1. Reference is made to the following questions by CINC at 0900 briefing 22 April 52:

- a. Additional information on reported cavalry sightings.
- b. Number of CCF Cavalry Divisions in existence and number FEC accepts in Korea.

2. The cavalry detachments sighted were taken under accurate friendly artillery fire. A friendly patrol attempting to obtain information was forced to withdraw. (See details in Incl 1).

3. A tentative total of six cavalry divisions are accepted in the CCF and none are accepted in Korea. (See details in Incl 2).

4. In the absence of identifications, the above mentioned detachments contacted on the 6th ROK Division front on 21 April are evaluated as either mounted reconnaissance elements or a CCF pack train.

5. This completes action on SGS line #5027.

Communist Cavalry Sighted on 6th ROK Div Front**1. EUSAK Report:**

The following additional details and correction to the report of enemy cavalry on 21 April 1952, were received in Sitrep from EUSAK:

"At 211810 vic CT 863513 one squad of enemy cavalry dressed in white was observed moving south. At 211820 vic CT 863513 to CT 870529 two platoons of cavalry, one of which was dressed in white and the other in regular uniforms, were observed moving south. At 211900 one platoon of cavalry in regular uniforms was observed moving from CT 862530 to CT 862512. All units were reported to be moving in formation. Artillery fire was directed in each instance and soldiers dismounted and led horses behind ridges. Artillery fire resulted in 10 horses KIA. ROK forward observer stated that 20% of the horses carried packs and were being led. It was not determined what the packs contained. All cavalymen were armed with automatic weapons. Artillery fire did not appear to bother the horses excessively. It is believed by the observer that this is a regular cavalry unit totaling approximately 130 horses.

"At 221015 a friendly patrol approached area vic CT 863513 to get additional information. The patrol was forced to withdraw by enemy small arms fire. No information obtained. Friendly aircraft checked area at 221530 with negative results."

2. G2 FEC Evaluation:

In the absence of identifications, the reported sighting of enemy cavalry to the front of the 6th ROK Division on 21 April 1951, may be:

- (a) Mounted CCF reconnaissance elements. These are organic.

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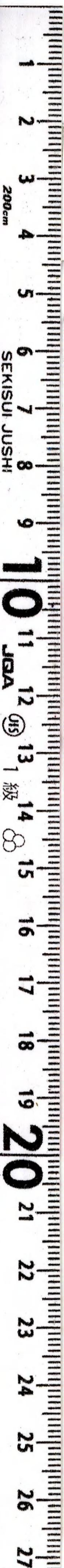

(b) CCF pack animals; a CCF infantry regiment has on a T/O & E basis, slightly over 100 animals.

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~~Chinese Communist Cavalry~~

1. A tentative total of six cavalry divisions are accepted in the CC Field Forces. Of these, the 1st and 2nd CCF Cavalry Divisions have been identified as organic to the Special Army Group, Fourth CCF Field Army; the 5th CCF Independent Cavalry Division and another of undetermined designation are carried in the North China Field Forces; and the remaining two — the 7th and 8th CCF Cavalry Divisions — are carried as components of the XIII Army Group, First CCF Field Army.

2. In addition to the above, as many as ten more cavalry divisions, according to old reports, may exist as part of military forces of the Inner Mongolian Autonomous Region. Although, the military forces of Inner Mongolia are not considered a part of the CCF, these forces could be called upon for service in Korea by the CCF.

3. The strength of a CCF cavalry division is currently estimated at 8,000 troops.

4. No CCF cavalry divisions are currently accepted in Korea.

5. Until early 1951, however, two unidentified CCF cavalry divisions were carried in Korea based on field reports of CCF cavalry activities across the UN front. In fact, it is believed, based on available records, that elements of the 8th US Cavalry Regiment (Infantry) were engaged with at least a CCF cavalry regiment during the heavy fighting which took place on the night of 3/4 November 1950, in the vicinity of Unsan (YS 3927). This has been confirmed by a CCF officer PW who identified the 1st Troop, 1st Squadron, 1st Cavalry Regiment, Independent CCF Cavalry Division. This PW, however, stated that the regiment returned to Inner Mongolia immediately after the fight and that only the 1st Troop re-entered Korea in late February 1951, attached to the 38th CCF Army.

1. There is no doubt that there exists within the city of Pyongyang numerous military targets; and it is agreed that such enemy targets should be expeditiously destroyed wherever and whenever possible. There exists, however, in this particular instance, one deterrent factor, i.e. the reported existence of a PW camp within the city. The exact location of this camp has not been determined. An air attack launched against Pyongyang, whether this camp is hit in the course of such raids or not, will provide the enemy with grist for his propaganda machine. He has long since proved his ability to exploit such situations to the maximum.

2. In view of this factor and the possibility of placing the lives of UN personnel in jeopardy, it is recommended that FEAF's request be disapproved until such time as the existence and/or location of the above mentioned camp can be positively established.

1. It is desired that you establish, with the least practicable delay, a Theater Shipping Surveillance Intelligence Center. Such Center will collect, collate, coordinate, evaluate, and make consolidated reports on the results of the air, surface, submarine, coast watcher, radar search reconnaissance and surveillance of the Far East Command.

2. Personnel problems involved in the establishment of such a Center are understood and appreciated, however, the value of such a Center in the overall program for the security of the Far East Command makes these problems of minor concern. It is not anticipated that this Shipping Surveillance Center will require large numbers of personnel. Air Force experience indicates that such a Center can be operated effectively by utilizing existing Army, Navy and Air communications, supplemented where necessary by Japanese telecommunication facilities.

3. All possible assistance in the establishment of this Center and coordination necessary for the performance of its mission will be rendered by this Headquarters and FEAF, subject only to limitations imposed by existing policy and the demands of the Korean situation.

4. Specifically, the various cooperating agencies are directed to assist as follows:

a. G2 GHQ: To provide, in coordination with your designated representative, a plan for the utilization of:

(1) Maritime Safety Agencies (thru PSD) to supply information on Japanese shipping.

(2) CIC (thru the CO 441st CIC Det) to recheck reports and evaluate reporting individuals and/or media.

b. CG FEAF (thru A2, FEAF): To formulate, in conference with your designated representative, a workable plan for the provision of:

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AG 350.09(1 Sep 50)GB, subj: Establishment of Shipping Surveillance Center

(1) Flights for reconnaissance repeats, rechecks, and shadowing or trailing missions.

(2) Pertinent de-briefing reports of shorebased aircraft crews.

(3) Necessary technical personnel on a TDY basis, subject only to the urgent need of the Korean situation.

c. Civil Transportation Section: To devise and plan, with a designated Shipping Center representative, a system for the provision of information on the movement of overseas shipping; and upon the establishment of a proposed indigenous center, a plan for the supply of information on Japanese coastal shipping.

Ref: (a) CINCFE secret ltr AG 350.09 of 1 Sep 1950, Subj: "Establishment of Shipping Surveillance Intelligence Center"

1. On 5 March 1952, Mr. I. YOSHIYUKI and Mr. Y. SAWA, of the Maritime Transportation Bureau, Ministry of Transportation, called at the Headquarters of Commander Naval Forces, Far East and presented the following information:

a. Commencing 1 April 1952, the Ministry of Transportation will be unable to submit its daily report of Coastwise Movements of Japanese vessels to the Transportation Section, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander Allied Powers, because of budget limitations. The budget of 40,000,000 Yen, for the reserved telephone system, over which the Ministry collects the information used in its report, has not been approved by the Japanese Government for fiscal 1952 (1 April 1952 to 31 March 1953). The report will be discontinued only because of lack of funds; personnel problems are not involved. The gentlemen also advised that this would affect the reporting of overseas movements as well as coastal movements.

b. The above mentioned gentlemen stated that this subject was discussed with the Transportation Section, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander Allied Powers, in December 1951, at which time representatives of the Ministry were told that after the Peace Treaty was ratified, the Transportation Section would have no further interest in subject reporting.

c. The procedure proposed by the Transportation Ministry subsequent to 1 April 1952 is for Branch offices (approximately 20 of them) to forward reports by mail every 10 or 15 days to a Central office in Tokyo where reports would be consolidated at the end of each month.

2. Subject reports furnish the Theatre Shipping Surveillance Intelligence Center of this Headquarters with information concerning the

movements of Japanese vessels in the waters in the vicinity of the Japanese Islands, as well as information pertaining to departures and arrivals from overseas ports. This information is of great value to the Shipping Surveillance Intelligence Center if it is to effectively carry out its mission as prescribed in reference (a). In the light of the current international situation and in the interests of the mutual defense commitments envisaged in the U. S.-Japan Security Pact, it appears reasonable that the Japanese Government should furnish to appropriate U. S. authorities current and accurate information on the movements of Japanese vessels in Far Eastern waters.

3. It is therefore requested that appropriate representations be made to the Japanese Government to insure the continuation after 1 April 1952, of an effective system of centralized collection of current information on the movements of Japanese ocean-going vessels, such information to be compiled daily and furnished to Commander Naval Forces, Far East either directly or through such channels as Commander in Chief, Far East may direct. The scope and type of information furnished should be similar to that being supplied at present.

4. When the Japanese Peace Treaty becomes effective and the control of all commercial ports reverts to the Japanese Government, it is anticipated that a further request will be initiated by Commander Naval Forces, Far East, through appropriate channels to the effect that the Japanese Government include in the above information the movements of non-Japanese ocean-going vessels within Japanese waters when such movements are known to them.

MEMORANDUM TO: Major General R. F. Eavis

SUBJECT: Financing Ship Surveillance Program

1. Purpose of this memorandum is to inform G2 that the reporting service rendered by Japanese Maritime Bureau under Ship Surveillance Program is continuing per verbal agreement reached at a conference held on 30 April 1952, and to summarize the action taken by Security Division to date.

2. References:

a. CINCPAC letter AG 350.09 subject: "Establishment of Shipping Surveillance Intelligence Center," dated 1 September 1950, directed COMNAVFE to establish a Theater Shipping Surveillance for the collection, collation, coordination and consolidation on results of air, surface, submarine, coast watcher and radar reconnaissance and surveillance of the Far East Command. The letter further provided for the utilization of Japanese Maritime Safety Agencies (thru PSD, G2, GHQ); 441st CIC Det and PFAF to assist in the Ship Surveillance Reporting Program.

b. COMNAVFE letter to CINCPAC Serial 0050h, File CNFE/All subject: "Proposed Action by the Japanese Government Concerning the Submission of Japanese Shipping Information", dated 8 March 1952, gave the background on the conference between Mr. Yoshiyuki and Mr. Sawa of the Maritime Bureau, that the ship surveillance reporting service furnished to Hq, PFC of a cost of 40,000,000 per annum would have to discontinue after 1 April 1952, due to lack of funds (this date was later extended to midnight 30 April 1952). Since information furnished is of great value to COMNAVFE in carrying out its mission, COMNAVFE requested that this service continue after the Peace Treaty.

3. Conferences

On 13 March 1952, Col Ewert, Mr. Wheeler and Mr. Hashima, Security Division conferred with Mr. Kizura, the Attorney General on this matter. The meeting resulted in agreement that both sides would examine all possibilities for continuing the service.

On 2 April 1952, conference between the representatives of GHQ (Col Ewert, Lt Col Bochnowski, Mr. Wheeler and Mr. Hashima, Security Division, G2; Lt Cdr Sullivan COMNAVFE, Lt Col Stitt Signal Sect GHQ) and representatives of the Japanese Maritime Safety Bureau (Mr. Yoshiyuki, Mr. Sawa, Mr. Kanikuni) was held for the purpose of discussing the cost to the US Government to maintain the surveillance now rendered by the Japanese in reporting the location of ships along the coasts of Japan. Lt Cdr Sullivan explained to the group what information COMNAVFE needed in the reporting the movement of domestic trade vessels, Japanese-owned ocean-going vessels and foreign vessels. Lt Col Stitt requested that certain technical data be furnished so that the estimate of the cost of maintaining this reporting service could be made by the Signal Corps engineers.

On 3 April 1952, Security Division furnished Signal Section schematic diagram of the telephone system and the geographical location of the reporting stations used in the Ship Surveillance Program.

On 7 April 1952, Col Stitt, Signal Section informed Security Division that the technical aspects of providing telephone communications for a

continuation of the Ship Surveillance Reporting Program had been worked out with the Japanese officials. Col Stitt further stated: "Utilizing leased circuits available to the military and using Japanese commercial circuits only when leased circuits are not available, it is estimated that the cost of this service can be reduced from the Japanese estimate of ¥40,000,000 per annum to an estimated ¥17,400,000."

On 14 April 1952, Lt Col Bochnowski contacted Lt Col Barton, office of the Comptroller, to see what administrative steps would have to be taken to pay for this service. Lt Col Barton stated that the funds are available for this type of service but the request for the funding would have to be formalized by Check Sheet from G2 to Trans Officer through Comptroller.

On 16 April 1952, Lt Col Bochnowski conferred with Major Donovan, Signal Section, and Mr. Yoshiyuki, Sawa, and Goichiro of Japanese Maritime Safety Bureau to discuss the necessary steps to implement the recommendation of the Signal Section. Mr. Yoshiyuki stated that the plan as outlined above was feasible but since the civilian Merchant Marine Committee was dissolved it will become necessary to hire eight people at a cost of ¥104,000 per month to handle part of the required information previously furnished by the above committee. It was agreed that this cost could be included as part of the service. The conferees then agreed that the Japanese would continue reporting service until 1 May 1952, and that Major Donovan would work out the necessary technical details to put the revised program into action.

On 18 April 1952, G2 in a Check Sheet to the Transportation Officer thru Comptroller, Subject: "Financing Ship Surveillance Reporting Program" requested that the Transportation officer make necessary financial arrangements to reimburse the Japanese Government for services rendered under this program.

On 28 April 1952, Mr. Speer, Transportation Section informed Lt Col Bochnowski that the negotiations to reimburse the Japanese Government have been completed based on the plan outlined to G2 by the Signal Section, and that a contract will soon be signed.

In check sheet to G2 dated 29 April 1952, Subject: "Communications for Japanese Maintenance Bureau" Signal Section stated "1. There appears to be no authority under the Security Treaty between the United States and Japan, the Administrative Agreement concluded between those two Governments, and contracts between the United States and the Ministry of Telecommunications, whereby telecommunications facilities and services furnished by that Ministry to the United States Forces, Japan can be placed at the disposal of the Japanese Ministry of Transportation or its local Maritime Bureau offices. 2. Any telecommunications facilities and services required by the Ministry of Transportation to obtain information for the United States Forces, Japan should be procured by that Ministry from the Ministry of Telecommunications".

In view of the above, Security Division called a conference between representatives of Hqs and Japanese Government at 1030 hrs 30 April 1952, to resolve this matter. Present at this conference were: Lt Col Bochnowski, G2; Lt Col Stitt, Major Donovan and Mr. C.A. Feisner, Signal Section; Lt Cdr Sullivan, COMNAVPE; Mr. Speer, Transportation Section and Mr. Sawa and Kanekuni of Maritime Bureau, Ministry of Transportation and Mr. Takahashi. It was decided that since the Signal Section could not implement the program utilizing leased military circuits the Ship Surveillance Reporting Program using Japanese commercial telephone facilities exclusively must continue. Because the present arrangements with the Japanese expired at 30 April 1952, the Japanese were asked to report the movement of ships in and about Japan as in the past with the assurance for payment of this service will be completed as soon as possible. Transportation Section representative was asked to inform the Japan Procurement Agency, JIC to cancel the current negotiations

with the Japanese Government based on Signal Section's plan and to re-negotiate with these people to pay for the service using the Japanese commercial telephone system exclusively effective 1 May 1952.

On 1 May 1952, Lt Col Bochnowski discussed this program with Lt Col Barton, office of the Comptroller. Lt Col Barton stated that since this information was necessary it will be paid for but since COMNAVFE has the primary responsibility for this program, the cost of it should be taken out of the Navy's share of U.S. Forces yen fund.

At 1100 hrs. 1 May 1952, Security Division contacted Lt Comdr Sullivan to inform him of the situation and recommended that their Fiscal officer, Lt Comdr Emerson get in touch with Lt Col Barton to discuss the financing of Shipping Surveillance Reporting Program.

2 May 1952, Lt Comdr Sullivan informed Lt Col Bochnowski that Lt Comdr Emerson had discussed above matter with Lt Col Barton. Lt Comdr Sullivan requested that Security Division furnish COMNAVFE with the background information on this subject. Copies of the Memorandums for Records of the conferences held to date were hand carried to Lt Comdr Sullivan and COMNAVFE was informed that the Japan Procurement Agency, JIC is now carrying on negotiations with the Japanese to pay the full cost of program and that Mr. Alexander representative of the above agency estimated that cost would be approximately 58,600,000 yen per annum.

4. Security Division thru Lt Col Bochnowski will keep in touch with all parties concerned and will keep G2 informed.

Armed Forces and using Japanese Commercial circuits when leased circuits are not available, this service can be continued by the Japanese Maritime Bureau subsequent to the Peace Treaty at an estimated cost of ¥18,648,000 per annum.

4. Since the information furnished through this service is vital to the security of U. S. Security Forces stationed in Japan, it is requested that necessary financial arrangements be made to reimburse the Japanese Government for the services rendered under the Ship Surveillance Reporting Program, effective on the day following the ratification of the Peace Treaty but not later than 1 May 1952. This matter has been informally discussed with Lt Colonel D. C. Barton, Office of the Comptroller, General Headquarters, who indicated that funds are available to pay for this project.

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MEMO FOR RECORD: Ref la was a directive fr CINCFE to COMNAVFE to establish a Theater Shipping Surveillance Center for the collection, collation, coordination & consolidation of rpts on results of air, surface, submarine, coast watcher and radar search reconnaissance of the Far East Command. This ltr further provided for the utilization of Jpse Maritime Safety Agencies (thru PSD, G2, GHQ); 441st CIC Det & FEAF to assist in the Ship Surveillance Rptg Program.

Ref lb gives the background on the conference between Mr. Yoshiyuki & Mr. Sawa of the Maritime Bureau, Ministry of Transportation & representatives of COMNAVFE at which the Jpse officials explained that ship surveillance rptg svc would have to discontinue after 1 Apr 52 due to lack of funds (this date was later extended to the day following ratification of Peace Treaty). Since the info furnished by the Maritime Bureau is of great value to the Shipping Surveillance Intel Center in carrying out its mission as prescribed in ref la, COMNAVFE rqsts that this svc be continued after the ratification of the Peace Treaty.

On 13 Mar 52, Col Ewert, Mr. Wheeler & Mr. Hashima, SctyDiv, conferred w/Mr. Kimura, the Attorney General, on the possibility of continuing ship rptg svc by the Jpse Maritime Bureau due to be abandoned because of lack of funds. The meeting resulted in agreemt that Mr. Sawa of the Maritime Bureau would examine all possibilities fr the Jpse side to see how & in what manner the svc could be continued & we would examine from our side the possibility of cutting in on or using Army lines.

On 2 Apr 52 a conference btwn GHQ representative (Col Ewert, Lt Col Bochnowski, Mr. Wheeler & Mr. Hashima, SctyDiv, G2; Lt Cmdr Sullivan COMNAVFE & Lt Col Stitt, Sig Sec, GHQ together w/Jpse Maritime Bureau representatives (Mr. Yoshiyuki, Chief of Overseas Trade Sec, Mr. Sawa & Mr. Kanekuni, Assts to Chief of Overseas Trade Sec for the purpose of discussing the cost to the US Govt to maintain the svc now rendered by the Jpse in rptg the location of ships along the coasts of Japan. General Williams, GHQ Comptroller, had indicated that the cost of this project could be paid out of Army funds. Lt Cmdr Sullivan explained to the group what info COMNAVFE wanted in the rptg of the movemts of domestic trade vessels, Jpse-owned ocean-going vessels and foreign vessels. Lt Col Stitt rqstd that certain technical data be furnished so that estimate of cost of maintaining this rptg svc could be made by the Sign Corps engrs. Mr. Yoshiyuki replied that his agency would furnish G2 the nec info.

On 3 Apr 52, Lt Col Bochnowski handcarried a schematic diagram of the telephone system used in rptg the movemts of ships by the Jpse & map showing the geographical location of the rptg stations.

On 7 Apr 52, Col Stitt, Sign Sec, informed Scty Div that the technical aspects of providing telephone communications for a continuation of the Ship Surveillance Rptg Program had been worked w/Jpse officials, Maritime Transportation Bureau. Col Stitt further stated: "Utilizing leased circuits available to the mil & using Jpse commercial circuits only when leased circuits are not aval, it is estimated the cost of this svc can be reduced fr the Jpse estimate of ¥40,000,000 per annum to an estimated ¥17,400,000.

On 14 Apr 52, Lt Col Bochnowski contacted Lt Col Barton, office of the Comptroller, to see what administrative steps would have to be taken to pay for the svc. Lt Col Barton stated that funds are available for this type of svc but the request for the funding would have to be formalized by Check Sheet from G2 to Trans Officer thru Comptroller.

On 16 Apr 52 Lt Col Bochnowski conferred with Maj Donovan, Sig Sec, GHQ, and Mr. Yoshiyuki, Sawa, and Goichiro of Maritime Bureau to discuss the necessary steps to implement the recommendation of Sig Sec. Mr. Yoshiyuki stated that the plan as outlined above was feasible but since the civilian Merchant Marine Committee was dissolved which previously handled part of the required information, this necessitated the hiring of eight (8) additional people to meet our needs, at a cost of ¥104,000 per month. It was agreed that this cost be included as part of the svc. The conferees then agreed that the Jpse would continue the reporting svc until day after the ratification of peace treaty but not later than 1 May 52 & that Maj Donovan would work out the necessary technical details with Jpse to put the revised program in effect.

This C/N requests the allocation of the necessary funds to carry out Shipping Surveillance Program.

1. It is desired that you establish, with the least practicable delay, a Theater Shipping Surveillance Intelligence Center. Such Center will collect, collate, coordinate, evaluate, and make consolidated reports on the results of the air, surface, submarine, coast watcher, radar search reconnaissance and surveillance of the Far East Command.

2. Personnel problems involved in the establishment of such a Center are understood and appreciated, however, the value of such a Center in the overall program for the security of the Far East Command makes these problems of minor concern. It is not anticipated that this Shipping Surveillance Center will require large numbers of personnel. Air Force experience indicates that such a Center can be operated effectively by utilizing existing Army, Navy and Air communications, supplemented where necessary by Japanese telecommunication facilities.

3. All possible assistance in the establishment of this Center and coordination necessary for the performance of its mission will be rendered by this Headquarters and FEARF, subject only to limitations imposed by existing policy and the demands of the Korean situation.

4. Specifically, the various cooperating agencies are directed to assist as follows:

a. G2 GHQ: To provide, in coordination with your designated representative, a plan for the utilization of:

(1) Maritime Safety Agencies (thru FSD) to supply information on Japanese shipping.

(2) CIC (thru the CO 441st CIC Det) to recheck reports and evaluate reporting individuals and/or media.

b. CG FEARF (thru A2, FEARF): To formulate, in conference with your designated representative, a workable plan for the provision of:

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AG 350.09(1 Sep 50)GB, subj: Establishment of Shipping Surveillance Center

(1) Flights for reconnaissance repeats, rechecks, and shadowing or trailing missions.

(2) Pertinent de-briefing reports of shorebased aircraft crews.

(3) Necessary technical personnel on a TDY basis, subject only to the urgent need of the Korean situation.

c. Civil Transportation Section: To devise and plan, with a designated Shipping Center representative, a system for the provision of information on the movement of overseas shipping; and upon the establishment of a proposed indigenous center, a plan for the supply of information on Japanese coastal shipping.

1. On 5 March 1952, Mr. I. YOSHIYUKI and Mr. Y. SAWA, of the Maritime Transportation Bureau, Ministry of Transportation, called at the Headquarters of Commander Naval Forces, Far East and presented the following information:

a. Commencing 1 April 1952, the Ministry of Transportation will be unable to submit its daily report of Coastwise Movements of Japan-est vessels to the Transportation Section, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander Allied Powers, because of budget limitations. The budget of 40,000,000 Yen, for the reserved telephone system, over which the Ministry collects the information used in its report, has not been approved by the Japanese Government for fiscal 1952 (1 April 1952 to 31 March 1953). The report will be discontinued only because of lack of funds; personnel problems are not involved. The gentlemen also advised that this would affect the reporting of overseas movements as well as coastal movements.

b. The above mentioned gentlemen stated that this subject was discussed with the Transportation Section, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander Allied Powers, in December 1951, at which time representatives of the Ministry were told that after the Peace Treaty was ratified, the Transportation Section would have no further interest in subject reporting.

c. The procedure proposed by the Transportation Ministry subsequent to 1 April 1952 is for Branch offices (approximately 20 of them) to forward reports by mail every 10 or 15 days to a Central office in Tokyo where reports would be consolidated at the end of each month.

2. Subject reports furnish the Theatre Shipping Surveillance Intelligence Center of this Headquarters with information concerning the

movements of Japanese vessels in the waters in the vicinity of the Japanese Islands, as well as information pertaining to departures and arrivals from overseas ports. This information is of great value to the Shipping Surveillance Intelligence Center if it is to effectively carry out its mission as prescribed in reference (a). In the light of the current international situation and in the interests of the mutual defense commitments envisaged in the U. S.-Japan Security Pact, it appears reasonable that the Japanese Government should furnish to appropriate U. S. authorities current and accurate information on the movements of Japanese vessels in Far Eastern waters.

3. It is therefore requested that appropriate representations be made to the Japanese Government to insure the continuation after 1 April 1952, of an effective system of centralized collection of current information on the movements of Japanese ocean-going vessels, such information to be compiled daily and furnished to Commander Naval Forces, Far East either directly or through such channels as Commander in Chief, Far East may direct. The scope and type of information furnished should be similar to that being supplied at present.

4. When the Japanese Peace Treaty becomes effective and the control of all commercial ports reverts to the Japanese Government, it is anticipated that a further request will be initiated by Commander Naval Forces, Far East, through appropriate channels to the effect that the Japanese Government include in the above information the movements of non-Japanese ocean-going vessels within Japanese waters when such movements are known to them.

SUBJECT: US Medicines and Medical Supplies Captured
from North Korean Troops

BACKGROUND

1. Medicines and medical supplies of US make have been found on captured North Korean troops, according to an Army message of late November or early December 1951. This information came from an OIT licensing officer who, however, has been unable to locate the message which he personally had seen. The captured materials were not further identified.

2. It is known that before the US embargo on exports to Communist China, inquiries from that country and Hong Kong were received for fantastically large quantities of antibiotics, sulfa drugs, and other medicines. Many of these items of US origin continue to appear on manifests of ships leaving Hong Kong for China.

3. Because of lack of definite proof of such transshipments, it is futile to deny export licenses, as in nine cases out of ten the Appeals Board reverses the decisions.

4. OIT states that if the lot numbers on the captured medicine vials could be obtained, they could be traced back to the US manufacturer and the exporter, and thus provide conclusive evidence to support denial of future export license applications.

REQUIREMENT

1. Obtain the lot numbers of antibiotics and sulfa drugs of US manufacture captured from North Koreans, either by procurement of the actual containers or vials, or by taking legible photographs of them. The information should contain all data useful in identifying US source and exact shipment.

1. G2, EUSAK notes that CIA has been duplicating much of the markings work already done by Army; that the CIA personnel who came to the FEC on this program apparently knew nothing of the Army technical intelligence collection activities. EUSAK concludes that the need for more effective exchange of information requires no further comment, and recommends that this matter be forwarded to G2, DA, with our comments.

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2. Since the comments of EUSAK will be partially rectified by the FEC Technical Intelligence School; the proposed revision of the FEC Technical Intelligence Target Book; the proposed revision of the FEC Technical Intelligence Markin s Collection Guide; and the issuance of FEC Technical Intelligence Collection Directive number 1, it is recommended that G2, FEC file this document for the time being.

a. Smuggling activities to and from the following areas, to include identity of individuals and organizations engaged, goods and persons smuggled, facilities used, and sanction (if any) of government concerned:

- (1) Japan and the Maritime Military District of the USSR.
- (2) Northeast Korea and the Maritime Military District of the USSR.
- (3) Northeast Korea and Japan.
- (4) The China Coast and Japan.
- (5) Northeast Korea and China.

b. Individuals, groups and illegal activities in North Korea, to include the following:

- (1) Outstanding personalities, functions, movements and illegal activities of Soviet nationals.
- (2) Activities, location, original homes, and restriction on activities and movements of refugees.
- (3) Designation, composition, location and anti-government and/or anti-Soviet activities of dissident individuals or groups, to include causes of dissatisfaction.
- (4) Black-marketing, bribery, prostitution, illegal movement and other illegal activities.

c. Restrictions along Korean-Soviet and Korean-Manchurian borders, to include:

- (1) Location and size of restricted areas.
- (2) Nature of restrictions.

- (3) Type, volume and direction of border traffic.
- (4) Authorized border crossing points and documentation required for crossing.
- (5) Measures taken to effect security of restricted areas, to include location and size of guard details.


