1. References: Paragraph 5, Operational Directive 89, Headquarters Eighth Army, dated 20 November 1946 and paragraph 10, inclosure 1 to Operational Directive 89.

2. Review of completed forms MGP 37 by Headquarters Eighth Army has been partially completed. The materials which are to be shipped from plants, laboratories or arsenals at this time, are indicated on attached forms as inclosures 1 to 13. Inclosure 14 is the consignee code.

3. Under authority contained in letter from General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, dated 14 March 1947, subject: "Temporary Release of Reparations Items for Use of Occupation Forces," materials listed in inclosures 1 through 13 are released from custody and control of the local military government teams and are to be shipped by the General Contractors' Association of Japan to indicated Engineer Depots who will assume responsibility for maintenance, custody and control.

4. In the event that removal of transformers and motors in indicated quantities will seriously jeopardize custody and control of remaining reparations items, this headquarters is to be notified without delay through normal military government channels.

5. The General Contractors have been advised that the removal of installed transformers may necessitate rewiring the remaining transformer capacity. This was done in order to assure sufficient current for proper maintenance of remaining reparations items.

6. Reports called for in paragraph 10, inclosure 1 to Operational Directive 89, dated 20 November 1946, should include all data available on the capacities or ratings, phases, horsepower and reparations inventory

SUBJECT: Release of Reparations Machinery to Expedite Production of
Coal and Coal Mining Machinery

TO: Commanding Officer
Kyushu Military Government Region
APO 929

1. Reference: Kyushu TWX, cite LM-133.
2. A summation of the present policy on temporary releases of reparations equipment to expedite coal production is given below:
 - a. In general, no permanent releases will be made. Temporary releases will be made on proper application, pending acquisition of new equipment or used equipment from non-reparation sources. Applications must prove conclusively that the equipment desired is not presently available from non-reparations sources.
 - b. Releases will be made on a basis of need and expediency in individual cases. No blanket releases to improve over-all production will be made. A separate application must be made for each individual release.
 - c. The authority to temporarily release reparations equipment resides in Headquarters Eighth Army. All releases must be submitted to and approved by Eighth Army prior to physical release of the equipment.
 - d. The production of coal is considered of prime importance. However, it is felt that adequate stimulation is given the production of new mining equipment by C.D. 36, and that sufficient production facilities are available for production of new equipment without recourse to extensive release of reparations machines. Coal mining equipment expeditors' reports indicate that producers' capacity and in some instances, actual production of new equipment, is in excess of mine operators' orders. Apparently, lack of new equipment is due to shortage of raw materials, inefficiency of machinery control associations, and delays in payment for new equipment by the mine owners, rather than shortage of industrial facilities to produce the needed equipment.

SUBJECT: Inventory Instructions for Synthetic Rubber Plants

TO: See Distribution

1. Reference: Memorandum for the Imperial Japanese Government from General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, AG 387.6 (15 May 47) REP (SCAPIN 1681), subject as above, dated 15 May 1947. All items listed on the inventory form (Inclosure 1) which are located in the plants specified by Inclosure 1 to reference SCAPIN that are currently operable or economically reparable will be recorded on the inventory form, three (3) copies of which will be furnished this headquarters.
2. Each individual item of equipment inventoried will be marked at the most conspicuous place, in a size which will be easy to read, and in a color of paint which will be in sharp contrast to that item of equipment.
3. The identifying code is based on the inventory form. It will show for each item the category (Roman numeral), the class (capital letter), and the type (Arabic numeral). Example: Purifier - IA3 (Roman numeral I identifies process equipment, capital letter A identifies an individual item of acetylene gas generating process equipment and Arabic numeral 3 identifies an individual purifier).
4. Separated from the code marks by a dash (-) will be an identification number. Such numbers will follow in sequence the identification number of similar items; the highest number assigned indicates the aggregate number of a given type of equipment in the specific plant. Thus, if the purifier cited in the example in paragraph 3, above, were the tenth one assigned an identification number, its final numbering would be IA3-10.
5. It will not be necessary to identify this equipment in any greater detail than specified herein; specifically, prefecture and plant code numbers are not desired as identification on the equipment.

Subsequently Inventoried for Reparations

TO: See Distribution

1. You are directed to conduct an investigation to determine whether any reparations machinery in your area of jurisdiction is looted property from Allied Nations. In the event that machinery of this nature is uncovered as a result of this investigation, you are directed to furnish this headquarters with a list of all such machinery and equipment in plants which have been subsequently inventoried for reparations.

2. This list will include the reparations inventory code number (code numbers should be followed by the letters AN indicating that the machine is Allied property), the name of the country from which looted if known, and any other information which will assist in identifying the machine and determining ownership.

3. Higher headquarters has indicated that if investigation reveals that the machines are looted property, release from reparations will be accomplished by special directive from SCAP.

1. References:

a. Telephone conversation, Mr. Mossman, your headquarters, and Lt Col Nelson, this headquarters, 12 May 1947.

b. Memorandum for the Imperial Japanese Government from General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, AG 387.6, (20 Nov 1946) ESS/IN (SCAPIN 1347), subject: "Reparations Selections within the Light Metal Industry."

2. SCAPIN 1347 was distributed by higher headquarters under date of 20 November 1946. Prior to issuance of this directive to the Japanese Government, it was found advisable to temporarily withdraw the directive, and distribution has not been made as of this date. This headquarters has been informed by higher headquarters that the plants listed in SCAPIN 1347 have not been designated as reparations selections within the light metal industry as of this time. Unless portions of these plants are otherwise listed for reparations under other directives, the plants may be released from custody and control.

1. The problems raised in basic communication have been discussed with higher headquarters. Possession of travel orders is not sufficient authority in itself to permit entry of visitors to plants designated for reparations.

2. Signs posted at entrance to reparations plants may be changed to read: "This establishment is off limits. Authorization to enter will be obtained in writing from Military Government".

1. References:

- a. Memorandum, AG 334-GB, GHQ-SCAP, 9 June 46 to Chiefs of Foreign Missions in Japan, Subject: Official Relations and Contacts with the Imperial Japanese Government, with Staff Sections of GHQ, and with United States Occupational Forces.
- b. SCAPIN 1372 (AG 091.112-GB), GHQ-SCAP, 2 December 46, Subject: Contact with Japanese Officials.
- c. Operational Instructions 1/2, Headquarters I Corps, 20 July 46.
- d. TWX NR-R-111330/I, Headquarters I Corps, copy of which made as Inclosure 1.
- e. Letter 387.6, Kyushu Military Government Region, 8 March 47, Subject: Guarding of Reparations Installations, copy of which made as Inclosure 2.

2. An embarrassing situation for Military Government Teams in Kyushu results when visiting personnel frequently call upon Japanese authorities without the knowledge of Military Government as to the visitors' presence on this island and/or the use of travel orders by such visitors as a "credential" to gain admittance to any installation, institution, or establishment in Kyushu without at any time contacting Military Government during their sojourn on the island.

a. If the visiting personnel are official representatives of Foreign Governments, the Japanese officials are endeavoring to comply with SCAPIN 1372 (ref 1b) and in so doing inquiry is made of this headquarters as to whether the requests of such official representatives have been "cleared through proper channels", quoting in part paragraph 3 of SCAPIN 1372.

BASIC: Ltr, Kyushu Mil Govt region, 091.112, subj:
"Contact with Japanese Officials", dtd 13 Mar 47,
contd.

- (1) In this connection, this headquarters construes Military Government of the area in question as a "Proper channel" through which visitors should clear prior to contacting Japanese public and private (business, institutions, etc) officials.

3. As indicated by paragraph 2 of reference 1e, it is considered by this headquarters that travel orders carried by inspecting personnel do not in themselves constitute proper authority to enter into restricted or guarded areas.

4. When this headquarters is in receipt of information such as contained in reference cited in paragraph 1 d, it is presumed that representatives of Foreign Missions are complying with reference 1a in that all contacts between official representatives of Foreign Governments and the Japanese Imperial Government are made through General Headquarters, as further indicated by SCAPIN 1372 (ref 1b).

a. It is considered highly desirable and recommended that at the time clearance is granted representatives of Foreign Missions, such representatives be instructed to call upon the Senior Military Government Officer of the area in which an inspection or the contacting of Japanese officials is contemplated.

5. As concerns installations subject to reparations, paragraph 3a (2) of reference cited in paragraph 1c directs that a sign be placed at entrances to such installations, which states in part: "This establishment is off limits to all unauthorized United States Troops and Japanese personnel."

a. It is recommended that these instructions be amended to read: "This establishment is off limits to all unauthorized personnel regardless of nationality. Authorization to enter this installation will be obtained in writing from Military Government."

(1) In this connection, information is desired as to whether the signs may conclude with: "By Command of Major General Woodruff."

6. This communication is written with full knowledge of the contents of Letter AG 004 (rep)-BA, Headquarters I Corps, 10 March 47, Subject: Visits to Reparation Plants

SUBJECT: Deficiencies in Care of Reparations Equipment

TO : See Distribution.

1. Reference: letter, Imperial Japanese Government, Central Liaison Office, subject: "Operations to be Performed in the Servicing and Repair of Machinery and Accessories to Implement SCAPIN 1219," a copy of which is attached hereto as Inclosure 1.

2. Representatives from the Office of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers have recently visited a number of reparations plants located in the area of jurisdiction of I Corps. As a result of these inspections, numerous deficiencies with respect to the care of reparations equipment have been brought to the attention of this headquarters. The following irregularities are cited for your information:


a. Guards posted at entrances to reparations plants were not always properly instructed. The guards frequently failed to stop visitors and require presentation of authenticated passes, before entry to the plant was permitted. All visitors to reparations plants, including Military Government officers, should have in their possession proper passes, prior to entry to these plants.

b. Considerable divergence was noted with respect to the classification of machinery in reparation plants. In some instances, machines were designated as Class II, although they were in operation; in other instances, machines which were inoperable were classified as Class I. Your attention is directed to the provisions of Section III, Paragraph H, Inclosure 1 to Operational Directive No. 5/4, Headquarters Eighth Army, dated 22 August 1946. All machines which are operable or can be placed in operation by means of minor servicing are to be classified as Class I. It is anticipated that the classification of many machines will be subject to change, as additional labor and material are expended. Classification of machinery located in reparations plants should be subject to constant review by Military Government officers.

c. Reference letter, paragraph 1, consists of a copy of instructions issued by the Central Liaison Office of the Imperial Japanese Government, and provides for implementation of the provisions of SCAPIN 1219. Although distribution was made through Japanese channels, it has been found that all Japanese prefectures have not received this letter. It is directed that Japanese Liaison Offices in each prefecture be contacted, to insure that information contained in reference letter has been brought to the attention of appropriate Japanese officials, and corrective action taken.

SUBJECT: Operations to be Performed in the Servicing and Repair of Machinery and Accessories to Implement SCAPIN-1219.

As regards the above mentioned subject, the standards of operations to be exercised have long been protracted and the concerned organs have often stressed the necessity to improve the conditions of custody and maintenance. Since, based on the advice of General Headquarters and Eighth Army, we have decided to put it into execution by the ways stated in the attached paper No. 1 and No. 2, it is requested that you should notify the matters to every concerned organ civil or official. Furthermore, much attention should be paid to the following matters in regard to this execution. Especially in respective prefecture there may be some diversities between the standards stated below and the requirements of local military government teams but the standards to be performed have been fixed after consulting with the Headquarters Eighth Army.

1. In performing the operations necessary in the service and repair of machinery and equipment, only the machines of which inventory has been drawn up will first be put into execution.

2. The service and repair will be performed for unactive machines in principle from A class and then to B class. As regards the machines which are now operating, much attention will be paid to cleaning or handling of the machines to put them in proper working order on principle stated in the attached papers.

3. The requirement of expenditure necessary for these operations is to be submitted to the Ministry of Finance as usual process.

4. Concerning the materials necessary in the operations, the utilization of the earmarked objects will be taken into consideration.

5. Regarding the attached paper No. 2.

(1) It is desirable that the organization of operating teams be taken into consideration as a reference. The above teams will work at a unit of a designated plant. As per about 100 sets of machines, the members of the first and second unit will be suitable and at most about 100 members will be desirable.

(2) The competent technicians in every special field will be selected as the leaders of the operating units.

(3) Concerning the third unit, it will be unnecessary to form a new group if the necessary members are now well organized.

SUBJECT: Operations to be Performed in the Servicing and Repair of Machinery and Accessories of Class 1 and 2 Machines.

1. Level - In order to custody and maintain in the perfect condition put machine in level position before maintenance is begun.

2. Accessories and attachments - detach all removable accessories such as chucks, face plates, steady rests, tool holders, wheel dressers, counter shafts, etc. to expedite the cleaning process and much attention be paid to the internal cleaning.

3. Clean

a. External - all chips, dirt and other foreign matter should be removed and surfaces cleaned with a suitable solvent (kerosene, diesel oil, etc.) applied either by brush or clean rag. All surfaces should then be thoroughly dried. Removal of rust on finished surfaces should not be attempted except in extreme cases. Belts (rubber, leather, fiber) will be cleaned and protected from further exposure to oil and grease.

b. Internal - drain coolant system if present and clean reservoir, pump and connecting pipes. Perform same operations on hydraulic system if present.

c. Accessories - accessories will be cleaned as in (a) above.

4. Lubricate - service machine with suitable lubricants necessary to custody and maintain in the suitable condition.

5. Operation - connect to power supply if power line is perfect or easily taken in, otherwise by hand and perform all movements of operation. Need not connect motors to unactive machines when they are taken away and put in protective maintenance, but attention be paid to connect and operate them as testing.

6. Check.

a. Electric equipment.

(1) Motors - check all motors present on machine including those operating hydraulic, coolant and similar systems for proper operation and make repairs as good as possible in the subject plants if necessary (such as drying). Test them by suitable method such as insulator testing if power supply is unobtainable.

(2) Miscellaneous electric equipment - All wiring, connector boxes, fuse, switch and control units should be checked and put in proper order.

b. Pumps and related items such as pipes, flexible hose, valves, etc., in hydraulic and coolant systems will be cleaned and checked for worn parts, leaks, etc., and necessary repairs made in the limit possible in the subject plants.

c. ~~Large~~ ~~mechanisms~~ - i.e. feed screws, will be checked for back lash ~~and~~ ~~repairs~~ made wherever possible in the subject plants.

d. Gears - Remove gear case covers and check for worn gears, shafts, bearings and bushings and replace worn parts as good as possible in the subject plants.

e. All other moving parts such as counter shafts, bearings and bushings of all types check for wear and make adjustment and replacement if possible.

f. After completion of above operations a competent mechanic should make a list for each machine, of the accessories or parts not present and make clear special matters of machines such as damaged parts, peculiarities, and an attempt made to secure these missing items from machines designated as Class 3 of the subject plants.

7. All accessories and loose parts belonging to a machine will be collected and stored marking the name of machines to be attached to.

SUBJECT: Proposed T/O Necessary to Perform Service and Repair as Outlined in Memo for Imperial Japanese Government.

To perform the operations necessary in the service and repair of machinery and equipment the personnel should be grouped as a team and divided into three (3) working units.

1. The first unit will be composed of those workers necessary to accomplish operations as specified in paragraph 1, 2 and 3 of Memorandum No. 1 (Leveling, cleaning and removal of attachments). Personnel for this unit should be experienced insofar as maintenance and operation of equipment are concerned. Suggested number required, five (5).

2. The second unit of the team should be composed of personnel capable of inspecting, testing and making the necessary repair as suggested under paragraph 6 of Memorandum No. 1. As stated in Memo for Imperial Japanese Government it is desirable that these services be performed by mechanics associated with the particular plant. Suggested number required, four (4). One electrician, three mechanics.

3. The third unit will consist of a qualified supervisor and the necessary labor to properly process the necessary labor, to properly process the equipment for preservation during storage and shipment.

3. Upon completion of the inventory, three (3) inventory forms for each plant will be forwarded to this headquarters (Attention: Military Government Section) and one (1) copy placed on file in the Prefectural Office.

4. Each individual item of equipment inventoried will be marked at the most conspicuous place, in a size which will be easy to read and in a color of paint which will contrast sharply with the color of the equipment.

5. The identifying code is based on the inventory form. It will show for each item the category (Roman numeral), the class (capital letter), and the type (Arabic numeral). EXAMPLE: Converter - IA5 (Roman numeral I identifies furnaces, ovens and foundry equipment, capital letter A identifies an individual item of metallurgical and metal melting furnaces and Arabic numeral 5 identifies an individual converter).

6. Separated from the code marks by a dash (-) will be an identification number. Such numbers will follow in sequence the identification number of similar items; the highest number assigned indicates the aggregate number of a given type of equipment in the specific plant. Thus, if the converter cited in the example in paragraph 5 above were the tenth one assigned an identification number, its final numbering would be IA5 - 10.

7. It will not be necessary to identify this equipment in any greater detail than specified herein; specifically, prefecture and plant code numbers are not desired as identification on the equipment.

1. Information received at this headquarters indicates that representatives of Allied nations will be permitted access to plants designated for reparations. The purpose of these visits is to inspect the plants in order to secure information, which will serve as the basis for selection of equipment for reparations claims. Pending receipt of information from higher headquarters with regard to this policy, the following procedure will govern the visits of these delegations in this area:

a. All delegations will report to local Military Government teams prior to inspection, and will be accompanied by a representative from the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Reparations, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

b. Visits will be permitted only when prior notification has been received through normal channels.

c. Only one visit to an individual plant will be permitted by each delegation. This is not to be construed to preclude a return visit to a plant while the delegation is in the area.

d. A representative of the local Military Government team will accompany each delegation during the course of its inspection.

2. A report will be made to this headquarters, in the event that unauthorized visits are made to reparations plants, which do not comply with the instructions contained in paragraph 1, above.





SUBJECT: Clarification of Directives Selecting Chemical Plants for
Reparations.

TO: See Distribution.

To assist commanders in making decisions on petitions by the Japanese for the release of machinery or equipment from reparation installations, the following extract of an indorsement from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers is quoted:

#1. When a plant designated for reparations is composed of two or more parts, only that portion of the plant should be taken which qualifies under the established criteria for the type of plant indicated.

3. The list of Synthetic Rubber Plants accompanying SCAPIN 1277 refers only to such portions of the listed companies as were engaged in the production of synthetic rubber. In the example cited, the synthetic rubber plant alone is to be taken into custody; the fertilizer and benzene plants, though located within the main grounds, are not to be placed under custody and control by SCAPIN 1277. It is pointed out, however, that several synthetic rubber plants, because of war-time equipment shortages, utilized items of equipment in their synthetic rubber system which were originally designed for, or located in, other portions of their plant. When production of synthetic rubber ceased, this equipment was incorporated in its original place in the plant scheme. Such equipment, once used in the synthetic rubber system, must be placed under custody.

3. Similarly, a sulfuric acid plant is defined as that equipment regularly used in the manufacture of the one principal product, sulfuric acid. This includes any auxiliary equipment, such as cranes for unloading pyrite ore, conveyor belts for movement of ore, crushers, water circulation pumps serving the plant, electrical equipment (transformers, etc.), bottling plant, etc. Some contact plants also make chemically pure acid; the equipment used for this process is also construed to be part of the plant. However, the equipment used to make sulfuric acid derivatives is not part of the sulfuric acid plant. For example, equipment to make dyes, chloro-sulfonic acid, etc., does not fall under the definition of a sulfuric acid plant.

4. A caustic soda plant includes not only the electrical equipment, cell equipment (which includes the mercury in mercury-type cells), and caustic soda evaporators, but also all equipment used to recover chlorine. Chlorine recovery equipment consists of liquid chlorine bottling plants, bleaching powder and solution plants, hydrochloric acid plants, and auxiliary equipment servicing such plants. Hydrogen blowers and their accessory equipment servicing the caustic soda plants are also included."

2. Attached as Inclosures 1 and 2 are lists of Machine Tool Plants and Ball and Roller Bearing Plants in your area to be inventoried. Inclosure #3 is sample copy of Inventory Sheets, a supply of which is being sent under separate cover.

3. All items indicated in reference 1a, above, which are located in listed plants (Inclosure 1 and 2) that are presently operable or economically repairable will be counted, marked and recorded on the inventory forms which have been forwarded (Inclosure #3).

4. Upon completion of the inventory, three (3) inventory forms for each plant listed will be forwarded to Headquarters Eighth Army (Attention: Military Government Section), through channels, and one copy placed on file in the prefectural office.

5. The identifying code is based on reference 1a, above. It will show for each item the category (Roman numeral), the class (Capital letter), and the type (Arabic numeral). For example; Planers-IA8 (Roman numeral I identifies a metal working machine, Capital letter A identifies an individual machine tool and Arabic 8 identifies an individual planer).

6. Separated from the code mark by a dash (-) will be an identification number. Such number will follow in numerical order the identification numbers of similar items; the highest number assigned indicates the aggregate number of a given type of equipment in the specified plant. Thus, if the planer cited in the example in paragraph 5 above were the fifteenth one assigned an identification number, its final numbering would be IA8-15.

7. Each individual item of equipment tallied will be marked in a conspicuous location, in a size easily read, and in a contrasting color of paint to that of the equipment.

8. The identifying of equipment as explained herein is all the details necessary. It will not be necessary to paint on the machine the prefecture and plant code number identification.

1. Reference is memorandum for the Imperial Japanese Government from General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, file AG 387.6 (13 Aug 46) FSS/IN, (SCAPIN 1134), dated 13 August 1946, subject: Reparations Selections within Privately-Owned Munitions Plants.

2. There has been some misunderstanding as to what portions of chemical plants which have been taken into custody as military explosive plants under the subject directive should be held in custody. For the purposes of this directive, the following definitions are used:

a. A plant is an establishment composed of one or more production units, operating as an entity under one management and confined to one geographical location. It may utilize several buildings which need not be physically connected or located within a single enclosure.

b. An integrated production unit is a part of a plant capable of independently producing an end product or component and susceptible of being removed as a unit without destroying the balance of the plant.

c. A chemical plant is an establishment producing basic chemicals, or an establishment manufacturing products by predominantly chemical processes.

3. The criteria assumed for these selections for reparations include the interpretation of the terminology "military explosives" to mean "military explosives and closely allied intermediate products used to manufacture such explosives." The selection of units producing such intermediates was based on the determination that the units were built to produce the listed intermediate chemicals specifically for use in military explosives; thus the fact that some of the chemicals in question may have peacetime uses did not affect the selection.

4. The plants listed on Inclosure number 1 which have been taken into custody as explosive plants under the subject directive should be released from this custody except for the listed units which should remain in custody. The remainder of the units in these plants do not meet the criteria of privately-owned munitions plants to be listed for reparations as referred to in paragraph 3 above.
