

"JUST HOW TO GROW HYACINTHS."

CULTURE IN POTS — The best soil to use s a compost of good fibrous loam with a liberal addition of leaf soil, sharp sand and well decayed cow mannee. The whole should be well mixed and left to stand some time before use.

In potting leave the top of the bulb just exposed, and let the soil be modeately moist. The pots should then, at once be placed ontdoors on a bed of wet ashes and covered with six inches of the same material or, good garden soil and left exposed to the weathers. When the bulbs are well rooted and about an tuch of the top growth has been made, they may be removed indoors to force, first into a subdued light until the blanched foliage has attained its full green color, and theu into the sunniest situation at command. Abnudance of air, a moderalely moist atmosphere and plenty of water at the roots is then necessary for early, well developed flower spikes. A dry or frosty almosphere or a draughly situation will cause the flower buds to shrivel. Forcing should only be done gently, the temperature not exceeding 70 degrees.

If finely developed trasses and rich colors are preferred to very early flowers the Hyacinth should not be forced, but be left outdoors longer to develop, and then be removed to a build temperature like that of a cool greenhouse a sitting room window or frame, always selecting the summist and most genial situation.

CULTURE IN GLASSES. - Pure clear water should be used with a piece or two of charcoal in it to keep the water sweet The base of the bulb should at all times just touch the water. Place the glass in a cool dark place to encourage root growth. When the glasses are nearly full of roots admit them to the light gradually, and then to the sunniest place at command till the flower spikes are well develope i. Avoid a loo dry or frosty atmosphere or a draughty situation, as such conditions will often cause the flower buds to shrivel np.

CULTURE IN BEDS AND BORDERS.—For its successful cultivation in the open air, the Hyacinth likes a light, rich soil, which should be dug to a depth of 18 inches previous to planting the bulbs, the addition of sharp sand being recommended if the soil is very heavy. The ground should also be effectually drained. After digging the ground well, remove the top soil to a depth of 4 inches, and set the bulbs at equal distances of 6 to 8 inches apart, then cover them will the soil which had been removed and press and level the same with board or plank. From the time of their appearing above ground in sping they require little or no attention, but a slight covering of small litter or straw may be used with advantage in very exposed situations in severe weather.

AFTER TREATMENT.—When done flowering, cut down the flower and continue watering a lowing the leaves to return their nutriment to the bulb. When the leaves have become dry, the plant should be taken up and dried in some snupy place for a week or so, and then stored in dry sand for next season. Bulbs that have flowered in water are only suit ble or planting ont of doors afterwards.

Planted in September, they flower at Christmas or sooner; a succession can be kept up by potting bulbs at intervals. When the bulbs are planted, set away in a cellar or other cool location until vigorous root growth has been made. Three bulbs can be planted in a 5 inch pot. Most bulbs throw up from 3 to 5 spikes of bloom, which do not all come to perfection at the same time, thus prolonging the flowering season. We import Roman Hyacinths in immense quantities from the South of France, which enables us to supply the very best bulbs. The flowers are dainty, graceful and delightfully fragrant.



Single Early Tulips.

The Tulip, for its gorgeous colors, its pretty cup-like shape and its early flowering, is one of the oldest Spring favorites; planted in beds or borders, it is unrivaled for brilliant effect. As with most flowers, single varieties succeed better than double when forced; for this purpose they should be planted as early as possible; they need not be buried in ashes or earth like the Hyacinth, but should be kept in a cool, dark place until well started, after which the same treatment applies to both. The single dwarf Duc Van Thol varieties are especially adapted to forcing, and can be brought into bloom by January 1. For out-door planting, bulbs should be selected which will bloom about the same time, and as with the Hyacinth, they will be more effective if massed in contrasting colors. Plant four to six inches apart and four inches deep, and cover with a few inches of straw or dry leaves. When in bloom the bed should be protected from rain or frost. Our list comprises the choicest sorts for general culture. The number preceding the name of the variety denotes the height in inches, an advantage that will commend itself to those of our customers who plant borders, etc., requiring uniformity in this respect, while the letters a and b indicate their earliness of bloom; the a's flower together and are the earliest, the b's flower together but are somewhat later.


