For this reason Finme has been under international occupation pending the deliberations of the Conference and Italy is respect.

The action of d'Annunzio disregards his country's obligation to its Allies and flaunts the Conference. It is an act of sheer military aggression which, if it were condoned, would fur nish justification for innumerable similar escapades for which certain parts of Southern Europe provide a fertile field, thereby imperilling the peace of the world. Already, according to Paris dispatches, it has been emulated by other Italian forces which have seized several points under Jugo-Slav occupation formally agreed to and authorized. If, failing the peaceable settlement of the Fiume dispute, force was to be the only arbiter, it would not be d'Annunzio and his sociates who would be expected to initiate and direct the use of that weapon in Italy's name. They have no lawful status in the situation : they are acting, in fact, in defiance of the law of their own country as well as of international morality. For these they have substituted the law of force, unauthorized by anything but the caprice of their own emotions. Has not the world been fighting that very same conception of the Germans, with the difference that the enemy, at least, had the authority of his own law, whatever it was, while holding all other law and international morality in contempt?

The Fiume coup is the height of madness, for it confronts Italy with a situation charged with ominous possibilities. The Italian Government and accepting all that it implies. It realizes that Italian possession of Fiume under such conin name. Looking to the future, it must see that d'Annunzio's action, if it were authoritatively supported, would be nothing less than a boomerang, for it would recoil in the shape of a war with Jugo-Slavia and the other nationalities of Southern Europe interested in the status of Fiume-a war in which Italy could make no appeal to the conscience of the world.

On the other hand, d'Annunzio's action unestionably has the support of a large part of the Italian population, if not the greater part, including, no doubt, a considerable proportion of the fighting forces. The Government apparently fears to adopt forcible measures owing to the prob-ability that they would precipitate a revolution and eivil war. The populace, inflamed by sentiment, is not likely in such circumstances to give much heed to ultimate consequences or to ethics. Hence, this outbreak of d'Annunzio's emotionalism is doing more harm to Italy than could be offset by the possession of a score of Fiumes or the gratification of a host of sentimental

"A few days ago the General was made the recipient of a \$500 chest of silver, on which was engraved the name 'Curry.' He stated that the family name had been correctly spelled, and indicated that the General had simply let the other go by default during the war as not worth bothering about.
