Any soil that will produce early cabbage will grow Cauliflower, as their requirements are almost similar, but, as the product is more valuable, extra manuring and preparation of the soil will be well paid.

The seeds may be sown in hot-beds in March or April, and transplanted to open ground about the first of May.

Dig the trenches four feet apart, a foot wide and ten inches deep. Fill in five or six inches of well-rotted manure, and mix thoroughly, half a spade deep, with the earth at the bottom. The tops of the plants should be shortened before they are set. Earth up to blanch, three or four times during their growth, taking care no earth falls in the centre of the plants.

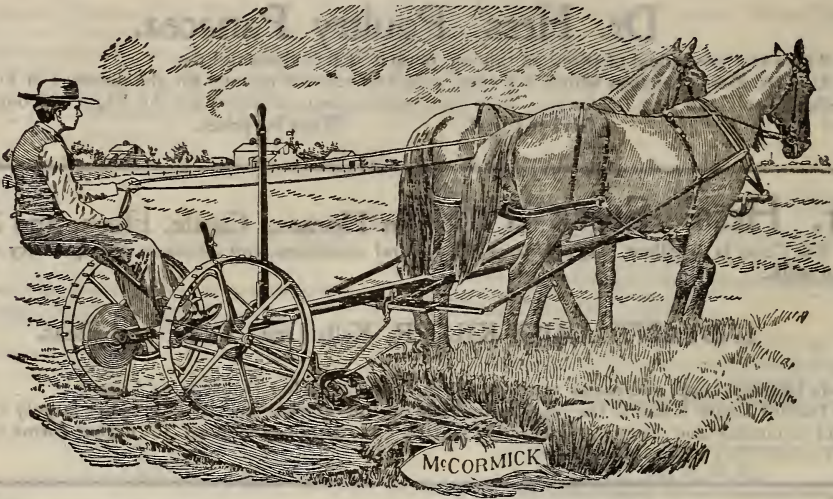

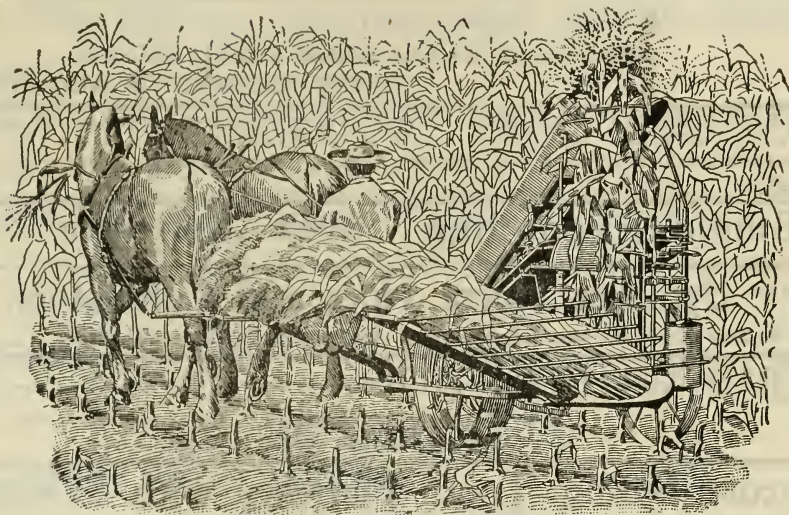

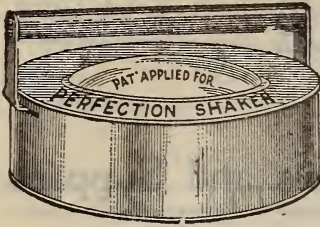
