the information of the various committees; this procedure will constitute a check against over expenditure of any appropriation. The trial balance of the general ledger will, therefore, exhibit the amounts which were estimated as recoverable from any source of revenue, and the amounts actually received therefrom to that date, and will exhibit likewise the amounts placed at credit of each department, and the expenditure to that date. The departmental journals will show, in columnar form, the expenditures under the respective classifications of that department, the general ledger account containing the monthly charges in total.

Accountant's Department.
This department will continue to record the transactions of all other departments, which, in the majority of cases, will be expressed in totals, the details being shown in the separate departmental records. There will be an account with the "stores department" which will show charges for supplies taken into stock by the storekeeper, and credits for his delivery from stock to the various departments or works, the balance of this account agreeing with a similar account maintained in the "stores department," and being represented by the sum of the stock accounts.

Other accounts relating to stores, transactions will be the "rock," "cement," "sand and gravel" accounts, containing all expenditures for these materials; credits to these accounts will come from the storekeeper's journal each month. An account of store expenses will contain charges for storekeeper's salary and all expenses of his department; credits to this account will come from the storekeeper's journal, and will consist of the percentage charge distributing these expenses.

There will further be an account for "engineering department." To this will be charged the salaries of engineering and surveying staffs, and other expenses incidental to the conduct of this office, the cost of tools or supplies (other than machinery of an enduring value), repairs, maintenance, etc.; credits to this account will come from the works department journal, and if the percentage charge out to the various construction accounts has been correctly estimated, the expenditures during the year will be balanced by the charges to construction.

An account will be kept representing the value of engineering machinery, such as crushers, mixers, surveying instruments, etc., and from this depreciation will be allowed each year and charged to "engineering accounts," being distributed therefrom to the various construction accounts.

Filing System.
This matter is under consideration, with the object of bringing papers and correspondence relating to the same portion of the city's business and distributed in several departments, into a central office where they would be more accessible, and under the care of a capable clerk this office might also serve the purpose of an enquiry bureau from whence enquiries from the public might be distributed among the various offices, thus avoiding the frequent interruption of officials who would under this system be able to consider these enquiries together with such information as might be procurable by the enquiry clerk; in many instances the enquiry clerk would himself be able to furnish the desired information, and from his acquaintance with the correspondence filed by him, he would be in a position to render effective assistance to all departments, supplying information on the progress of various matters within his knowledge.


General Taxes.
In past years a great deal of labor has been expended, and a great pressure as regards time, in the annual production of the assessment roll, and later of the tax collector's roll.

A new form of assessment roll is being designed, which, with regard to the description and measurement of the property, will be a permanent record, a moveable section being provided for the entry of the assessment figures each year in re-writing the body of the assessment roll, and will facilitate the earlier production of the completed roll. Similarly in the tax collector's roll the description, measurement, etc., will be in permanent form, the moveable section comprising the valuation for assessment for the year, the calculation of the tax payable, and the record of the amount paid. If the recommendation with regard to the local improvement instalments is adopted, the permanent section of the tax roll will contain the record of all local improvements affecting each piece of property, as well as the amounts payable for sewer services, thus furnishing in one record the history of all taxes payable in connection with each piece of property, and exhibiting at a glance all arrears which are outstanding.

The earlier production each year of completed figures in both assessment and tax rolls will enable delivery of tax notices to be made in good time, without the present strain of overwork at certain seasons of the year. When any work was commenced the form of tax roll for the present year was in preparation, and it was, therefore, impossible to use the revised form of tax roll above described, but both assessment-roll and tax roll can be provided for use next year.

The revised form of tax roll will enable a balance to be obtained between the amounts payable for the roll and the totals accounted for in the cash book, and a proof of the arrears carried forward to the next year. No attempt has been made in past years to balance the tax roll either against the total of the original tax levy or with the cash accounted for in the cash book, although in the case of the gen-

eral tax roll the posting of the items from the tax receipts has been checked in detail. This method of checking, however, covers but one side of the operation, and should not be substituted for the more comprehensive tests afforded by the general balancing of the totals of the tax roll with the records contained in the cash book and general ledger.

A new form of receipt for general taxes has already been provided for use in the collection of taxes this year, and as in the case of the new receipt form provided for the water department, the laborious copying in detail into the general cash book of all items of taxes collected, is entirely eliminated, the receipts of each day appearing in total in one line in the cash book. The posting to the tax roll will be taken from the counterfoil of the receipt book, which is designed to show thereon the addition of the accounts for which the receipts have been issued.

General.
There is in course of preparation a balance sheet expressing in revised form the position of the accounts as at December 31st, 1909, taking into consideration the various changes which will be found necessary upon the adjustment of the several matters which have received especial consideration. This revised balance sheet, which will probably be ready for submission to your council about the middle of next month, will indicate the results, in my opinion, is the best adapted to the correct representation of the financial position of the corporation, and if approved by your council, will constitute a permanent form of balance sheet. As I have not yet received from the bank a certificate of the various balances on hand and overdrawn, as at December 31st, 1909, I have not verified the items of the balance sheet, which will be dependent upon this bank certificate; this work will be completed before submission of the revised balance sheet.

In this revised balance sheet of December 31st, 1909, effect will be given to the proposed adjustment of sinking fund balances and like matters, the correction of some inaccuracies in calculation or arrears of taxes and rates, which, in the case of the water department were estimated at the close of last year. A correction will also be necessary in the item described in the balance sheet as "collectable assessments subject to local improvement by-laws," the published amount including as collectable that portion of the instalments which is payable by the corporation at large, whereas the item of collectable assessments should exhibit only that portion which is actu-

ally collectable from the property owners benefited by the local improvements, the amounts paid in advance and committed being excluded therefrom.

The balance sheet as published included no provision for accrued interest upon debentures, or for accounts for sundry creditors, whose claims were subsequently paid out of the revenues of 1910.

From the item of general purpose loans there should be deducted the sum of \$14,000 for North Park loan, this amount being shown separately as an advance from the Bank of B. N. A.

It will also be necessary to eliminate the item of unsold debentures, \$14,000, the fact being that these debentures were pledged as security for the bank loan, there being but one liability for the amount. This liability, by the way, has since been reduced by sales of land, and as a provision for redemption of the final liability, \$250 has been set aside each year for the past three years, the apparent presumption being that the further sales of land will reduce the liability to \$3,000 or less within the ten-year term of the debentures.

The adoption of the recommendations herein contained, the revision of certain methods, and the redistribution of the work now performed by the clerical staff will, as already pointed out, result in a considerable saving in this direction.

The general outline of the changes proposed has been discussed with the various members of the staff, whose work will be affected thereby, and I believe that there exists a general desire to assist in every way the introduction of a system which will reduce the volume of routine work, and at the same time furnish a more satisfactory record of the operations.

It may be that in the preparation of this report the methods to be employed have been described with more elaborate detail than was necessary under the circumstances, but as the points referred to may be of interest to some of the members of the council, I have not spared explanation upon matters of routine, feeling satisfied that the entire simplicity of the system will constitute its best recommendation.

The foregoing notes will inform your council as to the progress of the work in hand, and will furnish an outline of the work yet to be completed, although it is not impossible that extensions along other lines may be suggested as the work progresses. I desire to lay particular stress upon the importance of two matters which have been referred to: first, the adoption of a six months' rate in advance for all water consumers, and secondly, the establishment of one common rate for the payment of all local improvement instalments, and I should appreciate the opinions of the council upon these matters, which must be taken into ac-

count in the preparation of the new water register and the tax roll of next year.

Hamilton, Wash., Sept. 20.—Otto Beckman, 24 years old, a logger employed by the Hamilton Logging Co., was instantly killed here. Beckman was employed as "chaser." GAY DANCING SCENE IN SHAKESPEARE'S TOWN

Feature of This Year's Festival
Revival of the Morris Dance

Stratford-on-Avon, Shakespeare's town, has been gay with its Shakespeare festival. The most interesting new feature this year has been the revival of the Morris dancing, to which we have referred in former issues, whose object is "to bring back to the poor of England the joy of life which is their birthright."

At Stratford there was a festival of song and dance, and the London Times says:

"That competition was an outcome of the renaissance of Morris dancing, which is largely due to the research of Cecil Sharp, the energy of Miss Mary Neal, and the example and missionary spirit of the working girls belonging to the club in North London of which she is the presiding genius. Mr. Denson has gone to headquarters and absorbed the girls and boys of the Esperance club into the general scheme which he has set himself to accomplish. And that means of necessity that people from all over the country will be attracted to Stratford to join in the common movement.

"For from the small beginnings of the Esperance club the cult of Morris dancing has spread far and wide, and a very large number of teaching centres, covering every county in England, look to it as the root from which they have sprung. And the work is continually growing. Every weekday for the last three weeks a constantly-changing class of women, most of them young, all of them teachers in elementary schools, have been learning how to dance and sing and play in one of the Stratford schoolrooms. They have sat in rows on benches, like their own pupils, learning by ear from Clive Carey the old songs that they in their turn will teach the children in their charge, and then, step by step, and with infinite pains, have picked up from Miss Florence Warren, one of the members of the Esperance club, with a genius for teaching, as many as they could in the time at their disposal of the traditional Morris dances. And they have done this in their holidays, and at their own expense; and some 250 of them will now go back to their schools, which cover England from Cornwall to Wales, to pass on the lessons that they have learnt.

"Of late years many books, theoretical and practical, have been written on the subject of these dances, songs, and singing-games. The names of the best known of the authors are the Rev. S. Baring-Gould, Mr. John Graham, Miss Mary Neal, Cecil Sharp ("The Morris Book," "English Folk-Songs," "Folk-Songs from Somerset"), Frank H. Stanger ("Dance Tunes," "Traditional Tunes"), Miss Lucy Broadwood and Fuller Maulland ("English County Songs"), Mrs. Gomme ("Folk-Lore-Dictionary"); and, with the aid of their books and several publications by Messrs. Novello and Messrs. Curwen, these school teachers will find little difficulty in carrying on the lessons begun in Stratford.

"What the Boy Scout movement is doing for the boys of England the Morris dance revival is doing and will do more and more for both girls and boys, the women and men of the next generation, turning them into far happier and better citizens than they would otherwise have been. The gay ribbons, the tinkling bells of the dances, the clean print rocks and

NARROWLY ESCAPE DEATH.

Philadelphia, Sept. 20.—Aeronauts Alterholt and Graham, who piloted the balloon, Pennsylvania in the National championship balloon race, which started from Indianapolis Saturday, reached Philadelphia to-day much the worse for their trip. They escaped death only by the narrowest margin, they say.

The Pennsylvania was buffeted about and finally wrecked by a storm near Dexter, Ohio. At an altitude of 24,000 feet it encountered a terrific storm. Three bags of ballast were thrown overboard, but failed to prevent the bag's descent or hardly check it. The balloon dropped at a frightful speed

and rebounded more than a hundred feet when it struck the earth. Both men became entangled in the ropes and were dragged. Both suffered painful bruises and their clothing was torn to shreds.
