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THE PRESENT MISAPPLICATION OF POOR LAW RELIEF.

JUST forty years ago there was a great reform in the administration of the English poor law. It had been shown by a most careful investigation that the former system of administration was pernicious, that it lessened wages, that it demoralised the recipient, and that it pauperised the poor ratepayers. The time was one of suffering and anxiety; a great alarm was felt, and a vigorous struggle was made to resist the evil. And for a time the amendment was remarkable. All the worst evils were lessened and a corresponding good produced. The authors of the reform hoped that it would be permanent. But, unhappily, since then our prosperity has been great and our fears have been lulled, and in consequence the worst practices of the old law have revived upon us with a rapidity and in an intensity which few are aware of.

An elaborate report on the system of poor law relief in the southern counties (by Mr Woodhouse, a poor-law inspector) has just been published by the local Government board, and its contents will dishearten our older readers, who remember former efforts, and who have little idea how far their beneficial results have passed away. The habit of very general, if not of indiscriminate, outdoor relief—the practice formerly most condemned, and that which was thought to have least to say for itself—has again fixed itself over a wide area and in great magnitude. The poor-law inspector tells us "that the workhouse," the legal alternative to illegal outdoor relief, "is no longer offered." "That the workhouse, however, is not offered so frequently as it ought to be, I am convinced not only by the statistics relating to the numbers of indoor and outdoor paupers, but from my own personal observation of the proceedings of the guardians in this respect, and from the inquiries which I have made upon the subject. It has been stated that the outdoor paupers throughout England are to the indoor in the proportion of eight to one. In many of the unions, however, which I visited the preponderance of persons in receipt of out relief over those maintained in the workhouse is far greater. Thus, to take the three unions, which in the first week of February, 1871, exhibited the highest rate of pauperism in the county of Devonshire, viz., Tiverton, Axminster, and Honiton. In the Tiverton Union at that date the percentage of pauperism upon the population, according to the census of 1861, was 8·5 per cent., in Axminster 8·4 per cent., and in Honiton 8·2 per cent. In the Tiverton Union there were on the last day of that week 111 paupers in the workhouse and 2,544 in receipt of out relief; in the Axminster Union there were 145 in the house and 1,518 receiving out relief; and in the Honiton Union the numbers were 90 indoor, against 1,780 outdoor paupers. In the Axminster Union, therefore, less than 8 per cent. of the pauperism was at that date relieved in the workhouse, and in the Tiverton and Honiton Unions less than 5 percent. Again, taking the expenditure in these unions for the year ended at Lady-day, 1869, I find that out of every 100 expended upon the relief of the poor during that year, 85*l* in the Axminster Union, 92*l* in the Tiverton Union, and 93*l* in the Honiton Union were spent upon out relief. The presumption raised by these statistics, that the workhouse test is not used so frequently as it ought to be, was further confirmed by my own observation and the infor-

"mation I received on the subject, not only in the unions "which I have mentioned, but in a very large number of those "which I visited. In some unions the guardians acknowledg'd that although relief in the workhouse only was "offered to persons of known bad character, yet the house was "not often made use of as a test of destitution, and in many "others in which the guardians professed to apply the work- "house test for this purpose it appeared to me from my own "observation of the cases disposed of on the day of my visit "that out-relief was granted in many cases in which the "workhouse might properly have been offered. At Yeovil "the chairman, who had been a guardian for thirty-four "years, informed me that in that union the workhouse test "was not applied nearly so frequently as was formerly the "case. At Plymouth I ascertained that during the six months "preceding my visit out of about 600 cases disposed of by the "guardians in one relief district, orders for admission into "the workhouse were given in fifteen cases upon the applica- "tion of the paupers, while the guardians offered the work- "house as a test in eleven other cases, in not one of which "was it accepted."

Yet the bad consequences of this system are just now what they were formerly.

First, it enables the worst class of employers to obtain labour at a much less price than they otherwise would. Mr Longley, a local Government inspector, who has reported very ably on Poor Law administration in London, tells us of a case "which occurred in his presence." "A widow, who applied for a renewal of out-relief, stated that her occupation was to clean an office in which she lived rent free, though she received no wages for her work. The relieving officer told the guardians, as indeed was evident, "that 'her relief paid her wages,' and that 'if it were dis- continued her employer must pay her.' The relief, how- ever, was renewed."

Secondly, it reduces most the wages of the poorest and those who can least bear reduction. The same authority tells us of a case where "A chairman of a Board of Guardians, addressing a widow with two children applying for renewal of relief, said, 'If you can't earn enough to keep you with what we give you, you must come into the workhouse, we don't profess to give enough to keep you out of the work- house.' In another case the view of the guardians was thus frankly explained to me by one of their number:—"Relief in aid is our principle for out-relief, we can only give adequate relief in the workhouse."

Naturally it is female labour, and the less efficient kinds of male labour, which are exposed to this system. Strong artisans do not ask for it or think of it; and the consequence on the class affected, we are told, may be judged of by the following typical case:—"A woman states that she earns from 3s to 4s per week, and that she pays 2s 6d a week in rent; the weekly relief awarded her, by way of compromise, will be 1s 6d or 2s, and a loaf of bread, upon which, together with the balance of her earnings, it is all but im- possible that she can exist."

The system fastens on the kind of labour now worst paid, and prevents it from receiving more than the minimum which will support life.

Thirdly, we thus encourage thriftlessness and improvidence in ways too obvious to point out at length.

Fourthly, it pauperises the poorer ratepayer, for in the end it leads to an expense which he cannot defray. There is indeed an idea that outdoor relief saves money, and there would be an augmented cost if the law were strictly enforced, and if the able-bodied poor were required to go into workhouse. But Mr Woodhouse tells us from his experience:—"As regards the argument which proceeds upon the ground of economy, I believe that its fallacy may be very readily shown by a simple arithmetical process. That argument, stated in its simplest form, is as follows:—A family applies for relief; if they are given out-relief to the amount of four shillings a week, they will be satisfied; if they come into the workhouse, their maintenance will cost ten shillings a week. The economists therefore argue, that by giving out-relief they will save six shillings a week. Now the very same guardians, who have used this argument, have frequently acknowledged to me, that when the workhouse test is offered, it is not accepted in more than one case out of ten. By offering the workhouse then in ten such cases

"the guardians would indeed lose six shillings a week in the one case in which it was accepted, but in each of the remaining nine cases they would save four shillings, so that their total gain upon the ten cases would amount to thirty shillings a week. I believe, however, that transparent as the fallacy is, this mistaken notion of economy lies at the root of a large proportion of the out-relief at present given throughout the country, and that if the guardians were generally convinced of the fallacy of the argument employed, they would be more willing than they are at present to make a proper application of the workhouse test."

In fact, there is a possibility that the due administration of the law may produce a large augmentation of cost, and therefore the guardians will not risk it, though they know that this large augmentation is most improbable, and that general outdoor relief is sure to cause much outlay. They fear the possibility of the larger expenditure, but they do not fear to incur the lesser, though its effect is certain, and in the long run it becomes far more. A commercial firm thus managed would very soon have to be wound up.

We fear that in rural districts the Union Chargeability Bill is not working well. Mr Woodhouse reports on this as follows:—"There cannot in the first place fail to be instances in which a guardian, well acquainted with the circumstances of some case from his own parish, is tempted to divest himself of his judicial character as a member of the Board, and, assuming that of an advocate of the applicant, to urge some relaxation of the mode in which the guardians would, under ordinary circumstances, deal with the case. His brother guardians are, in the absence of the pauper, unable to support their own views by questioning him, and ascertaining his condition for themselves, and being compelled to rely solely upon the report of the relieving officer, and the opinion which has been expressed by the guardian of the parish, give way against their better judgment, and assent to the relief which he has proposed. The guardian, whose views have thus been adopted, is naturally willing to assent to the wishes of each of his brother guardians in turn under similar circumstances, and thus, without being consciously actuated by any improper motives, Boards of Guardians are constantly led to depart in practice from what they would in theory acknowledge to be sound principles of poor law administration. At a meeting of a Board of Guardians, which I attended in an agricultural union in the West of England, I took occasion to call their attention to the exceptionally high rate of pauperism which prevailed in their Union, and to several points which appeared to me objectionable in their mode of administering relief. A large number of guardians were present, and in the course of the discussion which ensued, one member of the board stated it as his belief that the large majority of the guardians agreed individually with what I had said, and were prepared to assent to the principles which I had endeavoured to enforce, 'but somehow,' he added, 'when we come to act as a board, we don't carry them out.' None of the other guardians expressed any dissent from this statement, and I have no reason to doubt that it was correct."

In former times the paupers of each parish were chargeable on that parish only, and then the guardian for that parish who knew them applied all his mind and all his knowledge to prove that they ought not to come upon the rates; but now the charge of the paupers is distributed over the whole union, so that each guardian only thinks of getting the people of his own parish helped in the way they most wish to be helped, and in so burdening the funds of the whole union, the representative of each parish aids all the others.

The only comfort which these reports give us is that the magnitude of the evil seems in some places to be working its own cure. People are beginning to be alarmed at it, and to take steps to lessen if not remove it. In some parts of London a considerable reform has already been effected. By taking advantage of a fairly, though not extraordinarily favourable moment, the guardians of a single union at the East End have reduced the number of paupers receiving out-of-door relief in the following extraordinary manner:—

If so much can be done by care and watchfulness at the East End of London, where there are many poor and few resident rich to attend to them, surely more might be done in such districts as the West End, where the rich are comparatively many, or in the rural districts, where the poor are comparatively few.

MR BUTT'S PROPOSAL FOR IRELAND.

On Tuesday we are to have a field night on Home Rule, and it is not improbable that Mr Disraeli will deliver his "historic conscience" of an oration criticising the aspirations of the Irish patriots. Mr Butt is to propose "that this House resolve itself into a committee of the whole House to consider the present Parliamentary relations between Great Britain and Ireland;" and should his motion be carried, which of course it will not be, he will then further move in committee of the whole House, "that it is expedient and just "to restore to the Irish nation the right and power of "arranging all exclusively Irish affairs in an Irish Parliament;" "that provision should be made at the same time for maintaining the integrity of the Empire and the connection "between the countries by reserving to this Imperial Parliament full and exclusive control over all Imperial affairs." In other words, Mr Butt is proposing to make of Great Britain and Ireland a Federation such as that of the United States, with this great difference, that the States of the Union are numerous enough and powerful enough to prevent any monopoly of power by any one State; but in such a federation as is proposed between a people of over twenty-six millions, and a people of little more than five, the centre of gravity of the federation could hardly fail to be so very much nearer to the greater power, that the less would be always complaining of its nonentity in the combination. That was the reason why O'Connell, and after O'Connell Mr Duffy and his party, always steadily objected to the solution of the problem which Mr Butt now advocates. What they wanted was something much nearer the legislative and administrative independence of a colony than the legislative and administrative independence of one State unequally yoked with another of nearly five times its population, and much more than five times its wealth. But Mr Butt has seen the difficulty and inexpediency of proposing a measure which would exclude Irishmen from any part in Imperial affairs. That is not a sacrifice which Irishmen are any longer prepared to make for the sake of mere local independence. Consequently Mr Butt is obliged to propose the very unsatisfactory *tertium quid* of an unequal federation, to which he will find it exceedingly difficult to give the sound even of a plausible proposal in addressing the House of Commons on Tuesday.

For, in the first place, it can hardly be said that the Irish are accomplished in the arts of Parliamentary Government, while Mr Butt's scheme would require them to be very highly accomplished in that art, since it would demand of them *two* efficient bodies of parliamentary representatives, one to conduct their own affairs at home, and one to hold the balance between different English parties, in dealing with Imperial affairs at Westminster. How can even Mr Butt credit Ireland with the resources for two efficient Parliaments? And yet this is of the very essence of his proposal. Nothing is more difficult than Parliamentary Government, and nothing more easy to bring into discredit.

Neither France nor Germany can be said to have shown any great capacity for developing an efficient Parliamentary Government. Germany's Government is not really Parliamentary at all, and that of France, though Parliamentary, is at the present moment, from whatever causes, nearly as bad as it could be. Has Ireland ever given us reason to expect that she would succeed any better? The one Parliamentary Government she ever had was one of the worst and most corrupt of all Governments. No doubt it was a Government of caste and privilege. It was not a national Parliament which governed Ireland, but the Parliament of a small minority of the Irish people. Still, badly as that worked for the privileged caste, it is not doubtful that that privileged caste contained much the largest proportion of the political genius and tact of Ireland, and that a truly national Parliament, though probably much more disposed to do justice, would have had much less intellectual capacity of judging how best to do it. As far as can be judged from the representatives whom Ireland now sends up to Parliament, the intellectual calibre of a national Irish Parliament would be far inferior to the calibre of the Parliaments which the ruling caste in former days sent up. Yet two such Parliaments are necessary to Mr Butt's scheme: one to rule Ireland on behalf of the Irish, and one to give expression to Irish wishes in the affairs of the Empire. Could such a scheme result in the alleviation of misrule in Ireland, or would it not rather result in an enormous multiplication of Irish grievances? The gift of Parliamentary wisdom and sagacity is a rare one. Nothing would be less likely to result in order, among many, perhaps most, peoples, than government by public meeting. In Ireland especially, where tempers are hot and creeds violently contrasted, where two races exist which amalgamate almost as ill as the two religions, where, thanks greatly to British mis-government, suspicion, that disease of the Celtic race, is always active, where there is much wit and little patience, much impulse and little deliberation, we can hardly conceive an attempt more likely to end in bloody discords than the government of local affairs by a local Parliament. Parliamentary government is a great instrument in the hands of a people who can go through much and feel little, who care enough about politics to be earnest, but hardly enough to be ferocious, who take a great deal to make them angry, but a very little to make them attentive. But such a people the Irish certainly are not. On the contrary, they feel much when they go through little; often they will not care enough about politics to make them serious, and often, again, so much as to make them fierce; they are a people whom it will often take very little to make angry, and a great deal to make attentive. If an Irish Parliament were met to debate local affairs, we should expect a very early split between Catholics and Protestants, and very fierce quarrels between them, while the business of the Administration would be very frequently neglected. As far as any one can now judge, there is hardly a people in Europe less qualified to govern themselves well through a Parliament than the Irish people if left alone.

And if the proposed change would be bad for Ireland, for Great Britain it would be absurd. Conceive having to distinguish so elaborately between local and Imperial affairs in all things that a different body should be asked to consider the necessity of taxing the United Kingdom for the purposes of a foreign army, from that which would be consulted on the necessity of taxing Great Britain for the purposes of a British army to enforce authority when endangered in this island. Consider the problem which would arise as to the share which Ireland should take, for instance, in the expense of the postal service of the United Kingdom, or in the burden of the public debt. Imagine the contingencies in case the Protestants of Ireland appealed to the Federation for protection against their more numerous Catholic brethren, and the fierce strife which would spring up as to the right of the Imperial Government to put down civil war, or to prevent civil war in one of the federated States. Nothing less hopeful than a scheme of federation between Great Britain and Ireland can to our minds be suggested. It would mean a plan for crippling Great Britain and ruining Ireland, for promoting the fiercest encounters between us, for fomenting civil strife there and bitter partisanship here, for undoing all that has been well done between the two countries, and for "cursing Ireland" with the burden of a "granted prayer."

THE REVENUE OF EGYPT.

WE have lately received copies of official statements which the Egyptian Government has prepared with reference to its financial position, as well as summaries of the same documents, which are of a semi-official character. These statements are almost professedly designed to supply deficiencies which we have from time to time pointed out in the published information respecting Egyptian finance, and we may now inquire what the new information amounts to.

The Egyptian Government, it will be recollect, since the introduction of the loan of last year, has published various documents. First there was a "budget" for the year 1873-4, which unluckily differed from a budget for the same year in the "*Statistique de l'Egypte*," without any explanation of the difference being volunteered, and which was itself in several points defective. Afterwards there was published a summary statement of the annual revenue for each of the last ten years, with a consolidated account of the expenditure for the same period, which did not, however, show what the expenditure in any particular year had been. All this, as we showed, was very insufficient. A detailed account of the actual receipts and expenditure in the latest year, showing the sources of receipt, and the objects on which the money received was spent, was one of the indispensables requisites to forming an opinion on the large borrowing operations which the Egyptian Government proposed. The documents now put forward are intended to supply the void we describe, as far as the revenue is concerned. There is still no attempt to show generally or in detail what the actual expenditure of any particular year has been; but accounts of the receipts by various branches of administration in the year 1872-3 are submitted. And so far these accounts cover a good deal of ground. The total revenue in the last budget was put at 10,000,000*l.*, and the accounts supplied give some sort of detail—in some cases considerable detail—as to eight out of these ten millions, viz.:—

Of the remaining two millions also, one-half million is professedly the estimate of a wholly new tax—the octroi on tobacco—so that the detailed statements before us really give information as to the bulk of the Egyptian revenue of last year. Owing to the want of details on the expenditure side, the materials are still most inadequate for a full discussion of the condition and prospects of Egyptian finance, but the general information on the subject, it may be admitted, has been increased by the present documents. A good deal more may certainly be known now as to Egyptian finance than was at all possible a year ago, though a great deal is still wanting.

We subjoin, at the foot of this article, the more important of the semi-official summaries of the documents which we have received. These summaries, it will be observed, comprise—(1) a statement of the direct taxes in Egypt per province, showing the aggregate received from each, and the various branches of receipt which make up that aggregate; (2) additional details as to four of these branches, viz., taxes upon land, tithes upon land, tithes upon date-trees, and trade licences; and (3) a summary of the accounts of the railway administration showing the net earnings. There is also a semi-official summary of the Customs receipts, which we do not publish in full, but have still farther compressed. From these summaries, and the fuller documents before us, it is possible to form some idea as to the sources of the Egyptian revenue.

(1) The direct taxes, exclusive of 287,000*l.* for trade licences and 272,000*l.* "miscellaneous," are practically a revenue from land in various shapes, the items being—

The taxable land in Egypt in the year in question, according to the tables subjoined, amounted to 4,712,000 feddans, or acres, and the possibility of comparing this acreage with the revenue yielded, is one of the first advantages of having detailed accounts. The aggregate amount comes to about 25*s* per acre, which does not appear impossible in a country where there is nothing between the State and the occupier of the soil and where land is so fertile as in Egypt. At any rate, those acquainted with Egypt will be able to show where errors exist, if any, and this the more easily on account of the full details supplied for each province. The chance of having such rectifications made was one of the most important reasons for calling for detailed accounts.

The items, when examined separately, supply farther matter for explanation, besides offering additional details for local criticism. The chief points are that the first two items—"taxes upon land" and "tithes upon land"—comprise what may be called the original land revenue; and that the third item—the Moukabala—is not only temporary in itself, but involves a gradual reduction of the other two items, which is, no doubt, a very important qualification of its nature. As regards the first two items, it is important to understand the distinction between them. The greater portion of the land of Egypt, it appears, or 3,467,570 out of a total of 4,711,868 acres, is subject to the ordinary tax, which is stated to be a tax in kind called "mal;" but there is another large portion, amounting to 1,244,298 acres, which is subjected to the *dime* or tithe, which is a much lighter tax. The average yield of the former per acre is 21*s* 2*d*, of the latter 6*s* 2*d*; so that in spite of the large amount of the tithe lands, (about one-third of the ordinary lands), the total yield of the latter is 3,668,000*l.*, or nearly ten times the yield of the tithe lands, which is only 385,000*l.* The distinction between ordinary and tithe lands is stated in the documents before us to be purely one of title arising from variations in the terms of the original grant from the State, and not from any difference in the quality of the lands affected; and the inference would accordingly be that if the ordinary lands are not oppressively burthened the tithe lands escape very easily indeed. But the point, so far as we can judge, is not cleared up with sufficient authority. The proportion of the rate of the tithe to the rate of the ordinary tax varies very much in different provinces, and there is room, we think, for a good deal of additional information as to the precise mode of levying the taxes, and the proportion of each to the value of the lands affected.

As regards the "Moukabala," the position of the Egyptian Government, as may be gathered from what we have said, is not altogether satisfactory. The sum put down on account of it is 1,576,000*l.*, or more than one-third of the original "taxes" and "tithes" upon land, and this is to cease in twelve years. According to the decree instituting it in 1871, permission was given to the taxpayers, though we suspect the permission was often practically in the nature of a command, to redeem one-half the tax by the payment of a sum equal to six times the amount of the tax, which sum could either be paid at once or by equal annual instalments extending over six years, a period which has since been extended to twelve. The Egyptian Government therefore, where this "permission" has been taken advantage of, sacrifices 50 per cent. of its land taxes for an annual payment during twelve years of an additional 50 per cent. The object was to extinguish the floating debt, and there could not be a better proof of the wasteful extremities to which the Egyptian Government was reduced, the result on the floating debt, moreover, having as yet been entirely inappreciable as the great loan of last year bears witness. As the Egyptian Government, besides, allows 8*½* per cent. interest on the amount of the instalments during the currency of the twelve years, the effect is that the original amount of the land taxes is reduced annually by a sum of 131,000*l.*, so that at the end of twelve years the Egyptian Government will not only lose the annual sum of 1,576,000*l.* now payable under the Moukabala arrangements, but will have gradually lost an equal annual amount, or about 3,000,000*l.* in all. This is evidently an arrangement to which only necessity would have compelled the Egyptian Government to submit. The actual case is not quite so bad as this, because the Egyptian loans have large sinking funds attached. If Egypt were to carry on for twelve years without new borrowing, the effect of the sinking funds would probably be such that even the loss of three millions from the present revenue of ten millions

might be contemplated without alarm. It is also quite true that whatever arrangements the Egyptian Government may make as to the land taxes, the wealth accruing to the landed proprietors by redeeming the taxes out of their annual income, will remain taxable; the three millions may be re-imposed in another form. But that Egypt will go on for twelve years without new borrowing is obviously a sanguine expectation, and there would no doubt be some difficulty in re-imposing taxes which have been abandoned under a compact like that of the Moukabala. The peculiarities of the Moukabala revenue are certainly such as to call for extreme care on the part of the Egyptian Government.

Of the other parts of the land revenue, the "tithes upon date trees" require very little comment. The total yield is small—only 182,000*l*—though of course the publication of full details will supply here, as in the more important items, the means of local criticism. The annuities on village debts are also a small item, and are of less importance as being terminable like the Moukabala, the annuities being, in fact, a repayment to the Government of advances which it made in former times of difficulty to the cultivators in the villages. As to the other items of direct revenue there is also little need to say anything, the amount being comparatively inconsiderable. As regards the trade licence taxes, the information as to the average charge per person in each province will be serviceable so far as it goes, but the information, to be complete, should be accompanied by an account of the rates of charge according to the species of classification of traders adopted.

(2.) The next great branch of receipts is the Customs, and the document before us happens to be the more interesting as containing a full account of one part of the expenditure. The gross yield of the Customs in 1872-3 is certified to be 620,000*l*, and the expense of collection was 35,000*l*, or about 6 per cent., which does not appear to be an insufficient charge, while it is not excessively costly compared with the charge for collection in other countries. These results are shown with great detail in the tables, the separate yield of each article liable to duty being specified, and there seems no room for doubting that the Egyptian Government really received in 1872-3 the revenue from customs which it says it got. The amounts yielded correspond nearly with the rates of duty and the estimated values of the imports and exports as separately published, and the only difference is that the nominal charge of 8 per cent. on the imports appears to be rather higher than what the real charge comes to according to the mode of levy adopted. The principal items of the import duties of 435,000*l* are "manufactures" 135,000*l* and "coals" 52,000*l*, and the principal other charges are also on manufactures of various kinds, though differently designated.

(3.) The last great branch of revenue shown in detail is that of the "railway administration," which seems to include the Government Telegraphs as well. The details as to the traffic and expenditure are very interesting. As to goods, what we may call the through freight from each station in the interior to Alexandria and other ports is shown with the utmost detail, and separately as regards cotton, grain, and other articles, while there is an equally detailed account of the local goods traffic and of the through traffic from the coast to the interior. As to passengers, there is also a full account of the numbers of each class travelling, besides other particulars, and the more miscellaneous receipts of the administration are also shown with similar detail. The semi-official summary which has been compiled, and which we subjoin, hardly does justice on this head to the completeness of the full account which is before us. The details as to the expenditure are also abundant, though some essential matters are in our opinion omitted. The final result is that there is a gross receipt of 1,478,264*l*, against an expenditure of 599,826*l*, which seems rather a small proportion of the receipts, being only 40½ per cent., so that the net receipts of 878,438*l* may, perhaps, rather exceed what ought to be considered as having been fairly earned. It appears, however, that, separating the railway receipts proper from the other matters included,

the proportion of working expenses would not be so small; and whatever the real proportion is, we should be inclined to admit that there is a large real revenue derivable from Egyptian Railways after all proper charges have been made for working and maintenance. The data for showing this exactly are, however, incomplete, as the accounts tell nothing as to the train mileage run, number of engines employed, and other matters essential to the full understanding of how a railway system is worked. We should be inclined to recommend the Egyptian Government to copy the forms of accounts which our own railway companies are legally compelled to use, and which throw some light on all these points. Meanwhile there can be no doubt that a gross income of about 1½ millions from such a property as its railways must leave the Egyptian Government a considerable net surplus, unless we are to suppose that the system is worked with entire recklessness.

Such is the extent of the information in the documents before us. It amounts to this, we think, that from the three branches of revenue dealt with—the direct taxes, the customs, and the railway administration—the Egyptian Government really derived in 1872-3, and may still derive annually, about 8,000,000*l*, which with the minor and miscellaneous items will bring its annual income up to and over 9,000,000*l*, irrespective of new taxes. About 1¼ millions of this amount is rather an anticipation of revenue than actual income belonging to the year, but there seems little doubt that about 9,000,000*l* in actual money is now drawn by the Egyptian Government from its subjects; and at least seven millions is revenue belonging to the year. This is much better than we should have expected beforehand from the way in which former budgets were drawn up, and from the immense deficits of the last ten years, which have led to incessant borrowings. Probably, too, the revenue may be capable of increase in some directions from new taxes; the estimate of the new octroi on tobacco, which was put down at half a million in the last budget, is alleged to be based on a moderate reckoning from the known imports, and probably something may come in from this source, though new taxes in oriental countries have often been so disappointing that we should distrust very much anything but actual results. But the information, it should be understood, does not go beyond the single point of the revenue. Our criticism on the omissions of former budgets in respect of the charge for the floating debt remains unaffected, and no account of the whole expenditure in a particular year has yet been shown. The presumption is that the revenue, however large it may have been, has been a long way insufficient for that expenditure, and it is impossible to prove, except by the accounts themselves, that the deficit in the latest years is caused by remunerative works. The Egyptian Government has done well in publishing the documents we have commented on, but it has still a great deal to publish before its financial position is satisfactorily cleared up. Even then the question would remain for investors as to how far a Government which has hitherto mismanaged so grossly, which is oriental in its nature, and which depends so much on the character of the ruler for the time being, can be trusted to continue in a safe financial course, but its position would no doubt be better than it was when doubts as to its character were aggravated by the complete concealment of its accounts.

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BUSINESS NOTES.

THE REVENUE.—The last weekly return of the revenue and expenditure brings our information as to the revenue down to within ten days of the close of the quarter, and the period that has elapsed is long enough to let us see whether during a considerable portion of the financial year the anticipations of the Chancellor of the Exchequer are being fulfilled. It seems hardly doubtful now that these anticipations have so far not been exceeded. Taking the three large items of revenue which it is useful to compare in such matters—customs, excise, and stamps—we find that since the beginning of the quarter they have yielded as follows, as compared with the corresponding period of last year:—

But the Chancellor of the Exchequer expected no such decrease as would have amounted to so much in a single quarter. Comparing his final estimates of revenue after reducing taxes with the actual receipt of last year, we find that against a falling off of 1,600,000l in the Customs he expected an increase of

If this were to go on, the Chancellor of the Exchequer would be "out" at least half a million in his revenue at the end of the financial year. No doubt it may be explained that the return this year includes one day less than the corresponding period of last year, and one day makes a difference of about 170,000*l* on the average in these three branches; but on the other side it has to be considered that the reduction of the sugar duties has only affected a part of this quarter, and a much less reduction than the proportionate reduction of 400,000*l* should therefore have been looked for in it. At the same time the Excise duty reduced (viz. the duty on horses) does not really affect the current quarter at all, and, if so, the expected increase of Excise in this quarter would really be about 250,000*l*, instead of 109,000*l* only. The difference against the budget on the above three branches, allowing for the difference of a day, is thus in all probability more and not less than the above sum of 132,000*l*. The revenue at any rate has ceased to expand with its former elasticity.

INSURANCE ON FREIGHT.—The Court of Exchequer Chamber, in the case of *Allison v. The Bristol Marine Insurance Company*, has just reversed by a majority of one a judgment of the inferior court in regard to freight, which raises a rather difficult point. The suit was by a shipowner for a total loss on half the freight on a voyage from Greenock to Bombay by a ship which was chartered to convey coals. He had insured the whole freight on about 2,000 tons of coals for 4,000*l*, and eventually he received half the amount in advance from the charterer, who in turn insured the value of the coals, plus the freight he had paid, with his own underwriters. The ship became a wreck off Bombay, but half the coals were saved, and were delivered by the captain to the charterer free of freight, the captain considering that the half which had been paid in advance applied to the half cargo which he delivered. The shipowner accordingly now sued for a total loss on the undelivered half of the cargo, but the underwriter contended that he could only sue for half a loss, as only half the cargo, and consequently only half the freight, could really be considered lost; and in this view they have been supported by the majority of the Court of Appeal. This judgment, we think, must be considered the only equitable one. It was apparently a mistake on the part of the captain to deliver the half cargo saved "free of freight"; he ought to have received at Bombay the moiety of the freight for that portion of the cargo, and this being the case the effect of giving the shipowner the right to sue for the total loss of half the freight would be to make the shipowner and the charterer together entitled to more than they would have received if the voyage had been successful. The charterer was entitled to recover half what he had insured, so that if the shipowner recovered for a total loss of half, the underwriters would pay more than what was really lost altogether. The case becomes complicated by the payment in advance, but it is quite clear that the charterer at Bombay was either entitled to recover nothing in respect of what he paid for freight, or the shipowner could not recover for a total loss.

THE NEW SPANISH REPUDIATION.—A double repudiation of the Spanish debt interest has recently been announced from Madrid as impending, and whatever doubt there may be about one part of the announcement, viz., the alleged intention to "suppress" the debt interest altogether, there seems no doubt about the other portion, which relates to the compromise effected some time ago with reference to the two coupons of the 3 per Cent. debt now overdue. Those coupons, it will be recollect, were to be dealt with by that compromise in a very peculiar way. The Spanish Government was to hand over to certain trustees, in whose names they would be deposited with the Bank of England, certain obligations of the Rio Tinto Mining Company, and certain *pagares* granted for the purchase of national lands, sufficient to secure an issue of bonds bearing 5 per cent. interest equal to the nominal amount of the overdue coupons. By this means the overdue coupons were to be provided for, bondholders being meanwhile put in possession of bonds which would be saleable at a price, and would give them so much cash at once if they chose to sell. The objections to this compromise were obvious, as it was in effect, according to the probable selling price of the new bonds, a sacrifice of nearly one-half of the bondholders' rights in the coupons, and they were to receive no certificates for the deficiency such as ought to be

exacted from every insolvent Government when it compounds with its creditors—at least any such Government whose affairs are anarchical, and with which consequently no permanent arrangement can be made. The worst consequences, as we pointed out, were likely to ensue from the facility shown by the bondholders in bargaining away their rights. And these "worst consequences" have apparently occurred. Encouraged by the extreme facility shown, the new Finance Minister at Madrid has apparently considered that there was no occasion for paying the too complacent bondholders anything. Perhaps he has been very hard up as well, but at any rate the *pagares* necessary for the issue of the 5 per Cent. Bonds have not been forthcoming, and the overdue coupons will not be paid. This is the upshot of the very last compromise entered into by the Spanish bondholders with the defaulting Madrid Government, and we hope the experience will at last convince them not only of the mistake of lending to Spain in the first instance, but of the danger of compromising any just claim without retaining a hold over Spain for any unsettled balance should its finances afterwards improve. The stiffness of the creditors from whom they borrow might itself contribute powerfully towards improving the financial character of certain foreign Governments.

THE RUBY MINING COMPANY.—The disclosures in the suit of Mr Askew to have his name taken off the list of shareholders of the Ruby Consolidated Mining Company, Limited, which has just been decided by Vice-Chancellor Malins, are almost as instructive in their way as the disclosures in the various suits which have arisen about the more notorious Emma and Mineral Hill Mines. Mr Askew, who was induced in May, 1872, to apply for shares in the Ruby Company, now brought an action to have his name taken off under section 35 of the Act of 1862, on the ground that he had been induced to do so by the fraudulent misrepresentation of the directors, which entitles him to say that his name had been entered "without sufficient cause." The fraudulent misrepresentation, according to Vice-Chancellor Malins's judgment, consisted in the fact that the prospectus said the price to be paid by the Company for the property was 285,000*l*, and that the title had been investigated and found perfect, whereas it appeared that the title had not been investigated at all, and Mr Hartmont, one of the promoters, and who was also a director, knew very well that he, with some associates, had bought the property for 40,000*l*. In other words, the property had been bought for 40,000*l*, and was made over to the Company by one of its own directors for seven times the price he had paid. Fortunately, section 38 of the Act requires that every prospectus and notice inviting subscriptions should specify the dates and the names of the parties to any contract entered into by the company or the promoters, directors, or trustees thereof, and that any prospectus not specifying the same should be deemed fraudulent, unless the person taking shares on the faith of it had notice of such contract. Under this section Mr Askew has succeeded in establishing that his name ought not to be on the list of shareholders, and the directors who resisted the application to have his name taken off have had to pay costs. An unintelligible part of the case is that Mr Askew, who had paid up in full, and was not liable to any calls, had no apparent interest in having his name struck off, but this observation would not apply to shareholders who may happen not to have paid in full, while it may be hoped that, besides the barren privilege of having their names struck off the registers, shareholders in such a case as this will also be found entitled to have their money back. It appears from the report of the case that the public had not "come in" to any material extent, so that the fraudulent misrepresentation failed of its object, and we are glad to see that the public will for once have the benefit of the lesson of the case, without having themselves suffered any extensive injury.

THE POWERS OF DIRECTORS.—The decision in the case of *Riche v. the Ashbury Railway Carriage and Iron Company*, which has just been given by the Court of Exchequer Chamber, relates to a matter of no little interest to shareholders. How far are the latter bound by contracts of the directors beyond the scope of the association, and by what process do such contracts become binding upon them? The company was incorporated by charter in 1864, for the construction of railway rolling stock, and to carry on business as mechani-

cal engineers and general contractors; and the contract in question was one which had been entered into for making a line of railway from Brussels to Antwerp and Tournai, which it was supposed would give the company the advantage of supplying all the rolling stock. Many shareholders, it appears, objected at first to this course as *ultra vires*, but in May, 1867, a meeting was called, at which the contract was ratified under the seal of the company, without any express dissent from any of the shareholders, who at least had all notice of the nature of the contract. Eventually, however, the contract was repudiated by the company, and the defence against the suit of the contractor who had been engaged by the company to make the line, was that the agreement was *ultra vires*. The judgment of the Court of Exchequer was however in favour of the plaintiff, and the Court of Error was now divided, so that the judgment will stand. According to the view of Mr Justice Blackburn, who agreed with the majority in the Court below, the reason in favour of it is that the Company being incorporated by Charter had the usual powers of making contracts, unless it was restricted by express words. Such a contract could certainly be ratified by the shareholders, and even if not ratified, a contract beyond the Company's powers might be a reason for cancelling the Charter, but would not necessarily entitle the Company to repudiate. The case is perhaps less valuable as a precedent than it would otherwise be, because it does not affect limited liability companies acting under articles of association, but proceeds on the special view of the Courts as to the powers of corporations. It was also a case between a third party and the Company, and it did not seem to be disputed that as between a dissenting shareholder and his fellow shareholders, the decision might have been different—each shareholder having the right to confine the Company to which he belongs to the business which is defined in the memorandum of association or charter of incorporation. The judgment moreover, it is stated, will be carried before the new Court of Appeal established by the Judicature Act.

THE GREAT WESTERN OF CANADA RAILWAY.—The affairs of the Great Western of Canada Railway Company have lately been undergoing investigation by a shareholders' committee, for which there is no doubt some cause in the fact that the dividend two years ago was 6½ per cent. per annum and is now only half that sum, or less, while the shares have fallen from 22*l* or 23*l* to 12*l*. The cause of this depreciation the committee has discovered to be mainly the usual one of extravagant expansion and injudicious expenditure of capital, but the report besides contains some statements which we trust are not generally well founded in regard to the management of any of our important railways. The committee say:—

Rumours being current at the time of the appointment of the committee, that the board-room of the company was the constant resort of stock brokers, they made it their duty to inquire into the truthfulness of these rumours, and they regret to say that the evidence fully confirms them.

In connection with this subject, it must be mentioned that the committee became possessed of certain code books. The one given to them as the code book of the company had been quite recently published; but when in Canada they obtained possession of the one which had previously been in use, the existence of which had been withheld from them.

This latter book contains many phrases suitable only for stock-jobbing, and, as the result of their inquiries, the committee have no hesitation in saying that it has been so used for private purposes.

The subject of telegrams also came under review, and it was discovered that a reprehensible practice existed of telegrams being transmitted from officials to individual members of the board and others, and vice versa, sometimes on the business of the company, and at others on private matters, many of which have not been produced, though asked for by the committee.

Great dissatisfaction having been expressed at the half-yearly meeting in April, 1873, that information with regard to the company's affairs was cabled from Canada to private individuals in this country in advance of the public announcements through the board, a distinct understanding was come to, that the board should publish the monthly returns of receipts and expenditure immediately on their receipt.

Notwithstanding this pledge,

were not published till the end of June.

Whilst the published weekly receipts during those months showed large increases, the expenditure, which was thus withheld from the public, increased in a still greater ratio, thus:—

During this interval, in the face of this large increase of receipts, sales were numerous, and the price of the shares steadily declined. When the large increase of expenditure was made public a further immediate fall in the market price took place.

One of the directors stated at the half-yearly meeting on the 16th Oct., 1872, that the accounts just received of the earnings for the first two months of the half year "afforded a prospect of a considerable increase in dividend for the current half-year," and he further said, "he had no doubt that, unless something unforeseen occurred, they would have the pleasure of announcing, when they next met, a considerable addition to the dividend." (The dividend then announced was 6½ per cent.)

This director transferred out of his name on the 28th November, 1872, 600 shares, and on the 12th December following, 500 shares, as appears by the company's register.

The price of the company's shares at that time ranged from 22*l* to 23*l*.

We fear there are very few companies where official information does not get abroad somehow for stock jobbing uses before the ordinary shareholder is made aware of it, but the apparent system described in the above instance is, we hope, unusual. The statement, however, is only *ex parte*, and it remains to be seen what exculpation the directors of the above Company who may be affected by the committee's remarks have to offer.

The differences are only of insignificant amount, with the exception of a further increase of over nine millions in the stock of cash. In addition to the above, there is an augmentation of a million and a half in the advances on bullion and public securities. The discounts have again decreased, notwithstanding the approach of the end of the month, when there is usually a revival in the demands. The Bank Council, in its meeting this afternoon, will fix its dividend for the first six months of the year. The amount is expected to be 160f, which would be 10f less than in the corresponding half of 1873. The profits in the six months are about three millions less than last year.

In the discount market there is still the same rarity of paper, and good bills may be placed at from $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ below the Bank rate. The current quotations are 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ for commercial paper, 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ for bankers' acceptances, and 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ the signatures of the Haute Banque. Exchange on London is unvaried, at 25f 18 to 19c for long paper, and 25f 18 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 20c short, negotiated at sight. Some changes have, however, taken place in the prices of continental paper. Bills on the German places are $\frac{1}{2}$ lower. Hamburg at 122 to 122 $\frac{1}{2}$ the 100 marks; Berlin, 33 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 33 $\frac{3}{4}$ the 100 thalers; Frankfort, 209 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 210 the 100 florins. Vienna is, however, firmer, at 221 to 223 the 100 florins. There has also been a marked rise in Spanish; Madrid obtains 508 to 510 long, and 512 to 514 short, the 100 dollars; St. Petersburg is in demand, at 342 to 343 long, and 343 to 344 short, all the above negotiated at three months. Belgium, at sight, is at 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ dis; Italy loses 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 10; French gold coin is at par; silver five-franc pieces at par to 2 per thousand discount. English sovereigns at 25f 10 to 15c; and Bank notes, 25f 15 to 20c; United States dollars, 5f 10c.

The Bourse has been firm during the week, the rise being stimulated by daily purchases of rente for the Caisse des Dépôts et Consignations, which to-day took 205,000f of the Fives. There has also been a more active demand for options at expanding rates, 96f 15, *dont* 50 centimes, being paid for the Five per Cent. at the end of July. The Morgan Loan has gained another 3 $\frac{1}{2}$, the fears of reimbursement having for the moment calmed down. Foreign securities present little change, Italian, after reaching 67f 60, has receded to 67f 35. Turkish Fives were heavy at the commencement of the week, at one moment going back to 45f 70; the recovery is chiefly due to the purchases of speculators for the fall, who had oversold. The bonds of 1873 are at 245 $\frac{1}{2}$. Egyptian securities are firm, the 1866 at 455, 1868 at 82, 1870 at 370, and the 1873 at 345. Bank of France shares have gained 80f in the week, and Banque de Paris have been in request at better rates. Other banking companies shares are neglected, and Credit Mobilier have been further depreciated, as it is now certain that no

dividend will be paid for 1873. The weekly returns of the railway companies are again favourable, showing a small increase in the aggregate on the same week of 1873. The greatest improvement has been in the Paris to Mediterranean Company, which has gained 294,000f. The shares of that company have risen 12f 50, and the advance has even extended to the shares of the lines which have a diminution in their receipts, the Eastern, for example, which shows a deficit of 210,000f compared with the same week last year. There is a marked recovery in all the bonds of the City of Paris, for which there is a continued demand, and prices have advanced from 10 to 20 francs in a few weeks. Transatlantic Company shares are at 215f, and the Messageries at 547f 50.

The return published by the Suez Canal Company for the month of May, shows that the loss by the application of the tariff is 199,800f. The gross tonnage was 210,430 tons, against 194,542 in May, 1873; and the tolls, as recently charged, would have amounted to 2,104,304f, including the fraction of a ton. The Company's tables do not give the net tonnage of the 108 vessels which passed through the canal during the month, and which it apparently intends to ignore, but the receipts based on the net tonnage, with the supplement, amounted to 1,904,498f. The difference between the new and the old tariffs is 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. less for trading vessels, 16 $\frac{1}{4}$ per cent. for the Messageries and Peninsular and Oriental Company's steamers, and 26 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. for government vessels. The shares of this Company have recovered 8f 75c in the week. The delegations for money are at 405, the Company's 5 per Cent. Obligations at 461 $\frac{1}{4}$, and its Trentenary bonds at 120. The Committee on the Budget of 1875 has commenced the examination of M. Magne's plan for meeting the deficit of this year and 1875, by the addition of another five per cent. or half-tenth to the Customs and Excise duties and registration dues. The committee appear to be opposed to any increase of the taxes, and to prefer to balance the receipts and expenditure by reducing the reimbursement of the debt to the Bank of France from 260 millions to 150 millions a year. Some of the members proposed to hear the Regents of the Bank on the subject, but a resolution was come to that the Minister of Finance should be first invited to attend before the Committee to answer questions relative to the proposed reduction. In the course of the sitting M. Léon Say, referring to the mission with which he has been charged by the Committee on the Budget—to draw up a report on the exchange operations connected with the payment of the Prussian indemnity—said that the work was not terminated, but that he had already gathered sufficient information to convince him that the stock of specie in France was much less reduced than might have been feared. If, therefore, the Governor of the Bank shared that opinion, the resumption of specie payments might take place very shortly, even with a reduction in the repayments to the Bank.

The Assembly has rejected a Bill presented by M. Tirard to permit jewellers to manufacture articles for exportation of a lower standard than 18 carats. The object of this proposition was to enable the trade to compete with the German houses which find a large market in South America and the East for jewellery of 13 and 14 carats. M. Tirard was willing to maintain the present standard of 18 carats for all articles of gold or silver sold in France. The Government, however, opposed the measure on the ground that French manufacturers would lose the reputation their wares now enjoyed abroad if they commenced exporting jewellery of inferior quality. France, of course, sells abroad a large quantity of plated goods, but the Mint stamp is only granted to metal of at least 18 carats. The trade is evidently suffering, and the

customs returns for the first five months of this year show that the exports of jewellery only amounted to 15 millions, against 34 millions in the same period of 1873.

An interesting Parliamentary paper relative to railway communications through the Alps has just been issued by the Assembly. The motive for the publication was a proposition by a number of deputies to open a credit of 48 millions towards the cost of cutting a tunnel through the Simplon. The subject was referred to the committee on railways, and one of its members, M. Cézanne, has published a report in which he examines the advantages of the Simplon route compared with other plans of railways through the Alps. The subject had a special interest from the fact of a large sum of French capital having been already sunk in an abortive attempt to make this line. A company was first formed in 1853 for the purpose, but in 1865, after having spent a sum of 30 millions, it became insolvent, and was forced to abandon the work. A new company was founded on the ruins of the old one, and the result was that at the moment of the war a further sum of 10 millions had been expended, and the undertaking had again come to a standstill for want of funds, while for the 40 millions of capital sunk all that remained was about 50 miles of railway worked at a loss, while the tunnel through the mountains had not been even commenced. As there was no prospect of the line ever being terminated, the Government of the Valais, which for twenty years had shown forbearance towards the undertaking, obtained from the Federal Council the forfeiture of the second company, and the entire line was sequestered and sold to the West Switzerland Consortium for a sum of 10,100f only, the purchasers, however, assuming all the liabilities of the insolvent company. Although the Simplon route possesses technical advantages over some of the other træcs, and would be of greater service to France than the St. Gotthard line, and of more use to Germany than the Mont Cenis tunnel, both of the others—perhaps for that reason—have been preferred to it. The Simplon lies about midway between the St. Gotthard and Mont Cenis passages, and if a single tunnel had been made jointly by the two countries the Simplon route would no doubt have been chosen; but each country preferred a line on which one issue of the tunnel was on its own territory, in which respect the Simplon satisfied neither, the northern outlet being in Switzerland. Even in the eventuality of the Mont Cenis route becoming insufficient for the traffic between France and Italy, and a second tunnel being necessary, the line of Mont Genève would probably be chosen, as it not only presents strategic advantages, but the length of the gallery required would be only 4,620 metres, or less than one-third of that by the Simplon. But for the loss of Alsace, France might have endeavoured by the Simplon route to compete with Germany in the carrying trade between Italy and the North of Europe, but she has no longer that motive now that that province, through which the line would pass, has ceased to belong to her. The route between Paris and Piacenza, a central point in the Italian system, is indeed 40 miles less by the Simplon than by Mont Cenis, but that gain would be more than counterbalanced by the inconvenience of trains going over the territory of four different countries and passing three customs frontiers. These are among the reasons which induced the French railway committee to pronounce against the Bill for a subvention of 48 millions. Objection was also taken to the large sum demanded. Germany, who will derive much greater advantage from the St. Gotthard line than France ever could by that of the Simplon, only contributes 20 millions, or one-fourth of the cost, Italy and Switzerland furnishing 65 millions between them, while France was now asked to give more than half the sum required for the Simplon gallery, and none of the other Powers interested made any corresponding engagements. The committee thought that France was now too poor to be so generous towards a work in which she had only a secondary interest. The report mentions incidentally that the tunnel through Mont Cenis cost 80 millions of francs for the 18 kilometres, or 6 millions per kilometre. The share of France was 27½ millions, of which 7 millions was for premiums to the contractors for completing the work in less time than they were allowed. Italy paid about double the sum contributed by France.

A fraud has been attempted here with the new bonds of the City of Brussels. Parties had bought a large quantity of scrip and imitated the stamp with which it is marked when the whole of the instalments are paid up. These titles have been offered in Paris for sale and as security for advances, and as the value of the scrip titles is only about 16f, and the liberated 95f, this last operation left a good margin of profit. The confederates, however, overreached themselves by offering the bonds in too large quantities; a money changer to whom 300 had been proposed for sale had his suspicions aroused, and telegraphed to a stockbroker at Brussels for inquiry, and the fraud was discovered. This led to the arrest of the parties.

The amount of the "other" deposits, as compared with the "other" securities, showed, in 1864, a deficiency of 7,677,928l.; in 1871, an excess of 2,477,958l.; in 1872, a deficiency of 3,921,303l.; and in 1873, a deficiency of 5,366,405l. In 1874, there is an excess of 99,097l.

In 1864, the Conference assembled to bring arbitration to bear on the Schleswig-Holstein question had dissolved without a definite result, and the markets for public securities were depressed by the fear that we should go to war. Rates in the discount market were fully up to that of the Bank.

In 1871, the conjunction of the half-yearly requirements with the payment on account of the new French loan caused a strong demand for money. There was more than average activity on the Stock Exchange.

In 1872, rates were firm owing to the half-yearly demand. Bullion was, however, coming in rapidly, and as the German purchases had slackened, an easier money market was looked for.

In 1873, the temporary lock-up of money caused the charge for short loans to rise sharply, but gold was arriving from abroad and easier rates were expected. Investments made by the public were found to have decreased in comparison with former years on account of the less profitable state of trade which succeeded the rise in the price of coal.

DISCOUNT AND MONEY MARKET.—The supply of money has continued short all through the week, in consequence of the usual preparations to show a good balance at the close of the half-year. There is still, however, a great scarcity of bills, and rates in the discount market are substantially what they were a week ago, with a general expectation that they will fall off as soon as the dividend money is let out at the commencement of the new half-year. The minimum this afternoon for two and three months' Bank bills is 2½ per cent., and on the Stock Exchange the rate at call on English Government securities is 2 to 2½ per cent. During the week there has been very little influx of bullion into the Bank from abroad, but the foreign exchanges remain generally in our favour (although some French coin has again been taken from the Bank for Paris), and shipments continue to be reported from America, while a large Australian shipment is due about the middle of next month. The ease of money in India is likewise increasing.

The changes in the Bank return exhibit a moderate improvement in its position compared with last week. The bullion has increased 344,000l. of which 250,000l. is from the country, and the remainder from abroad, but the reserve has only increased 79,000l., the influx of bullion being compensated by the large increase of 265,000l. in the active circulation, which continues to be about 500,000l. or 600,000l. in excess of the amount at the corresponding date last year. On balance the aggregate deposits are diminished, the public having increased 634,000l., and the private diminished 764,000l., so that the proportion of reserve to liabilities has risen. The other securities again show a slight falling off, amounting to 169,000l., and the Government securities have also diminished 74,000l.

THE STOCK MARKETS.—The week has been almost featureless. Business continues to be greatly restricted, and there would no doubt be a steady tendency on this account towards lower prices if the money market was in the same condition of stringency as it was a year ago, but in the actual state of the market this tendency is resisted. The result is a very slight fluctuation in prices from day to day, though perhaps on balance the tendency is rather upwards, purchases being made in anticipation of the dividends next month, as well as of drawings on some of the foreign loans. The regular course of business appears lately to have been a short period of animation followed by a longer period of stagnation, in which prices droop a little, but during which a certain amount of floating stock gets absorbed, and the markets are prepared for a farther upward movement. In this state of things the approach of the account rather favours the upward tendency in prices, operators for the fall perceiving that the chances have increased against them, in consequence of the absorption of stock, and the drawings and the dividends being permanently to their disadvantage. The principal change, owing to these general causes, appears to have been in the speculative foreign market, Egyptian, Peruvian, and Turkish having all rather advanced, partly, it would seem, on the appearance of continued strength in the Paris Bourse, although French politics are still unsettled; but in the other markets, also including English Railways, the same influences have been felt, and in spite of some unfavourable causes, there is no reduction from last week's prices. A principal exception has again been made by Erie and Atlantic and Great Western descriptions, which have touched a very low point since we last wrote, but have since rallied from the extreme point of depression. To-day there has been rather more weakness shown, especially in Peruvian and one or two English railways, but the tone at the close is again better.

ENGLISH GOVERNMENT SECURITIES.—In this department there is comparatively little change, but on balance it is slightly unfavourable.

COLONIAL GOVERNMENT SECURITIES.—New Brunswick have advanced 1, but otherwise prices give no further evidence of the existing desire for steady investments.

FOREIGN GOVERNMENT SECURITIES.—The Paris Bourse, as above noticed, has been firm all the week, notwithstanding the long continuance of the political crisis at Versailles. Money continues very abundant at Paris, making the rates for carrying over very light, and as the prospects of the French harvest are excellent, while large purchases of French rentes continue to be made for investment, the political uncertainty has been quite insufficient by itself to prevent a return to steeliness on the Bourse. This improved tone has naturally had some effect here, and has assisted the various causes which continue to stimulate an upward movement in prices, even in the absence of business which is so noticeable. Peruvian, Egyptian, and Turkish among the speculative securities have all been steady during the week, while French and the higher class of securities generally have also been in demand. Spanish have formed an important exception, in consequence of telegrams from Madrid announcing the intention of the Spanish Finance Minister to repudiate the compromise for paying the overdue coupons, and suggesting an intention to "suppress" the foreign debt-interest altogether. To-day Peruvian has been rather weak

on large sales to secure profits, and a good deal of the advance early in the week has been lost, and some of the other speculative securities have suffered a little in sympathy, but the tone at the close, except in Peruvian, is again firm.

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ENGLISH RAILWAYS.—Although the traffics this week have again been on the average disappointing, prices have been well maintained, and have on balance rather advanced. The scarcity of stock, and the great confidence of holders and investors in the future of railway property, whatever the dividends for the current half-year may be, render it exceedingly difficult for speculators for the fall to make the necessary purchases to cover their engagements, and it still appears not unlikely that the events on which they are calculating, viz., a reduction of dividends for the current half-year, accompanied by unfavourable traffics, will occur without the corresponding fall in price which they anticipate. Although the traffics are on the average disappointing, it is also again noticeable that the most material decreases are on the two lines affected by the strikes—the North-Eastern and the Great Western—and on the other heavy lines there is a most satisfactory increase, particularly so this week on the North-Western line. To-day North-Western stock has been bought but Midland have declined, and the tone is generally rather dull.

There are no inquiries for gold for export, and about 98,900*l* has been sent into the Bank since our last circular of the 18th inst., to be followed by further amounts. Some small withdrawals of French coin have taken place, to the value of 56,000*l*.

Silver.—Owing to further orders for the continent prices have advanced, and transactions have been entered into at 5*s* $\frac{1}{2}$ d per oz for arrival, and 5*s* d per oz for immediate delivery. The amounts to hand during the week have been 40,000*l* from New York, and about 60,000*l* from the West Coast of South America.

Mexican dollars.—A portion of the late arrivals remains unsold, but with the improvement in the value of silver it is not unlikely that purchasers will now be found at a slightly better rate than 5*s* $\frac{1}{2}$ d per oz, the price recently obtained.

Exchange on India for Banks' drafts at 60 days' sight is 1*s* 10*d* per rupee. The next tenders for India Council bills will be received on 1st July, and will be for 400,000*l*. The last drawings of this amount were on 15th April.

Quotations for Bullion.—Gold—Bar gold, 77*s* 9*d* per oz std; ditto fine, 77*s* 9*d* per oz std; ditto refineable, 77*s* 11*d* per oz std; United States gold coin, 76*s* 3*d* per oz. Silver—Bar silver, fine, 4*s* 11*d* per oz std, firm; ditto, containing 5 grains gold, 4*s* 11*d* per oz std, last price; Mexican dollars, 4*s* 9*d* per oz.

According to the *Gazette* return of this evening, the movement in the precious metals during the week ended June 24 has been as follows:—Gold—import, 137,553*l*; export, 33,901*l*. Silver—import, 87,558*l*; export, 111,778*l*. The gold operations at the Bank have comprised the withdrawal of 235,000*l* in foreign coin for Paris, and the influx of 180,000*l* in bars.

COMMERCIAL EPITOME.

FRIDAY NIGHT.

The weather has gradually become more favourable to agriculture, showers have fallen, rather violent in some quarters it is true, but beneficial on the whole, and especially to spring corn and feeding stuffs; markets have at the same time lost none of their firm tendency, and a further advance in the value of wheat is talked of as possible before harvest. Foreign supplies at present are fair, but the continental demand is still so large as to take off any surplus above this country's wants at steady rates, and stocks everywhere are reported bare. It is also doubtful whether prices are sufficiently high to encourage further shipments on a scale equal to all requirements, but though importers have little inducement to purchase while the market for foreign wheat remains comparatively unprofitable, the fine weather and prospects of plentiful harvests in all consuming and exporting countries cause shipments to be as yet freely made. The weather has been variable on the continent; the price of flour at Paris has advanced 1*s* 6*d*, German markets remaining steady. There is no change in New York quotations.

The cotton trade continues languid, and the depression in yarns and manufactures spreads; continental and Eastern demand are alike dull, the last-named market being overstocked. Home requirements are looked upon as likely to be the most steady and reliable. Prices for raw cotton have drooped a little in the absence of business, but a further decline is not in all quarters thought justifiable. At Manchester stocks of goods and yarns are increasing; forced sales are occasionally reported, without, however, having much effect on prices, which are as low as they can be in relation to cost, without involving heavy losses. The export from America to England has fallen off. Continental consumption of raw cotton, on the other hand, has been large this year, statistics showing that 160,000 bales more of American cotton had gone out of sight (in other words, entered into spinners' stocks) during the first four months of 1874 than in the same months of 1873.

The wool trade shows more activity now that the price of home-grown has to all appearance reached its lowest point and begun to rise. At Doncaster, and later at Leicester wool fair, the supplies, though large, were rapidly taken off, the principal demand existing on speculative account, spinners for the present finding prices too high. The firmness has been taken advantage of throughout the trade, both in raw material and manufactures, to raise quotations, and some check has consequently been placed on reviving confidence. Foreign wool in London is reported steady, without much demand; and since the conclusion of the colonial sales little business has been done. Yarns at Bradford are in good request, but prices are said to make foreign buyers very reticent. The position of manufacturers has also improved, and a fair degree of employment is reported, new orders coming in moderately fast.

At the quarterly meeting of the iron trade early next month, some sort of definite guide to the state of future prices this year is expected, and the demand for finished iron is still restricted as much as possible until that time. Since the conclusion of the Cleveland strike a more favourable view has been taken of the prospects of general revival, one great obstacle being thus taken from the declining tendency of prices to a healthier basis; not that any great reduction is immediately expected, for demand is supposed to have accumulated, while production has certainly been on the decrease this year. The make of pig iron in the manufacturing districts has outrun the demand, however small the production may have lately been, but stocks have not increased to a large or depressing extent. Much will depend on the state of the colliers' strike in South Staffordshire, as to whether the quarter-day meeting will have much influence, though it is stated that material reductions are out of the question in any case; the strike in question has not yet concluded, although the result, as usual in a falling market, is not very doubtful. The price of coal is still falling throughout the country, and even in those districts where colliers' strikes still restrict production, viz., South Staffordshire, and parts of South Wales and the west of Scotland, no other tendency is apparent; in the last district, indeed, 40 per cent. reduction of wages has in some cases been agreed to by miners, but so large a fraction of former advances is a very exceptional case of reaction, the more general extent to which wages have been reduced being one-fourth to one-tenth only of the rise recently obtained by colliers generally.

The market for sugar has been quoted fairly steady but inactive throughout the week. For refined there is little regular

inquiry, but refining qualities of British West India appear to have been in chief demand. In coffee there is no special change for the week; prices lost much of their recent firmness until the Dutch sale took place at Amsterdam, when a recovery occurred both in East Indian and Central American. Messrs Sillar's Circular states that "the tea market has been quiet but firm since the date of our last, the deliveries continuing on a satisfactory scale. The new season at Foochow was opened on the 10th instant by the purchase of 21,000 chests at three to four taels (about 10 per cent.) over last year's opening rates. Telegrams dated 20th instant report the market active." For tallow and oils prices have given way generally. The demand for metals remains fair, but the markets have been without activity at steady rates.

EXTRACTS FROM TRADE CIRCULARS.

(From Messrs Alexr. Collie and Co.'s Manchester Report, dated June 25.)—Owing to the stagnation of trade throughout South America, and the more recently fluctuating accounts of prices and exchange in India and China, the operations of export buyers have been upon considerably less than an average scale, and in several instances stocks have, in consequence, been found to be inconveniently accumulating. Without exhibiting any important degree of weakness, producers have evinced more eagerness to make sales, and the transactions of any magnitude reported have been at a concession on their part of fully 1½d per piece. To this the better qualities of shirtings have continued the exception, makers of them being still fairly under contract. The exports for May were of fairly liberal extent, partaking largely of orders placed some time previously. For the present month, to date, it is expected that the tables will present a considerable falling off. In home-trade goods a fair demand exists for general classes, and from this source some relief will be derived by such producers as find themselves encumbered with present stocks.

(From Messrs Lee, Hedges, and Co.'s Coffee Report, dated Colombo, May 27.)—The quantity of plantation offered for sale is most trifling. The extraordinary shortness of our crop for the current year becomes more remarkable each week, and we shall deem ourselves fortunate to reach a total of 600,000 cwt., which it seems reasonably certain we cannot exceed. Prospects for next year do not present that favourable appearance that the blossoms encouraged us to look for, and the reports from the chief districts in the central Province are not by any means sanguine of even an average crop on the whole. Exports—Plantation, 17s to 17s 6d per bush; low-grown and garden parchment, 16s 6d per bush. Values have been maintained, but demand and supply are exceedingly limited. Native picked and dried, 7s to 7s per cwt. A fair business has been done, chiefly in unpicked samples, at 6s to 6s. Quality is good, but supplies more scarce than usual at this season.

(From Messrs Wm. Moran and Co.'s Indigo Report, dated Calcutta, May 22.)—The rain alluded to in our last circular as having fallen in Furridpore and Krishnaghur, has greatly benefited the plant, and has enabled planters in the latter district to fill in most of their empty lands; we hear also that several factories in Fessore came in for a share, but from all other districts of Lower Bengal we continue to receive complaints of want of rain and excessive heat, from the effects of which a good deal of spring plant has died off, and the October

cultivation, although holding out well, is showing symptoms of distress. There is no improvement to report from Tirhoot, Chumparun, and Chuprah. In the Benares Provinces and the Doab rain is needed to freshen them up, and also to help on the Khoontees, which, although generally well reported on, are feeling the effects of the continued fierce heat.

THE COTTON TRADE.

LIVERPOOL—JUNE 25.

The cotton market this week has been quiet, with a downward tendency in prices, and though to-day there has been more firmness, the quotations of most descriptions again show a slight decline. For Sea Island the demand has been slow, but prices are without material change. American has been dull, and quotations are 1½d to 2d per lb lower in the grades below middling. For Brazil there has only been a very limited inquiry, and with free sellers prices are generally 1d to 2d per lb easier. Egyptian continues quiet, excepting in white cotton, which commands full prices. West Indian and Peruvian remain inactive, with quotations unchanged. East Indian has been dull of sale, and the useful qualities are generally 1d per lb lower. The low grades and short stapled descriptions are nominally unchanged.

In cotton "to arrive" and for future delivery the business has been limited, and prices have given way about 1d per lb.

The sales of the week, including forwarded, amount to 55,290 bales, of which 3,410 are on speculation and 8,150 declared for export, leaving 43,730 bales to the trade.

JUNE 26.—The sales to-day will probably amount to about 10,000 bales: the market without change.

The actual stock of cotton declared this morning amounts to 959,980 bales, which proves to be 9,850 bales less than the estimate, showing a decrease of 34,490 American, and 8,640 Egyptian, and an increase of 170 Brazil, 390 Smyrna, 5,760 West Indian, and 26,960 East Indian.

American markets continue dull and inanimate. There is very little demand for cotton, and holders have given way $\frac{1}{8}$ d at New Orleans, $\frac{1}{2}$ d at Galveston, Savannah, and New York, and $\frac{1}{16}$ d at Charleston. Future deliveries at New York opened dull, and, excepting on Saturday and Wednesday, continued declining to present rates, which are $\frac{1}{8}$ c lower than those of last week for June and July delivery, $\frac{1}{4}$ c lower for August, and $\frac{1}{8}$ c lower for September and November. At the close an advance was quoted for October delivery, reducing the net decline to $\frac{1}{8}$ c. Receipts are again small compared with last year, the total being 12,000 bales, against 20,000 for the corresponding week of 1873. Exports show a decided falling off this week, the total to all European ports only summing up 13,000 bales, against 25,000 last week and 38,000 last year. American spinners have taken 8,000 bales from the ports during the week, against 10,000 last week and 13,000 last year.

NEW YORK, June 13.—Stock at interior towns 51,000, against 54,000 last year. June 14.—According to about 200 reports received from the south and south-west during the past week, the thermometer averaged 85 degrees, with 14 per cent. of the time rainy.

BRADFORD.—Wool.—At Leicester a large business was done. At our market there is a brisk inquiry on the part of consumers. Staplers are, however, in many cases asking more than buyers will pay. Yarns—A considerable amount of business is offering by the export houses. But in most of the favourite yarns prices are out of their reach.

LEEDS.—Some extensive purchases have been made for New Zealand. There are also Germans and Canadians in the town quietly supplying themselves with the lower classes of cloths suitable for the fall trade.

ROCHDALE.—Merchants have scarcely yet begun to give out their orders for the autumn, but in lighter flannels it is not unlikely that a good trade will yet be done, as the healing process seems to have begun with reference to the manifold "strikes" which have been prevalent. There is a more settled state of the market for wool.

WOLVERHAMPTON.—A great demand for sheets, which are firmer in price. Orders for bars, angles, and plates sought after. Pig iron freely offered without securing purchasers. There is much anxiety to know the price to reign at the quarterly meeting fixed for the 8th and 9th of July. Makers of best iron decline to reduce at those meetings if the colliers' strike continues.

NORTH OF ENGLAND AND CLEVELAND.—Since the strike of ironstone miners a better feeling has prevailed in the iron trade of this locality. In the course of a few days a large proportion of the men will again be employed; those who went away are returning very fast. A better inquiry for rails is reported on the close of the strike, prices being easier.

THE TYNE AND WEAR DISTRICTS.—The state of manufacturing business is indirectly depressing the gas as well as the manufacturing coal trade.

SOUTH WALES AND MONMOUTHSHIRE.—Iron.—Now that rails have fallen below 8*l* it is confidently expected that orders will be more freely placed. It is considered certain that the demand for rails and bars is increasing. The wages of colliers are not yet settled.

DUNDEE.—The increased activity in the flax market has continued, in consequence of the confirmation of unfavourable accounts regarding the growing crops from various quarters.

C O R N .

AMERICAN GRAIN AND FLOUR MARKETS.

NEW YORK—June 12.

We have had a pretty general decline in prices of flour the past week, and the reduction at the close averages about 2*s* per barrel. The export demand has been large, but such has been the pressure to sell, to close out to the last barrel, in view of the large receipts at all points, and the excellent prospects of the coming crop, that there has been no adequate support to prices. Wheat has come forward in large quantities; lower prices have been accepted for spring growths. Reports from the South indicate a good yield of winter wheat, and the receipts of spring wheat at the Western markets continue on a scale of extraordinary magnitude. Indian corn has been in active export demand, favoured by a marked decline in ocean freights. Receipts of corn at the Western markets continue in excess of last year, and crop prospects are favourable, so that the recent advance may be ascribed wholly to the increased export movement stimulated by the decline in ocean freights. Rye has declined. Oats irregular.

Grain: Wheat, No. 1 spring, \$1.48 to \$1.51; white, \$1.57 to \$1.75. Corn, Western mixed, \$4*c* to 8*c*. Rye, \$1.03 to \$1.08. oats, mixed, 62*c* to 64*c*. Peas, Canada, 1.00*c* to \$1.25 per bushel.

LONDON MARKETS.

STATE OF THE CORN TRADE FOR THE WEEK.

MARK LANE, FRIDAY EVENING.

The frequent showers that have taken place during the week have been beneficial to the growing crops, and accounts generally speak well of their improved appearance. The effect upon the trade has not been very decided, purchases being already narrowed so closely to immediate requirements as to admit of little further curtailment, and as in the early part of the week there was some falling off in the supplies on offer, prices of wheat in many of the provincial markets sustained an advance of 1*s* per qr; this was not, however, freely paid. Subsequently there were some increase of arrivals at ports of call as well as at direct ports, and the advance was partially lost, more particularly at outports. At Mark lane there has not been much change. The week opened with a firm tone at the extreme of late rates for both English and foreign wheat, but at no quotable advance. The former has throughout been taken off slowly, and remains without any noteworthy feature. Foreign white descriptions maintain their value fully, and appear substantially firm. American red wheats have, however, during the last day or two been arriving more freely, and there are further cargoes due, whilst New York telegrams report shipments to be still rather active. Under these circumstances buyers hesitate to pay present rates, and, although our quotations cannot be altered, prices of red wheats tend downwards. It may be noticed the American shipments include rather a larger proportion than usual for the continent, but this, whilst moderating arrivals here, may proportionately curtail our export demand, which has recently given much support to the market. Flour, like wheat, opened with a firm tone, and there was some increase of business, but the demand has not been sustained, the market for all descriptions closing dull. Barley has been less in request, and where sales have been pressed rather lower prices have resulted, not, however, to establish any change in general quotations. Beans have ruled very firm at the late advance, and in exceptional cases even more has been obtained,

the tendency being still against buyers. Oats moved up a little on Monday, but there was a lull in the trade to-day, and a rather more favourable market for buyers, leaving quotations the same as on Friday last. Maize has been very firm all the week and closes so to-day.

Mr J. E. Beerbohm's Evening Corn Trade List states that the arrivals of grain and seed-laden vessels at ports of call since Friday last have been 59 in number. Total last week, 29; total since Jan. 1, 1,196; total to same time last year, 1,085. Wheat.—The arrivals have been liberal, consisting of 37 cargoes, including 7 steamers. The demand was good at the close of last week, but since then buyers have become rather reserved, and for cargoes short of days a trifle less money has been accepted. 

COMMERCIAL AND MISCELLANEOUS NEWS.

The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury having certified to the Commissioners for the reduction of the National Debt, in pursuance of the Act 29 and 30 Victoria, cap. 39, sec. 16, that the actual surplus revenue of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, beyond the actual expenditure thereof, for the year ended the 30th day of September, 1873, amounted to the sum of 2,226,768/- 3s 8d, the Commissioners for the Reduction of the National Debt hereby give notice that the sum of 556,692/- 0s 11d, being one-fourth part of the said surplus of 2,226,768/- 3s 8d, will be applied, under the provisions of the said Act, in the quarter ending the 31st day of March, 1874, towards the reduction of the National Debt.

The whole cost of the purchase of telegraphs by the State is not yet known, a sum of about 5,000,000/- having yet to be paid as soon as the outstanding claims of certain railways are settled by arbitration. The sum actually paid to the telegraph companies has been 5,847,347/-, which is made up as follows:—Electric and International, 2,938,326/-; British and Irish Magnetic, 1,243,536/-; Reuter's Telegram Company, for the Norderney Cable, 726,000/-; United Kingdom Company, 526,264/-; Universal Private Company, 184,421/-; Jersey and Guernsey Company, 57,350/-; Isle of Man Company, 16,136/-; Economic Company, 15,000/-; other smaller undertakings, 140,314/- total, 5,847,345. Laid to English and Welsh railway companies:—Brecon and Merthyr, 1,200/-; Bristol and Exeter, 17,500/-; Bristol and Portishead, 2,000/-; Cambrian, 1,456/-; Cockermouth, Keswick, and Penrith, 1,350/-; Colne Valley, 105/-; Furness, 500/-; and 100/- per annum for way leave. Great Western, 33,900/-, and an annual payment of 5,500/- for way leave.

Llanelli, 2,400/- and 1/- per mile per wire per annum for way leave. London, Brighton, and South Coast, 100,000/-; London, Chatham, and Dover, 107,500/-; Mid-Wales, 950/-; Monmouthshire, 1,700/-; Pembroke and Tenby, 2,567/-, and 1/- per mile per wire per annum for way leave. Wages in the iron trade have been settled for a time in the leading districts, but the arrangement as to a definite sliding scale which should fix a basis in both the Midlands and North of England has not yet been effected. Ironmasters and ironworkers are probably by this time anxious for a system which shall obviate the necessity for continual meetings and movements; and the effect of a settled agreement for a certain number of years would not only be to encourage enterprise and production in that trade during the term agreed upon, but would materially pacify other contests in other branches of industry which naturally follow so large a section of it as the iron trade represents. Preliminary meetings have been held, and the result is embodied in the resolution subjoined:—"That the wages of the ironmasters in Staffordshire and the North of England be regulated in the following manner: That from the 3rd of January till the 4th of April, 1874, the price of puddling should be 12s 6d per ton, and mill rates in proportion; that Messrs Barker, Williams, Roper, Whitwell, Capper, Aucutt, Trow, Holden, Hunter, and the secretaries be appointed a committee to endeavour to recommend a self-adjusting system regulating wages after the 4th of April, 1874, with a maximum of 12s 6d and a minimum of 9s 6d for puddling, and mill rates in proportion."

The return of the number of male coal miners employed in 1872, showing 418,088, is the first compulsory return, and the large increase shown over the preceding year is partly owing to some class of labourers formerly omitted in many returns being now included, the present return comprising all persons from the face of the coal in the pit to the shafts outside. But undoubtedly a large addition was made to the number of men engaged below ground. The books of a Lancashire colliery show that in October, 1868, the hewer received 1s 4d per ton for hewing and filling coals, screened coal and dress together, and in October, 1871, the amount had risen to 3s 11d per ton. The day's work was about 60 cwt in 1868, but was reduced to 50 cwt in 1872. The inspector of that district states the wages made by three average workmen in the district in 1872: the average number of days worked was only 231, equal to 4½ days in a week, and the wages were 6s 10d per day worked. Writing in March, 1873, this inspector says, "At the

present time the nominal day's wage of the collier is 10s." But he observed that the miners did not work so diligently nor so steadily in 1872 as in former years, and such increase of production as occurred (very little in his district) was due to the increased number of hands attracted from other trades by the high wages and the use of machinery. Mr Dickinson, whose district is North and East Lancashire, notices that it is clear that some of the accidents were caused by the want of that steady attention to duty which is more observable in times of less prosperity. Wages, he observes, have their periods. In his district the highest period centred in 1853, 1860, 1866, and now in 1872-73; and the periods of lowest wages centred in 1850, 1857, 1863, and 1869. Mr Willis, inspector for South Durham, has reason to believe that some of the regulations of the local unions have not only been to a certain extent subversive of the necessary strict discipline for which this district has always been considered pre-eminent, but may, if continued to be carried into effect, possibly lead to collieries not being properly attended to in matters of safety. He adds that instances might be indefinitely multiplied where an obstructive and, in many instances, coercive policy of this character has been of serious loss to proprietors, and of no possible gain to the workmen, but very prejudicial to the safe working of the mine. We may add that this inspector will now have Cleveland and Whitby in his district. He believes that no complete list of these ironstone mines has been compiled hitherto.

The report of the Department of Agriculture for November and December shows that the average of the tobacco crop, in comparison with last year, is 94. The returns make the yield above that of 1872—in West Virginia, 129; Kansas, 114; Arkansas, 108; Virginia, 102; Illinois, 101; New Hampshire, New York, Texas, and Oregon, 100. The other States range between 70 in Pennsylvania and 98 in South Carolina and Florida. In condition, Connecticut reports an average of 133; Massachusetts, 120; New Hampshire, 118; Vermont, 110; Maryland, Louisiana, and Oregon, 106; Kansas, 102; Virginia, Georgia, and Alabama, 101. The other states range between 100 in Illinois and 91 in Missouri. In all the Gulf States there are counties reporting the cultivation of sugar cane to some extent, but outside of Louisiana it is evident that this production is small. The returns marked the average production of potatoes throughout the country 15 per cent. less than last year. As the crop was then estimated at 113,516,000 bushels, a falling off of about 17,000,000 bushels is indicated. The sweet potato crop is a fair one both in yield and quality. The quantity of hay produced this year is about 500,000 tons less than last, when it was not far from 24,000,000 tons. The report says, under the head of "Foreign Demand for Wheat in Great Britain," that many have supposed that Russia is the heaviest contributor to these supplies; but the official figures show, when subjected to analysis, that the United States furnishes the largest proportion, the total for 15 years being 143,817,686 cwt, or 27 per cent. of all, while the proportion of Russia is 24 per cent., or 126,756,477 cwt; Germany, inclusive of the Duchies, up to 1860, contributed 17 per cent., or 93,437,841 cwt; France, 9 per cent., or 57,342,638 cwt; and British America, 5 per cent. These prominent contributions, with fractions of percentages omitted, make 84 per cent., leaving but 16 per cent. to all other sources of supplies.

In the summer of 1873 the fiscal condition of America foreshadowed none of the straits to which the Treasury would be put to on account of the effects of the financial panic. The official statement of the foreign trade of the United States for the fiscal year ended 30th June, 1873, shows that the aggregate imports of the country for the year were 663,410,597 dols, and the aggregate exports of domestic produce 649,132,563 dols. Of the imports, 28,148,481 dols were subsequently re-exported. This trade return, compared with the previous year, shows an increase of 23 millions of imports, 100 millions of exports of domestic produce, and 5½ millions of foreign re-exports. Of the imports, 17 millions were brought in land vehicles, 174½ millions in American vessels, and 472 millions in foreign vessels. This is a decrease of three millions in American vessels, and an increase of 26½ millions in foreign vessels, compared with the preceding year. Of the exports nearly 8 millions were taken away in land vehicles, 163 millions in American vessels, and 478½ millions in foreign vessels. Compared with the preceding year, this is an increased exportation of two millions in American vessels and 96½ millions in foreign vessels. Practically, the entire increased trade of the United States for the last fiscal year has been carried in foreign vessels, and chiefly under the British flag. Of the imported goods of the fiscal year, 497 millions were dutiable and 166 millions free, a decrease of 82 millions in the former and an increase of 105 millions in the latter, compared with the preceding year. This great change was caused by the repeal by Congress of a long list of duties on imports in the spring of 1872, the chief being tea, coffee, and hides. There came in free 24½ millions of tea, 44 millions of coffee, and over 16 millions of hides, which previously had been dutiable; the remaining increase in free goods being mainly in the list of drugs and chemicals. For the last fiscal year the postal revenue was 22,936,741 dols, and the expenditure 29,084,945 dols. For the next fiscal year ending June 30, 1874, the estimated income is 29,293,849 dols, and expenditure 33,929,912 dols, leaving a deficit of 4,636,383 dols to be provided by Congress. In addition to this mail subsidies are paid to steam lines between California, the Sandwich Islands, Japan and China, and New York and Brazil, amounting to 1,225,000 dols.

An announcement, dated New York, December 20, states that the Postmaster-General has made arrangements for four mails to leave for Europe weekly.

According to the Reports of the Ninth Census, lately issued at New York, the aggregate of property belonging to the various religious bodies in the United States is returned as follows. We give the sums in round numbers:—The Methodists, 14,500,000/-; the Roman Catholics, 12,700,000/-; Protestant Episcopal Church, 7,600,000/-; the Baptists, 8,500,000/-; the Lutheran Church, 3,100,000/-; the Presbyterians, 11,000,000/-; the "Reformed Church," 3,400,000/-; the Unitarians, 1,300,000/-; the Jewish, 1,000,000/-; the Congregational Body, 5,200,000/-; the "Universalists," 1,180,000/-; the "Christians," 1,340,000/-; the Mormons, 136,000/-; the "Shakers," 18,000/-; the Moravians, 148,000/-; the Friends (i.e., Quakers), 820,000/- The total of religious property is given at 73,850,000/-, as against 35,700,000/- in 1860, and 18,000,000/- in 1850.

The comparison of the Indian Exchequer returns for the final quarter of the current official year shows a decrease of 180,136/- in receipts, and an increase of 642,535/- in expenditure. In opium the decrease in receipts amounted to 124,400/-; the increase in expenditure to 159,765/- The loss by exchange is 118,885/-; by public works ordinary, 89,909/-; and public works extraordinary, 176,299/- The total receipts at the end of June amounted to 14,836,646/-, and the expenditure to 12,613,379/-

The sixty-sixth annual publication of the poor rate return, now issued, represents the sums levied and expended as poor rates throughout the whole of England; excepting only some small parishes, which are stated by the overseers either to have "no poor," or to make no levy "yet." The returns, in a contracted shape, are exhibited in the next table, for the last nine years, with the rate per head, on the estimated population, of the amount levied as poor's rate, and of the amount expended in relief:—

It is to be observed that 4,086,618*l*, or more than one-third of the whole poor rates now levied, are expended for "other purposes" than the relief of the poor. Some of these are partly connected with the relief of the poor, but the greater portion are totally unconnected with it. The figures which represent for 1872-73 the whole expenditure out of the rates are these:—1. Relief to the poor, 7,692,169*l*; 2. Law charges, 24,068*l*; 3. Purposes partly connected and partly unconnected with relief, 615,546*l*; 4. Purposes wholly unconnected with relief, 4,094,783*l*—total, 12,426,566*l*. The expenditure for relief to the poor only shows a decrease in 1873 as compared with 1872 of 315,234*l*, or 3·9 per cent. The rate per head on the estimated population was 6s 11½*d* in 1872, and 6s 7½*d* in 1873. The expenditure unconnected with relief to the poor is entirely foreign to the object originally contemplated in the enactment of the rate, and has greatly increased since the passing of the Poor Law Amendment Act in 1834, in consequence of the imposition of new and the augmentation of old charges. In 1873 the payments for or towards the county, borough, and police rates were 3,041,808*l*; payments by overseers to highway boards, 704,483*l*; other local expenses, 348,492*l*—total, 4,094,783*l*.

A paper has been read before the National Association for the promotion of Social Science on the "Law of Conspiracy and its Modern Application," by Mr Rupert Kettle. The following are extracts:—"My subject divides itself naturally into three propositions:—1st. What is the crime of conspiracy? 2nd. By what evidence is it proved? 3rd. Should the law relating to it be amended?.....The practical result of my whole argument is, that I recommend the association to consider:—1. Whether it is not better, having regard to the present position and permanent interest of master and servant, to declare, or, if necessary, repeal so much of our ancient common law as relates to acts in restraint of trade, and to repeal the penal provisions of the Master and Servant Act, instead of incurring the danger of disturbing our criminal polity by attempting to alter the fundamental principles of the law against conspiracy. 2. Whether, as a matter of administration, it is not just that all defendants indicted for conspiracy should have, of right, all the advantages they can already obtain by removing indictments into the superior courts.....I am glad the association invited me to treat the question in its purely legal aspect, and apart from any of its supposed economic influences. It is not a question of class interests. The workman passes part of the twenty-four hours as a producer and part as consumer. His time, in fact, is divided in his relation to others between his position of employer and employed. It is an axiom in social economics capable of arithmetical proof, that where a workman spends the whole of his wages his interests as employer and as a workman exactly balance each other. Looking at the condition of some neighbouring nations, I think we may congratulate ourselves that a public association like this can lawfully and freely meet to discuss topics such as that upon which we are now engaged. Not only can we combine and confederate without fear, but with the full assurance that if our deliberations are wise, we shall, upon this, as we have upon other pressing and important questions, help to form a sound public opinion, and ultimately influence for good the counsels of the State."

The statement of accounts of the Metropolitan Water Companies (nominally for the year 1872, but in most instances for the year ending with March, 1873), prepared in pursuance of the Water Act of 1871, shows the following results:—The Chelsea Company states its capital expenditure at 839,436*l* down to the middle of the year; its water rents accrued were 39,712*l* in the first half and 39,409*l* in the second half of the year, making together 79,211*l*, and 27,980*l* was the year's cost of maintenance of works and management. The East London Company reports its capital expenditure, 1,843,325*l*; water rents accrued 161,735*l*; and 63,244*l* paid for maintenance and management. The Grand Junction Company shows capital expenditure, 1,037,666*l*; water rents accrued, 111,542*l*; and cost of maintenance and management, 43,206*l*. The Kent Company reports capital expenditure, 480,994*l*; water rents, 65,153*l*; and 25,119*l* cost of maintenance and management. The Lambeth Company shows capital expenditure, 1,009,361*l*; water rents 108,855*l*; and 44,053*l* maintenance and management. The New River Company, capital, 2,666,597*l*; water rents, 308,028*l*; maintenance and management, 119,711*l*. The Southwark and Vauxhall Company, capital expenditure, 1,509,002*l*; water rates, 126,543*l*; and 54,727*l* maintenance and management. The West Middlesex Company, capital expenditure, 877,808*l*; water rates, 130,374*l*; and 44,097*l* maintenance and management. The totals show 10,264,189*l* capital expenditure, as stated in each case, to the middle of the year; 1,091,351*l* water rents accrued; and 422,138*l* cost of maintenance and management.

The following is a return of the number of emigrants from Ireland who left the country during the years 1872 and 1873. These important returns are obtained at the several ports by the Metropolitan police and the royal Irish constabulary, who act as enumerators.—In 1872, males 46,212, females 31,890; total, 78,102. In 1873, males 51,930, females 38,219; total, 90,149. Net increase in 1873, males 5,718, females 6,329; total, 12,047. But in the months of November and December the number of emigrants decreased 1,074 and 556 respectively, in comparison with those months in 1872. The total emigration from Ireland since the 1st of May, 1851—the date at which the collection of these returns commenced—to the 31st December, 1873, was 2,252,745 persons.

According to the returns supplied by the emigration officers at Liverpool, it appears that during the past quarter 25,659 persons left that port, principally for the United States. Of these 18,090 were English, 9,258 foreigners, 2,919 Irish, and 392 Scotch. The year's emigration shows a decrease of 5,592. During the month of December 22 ships sailed under the provisions of the Emigration Act, carrying 2,459 passengers; and 49 vessels, not under the Act, sailed with 1,566 passengers. This shows a decrease of 1,962 emigrants as compared with December, 1872.

An official report of the number and duration of strikes in Germany has been issued by the Handelstag Committee, by which it may be seen that this engine of democracy, as it is regarded in that country, has been well employed since its movers first took to organising combined inroads on the domains of capital. The report states that 204 suspensions of work took place since the general movement began, of which 146 occurred in large or wholesale trades, and 58 in the smaller branches of industry. As in this country, miners appear to have been most refractory, the number of men on strike in one district having been as many as 7,000 or 8,000, while other strikes are reported in the same industry in which over 5,000 men participated. The actual suspensions were: in mines, 11; in mines conjointly with factories, 21; in textile factories, 39; in cigar and tobacco works, 15; in hat-making and printing establishments, 10 each; in railway and carriage works, 6; and in industries where machinery is not employed, 30; such suspensions of work took place in the building trade alone. Two strikes lasted six months; 8 more lasted over three months; and 36 between the latter period and one month.

The amount of Customs duty collected by the United States Government at New York considerably declined last year, as compared with 1872. In the first quarter of last year the collection amounted to \$35,758,539, as compared with \$42,124,009 in the corresponding quarter of 1872; in the second quarter, to \$26,222,978, as compared with \$31,698,701 in the corresponding quarter of 1872; in the third quarter to \$33,991,737, as compared with \$39,860,444 in the corresponding quarter of 1872; in October to \$7,656,385, as compared with \$10,655,391 in October, 1872; and in November to \$5,588,339, as compared with \$7,274,100 in November, 1872. The aggregate collection for the first 11 months of last year thus amounted to \$109,217,978, as compared with \$131,612,644 in the corresponding period of 1872.

The United States have been unsettled by labour combinations to keep up wages when other prices had fallen. The locomotive engineers' strike on the Pennsylvania and Western railroads would seem to have soon spent itself, and trains were running once more with commendable regularity. The contest, in fact, turned on the question whether the former would or would not recognise the fact that there had been a great financial and business revision, seriously curtailing the income not only of their employers, but compelling lower prices and reduced wages in almost every department of skilled labour.

The immigration for 1873, judging from the arrivals reported at New York, is not so large as during 1872. During 1873 down to December 20, there were 266,011 immigrants landed at New York, the number for the corresponding period of 1872 having been 292,933, a decrease of 26,922. The bulk of the immigrants this year came from Germany and Ireland, as usual, the former sending us 105,749, and the latter 76,083. England sent 32,713, France 5,197, Sweden 10,173, and Italy 6,770. There were 2,437 Mormon arrivals this year (777 more than last year), and England, Denmark, and Sweden furnished the most of them. The Southern Emigration Societies have this year succeeded in getting a larger immigration to the Southern States than formerly was the case, although the number who go in that direction is still small.

A statement made by Dun, Barlow, and Co., mercantile agents in the leading cities of the United States, shows that in 1873 the number of mercantile failures was 5,183, the aggregate liabilities being \$228,499,000. This total is nearly double that of 1872, when the report was 4,069 failures, with \$121,056,000 liabilities. In New York city in 1873 the failures numbered 644, with over 92 millions of liabilities, which was two-fifths of the total for the whole country, whereas during 1872 the New York city failures numbered 385, with 20 millions of liabilities, but one-fifth of the total. This shows not only the effect of the panic, but also that it chiefly fell upon New York, a large portion of the increased liabilities of 1873 being those of banking firms who had heavy debts to depositors and on call loans, with collaterals of which a large percentage has since been adjusted or liquidated. In Pennsylvania the panic caused an increase from nine millions in 1872 to 31 millions in 1873, while it is remarkable that in some localities, in spite of the panic, there was actually a decrease in 1873 compared with 1872. Thus Massachusetts declined from 25 millions to 11 millions, and Illinois from 11 millions to 7 millions.

The whole railroad mileage in the United States is 71,564 miles, with second track and sidings of 18,512 miles, making the total equivalent of single track 85,076 miles. The total number of locomotives is 14,223;

of passenger train cars, including baggage, express, and smoking cars 13,725; of freight train cars of all sorts, 338,427. The total capital stock amounts to \$2,072,251,954, or about \$28,956 per mile; the total floating and funded debt, \$1,999,741,597, or \$27,957 per mile; and the total cost of railroads and equipments, \$3,728,416,958, or about \$52,099 per mile. The total gross traffic of railroads for the latest year yet obtainable was \$478,885,597, and the total net receipts over and above operating expense were \$174,350,913. These earnings are based on 54,454 miles of road, that being the total for which earnings have been reported; and hence the net income of railroads applicable to the payment of interest and dividends amounted to about \$3,201 per mile on the 54,454 miles operated.

Dr Archibald Campbell, late Superintendent of Darjeeling, read a paper at the Society of Arts on Indian teas. It was very satisfactory to be able to state that the Indian authorities had been roused to vigorous exertions in providing means of communication between the tea-producing districts and the sea-board. Merchants from Thibet, Cashmere, and Afghanistan had crossed the Himalayas into India, and were carrying off the teas from the factories in the north-west at highly remunerative prices, bespeaking all the crop of next year in Kumaon, and paying down half the cash in advance. Taking all circumstances into consideration, the tea prospects were brighter than the pioneers of the great Indian industry could hitherto boast of. The tea crop of India was in 1873 about 20,000,000 lbs, of which Darjeeling contributed 2,600,000, increasing at the rate of 15 per cent. per annum on the land actually under tea cultivation—*i.e.*, 14,000 acres. For the present year 21,000,000 lbs could be reckoned on, of which 3,000,000 would be from Darjeeling. There were other lands which, when cultivated, would increase the supply. Dr Campbell dwelt upon the quantity of spurious and adulterated China teas imported into England, and the extent to which pure Indian teas were kept back from the public for the purpose of mixing to make them saleable. He said the public were not fully alive to the excellence and economy of Indian teas, and concluded by trusting that the Society of Arts would point out some means of protecting the people from the calamity of flooding the country with adulterated teas, and of securing for the Indian teas a fair field in the English market.

The following is the New South Wales Tariff, as assented to by his Excellency the Governor, to become operative on the 1st of January, 1874:—Spirits—On all kinds of spirits imported into the colony, the strength of which can be ascertained by Syke's hydrometer, the proof gallon, 10s; on all spirits and spirituous compounds imported into the colony, the strength of which cannot be ascertained by Syke's hydrometer, the liquid gallon, 10s; methylated spirits, per gallon, 2s; wines, sparkling, per gallon, 6s; other kinds, ditto, 4s; sarsaparilla, if containing not more than 25 per cent. of proof spirit, per liquid gallon, 4s; beer, ale, porter, spruce, or other beers, in wood or jar, per gallon, 6d; ditto, in bottle, per gallon, 9d; cigars, per lb, 5s; snuff, per lb, 2s; tobacco, manufactured, per lb, 2s; ditto, unmanufactured, per lb, 1s; ditto, for sheepwash, per lb, 3d; opium (including all goods, wares, and merchandise mixed or saturated with opium, or with any preparation or solution thereof, or steeped therein), per lb, 10s; coffee, chicory, cocoa, and chocolate, per lb, 3d; tea, per lb, 3d; sugar, raw, per cwt, 5s; ditto, refined, per cwt, 6s 8d; ditto, molasses and treacle, per cwt, 3s 4d; malt, per bushel, 6d; hops, per lb, 3d; confits, confectionery, and suades, per lb, 1½d; cordage and rope, per ton, 40s; paints, per ton, 40s; nails, per ton, 40s; galvanised iron, in bars, bundles, or sheets, or corrugated, per ton, 40s; galvanised manufactures, per cwt, 3s; vinegar, per gallon, 6d; turpentine, per gallon, 1s; varnish, per gallon, 2s; sage, ginger, jams, jellies, nuts of all kinds (except cocoanuts), preserves, biscuits, blue, dates, mustard, starch, maizens, and cornflour, per lb, 1d; dried, preserved, and salt fish, per lb, 1d; powder, blasting, per lb, 1d; powder, sporting, per lb, 3d; shot, per cwt, 5s; woolpacks, each, 3d; bags and sacks, per dozen, 1s; gunny bags, per dozen, 6d; cheese, dried fruit, pepper, spices, bacon, and hams, per lb, 2d; candles, per lb, 1d; cement, per barrel, 2s; bottled fruits (quarts), per dozen, 2s; ditto (pints and smaller packages), per dozen, 1s; rice, per ton, 60s; iron wire, per ton, 20s; salt and saltpetre, per ton, 20s; soda crystals, per ton, 2s; timber, dressed, per 100 ft superficial, 2s; ditto, rough and undressed, ditto, 1s; oilmen's stores—sauces and pickles, quarts, per dozen, 1s; ditto, pints and smaller quantities, 6d; paper, writing and fancy, per lb, 1d; ditto, brown and wrapping, per cwt, 3s 4d; oils of all kinds (except animal, sperm, black, and cocoanut), per gallon, 6d; ointments, sashes, and shutters, each, 1s.

On October 16 the Auditor-General published an account of the receipts and expenditure of South Australia up till the close of September, from which it appears that during the first nine months of the current year the revenue has been 719,019/- or only a few thousands less than the estimate for the twelve months. All the main sources of income have contributed liberally towards this result, customs and railways having been particularly prolific. It is probable that the receipts for the present quarter will yield considerably more than 200,000/-; and should they do so, the Treasurer, as we have before had occasion to note, will commence 1874 with a balance to the good of between 100,000/- and 150,000/-. The expenditure has been somewhat beyond the estimate, but there is a large balance now available to meet liabilities. The prospects of the colony have been somewhat overclouded through the unseasonable prevalence of dry weather. A month ago we were able to report that the wheat crops were progressing favourably, and that the harvest was likely to be as prolific as that of last year. Now the farmers are oscillating between the hope of securing a moderate yield and the fear of having to put up with an average of six or seven bushels an acre. Ten days ago the aspect of affairs was for them exceedingly gloomy, but, fortunately, a more cheerful face has been lately put upon matters.

The return of bullion in the Bank of England for the month ending January 28, gives an aggregate average in both departments of £22,991,631. On a comparison of this with the return for the month ending December 31, there appears to be an increase of £757,270, and a decrease of £1,507,839, as compared with the same period of last year. The stock of specie held by the banks in Scotland and Ireland during the month ending January 24 was £6,838,381, being a decrease of £315,033 on the previous month, and an increase of £4,879 on the corresponding period last year.

COMMERCIAL AND MISCELLANEOUS NEWS.

The offer made to the Norfolk Agricultural Association last year, by the Earl of Leicester, of £200 for the best essay on the improvements in agriculture which have been made in the Eastern District of England during the last twenty years, has been accepted. The essays are to be sent in to the secretary by the 1st of March, 1875, subject to the conditions of the society.

The *New York Chronicle* of Jan. 31 contains an article on waste in cotton as affecting consumption, and states the question of the world's actual consumption of cotton is just at present less clearly defined in minds of cotton men than ever before. This is due to several disturbing elements in Liverpool statistics, lately brought to light, which enter into the problem. First, we had the stock-taking at the close of the year at Liverpool, disclosing 120,000 bales more of cotton than was supposed to be held there. Next, we had the "Board of Trade" returns, showing about 140,000 bales less delivered to spinners during the year than the Cotton Brokers' Annual Circular gave. The cotton crop of 1872-3 contained more dust, sand, and other heavy trash than any other one ever produced in the United States. Spinners state that the loss from this cause in the use of the cotton was very large (found to be not less than ten, and often going above twenty per cent.) in several hundred thousand bales. Its excess in the average of that crop above the usual portion of sand and dust in American crops was probably somewhere between four and six per cent. If 5 per cent., then that crop lost in use from this cause about 200,000 bales. Then again, there was another wasting characteristic of the last crop, and that was the great excess of "fly," the result of the dry season, which, in mills using cotton wholly free from sand and dust, and of high grade, made the "waste" run higher than usual by two or three per cent. From the same cause (a dry season) the packing-boxes would not hold so much weight of lint as the usual average, the cotton being more spongy and elastic in mass than in a wet season. Therefore the bales were lighter in actual weight of lint than usual. From these conditions of the cotton it is computed that the crop of 1872-3 could not, and did not, expend as well as the same number of bales in previous crops—say, by 7 to 7½ per cent. (some estimating the loss much greater), or 33 lbs per bale of 440 lbs net, and that the quantity in the crop—stated at 3,930,000 bales—was therefore in its expending value only 3,635,000 bales when compared with previous crops. In the crop of 1873-74 we find all these conditions absent. The season was a wet one. There is no more than the old average of dust and other heavy waste. It follows, therefore, if we are correct in our premises, that the production this year in expending value, whatever its number of bales, is to be rated in just comparison against only 3,635,000 bales of equal value in all the last crop. This difference will be felt more in England than elsewhere. Here, and on the Continent of Europe, the better and less dusty cotton was chiefly used. But England was the receptacle of two-thirds to three-fourths of our very dusty cotton. Fortunately for her she obtained it at a price quite 1d lower than similarly degraded cotton commands relatively in ordinary crops, and found profit in its use, or at least a reduced loss. But there can be no true comparative statement of her consumption which fails to take into account the serious difference which this large waste should abate from her apparent consumption. This packed up dust and sand is not thrown off in tare like the bagging and bands, yet it never goes into cloth or yarns.

Queensland is making some rapid strides onwards. Manufactures of various kinds are increasing, and mining is being prosecuted with considerable energy. In the fourteen years of her independent existence (for it is that time since her severance from New South Wales) her population has increased from 45,077 to 133,553; her area, leased in acres, from 57,200,000 to 123,737,093; her horses, from 36,532 to 92,798; horned cattle, from 637,299 to 1,200,992; sheep, from 4,533,353 to 6,687,907; gold sent by escort (value), from nil to 592,993; copper ore raised (value), from nil to 196,000/-; shipping inwards (tonnage), from 77,312 to 148,630; wool exported, from 8,063,613 lbs to 17,793,393 lbs; tallow, from 1,503 tons to 2,890 tons; cotton, from 14,344 lbs to 1,488,987 lbs; preserved and fresh meat, from 510/- to 62,695/-; imports (total value), from 1,323,509/- to 2,218,717/-; exports (total value), from 793,236/- to 2,698,934/-; revenue, from 295,286/- to 996,323/-; expenditure, from 317,026/- to 805,743/- Cotton appears to be yielding to sugar, of which the London buyers have already spoken with much favour. In this list no place is accorded to tin, and yet this mineral is reaching us in large quantities from the extensive tin tracts. The produce of tin by this colony and Queensland is likely to have a very sensible effect on the Cornish mines, seeing how slight were the expenses incurred here in procuring stream tin of high quality. The warning was ridiculed in England, but now a great many of the Cornish mines, finding it impossible to stand the competition, are obliged to close.

The financial statement of the Amalgamated Association of Miners states that the associated branches are 45 in number, and the counties into which they extend are West Cumberland, Lancashire, Staffordshire, Shropshire, Warwickshire, Gloucestershire, Derbyshire, Flintshire, Monmouthshire, Brecon, Glamorganshire, Carnarvonshire, and Cardigan. Oldham, with 1,200 members, seceded and joined the National Association after the last conference, probably owing to decisions adverse to them; but their place had been filled by a new branch—that of Clea Hills, near Ludlow. The membership had increased from 99,399 as on the 30th September, 1873, to 106,368 on the 31st March, 1874, being an increase of 6,969 during the last six months. The funds of the association have decreased during the six months, owing chiefly to the protracted lock-out at Burnley, and matters connected therewith. Upwards of one thousand men had been continuously supported from the funds with the association allowance, and the executive had besides augmented their support by a payment of 25 per cent. extra from the voluntary subscriptions fund. Further, a large amount of money had been paid in the defence of the officers and others on a charge of conspiracy. There had been other strikes which the association had to contend with. The executive had been obliged to lay two sixpenny levies for the general fund, and one sixpenny levy for the Burnley men. Another levy was payable on or before the 14th instant, to meet the claims of the men contending against a reduction in South Staffordshire. There were also a number of men on strike in North Wales and some in the Neath district. The amount of funds in hand at the last con-

ference was 20,566*l*. There had been received during the six months for entrance fees, contributions, interest, &c., 8,425*l*; defence fund, 8*s* 18*d*; for election expenses, 906*l*; in special levies, 2,523*l*; in the Burnley fund, 5,103*l*; making a total income of 37,533*l*. The expenditure during the six months for agents' wages and fares, salaries, rent of rooms, printing, stationery, postages, telegrams, defence witnesses in the trial, and other sundry expenses, amounted to 2,247*l*. There had been paid to men on strike 17,856*l*. To unfinancial members and in gifts to Burnley men 4,234*l* had been paid. 20*l* was contributed to the Representation of Labour League. The election expenses at Wigan cost 660*l*, and at Merthyr Tydfil 967*l*; and the total expenditure was 26,005*l*. A balance was left in hand of 11,524*l*. There was also a subscription in hand amounting to 926*l*, raised towards the Pimsoill Seamen's Fund.

At a meeting of the Society of Arts, under the presidency of Vice-Admiral Erasmus Ommanney, two papers on the geographical and physical character of the diamond fields of South Africa were read. The first, by the Hon. Theophilus Shepstone, the Secretary for Native Affairs in Natal, described the conditions under which the diamond is found on the Vaal River. He pointed out that Africa south of the equator consists of a great central irregularly-shaped basin, the outer edges of which varied in height from 4,000 to 10,000 feet above the level of the sea, and that through this river the Orange River to the south-west and the Limpopo River to the north-east cut their way. It is near the exit of the former from the enormous basin that the diamond fields lie, while gold in large quantities is being obtained from the north-eastern district. The author of this paper conjectures that this basin is the dry bed of an enormous inland sea, and that the diamonds which are found in it were formed by carbonic acid gas ejected by the action of subterranean heat through fissures in the earth's surface into the bed of the dried-up sea, the water of which was sufficiently deep to imprison and liquefy the gas after its evolution. The second paper, which was by Dr Robert Mann, late Superintendent of Education in the colony of Natal, dealt principally with the commercial aspects and influences of the South African diamond and gold fields. Since the first serious working of the diamond fields in 1871 large numbers of diamonds had been obtained, and it was estimated that in 1872 there were no less than 20,000 miners engaged in searching for them. So large has been the yield that a very material diminution has been brought about in the value of the larger gems in the home market, and the diggers are now leaving the diamond fields for the more profitable north-eastern gold fields. The result of the discovery of these fields has been to develop South African commercial enterprise and to civilise the wild tribes in that part of the continent. Mr Sopen, a diamond merchant, stated that the number of diamonds of the purest water received from the Cape was very small, not amounting on the whole to more than 2 or 3 per cent., while of ten-carat stones not one in 10,000 was perfect. In consequence of the large quantity of second-class stones received from the Cape, such gems were now 60 or 70 per cent. cheaper than they were three years ago. Stones which some time since would have realised 1,500*l* would now only fetch 200*l*. The first-class diamonds, however, were rather dearer than formerly. Professor Tennant, in reply to a question, said that there was no truth in the report that Cape diamonds gradually lost their brilliancy after being cut and polished.

According to the Blue-book lately issued, there has been a decrease in the house duty of about 20,000*l*, when in the natural course of things the Commissioners consider there should have been a considerable increase to the extent of the actual decrease. The doubts as to the scope of the exemption of trade premises mentioned in the last report as prevailing with the Commissioners for the city of London might be assigned as a sufficient cause; but, after making the allowance, the Commissioners state that they should have still to account for the sudden arrest of progress in the duty which occurred in 1872-73. The Commissioners add—"We have no doubt that this is a consequence of the Metropolitan Valuation Act, which came into operation in the year 1871. The result of the re-valuation then made by the Assessment Committee was an increase of 42,600 in the number of houses charged, and 3,000,000*l* in their value in both cases—about double the average yearly increase. But it was soon found that many of these assessments could not be maintained, and especially in those cases in which the value of the houses had been raised from below the taxable limit of 20*l*, and had thus been for the first time brought under our charge. The consequence has been felt in the succeeding years from the successful appeals of a large number of householders who felt themselves aggrieved by the new or increased charges to which they were subjected." Shops and warehouses, beerhouses and farmhouses, are only charged at the rate of 6*d* in the pound, while dwelling-houses are charged 9*d* in the pound. Out of a duty of 1,382,860*l*, the dwelling-houses paid 1,046,001*l*.

Mr Fawcett, addressing the electors of Hackney, has expressed some views on taxation which are reported as follows:—I certainly think there are strong reasons for urging that if the Income Tax cannot be altogether abolished the best way of giving relief would be to exempt all incomes of less than 200*l* a year from the tax, and to deduct this amount from incomes exceeding 200*l*. Thus an income of 250*l* would pay the tax on 50*l*. But when we come to consider what the Government is likely to do in reference to local taxation, we have reason for the most serious misgiving. The next time some county member talks to his tenant farmers about the great boon he is going to secure to them by getting grants from the consolidated fund with a view to diminishing rates, let him at the same time explain to the farmers what security they will have; that if they are called upon to pay 100*l* a year less in rates they will not be called upon at once to pay 100*l* a year more as rent to their landlord. We all know that the agent or the steward would at once say, "These farmers having to pay so much less in rates can afford to pay so much more as rent." Nothing seems more surprising than the statements perpetually made that local taxation in this country is peculiarly a grievance of the landed interest. The more the subject is inquired into the more evident will it appear that local taxation

presses with greatest severity upon the house occupiers in our towns and not upon the owners or cultivators of land. You who are inhabitants of a metropolitan borough should be among the first to demand a reform of local taxation and of local government.

According to the returns printed on co-operative societies, there were in Scotland 178. The amount insured was £6,080*l.* At the end of the year 1872 there were 38,829 members; the amount of share capital at the end of 1872 was £181,793*l.*; the loan capital at the same period, £27,022*l.* The trade accounts show that the cash received for goods sold in 1872 was £1,595,120*l.*, the average stock-in-trade during the year, £163,971*l.* The expenses of the year were £78,543*l.*, and the interest on share and other capital, £9,103*l.* As to the liabilities, it appears that the entire liabilities were £358,863*l.*; the reserve fund, £14,309*l.*; the entire assets, £11,822*l.*; the value of buildings and land, £8,776*l.*; the capital vested with other similar societies, £17,765*l.*, and the capital invested with other companies, £2,803*l.* The net profits, disposable from all sources, were £126,314*l.*; dividends declared to members during the year, £108,790*l.*; dividends allowed to non-members, £2,994*l.* In Scotland the amount allowed for educational purposes during the year was only £237*l.*

The production of wines in France was 25,000,000 hectolitres in 1788 but, owing to the oidium, and later to the phylloxera, the quantity has been very irregular, and within late years has varied between 29,788,243 hectolitres in 1861, to 70,000,009 in 1869, and 55,079,500 in 1872. Alsace and Lorraine furnished 1,512,672 hectolitres in 1869. The official report of prices shows little variation from 1806 to 1850, being between 33f to 36f the hectolitre. From 1850 prices rose from 28f in 1851 to 67f in 1857, the average being 49f, and up to 1869 prices were firmly maintained. If we multiply these figures, 49f 68c, average price by the production of 1869, we find the wine crop was worth in that year 3,447,600,600f. Only 52,000,000 of the 70,000,000 hectolitres of 1869 paid government duty, which shows that 17,000,000 escaped the watchfulness of the excise agents. The export of wine in France has shown an astonishing development; only 47,300,000f in 1836, it rose to 220,500,000f per annum for the period of 1857-1866. The exportation in 1871 was 277,665,000f, the quantity in that year being 3,323,524 hectolitres: in 1872 3,423,071 hectolitres were exported.

Sir H. Parkes, in a communication to Lord Granville from Yedo, dated the 7th July, 1873, states that the commercial year in China and Japan terminates at the end of June with the close of the tea and silk season. Dwelling on the subject of "overtrading," Sir Harry Parkes refers to the accounts he had received that "business was overdone," he expresses a hope that such excessive speculation would not be repeated in the current year. There are it seems Japanese guilds, and they exercise a very potent influence on the foreign commerce of Japan. Sir H. Parkes mentions some circumstances to show that the plan of the "present Japanese Government is to run all trade into the mould of monopoly, to restrict it according to the personal view of men who are in office for the moment, and to make commerce subservient to their own purpose. The eagerness which many Japanese officials exhibit to quit their posts—apparently as wealthy men—and to share in the profits of business thus conducted, is also a noteworthy feature in the present aspect of trade in Japan." Sir H. Parkes, in a further communication to Lord Granville, dated August 5, 1873, encloses a report on the Island of Yedo. The total value of the exports from Yedo is estimated at \$8,000,000 per annum, and the duty paid on exports about \$370,000.

The annual report recently issued by the assessors of the State of New York, referring to the method of assessing property liable to taxation, shows that the valuation of the small proportion of personal property which is assessed ranges from 100 to 20 per cent. of its value, and at least 85 per cent. of it escapes taxation altogether. The valua-

tion of real estate is equally capricious, ranging from 75 per cent. to 15 per cent. of its value on a fair sale. The assessors found that in every part of the State the least productive property and that of the lowest real value is assessed at the highest ratio. Small houses and lots are usually assessed at about 60 per cent. of their actual value, while the dwellings of wealthy people are assessed sometimes as low as 20 per cent. The assessment of personal property has now reached the point where virtually the amount of the assessment "depends more on the will, craft, conscience, or want of conscience, of the party assessed than upon the law or its enforcement." The assessors state, further, that less than 15 per cent. of the personal property of the State liable to taxation finds a place on the rolls of the assessor. The assessors make the rather startling announcement, that in every section of the State "the universal statement and evidence is that the farm lands have depreciated in value from 10 to 30 per cent. in the last six years." They add that "in many of the best agricultural counties the number of farms is constantly decreasing, and the population is not so large now as 10 or 20 years ago.

The following shows the rates of American railroad dividends in 1873, as reported in "Poor's Manual," the year being generally the one which expired before May last. The whole mileage covered in Poor's table is 57,323, which is about seven-eighths of the average mileage worked in 1872, put probably includes every railroad that paid a dividend:—

The Statistician of the Department of Agriculture has completed an investigation concerning last year's farm products. The greatest reduction in yield is in corn, and the decline is heaviest in the great corn-growing States, one of the lowest Western averages being that of Illinois, which is only 21 bushels per acre upon an area of more than 7,000,000 acres. The average yield of wheat was greater in most of the States than in 1872. In most other grains and in potatoes a decline is shown. The potato yield is especially low in Illinois, Missouri, Iowa, Kansas, and Nebraska. The average prices follow closely the changes in the local rate of yield, rising almost exactly in proportion to the local scarcity, and falling with increased production. The report shows a few exceptions or modifications of this law, the result of distant or foreign demand. It is seen, especially in Missouri and Kansas, that comparative scarcity of grain products counteracts largely the effect of distance from the seaboard, and compels higher prices than are obtained in any other interior States west of the Ohio.

The general trade circular issued by Messrs. Norman Bros., of Calcutta, states that during the month of October the German Government shipped about thirty lacs of silver to Calcutta. This appeared to be the first of the anticipated large shipments of this metal to India, and confirmed the general feeling that existed in London and in the East, that India alone would furnish a certain and profitable return for it, and that in consequence something like 90 millions sterling from Germany, before she completed her gold currency, and some unknown quantity from the other European powers, who are contemplating a resort to the single gold standard, would during the next few years flood India, and reduce the value of the rupee to something like 1s 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. For the present, we may say that the Germans are not likely to thrust their surplus silver on India under certain rates, because in the four European countries that have the double standard, they can always get off a fair amount, even through their mints, at something like an equivalent to 59d per oz in London; and with regard to the five-franc pieces taken in part payment of the indemnity, they can work those with these four countries at rates which, at the present exchange between France and England, would equal 60 $\frac{1}{2}$ d per oz standard in London, without charges. It has long been expected that the short importation of silver consequent on the increased amount of Government drafts must tell upon the currency, as it is known that the average requirements of the country, independent of the circulation in our own dominions, is two crores a year; hitherto we have not been able to trace the expected effect in diminished prices, but it may be that the extraordinary demand for silver for the movement of rice to the famine-stricken districts is now disclosing a depleted and insufficient currency. If this should be found not to concur with any large indebtedness to India, the speediest remedy would be for the Government to take a loan from the German Government, payable in silver, rather than leaving it to the slower action of the rate of interest and the state of the exchanges, which in the course of time should bring in the metal. As we presume a loan must be a portion of the next budget, the knowledge of it would act as a considerable stimulus to such a desirable end.

POST OFFICE ANNOUNCEMENTS.

It having been represented to this department that packets containing articles of jewellery, watches, &c., received in Peru are chargeable with customs' duties, and ought not to be forwarded by post, the Postmaster-General thinks it necessary to make this regulation known to the public, and to state that any letters or packets containing such articles sent through the post to places in Peru are, according to the laws of that country liable to confiscation.

During the summer months (commencing on the 1st May) there will be a service to the Channel Islands daily, Sundays excepted. From Monday to Friday inclusive the despatch from London will be by the ordinary night mail train to Southampton, but on Saturday, when the packet will leave Southampton earlier than other nights and will proceed direct to Jersey, the mails will be forwarded by the 5.20 p.m. train from Waterloo station, and the Guernsey bags sent on that day will reach their destination via Jersey on Monday morning. The mails from the Islands will be due in London every day, Sundays excepted, in time for the first delivery.

Since the issue of notice No. 16, dated the 30th ultimo, relative to the Australian mail service, the Postmaster-General of Victoria has requested that correspondence for that colony, which may be specially directed to be sent by the route of Singapore and Brisbane, may be so forwarded. The public are, therefore, informed that, while all correspondence for Victoria not bearing a special address will, as a rule, be sent by the Point de Galle and Melbourne route, correspondence for this colony will also be sent, in future, either via Singapore and Brisbane or via San Francisco, if bearing a special address to that effect.

Commencing on the 15th inst., an additional packet will be despatched from Liverpool on the 15th of each month, to call at the ports on the South West Coast of Africa not visited by the regular packets which

sail every Saturday. The ports at which these additional packets intend to call from time to time will be notified in the postal circular. Mails for conveyance by those vessels will be despatched from London on the evening of the 14th of each month, and from Liverpool on the following day, excepting when the 14th falls on a Sunday, on which occasions the mails will leave London on the evening of the 15th, and the packet will sail one day later.

Education during 1873 was fostered in England and Wales by Government grants to the amount of £1,172,786/18s 2d, an increase of 198,494/15s 7d compared with the year 1872. From the fact that grants for evening scholars show a falling off of 7,255/1, while other objects for which grants were made have largely developed, it would appear that the former hap-hazard kind of education is being improved upon by the new regulations. The total grants since 1839, inclusive, now amount to £13,361,905/1s 6d, of which £8,856,648/1 was to Church of England schools. Increased accommodation was provided in 1873 for 78,018 children, at a cost of £9,277/11s from Parliamentary grants, in addition to £62,774/1 subscribed by promoters. Since 1839, a term of 35 years, new buildings and extensions of the same kind have provided accommodation for 1,150,502 children. For Scotland, the expenditure from education grants was £40,291/7s 8d in the year 1873; for the 35 years, £8,255,660/1. Increased accommodation was made for 1,678 children, at an expenditure of £9,972/1 on the necessary buildings and extensions.

The net receipts in 1872 were, however, only 1,044,256 roubles, 1872, against 1,321,628 roubles in 1871, the net profit *per cent* being 8 r 16 c in 1872, against 11 r 34 c in 1871.

With regard to migration to the South in the United States, a report has been published which is thus commented upon by the New York *Chronicle*:—An important question arises as to taxation. So much has been said with regard to the debts Southern States have accumulated, and the bad Governments they have been forced to live under of late, that the taxes one may be called upon to pay become a leading consideration. On this point we find some figures in Mr Killebrew's report, worked out from the census returns, which are very instructive. For the purpose of better comparison, we bring all his statements into the following table:—

The above figures apply to 1870. Of course some changes have been

made since, but this table is sufficient to show us that the question of taxation for the new citizen to consider is really not so serious anywhere as many have been led to suppose. In fact, the rate on each thousand dollars and the rate per head is higher in many other sections of the country. Besides, it will be noticed that in those Southern States where the Government has been honest, taxation is small; and it is only necessary that this purifying process be extended, and the power in each State placed in the hands of the taxpayers to bring down taxation in other States.

The following remarks on the Bengal deficiency are from the *Indian Economist*, dated March 31:—"The district officers of Bengal estimate the average consumption of rice per head of the population at two-thirds to three-fourths of a seer per day. If then we assume the population to have been correctly returned by the late census, the annual consumption of grain in the provinces will be represented by the following figures:—

The first estimate gives a total of 14,700,000 tons; the second, of 16,700,000. To arrive at the harvest, we must add 2,000,000 tons for seed, &c., and 400,000 tons for export. Thus the most moderate estimate of the grain harvest of the presidency is about 17,000,000 tons; a very common one making it 19,000,000. Now the harvest has failed so heavily that the people will not gather upon the whole more than one-third of this average yield. In other words, the harvests of the year 1873-4 (April to April) fall short of their normal yield by the enormous amount of ten or twelve millions of tons. If we estimate the gross yield of the three harvests (bhadoo, aghanee and rubbee) in Behar and Rajshahye at 5-16ths of the usual yield (which is too high an estimate), the position of the 28 millions who have gathered no more than this proportion of the average harvest, is as follows:—

The effect which the demand for seed has upon the position, has not, perhaps, been adequately discerned. If the yield really is but one-third, or a little less, nearly half the harvest will be wanted for seed. It will no doubt surprise most of our readers to learn that the total amount of surplus food grown by all the great producing countries of the world—Russia, Poland, Egypt, and America—has been just estimated in London at but from 12,000,000 to 18,000,000 quarters. Five quarters of wheat, in round figures, go to the ton. Thus, while the Bengal harvest has failed to the extent of 10 or 12 million tons of food, the total surplus of all the wheat-exporting countries of the world is estimated, at highest, at less than four million tons. Mr Lawes estimates the average consumption of wheat at home to be $5\frac{1}{2}$ bushels per head per annum (about 336 lbs), or a little less than one pound per head per day. The total wheat harvest of the United Kingdom was estimated in 1871 to be about 17 million quarters, or considerably less than four million tons. Estimates of this order can, in the nature of things, be approximate only, but our figures, we believe, give a generally correct idea of the calamity that has befallen Bengal.

A review of American trade, dated New York, May 13th, gives the following rather hopeful account:—Although there is no appreciable change from the general depression of business which has prevailed to this period of the spring season, yet certainly matters look no worse. The disease is not of that nature which admits of any quick improvement; but being a general prostration consequent upon an overstraining of the whole system of finance, industry, and commerce, the recuperation can be but gradual and almost imperceptible in its stages. There seems to be good reason for hoping, however, that the process of recovery has set in; but certain effects of the crisis, it would seem, must be more fully developed before the restoration of business can be considered as proceeding upon a really sound basis. Prices generally have declined very materially. Indeed, taking an average valuation of commodities, real estate, and securities, and it is perhaps safe to say that values are now 25 per cent. lower than they were at the beginning of last September. But in wages, which are the basis of commercial values, there has been no such reduction. It is felt to be the more necessary to produce cautiously under this unequal condition of things because, in the commercial countries with which we have to compete more or less, a steady reduction of wages is in progress and does not seem to have yet reached its full extent. The temper of the commercial mind is, under these circumstances, patient—free from alarm or uneasiness—and waiting for the conditions which would justify a renewal of active operations. The financial question before Congress, which so recently appeared to be the one thing upon which all business was waiting, has to a large extent lost its interest with the commercial public since the veto of the Senate's Finance Bill. The expansionists and inflationists in Congress appear to be so evenly balanced that it is not deemed likely that any measure will be passed which would very materially modify the existing currency system; and this being the common conclusion, the currency question is no longer regarded as an important element in the future of business. To-day, the Senate began the consideration of the amended House currency bill, a copy of which was appended to my last advices; and the debate upon it appears likely to be a protracted and exciting one.

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
