Attorney-General Has Insurance Act Under Preparation

Life Underwriters Pleased With Announcement By Hon. J. W. de B. Farris; Hon. Mary Ellen Smith

As head of the Insurance Department of the Provincial Government, Hon. J. W. de B. Farris, Attorney-General of British Columbia, is at present engaged in drafting an Insurance Act for the Province which will materially improve present conditions of conducting insurance business in the Province, Life Underwriters of Canada, in convention here, were informed this morning.

Mr. Farris addressed the convention on the subject; "The In-

vestment of Money, or Difficulties That Beset the Widow; or How Estates Are Dissipated.

To General Advartage.

He said that Mothers' Pensions, provided by legislation passed recently by the Legislature, looked after the widows and children in cases where the father had failed to realize the importance of taking out insurance and therefore the two worked to the general advantage of humanity.

Speaking of the proposed bill, in the drafting of which the assistance and advice of life underwriters, he invited, Mr. Farris said it would be introduced at the next session, and it would provide that every man carrying on the insurance business must apply for and, secure from the linspector of Insurance a licence to do business.

No Grants.

Up to the present none of the Federal mohey has been advanced to Nova Scotia or Alberta. Any province can file plans for highway improvements until April 1, 1924, when the grants will expire.

Although the average provincial etsimate of cots per mile for all Canada, excepting Alberta, is \$6 783.84, the cost in the various provinces shows a marked difference. In Prince Edward Island the cost per mile is \$1.793, in Quebec \$11.864, and Ontario \$18.955. This variation is accounted for by the nature of the roadways-and style of improvements necessary.

103,554 DAYS STRIKE LOSS IN JULY IN CANADA

Ottawa, Aug. 18.— (Canadian Press)—The loss of time on account of industrial dispetes during the month of July was less than during either June. 1911 or July, 1920, states the August Labor Gazette. There were in existence at one time or other during the month 32 strikes, involving 7,652 workers and resulting in an estimated time loss of 103,554 working days, against 44 strikes, 8,883 work people and 161,510 working days in July, 1920.
On July 1 there were twenty-seven strikes affecting 6,939 work people. Five strikes beginning June, 1921, were reported. Six of the strikes beginning prior to July and two of the strikes during July were reported as terminated, leaving twenty-four strikes involving 3,743 work people on record at the end of the month.

"The other day I was looking over a chart on the wall of my office showing the rise and fall of wages, prices and costs, from the time of the war of 1812 to date. I was struck with the marked similarity of the trend of prices after the last war in comparison with the same conditions in 1842."

SHARK HUNTING

TO BE SHOWN

Press Conference Delegates Will Have Thrilling Spectacle

Honolulu, Hawall, Aug. 18.-Thrille occasioned by riding the surf in out-rigger canees or on native surf boards, or standing on the rim of the con-

rigger canees or on native surf boards, or standing on the rim of the continuously active voicano of Kilauca and gazing down into the rearing, tossing sea of molten lava, have an active rival in the keen excitement that accompanies the hunting of the shark in the waters outside the coral reef that encircles the Island of Oahu. Newspaper men who are coming to Honolulu in October as delegates to the Press Congress of the World will find that shark hunting goes hand in hand with other sports, and, although intensely exciting, is in no way dangerous, The shark hunters go to sea in a launch or sampan which tows a dead white horse. When the fishing grounds are reached, the boat beigins to circle about, and soon the fins of sharks may be seen cutting through the water.

If one is an expert, he may harpoon a shark as it turns over to strike, or he may try his luck with a high-powered rifle. The shark is a furious fighter and, once harpooned or caught with hook and line, displays afmazing strength. But he finally three and is gradually hauled aboard and then dispatched.

There are few Hawailans living today who cage to meet a shark in the open water and fight him as his ancestors did. In the olden days, a Hawailan armed himself with a hard, wooden double-pointed javelin about 18 inches long, and with the centre portion large enough to permit a good grip. He then let himself down into the water. As a shark approached and turned over to strike, its great Jaws open to their full width, the Hawailan, with a quick movement, thrust the javelin between the jaws, one point penetrating the roof of the mouth and the other the lower Jaw. The shark, thus unable to close his mouth, and helpless, was either speared or allowed to swim away as the Hawailan chose.

Russians Will Investigate in Loyalists Were Buried in St

An expedition will leave Moscow this month for the Siberian coast to investigate the problems of navigation between Europe and the mouths of the Siberian rivers, according to ah Associated Fress mail dispatch from Riga which quotes a dispatch from Riga which quotes a dispatch from the Soviet Russian capital.

The task will be to make a survey fof a canal across the Yalmai peninsula, which would make it possible for ships to avoid the Kara Sea, where because of ice, navigation is almost impossible.

The expedition is to go first by rail to Omsk, thence by steamer along the River Obl, northward, while a part of the way it will have to go on horse-back or be drawn by moose.

Another of the aims of the investigation is the fitting up of wireless communication with the Siberian coast, and the establishing of stores of supplies, etc., along the coast.

The party will include eight professors, engineers of various technical branches, some students and others, making a group of about 200 men. As equipment they will have two hydroplanes, motor boats, various scientific and technical instruments and as much other necessary material as gan be carried.

(5) Whereas in 1914 this country had thirty-eight capital ships in full commission, the number has now been reduced to sixteen.

(6) The squadron in South American waters has been withdrawn, and cruisers have been recalled from the North Atlantic and South African Squadrons.

(7) One of the destroyer flotillas of the Atlantic Fleet has been placed in reserve.
