Soldiers and Labor Solid, Welfare of Country Demands Avoidance of Extremes of Reaction and Radicalism, Liberal Leader Says In

"The political campaign now drawing to a close has demon strated clearly that in the exercise of your franchise on December 6 you will be called upon to decide as respects the next five years:

"1. Whether the affairs of our country are to continue to be administered by an autocratic executive, indifferent alike to the will of the people and the rights of Parliament, as the Meighen administration has been ever since its usurpation of power nearly a

"2. Whether, at this critical time in our country's affairs and the unsettled conditions in other countries, we in Canada are to experiment in our Federal politics with government by a class primarily in the interests of a class; or,

"3. London, Dec. 4.—(Canadian Press Cable)—A weird entertainment was given at Bikaner, India, in honor of the Prince of Wales following a state-banquet at the palace. The entertainment began with a religious fire dance in the courtyard of the fort. The big bonfire, which had been lighted in the centre-of the great quadrangle, was then allowed to die down to a mass of glowing embers, through which bare legged natives, singing wildly, danced, kicking up a cascade of sparks and snatching portions of the flery mass which they placed in their mouths, although-the leat of the fire could be feit ten

The dancers subsequently prioutted, in front of the Prince, clamoring for him to inspect their feet, which were found to be anscarred by the fire and actually were moist and cool as though the lancers had been paddling in water.

NOVA SCOTIANS - WIN FIRST PRIZE FOR BOX APPLES

FOR BOX APPLES

Halifax, Dec. 4.—Nova Scotia box apples took first prize at the recent imperial fruit show in London, England, an achievement indicative of the recent rapid progress, of apple culture in this Province. Ten years ago Nova Scotia apples had a rather poor reputation, and on the British markets were bringing from four to ten shillings less per barrei than Ontario or British Columbia apples. About that time the Dominion Government, the Nova Scotia Government and the Canadian Pacific Railway, which controls the railroad running through the Annapois Valley, inaugurated a campaign to stimulate interest in improving the methods of maintaining and caring for orchards, and developing a better quality of fruit. Five years later Nova Scotia had become an important factor in the barrei apple market, but there were still horticulturists who doubted that this province would ever be able to compete successfully in the box apple trade. Careful cultivation and free use of sprays and insectitides have, however, made a notable improvement in the productivity and quality of Nova Scotia apples. For three years now the Province has had large apple crops of an excellent quality, and the orchardists have come to believe that with proper care, apple orchards can be educated out of the old habit of having full crop one year and a poor crop the mext.

This season Nova Scotia has sold This season Nova Scotia has sold an unusual quantity of apples in the American market, and the fruit growers expect to dispose of the balance at good prices in the British market. The crop is estimated at 1,500,000 barrels, and it is expected to yield the producers a profit of \$3 per barrel, clear of culls.





PACKING HOUSE WORKERS STRIKE

Statements of Two Sides in U. S. Disagree

Chicago, Dec. 5.—Union packing house workers in livestock certres outside of Chicago were reported by union strike leaders to-day to be practically all out on strike, while company officials declared their plants were not seriously affected, and in Chicago announced that all plants, except a few independent concerns, were working 30 to 35 per cent, of the regular force.

The union strike, vote dby the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen's Union, in protest over a reduction of wages, went into effect this morning.



Canadian Pacific Sued For Damages Following Mr. Day's Death

widow of the late Robert S. Day, on behalf of four dependant children, for the death of the late president of the Jubilee Hospital Board from in-juries sustained on the night of the Jubilee Hospital Ball in Novem stone parapet at the south approach

stone parapet at the south approach driveway of the Empress Hotel.

The trial is proceeding with a special jury. S. S. Taylor, K. C., for the plaintiffs, is making a final appearance in legal circles in Victoria, prior to his departure for the south. E. P. Davis, R. C., and J. E. McMullen are appearing for the railway company.

R. Bagshawe, foreman, E. G. Surrey, Thomas Hammond, W. H. Biggs, J. B. Rowe, R. McBratney, Samua-Holman and C. S. Ward were impannelled as the jury this morning by Sheriff Richards.

Mr. Taylor, in a brief outline to the jury, described the finding of the late Mr. Day at the foot of the eightfoot wall in a serious condition from fractures of the hip and other injuries. His death followed as the result of these injuries.

"We complain that the driveway was negligently guarded, and not safe for the public to use," said counsel. "Mr. and Mrs. Day were guests at the hotel, having tickets for the ball of the Jubilee Hospital for that night. The parking ground, we claim was a dangerous trap, and through this dangerous trap this man met his death. The wife and four dependent children are suing for damages, the amount of which will be left to the descretion of the jury. The glast of the action is therefore the claim that there was negligence on the part of the defendant company. The claim may be made that the late Mr. Day contributed to that negligence, but as to that I do not know."

Dr. W. J. Tomalin, family physician of the late Mr. Day was called in evidence and testified that prior to the accident Mr. Day was in excellent health, and died later as the result of complications from the original injuries.

Sergt. Major H. Hinds, a draftsman from Work Point Barracks, submitted plans made of the drive-way on the south side, the plans being shown to the jury. The trial is continuing.






