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MAKING A START.
Some time ago Mr. Reginald McKenna warned Great Britain and the European nations that unless the annual expenditures upon naval and military organizations were appreciably reduced another decade would find them in a state of absolute bankruptcy from this cause alone. It was not a statement in favor of universal peace or a plea for an agreement among the nations, it was merely the result of an exhaustive examination of the financial conditions of the world and an intelligent forecast based upon his own undisputed knowledge of international finance. None the less it will undoubtedly have the effect of producing a volume of interesting and illuminating statistics at the forthcoming Washington Conference.

Too Late Now.
It would have been a desirable climax if the former Kaiser of Germany could have been delivered into the hands of the Allies at the time of the armistice. The victors were then in a mood to deal with the gentleman in question and whatever the punishment its effect upon the relations between victor and vanquished would not have contributed anything very serious to the perplexities which confronted the world at that stage. But to take Mr. Horatio Bottomley's demand for the extradition of the banished ex-war lord with any degree of seriousness now would be to run the risk of grave international consequences merely to satisfy an appetite that could only have been properly appeased two and a half years ago. It might be different if the German Government could be persuaded to recall the former ruler to stand his trial with the other criminals at Leipzig; but that is out of the question. Any interesting speculation upon that vague possibility is discouraged by the knowledge that it is neither the intention of Germany to live up to her Treaty obligations in this respect, nor likely that any compelling influence is contemplated. The Leipzig Court has been a farce from the start. To continue it is to mock the memory of the heroic dead.

AERIAL NAVIGATION.
It is right and proper that the Canadian Air Board should discontinue "stunt" flying and other aeronautical gymnastics which are likely to detract from the growing popularity of this newest type of transportation. It has taken a long time to reduce the number of sceptics and every accident that might have been avoided by the employment of the ordinary processes merely add to the difficulties of education in its scientific phases. To become an essential part in the commercial and industrial life of Canada development will have to follow sound lines. Such popularity as aerial navigation ought to win from the general public can be won without needless risk.

Life Insurance.
To the Editor: I have been interested in remarks of the president of the Life Underwriters in our city as to the value of life insurance as an investment, but unfortunately my experience does not all coincide. Here it is: In the year 1880 I was induced to take out two policies of one thousand pounds each, whole life in the Sun Life Assurance Co. of England (one of the oldest offices in the world) the premium on each being twenty-one pounds seventeen shillings and sixpence per annum. I have paid that premium for 35 years, and must still pay as long as I live to keep the insurance in force. The amount so paid if invested at 5 per cent. per annum would now amount to just two thousand pounds each policy.

Peace or War?
Out of the defiant attitude of the Dail Eireann and its chief spokesman there arises a number of possibilities which might easily contribute to a final settlement. At the moment there is no more to suggest that Eamonn de Valera will come to terms with the British Government than there is to suppose that he and his followers will be allowed to break off negotiations altogether. But the interesting feature in the circumstances of the moment is the necessity which would seem to exist for the "republican" leader to justify a return to open warfare in

the event of his inability to discover a counter-proposal that would be acceptable to the Government. It goes without saying that if he incites the radical wing to a renewal of the murderous practices which have almost reduced the country to a shambles he will succeed in creating what The Melbourne Argus designates a "troublesome little foreign country with power to class Irishmen as foreigners throughout the Dominion." But if no settlement is found and the extremists hesitate to employ the old tactics it simply means that the Sinn Fein cause will languish. If it languishes it will stagnate. If it stagnates it will die. This is one of the remotest possibilities; but even the mental processes of the most ardent Sinn Feiner must bow to the influence of events.

NOTE AND COMMENT.
Any attempt on the part of the "republicans" in Ireland to interpret the cancellation of military and police leave as other than a precautionary move on the part of the British Government will be merely an excuse to renew hostilities in the absence of a settlement. Sir Ernest Pollock—Great Britain's Solicitor-General—told the House of Commons yesterday that the punishments imposed by the German Court on convicted German officers must be judged by German standards. They have been judged by no other; their farcical nature becomes obvious on a process of comparison with the crimes.

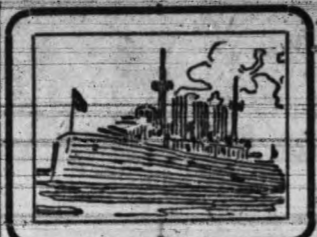

In competition with San Francisco ship-repair firms, Yarrows, Ltd., of Esquimalt, have secured a contract for the complete refit of the tanker Caddo, owned by the Standard Oil Company...

The fact that the tanker Caddo is coming here for general overhaul and refit is due solely to the enterprise displayed by the Esquimalt firm in invading foreign territory and securing the contract in the face of close competition by prominent San Francisco ship-repairing firms.

Enterprise and foresight was shown by Yarrows, Ltd., in sending a representative to San Francisco to tender on the Caddo work. It should be a matter of much satisfaction here that the Esquimalt firm could complete the work right on the ground.

Four Weeks' Work. It is estimated that the work on the Caddo will occupy from three to four weeks. The ship has already been dispatched from San Francisco and is expected to arrive at this port late on Sunday night.

Preparations are being made at the plant for the reception of the vessel and work will be started on her immediately she has been delivered here.

The Caddo is a well-known oil tanker on the British Columbia coast. For several years she has been engaged in transporting oil between California and Vancouver.

OLYMPIC MAKES FASTEST VOYAGE SINCE WAR ENDED

New York, Aug. 18.—The fastest trip made by the White Star liner Olympic since the war ended was her last voyage, when the giant ship put down her gangplank at Pier 68, North River, after a voyage of five days, 18 hours and 18 minutes from Southampton, via Cherbourg. Sir Bertie Hayes, K. C. M. G., her commander, said that the ship would have been here hours earlier but for the fact that the Olympic was delayed longer than usual taking on passengers at the French port. The ship came over the usual southern course.
