Lewis Duncan, the chairman, made the announcement that a price had been agreed upon, but it would not be made public until the Board of Commerce had passed on it.

SAYS PROFITS PLACE IS IN JAIL American Federation of Labor Delegate Addresses Dominion Trades Congress

Hamilton, Sept. 25.—The delegates to the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress enjoyed a respite yesterday. A session was held in the morning, at which fraternal delegates from labor organizations in the United States delivered addresses, and during the remainder of the day members of the Congress attended entertainments arranged in their honor.

Profiteers Denounced. Sam Griggs, delegate from the American Federation of Labor, denounced profiteers in no uncertain manner, and declared that the proper place for them was in jail. He reviewed the various attempts to solve the cost of living problem, but protested to have no faith in investigations unless convictions followed and persons guilty of offences in this connection were made to suffer.

SAYS DOMINIONS ENTITLED TO PLACE French Foreign Minister Speaks in Chamber on League Warm Discussion on Attitude of United States Senate

Paris, Sept. 25.—In the course of the discussion in the Chamber of Deputies on the peace treaty with Germany yesterday, Foreign Minister Pichon upheld the right of the Dominions of the British Empire to membership in the League of Nations. He declared France had no colony compared with the British Dominions, which had raised nearly 3,000,000 men during the war.

Answering a question by M. Barthou, M. Tardieu expressed confidence that the United States Senate would ratify the treaty-part of the League of Nations. The possibility of non-ratification of the League of Nations by the United States Senate, the consequences, in such event, to the guarantee for the future of France, and the question whether the League would exist without the United States as a member occupied the entire afternoon's debate.

said, "is the exemption of the value of improvements and the taxation of land values only. But the land could not be sold for taxes without the building. Therefore, the building goes with the land in a tax sale and can only go with the land."

"If this is so the Legislature must have meant what is unworkable, because of the absence of the provision for the purchaser in a tax sale to give the buyer access to his land."

"If he buys the land could not he be forced to move the obstruction?" asked Mr. Justice Macdonald.

"But he buys no part of the structure, only the ground and soil below the lowest foundation stone," replied Mr. McDiarmid.

"As no tax sale can be made the result is the exempting of the whole from taxation unless the legislature can work it out."

"If there is no taxation of land alone and our buildings are exempt, there is no taxation of us."

Statutes and other law books are piling up high on the desks of the judge and the attorneys as new legal references are made.

ALLEGED MURDERER ARRESTED HERE IN THE HINDU TEMPLE

Gopal Singh, Charged With Homicide in South Vancouver Taken to Mainland

CLAIMS TO HAVE BEEN HINDU PRIEST HERE

On a warrant charging him with the murder of a fellow-countryman in South Vancouver, Gopal Singh, who claims to be the priest of the local Hindu temple, was arrested in that institution this morning. Singh apparently is unconcerned over his arrest, and calmly protesting his innocence, spent the day in the city lockup and was taken to the Mainland on the afternoon boat to stand trial. Two other Hindus, Shir Singh, and Herman Singh, are being held by the South Vancouver police, who believe that they have some knowledge of the circumstances surrounding the death of Lal Singh, of Mission, in May, 1917. Lal Singh disappeared while he was supposed to be in possession of a considerable sum of money, and no trace was found until the discovery a few days ago of human bones, thought to be his remains, in an old South Vancouver mill, which was being dismantled.

FIRST ENTRY MADE IN TRANS-PACIFIC RACE FOR DIRIGIBLES

Los Angeles, Sept. 25.—Captain Eric Donaldson, of the 82nd Flying Squadron, Royal Flying Corps, has entered as a competitor for the \$50,000 prize offered by Norman Yarrow, of Victoria, for the first Canadian to fly across the Pacific.

This is the first entry to be made in the sensational race which will occupy the attention of the aerial world for some time. Capt. Donaldson has seen considerable service with the R.A.F. Whether he intends to promote a company to construct a dirigible or whether he has been asked to make the flight is not known here. Where the great gas-bag will be constructed is not known, but there is a possibility that a lot of the work will be done on the Island.

Liquor Case Dismissed.—Patrick Appa, charged with driving an automobile while under the influence of liquor, was found not guilty by Magistrate Jay in the Police Court this morning.

The arrest here this morning was effected by City Detective Phipps and Detective Winters, of South Vancouver, who arrived in the city this morning. The officers, in possession of information regarding Gopal Singh's movements, and bearing a warrant for his arrest on the charge stipulated, proceeded quietly to the Hindu temple on Blackwood Street about ten o'clock. Here they found him the Hindu they sought and showed him the warrant. Gopal manifested little concern and readily followed the officers, who found it unnecessary to wait for the patrol. The prisoner was not handcuffed and walked calmly along the street with the officers. The party was met by the "wagon" before it reached the police station, where Gopal was searched, and taken to the cells.

FULL EXEMPTION IS INTENDED FOR CHURCHES, HE SAYS

F. A. McDiarmid Claims Provincial Statutes on Taxation Misconstrued

The whole policy of exempting improvements from taxation under present laws cannot hold, in practice, and is illegal, according to the claim of F. A. McDiarmid before Mr. Justice Macdonald in the Supreme Court today. Mr. McDiarmid is representing the Bishop of Vancouver Island in the fight against the city for the exemption of St. Andrew's Cathedral, at View and Blanshard Streets. The city proposed to sell the property last May for some \$18,000 of delinquent taxes.

Under the present statutes, Mr. McDiarmid said, with the tax on only the land value, it is impossible for the corporation, if the taxes on this land were not paid, to sell the land if there were a building on it as the building is not subject to taxation and the purchaser of the land in such a case would have the right only to the strata of land lying below the lowest foundation stone of the building.

"What the Legislature must have intended was that the land and improvements should be taxed at the value of the land," said Mr. McDiarmid. If the two were included under the one head it would then be impossible to tax church property, as the church buildings are exempt.

Complete Exemption Intended.

"When the Legislature said that the building of a church in use for the public worship of God was exempt from taxation it meant everything in connection therewith and included the land," Mr. McDiarmid said. "The Legislature did not alter the situation at all when it made changes in 1912 by the revised statutes and in 1913 by alterations in the Municipal Act. The exemption that was intended was everything that went to make up the structure of a church and the land which is a necessary part of that."

"My stand and interpretation of it is that everything necessary to the maintenance of the Christian religion and the public worship of God is exempt."

"In the consideration of this statute the whole of the statute and its course must be taken into consideration and it cannot be said that the Legislature intended to discriminate between the ground left around the Cathedral and the Cathedral itself."

Legislation Unworkable.

Mr. McDiarmid claimed that the law as it now stands is in the same position as if the Legislature had left it as it was in 1905.

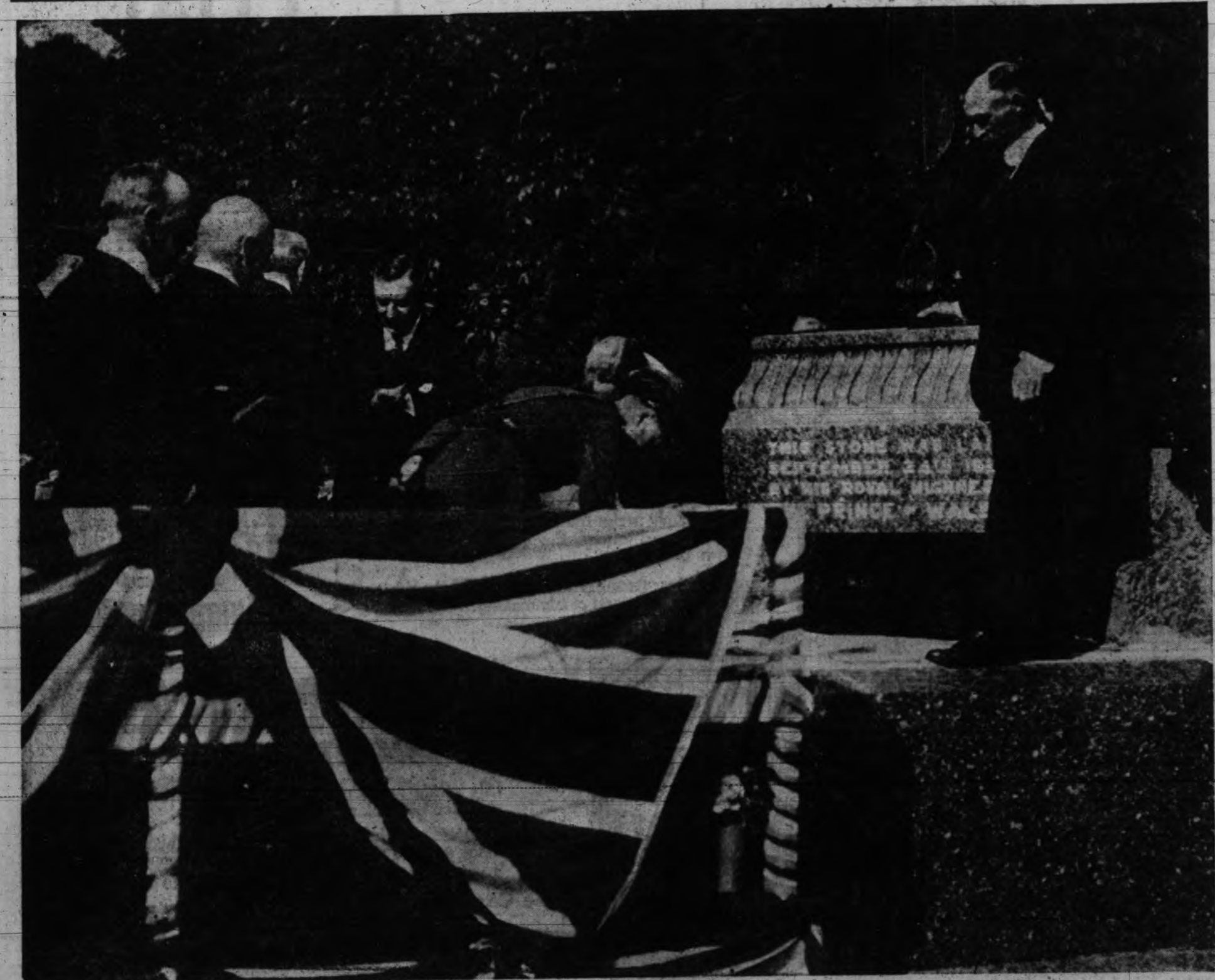

Craigdarroch Inspected By Prince This Morning



PRINCE TALKS TO WOUNDED SOLDIERS

(Continued from page 1.)

At the foot of the steps His Royal Highness was greeted by Major A. D. Macdonald, of the Soldiers' Re-establishment Board, who presented to the Prince Dr. Proctor, unit medical director; C. C. Tunnard, island representative of the E. C. R.; Dr. Fearse, assistant unit medical director; Dr. Taylor, medical superintendent of the hospital; T. Barclay, assistant director's representative, and Miss McLeod, matron.

Signed Visitor's Book.

The Prince was escorted around the piazza and entered the western door. He then proceeded to the second floor and inspected the wards. Nursing Sisters Sinnett, Moore and Collis were presented to the Prince as he entered. All the up-patient beds were standing in the same hasty manner. Four warriors who were badly crippled remained in bed. The Prince shook each man by the hand and spoke to every second one. Any man wearing South African ribbons or ribbons of honor were questioned by the Prince as to what unit they served in and in what actions they won their decorations. He paid particular attention to the bed patients.

The Prince then climbed the stairs to the lower ward and inspected the ward. He was greatly impressed with the wonderful panorama and passed a number of very flattering remarks about the city's beauty. Returning to the main floor he inspected the recreation room and dining room, where Miss Nickell the dietitian, was presented to him.

When about to step into his car and while the camera were clicking with great rapidity three cheers and a tiger were called for. These were given in the same lusty manner that has characterized the cheering for the Prince in this city. The Prince acknowledged each cheer with a smart salute and drove off smiling and waving his hand.

General Inspection.

Following the departure of the Prince the castle was thrown open for public inspection and hundreds of people availed themselves of the opportunity of looking over the new home for injured soldiers.

Beautiful woods have been employed throughout the building for wainscoting, panelling, etc., and the grand stair, mounting by some six or seven flights to the topmost floor, gives an air of dignity and space and offers in the way of cosy corners and comfortable window seats. To the left of the front door is the library, with its long glass doors, to the right is the long room which is kept as a recreation hall. Further along, reached by way of hall and corridor, is the big kitchen with its massive range. Off this again is the pantry, connected by means of a dumb-waiter, with basement and each of the floors above, where a corresponding room, known as "serving room," is fitted with appliances for keeping the food warm after it has been sent up. The dining room opens on the pantry, and is a particularly handsome salon finished in golden oak, and large enough to seat twenty-five patients at a sitting.

On the first, second and third floors are to be found the nurses' and matron's sitting room and office, linen store, diet kitchen, etc.; above this come other floors with wards,

The biggest of which will accommodate ten patients. The further one mounts the more wonderful the view from the windows. An idea of the extent of surrounding country that can be seen from the observation tower may be gained from the distance that Craigdarroch itself may be seen—which is from practically any part of the Peninsula or the surrounding waters.

A complete fire alarm system has been installed, with outside fire escape connecting with each floor, and fire extinguishers in each corridor.

In the southeast corner of the grounds there has just been erected a vocational school building. Work here is under the jurisdiction of the vocational branch of the S. C. R., and here classes are held in mechanical work, woodwork, basket weaving, etc. The building is finished outside in rough plaster, and makes a very picturesque little addition to the grounds, which have this summer already borne their first harvest of vegetables for the house supply.

ITALIAN LEADERS SAID TO BE MOVING AGAINST TOWN ALONG COAST OF ADRIATIC

(Continued from page 1)

Wilson's Answer. So far as is known definitely no answer to proposals made by Italy relative to Fiume has been received from President Wilson, although it is intimated in unofficial Italian circles that it has arrived. There is disposition on the part of the Italians to reject any proposal looking to a compromise, the claim being made that the storm throughout their country can be calmed only by giving Fiume to Italy.

Admiral Cagni. A dispatch which reached Paris yesterday from Rome said confidence was expressed by the newspapers and in political circles in Rome concerning the mission entrusted by the Italian Government to Admiral Umberto Cagni, who had been appointed commander of the naval forces in the upper Adriatic.

Union. According to The Giornale d'Italia, Admiral Cagni had a long conference with King Emmanuel and Premier Giolitti, and which he obtained an explicit declaration of the acknowledgment by the Government of the union of Fiume with Italy.

On Guard. Paris, Sept. 25.—A Rome dispatch dated Wednesday quotes The Epoca as stating that Serbian regulars and Jugo-Slav volunteers have taken up positions dominating Monte Nevoso, about twenty miles north of Fiume, and guarding the Regio basin and the San Pietro-Fiume railway.

For Europeans. Paris, Sept. 25 (Havas).—The crisis through which Italy was passing is imputed to the Great Powers by General Giuseppe Garibaldi, in an interview published in The Petit Parisien this morning. He reproached them for not having given Italy all that was promised in the Treaty of London and declared it to be the intention of the Italian people to keep Fiume "even at the price of another war."

It depends on France and England, he said, "whose populations are with Italy in the Fiume affair. Whatever should be President Wilson's answer to Italy's proposals, we will say to him that this dispute is between Europeans and must be settled between Europeans.

Garibaldi's Statement. Paris, Sept. 25.—General Giuseppe (Peppino) Garibaldi, son of the Italian patriot and a staunch supporter of Gabriele d'Annunzio in his seizure of Fiume, arrived in Paris yesterday. In an interview he declared that the taking of Fiume by d'Annunzio was a result of President Wilson's "open hostility" toward Italian aspirations, and said that serious results might follow if the Italians were not placed in a position to hold the Fiume question according to the will of the people.

General Garibaldi said Fiume was not beleaguered, as had been reported, and that the Italian Government was sending food into the city as usual. He had come to Paris, he asserted, "to get the outside view of the Fiume question," but his visit was not an official one, although he had conferred in Rome with Premier Nitti and others.

Half Year of Waiting. "The whole situation at Fiume," said General Garibaldi, "is the result of six months of waiting by the Italians for just treatment, and the resentment which arose and turned into a practical revolt is due to the open hostility of President Wilson personally toward Italian aspirations.

The Italian people, with their army and navy, intend that Fiume, including the city and the port and the connecting land of the Istrian Peninsula, shall form a part of Italian nationality.

The spirit of disintegration which is arising owing to President Wilson's hesitation in reaching a decision with regard to Fiume may lead to very serious consequences in my country, should our allies not put the Italian Government in a position to settle the Fiume question according to the will of the people.

"I hope the same spirit that moved Italy to enter the great war will inspire our allies to give us the solution of the Adriatic question which we must have."

GRAIN REGULATIONS

Ottawa, Sept. 25.—An amendment to the Grain Act, of which notice has been given, provides that if the amount of grain in an elevator on August 31 is in excess of one-quarter of one per cent. of the gross amount of the grain received in the elevator during the crop year, such excess surplus shall be sold by the Board of Grain Commissioners and the receipts applied toward the cost of administration of the Canada Grain Act.

OUT OF WORK

Coblenz, Sept. 24, via London, Sept. 25.—Reduction of the German army is throwing thousands of professional soldiers out of jobs and adding considerably to the unemployment problem-bothering the nation.

HONOR FOR BALFOUR

London, Sept. 25.—A dispatch from Alexandria, Egypt, says the first Jewish industrial army colony, founded near the port of Haifa, in Palestine, has been named Balfour, in honor of the Balfour declaration in favor of a Jewish homeland in Palestine.

ARBITRATION ON GRAND TRUNK PLAN

Ottawa Government May Make an Announcement Next Week

Ottawa, Sept. 25.—It is authoritatively stated that the negotiations between the Government and the Grand Trunk Railway have not yet been completed, but they are progressing, and an official announcement may be forthcoming some time next week. The present negotiations, it is understood, are being carried out simply with a view to establishing the basis of the arbitration proceedings which it has been agreed will take place in order to fix the terms on which the Government will secure the Grand Trunk system.

STRIKERS ASK "DECENT JUSTICE"

Corporation officials announced that the gradual return of men which set in on the second day of the strike continued to-day. The return, it was said, was not large, but was steady and gratification was expressed by steel officials with the steel situation.

Secretary William J. Foster, of the steel workers' national committee, said to-day he had no reports of further shut-downs, but was in receipt of information from different parts of the Pittsburgh field that gains were being made by the strikers.

Pinch is Felt. Youngstown, Ohio, Sept. 25.—With the closing of the steel mills in the Mahoning Valley, merchants of Youngstown are beginning to feel the effects of the curtailment of ready money heretofore so freely spent by the mill workers, they say.

Almost \$1,000,000 was paid in wages to 11,500 employees of the Youngstown Sheet and Tube Company yesterday. Not a single incident of disturbance accompanied the gathering of so many men at the company's gates.

Sympathetic Strike. Chicago, Sept. 25.—An official announcement declared that the strike of steel men was called Monday, was counter-balanced by the 135 steam engineers at the Illinois Steel Company at Gary being in operation to-day, which would be the most extensive resumption of work in the Chicago district since the strike of steel men was called.

Claims of the industrial and labor leaders still are at variance in a position of five hundred men at Indiana Harbor, Ind., attended a meeting and demanded protection for their return to work. Speakers at the meeting said eighty per cent. of the 13,000 men on strike at six plants desired to resume work.

At Gary and South Chicago, according to labor leaders, the tendency of the men was not to return to work. Officials of the Inland Steel Company at Indiana Harbor were said to have stated that unless striking employees returned to their places to-day, the company would operate the plants, they would be closed down for from three to nine months.

A Returned Nurse. Passing from St. George's Ward to the message room, the royal visitor noticed Nursing Sister E. E. Charles in a wheel chair and spent a minute or two in conversation. The sister, who only recently returned from overseas, is recovering from an operation which she had been called upon to perform.

Union of Teachers of France to Join Labor Federation

Paris, Sept. 25.—(Havas).—The Teachers' Congress has voted for the affiliation of a new teachers' union with the French General Federation of Labor.

NEW LIEUT.-GOVERNOR OF ONTARIO NOT APPOINTED AS YET

Toronto, Sept. 25.—Recently it was stated that Sir Edward Kemp, Overseas Minister, had accepted the nomination of Sir John Hendrie, the present Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario. Interviewed last night, Hon. J. D. Reid, Minister of Railways, emphatically denied the rumor.

Naples, Sept. 25.—On the arrival here of the steamship Europa from New York the police arrested five Italians who are alleged to be anarchists.

Paris, Sept. 25.—A rumor was in circulation on the Bourse here to-day that Nikolai Lenine, the Russian Bolshevik Premier, had been assassinated.

London, Sept. 25.—Fierce fighting was in progress throughout Tuesday and yesterday in the region of Pskov, southwest of Petrograd, where the Estonians annihilated two Bolshevik regiments, according to Estonian dispatches received here to-day.

Omsk, Sept. 21.—News from the front of the anti-Bolshevik forces continues favorable. The First Siberian Army is holding positions with its left flank resting on the Ishim-Tiumen Railway forty miles west of the town of Ishim. A Bolshevik flanking operation to the north of Ishim which had caused some apprehensions was defeated.

General Knox, chief of the British Military Mission at Vladivostok, has returned with Admiral Kolchak, after viewing operations on the Petropavlovsk front. General Knox expressed himself as deeply impressed with the fighting spirit displayed by the Siberians.

PRINCE CHATS TO WOUNDED VETERANS

Make Friends of Blue Band Boys at Esquimalt Hospital. This afternoon His Royal Highness spent half an hour at Esquimalt Hospital. The consideration and sympathy which have been such factors in creating his popularity was extended to the blue band boys from France recovering from their wounds. The hospital, always a picture of cleanliness and neatness, was especially spotless in readiness for the royal visitor. Fifty patients from Resthaven Hospital under Capt. H. H. McKenzie were brought down to meet the Prince.

For an hour previous to the Prince's arrival the men waited patiently on the verandah outside St. George's ward, and on his arrival filed into the ward while His Royal Highness inspected the officer patients and staff in front of the Administrative Building. The Prince appeared to take a keen interest in everything he saw, and asked a number of questions of Colonel D. Donald, the A. D. M. S., and Major Thomas O'Hagan, O. C. of the hospital.

The royal visitor then proceeded to St. George's Ward, where the men lined up in front of the beds. Walking up one side of the ward and down the other he shook hands with each man in turn, stopping to chat with several of the veterans.

A kindly action which excited admiration was the spontaneous sympathy the Prince showed as he gently separated two veterans so that he might step between them to reach the side of a bedridden patient. Noticing Private P. E. Snape, a 2nd C. M. H. man, in one of the wheel beds with which the Prince from his extensive experience of military hospitals has undoubtedly learned to associate with serious cases he stopped over to talk to the veteran. Private Snape, he was told, was a 2nd C. M. H. man, wounded at Cambrai by a bullet which had entered the spine and caused the loss of the use of both legs. As the Prince passed up and down the lines he, in every instance, made a point of passing a little extra time with the bedridden patients.

A Returned Nurse. Passing from St. George's Ward to the message room, the royal visitor noticed Nursing Sister E. E. Charles in a wheel chair and spent a minute or two in conversation. The sister, who only recently returned from overseas, is recovering from an operation which she had been called upon to perform.

The necessity of adequate Government inspection of meat in British Columbia was impressed upon the members of the Rotary Club when they lunched at the Home Products Fair to-day as the guests of the King's Daughters.

At the luncheon were members of the B. C. Veterinary Association. Dr. Dammer, Dr. Chester and Dr. Strong all spoke on the desirability of a more adequate inspection of cattle and meat, and declared that it was far better to prevent tuberculosis and the other diseases spreading through the medium of diseased meat than to build sanitariums for those already affected. At present the speakers declared, the law made it necessary for exporters of meat to keep their products up to a high standard, so that the poorer meat was retained for home consumption. As a result a large part of the meat in the Province came to the tables of the people contaminated with disease. It was explained to the Rotary Club that the Veterinary Association was behind a bill to be introduced in the Legislature at its next session to provide for proper Government inspection of all meat in the Province. The Club was asked to use its influence to get this bill passed. Thoroughly in sympathy with the movement, the Club passed

upon to perform. He then proceeded to the Red Cross Hut, where the rest of the patients were assembled, mingling and talking with the veterans.

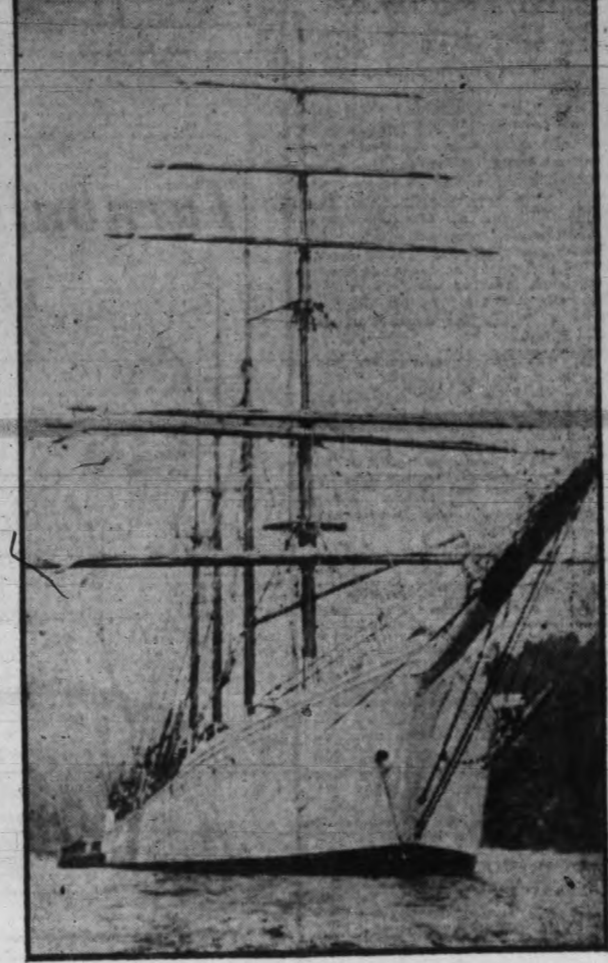
GOVERNOR-GENERAL WILL LAY KEEL AT PRINCE RUPERT

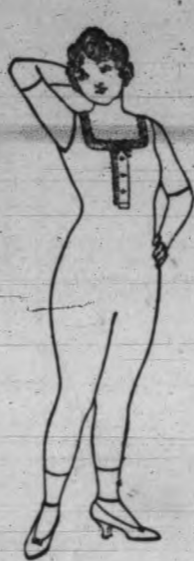
