UNITED STATES SCHOOL POST-POLE.—This vessel was built on the 10th Inst. in lat. 36, long. 74, 34, from a cruise round Cape Horn, is now on a visit to this city. He had been absent nearly three years, we believe; and during his interesting service, visited the Marquesas, or Washington Isles, Oahu, and several of the Society Islands. He passed some two or three months at Wahoo, one of the Sandwich Group. We understand Capt. Jones was charged with dues, highly important to our increasing commercial interests in these far remote regions; and that the true cost of the voyage has been assessed to the sum of \$100,000 by the Government. —Nugent.

The Dolos sailed from Smyrna on the 10th of October, under convoy of the U. S. ship Peacock, and late from the 15th Inst. in lat. 36, long. 74, 34, from the Mediterranean bound to New-York. We find, by the arrival of the brig Doctor, at Boston, from Smyrna, that the Post-Pole has had a brush with a gang of Greek pirates.

The Dolos sailed from Smyrna on the 10th of October, under convoy of the U. S. ship Peacock. They were in company with Augustus, Foster, brig Susan, Rob Roy, Eastbrook, and Cherub, Loring, all for Boston; English and the Dutch vessel. On the 11th, in the Gulf, while United States ship Lexington, with ship Harriet, of New York, under convoy for Smyrna. On the 14th, the Cherub, Susan, Rob Roy, and an English schooner separated from the convoy. 15th, in the Bosporus Passage, in the night, three hours, with about fifty Greek pirates, took possession of an English brig within sight of the fort, made fast to boats with 20 muskets, to tow her in towards the shore. The Proprietary assumed that her boat, and went to the rescue of the brig, they commenced a wild fire upon the Greeks, who cut the towline, and pulled for the shore, the boats of the Post-Pole; all the while firing upon and killing many of them. About 40 Greeks were on board the brig at the time of the attack, all of whom jumped overboard, and were either drowned or shot in the water.

17th arrived off Milo and found the Rob Roy, Susan, and the English schooner which separated on the 14th had arrived there. Captain Pratt learned that the Rob Roy and schooner had been taken by 8 boats full of Greeks, and plundered of cargo, &c. When they first heard it was calm, and as they approached, Captain Loring, of the Cherub fired a gun at them, which did not intimidate them, and fearing he again fell into their hands that he and all his crew would be massacred abandoned her, took his boat with all the crew and pulled for the Susan; a breeze soon after he got on board springing up, the Susan escaped. The Greeks took possession of the Cherub, and when last seen was steering toward Delos, where they rendezvoused. The brig Phoebe, of and from New-York for Smyrna, was at Milo waiting a convoy—the had been taken by the Greeks and plundered.

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
