There is an excellent prospect that a special meeting of the City Counat a special meeting of the City Coun-cil to be held this evening the agree-ment between the corporation of Vic-toria and the Oak Bay municipality for toria and the Oak Bay municipality for a solution of the water problem, in so far as it affects the two contituencies, will pass. Enquiry this morning elicit-ed the information that a number of ildermen who had on the two occa-sions that the agreement was previous-before the board taken a stand in opposition, are now willing to support the same, providing some minor changes are made in the wording of it. At preliminary conferences held yesterday afternoon between represen-tatives of the Oak Bay Council and the

it. At preliminary conferences held yesterday afternoon between representatives of the Oak Bay Council and the city a line of action was approved which, it is anticipated, will meet with the hearty approval of a majority of the members of the City Council.

With the passing of the agreement a most dangerons situation confronting the city of Victoria in respect to its future policy for a water supply will have been overcome. By the agreement certain clauses in the bill now before the Legislature conferring important rights on Oak Bay will be dropped. Oak Bay will be preserved as open territory as a market where Victoria may sell water, and not handed over to the Esquimalt Waterworks Company, and no authority will be conferred upon the neighboring municipality to tear up the streets of Victoria to lay pipes to connect with the Esquimalt system.

This attempt to night will be the third that has been made to get the City Council to pass the agreement. On the two previous occasions that the agreement was dealt with, it was defeated on a tie vote. Broadly, the proposition is that Victoria shall agree

feated on a tie vote. Broadly, the proposition is that Victoria shall agree to sell to Oak Bay all the water it from some source other than Eik Lake. The aldermen opposing the agreement took the ground that inasmuch as it was proposed to sell water at a cheaper rate than that paid by consumers in Victoria, it was unfair. But to this it was pointed out that even with the wholesale rate applying to Oak Bay, the residents of the neighboring municipality would be called upon to pay a higher rate than the consumers in Victoria.

It is probable that the debate tonight will be chiefly on the clause compelling the city of Victoria to decide on a source of supply other than Eik Lake within one year. Some of the aldermen think this a harsh stipulation, but it is not believed that this knotty point will ber the way to the

An early spring and a good year for the farmers is anticipated in this district on account of the heavy snowfall and very little frost in the ground, the frost only extending from three to four inches below the surface.
