The object of this hill is so clear that it will suffice to readily, to be convinced at once of its importance. The measure, I think, is exempt from all the objections that were made upon local legislation. I am of opinion that the Legisture can, and should, direct their serious attention to it.

I regard it as recessary only to explain in a few words how serviceable the adoption of this act will be to the public interests. There is in this city two courts which have the interests. All our citizens who have occasion to institute actions that those courts have jurisdiction of, can indeffenately bring them before either. This privalege which is accorded to the inhabitants of the city is not extended to those of the country. In my opinion, if a resid. It of the city has the right to choose the tribunal before whom he claims redress, the same priv-In my opinion, if a resident of the city has the right to choose the tribunal before whom he claims redress, the same privilege should be extended to him of the country. It seems papable injusted that the one should be more privileged than the other. My intention is not here to make any reffections upon persons, nuch less upon there be public functionaries, but as it is known that the three-thirds of the inhabitants of the city and its environs speak only the French language, the Judge should be able to express himself when he addresses French juries and witnesses in the tongue which they comprehend, notwithstanding it is generally understood that the individual witnesses in the tongue which they comprehend, notwithstanding it is generally understood that the individual who presides over the District Court, before whom are brought all the country-causes, does not speak a word of French.
