The maximum number of marks obtainable for this paper will be six to each question, or 120 in all; and the minimum required to obtain a certificate of having passed will be 96 marks. "This being premised, any Graduste in Law of the University will receive a Sunnud as Pleader, without further examination before the Sudder Adawlut, provided that he produce with his application, the certificate of a Government Examination Committee, that he has passed an examination (involving the test of an Interpreter's Examination) in the language of the District in which he seeks to practise as a Pleader, unless his proficiency in such language should be guaranteed by a University ecrificate.

These Rules, which we doubt not will be strictly carried out, will produce a greatly improved class of Pleaders, very superior in character and acquirements to what we have hitherto had. Amongst the Pleaders in the shrewd men, but few possessing any literary or legal acquirements. This was an action brought to recover Rs. 232 for ground rent due by defendant to plaintiff from 11th November 1858 to 10th November 1861, at the rate of Rs. 77-5 per year. The ground in question is situated at Malabar Hill, and is called Ambarwaddy, and belongs to the plaintiff who had purchased it in 1858 from one Poottoba Dadoba; and the defendant is the lessee, holding two leases both dated 1848. Defendant resisted the payment of the rent on the ground that the road attached to the land had not been kept in a state of repair as was required by a covenant in the lease. Two or three witnesses were examined on behalf of the plaintiff to shew that the other lesses were satisfied with the state of the road and that they paid rents without any objection. At this stage Dr. Reid consented to a verdict in favour of the plaintiff, and obtained the Court's sanction to file a cross action against the plaintiff within a fortnight for breach of covenant in not having repaired the road.

Verdict for plaintiff and Costs.

A MARWADEE TRICK.—A Marwaree money-lender who had sued an old Mahomedan woman on a promissary note was fined fifteen Rupees by the Second Judge for tampering with a witness who had been giving evidence in the box. OUR IRON-CLAD FRIGATES. (From the Times, December 3.)

In the article on this subject which appeared in our columns last week we stated that it was a great error to suppose that all our built ironsides were like the Warrior. We venture now to point out another error which is also very general—namely, that of estimating the whole of our iron frigates, whether building or built, as an already effective fleet. Now, the fact is that at least 20 months from the present date must elapse before 4 of our finest vessels—the Minotaur, the Achilles. The Captain, and the Northumberland, are even afloat; and we learn from the experience of the Warrior that, even using the greatest speed in equipment, it would be at least six months from that time before they could be ready for commission. The truth is that our iron fleet is much deficient in numbers as compared with that of the French. The great size and enormous massiveness of our vessels render the building of them a very slow process. It is the knowledge of this that makes us anxious to see more of them in hand, and we should hear with unmixed satisfaction that the Admiralty had carried out the intention they expressed this autumn of calling for tenders for the construction of three more, in addition to those now building. The four really iron ships now being constructed (for we do not include in this category either the Bulwark or the Royal Oak at Chatham, which are merely wooden two-deckers cut down to be plated with iron, on the French system) are what are called the "improved Warriors," whose names we have already given. Every improvement which it is now seen that the Warrior requires these ships will possess, while, on the other hand, they will be free from all her defects, especially that most important one of construction, which leaves the stem and stern vulnerable to shot.
