

TILLAMOOK, Jan. 24 (Special - The flying saucers are back.

Mr and Mrs Burt Leckington, driving south on highway 101 at 11:05 a. m. Sunday, saw a silvery object in the sky above them at an elevation of about 2000 feet, they reported.

Mrs. [REDACTED] first discovered the object about one quarter mile southeast of Pleasant Valley. She called her husband's attention to it and they watched it as they drove slowly to the store at Pleasant Valley.

There the store operator, Allen Hughes, went with Leckington to observe it, but by that time it had disappeared. A check of the airport here indicated that a yellow plane was the only one in the air at the time.

Mrs. [REDACTED] described the object as round and silver. She said she could not tell whether it was moving.

AT TILLAMOOK, OREGON

2. On 11 April 1949, Mr. [REDACTED] ROSE, occupation machinist, was interviewed at his repair shop beside Hughes Grocery and Filling Station, Pleasant Valley, Oregon; and at his home at Rt. #2, Box 168, Tillamook, Oregon. [REDACTED] stated that at about 1100 hours, 23 January 1949, while driving south on Highway 101 below the old Naval Air Station, which is approximately four miles south of Tillamook, Oregon, his attention was attracted to a shiny object glinting in the sun. The object seemed to be stationary, was a silver color, and seemed to have no distinct shape. The map coordinates show the place of observation as latitude 45° 22' 17", and the longitude as 123° 48' 12". [REDACTED] saw the object through the windshield (which was clean) of his car at about a 35° angle from the ground. It seemed to be about 1/2 to 3/4 of a mile from him to the southeast, and the altitude seemed to be about 500 feet. It was in view for about 2½ or 3 minutes, during which time [REDACTED] drove to Pleasant Valley, about ½ mile away, and went into his shop to get his binoculars. By the time he returned outside the object had disappeared. It did not seem to move the entire time of observation, had no sound or odor (His automobile motor was running, and sound would not have been distinguished from the motor), and its size seemed to be about 12 or 15 feet in diameter. [REDACTED] states that the object was about the size of his open hand at arm's length from his eyes from where he saw it. It left no trail and did not maneuver. [REDACTED] compared its brilliance with the effect of the sun shining on a sheet of stainless steel and reflecting from it. The weather was pleasant, no ground haze, clear, very good light; and [REDACTED] did not see any clouds in the sky. The only witness with [REDACTED] was his wife ROSE, interviewed at their home at Rt. #2, Box 168, Tillamook, Oregon, whose account did not differ from [REDACTED]'s. It was noted that [REDACTED] does not wear glasses, and in his work as a mechanic he does a lot of welding with an arc welder. [REDACTED] was not in the armed services in the war, as he was deferred because of nerves. However, he did do duty as a civilian defense air raid observer.

3. On 11 April 1949, Mr. ROSE, father of Mrs. ROSE [REDACTED], was interviewed at the [REDACTED] home at Rt. #2, Box 168, Tillamook, Oregon; where, with his wife, he lives in a small house to the rear of the [REDACTED] home. [REDACTED] stated that at about 1100 hours on 24 January 1949 he was hanging his wife's wash on the line behind his home. While putting an article of clothing on the line, his attention was attracted to a silvery disc the shape of a saucer and about the size of the full moon going directly over his head in a definite

SYNOPSIS			
<p>Investigation predicated upon request of DO 45, Wright-Patterson AFB, Dayton, Ohio. On 11 April 1949, Mr. and Mrs. [REDACTED] and Mr. [REDACTED] were interviewed at their homes at St. #2, Box 158, Tillamook, Oregon. Mr. and Mrs. [REDACTED] described a shiny object which they had seen at 1100 hours, 23 January 1949 while driving south on Highway 101 toward Pleasant Valley, Oregon. Mr. [REDACTED] described a silvery object which he had seen while hanging out his wife's wash at [REDACTED], Tillamook, Oregon, on 24 January 1949. The object appeared at about 1100 hours directly overhead and traveled in a northeastern direction until lost to view. It was also noted that on 23 January 1949, the radio station at Tillamook, Oregon, called the airport and the Coastway School of Aeronautics at the old Naval air station, which is located about six miles from Pleasant Valley, to ascertain if their pilots had observed any flying objects. About fifteen minutes prior to the call, the Coastway School of Aeronautics had sent a silver colored airplane to McMinnville, Oregon, via Hebo, Oregon; and the path of the plane would have been about the same as where the flying object was seen on 23 January 1949.</p>

Map coordinates show the place of observation to be latitude 45° 22' 40", and the longitude as 123° 48' 7".

4. The Tillamook Police Department and the Tillamook County Sheriff's Office were contacted, but had never heard of either [REDACTED]

5. On 11 April 1949, Mr. [REDACTED], wife of [REDACTED], owner of the [REDACTED] Grocery and Filling Station, Pleasant Valley, Oregon, was interviewed at the grocery store. He stated that [REDACTED] is a quiet, reliable man, and not given to bragging or drinking in any manner. [REDACTED] is a good worker in his repair shop, and Mrs. [REDACTED] believes that he did see the flying object as he stated. Mr. [REDACTED] further advised that 23 January 1949 was a clear, sunny day.

6. On 11 April 1949, Mr. [REDACTED], flight instructor of the Coastway School of Aeronautics, located at the old Naval Air Station about six miles from Pleasant Valley, Oregon, stated that on 23 January 1949, at approximately 1100 or 1115 they received a telephone call from the radio station at Tillamook, Oregon, asking them if any of their instructors or students in the area had seen any "flying discs", as one was reported in the Pleasant Valley Area. The school stated that they did not see any. It was revealed by [REDACTED] that a silver colored, aluminum finished airplane had departed for McMinnville, Oregon, about fifteen minutes prior to the telephone call; and that it had flown to Rebo, Oregon, where it turned to go through the low passes enroute to McMinnville, Oregon. This plane would have flown through the area where [REDACTED] saw the flying object at approximately the same time he reported seeing it. On 24 January 1949, the same airplane had been flying between 1930 and 1934, however, it is unknown as to where the ship was flying, as no flight plan was made for the flight.
