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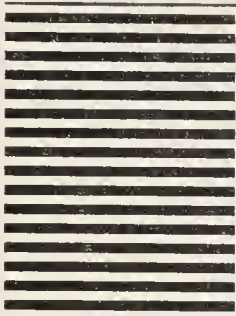

THE CALENDAR

THE JULIAN CALENDAR

The calendar is a method of identifying the passage of time and thereby regulating our civil life and religious observances.

Days, months, and years are based on astronomical periods. The day is the time it takes the earth to make one revolution on its axis, the month is associated with the period of rotation of the moon around the earth, while the year has to do with the rotation of the earth around the sun.

Many religious ideas and observances have been connected with the changes of the moon, and in ancient times the calendar took account of the moon rather than the seasons. From new moon to new moon is 29.530 days, and from one spring equinox to the next is 365.24219 days. Since the two are incommensurable, the modern calendar disregards the moon.

June in January sounds very well in a song but having summer coming in a winter month in actual life is not desirable.

When Julius Caesar came to power, the Roman Calendar was hopelessly confused. With the advice of the Alexandrian astronomer, Sosigenes, Julius Caesar established the Julian Calendar. The length of the year was taken as $365\frac{1}{4}$ days, and in order to account for the $\frac{1}{4}$ day, an extra day was added every fourth year. From 45 B.C. each month has had its present number of days. In the old Roman Calendar which was based on the moon an extra month was inserted to straighten out the difference between twelve lunations, 354.37 days, and 355 days, which they called a year. This was inserted when necessary after February 23rd. In the Julian Calendar the extra day was added by repeating the sixth day before the Kalends (1st) of March, whence comes our word bissextile for leap year.

Calendar trouble was not over. Due to a misunderstanding about inserting the intercalary day, by the time 8 B.C. came, the year began three days too late. Augustus rectified this by omitting all intercalations till A.D. 8 and no further change was made till the reform of Pope Gregory XIII in A.D. 1582.

The Julian Calendar is known as the "Old Style" and after the change made by Pope Gregory as the "New Style"; the difference between the two is 13 days. The Calendar so arranged is known as the "Old Style" and is now used by the Eastern Orthodox Church in Russia, Ukraina, Syria and Palestine.

Many Canadian citizens of Russian, Greek, Ukrainian or Syrian descent, thus observe their Christmas Day on Jan. 7 Gregorian.

THE GREGORIAN CALENDAR

But as the Solar Year is 11 minutes, 12 seconds less than the Julian Year of $365\frac{1}{4}$ days, it followed in course of years that the Julian Calendar became inaccurate by several days, and in 1582 this difference amounted to 10 days. Pope Gregory XIII, at the suggestion of Aloysius Lilius, an astronomer of Naples, determined to rectify this, and devised the Calendar now known as the Gregorian Calendar. He dropped or cancelled these 10 days—October 5th being called October 15th—and made centennial years Leap years only once in 4 centuries; so that whilst 1700, 1800 and 1900 were to be ordinary years, 2000 would be Leap year. This modification brought the Gregorian year into such close exactitude with the Solar year that there is only a difference of 26 seconds, which amounts to a day in 3,323 years. This is the "New Style". The Gregorian Calendar was adopted in Italy, France, Spain, Portugal and Poland in 1582, by most of the German Roman Catholic states, Holland and Flanders in 1583, Hungary in 1587. The adoption in Switzerland began in 1584 and was not completed till 1812. The German and Dutch Protestant states generally, along with Denmark adopted it in 1700. British dominions in 1752, Sweden in 1753, Japan in 1873, China in 1912, Bulgaria in 1915, Turkey and Soviet Russia in 1918, Yugoslavia in 1919, Romania and Greece in 1924, Turkey in 1927. The rules for Easter have not however, been adopted by those oriental churches that are not subject to the Papacy.

The difference between the two "Styles" will remain 13 days until A.D. 2100.

THE JEWISH CALENDAR

The Jewish Calendar from the institution of the

Mosaic Law downward was a lunar one, consisting of twelve months. The cycles of religious feasts commencing with the passover depending not only on the month but on the Moon; the 14th of the month of Abid or Nisan was coincident with the full moon; and the new moons themselves were the occasions of regular festivals; the commencement of the month was generally determined by observations of the new moon, but twelve lunar months would make but $354\frac{1}{2}$ days, the years would be short twelve days of the true year and it was necessary that an additional month Veader, be inserted about every third year.

The modern Jewish Calendar is based on fixed rules and not on observation. A common year may contain 353, 354 or 355 days and the Leap year 383, 384 or 385 days. The intercalary month always contains 30 days and is inserted next before the month Adar which name and place it takes. Adar itself is called second Adar or Veader. Tishri 1 is the Jewish New Year and it cannot be a Sunday, Wednesday or Friday. Tishri 1 is not necessarily the day of new moon but is governed by a mean new moon which is calculated from the value of a mean lunation. It is complicated as compared with the Gregorian Calendar. The intercalary month is introduced seven times in every nineteen years.

The identification of the Jewish months with our own cannot be effected with precision on account of the variations existing between the lunar and solar month. The Jewish Calendar is given on page 3.

THE MOHAMMEDAN CALENDAR

The Mohammedan Calendar is called also the Calendar of Hegira (i.e. Migration) and is attributed to the primary migration of Mohammed, the Prophet of Islam, on September 20th, 622 A.D. from Mecca, his native city in the land of Hejaz, Arabia, to the city of Medina in the north of the same land. In Medina the Prophet and Founder of the Islamic Faith died and was buried.

Each year consists of 12 lunar months, and since no intercalation is made the months go round the seasons in between 32 and 33 years. In civil life there seems to be confusion as to the beginning of the month and unless both the day of week and day of the month are stated it is impossible to give an exact interpretation to a date.

The Mohammedan Calendar is observed by all the Moslems in Arabia, Yemen, Iraq, Transjordan, Persia, Afghanistan, India, Syria, Palestine, Egypt, Tripoli, Tunis, Algeria, Morocco, and in Turkey both Asiatic and European.

The year 1373, according to the Hegira Calendar began on September 9th, 1953; the year 1374 on August 29th, 1954 Gregorian.

OTHER CALENDARS IN USE

Other calendars in use at the present day, in addition to those above, include the Coptic, Hindu, Persian.

CALENDAR REFORM

Reform of the calendar, so that it may be balanced in structure, perpetual in form and harmonious in arrangement, has long been under discussion.

In 1937, international opinion as to the desirability of calendar reform was explored by the League of Nations. Of 45 replies received, 14 governments indicated their willingness to adopt the perpetual calendar known as The World Calendar. Only 6 governments took a definite stand against such a reform.

The World Calendar comprises equal quarters in which the first month of each has 31 days and the other two 30 days each. These quarters contain exactly 91 days, 13 weeks and 3 months, with 13 Sundays and 78 weekdays, while each month has 26 weekdays. The 365th day becomes the Year-End Day, between December 30th and January 1st. In leap years a Leap-Year Day is interposed between June 30th and July 1st. Every January 1st falls on a Sunday, as does the first day of the other quarters. Thus the calendar is symmetrical and in keeping with the solar year and the seasons.

A suggestion has been made that the Year-End Day, a world holiday dedicated to international friendship, be called United Nations Day.

The World Calendar is sponsored by the World Calendar Association, 630 Fifth Ave., New York, and by affiliated calendar reform organizations throughout

the world; in Canada by The Rational Calendar Association of Canada, which is listed in this volume; see *index*. These associations are striving to win favor for reform by lectures and publications and suggest its adoption to start on Sunday, January 1st, 1956. This is the earliest date on which the Gregorian calendar and the New World Calendar meet.

On July 15, 1946, the Hon. Karl E. Mundt, Republican, introduced a Bill in the House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States, being joined by the Hon. John Kee, Democrat, for adoption of The World Calendar by the government of the United States. The proposed legislation also directed the President of the United States to seek international adoption.

The Inter-American Economic and Social Council of the Pan American Union placed The World Calendar on its agenda and referred the subject to its Committee on Commerce for further study and report.

THE WEEK

The division of the week is found only among Aryan nations and in regions into which they have penetrated. The day is, for convenience, divided into 24 equal parts and is the period of a single rotation of the earth upon its own axis.

A Solar or Astronomical day commences at midnight, and is divided into two equal portions of 12 hours each—those before noon being termed (A.M.) those after noon (P.M.).

The Chinese week consists of 5 days, which are named after iron, wood, water, feathers and earth; they divide the day into 12 parts of 2 hours each.

The Anglo-Saxons named the days of the week after the following deities; Sunday, the Sun; Monday, the Moon; Tuesday, Tiesco (God of War); Wednesday, Woden (God of Storms); Thursday, Thor (God of Thunder); Friday, Freya (Goddess of Love); Saturday, Saturn (God of Time).

The word week is from Wikon (German); = change, succession.

In The Soviet Union up to June 27, 1940 the six-day week prevailed in many factories, etc.; that is, five days of work followed by a day of rest. The free days were usually the 6th, 12th, 18th, 24th, and 30th of the month. In some industries where there is continuous production (steel mills, chemical plants, mines, etc.) there was a five-day week—that is four days of work followed by a rest day. On June 27th, 1940, by ukase of the Supreme Soviet of

the U.S.S.R. the seven day week was introduced everywhere in the Soviet Union, Sunday being observed as a day of rest.

Dominical Letter

The Roman Calendar makers placed the letters A,B,C,D,E,F,G. against the day of the year. The letter which stands against the Sundays is known as the Dominical Letter. In Leap year since no letter is set opposite the added day one letter appears for January and February and the letter preceding for the remainder of the year.

Jan. 6 (Sun.) is F. F therefore is the Dominical letter for Jan. and Feb. Since no letter is assigned for Feb. 29, Sunday from then on comes under the preceding letter, E, which is the letter for the remainder of the year.

Golden Number—The calendar for the phases of the moon is nearly the same every 19 years which is known as the Metonic Cycle. The Golden Number is its number in this Metonic Cycle. To find the Golden Number for 1952 add 1 to 1952 and divide by 19. The remainder, 15, is the Golden Number.

Epact is the age of the moon on some fixed day of the calendar year. (January 1 Gregorian Calendar).

Solar Cycle

In the Julian Calendar the days of the year recurred on the same days of the week in 7 x 4 years; 28 years was called the Solar Cycle. It is little used now.

The Cycle of the Indiction, is a non-astronomical cycle of 15 years. Following Diocletian's reconquest of Egypt in A.D. 297 a provincial census was taken and repeated every 15 years.

Julian Period

This is a combination of the Solar Cycle of 28 years, the Metonic or Lunar Cycle of 19 years, and the Cycle of the Indiction, 15 years. These are all supposed to begin on January 1 of the Julian Calendar which was 4713 B.C. The Julian days are numbered consecutively from Greenwich mean noon on January 1, 4713 B.C.

STANDARD TIME ZONES IN THE UNITED STATES AND CANADA

SOLAR, SIDEREAL AND STANDARD TIME

Apparent Time. — By apparent noon is meant the moment when the sun is on the meridian, and apparent time is measured by the distance in degrees that the sun is east or west of the meridian. Apparent time is given by the sun dial.

Mean Time. — The interval between apparent noon on two successive days is not constant, and a clock cannot be constructed to keep apparent time. For this reason *mean time* is used. The length of a mean day is the average of all the apparent days throughout the year. The *real sun* moves about the ecliptic in one year; an imaginary *mean sun* is considered as moving uniformly around the celestial equator in one year. The difference between the times that the real sun and the mean sun cross the meridian (i.e. between apparent noon and mean noon) is the *equation of time*.

Sidereal Time. — This is time as determined from the stars. It is *sidereal 0 hours* when the Vernal Equinox or First of Aries is on the meridian. In accurate time-keeping the moment when a star is on the meridian is observed and the corresponding mean time is then computed with the assistance of the Nautical Almanac or by the help of the table on page 19. (See notes, pages 6-7). When a telescope is mounted equatorially the position of a body in the sky is located by means of the sidereal time.

Standard Time. —

Owing to the great breadth of the Dominion the difference in solar time in various parts of the country is adjusted by the creation of Standard Time Zones, one hour in width, fixed between arbitrary lines running north and south, 15° of longitude apart, the time observed in each zone being an exact number of hours slow from Greenwich.

Example: When it is 8 a.m. by Pacific Time it is 12 noon by Atlantic Time and 4 p.m. at Greenwich.

There are seven zones divided as follows, reckoning from Greenwich:

Standard Times as used by the railways in traversing these Zones are in general use. Solar time around the globe varies four minutes with each degree of longitude.

DAYLIGHT SAVING OR SUMMER TIME

Prior to the war, Daylight-Saving Time in Canada was a matter of local regulation. Railways ran on Standard Time. Many cities and towns adopted Daylight-Saving Time for the summer months, especially in the east, but probably most towns and rural communities throughout the Dominion observed normal (Standard) time.

In September 1940, a Dominion order-in-council required municipalities in Ontario and Quebec which had been observing daylight-saving time, to continue to do so indefinitely, throughout the year, as a power-conserving measure.

On January 26th, 1942, by Order in Council P.C. 547, Daylight Saving was made obligatory on all municipalities in Canada throughout the year.

On Sept. 30th, 1945 this order was revoked and Canada reverted to Standard time, subject, as before the war, to local regulation. In subsequent years many cities in Canada, went on Fast time from the end of April to the end of September.

In Great Britain Summer Time was originally enacted by law in 1916. An Act of 1922 specified that the time should be advanced 1 hour at 2 a.m. G.M.T. on the morning of the day following the third Saturday in April, or if that day is Easter-day, the day following the second Saturday, and should end at 2 a.m. G.M.T. on the morning of the day next following the third Saturday in September. The Act, renewed in 1924 and 1925, was made permanent and modified

by substituting the first Saturday in October for third Saturday in September. The Act applies to Great Britain, Northern Ireland, Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

During the war, Summer time in Great Britain and Northern Ireland was extended beyond its normal period, later made continuous throughout the year and finally increased an extra hour (double Summer Time) during the summer months.

In 1946 normal Summer Time was resumed and was in effect from April 14th to October 6th.

In 1947 Double British Summer Time was re-introduced and became effective between April 13th and August 10th, when normal Summer-Time, i.e., one hour in advance of Greenwich Mean Time, was resumed and remained in operation until October 31, when Normal Greenwich Time came into force again.

In 1948 British Summer Time, i.e., one hour ahead of Greenwich Mean Time was in operation from March 14th to October 31st.

Practically the same arrangement was in effect from 1949—1952. In 1953, summer time was operative between April 19 and October 4.

In the United States Daylight Saving Time is a matter of local legislation; on February 9, 1942, legislation became effective placing the entire nation on Daylight Saving (War) Time but this legislation was rescinded on Sept. 30th, 1945.

The First Sunday in Advent is the fourth Sunday before Christmas Day, and is therefore the nearest Sunday to November 30.

ECLIPSES DURING 1954

In the year 1954 there will be 5 eclipses, three of the sun and two of the moon. Three of these will be visible in Canada.

1. An annular eclipse of the sun on January 5. This eclipse will be visible in Antarctica and in the southern parts of the Indian and Pacific Oceans, but not at all in America.

2. A total eclipse of the moon on January 18. The beginning of this eclipse will be visible in North America except the extreme western and north-western parts, and the ending will be visible over the whole of North America. The moon enters the umbra at 19 50, mid-eclipse is at 21 32, and the moon leaves the umbra at 23 14, all these times being E.S.T.

3. A total eclipse of the sun on June 30. This eclipse will be visible, at least as a partial eclipse, over all of Canada except the west coast. The path of totality will cut across north-eastern Canada, extend-

ing from Lake Superior to the tip of James Bay and thence to the northern Labrador coast and across the north Atlantic, past the southern parts of Scandinavia, across Russia and ending in India. The path of totality will be only about a hundred miles wide, elsewhere the sun will appear partially eclipsed. In eastern Canada the eclipse will begin just after sunrise, in western Canada the sun will be already partially eclipsed when it rises.

4. A partial eclipse of the moon on July 15. This eclipse will be well seen in South America, Europe and Africa. The ending will be visible in the eastern parts of North America just after moonrise, elsewhere on this continent the eclipse will be over before moonrise. The moon leaves the umbra at 20 31 E.S.T.

5. An annular eclipse of the sun on December 25. This eclipse will be visible in South Africa and Australia and over the ocean between; no part of it will be visible in North America.

NOTES ON THE ASTRONOMICAL TABLES

The purpose of the following notes is to explain the tables and charts which are not self-explanatory and to illustrate the uses to which they may be put.

Sunrise, Sunset, Moonrise and Moonset (see tables pp. 9 to 15). These tables give Standard Times of risings and settings for the places to which they apply (*i.e.* E.S.T. for Toronto and Ottawa, C.S.T. for Winnipeg, P.S.T. for Vancouver). The calculations are for the upper limb (edge) of the sun and they are made for the astronomical (sea) horizon. Accordingly, the times will not be correct if the observer is below or above the level of his visible horizon at the point of sunrise or sunset.

The times of sunrise and sunset for a place other than those given in the table can be obtained with a fair degree of precision by proceeding as follows: Choose two places in the table which bracket your latitude; take the times of sunrise (or sunset) of each of these; change each to Local Mean Time by adding (or subtracting) 4 minutes of time per degree for the number of degrees of longitude by which that place is east (or west) of the standard meridian of its time zone. Then, by finding the change per degree of latitude difference, find the local Mean Time for your own latitude. Finally add (or subtract) 4 minutes for each degree of longitude which you are west (or east) of your standard meridian to obtain Standard Time.

If the place has a latitude nearly equal to that of one of the places listed (say within half a degree) the procedure may be simplified: For each degree by which the place is west (or east) of the listed place add (or subtract) 4 minutes to the tabulated value of the listed place. This gives the time of sunrise or sunset in the Standard Time of the listed place; change to the Standard Time of the required place if it is in a different time zone.

Example: Required to find the time of sunset on Jan. 1, 1954 for Quebec City (lat. $46^{\circ} 48' N$. long. $71^{\circ} 13' W$).

From tables: Ottawa 16 30, Winnipeg 16 37. Ottawa is about $\frac{3}{4}^{\circ}$ west of 75th meridian; Winnipeg is about 7° west of 90th meridian. Therefore L.M.T. for Ottawa is 16 30 - 3 = 16 27, and L.M.T. for Winnipeg is 16 37 - 28 = 16 09. Difference in latitude of Winnipeg and Ottawa is about 5° . Thus sunset is earlier from the latitude of Ottawa northward by about $3\frac{1}{2}$ minutes per degree of latitude and, since Quebec is about $1\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ farther north than Ottawa, the L.M.T. of sunset at Quebec is 16 27 - 5 = 16 22. Since Quebec is about $3\frac{3}{4}^{\circ}$ east of the 75th meridian the E.S.T. of sunset at Quebec is 16 22 - 15 = 16 07.

Note: Since Montreal and Ottawa are at about the same latitude the E.S.T. of sunrise and sunset for Montreal may be taken as simply 9 minutes earlier than at Ottawa.

The times of moonrise and moonset are not easily obtained with precision for places other than those listed in the tables because of the more rapid motion of the moon. However, by using the Ottawa, Winnipeg or Vancouver values for Eastern, Central or Western Canada respectively, the errors will usually be less than half an hour.

Azimuth of the Sun at Rising and Setting (see table on page 18). Only twice a year, namely about March 21 and September 23, does the sun rise and set more or less exactly in the east and the west respectively. It is of interest and sometimes of value to know the position of sunrise and sunset at other times. The table on page 18 tabulates these positions in degrees east of north and west of north for sunrise and sunset respectively for a selection of latitudes and dates. For latitudes and dates other than those tabulated take simple proportions.

Time when the Sun is on the Meridian (see table on page 19). If Standard Time is to be obtained from a sun-dial or from a noon marker or, conversely, if direction is to be obtained by the sun from a knowledge of time, it is necessary to know the time when the sun is on the meridian, *i.e.*, due south. The correction to the sun-dial is given for every third day in the table on page 19. (Take simple proportions for intermediate days.) Add this to Apparent Solar Time to obtain Local Mean Time. To obtain Standard Time add (or subtract) 4 minutes per degree of longitude by which you are west (or

east) of your standard meridian.

Example: At Toronto on February 3rd what is the Eastern Standard Time when a vertical peg casts a shadow due north?

It is then noon Apparent Solar Time. Correction to the sun-dial from table is +13m.49s. Therefore Local Mean Time is 12h. 13m. 49s. and since Toronto is $4\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ west of the 75th meridian, the Eastern Standard Time is 12h. 13m. 49s. + 17m. 40s. = 12h. 31m. 29s.

Sidereal Time (see table on page 19). For any given moment the local sidereal time may be obtained with an accuracy of a second or two from the table of the Ephemeris of the Sun as follows: In this table choose the date next preceding the given moment. For this date apply the correction to the sun-dial with sign reversed to the sun's apparent right ascension, then add or subtract 12 hours. The result is the Greenwich Sidereal Time (G.S.T.) for 0h G.M.T. on the tabular date. Advance this time by the G.M.T. of the required moment and by 3m 57s per day (about 10s per hour) for the interval between the tabular date and the required moment; finally retard the time by the longitude west expressed in hours, minutes and seconds.

Example: Required to find the local sidereal time for Toronto (longitude 5h, 17m 40s W.) at 22 40 E.S.T. Sept. 12.

G.M.T. of required moment is 3 40 Sept. 13. From table 0h G.M.T. Sept. 13 is 11h 22m 02s + 3m 51s + 12h = 23h 25m 53s G.S.T. Therefore 3h 40m G.M.T. Sept. 13 is 23h 25m 53s + 3h 40m + $3\frac{3}{4} \times 10s$ = 27h 06m 30s or 3h 06m 30s G.S.T. Therefore local sidereal time is 3h 06m 30s - 5h 17m 40s = 21h 48m 50s.

Altitude of the Sun at Meridian Passage (see table on page 19). For architectural or gardening purposes it may be of value to know the maximum (*i.e.* noon-time) altitude of the sun at various seasons. This is obtained from the table of the sun's apparent declination which is listed for every third day. (Take simple proportions for intermediate days.) Proceed as follows: Subtract your latitude (presumed in the northern hemisphere) from 90° ; add or subtract (as indicated by the sign) the value of the sun's declination for the proper date.

Example: How high is the sun at noon on November 24th at Quebec City (latitude $46^{\circ} 48'$)? $90^{\circ} - 46^{\circ} 45' = 43^{\circ} 12'$. Sun's declination on Nov. 23 is $-20^{\circ} 24'$. Therefore sun's altitude at noon is $43^{\circ} 12' - 20^{\circ} 24' = 22^{\circ} 48'$.

Direction obtained from the Pole Star (see table on page 19). A previous note explained how the sun may be used to obtain the north-south direction. If a theodolite or telescopic sighting device is available, a north-south line may be laid down more accurately by means of the Pole Star. This star is exactly north only twice per day, namely at upper and lower transits. The table on page 19 lists the Local Mean Time of the upper transit of Polaris for every third day. (Take simple proportions for intermediate days.) The lower transit is 11h. 58m. later. To find the corresponding Standard Time add (or subtract) 4 minutes per degree of longitude by which you are west (or east) of your standard meridian.

Example: During the night of February 15-16 when is Polaris due north at Toronto (long. $79^{\circ} 24' W$)?

From table, upper transit is at 16 10 L.M.T. on Feb. 15. Lower transit therefore is at 4 08 L.M.T. on Feb. 16. Toronto is about $4\frac{1}{4}^{\circ}$ west of the 75th meridian, therefore the corresponding E.S.T. is 4 08 + 18 = 4 26.

Note: Although the table of upper transits of Polaris was calculated for longitude $90^{\circ} W$, little error will result in accepting these values for the whole of Canada. Working to the nearest whole minute of time the errors made in the direction of Polaris by this method will seldom exceed 10 seconds of arc.

References. The tables and charts in the Canadian Almanac are intended for simple astronomical observations. To make more extensive observations the following are recommended: The Observer's Handbook, The American Ephemeris and Nautical Almanac, Norton's Star Atlas and Reference Handbook.

ASTRONOMY IN CANADA

During the past fifty years Canada has established and maintained a prominent place in the field of astronomy, both professional and amateur.

Canada possesses three major astronomical observatories: the Dominion Observatory at Ottawa, the Dominion Astrophysical Observatory at Victoria, and the David Dunlap Observatory at Toronto. The Dominion observatories are operated under the Department of Mines and Resources and the David Dunlap Observatory is operated by the University of Toronto.

The Dominion Observatory at Ottawa has been operating since 1905. Its principal astronomical functions at the present time are the time service, solar research, and meteoric research. Its largest telescope is a 15-inch refractor.

The principal telescope of the Dominion Astrophysical Observatory is a 72-inch reflector completed in 1918. With this instrument much important research concerning the motion and nature of stars has been accomplished.

The David Dunlap Observatory was completed in 1935, a gift to the University of Toronto from the late Mrs. David Dunlap in memory of her husband. The large telescope at this observatory is a 74-inch reflector. Research problems include stellar motions, stellar spectroscopy, and the study of variable stars.

The telescopes at Toronto and Victoria are exceeded in size only by the Mount Palomar 200-inch telescope, the Mount Wilson 100-inch telescope, both in California, and the 82-inch telescope of the McDonald Observatory in Texas.

As well as these major observatories where telescopic observations are made every clear night, there are a number of observatories primarily devoted to astronomical instruction. Among these are the Hume Cronyn Memorial Observatory of the University of Western Ontario at London (10-inch refractor), the Observatory of the University of Saskatchewan at Saskatoon (7-inch refractor) and the Observatory of the Royal Astronomical Society of Quebec City (16-inch reflector).

Public visiting hours at these observatories are as follows: Dominion Astrophysical Observatory at Victoria, Saturday evenings throughout the year; the Dominion Observatory, Ottawa, Saturday evenings throughout the year; David Dunlap Observatory at Toronto, Saturday evenings April 1 to October 31, and Wednesday afternoons throughout the year; Hume Cronyn Observatory at London, first Saturday evening in each month; University of Saskatchewan Observatory at Saskatoon and the R.A.S.C. Observatory at Quebec, one hour every clear evening.

There are other smaller observatories at Universities and Colleges which are reserved for student instruction.

In addition to professional astronomers there are many amateurs in Canada who follow this interesting study. Most of these are members of the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada (see Index), membership in which is open to all who are interested in the subject.

METEORS, METEORITES, AND METEOR SHOWERS

A *meteor* or "shooting star" appears momentarily in the sky when a particle from beyond the earth enters the earth's atmosphere at a high velocity. Most visible meteors are caused by particles smaller than a grain of wheat, and these small particles are completely vaporized in the atmosphere at a height of about 80 miles. A spectacular meteor, known as a *fire-ball*, is caused by a larger body which may fall to the earth's surface in one or more pieces. Particles seen thus to fall, or subsequently found by analysis to be of this nature, are called *meteorites*.

Meteorites may be divided into two main classes—the irons, which are almost pure nickel-iron, and the stones. Any meteorite is characterized by a dark, smooth crust caused by the fusion of the outer part.

Meteors may be observed on any clear, moonless night at an average rate of about ten an hour. At times there occur *meteor showers*, when meteors are seen with much greater frequency and appear to radiate from a particular part of the sky which is called the *radiant*. This is an effect of perspective, the radiant being the vanishing point of the parallel tracks of the meteors. Meteor showers usually repeat themselves annually, and have nearly always been associated with the orbits of comets. When the earth passes through or near the orbit of a comet it inter-

cepts straggling particles which cause meteors. The principal meteor showers for the northern hemisphere are listed below.

The study of meteors and meteorites adds to our knowledge of the nature and origin of the solar system and also to our knowledge of the earth's outer atmosphere.

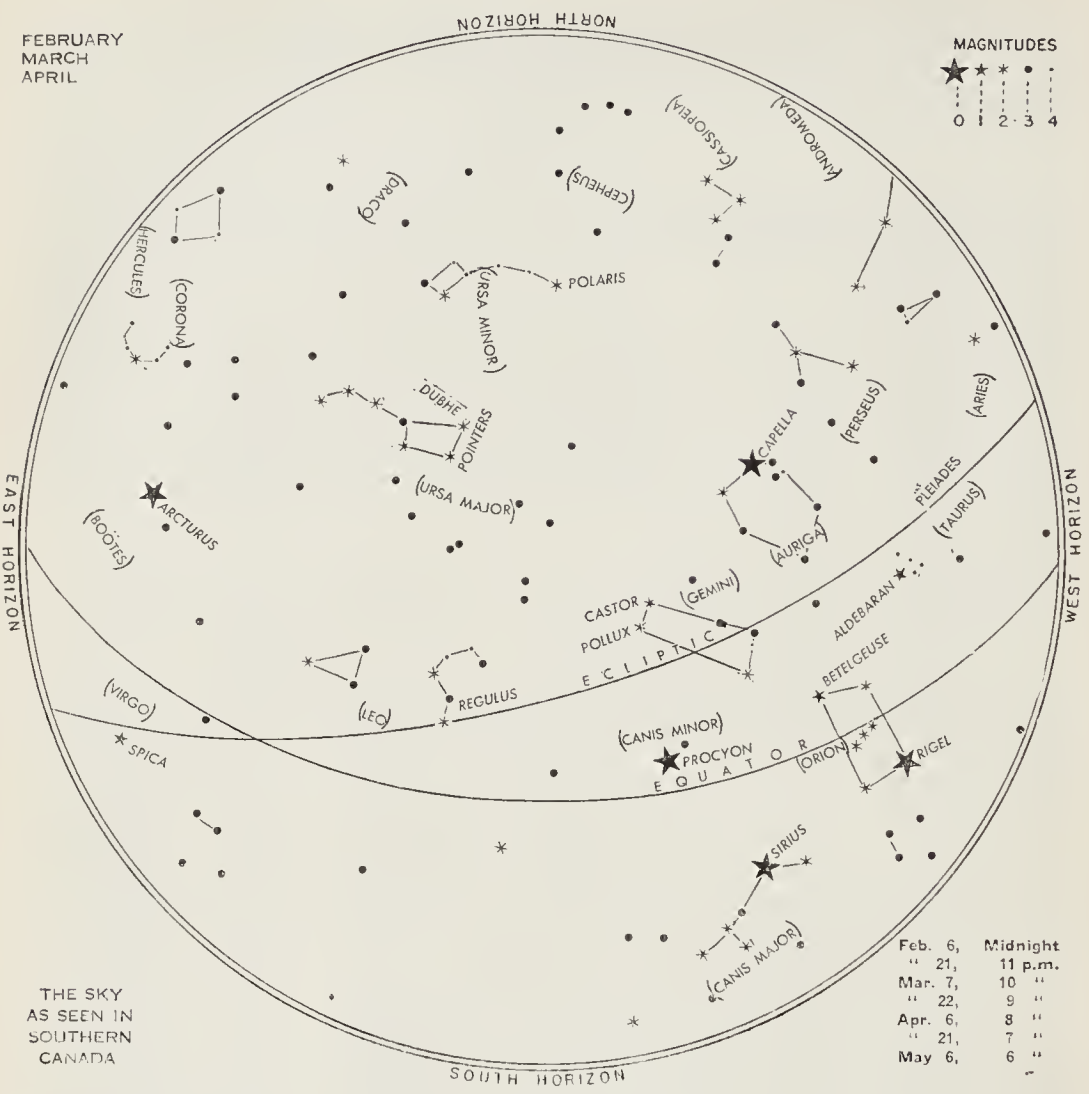

QUARTERLY STAR MAP

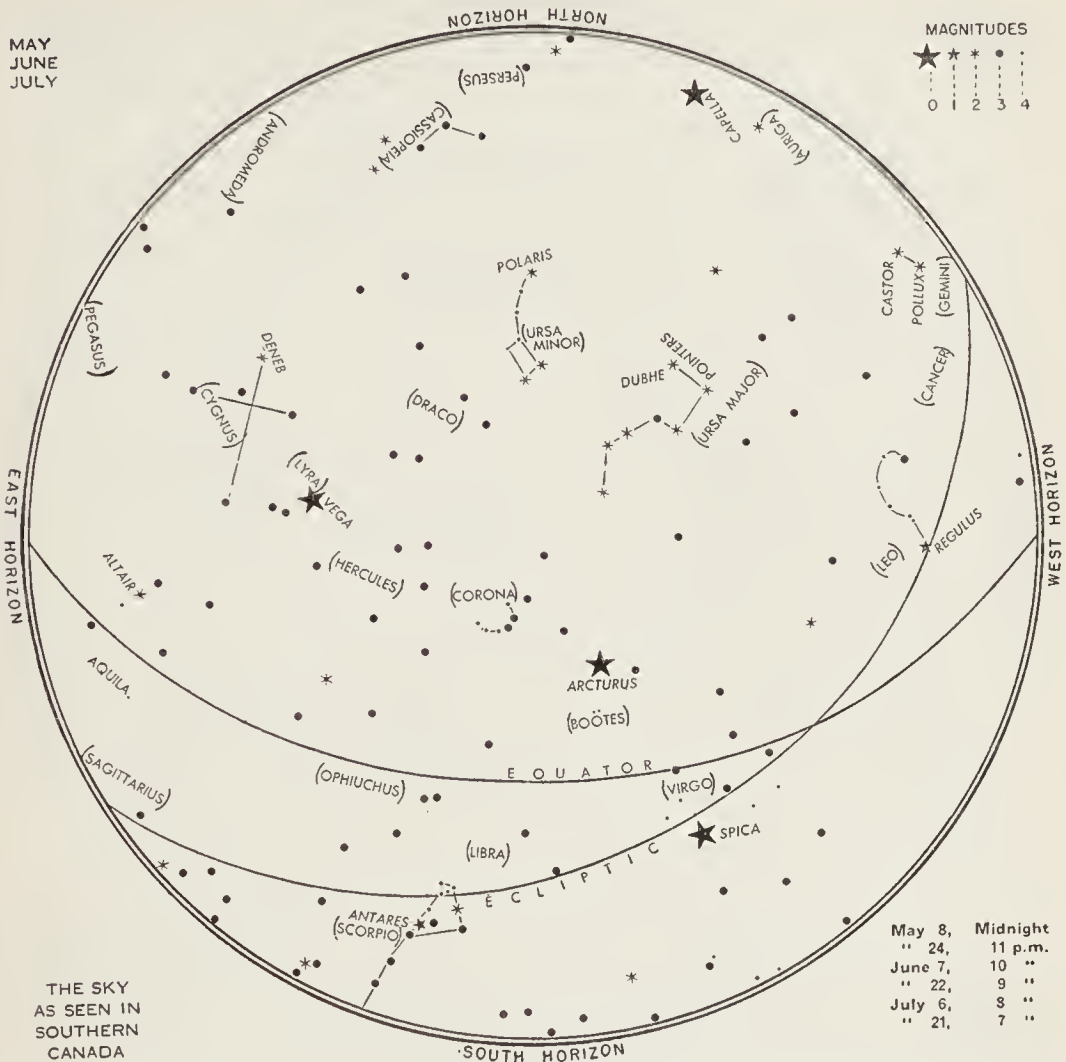

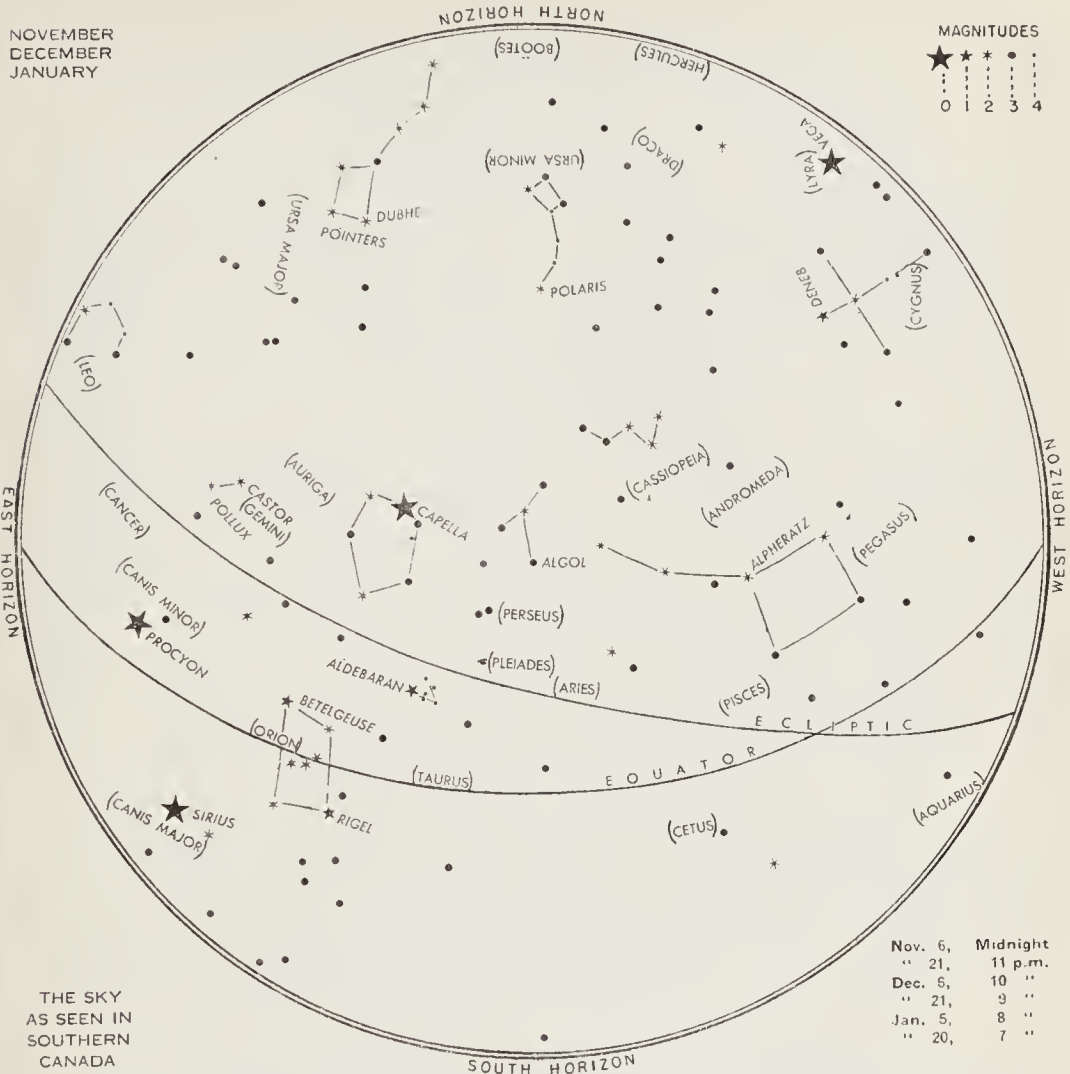

MAGNETIC DECLINATION

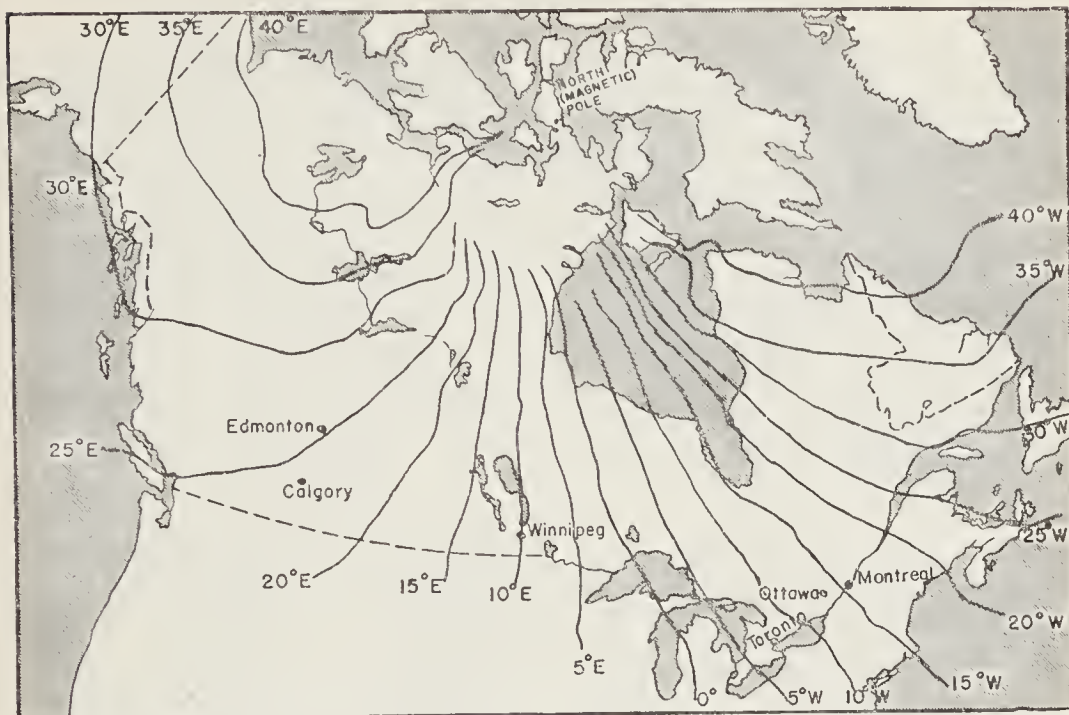


CHART OF MAGNETIC DECLINATION

A compass needle, even when unaffected by extraneous magnetic field, does not in general point due north. The amount and direction by which its direction differs from true north is called magnetic declination or variation. The declination varies with the position of the observer and also varies slowly with time. The above chart gives the values of declination over the Dominion as of 1940. These

values may be used for 1951 unless accuracy of better than 1° is required.

Example: What is the direction of the compass needle at the southern tip of Lake Manitoba?

From the chart this point is about 1/4 of the way from the line of 10°E declination towards the line of 15°E declination. Therefore the declination is 11°E, i.e., the needle points 11° east of true north.

A large map of Canada showing lines of Equal Magnetic Declination and Annual Change in Canada for 1940 is obtainable from the office of the Surveyor General, Ottawa, for 25 cents.

LEGAL WEIGHTS AND MEASURES IN CANADA

In Canada the law provides, with respect to weights, that the unit shall be the standard pound (avoirdupois) of 7,000 grains, one-sixteenth part of the standard pound shall be an ounce (437½ grains), one hundred pounds a cental, and two thousand pounds a ton, and that four hundred and eighty grains shall be an ounce troy. As regards measures—That the unit or standard measure of capacity, as well for liquids as for dry measures, shall be the gallon, containing ten standard pounds of distilled water, weighed with the water and air at a temperature of sixty-two degrees Fahrenheit with the barometer at thirty inches, the quart shall be one-fourth part of a gallon, and the pint one-eighth part of the gallon, and eight gallons shall be a bushel. The 1/160th part of the gallon by volume shall be the fluid ounce.

This gallon, commonly known as the "Imperial gallon," contains 277.42 cubic inches.

The standard measure of length is the yard, one-third part of which it is provided shall be a foot, and the twelfth part of such foot shall be an inch.

The legal cord for the measurement of wood, is 128 cubic feet.

IMPERIAL MEASURE

Special note should be made of the fact that certain standards of weights and measures used in some of the states of the United States are not legal, though frequently used, in Canada. These standards are not so large, being about 16.6 per cent. smaller in capacity than the legal standards in Canada, i.e., the Imperial pint, quart and gallon. Imperial measure is 20% larger than U.S. measure.

To convert a given number of U.S. gallons into Imperial gallons, subtract 1/16th or divide by 1.2. To convert a given number of Imperial gallons into U.S. gallons, add 1/5th or multiply by 1.2.

United States liquid measure is based on a gallon containing 231 cubic inches. United States Fluid ounce = 1.04 Canadian Fluid ounce. United States Bushel = 0.9694 Canadian Bushel. The United States bushel contains 2150.42 cubic inches

THE FRUIT, VEGETABLES AND HONEY ACT AND REGULATIONS

Chapter 62 of the Statutes, 1935

The provisions of this Act are intended to promote orderly marketing throughout the fruit, vegetable and honey industries and to assist in the settlement of disputes through the medium of an Arbitration Board. The Act is applicable to interprovincial or foreign trade only.

There follows a brief summary of the provisions of the Act and Regulations:

1. Establishment of grades or standards of quality for honey, fruits and vegetables.
2. Prescribes conditions relative to inspection, grading, marking of packages, shipment, advertisement and sale of fruit, vegetables and honey produced within or without Canada.
3. Establishment of standard packages for various kinds of fruits, vegetables and honey.
4. Provides for the detention of fruit, vegetables, honey or packages in respect of which an offence under the Act or Regulations has been committed.
5. Prescribes penalties for contravention of any provisions of the Act or Regulations.
6. Licensing of brokers, commission agents and dealers, handling fruits and vegetables.
7. Provides for a commercial fruit and vegetable inspection service at both shipping point and destination for which appropriate fees are charged for certificates issued.
8. Registration of honey packers and persons assembling honey and to prescribe fees for honey inspection certification and licensing.

9. Provides for the inspection and certification of imported produce for which a fee is charged for customs clearance purposes or to assist in determining if contract stipulations have been met.

10. The compulsory inspection and certification of fruits, vegetables and honey exported out of Canada for which a fee is charged.

11. Provides for amendment and addition to regulations through Ministerial Order.

EGGS

The regulations respecting the grading and marking of eggs, put into effect by the Federal Government, being in use throughout Canada, are of general interest to consumers.

The Canadian standard grades for eggs are as follows:— A1, A, B, C. — a candling definition being specified for each grade.

Grade A—The highest commercial grade; very good internal quality, clean and sound in shell; packed in three weights as follows—

Grade A Extra Large Eggs weighing individually at the rate of 27 oz. or more per dozen. (Optional)

Grade A Large—Eggs weighing individually at the rate of 24 oz. or more per dozen.

Grade A Medium—Eggs weighing individually at the rate of 21 to 24 oz. per dozen.

Grade A Small—Eggs weighing individually at the rate of 18 to 21 oz. per dozen.

Grade B.—The second grade, reasonably clean and sound in shell, weighing individually at the rate of 21 oz. or more per dozen.

Grade C.—The lowest grade, comprising all eggs, including cracks or dirty or stained eggs not permitted to be graded in Grades A and B, but which are still not of a condition unfit for human consumption.

Grade A1.—A super grade, available only on some markets. This grade is marketed only from farms holding a permit which is based on the suitability of production conditions; packed in three weights, Large, Medium and Small, the weights of which are the same as for Grade A.

Fresh—The word "fresh" shall be used only in conjunction with eggs which have not been cold stored

- (3) any excess of hatchways.

NET GR REGISTER TONNAGE. The Net or Register Tonnage is the Gross Tonnage as found above less deductions for crew space, stores, navigation spaces, allowance for propelling power and other deductions allowable under the Merchant Shipping Act.

DEADWEIGHT TONNAGE is the amount of cargo, bunkers, reserve feed water, domestic and sanitary water, provisions, consumable stores and effects on board, and is expressed in tons of 2240 lbs. each; or alternatively it is the difference in the displacement at a given draft and the displacement of the vessel "lightship" with water in boilers to working level and ready for steam but with none of the above mentioned items on board.

DISPLACEMENT is the amount of water displaced by a vessel floating in equilibrium in still water. The weight of water displaced is equal to the total weight of the vessel with everything on board and known as a displacement tonnage. If expressed in cubic feet it is known as the volume of displacement.

CHARTERED BANKS

Chartered Banks in Canada are incorporated by Special Act of the Canadian Parliament and governed by the Bank Act (Chapter 30 of the Statutes of 1944), which continues in force the charters of the banks until July 1, 1954. The Act specifies clearly the transactions in which banks may or may not legally engage, and embodies regulations designed to ensure the proper conduct of the bank's affairs. They are prohibited from engaging in any trade or business, from loaning money on the security of or dealing in the shares of any bank and from loaning more than \$10,000.00 to any of their officers or clerks. Subject only to the provisions of Section 88 of the Bank Act and of the Farm Improvement Loans Act, 1944 (Chapter 41 of the Statutes of 1944), banks are also prohibited from lending upon the security of immovable property, although this may be taken as additional collateral for debts already contracted to a bank in the ordinary course of its business.

The note circulation privileges formerly held by the banks were gradually reduced from January 1, 1936 to January 1, 1945 and since the latter date no bank has been permitted to issue or re-issue notes in Canada. In January, 1950, the banks paid to the Bank of Canada an amount equal to the face value of the notes issued by them for circulation in Canada and outstanding. Bank of Canada then became liable to redeem all of these notes thereafter presented to it. The foreign note issues of a bank are limited to ten percent of its unimpaired paid-up capital.

At one time in the event of the property and assets of any bank being insufficient to pay its debts and liabilities, each shareholder was liable for the deficiency to an amount equal to the par value of the shares held by him in addition to any amount not paid up on such shares. In 1934 it was provided that this liability of a shareholder, apart from any amount not paid up on his shares, should not exceed that proportion of the par value of his shares which the amount of notes which the bank was authorized to have in circulation in Canada bore to the paid-up capital of the bank. All extra liability on bank shares ceased in January, 1950, upon payment to the Bank of Canada of the outstanding Canadian note circulation balance.

GOVERNMENT OF ALBERTA TREASURY BRANCHES

Treasury Branches were established in 1933 by the Government of the Province of Alberta to provide facilities for depositing money, withdrawing deposits and transferring claims on goods and services to or from other depositors.

In 1944 the services were expanded and now include most of those provided by chartered banks. Treasury Branches and Managers are included in the preceding list of bank branches.

LES CAISSES POPULAIRES DES JARDINS (CREDIT UNIONS) IN THE PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

Les Caisses populaires Desjardins (Credit Unions) are organized and operate under the Quebec Cooperative Syndicates Act. They receive deposits from their members. Those deposits are payable on demand. The members can borrow from the society on note or mortgage for a short or long term period. The rest of the assets is invested in first class bonds or deposited in a Central Credit Union or a Chartered Bank. These Credit Unions do not issue paper money. There were 1,128 caisses populaires at the 31st of December, 1952.

CANADIAN GOVERNMENT ANNUITIES

The Government Annuities System was set up in 1908 to encourage persons resident or domiciled in Canada to save for their old age by the purchase of deferred annuities and to enable older citizens to stretch out their accumulated savings by the purchase of immediate annuities. Canadian Government Annuities are payable for life and may be guaranteed for a period of years certain. Under deferred annuities, premiums are returned with interest if the annuitant dies before the annuity commences. The maximum amount of annuity obtainable is \$1,200.00 a year. It may be obtained with the income reducing by \$40.00 a month at 70, thus fitting in with the Old Age Security Act.

Employers may operate their pension plans through the purchase of Government Annuities for, or on behalf of, their employees. There are 940 such pension plans in operation, covering 137,537 working employees. In addition, there are 108,187 individual deferred annuity contracts in force. Annuity in the annual amount of \$28,218,017 is being paid under 61,238 individual contracts and group certificates.

The premiums are moderate and annuities may be purchased through Canadian Government Annuities offices in 43 communities across Canada, or directly from Head Office.

FISHERY REGULATIONS, GAME LAWS, CLOSE SEASONS, LICENCES, &c.

The Canadian Government has the sole legislative authority over the fisheries of Canada, both coastal and inland, under which laws are made for the protection and conservation of the fisheries in all the provinces. The provinces, however, have property rights in the non-tidal fisheries. Over a period of years various arrangements have been made between the Dominion and the provinces dividing the administrative (but not the legislative) authority over fisheries. Under these arrangements the Federal Government not only legislates but also administers the fisheries in all Canadian tidal waters except those of Quebec. In the non-tidal waters of Canada the Federal Government administers the fisheries of the Yukon, Northwest Territories, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. The non-tidal fisheries of the other provinces are administered by the provincial authorities who enforce, on behalf of the Federal Government, the Federal laws regulating the fisheries as such.

Fisheries in National Parks of Canada are under the administration of the National Parks Service of the Federal Department of Resources and Development, Ottawa.

For further information as to fisheries regulations apply to the Department of Fisheries, Ottawa, or, in the case of National Parks, to the National Parks Service, Ottawa. For information as to fishing licence fees in any area apply to the administrative authority indicated above.

GAME LAWS

Migratory birds are protected under a Federal law known as the Migratory Birds Convention Act, which is administered by the Canadian Wildlife Service, Department of Resources and Development, Ottawa, Canada, in conjunction with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and in co-operation with the provincial game authorities. This Act is based upon the Migratory Birds Treaty with the U.S.

With this exception, and except in National Parks, game laws are under the administration of the various provinces and territories.

A Federal Law, the Game Export Act, passed in 1941, prohibits the export of game from any province or territory without permit from the province or territory. It has been proclaimed for all provinces and territories except Prince Edward Island.

Details as to closed seasons, licences, etc., are not given here, owing to the fact that regulations for the ensuing months are, in some cases, not available when this volume goes to press and where available are often subject to changes before the opening of the season.

Registration, where such service is in operation, is additional to the above.

2. Aerogrammes

In addition to the regular air mail services above described, a further service is provided through the use of Aerogrammes which may be sent to all countries, at 10 cents each. Aerogrammes may not be registered.

3. Business Reply Envelopes and Cards.

At the larger post offices firms sending out letters enquiries and order forms to the Canadian public may enclose an addressed business reply envelope having printed on the face of the envelope the words "Business Reply Envelope 5c, postage will be paid by", and the name and address of the firm, and bearing a return postage impression.

Similarly business firms may send out business reply cards, postage being collected from the business firm, upon return of the card, at the rate of 4c. each.

4. Special Delivery of Letters and Parcels

LETTERS.—Special Delivery letters bearing in addition to regular postage ordinary postage stamps of the value of 10 cts., and the words "Special Delivery" legibly written on the upper left hand corner of the envelope, may be accepted in Canada for Special Delivery at any place in the United States and at the following places in Canada.

5. Registration

The scale of Registration Fees in addition to the Postage on all classes of matter except parcel post, to addresses in Canada is as follows:—

In the case of registered articles posted in Canada addressed to places in the United States or to other Postal Union Countries, the registration fee is as follows:—

Other Postal Union Countries:	Indemnity not exceeding . . . \$ 8.17	20c.

An acknowledgment of receipt may be obtained by the sender of a registered article on payment of a special fee of 10 cents, in addition to the postage and registration fee, if the Acknowledgment of Receipt is asked for when the registration article is posted, or for 20 cents if asked for afterwards.

INDEMNITY FOR REGISTERED ARTICLES

Indemnity will be paid, provided the loss of the registered article is reported to the Department within one year of the date of posting, upon receipt of certain sworn statements of the persons concerned.

Canada.—In the case of registered articles posted in Canada for delivery in Canada, indemnity covers not only loss, but also rifling and damage. Indemnity is provided at scale of charges shown above.

SECOND CLASS MATTER

6. Transient Newspapers

Transient newspapers and periodicals include all newspapers and periodicals published in Canada, other than Canadian newspapers sent from the office of publication and British, Canadian and foreign newspapers posted by newsdealers. When addressed to any place within the Dominion, the United States or Mexico, and when published in Canada, and addressed to any place in Great Britain, or to places within the Empire, France, Spain and North and South America they must be prepaid at the following rate by Postage Stamp:—

2c for the first four oz., and 1c for each additional 4 oz., or fraction of 4 oz. to each separate address. To countries other than those mentioned above the rate is 2c for first 2 ozs. and 1c for each additional 2 oz., or fraction thereof, to each separate address.

Transient newspapers and periodicals not published in Canada are subject to the ordinary printed matter rate of 2c for first 2 ozs. and 1c for each additional 2 oz., or fraction thereof, to each separate address, for all countries except Canada, U.S.A. and Mexico.

7. Newspapers and Periodicals

Printed and published in Canada and posted from the office of publication.

Special rates of postage, dependent upon the frequency of publication and the circulation per issue.

apply to mailings of authorized newspapers and periodicals made by publishers. For particulars, consult local Postmaster.

8. British and Foreign Newspapers posted by Newsdealers in Canada

British and foreign publications as well as Canadian publications, if authorized by the Department may be posted by newsdealers in Canada to subscribers in Canada at the rate of 4 cents per lb. They cannot however be posted at that rate for local delivery at places where there is a free letter carrier service. Newsdealers may also post recognized Canadian newspapers and periodicals to regular subscribers in Great Britain and places within the Empire, at the bulk rate of 4 cents per pound.

9. Books, Limits of Weight, etc.

A Book Packet may contain any number of separate books. Limit of weight for post is 6 lbs. 9 oz., but in case of a single book, a weight of 11 lbs. is allowed. Limit of size, (domestic)—in no case must the combined length and girth exceed 6 feet. For all other countries no packet may exceed 3 feet in the combined length, breadth, and depth, but the greatest dimension must not exceed 2 feet, unless in the form of a roll when the length and twice the diameter must not exceed 3 feet 3 inches, but the greatest dimension must not exceed 2 feet 8 inches.

Book packets must be put up in such a way as to admit of contents being easily examined. They may contain an unsealed invoice, but must not contain any letter or sealed inclosure.

Books for the use of the blind are allowed to pass free of postage.

THIRD CLASS MATTER

10. Printed Matter, Circulars, Samples, Miscellaneous Matter

Third class matter, described as under, may pass between places in the Dominion of Canada or outside of Canada upon prepayment of 2c for first 2 oz.; 1c each additional 2 oz.

DEFINITION OF THIRD CLASS MATTER

Matter (other than newspapers and periodicals), wholly in print without reference to process, such as circulars, catalogues, calendars, hand-bills, books, pamphlets, printed forms, maps, paper patterns, prints, drawings, etc., the following partly-written and partly-printed matter:—militia and school returns, customs manifests, voters' lists, school or college examination papers and educational exercises passing between colleges and extra-mural students, etc. To come within the class of Third Class Matter the material printed upon must be either paper, cardboard or parchment.

REGULATIONS RE UNSEALED PACKAGES

No letter or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter may be sent or inclosed in any such package or thing mentioned, and the same must be sent in covers open at the ends or sides, or otherwise so put up as to admit of the contents being, if necessary, easily withdrawn for examination by the officers of the Post Office to ensure compliance with this provision (if enclosed in sealed envelopes notched at the ends or sides, or with the corners cut off, letter rate of postage will be charged).

EXCEPTION FOR U.S.A.

Printed matter exchanged between the United States and Canada, other than circulars and miscellaneous printed matter in packages weighing 8 ounces or less, but including books and catalogues having 24 pages or more although said books or catalogues weigh 8 ounces or less, may be tied with a string or fastened with gummed paper tape, provided such packages containing printed matter are marked or stamped "PRINTED MATTER," and bear the name and address of the sender and the printed inscription "May be opened for postal and customs inspection."

Articles of printed matter and parcel post addressed to all countries with the exception of Canada and the United States must continue to be sent as formerly in unsealed packages.

DEFINITION OF CIRCULARS

Circulars are communications in print, or produced by a multiplying process easy to recognise, but not direct from a typewriting machine, which are issued in identical terms to several individuals. A circular may, without becoming liable to a higher rate of postage, have a written date and signature, and may have the name of the addressee repeated in writing inside Reproductions or imitations of hand or typewritten matter, in order to be accepted as circulars, must be handed in at the post office wicket, in a number not less than twenty identical copies, separately addressed. Failure to comply with either of these conditions will subject the article to letter rate of postage.

PAPER FOR BLIND

Writing paper specially prepared for the use of the blind transmitted from an Institution for the Blind in Canada (recognized as such by the Post Office Department, Ottawa) to blind persons for their own use is allowed to pass free of postage.

LIMIT OF WEIGHT, ETC.

The limit of weight for a packet of third class matter is 6 lbs. 9 oz. and in no case must the length and girth combined exceed 6 feet.

Printed or written requests for return are recognized on books, third class matter, samples and parcels of merchandise addressed to places within the Dominion, or in the United States and same will be returned direct to the sender, subject to the payment by the sender, on delivery to him through the Post Office, of the full amount of postage to which the article was in the first place liable, together with any charges rated thereon on account of any deficiency in the original prepayment.

Printed matter should be fully prepaid at the time of posting and will not be forwarded unless at least partly prepaid.

11. Samples, Canada, U.S.A. and Mexico

Samples of Merchandise and Goods not having saleable value and not exceeding 1 lb. in weight, may be posted in Canada, to be forwarded to any place in the Dominion, U.S.A., or Mexico, on prepayment of a rate of 2c for the first 2 oz. and 1c for each additional 2 ozs. or fraction thereof under the following regulations:

Size limit: Canada 18 in. x 8 in. x 4 in., or if in the form of a roll 18 inches in length by 6 inches in diameter. Other countries: length, breadth and depth combined, 3 ft. but greatest dimension must not exceed 2 ft. Roll length and twice diameter 3 ft. 3 in. but greatest dimension must not exceed 2 ft. 8 in.

Samples must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, &c., which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen, or such like material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened.

There must be no writing upon or in any packet of samples, except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender, a trade mark or number and the price of the articles, or such words as may be necessary to indicate precisely the origin and nature of the merchandise.

Articles of saleable value even when intended to serve as samples, or goods sent for sale or in execution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or any article sent by one private individual to another, which are not actually trade samples, are not admissible.

Liquids (except intoxicating liquors), oils, etc., may be sent by mail in the Dominion if put up carefully in strict accordance with the directions given in the Postal Guide and ascertainable at any post office.

12. Samples for Great Britain and Foreign Countries

Samples of Merchandise, when addressed to places in Great Britain, must not exceed 1 lb. in weight, and must be prepaid. Size limit, length, breadth and depth combined, 3 ft. but greatest dimension must not exceed 2 ft. Roll length and twice diameter 3 ft. 3 in. but greatest dimension must not exceed 2 ft. 8 in.

Samples of liquids (except intoxicating liquors), oils, glass, etc., are admitted as samples provided they are put up in strict accordance with the directions given in the Postal Guide.

13. Commercial Papers, British and Foreign Post

Commercial papers mailed in Canada, for delivery in Canada, are liable to the letter rate of postage up to a weight of 16 ozs. and 1c per 2 oz. or fraction thereof, after. To all other countries the rate is 1 cent per 2 ozs. but each packet must have a minimum prepayment of 5 cents covering a weight of 8 ozs., prepayment compulsory. Size limit, length, breadth and depth combined, 3 ft. but greatest dimension must not exceed 2 ft. Roll length and twice diameter 3 ft. 3 in. but greatest dimension must not exceed 2 ft 8 in. The weight must not exceed 4 lbs. 6 ozs.

"Commercial Papers" are understood to comprise all

papers or documents written or drawn wholly or partly by hand (except letters or communications of the nature of letters or other papers or documents having the character of an actual and personal correspondence), documents of legal procedure, deeds drawn up by public functionaries, copies of extracts from deeds under private seal and (whether written or printed on stamped or unstamped paper) way wills, bills of lading, invoices and other documents of a mercantile character, documents of insurance and other public companies, also open letters and post cards of ancient date which have already fulfilled their original purpose, also copies thereof.

Parcels up to and including 12 ounces in weight are subject to a minimum charge of 5c covering a weight of 4 oz., plus 1c for each oz. in excess of 4 oz., except within the 20 mile zone where the charge shall not exceed 10c..

Parcels over 12 oz. but not exceeding one pound in weight are liable to the one pound rate to the Province of destination. (Withing the 20 mile zone the 10c rate shall apply).

Parcels are liable to 1c an oz. on excess weight over even pound until the next pound rate or group rate is reached. †The Maritime Provinces, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P.E.I., are considered as one Province.

*Consult local Postmaster for information respecting parcel post service to the Yukon, during season of closed navigation and the rates of postage on the various Air Stage Routes.

Parcel Post packets totally unpaid will be sent to the District Dead Letter Office.

Parcels must be prepared for mailing in such manner that the contents can be easily examined.

It is desirable that the sender's address should appear either inside the parcel or on the cover. This must be kept distinct from the address proper.

Redirected parcels or other articles posted in Canada prepaid at parcel post rates are chargeable with new postage at the rate which would have been chargeable had they been originally mailed from the office of redirection to the new address, except in cases where the forwarding address is within the province to which the parcel was originally addressed, when no redirection charge is to be made.

The limit of weight for a Parcel Post packet is 25 pounds, and in no case must the combined length and girth exceed six feet.

For Special Delivery, see note 4.

Parcel Post packets cannot be registered but can be insured (Insurance is free up to \$50. For fees and regulations for insurance of parcels, see paragraph No. 17 "Insurance".)

15. Parcel Post to Great Britain and Other Countries

Closed parcel mails are exchanged by direct service between Canada and the following countries: Argentina, Australia, Bahamas, Bermuda, Barbados, Belgium, Brazil, British Guiana, China, Cuba, Republic of Ireland, Fiji, Great Britain and Northern Ireland, France, Germany, Grenada, Hong Kong, Israel, Italy, Jamaica, Leeward Islands, Mexico, Netherlands, New Zealand, Philippine Islands, St. Lucia, St. Pierre and Miquelon, St. Vincent, Sweden, Trinidad and Tobago, Union of South Africa and Venezuela.

Parcels may also be sent to and received from any country with which the British Post Office maintains a parcel post.

Parcels for the Union of South Africa, British West Indies, Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Netherlands, Antilles, Haiti, and Central and South American countries may be forwarded via New York, and when intended for transmission by that route should be legibly marked "Via New York".

For rates enquire at Post Office.

Parcels for, or sent via, Great Britain, pass exclusively in the mails conveyed by ships on the direct route between Canada and the United Kingdom.

Parcels for Argentina, Australia, Bahamas, Barbados, Bermuda, British Guiana, Brazil, Cuba, Dominica, Fiji, Grenada, Jamaica, Leeward Islands, New Zealand, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, St. Kitts, Trinidad and Tobago, Union of South Africa and Venezuela, are forwarded direct from Canada and *via* the United States according to rate of prepayment.

LIMIT OF WEIGHT AND SIZE

General limit of weight—20 lbs.

For parcels addressed to countries where limit of weight is restricted to 11 lbs. or 15 lbs., enquire at Post Office.

Limit of size—3½ feet in length, width or depth, but in no case may the length and girth combined exceed 6 feet.

Every parcel must be fully prepaid by postage stamps.

A Parcel must not contain a letter or any writing in the form of a letter, or any explosive, combustible, or dangerous articles, or intoxicating liquor.

For each Parcel a Customs Declaration 91B must be securely affixed to the parcel to which it relates.

Non-adhesive Customs Declaration 15B and Despatch Lot 16B must also accompany parcels to most countries. Enquire at Post Office.

Parcels must be handed to the Postmaster; in no case should they be dropped into a letter box or other receptacle for mail matter. Parcels (except gift food parcels) to Great Britain may be insured. See par. No. 17. "Insurance". See also 15a Gift Parcels.

15a. Gift Parcels for Overseas

REGULATIONS OF THE UNITED KINGDOM FOR CIVILIANS

In 1944, British government regulations were made effective imposing the Purchase Tax on civilian recipients of gifts from overseas other than foodstuffs and used clothing.

Subject to the above paragraph, bona fide unsolicited gifts addressed to individuals in the United Kingdom, whether they include rationed foods or not, may be sent by parcel post. They must be plainly marked as GIFTS.

Gift parcels for the United Kingdom *must not exceed 20 pounds in weight*, must be clearly marked as "Gifts" and must not be imported into the U.K. as merchandise or for sale.

Recipients may be liable for any customs duty or purchase tax applicable.

Customs declarations should show details as to weight and value of goods included in these gift parcels.

The above restrictions do not apply to gifts for licensed charitable organizations in the United Kingdom who have been authorized to import gifts duty free.

The parcel post rates to the United Kingdom are 1 lb. 25c, 2 lb. 45c, 3 lb. 60c, 4 lb. 80c, 5 lb. 95c, 6 lb. \$1.10 7 lb. \$1.30, 8 lb. \$1.45, 9 lb. \$1.65, 10 lb. \$1.80. Over 10 lb. up to 15 lb. \$2.25 and over 15 lb. up to 20 lb. \$3.25.

16. Parcel Post for United States

General merchandise (parcel post) addressed to places in the United States or its possessions (except the Philippine Islands) is liable to postage at the rate of fourteen cents a pound up to 10 lbs.; over 10 lbs. and up to 15 lbs., \$1.75 per parcel.

Parcels up to and including 12 ounces in weight are subject to a minimum charge of 5c covering a weight of 4 ounces, plus 1c for each ounce in excess of 4 ounces.

Over 12 ounces, full pound parcel post rates apply.

Parcels must be accompanied by a Customs Declaration, and should be open to inspection (unsealed), but sealed packages may be accepted providing sender's name and address is shown by printed label or rubber stamp and nature of contents indicated.

17. Insurance of Parcel Post

Parcels posted in Canada for delivery in Canada may be insured up to \$50.00 without insurance fee, if so requested by the sender.

If the sender desires to insure such parcels in excess of \$50, the regular insurance fee of 12 cents to cover the additional insurance must be prepaid.

FOR DELIVERY IN OTHER COUNTRIES

Parcels posted in Canada for delivery in Australia, Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and new Zealand—also parcels intended for transmission via England addressed to foreign countries to which Great Britain extends insurance may be insured against loss, rifling or damage while in the custody of the postal service at the following rates: 12 cents for insurance not exceeding \$50. 30 cents for insurance exceeding \$50 and not exceeding \$100.

Particulars as to articles which cannot be accepted for insurance or insured against damage, may be ascertained from the local Postmaster.

18. C. O. D. Service in Canada only

Parcels may be sent C.O.D. within Canada whereby charges due the sender up to \$100.00 may be collected from the addressee and remitted to the sender by post office money order. C.O.D. parcels must be mailed at an accounting post office but may be addressed to any post office in Canada or to any rural route. A C.O.D. tag, procurable at all accounting post offices, must be used. Rural routes are for this purpose considered as accounting post offices. C.O.D. fees are as follow: 10c if not more than \$2.00 is to be collected; 15c if more than \$2.00 but not more than \$50.00 is to be collected; 30c if more than \$50.00 is to be collected. C.O.D. fee is paid by postage stamps affixed by the sender in addition to the ordinary postage. C.O.D. at other than the first class rate of postage. The sender of a C.O.D. parcel may include postage and C.O.D. fee in the amount to be collected. It is forbidden to send articles C.O.D. which have not been ordered or requested by the addressee and articles may not be examined before payment of the C.O.D.

The charges on C.O.D. articles may be increased, decreased or cancelled upon request of sender, made through Postmaster at office of mailing.

19. Prohibited Articles

All explosive, dangerous or destructive substances intoxicating liquors, glass bottles or glass in any form liable to break, and all matter subject to speedy decay, all obscene or immoral books, publications, pictures, etc., libellous post cards and letters the covers of which bear words of an offensive character, and letters and circulars relating to illegal lotteries or other fraudulent schemes. Enquiry should be made at the Post Office in regard to transmitting game, raw furs, skins, plumage, etc., by mail.

21. Domestic Money Orders

Post Offices in Canada at which any Money Orders may be issued or paid are distinguished by being printed in italics and preceded by a number having four figures, or letters "X" or "Y" followed by three figures.

Post Offices at which Money Orders are issued for payment in Canada only for amounts under \$16.00 are distinguished by "†".

The fee on Money Orders issued in Canada for payment in Canada, Antigua, Bahamas, Barbados, Bermuda, British Guiana, British Honduras, Caeos Islands, Cayman Islands, Dominica, Grenada, Jamaica, Montserrat, Nevis, St. Christopher (St. Kitts), St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Tobago, Trinidad, Turks Islands, and Virgin Islands are as follows:—

Owing to the unsettled state of Exchange the rates of exchange on money orders issued for payment in the United States (including Guam, Hawaii, Panama Canal Zone, Puerto Rico, Tutuila (Samoa), Virgin Islands of United States, Isle of Pines, Japan, Mexico and Poland can be obtained at any post office authorized to transact foreign money order business.

In the case of Mexico, Poland, and Japan exchange in terms of United States dollars is to be collected in addition to the foreign commission.

23. International Reply Coupons

International Reply Coupons may be purchased in Canada for 12c each and are exchangeable in any country of the Universal Postal Union for stamps representing the postage payable on the first unit of

weight of a letter transmitted in the International Mails. An International Reply Coupon is exchangeable at any Canadian post office for 5c in Canadian postage stamps.

24. British Commonwealth Reply Coupons

British Commonwealth Reply Coupons exchangeable for stamps representing the postage on a single rate letter from any country within the British Commonwealth to Canada, can be purchased at any post office, for 5c each for prepaying replies to letters.

Persons receiving British Commonwealth Reply Coupons may exchange them at any Canadian post office for 4c in Canadian Postage.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS

Savings business may be transacted at over 1500 Post Offices. Any person may deposit any sum from \$1.00 provided the total deposit standing in his name in the books of the Bank does not exceed \$10,000.00, exclusive of interest. Withdrawals on cash demand up to \$100.00 may be made at any Savings Bank Post Office and withdrawal in unlimited amount by application at Head Office may be allowed. Interest at the rate of 2% per annum is allowed on deposits.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR ELECTORS IN DOMINION AND PROVINCIAL ELECTIONS

ELECTIONS FOR THE DOMINION HOUSE OF COMMONS

According to The Canada Elections Act, and subject to certain exceptions, the general rule as to the qualifications of electors at a Dominion election is that every person in Canada, man or woman, is qualified to vote and entitled to be registered as an elector on the list of electors for the polling division in which such person ordinarily resides at the time of the issuing of the writ ordering a Dominion election in the electoral district if such person (a) is of the full age of 21 years, or will attain the full age of 21 years on or before polling day at the appropriate pending election; (b) is a Canadian citizen or other British subject; (c) has been ordinarily resident in Canada for the twelve months preceding polling day at the appropriate pending election, and (d) at a by-election only, has continued to be ordinarily resident in the electoral district until polling day. Among persons disqualified are Indians living on a reserve who have not executed a waiver of exemptions from taxation, prisoners, persons under restraint owing to mental disease, and Doukhobors in British Columbia. Indians residing on an Indian reserve who have served in World War I or World War II, and their wives, are entitled to vote without the requirements of executing a waiver of exemptions from taxation. Doukhobors, residing in British Columbia, who have served in World War I or World War II, and their wives and descendants, are entitled to vote.

Whenever an election is ordered an entire new list of electors is prepared, according to The Canada Elections Act, under the general direction of the Chief Electoral Officer, and supervision of a returning officer who is appointed for each electoral district. There are two classes of polling divisions which are called Urban and Rural. Generally speaking urban polling divisions are those comprised in cities and towns of over 5,000 population, the other polling divisions are rural. In urban polling divisions, a pair of enumerators representing different political interests, is appointed for each polling division. They make a house-to-house visitation immediately after the issue of the writ for the appropriate pending election, to secure the necessary information to complete a list of electors for their polling division. In rural polling divisions, the list is similarly prepared by one rural enumerator. Writs for a Dominion election are issued about two months before the date fixed for polling day, except at by-elections when such writs may be issued about 6 weeks before polling day.

PROVINCIAL ELECTIONS FOR LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

ALBERTA

All persons, male or female, are entitled to have their names placed on the list of voters, who are British subjects of the full age of 19 years and resident in Alberta for at least twelve months and in the electoral division for which the list is being made for at least two months immediately preceding the date of the writ of election.

BRITISH COLUMBIA

Every person, male or female, is entitled to vote who is not disqualified by the Provincial Election Act or any other provincial law, who is 21 years old and entitled within British Columbia to the privileges of a natural born Canadian citizen or British subject, has resided in the Dominion for twelve months, and in the Province for six months immediately preceding the date of his application for registration as a voter; and is a resident of the electoral district in which he seeks registration as a voter at the date of his making application under this Act to be registered as a voter.

Enquiries should be addressed to the Chief Electoral Officer, Victoria, B.C.

MANITOBA

Persons entitled to be placed on the list of voters include every person, male or female, who is a British subject by birth, naturalization, or if a woman by marriage, 21 years old and resident in Manitoba for at least 12 months and in the electoral district for which the list is being made for at least three months immediately preceding date of the writ of election.

Among those disqualified except as otherwise provided are judges, amended as to Indians by Chapter 18, Statutes of Manitoba, 1952, prisoners, mental patients and persons disqualified as a result of corrupt practices at provincial elections.

NEW BRUNSWICK

Among those qualified to vote at a provincial election are persons, whether male or female, married or unmarried, 21 years old on or before polling day, if British subjects and not otherwise legally disqualified, resident in the province for twelve months immediately preceding the date of the issue of the election writ and ordinarily resident in the electoral district at the date of the issue of the writ for the pending election or by-election. Among those dis-

qualified are Judges, County Magistrates, prisoners and mental patients.

NEWFOUNDLAND

Section 4 of the Newfoundland Election Act (1913) provides:

Every male British subject of the full age of twenty-one years and every female British subject of the full age of twenty-five years of sound understanding and resident in this Colony for two years preceding the day of Election shall be competent to vote for the Election of Members of the House of Assembly in and for the Electoral District or Division of a district, as the case may be, within which he or she is an actual and bona fide resident at the time of the preparation of the list of Electors or supplementary list of Electors as the case may be: Provided that any person temporarily employed or staying in any District or division of a District, as the case may be, and intending at the termination of his or her employment or stay to return to his or her home in another part of the Colony, shall not be deemed to be an actual or bona fide resident within the meaning of this Section: And provided that no person who is or within one year preceding the date of the said election has been an inmate of the Poor Asylum shall be qualified to vote.

(Note: Under the terms of Union of Newfoundland with Canada, 1948, notwithstanding the provisions of Section 4 above, the franchise was extended to female British subjects who have attained the full age of twenty-one years and are otherwise qualified as electors.)

NOVA SCOTIA

Every person, whether married or unmarried, may vote if a British subject of the full age of twenty-one years who has resided in Nova Scotia for at least twelve months immediately preceding the date of the writ of Election. Definition of residence is similar to that for Federal elections.

Among those disqualified to vote are persons guilty of offences under the Electoral Act, persons who are in receipt of charitable support in any municipal poorhouse or aid as a pauper under the Poor Laws.

ONTARIO

Qualifications for voters are, generally speaking, every man and woman who at the time of voting is 21 years old, a British subject not otherwise disqualified by the Election Act or otherwise, is and has been for twelve months preceding the day of polling a resident of Ontario and who resided in the electoral district at the date of the issue of the writ of election. Among those disqualified are Indians living on an Indian Reserve unless having served in the military forces.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Every person male or female may vote for Assemblyman if of the full age of 21 years on the day of the election and not otherwise disqualified; and who is a British subject and resident in P.E.I. for at least twelve months and in the electoral district for at least two months immediately preceding the issue of writ of election; or who is the holder of a freehold estate or in the bona fide use and occupation of any dwelling-house, warehouse, shop, etc., or any farm or piece of land of the value of at least \$100.00 providing that he or she has owned or possessed or has been in the use or occupation of a property for six months next before the date of the election. To vote for Councillor, a property qualification of \$325 is essential. A person who is qualified for councillor also is entitled to vote for Assemblyman.

An amendment, assented to 30th March, 1946, provided that, subject to residence qualifications, every person, male or female, who, being a British subject, whether or not a minor or an Indian, served outside Canada during the Second Great War in any of the Armed Forces or Auxiliary War Services of His

Majesty or of his Allies, or in the Merchant Marine, or in the Red Cross Corps, or in the Corps of Canadian Fire Fighters, shall be entitled to vote in the electoral district in which he resides on the date of the election at an election to be held for the election of a Councillor to sit in the Legislative Assembly.

QUEBEC

Section 47 of the Quebec Election Act (1945) provides: Every person is qualified as an elector and may be entered on an electoral list who fulfils the following five conditions:

1. Has been domiciled in the Province for at least two years before the date fixed for the enumeration;
2. Is domiciled in a polling-subdivision on the first day fixed for the enumeration;
3. Is of the full age of twenty-one years on or before the polling-day;
4. Is of Canadian citizenship;
5. Is not affected by any disqualification from voting contemplated by this act.

Section 2, par. g, provides: g. A person on active service in the armed forces of Canada retains the domicile which he had at the time of his entry into the service, unless he has subsequently established another domicile outside of the Province.

Among those disqualified are Indians domiciled on a reserve, judges, returning-officers and urban revisors appointed under the Quebec Election Act, interdicted persons, insane persons hospitalized in asylums or nursing homes, persons who have taken an oath of allegiance to any foreign power, or have become naturalized elsewhere, and persons who have been disqualified from voting by the Legislative Assembly, or against whom a judgment or sentence entailing disqualification from voting has been rendered by a court of competent jurisdiction, so long as such disqualification lasts, or found guilty of any infraction or crime punishable by two years' imprisonment or more and have not fully served the sentence pronounced against them.

SASKATCHEWAN

Every British subject male or female may vote for the Legislative Assembly who is of the full age of 18 years and has resided in Saskatchewan for at least six months immediately prior to the date of the issue of the writ, and in the electoral division where desiring to vote on the day of the issue of the writ. Any person may be registered as a voter who attains the full age of 18 years on or before polling day. Among those disqualified are Judges, Indians who were not in military service in either of the world wars, prisoners and patients in mental hospitals.

NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

A person is entitled to vote at an election of members to the Council of the Northwest Territories if he is a Canadian citizen, has attained the age of twenty-one years, and has been ordinarily resident in the Territories for a period of at least twelve months immediately prior to the date of the election.

Among persons disqualified are persons undergoing punishment as inmates in any penal institution and persons under restraint owing to mental diseases.

YUKON TERRITORY

Every person shall be qualified to vote who, not being an Indian, is a British subject of the full age of twenty-one years and has resided in the Yukon Territory for at least twelve months immediately prior to the date of the election and has resided in the electoral district in which he seeks to vote for at least one month immediately prior to the date of the election.

LIQUOR CONTROL IN CANADA

We give below a brief summary of the methods of controlling the sale of intoxicating liquors in the various Provinces.

The names and personnel of the various Liquor Control Boards are given under each Province. See index "Liquor Board, Commission, or Control."

ALBERTA

Spirits, wines and beers are sold in Government stores to permit holders.

Beer in unopened bottles may be sold by licensed hotels to persons over twenty-one years of age, and who are not disqualified under the Act.

Beer by the glass or open bottle may be sold by Licensed Hotels and Clubs for consumption on the premises.

Since the 1st July, 1950, Clubs which qualify with respect to service, may be issued a Liquor License, authorizing the service of all liquors for consumption on the premises.

General liquor permits are sold both to citizens and visitors at a cost of 50c., permits being good until the 31st of December in the year of issue.

Licensees may only purchase beer from Government Warehouses and Liquor Stores.

BRITISH COLUMBIA

The sale of liquor in sealed packages is made in Government Liquor Stores. The system of individual permits was discontinued in 1947.

Beer Licences are issued to permit the sale of beer by the glass in licensed premises and by the unopened bottle for consumption elsewhere. The sale of beer by the glass to bona fide members of Veterans' Clubs in respect of which Veterans' Club Licences have been issued, is permitted. Club Licences are issued to clubs which have been in operation continuously for three (3) years authorizing the club to purchase liquor and to sell by the glass the liquor so purchased to its members and guests for consumption on the club premises.

MANITOBA

Alcoholic beverages are sold in Government Liquor Control Commission Stores. Persons resident in the province, travellers and transients over the age of twenty-one years and not otherwise prohibited, may obtain a general permit, (yearly) fee \$1.00 or a Limited Period general permit effective for a period of time not exceeding thirty days fee .50c, to purchase alcoholic beverages for consumption, only in their residence either permanent or temporary. Permits expire March 31st following date of issue except in the case of Limited Period permits which expire on date set forth in the permit.

Spirits—Fifty-five ounces (2-26 ounce bottles) in any one day.

Wine—One gallon per day.

Beer—One case (24 pints) per day.

Beer parlour licenses are only issued in respect of hotels that are registered with the Government Liquor Control Commission.

Beer is also sold from the brewery cash and carry warehouses located on brewery premises, under the supervision of the Government Liquor Control Commission and from beer vendor depots located in hotels licensed by the Commission.

NEW BRUNSWICK

Intoxicating liquor is sold only in sealed packages and only at the Government stores. It is not rationed and permits are not required.

NEWFOUNDLAND

The importation, manufacture, and sale of alcoholic liquors are regulated by the Board of Liquor Control.

The holder of a licence to manufacture alcoholic liquor shall not be granted a hotel, restaurant or tavern licence.

All alcoholic liquor sold in the hotel lounge shall be dispensed at the bar in such a manner that it may be viewed by persons using the lounge.

All liquor sold upon licensed premises shall be consumed thereon.

All liquor served in licensed premises shall be dispensed from the original container in which the liquor is purchased from or under the authority of the Board.

Every person employed in serving liquor shall be in possession of a waiter's licence which may be granted by the Board.

A non-resident permit, valid for one month, may be issued only to a person not ordinarily resident in Newfoundland. The Board shall not sell spirits to any person except upon presentation of a permit and the signing of a sale slip by the person requesting the spirits.

NOVA SCOTIA

Liquor can only be sold in sealed packages through the Government stores. A permit is required for spirits, wine and beer.

By local option vote, beer and wine by the glass or open bottle may be served with meals during meal time by hotels which have been licensed to do so, in those areas which voted for the privilege. In the same manner, beer by the glass or open bottle may be sold for consumption on the premises in taverns, the operators of which have been licensed to do so. In the case of a hotel, the tavern premises must be so constructed as to be entirely separate from the hotel proper.

ONTARIO

In Ontario spirituous liquor is sold by the bottle in Government stores operated by The Liquor Control Board. Those desiring to purchase such liquor must secure a liquor permit which authorizes the purchase and consumption in the residence of the holder of the permit. Wine may be purchased from Liquor Control Board Stores, Ontario Wine Stores, and Wineries for consumption in the residence of the purchaser. Beer is procurable from Liquor Control Board Stores, Breweries and Brewers' Retail Stores for consumption in the residence of the purchaser.

Under the liquor licence laws of Ontario, liquor may be sold by the glass under a "Lounge Licence" and with meals under a "Dining Lounge Licence" in municipalities having a population of over 50,000. This privilege may be extended to smaller municipalities, provided that the municipal electors have signified their approval thereof by a vote. Beer may be served by the glass in licensed "Public Houses" and beer and wine may be served with meals in licensed "Dining Rooms" and "Restaurants". Clubs, railway trains and steamships may be issued licences for the sale of spirits, wine and beer. In clubs, the sale is restricted to members and their guests.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Intoxicating liquors in sealed packages may be obtained on Individual or Temporary Permits from retail vendors under the Prince Edward Island Temperance Act.

Chairman of the Temperance Commission is B. J. Haywood, Charlottetown, P.E.I.

QUEBEC

Spirits and wines are sold and delivered by the Quebec Liquor Commission stores only.

Spirits and wines so obtained may be sold to the public, by hotels, cafés and clubs under licenses, provided these are consumed on the premises.

Beer is obtained directly from the breweries and may be sold to the public by inns, taverns and restaurants under licenses, provided it is also consumed on the premises.

A grocery store duly licensed may sell beer at such store on condition: that not less than one bottle be sold; that beer be not consumed in that store or dependency thereof.

Municipalities may declare by by-law that no alcoholic liquor of any description may be sold within their territory.

SASKATCHEWAN

The sale of spirituous liquor and wine is restricted to the Liquor Board's stores. The following quantities

may be purchased in any one day:

- Beer..... 2 gallons
- Wine..... 1 gallon

Any other Liquor..... 40 ounces

The quantity of beer, wine and any other liquor that may be sold at any one time or in any one day to a purchaser may be increased to an amount not exceeding twice the quantity that would otherwise be sold in any one day under the provisions of subsection (1) of section 29 of The Liquor Act, provided that in case of a sale of such increased quantity no further purchase shall be made by the same person on the next following day when stores are open for the sale of liquor.

No permit required.

Sales of beer are made through Liquor Board Stores and in licensed premises. Licensees holding a license to sell beer by the glass may also be granted a license to sell beer in closed packages to be consumed off the premises.

NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

The Northwest Territories Act, Chapter 142, R.S., 1927, prohibits the manufacture of any intoxicating liquor or intoxicant in the territories except by special permission of the Governor in Council.

The Governor in Council, as authorized by Section 10 of the Northwest Territories Act has designated the control, regulation and sale of intoxicants in the

Northwest Territories as a subject in respect of which the Commissioner in Council, subject to the provisions of the Northwest Territories Act and of any other Act of the Parliament of Canada applying to the Territories may make such Ordinance or Ordinances as conditions or circumstances may to the Commissioner in Council appear to warrant.

By virtue of this authority the Territorial Liquor Ordinance has been passed and Territorial Liquor Stores have been established at Yellowknife and Fort Smith, N.W.T. Licensed premises for the sale of beer include a hotel beer parlour and the Canadian Legion premises at Yellowknife, and a hotel beer parlour at Hay River. Beer and other liquor may be sold in a cocktail lounge at Yellowknife and in a few service messes and canteens in the Territories.

Authority to manufacture intoxicants has only been granted in isolated instances, the product manufactured being wine for sacramental purposes.

YUKON TERRITORY

The Yukon Act, Chapter 215, R.S., 1927, authorizes the Commissioner in Council of the Yukon Territory to make Ordinances for the control and regulation of the sale of and traffic in intoxicating liquor in the Territory.

By virtue of this authority Territorial Government Liquor Stores have been opened at Dawson, Mayo and Whitehorse and beer parlours and cocktail lounges at various places in the Territory.

THE INCOME TAX ACT

The Income Tax Act, Chapter 52, Statutes of 1948 (effective for 1949 and subsequent taxation years) replaced the earlier Income War Tax Act. The Income Tax Act and amendments to the year 1953 were consolidated by Chapter 148 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1953.

CORPORATIONS

18% on the first \$20,000 of taxable income.
47% on excess over \$20,000.

Plus Old Age Security Tax of 2% of taxable income. Where the 1953 Taxation Year commences during the 1952 calendar year, the rates in effect for the 1952 Taxation Year are applied on income allocated to that portion of the year that occurs within the 1952 calendar year.

Other Deductions

Other Deductions are allowed under certain circumstances for:

Contributions under an approved superannuation or pension fund plan, charitable donations, union dues, medical expenses in excess of 3% of net income.

Investment Income Surtax

4% of the amount by which investment income exceeds the greater of:

- (a) \$2,400, or
- (b) the aggregate of the taxpayer's personal exemptions.

Tax Credit on Dividends

20% of Net dividends from taxable Canadian corporations—Not to exceed the increase in Income Tax (excluding Old Age Security tax) due to including such dividends in income.

PAYMENT

Corporations—

Pay by monthly instalments starting six months before the end of the fiscal year. Tax return must be filed six months after the end of the fiscal year.

Individuals—

Pay by deduction from salaries and wages or by quarterly payments on account, if not earning salary or wages. Tax return must be filed by April 30 of the year following.

Limitations of space prevent complete reproduction of the Income Tax Act. Copies of the Act may be obtained from the Queen's Printer, Department of Public Printing and Stationery, Ottawa.

TRADE MARKS

THE UNFAIR COMPETITION ACT, 1932

22-23 GEORGE V, CHAP. 38

A brief summary follows. A copy of the Act may be procured from The Registrar, Trade Marks Office, Ottawa Ont. It is suggested a competent attorney be consulted. The names of a number of such appear in these pages.

This Act came into force Sept. 1st, 1932, and repeals An Act respecting Trade Marks and Industrial Designs (see Chapter 201) in part as follows: Sections 3, 4 to 21 inclusive, 23 and 53 are repealed; and sections 42 to 52 are amended by striking therefrom the words "trade mark" and "trade marks" and any other words exclusively relating to said words.

TRADE MARK

TRADE MARK means a symbol which has become adapted to distinguish particular wares falling within a general category from other wares falling within the same category, and is used by any person in association with wares entering into trade or commerce for the purpose of indicating to dealers in, and/or users of such wares that they have been manufactured, sold, leased or hired by him, or that they are of a defined standard or have been produced under defined working conditions, by a defined class of persons, or in a defined territorial area, and includes any distinguishing guise capable of constituting a trade mark.

WORD MARK

WORD MARK means a trade mark consisting only of a series of letters and/or numerals and depending for its distinctiveness upon the idea or sound suggested by the sequence of the letters and/or numerals and their separation into groups, independently of the form of the letters or numerals severally or as a series.

DESIGN MARK

DESIGN MARK means a trade mark consisting of an arbitrary and in itself meaningless mark or design, or of a representation of some object or objects, or of letters or numerals in series or otherwise, or of a combination of two or more of the foregoing elements, and depending for its distinctiveness upon its form and colour, or upon the form, arrangement or colour of its several parts, independently of any idea or sound capable of being suggested by the particular sequence of the letters and/or numerals, if any, forming part, thereof, or by their separation into groups, and includes any distinguishing guise capable of constituting a trade mark.

DISTINGUISHING GUISE

DISTINGUISHING GUISE means a mode of shaping, moulding, wrapping or packing wares entering into trade or commerce which, by reason only of the sensory impression thereby given and independently of any element of utility or convenience it may have, is adapted to distinguish the wares so treated from other similar wares and is used by some person in association with his wares in such a way as to indicate to dealers in and/or users of similar wares that the wares so treated have been manufactured or sold by him.

OWNER

OWNER in relation to a trade mark, means either the person who has an exclusive right to use the mark in association with his wares in such a way as to indicate to dealers in and/or users of such wares that they have been manufactured, sold, leased or hired by him, or, in the case of a trade mark adopted for use in such a way as to indicate only that the wares in association with which it is used are of a defined standard or that they have been produced under defined working conditions, by a defined class of persons or in a defined territorial area, means the person, trade union, commercial association or administrative authority by which the said standard, working conditions, class of persons or area has been defined.

UNFAIR COMPETITION

No person shall knowingly adopt for use in Canada in connection with any wares any trade mark or any distinguishing guise which

3. (a) is already in use in Canada by any other person and which is registered pursuant to the provisions of this Act as a trade mark or distinguishing guise for the same or similar wares;
- (b) is already in use by any other person in any country of the Union other than Canada (i.e. any country which has acceded to the Union for the Protection of Industrial Property under the Convention as revised at the Hague on

Nov. 6, 1925) as a trade mark or distinguishing guise for the same or similar wares, and is known in Canada in association with such wares by reason either of the distribution of the wares in Canada or of their advertisement therein in any printed publication circulated in the ordinary course among potential dealers in and/or users of such wares in Canada; or,

- (c) is similar to any trade mark or distinguishing guise in use, or in use and known as aforesaid.
4. (1) The person who, in association with wares, first uses or makes known in Canada, as provided in the last preceding section, a trade mark or a distinguishing guise capable of constituting a trade mark, shall be entitled to the exclusive use in Canada of such trade mark or distinguishing guise in association with such wares, provided that such trade mark is recorded in the register existing under the *Trade Mark and Design Act* at the date of the coming into force of this Act, or provided that in compliance with the provisions of this Act he makes application for the registration of such trade mark within six months of the date on which this Act comes into force, or of the date of his first use thereof in Canada, or of the date upon which the trade mark or distinguishing guise was first made known in Canada, as provided in the last preceding section, and thereafter obtains and maintains registration thereof under the provisions of this Act.

TIME FOR APPLICATION

- (3) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection one of this section, the person who first uses or makes known in Canada, in association with wares a trade mark or a distinguishing guise capable of constituting a trade mark may apply for and secure registration thereof after the expiration of any of the periods of six months specified by subsection one, provided the same or a similar trade mark or distinguishing guise has not been registered by another for use in association with the same or similar wares, but such application shall not be allowed or the registration of such trade mark made before the expiration of a period of six months from the date of such application.

REGISTER OF TRADE MARKS

22. (1) There shall be kept under the supervision of the Registrar a register of trade marks in which, subject as hereinafter provided, any person may cause to be recorded any trade mark he has adopted, and notifications of any assignments, transmissions, disclaimers and judgments relating to such trade mark.

(2) The register shall specify the date upon which each of the trade marks recorded therein was registered, and shall contain an abstract of the statements contained in the applications for the registration of such marks respectively, and of any documents deposited with such applications, or filed with the Registrar subsequent to the making of the applications and affecting the right to such trade marks respectively.

23. (1) The register now existing under the *Trade Mark and Design Act* shall form part of the register maintained pursuant to this Act, and, subject as hereinafter provided, all entries therein shall hereafter be governed by the provisions of this Act, but shall not, if properly made under the law in force at the time they were made, be subject to be expunged or amended only because they might not properly have been made hereunder.

(2) The Registrar may at any time, and shall at the request of any applicant for the registration of a trade mark under this Act, by notice in writing require the owner of any trade mark or union label on the register at the date of the coming into force of this Act to furnish to him within four months from the date of the notice the information which would have been required on an application for the registration of such trade mark under this Act.

(3) If such information is not furnished pursuant to such notice, the Registrar shall by a further notice, fix a reasonable time within which, if the information is not furnished, the record of the registration shall be liable to be expunged, and it may be expunged accordingly by the Registrar if no objection is made by the owner of the mark, or by judgment, declaration or order of the Exchequer Court of Canada if he enters an objection.

(4) Any such notice as aforesaid shall be deemed to have been sufficiently given if sent to the person appearing from the record to be the owner of such mark addressed to him at his address as stated in the application for the registration of the mark or for the last renewal thereof, and if any other later or more accurate address is known to the Registrar, at such later or more accurate address, and also addressed to him in care of the person to whom the certificate of registration or of the last renewal thereof was sent at the time of its issue.

(5) Marks registered before the coming into force of this Act shall be treated as word marks or as design marks according to the following rules:—

- (a) Any mark consisting of words and/or numerals only without any indication of a special form or appearance shall be deemed to be a word mark;
- (b) Any other mark consisting of words and/or numerals only shall be deemed to be a word mark if at the date of its registration the words and/or numerals would have been registrable independently of any defined special form or appearance and shall also be deemed to be a design mark for reading matter presenting the special form or appearance defined;
- (c) Any mark including words and/or numerals in combination with other features shall be deemed to be a design mark having the features described in the application therefor but without any meaning being attributed to the words or numerals, which shall, however, also be deemed to constitute a word mark if and so far as they would at the date of registration have been registrable independently of any defined form or appearance and without being combined with any other feature;
- (d) Any other mark shall be deemed to be a design mark having the features described in the application therefor.

REGISTRABLE TRADE MARKS

26. (1) Subject as otherwise provided in this Act, a word mark shall be registrable if it

- (a) does not contain more than thirty letters and/or numerals divided into not more than four groups;
- (b) is not the name of a person, firm or corporation;
- (c) is not, to an English or French speaking person, clearly descriptive or misdescriptive of the character or quality of the wares in connection with which it is proposed to be used, or of the conditions of, or the persons employed in, their production, or of their place of origin;
- (d) would not if sounded be so descriptive or misdescriptive to an English or French speaking person;
- (e) is not the name in any language of any of the wares in connection with which it is to be used;
- (f) is not similar to, or to a possible translation into English or French of, some other word mark already registered for use in connection with similar wares; and
- (g) is not such as to suggest the name in French or English of some feature of a design mark already registered for use in connection with similar wares which is so characteristic of the design mark that its name would not be unlikely to be used to define or describe the wares in connection with which the design mark is used.

(2) An application for the registration of a word mark otherwise registrable shall not be refused on the ground that the mark consists of or includes a series of letters or numerals which also constitute or form part of the name of the firm or corporation by which the application for registration is made.

27. Subject as hereinafter provided, any design mark may be registered if it

- (a) is not identical with or similar to any design mark already registered for use in connection with similar wares;
- (b) is not such as to be likely to mislead dealers in and/or users of the wares in connection with which it is proposed to be used as to the character or quality of such wares or as to the conditions of or the persons employed in their production or as to their place of origin;
- (c) is not such that, by reason of one of its principal characteristics being a representation of something which obviously suggests a word mark already registered for use in connection with similar wares, it is likely that such word mark, or some word resembling the same, would be used to define or describe the wares in connection with which the design mark is used.

APPLICATION FOR REGISTRATION

30. (1) Any person who desires to register a trade mark under this Act otherwise than pursuant to a judgment, order or declaration of the Exchequer Court of Canada shall make an application in writing to the Registrar in duplicate containing

- (a) a statement of the date from which the applicant or named predecessors in title has or have used the mark for the purposes defined in the application and of the countries in which the mark has been principally used since the said date;
- (b) a statement that the applicant considers that, having regard to the provisions of this Act, he was and is entitled to adopt and use the mark in Canada in connection with the wares described; and
- (c) the address of the applicant's principal office or place of business in Canada, if any, and if the applicant has no office or place of business in Canada, the address of his principal office or place of business abroad and the name and address in Canada of some person, firm or corporation to whom any notice in respect of the registration may be sent, and upon whom service of any proceedings in respect of the registration may be made with the same effect as if they had been served upon the applicant himself.

(2) If the mark is intended to indicate that the wares in association with which it is used have been manufactured, sold, leased or hired by the owner thereof the application shall so indicate and shall contain

- (a) a concise description, expressed in such terms as are ordinarily and commercially used by the applicant, of the wares with which the applicant is commercially concerned;
- (b) a concise description in like terms of the specific wares in association with which the applicant has used the mark.

(3) If the mark is intended to indicate that the wares in association with which it is used are of a defined standard, or have been produced under defined working conditions, by a defined class of persons or in a defined area, the application shall so indicate and shall contain:

- (a) a statement that the applicant is not engaged in the manufacture, sale, leasing or hiring of wares similar to any wares in association with which the mark is used;
- (b) an exact definition of what the use of the mark in association with wares is intended to indicate in respect of the standard which such wares have attained, or of the working conditions under which or the class of persons by whom they have been produced or of the area in which they have originated.

31. (1) Every application for the registration of a trade mark shall state whether the applicant requests the registration of the mark as a word mark or as a design mark.

(2) If he requests the registration of the mark as a word mark, the letters and/or numerals constituting the mark shall be set out in the application in their proper grouping.

(3) If he requests the registration of the mark as a design mark, the application shall contain such a concise description of what the applicant considers to be its principal features as to enable the Registrar

properly to index the mark; any words or figures shall be referred to, if at all, only as reading matter, and shall be described as being in a specified relation to the other features of the design and/or of a described general appearance, as the case may require, and the applicant shall furnish five accurate and complete representations of the design prepared on or attached to paper of the prescribed size.

AMENDMENT OF RECORD OF REGISTRATION

42. If the person who at any time appears from the record of the registration of a trade mark to be the owner of such mark represents to the Registrar that any amendment is required to any statement theretofore recorded relating to the wares in which the owner of the mark is commercially concerned, or to the use of the mark, the address of the owner, or the person upon whom service may be made of proceedings in respect of the registration, the record shall, subject as hereinafter provided, be amended or added to accordingly.

CHANGES OF OWNERSHIP ASSIGNMENTS AND LICENSES

44. (1) Whenever it is made to appear to his satisfaction that any person who appears on the register to be an owner of a registered trade mark has ceased to be so and that some other person has become by assignment or transmission the owner of such mark, the Registrar shall note the change of ownership accordingly on the record of the registration.

(2) A registered trade mark shall not be assigned or transmitted except in connection and concurrently with an assignment or transmission of the good will of the business carried on in Canada in association with the wares for which such mark has been registered, and in any case such trade mark shall be terminate with such goodwill; provided however that any registered owner of a trade mark whose headquarters are situate in Canada and who is entitled to its exclusive use in connection with a business carried on in Canada may assign the right to use such trade mark in any other country, in association with any wares for which such trade mark is registered, in connection and concurrently with his assignment of the goodwill of the business carried on in such other country in such wares, provided that the grant of such right is forthwith recorded by the grantor of such right in the register maintained pursuant to this Act.

NOTICES OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT OR CANCELLATION AFTER NOTICE

49. (1) The Registrar may at any time, and shall at the request of any person who pays the prescribed fee, notify the person appearing from the register to be the owner of any trade mark that he considers, or that it has been represented to him that such trade mark has ceased to be used as a trade mark in Canada, or for any other specific reason to be set out in the notice, the registration of such mark should be cancelled or that an entry relating thereto should be struck out, corrected or amplified, and request him to advise whether he has any, and if any, what objection to the amendment of the register accordingly.

(2) If the person to whom such notice has been addressed agrees to the proposed amendment of the register in whole or in part, such amendment shall forthwith be made by the Registrar in accordance with such agreement.

(3) If, within three months from the despatch of such a notice as aforesaid, no reply to it has been received from the person to whom it was addressed, the Registrar shall send such person a second notice enclosing a copy of the first and stating that if, within a reasonable time to be fixed by the notice, no objection to the proposed amendment of the register is received, such amendment will be made, and, unless an objection is received within the time limited, the Registrar shall amend the register accordingly.

(4) Except as in the next following section provided, the Registrar shall not cause any amendment to be made in the register to which the person appearing therefrom to be the owner of the mark makes any objection.

RENEWAL OF REGISTRATION OF TRADE MARK

50. (1) If a mark has been on the register without renewal for the period hereinafter specified less four

months, the Registrar shall take the action prescribed under the last preceding section on the ground that the person appearing from the register to be the owner thereof has ceased to use the same.

(2) In any such case the registration of the mark shall be cancelled notwithstanding objection on the part of the owner thereof, unless the prescribed fee for the renewal of the registration is paid within the time within which an objection to the cancellation of the registration might be made.

(3) The period specified in subsection one of this section shall be as follows:—

- (a) In the case of any specific trade mark on the register maintained under the *Trade Mark and Design Act* at the date of the coming into force of this Act, twenty-five years from the date of the original registration or of the last renewal thereof;
- (b) In the case of any general trade mark or union label on the register maintained under the *Trade Mark and Design Act* at the date of the coming into force of this Act, twenty-five years from the said date; and
- (c) In the case of any trade mark registered under this Act, fifteen years from the date of the registration or of the last renewal thereof.

On any application to the Registrar to transmit to the Exchequer Court of Canada, the papers on file in his office relating to any entry in the register.	5.00

SHOP CARDS REGISTRATION ACT, 1938

2 George VI. Chap. 41

This Act is designed to afford a measure of protection to organizations such as Trade Unions which formerly were able to register their particular designations as Union Labels under the Trademark and Design Act.

SUMMARY OF PRINCIPAL PROVISIONS

Section 3. The Minister shall cause to be kept, under the supervision of the Registrar, a Register of Shop Cards in which, subject as hereinafter provided, any labour union may cause to be registered any Shop Card it has adopted.

Section 4. A labour union may apply for the registration of a Shop Card by filing with the Registrar an application therefor accompanied by a declaration made by the President, Secretary or other executive officer of such union thereunto authorized, specifying the name of the union on behalf of which such application is being made, the description of the Shop Card and the purpose of its use, and from the date of registration such union shall have the exclusive right of use of such Shop Card; and the said union shall, for the purposes of this Act, be considered the proprietor of such Shop Card.

Section 5 specifies grounds for refusing registration, etc.

Section 6. No Shop Card registered by any labour union may be assigned by any process of law or otherwise.

Section 7. A labour union may authorize the use of any Shop Card registered by it and such authorization shall be subject to cancellation only upon twelve months' notice, unless otherwise specified in any agreement for the use of such Shop Card, and the union shall grant the use of the Shop Card to any applicant who complies with the rules of the union.

Section 8. A Shop Card, when registered, shall endure for the term of fifteen years, but may be renewed before the expiration of the said term by the proprietor thereof, or by his legal representative, for another term of fifteen years, and so on from time to time; but every such renewal shall be registered before the expiration of the current term of fifteen years.

Section 10 (4) The proprietor of a registered Shop Card may apply to the Exchequer Court of Canada for leave to add to or alter any such Shop Card in any particular not being an essential particular, and the Court may refuse or grant leave on such terms as it may think fit.

INDUSTRIAL DESIGNS

Summarized from Trade Marks and Industrial Designs Act.

REGISTRATION

Address Applications to Commissioner of Patents, Ottawa

The proprietor applying for the registration of any design shall deposit with the Minister a drawing and description in duplicate of the same, together with a declaration that the same was not in use to his knowledge by any other person than himself at the time of his adoption thereof. Drawings not to exceed 13 x 8 inches wide.

A design may be registered if it is not identical with or does not so closely resemble any other design already registered as to be confounded therewith.

Certificate of Registration when issued shall be sufficient evidence of the design, of the originality of the design, of the name of the proprietor, of the person named as proprietor being proprietor, of the commencement and term of registry, and of compliance with the provisions of this Act.

If the author of any design shall, for a good and valuable consideration, have executed the same for some other person, such other person shall alone be entitled to register it.

EXCLUSIVE RIGHT

The registration gives exclusive right for the design.

DURATION

Exclusive right shall be valid for a term of 5 years, but may be renewed, before, or within 3 months after the expiration of the said term of 5 years, for a further period of 5 years or less on payment of the fee prescribed for extension of time: Provided that the whole duration of the exclusive right shall not exceed 10 years in all.

ASSIGNMENTS

Designs are assignable in law and a proprietor may grant and convey an exclusive right to make, use and vend and to grant to others the right to make, use and vend such design within and throughout Canada or any part thereof for the unexpired term of its duration or any part thereof. Such exclusive grant and conveyance shall be called a license, and shall be recorded in like manner and time as assignments.

PROTECTION

In order that any design may be protected, it shall be registered within one year from the publication thereof in Canada, and after registration, the name of the proprietor shall appear upon the article to which his design applies by being marked, if the manufacture is a woven fabric, on one end thereof, together with the letters Rd., and if the manufacture is of any other substance, with the letters Rd., and the year of registration at the edge or upon any convenient part thereof.

The mark may be put upon the manufacture by

making it on the material itself, or by attaching thereto a label with the proper marks thereon.

RIGHT OF ACTION

A proprietor of a registered design may maintain action for unwarranted use of the design and penalties are provided for improper application of design, etc.

FOREIGN APPLICATIONS

An application for the registration of an industrial design filed in this country by any person who has previously, regularly filed an application for the registration of the same industrial design in a foreign country which by treaty, convention or law affords similar privilege to citizens of Canada, shall have the same force and effect as the same application would have if filed in this country on the date on which the application for the registration of the same industrial design was first filed in such foreign country; provided the application in this country is filed within six months from the earliest date on which any such foreign application was filed.

ALTERATION

The registered proprietor of any registered industrial design may apply to the Exchequer Court of Canada for leave to add to or alter any such industrial design in any particular not being an essential particular, and the Court may refuse or grant leave on such terms as it may think fit.

FEEES

Fees payable in advance are as follows:

If an application is denied, fees will be returned less \$2.00.

TIMBER MARKING ACT

Address communications to the Commissioner of Patents, Ottawa.

Every person engaged in the business of lumbering or the getting out of timber, and of the floating or rafting of the same on the inland waters of Canada, within the provinces of Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick, shall, within one month after he engages therein, select a mark or marks, and cause such mark or marks to be registered in the manner herein provided.

The person who registers such timber mark shall thereafter have the exclusive right to use the same, to designate the timber got out by him and floated or rafted as aforesaid; and he shall put the same in a conspicuous place on each log or piece of timber so floated or rafted.

Marks may be cancelled and shall be assignable in law.

No person, other than the person who has registered the same, shall mark any timber of any description with any mark registered under the provisions of this Act, or with any part of such mark.

Penalties are provided for failing to select, register and use proper marks and for marking timber with a mark registered by another.

PATENTS IN CANADA

The Patent Act, 1935, Chap. 32, 25-26 Geo. V, 1935, as amended by Chap. 23 II Geo. VI, 1947 (assented to 14th May, 1947).

A synopsis of the principal provisions of The Patent Act are given below:—

For a copy of the Act apply to the Commissioner of Patents, Ottawa, who receives all applications and has charge of all records.

As it is difficult for an applicant to properly comply with the regulations of the Patent Office unless he is conversant with the process of obtaining a patent, any person contemplating obtaining a patent is advised to consult one of the patent solicitors whose cards appear in this volume.

DEFINITION OF INVENTION

The Act defines "invention" as any new and useful art, process, machine, manufacture or composition of matter, or any new and useful improvement in the same.

WHO MAY OBTAIN PATENTS

Subject to the various provisions of the Act, any inventor or legal representative of an inventor, of an invention which was:

(a) not known or used by others before he invented it, and

(b) not described in any patent or in any publication printed in Canada or in any other country more than two years before presentation of the petition, and

(c) not in public use or on sale in Canada for more than two years prior to his application in Canada

may obtain a patent granting him an exclusive property in such invention.

Any inventor or legal representative of an inventor who applies in Canada for a patent for an invention for which application for patent has been made in any other country by such inventor or his legal representative before the filing of the application in Canada, shall not be entitled to obtain in Canada a patent for that invention unless his application in Canada is filed:

(a) before issue of any patent to such inventor or his legal representative for the same invention in any other country; or

(b) if a patent has issued in any other country within twelve months after the filing of the first application by such inventor or his legal representative for patent for such invention in any other country.

No patent shall issue for an invention which has an illicit object in view, or for any mere scientific principle or abstract theorem.

APPLICATIONS FOR PATENTS

An applicant for a patent shall state in his application, if resident in Canada, his address in Canada. If not so resident, the name and address of some person resident in Canada who has been nominated to represent the applicant or patentee for all purposes of the Act including the service of all proceedings taken under any provision of the Act. This representative may be changed if necessary.

Each application for a patent shall be completed and prepared for examination within twelve months after the filing of the application, and in default thereof, or upon failure of the applicant to prosecute the same within six months after any examiner's action thereon of which notice shall have been given to the applicant, such application shall be deemed to have been abandoned, but it may be reinstated within twelve months after the date on which it was deemed to have been abandoned, if the failure to prosecute the application within the time specified was not reasonably avoidable. An application so reinstated shall retain its original filing date.

TREATY OR CONVENTION RIGHTS

Section 27 (1). provides that an application for a patent filed in Canada by any person entitled to protection under the terms of any treaty or convention relating to patents to which Canada is a party who has, or whose agent or other legal representative has, previously regularly filed an application for a patent for the same invention in any other country which by treaty, convention or law affords

similar privilege to citizens of Canada, shall have the same force and effect as the same application would have if filed in Canada on the date on which the application for patent for the same invention was first filed in such other country, provided the application in this country is filed within twelve months from the earliest date on which any such application was filed in such other country or from the thirteenth day of June, 1923.

No patent shall be granted on an application for a patent for an invention which had been patented or described in a patent or publication printed in Canada or any other country more than two years before the date of the actual filing of the application in Canada, or which had been in public use or on sale in Canada or more than two years prior to such filing.

JOINT APPLICATIONS

Section 32 (1), new in 1947, provides that:

(1) Where an invention is made by two or more inventors, and one of them refuses to make application for a patent or his whereabouts cannot be ascertained after diligent enquiry, the other inventor or his legal representative may make application, and a patent may be granted in the name of the inventor who makes the application, on satisfying the Commissioner that the joint inventor has refused to make application or that his whereabouts cannot be ascertained after diligent enquiry.

Where an applicant has agreed to assign a patent when granted to another person or to a joint applicant and refuses to proceed with the application; or where disputes arise between joint applicants as to proceeding with the application, the Commissioner may grant a patent to either one of the parties. Procedure is also outlined when a joint applicant retires or is added.

ASSIGNMENTS—APPLICANTS NOT INVENTORS

A patent may be granted to any person to whom an inventor has assigned or bequeathed by his last will his right to obtain it and the assignee may register such an assignment, after which the application cannot be withdrawn without the consent of the assignee.

IMPROVEMENTS MAY BE PATENTED

Any improvement to a patented invention may be patented.

TERM OF PATENT

The term limit for the duration of patents issued by the Patent Office under this Act is 17 years from the date on which the patent is granted and issued but if the application for the patent was filed prior to the coming into force of this section of the Act, the term is 18 years from the date on which the patent is granted and issued.

REFUSAL OF PATENTS

Where a patent is refused, the applicant may any time within 6 months' appeal the decision to the Exchequer Court. (Sec. 43)

INVENTIONS BY PUBLIC SERVANTS

Section 46 deals with the restriction and regulations of the rights of an inventor if he is in the public service of Canada.

GOVERNMENT OWNED PATENTS

Sections 19a, 19b, and 19c are new in 1947, dealing with secret patents and patents relating to Atomic Energy. Section 19a (1) provides that:

19a. (1) Any officer, servant or employee of the Crown or of a corporation which is an agent or servant of the Crown, who, acting within the scope of his duties and employment as such, invents any invention in instruments or munitions of war, shall, if so required by the Minister of National Defence, assign

to such minister on behalf of His Majesty all the benefits of the invention and of any patent obtained or to be obtained for the invention; and any other person who invents any such invention may so assign to such minister on behalf of His Majesty all the benefits of the invention and of any patent obtained or to be obtained for the invention.

Provision is made that an inventor, other than those mentioned in the preceding section, shall be entitled to compensation. Persons making assignments or having knowledge thereof are deemed to have information entrusted in confidence. Other provisions deal with secrecy. Subsection (15) provides that:

The Governor in Council, if satisfied that an invention relating to any instrument or munition of war, described in any specified application for patent not assigned to the Minister of National Defence, is vital to the defence of Canada and that the publication of a patent therefor should be prevented in order to preserve the safety of the State, may order that such invention and application and all the documents relating thereto shall be treated for all purposes of this section as if the invention had been assigned or agreed to be assigned to the Minister of National Defence.

INFRINGEMENT

Anyone infringing a patent shall be liable to the patentee and to all persons claiming under him for all damages sustained by the patentee or by any such person by reason of such infringement; and the Court may issue an injunction restraining the opposite party from the further use, sale, etc., of the article.

Provision is made that a person who, previous to the granting of the patent has purchased, constructed or acquired any invention shall have the right of using and selling the article, etc.

IMPEACHMENT

If any person has reasonable cause to believe that any process used or proposed to be used or any article made, used or sold or proposed to be made, used or sold by him might be alleged by any patentee to constitute an infringement of an exclusive property or privilege granted thereby, he may bring an action in the Exchequer Court of Canada against the patentee for a declaration that such process or article does not or would not constitute an infringement of such exclusive property or privilege.

PRIORITY OF INVENTIONS

No patent or claim in a patent shall be declared invalid or void on the ground that, before the invention therein defined was made by the inventor by whom the patent was applied for it had already been known or used by some other inventor, unless it is established either that,

(a) before the date of the application for the patent such other person had disclosed or used the invention in such manner that it had become available to the public; or that

(b) such other person had, before the issue of the patent, made an application for patent in Canada upon which conflict proceedings should have been directed; or that

(c) such other person had at any time made an application in Canada which by virtue of section twenty-seven of this Act had the same force and effect as if it had been filed in Canada before the issue of the patent and upon which conflict proceedings should properly have been directed had it been so filed.

PATENTED ARTICLE TO BE MARKED OR STAMPED

Every patentee under this Act shall, if possible, stamp or engrave on each patented article sold or offered for sale by him notice of the year of the date of the patent applying to such article, thus—Patented, 1935, or as the case may be.

When, from the nature of any patented article it cannot be so stamped or engraved the patentee shall, if possible, affix to it, or to every package wherein one or more of such articles is or are enclosed, a label marked with the like notice.

When any patented article or material is, from its nature or character, such that it cannot be so stamped or engraved and cannot, reasonably, be packaged or labelled the patentee shall, in all descriptive or advertising matter published by him and relating to such patented article or material, insert the like notice.

ABUSE OF RIGHTS UNDER PATENTS

NOT WORKING A PATENTED INVENTION

The Attorney General of Canada or any person interested may at any time after the expiration of three years from the date of the grant of a patent apply to the Commissioner alleging in the case of that patent that there has been an abuse of the exclusive rights thereunder and asking for relief under this Act.

The exclusive rights under a patent shall be deemed to have been abused in any of the following circumstances:—

(a) If the patented invention (being one capable of being worked within Canada) is not being worked within Canada on a commercial scale, and no satisfactory reason can be given for such non-working;

Provided that, if an application is presented to the Commissioner on this ground, and the Commissioner is of opinion that the time which has elapsed since the grant of the patent has by reason of the nature of the invention or for any other cause been insufficient to enable the invention to be worked within Canada on a commercial scale, the Commissioner may make an order adjourning the application for such period as will in his opinion be sufficient for that purpose;

(b) If the working of the invention within Canada on a commercial scale is being prevented or hindered by the importation from abroad of the patented article by the patentee or persons claiming under him, or by persons directly or indirectly purchasing from him, or by other persons against whom the patentee is not taking or has not taken any proceedings for infringement;

(c) If the demand for the patented article in Canada, is not being met to an adequate extent and on reasonable terms;

(d) If, by reason of the refusal of the patentee to grant a licence or licences upon reasonable terms, the trade or industry of Canada or the trade of any person or class of persons trading in Canada, or the establishment of any new trade or industry in Canada, is prejudiced, and it is in the public interest that a licence or licences should be granted;

(e) If any trade or industry in Canada, or any person or class of persons engaged therein, is unfairly prejudiced by the conditions attached by the patentee, whether before or after the passing of this Act, to the purchase, hire, licence, or use of the patented article, or to the using or working of the patented process;

(f) If it is shown that the existence of the patent, being a patent for an invention relating to a process involving the use of materials not protected by the patent or for an invention relating to a substance produced by such a process, has been utilized by the patentee so as unfairly to prejudice in Canada the manufacture, use or sale of any such materials.

LICENSE WHERE INVENTION NOT BEING WORKED

If a case of abuse is established the Commissioner may order a grant to an applicant of a licence on such terms as the Commissioner may think expedient; or if he is satisfied that an invention is not being worked on a commercial scale within Canada, he may under certain circumstances order the grant of an exclusive licence to an applicant able to provide capital for the working of the patent; or he may order the patent to be revoked.

In granting an exclusive licence a royalty shall be arranged payable to the patentee.

CAVEATS

Any intending applicant for a patent who has not yet perfected his invention and is in fear of being despoiled of his idea, may file in the Patent Office a document setting forth a description of his invention so far as it has proceeded, with or without plans, at his own will; and the Commissioner, on payment of the prescribed fee shall cause that document, which shall be called a "caveat," to be preserved in secrecy with the exception that he shall deliver copies thereof whenever required by the applicant or by any judicial tribunal. The secrecy of the document shall cease when the applicant obtains a patent for his invention.

If application is made by any other person for a patent for any invention with which such "caveat" may in any respect interfere the Commissioner shall forthwith give notice of such application by mail to the person who has filed such "caveat", and such person shall, within three months after the date of mailing the notice, if he wishes to avail himself of the "caveat", file his petition and take the other steps necessary on an application for a patent, and if, in the opinion of the Commissioner, the applications are conflicting, like proceedings may be had in all respects as are by this Act provided in the case of conflicting applications.

Unless the person filing a "caveat" makes application within one year from such filing the Commissioner shall be relieved from the obligation of giving notice and the "caveat" shall thereafter remain as a simple matter of proof as to novelty or priority of invention, if required.

PATENTS ISSUED OUT OF CANADA

The Commissioner shall upon the request of any person who states in writing the name of the inventor, if available, the title of the invention and the number and date of a patent said to have been granted in another country inform such person whether an application for a patent of the same invention is pending in Canada or not.

JURISDICTION OF EXCHEQUER COURT

52A. The Exchequer Court of Canada shall have jurisdiction, on the application of the Commissioner or of any person interested, to order that any entry in the records of the Patent Office relating to the title to a patent be varied or expunged.

PATENT ATTORNEYS

A register of attorneys shall be kept in the Patent Office containing the names of all attorneys entitled to represent applicants for patents.

THE CANADIAN LAW OF COPYRIGHT

by HAROLD G. FOX, Q.C.

WHAT IS COPYRIGHT? Copyright, as its name implies, is merely the right to restrain copying. By the terms of the Canadian Copyright Act, which came into force on January 1st, 1924, copyright subsists in every original literary, dramatic, musical, and artistic work. The work must be original and its author must, at the date of its making, be a British subject, a citizen or subject of a foreign country which has adhered to the Berne Convention, or be resident within the British Dominions; and if in the case of a published work the work was first published within British dominions or in a country which has adhered to the Berne Convention. A work is deemed to be first published in such a country if published there and in some other country simultaneously. The last word is interpreted as allowing fourteen days interval between the publication in the two countries.

Publication means the issue of copies to the public. It does not include the performance in public of a dramatic or musical work, the delivery in public of a lecture, the exhibition in public of an artistic work, or the construction of an architectural work of art. Nor does the issue of photographs and engravings of works of sculpture and architectural works of art constitute publication of such works.

Copyright is defined by the Act as the sole right to produce or reproduce the work or any substantial part thereof in any material form whatsoever, to perform, or in the case of a lecture to deliver, the work or any substantial part thereof in public; if the work is unpublished, to publish the work or any substantial part thereof. Copyright as conferred by the statute includes the sole right to produce, reproduce, perform, or publish translations of the work, the sole right to convert from a dramatic work to a non-dramatic work, to convert from a non-dramatic work or an artistic work to a dramatic work, by way of performance in public or otherwise, to make records, perforated rolls, cinematograph films or other contrivances by means of which the work may be mechanically performed or delivered; to reproduce, adapt and publicly present the work by cinematograph, to communicate it by radio communication, and to authorize any of these acts.

ORIGINALITY. The originality required by the statute relates to the expression of thought. The form in which the work is clothed should be original

although the idea or concept upon which the work is based need have no originality whatsoever. Originality in copyright law means that the work must be in a form created by its author and must not be copied from any other work. An illustration of this principle may be furnished in simple terms by reference to copyright in paintings. An artist may paint a particular scene, let us say, in the Laurentian mountains. A second artist may set up his easel on exactly the same spot as the first artist and may paint exactly the same scene, as he sees it. Whatever similarity the two works may have is irrelevant. The second work is an original work and entitled to copyright. If, however, the second artist does not go to the scene itself, but paints his canvas from a view of the first artist's canvas, the second artist not only infringes the first artist's copyright, but is not entitled to copyright in his own work. The same principle, of course, applies to photographs.

In order to understand this principle it will be useful to refer to copyright in compilations and anthologies. An author may decide to write, as an example, a history of the Roman Empire. He cannot know that history other than by reading the sources, original and secondary. From these he compiles a work based upon the works of others, but to which he has lent an original character by his own mental labours, and is therefore entitled to copyright in that work. A second author may go to the same original and secondary sources and compile a like work. He is entitled to copyright in it and does not infringe the copyright of the first compiler provided he uses the first compiler's work fairly and only for checking the accuracy of his own without copying any substantial part of it.

LITERARY WORKS. Literary works are those which are expressed in print or writing such as books, maps, plans, tables and compilations. Copyright in a work includes the title of the work if that title is original and distinctive, but the mere taking of a title apart from any substantial part of a work does not constitute infringement. It is only when the title has become so far identified with a work as to mean that work and that work alone in the minds of the public; that such a taking can be restrained on the ground that the second work is passed off on the public as and for the first work.

DRAMATIC WORKS. Dramatic works include any piece for recitation, choreographic work, or entertainment in dumb show, the scenic arrangement or acting form of which is fixed in writing or otherwise, and any cinematograph production where the arrangement or acting form or the combination of incidents represented give the work an original character. Copyright subsists not only in the actual words of the work but in the dramatic incidents created. In order to be protected as a dramatic work there must be some dramatic action. On this basis a dance step or piece of dramatic action may be protected by a written description of the acts of the performer. In that case there is a double copyright, one in the writing itself as a literary work and the other in the reproduction of the dance or drama, which is thus fixed in writing.

MUSICAL WORKS. Musical works are defined as any combination of melody and harmony, or either of them, printed, reduced to writing or otherwise graphically produced or reproduced. There is, therefore, no copyright in an impromptu until its notation has been fixed in writing or print by the composer. There then exists the right to restrain either its copying in printed form or its public performance.

ARTISTIC WORKS. Artistic works include works of painting, drawing, sculpture and artistic craftsmanship, and architectural works of art and engravings and photographs. Engravings include etchings, lithographs, woodcuts, prints and other similar works not being photographs. An architectural work means any building or structure having an artistic character or design in respect of such character or design, or any model for such building or structure, but the protection is confined to the artistic character and design and does not extend to processes or methods of construction.

INDUSTRIAL DESIGNS. Certain works fall within the definition of artistic works but will not be subject to copyright owing to certain conditions. These are such works as are designs capable of being registered under the Design Act, and used or intended to be used as models or patterns to be multiplied by any industrial process. Designs which do not meet that definition are not industrial designs but artistic works and are subject to artistic copyright. A design is deemed to be used as a model or pattern to be multiplied by an industrial process when it is reproduced or intended to be reproduced in more than fifty single copies not together constituting a set or is to be applied to (1) printed paper hangings, (2) carpets, floor cloths or oil cloths manufactured or sold in lengths or pieces, (3) textile piece goods or textile goods manufactured or sold in lengths or pieces or (4) lace, not made by hand.

LITERARY OR ARTISTIC MERIT. In no case need the subject of copyright possess any degree of literary or artistic merit. It would be highly improper if copyright were to depend on the opinion of any court as to the presence or absence of such an elusive quality, depending solely on individual taste, value, or discretion. The writer of doggerel verse or the mystery novel is entitled to the same copyright as the winner of the Nobel prize in literature, and the author of the comic strip cartoon receives no less protection than do those whose works are hung in the galleries of the nation. In this regard the applicable maxim is *De gustibus non disputandum*.

IMMORAL WORKS. There is one minor qualification to the above remarks. The courts will not protect immoral, indecent, obscene, or blasphemous works. What falls within the scope of these terms is impossible of definition and must depend upon the susceptibilities and sensibilities of any court adjudicating upon the matter. Thus, thirty years ago Elinor Glynn's *Three Weeks* was held to be an obscene work disentitled to protection. Within the present decade Judge Wolsey, in the United States, promulgated his now famous decision holding that Joyce's *Ulysses* was not an immoral work. *Tempora mutantur nos et nutamur in illis!* It may safely be said in principle that a work which is not purely pornographic but is honest work endeavouring to create an atmosphere, to depict life or to delineate the author's or artist's concept of things as they are or ought to be, would not be held to be immoral and would be entitled to copyright.

OWNERSHIP OF COPYRIGHT. The author of the work is, in general, the first owner of the copyright. The author is the person who actually writes, draws, paints, carves, models, fabricates, or composes the work, unless he is a mere amanuensis or workman. A person who suggests the idea of a work is not its author or even joint author. A ghost writer, therefore, is the author of the biography which he writes and the possibly famous person of whom he writes and who supplies the facts and recollections upon which the biography is based is not entitled to any share in the copyright—unless, of course, there is an agreement to the contrary. It should always be remembered that copyright is a property right and, therefore, contracts can be made respecting its ownership and disposal.

A work of joint authorship is one produced by the collaboration of two or more authors in which the contribution of one author is not distinct from the contribution of the other author or authors. Joint authors, in general, own copyright in equal shares.

In the case of photographs the person or corporation owning the original negative from which the photograph is made is deemed to be the author and therefore the owner of the copyright. The same principle applies in the case of the owner of the original plate from which any records, perforated rolls and other contrivances for mechanically reproducing sounds were derived.

Where a plate or other original of an engraving, photograph or portrait is ordered and made for valuable consideration and pursuant to the order, then, in the absence of agreement to the contrary, the person giving the order and not the author of the work is the first owner of copyright. This is an important principle. In the case of a portrait painter, the subject who gives the order and pays for the portrait receives not only the finished portrait for which he pays, but the copyright in his portrait as well. In the case of photographs the same principle applies. But where the photographer takes photographs on speculation and then endeavours to sell them to the subject, it is the photographer who owns the copyright.

Where the author of the work is in the employment of some other person under a contract of service or apprenticeship and the work was made in the course of his employment by that person, the person by whom the author was employed is, in the absence of any agreement to the contrary, the first owner of the copyright. Where, therefore, a writer on a newspaper or magazine holds a position on the staff of that publication for which he is paid a salary, and writes, let us say, feature articles, the copyright in those articles belongs to the owner of the publication. If, however, an independent or freelance writer is retained to write a series of articles for which the owner of the publication contracts to pay him a certain sum of money, the copyright in those articles belongs to the writer and not to the owner of the publication, because the writer is under a contract for service and not a contract of service.

Where an article or other contribution to a newspaper, magazine or similar periodical, is written by a staff writer acting in the course of his employment and there is no agreement to the contrary, although the copyright in the article resides in the owner of the publication, the writer nevertheless has reserved to him a right to restrain its publication otherwise than as part of a newspaper, magazine or similar periodical. Thus a staff writer may contribute to his newspaper or magazine a series of twenty or thirty articles. It is then decided to publish those articles in book form. The owner of the publication cannot publish without the author's consent, and the author, not being the owner of the copyright, cannot publish without the consent of the owner of the publication. The only way publication can occur is by mutual agreement, and in such case it is presumed that the author will make his bargain to his best advantage.

There is a distinct cleavage between the intangible right known to the law as copyright, and the ownership of the physical embodiment in which that right resides. This is of particular importance in the case of artistic works. Many painters and sculptors are unaware of the fact that when they sell one of their works they do not necessarily part with the right to reproduce it or, in other words, to issue copies of it

to the public. It must also be said that many purchasers of artistic works, particularly art galleries, national and otherwise, take an arbitrary view of the rights they acquire when they purchase an artistic work. Copyright is something entirely apart from the piece of canvas and pigment composing a painting and from the mass of bronze, marble or other material forming a work of sculpture. The sale of the physical object and the transfer of property therein do not of themselves transfer copyright. Copyright is a separate and distinctly existing right and can only be transferred by contract, express or implied. For this reason authors, artists, composers, sculptors and other creators of original works would be well advised to ensure that every sale of their works is made in accordance with a written memorandum. If such a procedure were generally adopted the present habit indulged in by art galleries of selling photographs and other reproductions of artistic works in their possession without compensation to the artist would promptly cease.

But, since the practice of selling photographs is to the publicity advantage of both gallery and artist, artists would be well advised to enter into an agreement with galleries to continue to issue photographs on a royalty basis.

TERM OF COPYRIGHT. The general term of copyright in works published and performed in public during the author's lifetime is the life of the author and fifty years after his death. In the case of a literary, dramatic or musical work or an engraving in which copyright subsists at the time of the death of the author, but which has not been published nor performed, nor in the case of a lecture, been delivered in public before that date, copyright subsists till publication or performance or delivery in public, whichever may first happen, and for a term of fifty years thereafter. It will thus be seen that copyright in unpublished works may extend almost indefinitely.

In case of works of joint authorship copyright subsists during the life of the author who dies last and fifty years after his death. The term of copyright in photographs is fifty years from the making of the original negative. In the case of records, perforated rolls, and other mechanical contrivances for the reproduction of sound, the term is fifty years from the making of the original matrix, plate, or negative.

Copyright in Government publications is fifty years from the date of first publication. This term is provided by statute, but one would be well advised to remember that the Crown may well claim a prerogative right of copyright in perpetuity.

In all cases of published works the term of copyright is subject to a statutory right for any person to reproduce the work on statutory terms at any time after the expiration of twenty-five years or, in the case of works in which copyright subsisted on June 4, 1921, thirty years, from the death of the author. The statutory terms require notice of intention to publish and the payment of royalties calculated at 10 per cent of the published price of the work.

ASSIGNMENT AND LICENCE. Creators of original works may assign their copyright either wholly or partially and either generally or subject to territorial limitations and either for the whole term of the copyright or for any part thereof, and may grant any interest in the right by way of licence. No such assignment or grant is, however, valid unless it is in writing signed by the owner of the copyright or by his duly authorized agent. The owner of copyright may, therefore, split the right into as many component parts as he desires. He may assign or license the right to publish, to produce or to reproduce his work on one or a million occasions. He may allow reproduction in one or a dozen countries or in one or a thousand cities. He may assign or license to different persons the right to reproduce a work of art by photography and by colour process. He may license its reproduction to one person for a calendar and to another for a Christmas card. In fact there is hardly any limit that can be placed upon the dealings which a copyright owner may have in his copyright if he can find someone who desires a particular part of the right and is willing to pay for it.

Where part of the copyright is assigned, the assignee becomes the owner of that part of the right. If, therefore, the composer of a musical work assigns the right of public performance, the assignee can restrain everybody else from performing the work

in public. He cannot, however, restrain the author or the person to whom the author may assign that particular part of the copyright from issuing printed copies of the *musical score* to the public.

An assignee or licensee is wise to register his assignment or licence in the Copyright Office at Ottawa.

DROIT MORAL. The moral right of an author is recognized by the Canadian Copyright Act which provides that, independently of the copyright and even after the assignment, he shall have the right to claim authorship of the work and to restrain distortion, mutilation or other modification in the work which would be prejudicial to his honour or reputation. The statute does not say who is to decide what amount or what quality of distortion, mutilation or modification would be prejudicial to an author's honour or reputation. This is a subject which has received wide treatment in the European and South American countries. There is no corresponding section in the British Copyright Act and, despite the quarter of a century during which the section has found its place in the Canadian statute, no case has been heard by the courts in which this section was invoked. It is interesting to speculate whether the reason for such lack of interest in the section lies in the honesty and integrity of Canadian publishers, performers and owners of other reproducing media or in the apathy and indifference of Canadian authors, artists, and composers.

FORMALITIES. Copyright under the Canadian Copyright Act is automatic and the author of a work need comply with no formality whatsoever in order that he shall possess copyright in his work. The statute contains provisions for registration of copyright but these are permissive only and no registration need take place. There is one minor point on which registration might possibly benefit the author but it is involved in such legal technicalities that it need not be discussed further. It may safely be said that an author is perfectly protected if he entirely neglects to register his copyright.

BERNE CONVENTION. Once a work is made, copyright subsists not only in Canada but throughout the British Commonwealth and all countries which have adhered to the Berne Convention. By arrangement with the United States, Canadian authors are entitled to apply for copyright in that country but their copyright is not automatic. It must be registered and all other requirements of the United States Copyright Act complied with including publication within the United States if the work is a literary work in the English language.

INFRINGEMENT. Infringement consists in doing without the consent of the owner of the copyright anything the sole right to do which is by the Copyright Act conferred on the owner of the copyright. It will thus be seen that it is infringement, without the consent of the owner of the copyright, to issue copies of a work to the public, to perform it in public, to reproduce it in any manner, to make a translation of it, to convert a novel into a dramatic work, to convert a dramatic work into a novel, and so on. But it must be emphasized that copyright is not an absolute monopoly, but is only the right to restrain copying, and if some other person produces a similar work independently of the owner of the copyright, there will be no infringement.

Importation of infringing works constitutes infringement as well as their being made in the country. There are effective provisions in the Copyright Act and in the Customs Tariff Act for preventing importation of infringing copies.

The making of only one copy of a work will constitute infringement and it need not be an exact copy. A colourable imitation is sufficient. There must, however, be a substantial part of the work taken or a substantial part of the work performed in public. In one case the reproduction of the march *Colonel Bogey* consisting of so much as was played in twenty seconds was held to be an infringement. In another case dealing with the musical work *Walking my Baby back Home* sufficient was played to allow the court to recognize the tune, although the evidence was so conflicting that the plaintiff claimed that thirty-two bars had been played and the defendant claimed only five bars had been played.

There are specific provisions relative to infringement in cases of making records and other mechanical contrivances for the reproduction of sounds. They

are somewhat complicated but, in general, they provide that the making of such contrivances shall not constitute infringement if similar contrivances have previously been made by, or with the consent of, the owner of the copyright, and the person who makes them gives notice of his intention to make them and pays the stipulated royalty of two cents per perforated roll or playing surface.

LAWFUL USE OF COPYRIGHT. By statute there are certain lawful uses of copyright and no person is permitted to complain if the use of his work is made under the following circumstances:

1. Any fair dealing with any work for the purpose of private study, research, criticism, review or newspaper summary. The use must be fair. Thus in one Canadian case an entire article was printed in a newspaper as the basis upon which a criticism was printed following it. The court held that this was not fair dealing.

2. The author of an artistic work who is not the owner of copyright therein may use any mould, cast, sketch, plan, model or study made by him for the purpose of the work, provided that he does not thereby repeat or imitate the main design of the work.

3. Paintings, drawings, engravings, or photographs may be made of a work of sculpture or artistic craftsmanship if permanently situated in a public place or building. The same thing may be done in connection with any architectural work of art so long as such drawings, etc., are not in the nature of architectural drawings or plans.

4. Short passages from copyright published literary works which are not themselves published for the use of schools may be published in a collection mainly composed of non-copyright matter *bona fide* intended for the use of schools and so described in the title and in any advertisements issued by the publisher. But no more than two of such passages from works by the same author may be published by the same publisher within five years and in each case the source from which such passages are taken must be acknowledged.

5. A newspaper may publish a report of a lecture delivered in public, unless the report is prohibited by a conspicuous notice affixed before and maintained during the lecture.

6. The reading or recitation in public by one person of any reasonable extract from any published work. Note the limitation to "one person." This precludes the public performance by more than one actor of even a small scene in a dramatic work.

7. Any musical work may be performed without motive of gain by the directors at any agricultural, agricultural-industrial exhibition or fair which received a grant from or is held under Dominion, provincial or municipal authority.

8. Any church, college or school and any religious, charitable or fraternal organization may perform any musical work without payment if done in furtherance of a religious, educational, or charitable object.

9. A report of an address of a political nature delivered at a public meeting may be published in a newspaper.

REMEDIES FOR INFRINGEMENT. In case of infringement the owner of copyright has two remedies. He may sue the infringer in the civil courts for damages incurred by him, as well as the profits made by the infringer, and may ask for the delivery to him of all infringing copies. Such an action is to be brought within three years after the infringement takes place. In addition, the owner of the copyright may prosecute the infringer criminally for his acts. This should give the copyright owner little, if any, personal satisfaction and no gain would accrue to him other than the satisfaction of personal animus. The first remedy is the proper one and is that which ought to be followed.

WORKS MADE BEFORE 1924. Copyright as we now know it came into effect with the new Canadian Copyright Act on January 1, 1924. But copyright subsisted in many works in Canada at that date, and in such cases they received copyright under the new Act by virtue of a special transition section.

It would be difficult to express in any moderate space the principles upon which copyright subsisted in Canada prior to 1924. There was in existence a Canadian Copyright Act prior to that date which required registration and any work registered under that Act would naturally be the subject of copyright. But copyright might also have subsisted in certain works prior to 1924 which were not registered under that Act. We may state the position shortly as follows:

1. Copyright subsisted at the effective date (January 1, 1924) in all works then unpublished whatever their nature.

2. Literary works published in the British Dominions were the subject of copyright whether registered or unregistered either in Canada or at Stationers' Hall in London.

3. Dramatic works were protected as literary works in their printed form, but so far as their performing right was concerned copyright subsisted during the life of the author and seven years after his death, or forty-two years from the date of first performance of the work. If the work fell within that definition on the effective date copyright subsisted in that work provided it had not been first performed in a foreign country to which the Imperial International Copyright Act did not extend.

4. Musical works enjoyed copyright in printed form as literary works, whether registered or unregistered and so far as concerned their performing right were treated the same as dramatic works.

5. Artistic works were protected prior to 1924 only if they were registered under the then existing Canadian Copyright Act.

6. Mechanical contrivances for reproducing sounds, if made before January 1, 1924, are by special provision treated as if the present Copyright Act had been in force at the time they were made.

The above is not intended to be an exhaustive statement of the law of copyright prior to the commencement of the present Copyright Act. It is, however, of the utmost importance when considering works in existence before January 1, 1924 to understand what was their status at that effective date because the new Act contains a transition section which conferred copyright under the new Act upon all works in which copyright subsisted at the effective date. The first thing to decide, therefore, is whether a work was or was not the subject of copyright on January 1, 1924. If it was, no matter what the nature or term of the copyright to which it was then entitled, it is now entitled, generally speaking, to copyright as established by the new Copyright Act.

It is a matter of no little difficulty to endeavour to explain the principles of the law of Copyright within the short compass of this article. Many subjects have obviously been left untouched and there will naturally remain many pitfalls for the unwary. The intention of this article is to give to the author, artist, sculptor and composer, a very broad and general idea of the rights he possesses in his original creations. Those rights ought to be protected and their owners will find that an appreciation and understanding of those rights and an insistence upon their recognition will earn them respect in this commercial world, while at the same time according to them some measure of reward for their labours. Those labours have produced and are producing great works for the benefit and enjoyment of mankind and as a famous jurist said nearly two centuries ago, "It is wise in any state to encourage letters and the painful researches of learned men. The easiest and most equal way of doing it, is, by securing to them the property of their own works. Nobody contributes, who is not willing; and though a good book may be run down and a bad one cried up, for a time; yet sooner or later, the reward will be in proportion to the merit of the work. A writer's fame will not be the less, that he has bread, without being under the necessity of prostituting his pen to flattery or party, to get it. He who engages in a laborious work, which may employ his whole life, will do it with more spirit, if, besides his own glory, he thinks it may be a provision for his family."

DESCENT AND DISTRIBUTION OF PROPERTY

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

A CONDENSED SUMMARY OF THE LAW OF INTESTATE ESTATES

All real and personal property which is vested in any person without a right in any other person to take by survivorship shall, on his death, whether testate or intestate, and notwithstanding any testamentary disposition, devolve to and become vested in his personal representative from time to time as trustee for the persons by law beneficially entitled thereto and, subject to the payment of his debts, and so far as such property is not disposed of by deed, will, contract or other effectual disposition, the same shall be administered, dealt with and distributed as if it were personal property not so disposed of.

"A husband who, if The Devolution of Estates Act had not been passed, would be entitled to an interest as tenant by the curtesy in the real property of his wife, may, by deed or instrument in writing executed, and attested by at least one witness and delivered to the personal representative, if any, or if there is none, deposited in the office of the Registrar of the Supreme Court at Osgoode Hall, within six months after his wife's death, elect to take such interest in the real and personal property of his wife as he would have taken if the said Act had not been passed, in which case the husband's interest therein shall be ascertained in all respects as if the said Act had not been passed, and he shall be entitled to no further interest thereunder.

The real and personal property of every man dying intestate and leaving a widow whether or not he leaves issue shall, where the net value of such real and personal property does not exceed \$5,000.00, belong to his widow absolutely and exclusively. The term "net value" means the value of the real and personal property after payment of the charges thereon and the debts, funeral expenses and expenses of administration, including succession duty.

Where the estate of the husband consists in whole or in part of real property, then notwithstanding anything set out above or anything hereinafter set out with respect to the benefits to the widow, such benefits shall not accrue to her and she shall only be entitled to her dower unless she elects to take her distributive share, as set out herein, in lieu of dower. The term "dower" means the right of the widow, for her life to one-third of the rents and profits from the real estate owned by her husband at his death.

By the provisions of The Devolution of Estates Amendment Act, 1952, the 1918 Enactment, as it stood in our present Devolution of Estates Act, (Chapter 103-R.S.O.-1950) was repealed and it was further provided that any real property which but for the provisions of the 1918 Enactment, would have vested in the persons beneficially entitled thereto, shall be deemed to have vested in such persons notwithstanding such provisions.

The Devolution of Estates Amendment Act, 1953, was passed so that an illegitimate child or the mother of an illegitimate child, under certain circumstances, shares in the estate.

Subject to what is set out above, the estate of a person dying intestate is distributed as set out below, according to the Devolution of Estates Act, being Chapter 103 of The Revised Statutes of Ontario, 1950. It will be noted that where the widow takes a share, the net value of the estate is presumed to be in excess of \$5,000.00. Where there is no widow to take a share, the net value of the estate is immaterial.

DISTRIBUTION

If the Intestate die leaving,—

1. A widow only, the widow gets \$5,000.00 plus interest thereon at 4% from date of death until payment and two-thirds of the residue. Remaining one-third of the residue equally to the next of kin of the deceased husband and those who legally represent them. For example, if the next of kin were a father, mother, brother and sister, or any of these and if there were children of a deceased brother or sister, the said one-third would be divided equally among all of these, save that the children aforesaid would

take per stirpes and not per capita,—that is the^y would take equally the share which their father or mother would have taken had he or she survived the intestate. If there are no kindred to inherit, the said remaining one-third of residue would go to the Crown.

2. Widow and one child or legal representatives of child. \$5,000.00 and interest as above and half residue to widow. The other half to child or equally among legal representatives.

3. Widow and children and legal representatives of deceased children—\$5,000.00 and interest as above and one-third of residue to widow. The other two-thirds equally among the children and the legal representatives of deceased children, the latter taking per stirpes.

4. Widow and father or mother or brother or sister, \$5,000.00 and interest as above and two-thirds of the residue to widow. The remaining one-third of residue to the father or mother or brother or sister.

If the intestate die leaving,—

1. A husband only,—half to the husband and remaining half among next of kin of deceased wife and those who legally represent them and in same proportions as mentioned in No. 1 above. If there are no kindred to inherit, the said remaining one-half would go to the Crown.

2. A husband and child or legal representatives of child,—one-third to husband. The remaining two-thirds to child or equally among legal representatives.

3. A husband and children and legal representatives of deceased children,—one-third to husband. The remaining two-thirds equally among the children and the legal representatives of deceased children,—the latter taking per stirpes.

4. Husband and father or mother or brother or sister,—one-half to the husband. The remaining half to the father or mother or brother or sister.

If the intestate die without leaving a spouse, but leaving,—

(a) a child or legal representatives of child,—all to child or equally among the legal representatives.

(b) Children and legal representatives of deceased children,—equally among all,—the legal representatives taking per stirpes.

(c) Children by two spouses,—equally among all.

(d) Child and grandchild of a deceased child,—half to child and half to grandchild who takes by representation.

If the intestate die without spouse or issue but leaving,—

(a) A father, mother, brother and sister or any of these and children of a deceased brother or sister,—equally among all,—the said children sharing per stirpes.

(b) A father or mother, or brother or sister,—all to the one who survives.

(c) A grandparent or grandparents,—all to him or her or equally among these.

(d) Brother or sister of the whole blood and brother or sister of the half blood, equally among the two.

(e) Posthumous brother or sister and mother, equally among the two.

(f) Brother and grandfather,—all to brother.

(g) Grandniece or grandnephew and niece or nephew,—all to niece or nephew.

(h) Brother and aunts or uncles,—all to brother.

(i) Uncles or aunts children and brother or sisters grandchildren,—equally among all.

(j) Grandparent and uncle or aunt,—all to grandparent.

(k) Uncle and deceased uncle's or aunt's child,—all to uncle.

(l) Nephew or niece by brother or half-brother and nephew or niece by sister or half-sister,—equally among the two.

(m) Children of deceased brothers or sisters or children of deceased brothers and sisters,—equally per capita.

Where the intestate dies without lawful heirs, all of his estate will go to the Crown."

SUCCESSION DUTIES IN CANADA

THE DOMINION SUCCESSION DUTY ACT

The following is a resume of some of the principal provisions of the Act, 4-5 George VI, Chap. 14., assented to June 14th, 1941, and amendments up to and including 1952. The information hereunder is only partial, is not interpretative, and legal advice should be sought in specific cases.

SUCCESSION

(SEC. 3.) A succession includes:

(a) property and income therefrom voluntarily transferred by grant, bargain or gift or by any transfer made in general contemplation of death.

(b) property taken as a *donatio mortis causa*;

(c) gifts made on or after April 29, 1941, and within 3 years prior to death of deceased.

(d) gifts of which actual and bona fide possession and enjoyment was not immediately assumed to the entire exclusion of the donor.

(e) property held jointly except such part which was contributed by the survivor.

PROPERTY VALUED AT DEATH

(SEC. 5.) Property shall be valued as of the date of death and is not subject to any appreciation or depreciation after the date of death.

AGGREGATE NET VALUE

(SEC. 2a) "Aggregate net value" means the fair market value as at the date of death, of all the property of the deceased, wherever situated, together with the fair market value, as at the said date, of all such other property wherever situated, mentioned and described in section 3 of this Act, as deemed to be included in a succession or successions, as the case may be, from the deceased as predecessor, after the debts, incumbrances and other allowances are deducted therefrom as authorized by subsection six of section seven and by section eight of this Act.

DUTIABLE VALUE

(SEC. 2e) "Dutiable value" means, in the case of the death of a person domiciled in Canada, the fair market value, as at the date of death, of all property included in a succession to a successor less the allowances as authorized by subsection six of section seven and by section eight of this Act and less the value of real property situated outside of Canada, and means, in the case of the death of a person domiciled outside of Canada, the fair market value of property situated in Canada of the deceased included in a succession to a successor less the allowances as authorized by subsection six of section seven and by sections 8 and 9 of this Act.

CHILD

(SEC. 2b) (amended 1944) "child" means

(i) a child of the deceased;

(ii) a person lawfully adopted while under the age of twelve years by the deceased as his child;

(iii) a person who, during his infancy for a period of not less than ten years, was in law or in fact in the custody and control of the deceased and was dependent upon the deceased for support; or

(iv) a lineal descendant of a person described by subparagraph (i), (ii) or (iii);

if at the time of the death of the deceased the child, person or lineal descendant was

(v) under eighteen years of age in the case of the deceased's own child or adopted child;

(vi) under eighteen years of age and dependent upon the deceased for support; or

(vii) eighteen years of age or over and likewise dependent upon the deceased on account of mental or physical infirmity.

DECEASED PERSON

(SEC. 2d) "Deceased" or "deceased person" means a person dying after the coming into force of this Act.

EXEMPTIONS AND ALLOWANCES

(SEC. 7) (1) From the dutiable value of any property included in a succession the following exemptions shall be deducted and no duty shall be leviable in respect thereof:—

(a) where the successor is the widow of the deceased, the value of the property up to the amount of \$20,000,

which exemption, however, shall be increased for each child of the deceased—

(i) by \$5,000 if such child does not benefit as a result of the death of the deceased;

(ii) by \$5,000 less the value of the property included in a succession to the child from the deceased;

(b) where the successor is a child of the deceased the value of the property up to the amount of \$5,000;

(c) where the successor is a child of the deceased having no surviving parent, the value of the property up to the amount of \$15,000, which exemption shall be in addition to the exemption provided for by paragraph (b) of this subsection: Provided, however, that where more than one child is entitled to exemption hereunder the exemption shall be limited to the sum of \$15,000 divisible amongst such children in proportion to the value of the property included in each succession;

CHARITABLE GIFTS

(d) where the successor is a charitable organization in Canada operated exclusively as such and not for the benefit, gain or profit of any person, member or shareholder thereof;

(e) where the successor is the Dominion of Canada or any province or political subdivision thereof;

(f) in respect of a gift made by the deceased where the same is proved to have been absolute and to have taken effect in the lifetime of the deceased, to have been part of his ordinary and normal expenditure, and to have been reasonable having regard to the amount of his income and the circumstances under which the gift was made;

(g) in respect of any gift made by the deceased prior to the 29th day of April, 1941, where actual and bona fide possession and enjoyment of the property, the subject matter of the gift, has been assumed by the donee or by a trustee for the donee immediately upon the making of the gift and thenceforward retained to the entire exclusion of the donor, or of any benefit to him, whether voluntary or by contract or otherwise;

(h) in respect of a gift made by the deceased in his lifetime where gift tax has been paid under the provisions of the *Income War Tax Act*, or the *Income Tax Act*, except to the extent to which duty payable under this Act exceeds the gift tax so paid;

(i) where the value of the property included in the succession to any one successor does not exceed \$1,000.

(j) in respect of any succession comprising property acquired for or incidental to residence in Canada, by (i) a minister, secretary, or attache, of legation; or (ii) a consul, or vice-consul, of career; or (iii) a high commissioner, accredited representative, or the secretaries of their offices,

provided that the foregoing officials are subjects of the country they represent, and provided further that such exemption shall only be granted to an extent equivalent to that which is granted in like circumstances by the countries which the said officials represent;

(k) in respect of pensions granted or payable under the provisions of the *Pension Act*, or other payments in the nature of pensions which are being administered on the thirty-first day of July, 1942, by the Canadian Pension Commission as directed by the Governor in Council under section six of the *Pension Act*;

(l) in respect of pensions granted or payable on account of disability or death arising out of war service by the government of any country which was an ally of Her Majesty at the time of such war service: provided, and to the extent that such country grants a similar exemption in respect of such pensions granted or payable by the government of Canada."

(2) In the case of a person dying domiciled outside of Canada, the amount of any exemption under subsection 1 of this section shall be limited so that it

shall be only such proportion of the total exemption as the value of property situated in Canada bears to the total value of the property wherever situated.

(3) (a) Where the deceased dies from wounds inflicted, accident occurring, or disease contracted while Canada is or was at war, and while on service with Canadian or any other of Her Majesty's Naval, Military or Air Forces or with allied or associated Naval, Military or Air Forces, and where the Canadian Pension Commission finds that the circumstances are such that the widow or children of the deceased are entitled or would, if such service had been with the Canadian Naval, Military or Air Forces, have been entitled to receive a pension under the *Pension Act* in respect of such death, or where the Canadian Pension Commission finds that the deceased died from wounds inflicted, accident occurring, or disease contracted, as a result of enemy action within 12 months before death;

(i) the exemptions allowed in paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of subsection 1 of this section shall be increased by fifty per centum; and

(ii) the amount of the duty payable in respect of a succession by any successor coming with Class A or Class B in the First Schedule to this Act shall be reduced to such sum as would, if accumulated at compound interest at the rate of three per centum per annum from the date of death with half-yearly rests, at the expiration of the period of the normal expectation of life of a person of the age of the deceased at the time of death (calculated in accordance with mortality tables approved by the Minister) amount to the duty otherwise payable.

(b) The Canadian Pension Commission shall on the request of the Commissioner investigate the circumstances and report its findings in respect of any case arising under paragraph (a) of this subsection.

(4) No duty shall be levied under this Act on the death of a predecessor on or after Jan. 1, 1948, where the aggregate net value does not exceed \$50,000.

(5) No duty shall be leviable in respect of the proceeds of any insurance policy or in respect of any annuity or other similar contract issued by any person in the ordinary course of business or by Her Majesty under the provisions of the *Government Annuities Act*, if the assured or the person with whom the contract was made was domiciled outside of Canada at the time of his death.

(6) (Applying to deaths occurring on and after Dec. 18, 1945). Where duty has become payable upon or in respect of the succession to any property passing upon the death of any person, and subsequently within five years duty has, on the death of the person to whom the property passed on the first death, again become payable upon or in respect of the same property or any part thereof or property which can be identified as having been acquired in exchange therefor, the value of the property included in both successions shall, for the purposes of computing the aggregate net value and dutiable value in respect of the second succession, be deemed to be an amount equal to

(a) where the second death occurs within one year of the first death, fifty per centum,

(b) where the preceding paragraph is not applicable and the second death occurs within two years of the first death, sixty per centum,

(c) where the preceding paragraphs are not applicable and the second death occurs within three years of the first death, seventy per centum,

(d) where the preceding paragraphs are not applicable and the second death occurs within four years of the first death, eighty per centum, and

(e) where the preceding paragraphs are not applicable and the second death occurs within five years of the first death ninety per centum of its fair market value.

ALLOWANCES FOR DEBTS

(SEC. 8) Relates to the allowance of bona fide debts and encumbrances and provides that allowance shall not be made:

(g) for any estate, legacy, succession or inheritance duties, or any combination of such duties, paid or payable to any province or to any country outside of Canada."

DEBTS OF

DECEASED DOMICILED OUTSIDE OF CANADA

(SEC. 9) Where the deceased was domiciled outside of Canada at time of death any allowance made on account of debts by way of deduction from the value

of the property situated in Canada, other than debts specifically charged upon the said property, shall be in the proportion that the value of the property situated in Canada bears to the value of the property of the deceased wheresoever situated.

PERSONS LIABLE FOR DUTIES

(SEC. 12) (1) Every successor shall be liable for the duty by this Act levied upon or in respect of the succession to him provided that the duty in respect of any gift of disposition *inter vivos* to a successor shall also be payable by and may be recovered from the executor of the property of the deceased but such liability shall be in his capacity as executor only and for an amount not exceeding the value of the interest of the successor in the property administered by the executor.

(2) Subject to the provisions of subsection 1 of this section all the duties assessed and levied under this Act shall be payable by and may be recovered from the executor of the property of the deceased, provided that the liability of any executor under this subsection shall be a liability in his capacity as executor only and for an amount not exceeding the value of the property administered by him.

(SEC. 13) Every executor who is required to pay duty upon or in respect of the succession to property which is not administered by him or which does not come into his possession or control shall be entitled to recover from the successor liable therefor the duty payable upon or in respect of such succession.

(SEC. 14) Every executor who is required to pay duty upon or in respect of the succession to property which is being administered by him shall be entitled to deduct from the amount paid over by him the amount of the duty paid by him or, in the event of the successor being satisfied otherwise than in money paid over by him, to recover from the successor the amount of the duty so paid.

DUTIES ON SUCCESSIONS

(SEC. 6) Subject to the exemptions mentioned in section 7 (Exemptions) of this Act, there shall be assessed, levied and paid at the rates provided for in the First Schedule to this Act duties upon or in respect of the following successions, that is to say—

(a) where the deceased was at the time of his death domiciled in a province of Canada, upon or in respect of the succession to all real or immovable property situated in Canada, and all personal property wheresoever situated;

(b) where the deceased was at the time of his death domiciled outside of Canada, upon or in respect of the succession to all property situated in Canada.

RATES OF DUTY

INITIAL RATES

(SEC. 10) There shall be assessed, levied and paid to the Receiver General of Canada, upon or in respect of each succession mentioned and described in section 6 (Duties on Successions) of this Act an initial duty at the rate set forth under the heading "Initial rates dependent on aggregate net value" in the First Schedule to this Act which corresponds to the aggregate net value, in the said Schedule, and the duty so levied shall be payable by each successor in respect of his succession: Provided that there shall be no duty levied under this section where the aggregate net value exceeds \$5,000. but does not exceed \$25,000.

ADDITIONAL RATES

(SEC. 11) In addition to the duty imposed by section 10 of this Act, there shall be assessed, levied and paid upon or in respect of each succession mentioned and described in section 6 of this Act a duty at the rate set forth in the First Schedule to this Act which corresponds to the dutiable value in the said Schedule, as follows:—

(a) under the heading Class A of the said schedule where the dutiable value exceeds \$5,000. and where the successor is the widow or child of the deceased;

(b) under the heading Class B of the said schedule where the dutiable value exceeds \$1,000. and where the successor is the grandfather, grandmother, father, mother, husband, son-in-law or daughter-in-law of the deceased or any person who is included within any of the classes of persons described in subparagraphs (i), (ii), (iii) or (iv) of paragraph (b) of section two but is not a child coming within paragraph (a) of this section.

(c) under the heading Class C of the said Schedule where the dutiable value exceeds \$1,000, and where the successor is a lineal ancestor (except a grandfather, grandmother, father or mother), a brother or sister of the deceased or any descendant of a brother or sister, or a brother or sister of the father or mother of the deceased or any descendant of such brother or sister;

(d) under the heading Class D of the said Schedule where the dutiable value exceeds \$1,000, and where the successor is any person in any other degree of consanguinity to the deceased than as mentioned in paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of this section, or is a stranger in blood to the deceased.

1948 AMENDMENT

(4A.) Where, on the death of a predecessor on or after the first day of January, nineteen hundred and forty-eight, the aggregate net value exceeds fifty thousand dollars, if the total amount of the duties otherwise payable under this Act exceeds the amount of the difference between the aggregate net value and fifty thousand dollars.

(a) the total amount of the duties is, notwithstanding anything in this Act, an amount equal to the amount of the difference, and

(b) the amount of the duty payable by each successor is an amount equal to the proportion of the amount of the duty otherwise payable by him that the total amount of the duties payable in accordance with this subsection is of the total amount of the duties otherwise payable.

1952 AMENDMENT

11A. (1) In this section

(a) "provincial Act" means any provincial Act that imposes Succession Duties and "provincial duties" means the duties imposed by such a provincial Act;

(b) "total duty" means the total amount of duty

that, but for this section, would be payable under this Act on the death of a predecessor mentioned in subsection two in respect of all successions to property on which duties were paid under provincial Acts, and;

(c) "total provincial duties" means the total amount of duties paid under provincial Acts in respect of all property the succession to which is subject to duty under this Act upon the death of a predecessor mentioned in subsection two.

(2) Where provincial duties have been paid in respect of property the succession to which is subject to duty under this Act upon the death of a predecessor, the successor may deduct from the duty otherwise payable by him under this Act in respect of the succession to that property the amount of that duty multiplied by the lesser of (a) one half; or (b) the total provincial duties divided by the total duty.

(The purpose of this provision is to permit the allowance of provincial duties as against the Dominion duties up to but not exceeding one-half of the Dominion duties. It came into force on June 15th, 1952.

EXAMPLE

An example of the way the two classes of rates i.e., the "initial rates" and the "additional rates" apply in the case of an estate of \$100,000, of dutiable value descending to two adult children. Each child's bequest is \$50,000. The "Initial Rate" (dependent on aggregate net value) for \$100,000 is 4.9%. The "Additional Rate" (dependent on dutiable value of the individual benefit) for a bequest of \$50,000, in Class B (the Class for Adult Children) is 7.9%. The total of 4.9% and 7.9% is 12.8%. A total rate of 12.8% is thus the duty applicable to the dutiable value of each bequest of \$50,000. (We have here doubled the original rates, in accordance with the 1946 amendment; but note section 11A respecting 50% deduction.)

FIRST SCHEDULE

RATES OF DUTY—DOMINION SUCCESSION DUTIES

(Partial Table Only)

The following is a partial table of rates omitting many of the intermediate steps. The complete schedule in the Act progresses by very small increases, both of values and rates. There are, for instance, 9 intermediate rates of duty between the 10% and the 12% rate shown below under Class A, and a similar close progression between other rates of duty here shown.

The rates in this schedule give effect to the 1946 amendment by which, in respect of any succession upon the death of a person after Dec. 31, 1946, the rates were doubled, with a provision for allowable deductions in respect of duties payable under the laws of any province or provinces. See above, Section 11A.

The rates appearing below apply only to successions derived from persons dying on or after the first day of January, 1947.

WHEN DUTIES PAYABLE

(Sec. 24) Duties, unless otherwise provided, are payable within 6 months after death of deceased.

INSURANCE AND JOINT BANK ACCOUNTS, ETC.

(Sec. 49) (2) Notwithstanding anything contained herein, property not exceeding \$1,500 in value or amount included in a succession may be transferred or paid without the consent of the Minister in each of the undermentioned cases, provided notice of such transfer or payment is given forthwith to the Minister, and that the property comes within any of the following classes, namely:—

(a) Moneys due under any contract of life insurance;
 (b) Moneys payable by any benevolent or friendly society to an estate of a deceased person or to any member or members of his family;

(c) Superannuation benefits payable to any member of the family of a deceased employee, including refunds of pension contributions.

(3) Notwithstanding anything contained herein property not exceeding \$500 in value or amount included in a succession, may be transferred or paid without the consent of the Minister, in each of the following cases, provided notice of such transfer or payment is given forthwith to the Minister, and that the property comes within any of the following classes, namely:—

- (a) Moneys in any branch of a bank;
- (b) Moneys deposited with a trust company, loan company, or similar institution;
- (c) Salary, wages or gratuities payable to the representatives or relatives of deceased employees.

AVOIDANCE OF DOUBLE TAXATION

A Convention between Canada and the United States of America was signed at Ottawa on June 8th 1944, having as its purpose the avoidance of double taxation in federal succession duties. This was amended by a Supplementary Convention taking effect on November 21st, 1951. A schedule outlining a similar agreement was signed between Canada and the United Kingdom on June 5, 1946. In 1948 an amendment to avoid double taxation in case of convention was adopted, the wording being as follows:

(4b.) Where Canada has entered into a convention or agreement with another country for the avoidance of double taxation pursuant to which duties are assessable under this Act exclusively in respect of the property situated in Canada where the deceased dies domiciled in that other country, the aggregate net value for the purpose of subsections four and four A means, in the case of a predecessor who dies domiciled in that other country, the aggregate net value of the property wherever situated.

SUMMARY OF PROVINCIAL SUCCESSION DUTIES ACTS

ALBERTA

Under agreement with the Dominion Government Alberta has vacated the succession duty field for a period of five years from April 1, 1947, although duties are payable on properties passing in estates for persons who died prior to that date. Enabling legislation was passed to extend this agreement from April 1, 1952. For list of exemptions from duty and rates of duty on such properties please refer to the 1949 edition of The Canadian Almanac and Directory.

BRITISH COLUMBIA

Under agreement with the Dominion Government British Columbia vacated the succession duty field for a period of five years from April 1, 1947, which agreement has been extended for a further period of five years ending March 31st, 1957, although duties are payable on properties passing prior to that date. For list of exemptions from duty and rates of duty on such properties please refer to the 1949 edition of The Canadian Almanac and Directory.

A Probate Fees Act applies to all estates where the date of death is subsequent to April 1, 1947, on any property passing under a Will or Intestacy.

MANITOBA

The Succession Duty Act, being Chapter 201 of the Revised Statutes of Manitoba, 1940, in so far as it is applicable to the cases of persons who die on or after the first day of April, 1947, is hereby suspended but otherwise shall remain in full force and effect.

The suspension effected by paragraph (1) shall not be deemed to be a repeal of the Act therein mentioned, but that Act shall, to the extent herein provided, be inoperative and remain suspended until such time as the suspension herein enacted is terminated.

(a) by an order-in-council to that effect, or
 (b) by an Act of the Legislature;
 and the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council is hereby authorized to make an order terminating such suspension effective on, from, and after, such date as may be fixed in the order.

This Act shall come into force on assent, but shall be retroactive and shall be deemed to have been in force on, from, and after, the first day of April, 1947.

NEW BRUNSWICK

Under agreement with the Dominion Government New Brunswick has vacated the succession duty field for a period of five years from April 1, 1947, although duties are payable on properties passing prior to that date. For list of exemptions from duty and rates of

duty on such properties please refer to the 1949 edition of The Canadian Almanac and Directory.

A new agreement, effective April 1, 1952, extends the former agreement with minor changes.

***NEWFOUNDLAND**

The Death Duties Act of 1934 together with amending Acts up to June 18, 1948, contain the following provisions:

Estates certified of less than \$5,000 shall pay no duties.

Insurance money to an amount not exceeding \$20,000 payable to a preferred beneficiary shall not form part of the estate of such deceased person where the preferred beneficiary is the widow of the deceased, or his dependent child under twenty years of age (or older if physically or mentally incapable of self-support). "Preferred beneficiary" is defined in the Life Insurance Act, 1943. The provisions of this paragraph apply only to estates of persons dying on or after June 1st, 1948.

Death duties are not payable on estates of members of any Allied forces or members of the Mercantile Marine of any Allied forces who die on active service or within twelve months from wounds or disease incurred on active service.

A new agreement has been entered into for a further period of five years to March 31, 1957.

ONTARIO

*The Succession Duty Act, being Chapter 378 of
The Revised Statutes of Ontario, 1960*

AGGREGATE VALUE

"Aggregate Value" which determines the normal rates of duty means the value at the death of the deceased of the property wherever situate passing on his death together with the value of all lifetime dispositions wherever made, where such dispositions are made on or after the first day of July, 1892, less debts, reasonable funeral expenses, Surrogate Court fees, solicitors fees for obtaining probate or letters of administration to the extent of \$100.00 and less the exemptions authorized by section 4 and specified below.

ESTATES EXEMPT FROM SUCCESSION DUTY

1. An estate, the aggregate value of which does not exceed \$5,000.00.

2. An estate, the aggregate value of which does not exceed \$10,000.00, where the only persons who participate are the following, or some of them:—

(a) Any brother or sister of the deceased;

(b) Any descendant of a brother or sister of the deceased;

(c) Any brother or sister of the father or mother of the deceased;

(d) Any descendant of a brother or sister of the father and mother of the deceased.

(e) The persons mentioned, or referred to, in 3, below, and any lineal ancestor of the deceased.

3. An estate, the aggregate value of which does not exceed \$50,000.00, where the only persons who participate are the following, or some of them: the grandfather, grandmother, father, mother, husband, wife, child, son-in-law or daughter-in-law of the deceased, or any of the persons mentioned below as being in the preferred class by virtue of the Ontario Adoption Act.

EXEMPTIONS FROM SUCCESSION DUTY, WHETHER OR NOT THE ESTATE AS A WHOLE IS EXEMPT.

By section 3 of The Succession Duty Act the following are exempt from duty but the property and dispositions with respect to which there are exemptions are nevertheless included for the purposes of arriving at the "Aggregate Value":

(a) Any property situate in Ontario passing on the death to any one person where the value of all the property so passing to such person does not exceed \$500.00;

(b) Any person to whom there is a transmission, with respect to such transmission, where the value of all the transmissions to such person, does not exceed \$500.00;

(c) Any person to whom a disposition is made, with respect to such disposition, where the value of all the dispositions to such person does not exceed \$500.00;

(d) Any property situate in Ontario passing on the death of the deceased to any one person where such property consists wholly of an annuity not exceeding \$100.00 or of an estate or interest for life or for a term in any property, the yearly income from which does not exceed \$100.00;

(e) Any person to whom there is a transmission, with respect to such transmission, where all the property in respect of which there are transmissions to such person consists wholly of an annuity not exceeding \$100.00 or of an estate or interest for life or for a term in any property the yearly income from which does not exceed \$100.00;

(f) Any person to whom a disposition is made, with respect to such disposition, where all the property in respect of which dispositions to such person are made consists wholly of an annuity not exceeding \$100.00, or of an estate or interest for life or for a term in any property the yearly income from which does not exceed \$100.00;

(g) Any property situate in Ontario passing on the death of the deceased to any member of the stranger class or where there is a trans-

mission to such member or a disposition to such member and where the value of all such property, transmissions and dispositions does not exceed \$1,000, provided that such member of the stranger class was in the employ of the deceased for a period of at least five years immediately prior to his death; or

(h) Any money payable as a result of the death of the deceased and any interest by way of annuity or otherwise accruing or arising on the death of the deceased, under any contract of insurance within the meaning of The Insurance Act where the deceased was domiciled outside Ontario at the date of his death.

NOTE: By further provisions in section 3, the total amount in respect of which no duty shall be levied under clauses a, b and c shall not exceed \$500.00;

The total amount in respect of which no duty shall be levied under clauses d, e and f shall not exceed an annuity or yearly income of \$100.00; and

Where by reason of clauses d, e and f no duty is levied, clauses a, b and c shall not apply.

SPECIAL REMISSION OF DUTY

Section 46 of the Act provides as follows:

Where the deceased dies from wounds inflicted, accident occurring or disease contracted within twelve months before death while in the active naval, military or air service of Her Majesty, the Treasurer may, if he thinks fit, remit the whole or any part of the duty for which the husband, wife, father, mother, child, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, brother or sister of the deceased is liable.

NOTE: If any remission is made under section 46 the property, transmission or disposition with respect to which such remission is made must nevertheless be included in the aggregate value.

FURTHER EXEMPTIONS

By section 4 of the Act there are exemptions with respect to the following and the property and dispositions concerned shall not be included in the aggregate value nor included for the purpose of determining any rate of duty.

(a) Any disposition for religious, charitable or educational purposes to any religious, charitable or educational organization which carries on its work solely in Ontario;

(b) Any property devised or bequeathed by the deceased for religious, charitable or educational purposes to any religious, charitable or educational organization which carries on its work solely in Ontario;

(c) Any disposition for religious, charitable or educational purposes to any religious, charitable or educational organization which carries on its work both in and outside Ontario to the extent of that portion in value of the property in respect of which the disposition is made as is in the same ratio to the whole that its expenditures for carrying on its work in Ontario bear to its total expenditures during such period as the treasurer may determine;

(d) That portion of any property devised or bequeathed by the deceased for religious, charitable or educational purposes to any religious, charitable or educational organization which carries on its work both in and outside Ontario as is in the same ratio to the whole that its expenditures for carrying on its work in Ontario bear to its total expenditures during such period as the treasurer may determine.

(e) Any property devised or bequeathed by the deceased to and any disposition to the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the Dominion of Canada, the Province of Ontario, or any municipality in Ontario;

(f) Any disposition for necessities or education to or for any member of the family of the deceased where it is shown to the satisfaction of the treasurer that such member was dependent in whole or in part on the deceased for such necessities or education;

(g) Any disposition to any person made more than five years before the date of death of the deceased, where actual and bonafide enjoyment and possession of the property in respect of which the disposition is made, was immediately

assumed by the person to whom the disposition is made and thenceforward retained to the entire exclusion of the deceased or of any benefit to him whether voluntary or by contract or otherwise, provided that this clause shall not apply to any disposition resulting in the making of any periodic payments, except such payments made more than five years before the date of death of the deceased;

- (h) Any money paid to or enjoyed by any member of the family of the deceased on or after the death of the deceased out of or in respect of any pension fund or scheme of general application to employees by reason of the employment of the deceased by the Dominion of Canada, the Province of Ontario or any municipality in Ontario;
- (i) Any non-commutable annuity, income or periodic payment effected in any manner other than by will or testamentary instrument and paid for by the deceased during his lifetime and paid to or enjoyed by the wife or dependent father or mother or any dependent brother, sister or child of the deceased after the death of the deceased, to the extent of \$1200.00 per annum with respect to any one person and to the extent of \$2400.00 per annum in the aggregate;
- (j) Any property devised or bequeathed by the deceased to and any disposition to the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, the Canadian Red Cross Society or any Patriotic Organization or Institution in Canada which receives the written approval of the Secretary of State of Canada; and
- (k) Any property passing on the death of the deceased to any religious, charitable or educational organization for religious, charitable or educational purposes carried out in any Province of Canada other than Ontario which is shown to the satisfaction of the Treasurer to allow the same exemption on property, given, devised or bequeathed to any religious, charitable or educational organization for religious, charitable or educational purposes carried out in Ontario.

NOTE—Notwithstanding anything set out above, with respect to "Further Exemptions", Clauses (a), (b), (c) and (d), in so far as they apply to religious organizations shall apply to such organizations as if the word "Canada" were substituted for the word "Ontario" wherever it appears in such Clauses.

The original enactment with respect to the above appears in the 1949 Amendments to the Act. A similar amendment was made in 1952 with respect to educational organizations. These amendments favor, to a considerable extent, religious and educational organizations throughout Canada so far as exemption from Ontario Duty is concerned.

Note 1—In addition to what is set out above the following will be in the Preferred Class, in so far as all Ontario Succession Duty Rates are concerned, by virtue of The Adoption Act, being Chapter 7 of the Revised Statutes of Ontario 1950:

- (i) a person adopted, at any age, under The Ontario Adoption Act and taking property by will or lifetime disposition from the adopting parent;
- (ii) the spouse of a person adopted and taking as in (i);
- (iii) the issue of a person adopted and taking as in (i);
- (iv) the adopting parent of a person adopted as in (i) who takes from the adopted person as in (i);
- (v) the adopting parent of a person adopted as in (i) where such adopting parent takes from the issue of such adopted person as in (i);

Note 2—If the spouse of a person, adopted under the Ontario Adoption Act inherits in his or her own right, on intestacy, from the adopting parent, he or she will be treated for all purposes of the Succession Duty Act, according to the natural relationship.

Note 3—The issue of any person, adopted under The Ontario Adoption Act, do not inherit, as such, on the intestacy of the adopting parent but they may inherit, on such intestacy, in their own right, in which case they will be treated for all purposes of The Succession Duty Act, according to the natural relationship.

There is one exception to what is set out immediately above. An example will clearly illustrate. Let us suppose that A were to adopt his nephew B when the latter was under the age of 12 years or that A stood in loco parentis to said adopted nephew for a period of at least five years during such nephew's infancy. Subsequently the nephew B dies leaving lawful issue. Say a son—C. Afterwards A dies intestate and C (his grandnephew) as A's next of kin, or one of them, inherits from A. The grandnephew C has then inherited in his own right from A but in such a case he will not be treated for purposes of Ontario Succession Duty according to his natural relationship to A but on the other hand will, for all purposes of The Succession Duty Act be treated as a child of A and so will be in the preferred class.

Note 4—An adopting parent who has adopted under The Ontario Adoption Act and who takes under the will of or lifetime disposition by the spouse of the person adopted is not entitled, as such, to the preferred rates. Such adopting parent will be taxed at whatever rates are applicable by reason of natural relationship, if taking by any means from such spouse.

Note 5—Where an adopting parent dies intestate, the person adopted by him under The Ontario Adoption Act, at any age, will inherit on such intestacy, the same as if he were the natural and lawful child of such parent. If under twelve years of age when so adopted or if the adopting parent stood in loco parentis to the person so adopted for a period of at least five years during the infancy of such person, then such person is a "child" under Clause (d) of Section 1, of The Succession Duty Act and would be in the preferred class for purposes of succession duty. Otherwise, the person so adopted will be taxed at the appropriate rates according to the natural relationship.

Note 6—An adoption order under The Ontario Adoption Act does not deprive the person adopted from inheriting on intestacy from his natural and lawful parents or other relatives or from taking under the will of or under a lifetime disposition by any person and the person so adopted will be taxed at the appropriate rates according to the natural relationship prevailing between him and the person from whom he inherits or takes.

Note 7—Where a person adopted under The Ontario Adoption Act dies intestate, his property acquired by himself or by gift or inheritance from his adopting parent or from the kindred of such parent, shall be distributed as though he had been born in lawful wedlock to his adopting parent but the beneficiaries shall be taxed at the appropriate rates, according to the natural relationship.

Note 8—Where a person, adopted under The Ontario Adoption Act dies intestate, the property acquired from his natural parent or kindred shall be distributed the same as if no adoption order had been made and the beneficiaries shall be taxed at the appropriate rates, according to the natural relationship.

Surtax Rate for Preferred Class 15%.

Section 2 of the Succession Duty Amendment Act, 1953, provides that the resultant duty, in the case of preferred beneficiaries, will not reduce what is left below \$50,000, or below the preferred beneficiaries' share of the \$50,000, as the case may be.

For the purposes of the Ontario Succession Duty Act, the term "child" shall mean,—(a) Lawful child of the deceased; (b) lineal descendant of any such child born in lawful wedlock; (c) person adopted by the deceased either under the Ontario Adoption Act, the Act of any Province, State or Country or informally, where such person was under the age of twelve years when adopted; (d) person to whom the deceased, during the infancy of such person, stood in loco parentis for a period of not less than five years; or (e) lineal descendant of the persons described in (c) and (d).

SCHEDULE OF RATES—COLLATERAL CLASS

Any lineal ancestor of the deceased, except the grandfather, grandmother, father or mother.

A brother or sister of the deceased or any descendant of such brother or sister; and a brother or sister of the father or mother of the deceased or any descendant of any such brother or sister.

MAKING RETURNS

Section 12 provides that every person to whom or for whose benefit any property situate in Ontario passes on the death of the deceased or to whom there is a transmission or to whom a disposition is made shall make returns to the Succession Duty Department. Such returns shall be made within three months after the death of deceased or within such further period as Treasurer may allow.

Section 12 also provides that the applicant for probate, administration or other grant shall, at the time of making application, make and file with the Succession Duty Department an affidavit containing,—

- (a) an inventory of all the property passing on the death of the deceased and particulars of all dispositions and such inventory shall show the value of such property and dispositions; and
- (b) the name of every person who benefits by any property passing on the death of the deceased or to whom a disposition is made, the place of residence of such person and the degree of relationship in which such person stands to the deceased.

NOTE—The terms "disposition" or "dispositions" where used under the above caption—"Making Returns" mean lifetime disposition or lifetime dispositions made by the deceased and do not include any disposition which he may have made by will.

WHEN AND HOW DUTY PAYABLE

Where an annuity, term of years, life estate, income or interest in expectancy is not involved, the duty levied shall be payable at the end of six months from the death of the deceased and for default there shall be added to such duty, interest at the rate of 5% per annum from date of death till payment.

In the case of an annuity, term of years, life estate or income which is not an interest in expectancy, the duty with respect to such shall be payable in a number of equal annual instalments equal to;—

- (a) the number of years
 - (i) of expectancy of life of the person who benefits, or
 - (ii) for which such annuity, term of years or income is to run, as the case may be; or

(b) ten, whichever is the lesser and such instalments shall commence one year after the death of the deceased and for default in payment of any of such instalments, there shall be added thereto interest at the rate of 5% per annum from the date on which such instalment became payable, until payment.

Duty with respect to any interest in expectancy may be paid as provided in paragraph 1.

The duty on any interest in expectancy, where an annuity, term of years, life estate or income is not involved, if not sooner paid, shall be due when such interest comes into possession and payable at the end of three months thereafter and in case of default there shall be added to such duty, interest at rate of 5 per cent per annum from the date of coming into possession until payment.

In the case of an annuity, term of years, life estate or income which is an interest in expectancy, the duty with respect to such, shall, if not sooner paid, be payable in a number of equal annual instalments as set out in Paragraph 2 above and such instalments shall commence one year after the date when such annuity, term of years, life estate or income commences to be enjoyed and for default in payment of any of such instalments, there shall be added thereto interest at the rate of 5% per annum from the date on which such instalment became payable, until payment.

ALLOWANCE FOR DUTY PAID IN OTHER JURISDICTIONS

For the purpose of avoiding double taxation on residents in Ontario an allowance shall be made for duty levied and paid on personal property situate in the jurisdictions mentioned below where the deceased owner died domiciled in Ontario, where such property passes to Ontario residents and where duty is levied on such residents, by Ontario, with respect to the transmission of such property. The allowance made by Ontario in such circumstances will be the amount of duty levied on such property by the foreign jurisdiction; provided however that if the duty levied on such property by the foreign jurisdiction exceeds the duty levied by Ontario with respect to the transmission of such property, the allowance will be the amount of the Ontario Duty.

The jurisdictions concerned are as follows:

- (a) The United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland;
- (b) The Union of South Africa;
- (c) The Commonwealth of Australia;
- (d) Eire;
- (e) The Dominion of New Zealand;
- (f) The other Provinces of the Dominion of Canada, save and except Newfoundland;
- (g) The District of Columbia; and
- (h) Each of the States of the United States of America.

The allowance to be made by Ontario, as aforesaid, shall apply where the deceased died on or after June 21st, 1946 and with the object of relieving Ontario citizens as far as possible, in this respect, the allowance shall be applicable whether or not the foreign jurisdictions, or any of them, make similar provisions in converse cases.

RE 1951-1952-1953 AMENDMENTS

There were a few amendments made to The Succession Duty Act in 1951. Among these was a very important re-enactment which provided that no duty would attach to the disposition mentioned below and that such disposition would not be included in the aggregate value nor included for the purpose of

determining any rate of duty. The disposition in question is as follows;—

Any disposition where actual and bona fide enjoyment and possession of the property in respect of which the disposition is made, was assumed more than five years before the date of death of the deceased by the person to whom the disposition is made, or by a trustee for such person, and thenceforward retained to the entire exclusion of the deceased or of any benefit to him whether voluntary or by contract or otherwise.

In addition to the 1952 Amendment referred to above, there was another amendment made to the Act in 1952 which provides that

any person may make payment not exceeding \$1500.00 under any pension fund, plan or scheme of general application to employees of whom the deceased was one, without the consent of the Treasurer, where payment is made to or for the benefit of any member or members of the family of the deceased, and notice of the making of payment shall be transmitted forthwith to the Treasurer.

The 1953 amendment referred to above in relation to preferred rates was designed to take care of a situation where the aggregate value was say, \$51,000., all going, e.g. to the widow. The duty at the applicable rates would be more than \$1000. The amendment in such cases, automatically reduces the duty to \$1000., thus leaving a clear \$50,000.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Under agreement with the Dominion Government Prince Edward Island vacated the succession duty field for a period of five years from April 1, 1947, although duties are payable on properties passing prior to that date. This agreement was renewed for an additional five years from April 1, 1952. For list of exemptions from duty and rates of duty on such properties please refer to the 1949 edition of The Canadian Almanac and Directory.

QUEBEC

EXEMPTIONS FROM DUTY

Since December 20th, 1951, where the aggregate value of the property transmitted in the direct line, ascending or descending, between consorts, between father- or mother-in-law and son- or daughter-in-law, and between stepfather or stepmother and stepson or stepdaughter, the following exemptions are granted:

(a) in all cases, an exemption from all succession duties on ten thousand dollars;

(b) in addition, an exemption from all succession duties on an amount of fifteen hundred dollars for each child, in the first degree, under twenty-five years of age, domiciled in this Province, left by and surviving the deceased.

Estates not exceeding \$1,000.00 in value and passing to immediate collaterals are duty free.

When the aggregate value of the property transmitted to a stranger in blood to the deceased, who has been in the employ of the deceased for at least five years, does not exceed one thousand dollars, no duty shall be exigible on such property or on the transmission thereof.

In estates which devolved since February 22nd, 1949, legacies, gifts and subscriptions for religious, charitable or educational purposes, as well as the proceeds of life insurance policies payable to churches and cemetery associations, are tax free regardless of the domicile of the benefiting institutions.

RATES OF DUTY

On property transmitted in the direct line, ascending or descending, between consorts, between father- or mother-in-law and son- or daughter-in-law, between stepfather or stepmother and stepson or stepdaughter, and on transmission between the same persons, the rates of duty shall be as follows:

In Estates the aggregate value of which:

Does not exceed \$10,000—Nil.

Exceeds \$10,000, not exceeding \$50,000—1% plus 1/25 of 1% for each full \$1,000.

Exceeds \$50,000, not exceeding \$100,000—1% plus 1/20 of 1% for each full \$1,000.

Exceeds \$100,000—5% plus 1/100 of 1% for each full \$1,000.

Provided, however, that the total so obtained shall not exceed 15% where aggregate value of Estate exceeds \$1,000,000.

Provided further that in addition to the above duty, a further duty is payable (on estates of which aggregate value exceeds \$10,000) as follows; Where the whole amount passing to one person:

Does not exceed \$50,000 — 1%.

Exceeds \$50,000, does not exceed \$300,000 — 1% plus 1/100 of 1% for each full \$1,000.

Exceeds \$300,000 — 3% plus 1/200 of 1% for each full \$1,000.

Provided, however, that the total rate so obtained shall not exceed 10%.

Higher duties provided in the case of collaterals, strangers, etc.

In 1945 an agreement was made between the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec providing for the avoidance of double taxation in regard to Succession Duties.

SASKATCHEWAN

Under agreement with the Dominion Government Saskatchewan has vacated the succession duty field as of April 1, 1947— for as long as The Dominion-Provincial Taxation Agreement continues in force— although duties are payable on properties passing prior to that date. For list of exemptions from duty and rates of duty on such properties please refer to the 1949 edition of The Canadian Almanac and Directory.

THE QUEEN AND ROYAL FAMILY THE HOUSE OF WINDSOR

In 1917 the late King George V., by Order-in-Council, changed the name of the Royal Family from the House of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha to the House of Windsor.

THE QUEEN.—Elizabeth the Second (Elizabeth Alexandra Mary, of Windsor) by the Grace of God, Queen of this realm and of her other realms and territories, head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith. Succeeded to the throne February 6th, 1952. Her Majesty, the elder daughter of the late King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, was born at 17 Bruton Street, London, W.1., on April 21st, 1926, married November 20th, 1947, H.R.H. the Duke of Edinburgh, K.G., K.T., R.N. As Heir Presumptive succeeded to the Throne on the death of her father, George VI, February 6, 1952, and was crowned June 2, 1953 at Westminster Abbey.

Second son of King George V and Queen Mary, he was born at York Cottage, Sandringham, on December 14th, 1895, married, April 26, 1923, Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon, daughter of the Earl and Countess of Strathmore. As Heir Presumptive succeeded to the Throne on the abdication of Edward VIII.

The Lord Chamberlain's Department has the general supervision of the Royal Household "above stairs," and also various duties toward the Sovereign and the Court. It is through the Lord Chamberlain that presentations at Court are arranged. In cities where there are royal palaces, he acts as the licenser of theatres. The Examiner of Plays is in the Department of the Lord Chamberlain. His sanction is necessary for the production of a play in any theatre in England at which a charge for admission is made.

THE QUEEN'S CIVIL LIST

Until George III. came to the throne in 1760, the income of the sovereign was derived chiefly from Crown lands, from a variety of landed property in England and Wales, Scotland and Ireland, in which the sovereign had a life-interest, and from which he received the rents. In the feudal ages these lands constituted a princely patrimony. In later times this Crown property was greatly reduced by lavish grants to royal favorites. At the Restoration the income from Crown lands was ascertained by a committee of the House of Commons to amount to £217,900 a year, in addition to £4,000 from the Forest of Dean. By the time Charles II. had been on the throne three years he had by his lavish bestowal of the lands on favorites reduced the income to \$100,000. William III., by his grants to favorites who had accompanied him from Holland, made further havoc with the Crown domains; so much so that at the accession of Queen Anne, Parliament endeavored to save the remnant by an Act (1 Anne, c. 8) which prohibited alienation of Crown lands, and enacted stringent provisions in regard to the length of the term for which they might be leased and the rents reserved.

In the year ended March 31, 1952, the sum of £880,000 was paid to the Exchequer by the Commissioners.

Queen Anne, George I. and George II. derived the larger part of their income from their life-interest in the Crown property, but when George III. came to the throne he surrendered his life-interest in the Crown lands. It was turned over to the nation in return for a fixed Civil List of £800,000, subsequently increased to £900,000. George IV., William IV., Queen Victoria and Edward VII., on their accessions, surrendered their life interest in the Crown lands in return for a Civil List. The same course has been taken by each subsequent monarch on coming to the throne.

Certain hereditary revenues have also been sur-

rendered to the Exchequer. These amounted to £370,000 in the year ended March 31, 1952.

In 1910 the King's Civil List was fixed at the yearly sum of £470,000, which was the same amount as that granted to King Edward VII.

By the Civil List Act of 1937, the civil list for King George VI was fixed at £410,000 subject to certain abatements which the revenues of the Duchy of Cornwall vested in His Majesty.

The Civil List Act, 1952, fixed the Civil list for Queen Elizabeth II at £475,000, allocated as follows:

This sum is subject to a reduction equal to a proportion of the net revenues of the Duchy of Cornwall, so long as the Duke of Cornwall is a minor.

In addition to the Civil List as above, provision is made for other members of the Royal Family on a per annum basis as follows:—

Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother, £70,000.

The Duke of Edinburgh, £40,000.

The Princess Margaret, £6,000, to be increased to £15,000 per annum in the event of marriage.

The Duke of Gloucester, £35,000.

The Princess Royal, £6,000.

From the above should be deducted the total of hereditary revenues, amounting to some £650,000, handed over to the state.

The revenue of the estates of the Duchy of Lancaster (which have been attached to the Crown since 1399), is paid over to the Keeper of Her Majesty's Privy Purse.

THE UNITED KINGDOM GOVERNMENT

The constitution of the House of Commons in the United Kingdom is governed by the Representation of the People Acts (1885-1948).

From 1801 to 1885 the membership stood at 658. This number was increased by the Representation of the People Act, 1885, to 670, and by a similar Act, 1918, again increased to 707. Following the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, membership was decreased to 615 as the result of reduction in the Irish representation. The Representation of the People Act, 1945, created 25 new constituencies and by a similar Act in 1948 the future membership was fixed at 625. University representation was abolished and former two-member constituencies were divided.

The House of Commons, as now constituted (1953) has therefore 625 members, with distribution of seats as follows: England, 506; Wales and Monmouth, 36; Scotland, 71; Northern Ireland, 12.

The present (40th) Parliament was elected at the General Election held on October 25, 1951.

The state of the parties resulting from this Election

was: Labour, 295, Conservatives (and associates), 320; Liberals, 6; Irish nationalists, 2; Irish Labour, 1; The Speaker, (non-party), 1.

The maximum duration of Parliament is five years. Members receive salaries of £1,000 per annum and travelling facilities between London, home and constituency on Parliamentary duties.

The House of Lords (December 1951) was composed as follows: Peers of royal blood, 4; Archbishops, 2; Dukes, 21; Marquises 27; Earls, 134; Viscounts 98; Bishops, 24; Barons, 526; Scottish representative peers, 16; Irish representative peers, 5; total 857 of whom 25 are unitors, making the actual number in the House of Lords, 832.

No title attaches to office in Cabinet or Administration. The title Right Honourable is given to all Privy Councillors. These are appointed for life, and every member of the Cabinet who is not already of the Privy Council is made a Privy Councillor.

THE OFFICE OF PRIME MINISTER

10, Downing Street, Whitehall, S.W.

Until comparatively recent times the office of Prime Minister was not recognised officially. It had developed as a consequence of the establishment of responsible government under a party leader, but the Prime Minister, as such, had no official rank and no precedence. It was not until 1905 that the Prime Minister was given precedence, by Royal Warrant, next after the Archbishop of York and over every

THE TREASURY

Great George Street, S.W.1.

The Treasury is the Department which deals with all matters of public finance, home and overseas; gives sanction for expenditure by the spending departments, civil and military, and is responsible for personnel questions throughout the Civil Service. The Treasury presents the estimate of all the Civil Departments to Parliament, but, after presentation, the responsibility for defending them in Parliament rests with the Parliamentary Heads of the Departments. The control of the Treasury is nominally in the hands of the Lords Commissioners consisting of the First Lord of the Treasury (who is also the Prime Minister), the Chancellor of the Exchequer and five Junior Lords. The Prime Minister and first Lord is not primarily concerned in the day-to-day aspects of Treasury business nor are the Junior Lords and the Parliamentary Secretary who are Government Whips in the House of Commons. The higher departmental direction of Treasury business devolves on the Chancellor of the Exchequer, who is assisted at Ministerial level by the Financial Secretary and the Economic Secretary.

THE FOREIGN OFFICE

The Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs is the Minister of the Crown responsible, subject always to the collective responsibility of the Cabinet, for the conduct of the foreign relations of the United Kingdom Government. He receives reports from, and issues instructions to, Foreign Service representatives abroad, and corresponds with foreign diplomatic representatives at the Court of St. James. He is the channel of communication between other government departments and private individuals in this country and foreign governments, and has, in addition, a number of duties of a formal nature. He is assisted both in Parliament and in administration by the Minister of State and the Parliamentary Under-Secretaries of State.

THE COMMONWEALTH RELATIONS OFFICE

In July, 1925, a Secretaryship of State for Dominion Affairs was created, and as a result the Dominions Office was set up, to take over from the Colonial Office, business connected with the self-governing Dominions including the Irish Free State (now the Republic of Ireland), the self-governing Colony of Southern Rhodesia, the South African High Commission Territories (Basutoland, the Bechuanaland Protectorate and Swaziland), and business relating to Newfoundland. One Minister combined the duties of the new post with those of Secretary of State for the Colonies until the 13th June, 1930, when Dominion Affairs became the entire charge of a principal Secretary of State.

In July, 1947, the Secretaryship for Commonwealth Relations replaced that for Dominion Affairs and, in August of that year, the responsibility for the conduct of relations with India and Pakistan was transferred to the Secretary of State for Commonwealth Relations from the Secretary of State for India, the latter post being abolished. In February, 1948, the Secretary of State for Commonwealth Relations took over, from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, responsibility for relations with Ceylon which became an equal Member of the Commonwealth on February 4, 1948.

The Colonial Office dates back to 1660, when a Committee of the Privy Council was appointed for "The Plantations", as the Colonies were then called. A Secretary of State was first appointed in 1768, but when the United States secured their independence in 1783 the office of Colonial Secretary was abolished and colonial affairs were managed from the Home Office. The War Department assumed responsibility for the Colonies from 1794 until the post of Secretary of State was revived in 1854. In 1907, a new department of the Colonial Office was set up to administer the affairs of the Dominions and the self-governing Colonies.

A separate Dominions Office was established in 1925, which became in 1947 the Commonwealth Relations Office.

THE ADMIRALTY

THE MINISTRY OF EDUCATION

Curzon Street, London, W.1

The Education Department exercises supervision
over the various departments of state-aided education,
and distributes the grants for education annually
made by Parliament (apart from the Universities,
which receive grant through a Committee of the
Treasury). These grants date from 1833. In 1839
the Committee of Council for Education was estab-
lished. The Vice-President was always a member of
the House of Commons, and his office was a fore-
runner of the present office of Education.

In 1900 the Committee of Council for Education
came to an end and its powers were transferred to
the Board of Education. This was not a "board" in
the usual sense, but an ordinary Government Depart-
ment. The political Head was called President of the
Board of Education and he was assisted by a Parlia-
mentary Secretary, who, like the President, was a
member of the Government and sat in Parliament.

In 1944 a new Education Act was passed by
Parliament. This measure, regarded as one of the
most outstanding in recent British legislation, framed
the complete reconstruction of the public system of
education in England and Wales. The Act set up a
Ministry of Education, and defined the Minister's
duty as being "to promote the education of the people
of England and Wales and the progressive develop-
ment of institutions devoted to the purpose, and to
secure the effective execution by local authorities,
under his control and direction, of the national policy
for providing a varied and comprehensive educational
service in every area".

Among its many reforms, the Act re-organised the
local administration of education; provided for raising
the age of compulsory school attendance to fifteen;
laid down the principle of free secondary education
for all; and established school meals and school
health services.

THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH

The Ministry of Health came into existence on July
1st, 1919. It then took over the functions of the Local
Government Board in connection with the administra-
tion of the Poor Law and of the laws affecting local
government, with enlarged powers as regards public
health. It also took over from the National Health
Insurance Commissioners the administration of the
National Insurance Acts.

In 1945, the National Health Insurance was
transferred to the newly formed Ministry of National
Insurance. In January, 1951, the responsibility for
housing and local government, water and sewerage
and certain civil defence matters, was transferred to
the newly formed Ministry of Local Government and
Planning (whose title was changed in October, 1951
to the Ministry of Housing and Local Government).
The Minister of Health remained responsible for
legislation covering the National Health Service,
including Mental Health; the Health Professions;
Public Health; International Health questions;
matters relating to drugs and therapeutic substances;
certain aspects of food and nutritional questions;
National Assistance; and Civil Defence (First Aid
and Casualty Services, National Hospital Service
Reserve, Welfare and Ambulance Services).

The Board of Trade is in charge of the administration of the laws relating to limited liability companies, and bankruptcy.

THE POST OFFICE

The British Post Office administers and operates the inland and overseas postal, telegraph and telephone services of the United Kingdom. The overseas telegraph and telephone services include wireless communication with ships at sea and radio telephone service. The remittance of money is also undertaken by means of money orders (postal and telegraph), postal orders and the cash-on-delivery system. The maintenance of the Post Office Savings Bank and the Post Office Register of Government Stocks and the issue, registration and repayment of National Savings Certificates are among the Government agency services undertaken. Other agency services include payment of pensions, allowances and postal drafts issued by various Government Departments, the sale of State insurance and revenue stamps and the sale and issue of licences. The approximate surplus over expenditure in 1951-52 was £5,407,820.

THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES

The Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries was constituted in 1919. It replaced the Board of Agriculture, established in 1889, which in 1903 had become the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries. The Ministry is responsible, in England and Wales, for promoting the efficiency of agriculture and fisheries. It provides for advice to farmers and horticulturists through the National Agricultural Advisory Service and to landowners through the Agricultural Land Service. The Minister's executive agents in the field are the County Agricultural Executive Committees. The Ministry has powers and duties in relation to agricultural education, research, marketing, machinery, and labour; the eradication of pests and diseases (the Ministry is responsible for diseases of animals matters in Scotland as well as in England and Wales); the distribution of scarce farm requisites; and control (where necessary) of imports and exports of agricultural produce and supplies; reviews of farm prices; and the collection and publication of agricultural statistics.

The Fisheries Department of the Ministry is responsible for administering the Acts governing the catching and landing of fish, and whaling; and conducts scientific investigations into problems of marine and freshwater fisheries.

The administration of the Ordnance Survey and of Kew Gardens is under the control of the Ministry.

THE MINISTRY OF LABOUR AND NATIONAL SERVICE

This Ministry was created in 1916 to take over the Labour Exchanges set up in 1910. It played a prominent part in the allocation of labour to war production during World War I. Later it developed as a department for the administration of many social measures, including the training of adults and juveniles, conciliation in industrial disputes and the promotion of welfare activities. During World War II it was responsible for the mobilisation of the nation for the war effort. It is now responsible for promoting employment in accordance with the requirements of the community, the registration, medical examination and calling-up of men under the National Service Acts and their resettlement on return to civilian employment, as well as for factory inspection.

THE MINISTRY OF TRANSPORT AND CIVIL AVIATION

The Ministry of Transport was established under the provisions of the Ministry of Transport Act, 1919, for the purpose of improving the means of, and facilities for, locomotion and transport. The Act transferred to the Ministry the powers and duties formerly exercised by other Government Departments in relation to (a) railways; (b) light railways; (c) tramways; (d) canals, waterways and inland navigations; (e) roads, bridges and ferries, and vehicles and traffic thereon; (f) harbours, docks and piers.

In order to secure further co-ordination in the recent war it was decided to merge the Ministry of Shipping and the Ministry of Transport, and this was made effective on May 9, 1941, when the Ministry of War Transport was created.

As from 1st April, 1946 the name was changed to 'Ministry of Transport', and the Ministry continues to be responsible for carrying out the government's policy in shipping matters, the administration of the merchant shipping acts and H. M. COASTGUARD SERVICE, as well as for inland transport matters.

The Ministry is responsible for the control of all United Kingdom merchant shipping in war, whether in military or civil employment, and for such merchant shipping services as the armed forces require in peace (e.g. for troopng).

MINISTRY OF SUPPLY

The Ministry of Supply was formed on 1st April 1946 by the amalgamation of the war time Ministries of Supply and Aircraft Production.

The primary function of the Ministry is to furnish supplies to the Fighting Services and to undertake research on, and the design and development of equipment for these Services, principally for the Army and Royal Air Force, but including aircraft, vehicles, some guns and ammunition and other equipment for the Royal Navy. Other functions are to sponsor the production of certain goods which are of economic importance at the present time and to carry the primary Government responsibility in the field of engineering and in the non-ferrous and light metal industries; to develop new types of civil aircraft, including those required by the National Airlines, and to undertake research on and the production of atomic energy.

MINISTRY OF HOUSING AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT

The Ministry of Housing and Local Government, under the title of Ministry of Local Government and Planning, was constituted in 1951 to take over the housing and local government functions of the Ministry of Health and the planning functions of the Ministry of Town and Country Planning (1943-1951).

The Ministry is responsible for the administration of Government housing policy, housing standards, and general supervision of the housing programmes carried out by local authorities.

The town and country planning work of the Ministry includes the framing of general policy concerning the use and development of land throughout England and Wales, and the guidance of local planning authorities, New Towns' Development Corporations, and the National Parks Commission in the carrying out of the planning functions allotted to them. The Ministry also co-ordinates the interests of Government Departments in the development of land.

In local government, the Ministry is the main link between local authorities and the central government.

allowances in August, 1946. After the National Insurance (Industrial Injuries) Act and National Insurance Act became law in July and August, 1946, the Ministry was engaged in the arrangements for bringing the two schemes into full operation on 5th July, 1948. The Acts provide several unemployment and welfare benefits.

The Ministry of Pensions which, since 1917, had been responsible for paying pensions for disablement and deaths due to war service, ceased to exist as a separate entity on 31st August, 1953, when its functions were amalgamated with the Ministry of National Insurance.

Under the National Assistance Act, 1948, the National Assistance Board is responsible for the grant of financial assistance, at the expense of the Exchequer, to persons in Great Britain who are without resources, or whose resources (including national insurance benefits, but not wages from full-time work which disqualifies for national assistance) need to be supplemented in order to meet their requirements. The general standards by reference to which assistance is granted are determined by statutory regulations approved by Parliament. Persons who are dissatisfied with the amount of assistance granted to them may appeal to a local independent Appeal Tribunal.

The Board have various other functions including the payment of non-contributory old age and blind pensions, the assessment of applications for free legal aid, and agency duties for other Departments where questions of need are involved.

The Central Office of Information was established in 1946 as the successor to the war-time Ministry of Information. It is a common service agency for the production of information and publicity material and the supply of general publicity services required by Government Departments. Both for the home and oversea ministerial Departments it produces and distributes books, pamphlets, magazines, films, exhibitions, photographs and other visual material. It conducts all official press and poster advertising except that of the National Savings Committee, carries out social surveys, and distributes Departmental news to the Press and the BBC. For the oversea Departments, it supplies British information posts with a daily service of news-background and comment and with a comprehensive reference service. Administratively, the Central Office is responsible to Treasury Ministers, while the Ministers whose Departments it serves are responsible for the policy expressed in its work.

INCOME TAX RATES AND DEATH DUTIES IN GREAT BRITAIN, 1953-1954

The standard rate of Income Tax in the United Kingdom (Great Britain and Northern Ireland) for the year 1953/54 imposed by the Finance Act, 1953, is 9/- in the pound.

Earned Income Allowance etc.—Two-ninths of the earned income up to a maximum allowance of £450; where total income does not exceed £250 a deduction of two-ninths of total income is allowed; persons aged 65 and upwards whose total income does not exceed £600 are allowed a deduction of two-ninths of total income; certain marginal provisions apply to incomes immediately above the limits of £250 and £600.

Personal Allowance.—Married man £210, other persons £120.

Additional allowance for wife's earned income, 7/9ths of that income up to a maximum of £120.

Child Allowance.—£85 for each child under 16 years of age, or over 16 if receiving full-time education, or, in certain circumstances, full-time vocational training.

Housekeeper Allowance.—£60 for a widower's or widow's housekeeper; an unmarried person's widowed mother or other female relative taking care of children; or, in certain circumstances, a female person employed or maintained to take charge of children.

Dependent Relative Allowance. Where incapacitated by old age or infirmity, not exceeding £60. In certain other circumstances not exceeding £40.

The income remaining after deduction of these reliefs is known as the taxable income; the first £100 of taxable income is charged at 2/6 in the £, the next £150 at 5/- in the £, the next £150 at 7/- in the £ and the remainder at the standard rate. Where the taxable income includes earned income of the wife, the amounts of taxable income chargeable at the reduced rates of 2/6, 5/- and 7/- in the £ may in certain circumstances be increased to £200, £300 and £300 respectively. Certain relief from tax is given in respect of life insurance premiums paid, in accordance with statutory provisions.

A portion of the tax payable by individuals for years 1941-42 to 1945-46 has been earmarked as a Post War Credit to be made available to the Taxpayer at a date to be determined. The Post War Credit for all five years is now being made available to men taxpayers aged 65 and over and to women taxpayers aged 60 and over.

SUR-TAX

On incomes in excess of £2,000 a further charge or tax is imposed, called the Sur-tax, which is payable as a deferred instalment of Income Tax on the 1st January following the year of assessment. Thus the Sur-tax in respect of the year 1951/52 is payable on the 1st January, 1953. The additional rates charged on these incomes begin at 2s. 0d. in the £ on the first £500 of the excess over £2,000, and rise by steps to the rate of 10s. 0d. in the £ payable on the excess over £15,000.

PROFITS TAX

The tax introduced in 1937 as the National Defence Contribution has, as from 1 January, 1947, been renamed the Profits Tax. The Profits Tax is imposed on the profits of all trades or businesses (excluding professions); as from 1st January, 1947 it applies only to corporate bodies and unincorporated societies and as from that date investment income is included in computing profits. The rate of tax is 22½% on distributed profits and 2½% on undistributed profits. If the profits are less than £2,000, no tax is payable. If the profits exceed

£2,000 but are less than £12,000, an abatement is allowed.

EXCESS PROFITS LEVY

The Levy, which is chargeable in addition to Income Tax and Profits Tax, is charged upon the excess profits for the period beginning Jan. 1, 1952 and ending Dec. 31, 1953, of bodies corporate resident in the United Kingdom, and in the case of non-resident bodies corporate, on the excess profits of any trade or business carried on in the United Kingdom. The excess profit is the profit in excess of the standard profit. The standard profit is, in general, the average profits for any two of the three years 1947, 1948 and 1949. Where profits in any one of the two years are low, 8% of the average paid-up share capital in that year may be substituted for the actual profits. Alternative standards may be chosen based on 10% of paid-up share capital or 8% of net assets at either 31st December, 1946, or 31st December, 1951. New businesses are, in general, entitled to a standard of 12% of paid-up share capital. All standards are subject to an adjustment for new share capital or capital repaid, and for undistributed profits or any over-distribution of profits. There is a minimum standard of £5,000. The amount of the Levy is 30% of the excess profits, subject to an over-riding limitation of 15% of total profits. Where profits in any year fall short of the standard the deficiency may be set against previous or future excesses.

DOUBLE TAXATION RELIEF

Relief from United Kingdom income tax (including sur-tax), profits tax and the excess profits levy is allowed in respect of taxes of a similar nature in Commonwealth or foreign countries.

As between the United Kingdom and Canada there is a special arrangement, signed on 5th June 1946, under which certain classes of income derived from one country by a resident of the other country are exempt from tax in the former country. Where both countries continue to tax, full relief for the double taxation is given by the country of residence of the taxpayer. The United Kingdom has similar arrangements with the United States and a number of other countries.

Where no such arrangement is in operation, a person resident in the United Kingdom is entitled to relief in respect of tax paid in the country in which income arises. This relief is limited, where the country is within the Commonwealth, to three quarters of the total United Kingdom tax on the income, and in other cases to half of the total United Kingdom tax. This new relief, which applies as from the year 1950/51, supersedes a previously existing scheme for relief in respect of taxes paid in Commonwealth countries.

An agreement between the United Kingdom and Canada for avoidance of double death duties was signed on 5th June, 1946.

BRITISH CUSTOMS DUTIES ON IMPORTS

Under the British Import Duties Act, 1932, a duty of customs, known as the "general ad valorem duty", equal to 10 per cent of the value of the goods, is chargeable on all goods imported into the United Kingdom, with certain exceptions. On specified classes of goods "additional duties" are chargeable as well as the general ad valorem duty. These additional duties are imposed by Treasury Orders made in accordance with the provisions of the Import Duties Act, 1932. Certain goods are exempt.

The Ottawa Agreements Act, 1932, provided for the charge of duty on certain goods, mainly foodstuffs, of non-Commonwealth origin.

Under the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921, Key Industry duty is chargeable on goods such as optical glass and optical instruments, scientific instruments and synthetic organic chemicals of non-Commonwealth origin.

Duty is also chargeable under other enactments, the main classes of goods liable being, Beef and Veal, Beer, Hydrocarbon Oils, Silk, Spirits, Sugar, Tobacco and Wine.

Goods (except Hydrocarbon Oil) of approved Canadian origin coming within the scope of the above Acts are admitted either free of duty or at a preferential rate.

IMPERIAL PREFERENCE

The general conditions governing admission of imported goods to Imperial Preference are that the goods must be shown to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of Customs and Excise to have been consigned from and grown, produced or manufactured in the British Commonwealth. Manufactured articles are not entitled to Preference unless a prescribed proportion of their value is derived from expenditure of a prescribed kind which has been incurred in the British Commonwealth or the United Kingdom in respect of materials grown or produced or work done in the British Commonwealth or the United Kingdom. Different proportions of value have been prescribed for different classes of manufactured goods.

Full information as to the qualifications for and method of claiming preference may be obtained from the Secretary, H. M. Customs, King's Beam House, Mark Lane, London, E.C. 3, from any Collector of Customs and Excise or from H.M. Trade Commissioners and Trade Correspondents in the Overseas

Dominions; also from Department of Trade and Commerce Foreign Tariffs Division, Ottawa.

Schedules of all dutiable goods and rates of duty are included in the "Customs and Excise Tariff of the United Kingdom and Northern Ireland," published periodically by H. M. Stationery Office, York House, Kingsway, London, W.C. 2, with amendments.

IMPORT LICENCES

Under the Import of Goods (Control) Orders 1940, as amended, no goods (other than goods consigned from the Channel Islands) may be imported into the United Kingdom except under the authority of a licence granted by the Board of Trade. Separate licences are not, however, required for limited lists of goods consigned from all countries or Empire countries respectively where Open General Licences have been issued.

Details of the goods covered by these Open General Licences are published from time to time in the Board of Trade Journal and in "Notices to Importers" issued by the Import Licensing Department of the Board of Trade.

PURCHASE TAX

The United Kingdom Purchase Tax is a single-stage sales tax charged at *ad valorem* rates on specified classes of goods. In general, liability to tax arises when the goods pass from the wholesaler to the retailer. Manufacturers and wholesale merchants dealing in chargeable goods must be registered. This enables them to deal with one another freely in the goods, or to export them without liability to tax. Tax becomes chargeable when the goods are sold by the registered manufacturer or wholesaler to an unregistered person, generally the retailer, or where there is no retail stage, to the public.

Purchase Tax is levied on chargeable goods imported into the United Kingdom, with the exception of goods imported for a registered wholesale merchant or a registered manufacturer as stock for his business or as materials. Such imported goods would become chargeable with tax (in the same way as goods of United Kingdom origin) if subsequently sold by the registered trader to an unregistered person.

The tax was first imposed by the Finance (No. 2) Act, 1940, and came into operation on 21st October, 1940, at two rates—16 $\frac{2}{3}$ % and 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ % of the wholesale value of the goods. Successive legislative changes in later years altered the schedules of taxable goods and at one period raised the number of rates to five, the highest rate then being 125% of the wholesale value. The rates are now fewer and lower, and at present (July 1953) there are three rates—25%, 50% and 75% of the wholesale value. In the case of cloth, apparel, household textile articles and furniture, relief from tax is allowed, wholly or in part, by means of a scheme introduced in 1952 under which the tax is charged only on the amount, if any, by which the wholesale value of the article concerned exceeds a fixed sum.

Latest information about the tax is set out in Notice No. 78 and related Notices, obtainable from the Commissioners of Customs and Excise, King's Beam House, Mark Lane, London, E.C. 3.

IMPERIAL AND COMMONWEALTH CONFERENCES

The "Imperial Conference" was constituted under the terms of a resolution of the "Colonial Conference," 20th April, 1907.

Prior to the Conference of 1907 there were four Colonial Conferences (three in London and one in Ottawa) in the years 1887, 1894, 1897 and 1902.

Imperial Conferences were held in: 1911, 1918, (Imperial War Conference) 1921, 1923, 1926, 1930, 1932 (Imperial Economic Conference, Ottawa) and 1937.

The Imperial Conference of 1937, held in London, discussed: (1) Foreign Affairs; (2) Defence; (3) General review of the progress of Empire Trade; (4) Colonial Affairs. No "Imperial" Conference, as such, has been held since.

On 1st November, 1939, the first of a series of informal War Conferences was held in London, attended by the British Prime Minister with Ministers of the War Cabinet and Dominion Ministers.

On October 11, 12 and 13, 1943, a conference of representatives of Britain, the Dominions and India met to form recommendations to be made to their

Governments respecting post-war civil aviation.

On May 1, 1944, a meeting of Dominion Premiers was opened in London for consultation on war problems and post-war plans.

In 1945, prior to the meeting of the United Nations at San Francisco, a British Commonwealth Conference was held in London, from April 5-14, 1945.

In 1946 a Conference of Dominion Prime Ministers was held in London in May-June which was attended by the Prime Minister of Canada (Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King).

During the Sessions of the Peace Conference in Paris, which opened on 29th July, the Canadian Premier with other Dominion leaders met the British Foreign Secretary of State at an informal gathering to discuss problems of the Conference in general and aspects of the five draft peace treaties of special interest to the Dominions.

Other Commonwealth Conferences took place during 1946 in which Canadian delegates participated.

Empire Conferences in 1947 in which Canada participated included a conference of representatives

from British Commonwealth countries to discuss citizenship, (February); the British Commonwealth Forestry Conference (London, June); Commonwealth and Empire Health and Tuberculosis Conference (London, July); and a Conference of Empire Survey Officers (London, August).

In 1948 the African Conference was held at Lancaster House, London, from September 29th to October 6th. It marked the first time that the African peoples, represented largely by those of their own race, met together to plan the future of a large part of their continent.

A Conference of Commonwealth Prime Ministers was held in London from October 11th to October 22nd. In addition to Great Britain, the countries represented were Canada, Australia, South Africa, New Zealand, Southern Rhodesia, India, Pakistan and Ceylon.

Vital problems of common concern to the countries of the Commonwealth were reviewed. These included: Foreign affairs in relation to Communist activities in various countries; economic recovery and reconstruction in Europe and in the Near and Far East; Western Union and the Berlin impasse; Commonwealth defence; improved machinery for Commonwealth consultation; the status of High Commissioners; world trade, with particular reference to the dollar deficit and the universal need throughout the Commonwealth for more capital goods; and the maintenance of world peace.

During the same month (October 1948) a Commonwealth Parliamentary Conference was also held in London. Twenty Commonwealth Parliaments were represented including delegates from Canada. Recent constitutional developments in India and elsewhere were discussed. Other problems examined included the position and rights of back benchers, the appointment of Ministers outside Parliament, the effect of the growing power of the Executive on Parliamentary institutions, the working of the party system, and the composition and role of Second Chambers.

In 1949 the Commonwealth Prime Ministers met in London (April 22nd to April 28th) to discuss constitutional problems relating to INDIA, under the Chairmanship of Mr. Attlee, Prime Minister of Great Britain. At the conclusion of this Conference, the following declaration was made:

"The Governments of the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, India, Pakistan and Ceylon, whose countries are united as Members of the British Commonwealth of Nations and owe a common allegiance to the Crown, which is also the symbol of their free association, have considered the impending constitutional changes in India.

"The Government of India have informed the other Governments of the Commonwealth of the intention of the Indian people that under the new constitution which is about to be adopted India shall become a sovereign independent republic. The Government of India have however declared and affirmed India's desire to continue her full membership of the Commonwealth of Nations and her acceptance of The King as the symbol of the free association of its independent member nations and as such the Head of the Commonwealth.

"The Governments of the other countries of the Commonwealth, the basis of whose membership of the Commonwealth is not hereby changed, accept and recognise India's continuing membership in accordance with the terms of this declaration.

"Accordingly the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, India, Pakistan and Ceylon hereby declare that they remain united as free and equal members of the Commonwealth of Nations, freely co-operating in the pursuit of peace, liberty, and progress."

These constitutional questions were the sole subject of discussion at the full meetings of the Prime Ministers. The conference declaration was acclaimed as the most important development in the history of the Commonwealth since the famous Balfour Declaration at the Imperial Conference of 1926.

At the Conference of Commonwealth Foreign Ministers held at Colombo, Ceylon, from January 9th to 15th 1950, attended by Ministers and delegates from the United Kingdom and all countries of the

British Commonwealth, Canada was represented by Mr. L. B. Pearson, Secretary of State for External Affairs.

Eleven plenary sessions were held under the chairmanship of Mr. Senanayake, Prime Minister of Ceylon, during which a comprehensive review was made of the political and economic problems of South East Asia and the Far East.

The Conference gave particular attention to the current situation of Indo-China, Burma and Malaya, and discussed the question of the recognition of the new régime in China and the future relation of Commonwealth countries with China. They also reconsidered, in the light of subsequent developments, the provisional conclusions reached at the Commonwealth Conference held in Canberra in 1947 on the conditions for a peace settlement with Japan. Finally, the Conference were informed of the political situation in Europe and the Middle East, and of steps which were being taken to promote closer political and economic co-operation among the countries of Western Europe and between them and the United States of America and Canada. The Conference agreed that there need be no inconsistency between the policy followed by the United Kingdom Government in relation to Western Europe and the maintenance of the traditional links between the United Kingdom and the rest of the Commonwealth.

The seventh Imperial Press Conference, opened at Quebec City in June, 1950, was attended by delegations, including prominent newspaper owners and editors, from Britain, Australia, Canada, New Zealand, South Africa and India. Other Commonwealth countries represented by one member were Pakistan, Ceylon, British West Indies, Bahamas, Bermuda, Fiji, Gibraltar, Malta and Malaya. Discussions covered the freedom of the Press, developments in the field of telecommunications, inter-Commonwealth rates for press messages, and other subjects of common interest.

In June 1951, a Conference of Commonwealth Defence Ministers was held in London. The main purpose of this Conference was to consider certain defence problems of world strategic importance. Shipping facilities, military training and the adoption by Britain of the new 0.280 rifle, were also subjects of discussion.

Shortly after the conclusion of the Conference held by the North Atlantic Treaty Organization Council at Ottawa (September 1951) when, for the first time, member Governments were represented by Foreign Ministers, Defence Ministers and Economic or Finance Ministers, a Conference of Commonwealth Ministers concerned with the supply of raw materials and manufactured goods, opened in London (September 24). The British Minister of Materials, Mr. Stokes, presided. This Conference, lasting for one week, considered means of increasing production of scarce materials at stable prices within the Commonwealth and of assisting the Dominions and Colonies in planning their programmes for exported equipment. The needs of rearmament had first consideration but deliberations of the Conference included a survey of the demand for raw materials when defence needs had been met; a review of the prospects for production consumption and prices of raw materials in relation to world economic trends; the effects of shortage of materials in the supply of manufactured goods; Britain's export prospects, and other cognate subjects.

The Commonwealth Economic Conference held in London in the autumn of 1952, preceded by meetings of representative financial advisers and officials, was convened to co-ordinate measures for increasing the economic strength of the Commonwealth countries, including the Colonial territories.

This Conference agreed to seek the co-operation of the United States and European countries in a plan incorporating international action for the progressive removal of import restrictions by both creditor and debtor countries and the restoration by progressive stages of the convertibility of sterling when conditions permitted. Agreement was also reached on (a) development in the sterling area to be concentrated on projects contributing to the improvement of the area's balance of payments with the rest of the world; (b) Britain undertaking to try to provide additional capital for Commonwealth development by facilitating the financing of such

projects, and to make sterling available for loan by the International Bank for certain projects.

The British Foreign Secretary, summarizing the results of the Conference, said that the Commonwealth Economic Conference had concentrated on three main objectives—the avoidance of recurrent economic crises, the ending of restrictive policies and the promotion of internal financial stability. These ends could be attained by sound internal policies, economic development, and freer trade and payments. The Commonwealth countries did not seek the creation of a discriminatory economic bloc but wished to strengthen themselves, to benefit the world economy generally.

After the coronation in 1953 there was a Prime Ministers' Meeting in London from June 3 to June 9 which discussed foreign affairs, particularly the state of relations with the Soviet Union, the Korean negotiations, and the position in the Middle East. The Prime Ministers agreed that no opportunity should be lost of composing, or at least easing, the differences which divided the world, but recognized that the democracies must maintain their strength and exercise unceasing vigilance to preserve their

rights and liberties. They exchanged views on steps which should be considered after the end of hostilities in Korea for the promotion of stability and progress throughout the Far East and Southeast Asia. They recognized the international importance of the Suez Canal and of the effective maintenance of the military installations in the Canal Zone, and agreed that it was in the common interest that the outstanding issues in the Middle East should be settled on the basis of ensuring the peace and security of the Middle East countries consistently with the sovereignty of each, and promoting their social and economic development. In the economic field, they reviewed developments since the Commonwealth Economic Conference of 1952, and agreed that the Commonwealth countries should adhere to the long-term objectives and lines of policy then laid down.

Particular attention was given to the need for stimulating economic development, expanding exports, and, consistently with the maintenance of adequate reserves, removing progressively restrictions on trade over as wide an area as possible and especially within the Commonwealth and the sterling area.

THE ROYAL NAVY

ADMINISTRATION

The Royal Navy is governed by the Board of Admiralty in Whitehall, headed by the First Lord of the Admiralty, who is a Minister of the Government. The Naval members of the Board consist of five Sea Lords, a Vice-Chief of Naval Staff and Deputy Chief of Naval Staff. Other civilian members of the Board are the Parliamentary and Financial Secretary and the Civil Lord, who are also Ministers of the Government, and the Permanent Secretary, who is a Civil Servant.

The Royal Marines are administered by the Commandant-General, Royal Marines, under the direction of the Board of Admiralty. Although not a member of the Board, the Commandant-General has access to the various members of the Board on matters affecting the Royal Marines.

The Women's Royal Naval Service is administered by the Director, W.R.N.S., under the direction of the Board of Admiralty. H.M. Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother, is Commandant-in-Chief.

ORGANIZATION

A large proportion of the ships of the Royal Navy is distributed amongst the following Fleets and Squadrons:—

- The Home Fleet, based on the U.K.
- The Mediterranean Fleet, based on Malta.
- The Far East Fleet, based on Singapore and Hong Kong.
- The East Indies Squadron, based on Trincomalee, Ceylon.
- The America and West Indies Squadron, based on Bermuda.
- The South Atlantic Squadron, based on Simonstown, South Africa.

Many other ships are used for training purposes and local duties in Home Waters and the remainder, not required for operational service, are attached to the Reserve Fleet. Ships of the Reserve Fleet are kept in various degrees of readiness for operational duty according to requirements.

The Royal Navy maintains a large number of shore establishments in the U.K., and to a lesser degree abroad. At home, these shore establishments consist mainly of barracks, air stations and training and research establishments. Dockyards, which are manned largely by civilians, are maintained at the following places:

- Home:* Portsmouth, Chatham, Devonport, Rosyth, Sheerness and Portland.
- Abroad:* Gibraltar, Malta, Singapore, Hong Kong and Simonstown.

Each of the Fleets and Squadrons of the Royal Navy is under the command of a Commander-in-Chief, who is an Admiral or Vice-Admiral. A Commander-in-Chief is also in charge of each of the Home Ports (Portsmouth, Chatham and Devonport) and of the training establishments in his Command.

Amongst others, there is a Flag Officer at the head of the Submarine Service and another is in charge of the Fleet Air Arm at home.

Reserves. The Royal Navy maintains a wide variety of Reserve Forces. They are as follows:

The Royal Fleet Reserve, which consists of Naval ratings and Royal Marine Other Ranks who have completed their Active Service engagements and who, voluntarily or as part of their contract, serve in the R.F.R. for a specified period.

The Royal Naval Reserve, which draws its members from the Merchant Navy and the fishing fleets.

The Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve, which is sub-divided into Divisions, Air Divisions and Squadrons, the Royal Naval Volunteer (Wireless) Reserve and the Royal Naval Volunteer (Postal) Reserve consists of men in civil life who volunteer to serve in the R.N. in time of an emergency and who undertake part-time Naval training.

The Royal Marine Forces Volunteer Reserve, which is the Royal Marine counterpart to the R.N.V.R.

The Women's Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve, with arrangements for training similar to those of the R.N.V.R.

The Royal Naval Special Reserve, which consists of National Servicemen from the Royal Navy which is the Royal Marine's counterpart to the part-time service.

The Royal Naval Volunteer Supplementary Reserve, the Royal Naval and Royal Marine Emergency Reserves, and the Women's Royal Naval Reserve which consist of men or women who undertake to serve in the Naval forces in an emergency but who do not carry out part-time training.

The Royal Naval Minewatching Service, which is a civilian organization administered by the Admiralty and which was formed early in 1952.

ENTRY INTO THE R.N.

Officers. The main form of officer entry into the R.N. is through Cadetships to the Britannia Royal Naval College, Dartmouth. The cadetships are awarded according to marks gained in a written examination and in tests of personal qualities. There are two types of cadetship—one open to 16 year old boys and the other to those approximately 2 years their senior. Both apply to the Executive, Engineering and Supply & Secretariat Branches and the latter to the Electrical Branch in addition.

In both types of cadetship, training, board and accommodation are free and parents are required only to reimburse the Admiralty for a cadet's uniform, clothing and personal expenses, on a basis decided by their net income.

THE BRITISH ARMY

HISTORICAL

Before the Norman Conquest every freeman between the ages of 15 and 60 capable of bearing arms, was bound to bear arms in defence of his country at the call of the King. This national militia was partially, but never wholly, superseded by the feudal system, introduced by William I, under which lands were held in return for units of cavalry and infantry which had to serve for 40 days at the cost of the lord. In addition, kings frequently maintained mercenaries, first out of their private funds and later out of the royal revenues. Parliamentary consent to the maintenance of an army was established in the seventeenth century as a result of a struggle between the Commons and the Stuarts. The standing army became a national institution under Charles II, and the Mutiny Act, passed at the accession of William III, in 1689, formed the basis of army discipline. The Mutiny Act, after enlargement and change from time to time, is now replaced by the Army Act, constitutional control being assured by the Army and Air Force (Annual) Act, which goes annually before Parliament and brings the Army Act into force for one year.

ORGANIZATION

The British Army is made up of (a) the Regular Forces with their reserves, including the Army Emergency Reserve, and (b) the Territorial Army and the Territorial Army Reserves.

The Secretary of State for War is the President of the Army Council. Other members of the Army Council are responsible for different aspects of army organization and administration, such as the organization and disposition of troops, all personnel matters, armament and maintenance, and expenditure.

The British Army at home and overseas is divided into commands, of which the more important are commanded by generals or lieutenant-generals, who control a number of districts or areas each under a major-general, and fighting formations located in their localities.

In time of war an army in the field is commanded by a general or lieutenant-general. It is made up of

Chaplains, Doctors, Dentists and Schoolmasters are offered short service commissions on completion of their professional training, with opportunities of obtaining a permanent commission.

A proportion of Fleet Air Arm pilots and observers also serve on short service commissions. These officers enter for a period of 8 years on the Active List with the opportunity of obtaining a permanent commission during their career. Entry is open to suitably qualified candidates between the ages of 17 years 4 months and 26 years, and the rank on entry is Naval Cadet.

Ratings. Ratings may engage for 12 years service in the R.N. or for 7 years in the R.N. and 5 years in the R.F.R., with opportunities to transfer to the longer engagement. 12-year ratings may volunteer to serve an additional 10 years, to qualify for a pension and terminal grant.

Entry into the R.N. as a rating is open to those between the ages of 15½ and 23.

Good opportunities are offered to ratings to become officers—either by promotion direct to Sub-Lieutenant or to Branch rank and thence to Lieutenant on the General List. There are also opportunities for promotion within the Branch List. Up to 25% of the officers entering the Executive and Supply Branches and 15% in General List in the Engineering and Electrical Branches may be promoted from the Lower Deck.

Entry regulations and promotion prospects for the Royal Marines are broadly similar to those of the R.N., except new entry officers enter as 2nd Lieutenants (on probation) and do not go to Dartmouth. Members of the W.R.N.S. enrol for four years and may re-engage for further periods. All W.R.N.S. officers, with the exception of a few with special qualifications, are selected from ratings.

Cost

The Naval Vote for the current financial year amounted to £364,500,000 as compared with £357,250,000 for the previous year.

two or more corps, and army troops consisting of supporting arms and services. An army group, of two or more armies, is commanded by a general.

A corps is commanded by a lieutenant-general. The headquarters controls a varying number of divisions of any type, together with its quota of corps troops.

There are three types of divisions, armoured, infantry and airborne, all commanded by major-generals. The armoured division has one armoured and one lorried infantry brigade, the infantry division three infantry brigades, the airborne division three parachute brigades, and all three have divisional troops.

An armoured brigade consists of three armoured regiments and a motor battalion. An infantry and parachute brigade each has three battalions. All types of brigade are commanded by brigadiers.

An armoured regiment has a headquarter squadron and three squadrons of tanks. An infantry battalion has a headquarter company, four rifle companies and a support company. Armoured regiments and infantry battalions are commanded by lieutenant-colonels and all squadrons and companies by majors.

Besides the major fighting arms—Royal Armoured Corps, Royal Artillery, Royal Engineers and Infantry—there are a number of technical and specialist corps.

THE REGULAR ARMY

The Regular Army comprises officers and other ranks commissioned or enlisted for full-time service. Normal regular engagements are for (a) three years with the Colours and (for men) four years in the Royal Army Reserve and (b) twenty two years with the Colours. A soldier enlisting on a twenty-two year engagement has the right, on giving appropriate notice, to terminate his colour service at the end of every three successive years. Termination at the end of three or six years carries a liability (for men) for four and three years service, respectively in the Reserve. National Service men are compulsorily enlisted into the Regular Army for a period of two years' service between the ages of 18 and 26. At the

termination of their whole-time service they have then to do part-time service for three and a half years in the Territorial Army or the Army Emergency Reserve.

THE ARMY EMERGENCY RESERVE

The role of the Army Emergency Reserve is to provide for the National Army those specialist units of the administrative tail, which for reasons of economy cannot be included in the Regular Army in peacetime. It also holds individual specialists. It is composed of a cadre of volunteers together with national service men completing their part-time service. It can only be called out on permanent service in an emergency.

THE TERRITORIAL ARMY

The Territorial Army was reconstituted in 1947 and with the Army Emergency Reserve it forms the Reserve Army. In time of war the Reserve Army is integrated with the Regular Army to form a National Army. Towards the National Army the Territorial Army can find an expeditionary force containing armoured, airborne and infantry divisions and a proportion of corps and army troops. It is also responsible for the bulk of the anti-aircraft and coast defences of the country.

The framework of the Territorial Army is provided by the cadre of volunteers, who are mostly officers and n.c.o.s. with war experience. The numbers are made up by national service men who carry out 3½ years part-time training with the Territorial Army after completing two years whole-time service with the Regular Army. Each Territorial Unit is based on and draws its recruits from a particular area of the country.

The Territorial Army can only be called out on permanent service in the event of actual or apprehended attack, but in the event of war may be sent anywhere at home or abroad.

WOMEN'S SERVICES

Queen Alexandra's Royal Army Nursing Corps, under the direction of the Director General, Army Medical Services, is organized to carry out the nursing of any Army personnel and their families and the training in nursing duties of other ranks of the R.M.A.C. and QARANC. It consists of Regular and Territorial officers and other ranks, with other Reserves. Officers are required to be State Registered Nurses. Other ranks are trained in many trades suitable for women in Medical Service at home and overseas.

The Women's Royal Army Corps has superseded the war-time "Auxiliary Territorial Service". Em-

ployment in both home and overseas commands includes many trades suitable to women, enabling them to replace and release men for combatant duties in the Army. They also provide at home and in certain overseas theatres personnel for "mixed" A.A. units, and skilled technicians, tradeswomen and signal operators. The Corps has Regular Army and Territorial Army elements.

THE ARMY CADET ORGANIZATION

The Army Cadet Organization consists of the Combined Cadet Force (CCF) (Basic and Army Sections) and the Army Cadet Force (ACF). Both Forces cater for boys between 14 and 18, and are entirely voluntary.

The objects of both Forces are to develop the character and power of leadership of boys, and to produce good citizens, potential leaders for the fighting Services, volunteers for the Regular Forces and entrants for National Service who understand true discipline and who are already well-grounded in basic training.

The Army Cadet Force is organized on a County basis in units and sub-units and is administered by the County Territorial and Auxiliary Forces Associations. Most units are "open" ones for both school and working boys who train in the evenings and at week-ends. There are also "closed" units at schools confined to members of the school. The officers come from all walks of life and do their Cadet work outside business hours. Units and sub-units are affiliated to local T.A. Units or sub-units.

The C.C.F. exists only at schools where education continues until age 17 or over. Only members of the school can belong. The officers come from the staff of the school. The boy joins the Basic Section and after passing a test of individual training can join the Naval, Army or Air Sections of the school contingent, dependent upon which of the latter exist at the school.

On January 31, 1953, C.C.F. strength was 65,392 consisting of 2,653 in the R.N. Section, 55,811 in the Basic and Army Sections and 6,928 in the R.A.F. Sections.

The strength of the A.C.F. on January 31, 1953 was 4,999 officers and 53,886 cadets.

Although the Cadet Forces are not part of the Armed Forces of the Crown, they are supplied by the War Office with clothing, equipment, arms and ammunition for training in shooting, such services as free travel to Annual Camps and to courses, and certain funds.

THE ROYAL AIR FORCE

The separate existence of the Royal Air Force dates back to April 1st, 1918.

The Royal Air Force is administered by the Air Council which consists of:

The Secretary of State for Air (President of the Air Council).

The Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State (Vice-President).

The Chief of the Air Staff.

The Air Member for Personnel.

The Air Member for Supply and Organisation.

The Vice-Chief of the Air Staff.

Deputy Chief of the Air Staff.

The Controller of Supplies (Air) in the Ministry of Supply.

The Permanent Under-Secretary of State (Secretary).

"Additional" Members appointed by the Secretary of State under powers given to him by the Order in Council which lays down the constitution of the Air Council.

The Secretary of State is responsible to Her Majesty the Queen and Parliament for all the business of the Air Council.

THE AIR MINISTRY

The Air Ministry is organised in five departments, as below:

The Department of the *Chief of the Air Staff* (C.A.S.).

The Chief of the Air Staff is the senior Air Member of Council and principal adviser of the Secretary of State on all the Service aspects of the administration of the Royal Air Force. He is responsible for all questions of Air Force policy and planning, for advice on the conduct of air operations for all training other than technical training, and for the fighting efficiency of the Royal Air Force. He is assisted by the Vice-Chief of the Air Staff, the Deputy Chief of the Air Staff, and the Assistant Chiefs of the Air Staff, each of whom is responsible for certain duties.

The Department of the *Air Member for Personnel* (A.M.P.).

The Air Member for Personnel is responsible for the personnel policy and administration, other than training, of the Royal Air Force, its reserves and auxiliaries, and the Women's Royal Air Force and the Air Training Corps. This includes questions of manpower; conditions of service for all types of R.A.F. and W.R.A.F. personnel; discipline; ceremonial, honours and awards; appointments; exits, promotions and postings; and casualties. He is also responsible for the welfare of R.A.F. and W.R.A.F. personnel including the religious, educational and medical services.

The Department of the *Air Member for Supply and Organisation* (A.M.S.O.).

The Air Member for Supply and Organisation is responsible for the organisation of the Royal Air Force; for the provision of equipment, stores and foodstuffs; for transportation; and for works, buildings and land.

The Department of the *Permanent Under-Secretary of State* (P.U.S.).

The Permanent Under-Secretary of State is the Accounting Officer of the Air Ministry and as such is responsible for financial advice and for the control of all expenditure; for accounting to Parliament for the expenditure of public money and stores; and for the negotiation and placing of contracts. He is also Secretary of the Air Council and in that capacity is responsible for the efficient working of the Air Ministry as a Department of State, for Parliamentary and legal business and for public relations.

The *Meteorological Office* is organised as part of the Air Ministry. It is responsible for meteorological research and for supplying meteorological information to all users, including units of the Royal Air Force.

UNITED KINGDOM COMMANDS

The *Commands of the R.A.F.* in the United Kingdom are as follows:

Bomber Command, its function is defined by its title; it also controls photographic reconnaissance units.

Fighter Command. Responsible for the control of offensive and defensive fighter operations; also for operational control of Royal Aux. Air Force Squadrons, Royal Observer Corps and of A.A. Command.

Coastal Command. Responsible for reconnaissance over the sea; in conjunction with the Royal Navy, for protection of shipping at sea and for attack against enemy shipping and submarines; also for meteorological reconnaissance, and air/sea rescue.

Transport Command. Responsible for the study, development and training of all air transport operations, including airborne assaults; the organisation and control of air transport operations in support of the R.A.F. and other services; and for operations along the trunk routes, including flight delivery of aircraft between theatres.

Flying Training Command. Responsible for the training of flying personnel. Also controls the Royal Air Force College, Cranwell, the R.A.F. Flying College, Manby (a specialist Flying Training Unit for officers of all the Commonwealth Air Forces, which combines certain aspects of the work of the discontinued Empire Flying School, the Empire Air Navigation School and the Empire Air Armament School) and various schools for the training of instructors in flying, navigation and the use of weapons.

Technical Training Command. Responsible for the training of ground personnel. Also controls the R.A.F. Technical College, in which the specialist training of technical officers is carried out.

Maintenance Command. Responsible for the storage and issue of the whole range of equipment used by the R.A.F.

Home Command. Responsible for the Reserves (including the R.A.F.V.R.), the Royal Auxiliary Air Force, University Air Squadrons and the Air Training Corps.

OVERSEAS COMMANDS

Overseas Commands are forces of various types of Squadrons and Service Units assigned to specific areas. The main overseas Commands of the R.A.F. are the Middle East Air Force, the Far East Air Force, and the 2nd Tactical Air Force. (This latter Force until September 1, 1951, was called the British Air Forces of Occupation, Germany, but following the decision that the operational resources of B.A.F.O. should be placed at the disposal of the Supreme Commander, Allied Powers in Europe, the role of the Command became primarily that of a tactical air force. It was therefore considered appropriate to restore the historical name of 2nd Tactical Air Force).

Women's Royal Air Force. Following the decision that the Women's Forces were to be continued on a voluntary basis as a permanent feature of the Forces of the Crown, provision was made under the Army and Air Force (Women's Service) Act, 1948, which was brought into operation on 1st February, 1949, for women to be commissioned and enlisted in the Royal Air Force and its reserves and auxiliaries. Women officers and airwomen accepted, under the new conditions, for the Royal Air Force are fully integrated into that force and are not organised as a separate corps.

His late Majesty, King George VI, approved the title of Women's Royal Air Force for use where it is necessary to provide collectively for women in the Royal Air Force.

The Air Force Act applies to such women in the same way as it applies to men, subject to adaptations and modifications made by Order in Council.

The Royal Auxiliary Air Force and the R.A.F. Volunteer Reserve are voluntary organisations in which men and women render part-time service while continuing to follow their civilian occupations; the R.Aux.A.F. being composed of flying and other units which form part of the first-line defences.

The Royal Observer Corps is a uniformed civilian body which is a vital part of Fighter Command's raid reporting and fighter control system. The duties of the members, who serve on a spare-time basis in peace, include the identification and plotting of aircraft flying over Great Britain.

The Air Training Corps gives boys of 14 and over experience in gliding and air matters, with special advantages if they join the Royal Air Force.

OVERSEAS TRAINING

During 1950 arrangements were made between the Governments of Canada and the United Kingdom for the Royal Canadian Air Force to train R.A.F. pilots and navigators in Canada. This scheme came into effect in January 1951. These arrangements are an extension of plans under which the R.C.A.F. are already training a number of air crews of the North Atlantic Treaty nations.

BRITAIN'S AUXILIARY AND NATIONAL SERVICES

A list of Civil Defence organizations, which were active during World War II, with descriptions, names and addresses of directors, etc., was included in the Canadian Almanac for 1945 and previous years.

CIVIL DEFENCE CORPS

Civil Defence (established 1949) is part of Britain's plan to improve defensive measures by enrolling volunteers to form the nucleus of a national auxiliary service.

The four Services concerned are the Civil Defence Corps, The Auxiliary Fire Service, the National Hospital Reserve and the Special Constabulary.

The first three train recruits (men and women as part-time volunteers) in peace-time for service if war should break out. The Special Constabulary provides training for recruits to assist the regular Police in peace as well as to establish additional trained reinforcements in emergency.

The Civil Defence Corps is a Crown service for

which The Home Secretary and the Secretary of State for Scotland are responsible. Its local organisation is a function of the local authorities. Each division (outside the County of London which has its own arrangements in conjunction with the Metropolitan Boroughs) comprises five sections: Headquarters, Warden, Reserve, Ambulance, and Welfare.

Civil Defence training schools have been established but the National Hospital Service Reserve (recruited by the Minister of Health) concentrates the available medical and nursing man-power on the hospitals in co-operation with the St. John Ambulance Brigade and the British Red Cross Society.

THE BRITISH COMMONWEALTH OF NATIONS

The Commonwealth consists of eight members; Australia, Canada, Ceylon, India, New Zealand, Pakistan,
the Union of South Africa, and the United Kingdom. Geographically the Commonwealth includes all territories
in which the government of any of these countries exercises authority, that is, colonies, protectorates, etc.
Its total area is 13,909,782 sq. miles, and its total estimated population (1944) 550,000,000.

The Imperial Conference held in 1926 stated that the United Kingdom and the Dominions were "autonomous
communities within the British Empire, equal in status, in no way subordinate one to another in any aspect of
their domestic or foreign affairs, though united by a common allegiance to the Crown, and freely associated
as members of the British Commonwealth of Nations." The Statute of Westminster, 1931, abolished certain
formal inequalities between the Parliament of the United Kingdom and the Parliaments of the Dominions.

THE UNITED KINGDOM

ed directly by Parliament, which is also supreme over

Malta is a self-governing colony with a representative assembly, and responsible ministers.

On April 15, 1942, in recognition of the fortitude of

the people of Malta, King George VI awarded the George Cross to the Island.

By Letters Patent dated September 5, 1947, Responsible Government was re-established in Malta and the new Legislative Assembly was opened by His Royal Highness The Duke of Gloucester on November 10, 1947. The Maltese Legislature may not pass laws touching the public safety or defence of Her Majesty's dominions and the general interests of British subjects outside Malta. In addition to this general reservation certain subjects are specifically withheld from the Legislature's competence. The principal subjects so reserved are matters dealing with the defence of the Island, and naval, military or air force matters generally, aliens, immigration, currency and treaties and relations with foreign states except insofar as it may be necessary for laws to be made in Malta to enable effect to be given to any treaty extending to Malta. Laws dealing with "reserved matters" may be made by the Governor subject to Her Majesty's approval, or by Order in Council.

The Governor is assisted by two Councils, the Executive Council, consisting of the Cabinet, and the Nominated Council, consisting of the Lieutenant-Governor, the Legal Secretary, (who are *ex officio* members) and three officers chosen from the Navy, Army and Air Force. There is a Privy Council which consists of the members of the Executive Council and the members of the Nominated Council and the Governor may, as occasion may require, appoint a Joint Committee of the Privy Council consisting of three members of the Executive Council, nominated by the Prime Minister and three members of the Nominated Council selected by the Governor.

WORLD ORGANIZATIONS

THE UNITED NATIONS

The United Nations is a world organization for the maintenance of peace and security and for the promotion of the welfare of humanity built around the wartime union of free peoples in defence of civilization.

Through a series of conferences, at Dumbarton Oaks (August-October 1944), at Yalta (February 1945) and at San Francisco (April-June 1945), the Charter of the United Nations was produced. The detailed plans for setting up the Organization under the Charter were then drawn up by the Preparatory Commission and its Executive Committee.

The main organs of the United Nations are: the General Assembly, the Security Council, the Economic and Social Council, the Trusteeship Council,

the International Court of Justice, the Secretariat. Subsidiary organs are established as and when required.

The *General Assembly* is composed of representatives of 60 Member States with one vote each. It is the only organ of the United Nations on which all Members are represented. It is a deliberative body where the Members have the opportunity to exchange views and state their problems. Decisions are taken by a two-thirds majority on important questions and a simple majority on other questions. The Assembly deals with its work through six Main Committees on which all Members have the right to be represented: First Committee (Political and Security, including the regulation of armaments); Second Committee (Economic and Financial); Third Committee (Social,

Humanitarian, and Cultural); Fourth Committee (Trusteeship, including non-self-governing territories); Fifth Committee (Administrative and Budgetary); Sixth Committee (Legal). The Assembly has also established procedural, standing and *ad hoc* committees. David M. Johnson is Canada's permanent representative at United Nations headquarters in New York.

The Security Council is composed of five permanent members, China, France, the United Kingdom, the United States and the Soviet Union. In addition, there are six non-permanent members elected by the General Assembly for a term of two years. The principal function of the Security Council is to examine questions endangering the maintenance of international peace and security, and to adopt and apply means to solve dangerous international situations or disputes. Each member of the Security Council has one vote. Decisions on procedural matters are made by an affirmative vote of seven members. On all other matters an affirmative vote of seven members, including the concurring votes of the five permanent members, is required (unless, in certain circumstances, a permanent member abstains from voting). Thus, the negative vote of one permanent member is sufficient to prevent the taking of a substantive decision. This is the "veto" power.

The Charter provides that a *Military Staff Committee*, consisting of the Chiefs of Staff of the permanent members of the Security Council or their representatives is to advise and assist the Security Council on all questions relating to the Council's military requirements for the maintenance of international peace and security, the regulation of armaments or possible disarmament.

On 11 January 1952 the General Assembly established the Disarmament Commission to replace the Atomic Energy Commission and the Commission for Conventional Armaments and to combine the work of both. The composition of this Commission is the same as that of the former Atomic Energy Commission, namely, the members of the Security Council plus Canada when that State is not a member of the Security Council.

The *Economic and Social Council* is composed of representatives of eighteen Member States elected by the General Assembly for a term of three years. Its function is to study and report on social and economic problems throughout the world, and to suggest means for their solution. Its decisions are taken by a simple majority vote. It is authorized to enter into agreements with specialized agencies for the purpose of bringing them into relationship with the United Nations. Such agreements are subject to approval by the General Assembly and the appropriate body of the specialized agency concerned. Agreements with the following agencies are in force: International Labour Organization (ILO); Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO); United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO); International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO); International Bank for Reconstruction and Development; International Monetary Fund; World Health Organization (WHO); Universal Postal Union (UPU); International Telecommunication Union (ITU); World Meteorological Organization. An agreement with the proposed Inter-Governmental Maritime Consultative Organization (IMCO), approved in 1948 by the United Nations General Assembly, will come into force when approved by the Assembly of IMCO, after that Organization is officially established. An agreement has also been authorized with the International Trade Organization (ITO) if and when that body comes into existence.

The Economic and Social Council is aided in its work by several expert bodies, called commissions and sub-commissions, which keep international problems in their respective fields under review. These bodies cover such questions as transport and communications, fiscal, statistical, human rights, social, population, status of women and narcotic drugs. The Council has also set up regional economic commissions for Europe, for Asia and the Far East, and for Latin America. The Council, in addition, has made arrangements for consultation with non-governmental organizations which are concerned with matters within its competence.

The Trusteeship Council consists of Member

Nations administering territories under trusteeship, the permanent members of the Security Council which do not administer trust territories, and as many other Members elected by the General Assembly as may be necessary to ensure that the total number of members in the Trusteeship Council is equally divided between those which administer trust territories and those which do not. The purpose of the Council is to study and report on political, economic, social, educational and cultural conditions in each territory under trusteeship, and supervise the application of trusteeship agreements. Its decisions are taken by a simple majority vote.

The *International Court of Justice* is the principal judicial organ of the United Nations. It consists of fifteen members elected for a term of nine years by the General Assembly and by the Security Council voting independently.

Mr. John E. Read, Canada—is one of the judges.

The *Secretariat*, under a Secretary-General appointed by the General Assembly upon the recommendation of the Security Council, serves the United Nations. It is divided into the following departments: Political and Security Council Affairs; Economic Affairs; Social Affairs; Trusteeship and Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories; Public Information; Legal Affairs; Conference and General Services; Administrative and Financial Services. There is, in addition, the Executive Office of the Secretary-General and the Technical Assistance Administration under a Director-General, Hon. Hugh L. Keenleyside of Canada.

The principal function of the organization is to ensure that international civil aviation may be developed in a safe and orderly manner and that international air transport services may be established on the basis of equality of opportunity and operated soundly and economically.

The principal organs of the organization are the Assembly, composed of all member states, which meets annually; the Council, comprised of 21 members, which meets continuously; and the Secretariat, which is recruited on a broad international basis. There are five subordinate bodies:

1. the Air Navigation Commission
2. the Air Transport Committee
3. the Legal Committee
4. the Joint Support of Air Navigation Services Committee
5. the Finance Committee

BRUSSELS TREATY ORGANIZATION

The Foreign Ministers of Belgium, France, The Netherlands, Luxembourg and the United Kingdom signed, on March 17, 1948 in Brussels, a treaty providing for "collaboration in economic, social and cultural matters and for collective self-defence", to remain in force for 50 years. The organization set up to carry out the provisions of the Brussels Treaty comprises a Consultative Council, composed of the foreign ministers of the five powers; a Permanent Commission, composed of the heads of the diplomatic missions in London of Belgium, France, Luxembourg

and the Netherlands and a United Kingdom representative with the rank of ambassador; and a Secretariat-General organized on an international basis. In addition, committees deal with social, cultural and civil defence co-operation between the five countries. The Defence and Financial Organization set up under Western Union has been integrated into the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (N.A.T.O.). *Secretary-General*, Baron F. de Selys Longchamps, 2 Eaton Place, London, S.W.1.

INTERNATIONAL LABOUR ORGANIZATION

HEADQUARTERS: GENEVA, SWITZERLAND

The International Labour Organization was set up in 1919 under the Peace Treaties concluding the First World War, to promote social justice and improve labour conditions through international action. It is an inter-governmental organization of 66 countries. Its organs are the International Labour Conference which normally meets annually; the International Labour Office; and the Governing Body which meets several times a year. National delegations to the Conference comprise, in addition to Government representation, direct representation of organized employers and workers from each member country. Since establishment, the International Labour Conference has adopted 103 conventions or draft treaties, many of which have been ratified by a considerable number of countries, as well as 97 formal recommendations: these instruments deal with a broad range of social and labour subjects.

The Office is the secretariat of the Organization. It lends expert assistance to Member Governments on request, and from time to time issues reports and other publications on social and labour affairs in various areas. The Director-General is David A. Morse, a citizen of the U.S.A.

GOVERNING BODY

The Governing Body is the international executive of the Organization. It is made up of one Government representative from each of the ten member countries of chief industrial importance; of one Government representative from ten other member countries, of eight workers' representatives and ten employers' representatives, members in the three latter categories being elected by the Conference. Canada holds one of the non-elective Government seats, as one of the countries of chief industrial importance, the Canadian member being A. Mac-Namara, C.M.G., Deputy Minister of Labour.

THE VICTORIA CROSS

THE VICTORIA CROSS was instituted by Queen Victoria at the close of the Crimean campaign, 1856. It is a Maltese cross, made of gun metal, with a Royal Crest in the centre and underneath it an escroll bearing the inscription "For Valor," and is awarded, irrespective of rank, to members of any branch of Her Majesty's services, either in the Imperial Forces or those of any British dominion, colony, dependency or protectorate, the Mercantile Marine, nurses or staffs of hospitals, or to civilians of either sex while serving in either regular or temporary capacity during naval, military, or air force operations. It is awarded only "for most conspicuous bravery or some daring or pre-eminent act of valour or self-sacrifice or extreme devotion to duty in the presence of the enemy." For additional conduct of similar bravery, a Bar is added. The ribbon was formerly red for the Army and blue for the Navy, but is now crimson for all services. An annuity of £10 a year accompanies the decoration, plus £5 a year for every Bar granted; payable to ranks below commission ranks from the date of the act which concerns the award. Navy, Army and Royal Air Force regulations provide for the annuity to be increased to the maximum of £75, including any other pension from public funds where officers and other ranks are incapable of earning a livelihood by reason of age or infirmity occasioned by a cause outside the recipient's control. Since June 17th, 1943, the financial responsibility has been assumed by the Canadian Government, and the pound sterling is deemed to have a value of \$5.00 in Canadian currency where this is concerned.

TITULAR HONOURS

For some years honours involving titles have not been bestowed on Canadians living in Canada.

On May 22, 1919, during the premiership of the Rt. Hon. Robert L. Borden, a resolution adopted by the House of Commons requested His Majesty to refrain from granting titular honours to Canadian citizens in the future. This policy was reversed in 1933 when, during the premiership of the Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, the Canadian Government recommended a number of such awards, which were duly granted on New Year's Day, 1934. Although titular honours were again conferred in 1935, the new administration which took office later that year under the premiership of the Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King revived the previous policy of the Government of 1919, and no titular honours have been recommended or awarded since that time.

On July 24, 1942, a Special Committee on Honours and Decorations reported to the House as follows:

- "As a result of their deliberations your Committee desire to make the following recommendations:
- (1) That His Majesty's subjects domiciled or ordinarily resident in Canada be eligible for the award of Honours and Decorations, including awards in the Orders of Chivalry, which do not involve titles.
 - (2) That His Majesty's Government in Canada consider a submission to His Majesty the King, of proposals for the establishment of an Order limited in number but not involving a title, for which His Majesty's subjects domiciled or ordinarily resident in Canada shall alone be eligible."

ORDERS OF KNIGHTHOOD, ETC.

The Order of Baronets, the lowest hereditary rank, was instituted in 1611; a Baronet is designated "Sir John Smith, Baronet"—usually written Bart. Taking precedence of Baronets are members of The Most Honourable Privy Council, who are addressed "Right Honourable."

The Most Noble Order of the Garter, instituted 1349.—K.G.

The Most Ancient and Most Nohle Order of the Thistle, instituted 1687.—K.T.

The Most Illustrious Order of St. Patrick, instituted 1788.—K.P.

The Most Honourable Order of the Bath, instituted in 1399, and revived in 1725, is divided into three classes—Knights Grand Cross, G.C.B.; Knights Commanders, K.C.B.; and Companions, C.B.

The Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, instituted in 1861, is divided into three classes,—Knights Grand Commanders, G.C.S.I.; Knights Commanders, K.C.S.I.; Companions, C.S.I.

The Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, instituted in 1818, has also three classes—Knights Grand Cross, G.C.M.G.; Knights Commanders, K.C.M.G.; Companions, C.M.G.

The Most Eminent Order of the Indian Empire, instituted 1877, has three classes,—Knights Grand Commanders, G.C.I.E.; Knights Commanders,

K.C.I.E., Companions, C.I.E.

The Royal Victorian Order, instituted in 1896, has five classes—Knights Grand Cross, G.C.V.O.; Knights Commanders, K.C.V.O.; Commanders, C.V.O.; Members 4th and 5th classes—M.V.O. Ribbon; blue with red and white edges.

The Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, instituted in 1917, has five classes—Knights (or Dames) Grand Cross, G.B.E.; Knights Commanders, K.B.E.; Commanders, C.B.E.; Dames Commanders D.B.E.; Officers, O.B.E., and Members, M.B.E. Ribbon (Military) Rose pink, pearl grey edging, vertical pearl stripe in centre; O.B.E. (Civil) Rose pink, pearl grey edging and no central vertical stripe.

Knights Bachelors are gentlemen unconnected with any order who have received the honour of Knighthood, and are entitled to the prefix "Sir" and to "Kt." after name. They rank immediately after Knights Commanders of the British Empire.

The Companions of Honour, instituted in 1917. Membership is limited; carries no title.

In all Orders of Knighthood the Knights Grand Cross and the Knights Commanders have the prefix "Sir" with the initials of their class following the name. Companions and Members bear no title, but have the letters C.B., C.M.G., M.V.O., as the case may be, attached to their names.

The arms are those of England, Scotland, Ireland and France, with a "difference" to mark them as Canadian, namely on the lower third of the shield, a sprig of maple on a silver shield. The crest is a lion holding in its paw a red maple leaf, a symbol of sacrifice. The supporters are, with some slight distinctions, the lion and unicorn of the Royal Arms; the lion upholds the Union Jack, and the unicorn the ancient banner of France.



The motto—A MARI VSQVE AD MARE—"From sea to sea"—is an extract from the Latin version of verse 8 of the 72nd Psalm—"He shall have dominion also from sea to sea, and from the river unto the ends of the earth."

There is a tradition, that the Fathers of Confederation derived the designation "Dominion" from this verse.

PETITIONS TO THE HOUSE OF COMMONS

A petition to the House of Commons must be presented by a Member, and such Member shall be answerable that the petition does not contain "impertinent or improper matter". One person may petition the House of Commons. Petitions may be either written or printed. When there are three or more petitioners, the signatures of at least three shall be subscribed on the sheet containing the prayer of the petition.

Long usage both here and in the United Kingdom has sanctioned the rule that every petition should commence with the superscription "To the

Honourable the House of Commons in Parliament assembled". Then should follow the formula "The Petition of the undersigned — humbly sheweth". The subject matter of the petition then follows in the third person throughout and each paragraph should commence with the word "That".

The conclusion should be the "prayer", briefly and clearly expressing the particular object which the petitioners have in view in coming before Parliament. The petition should close with the formal words "And your petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray".

REMUNERATION PAID TO MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS

Members of the House of Commons of Canada receive \$4,000.00 as a sessional indemnity, in addition they receive an annual expense allowance of \$2,000.00 per annum; the Prime Minister receives in addition to his indemnity and expense allowance as a member, a salary of \$15,000.00 and a motor car allowance of \$2,000.00 per annum. Cabinet Ministers receive, in addition to indemnity and expense allowance as a member, a salary of \$10,000.00 and a motor car allowance of \$2,000.00 per annum; the leader of the opposition receives a salary of \$10,000.00 plus a motor car allowance of \$2,000.00 per annum, in addition to his sessional indemnity of \$4,000.00 and expense allowance of \$2,000.00 per annum.

The Speaker of the House of Commons receives his sessional indemnity of \$4,000.00, expense allowance of \$2,000.00, a salary of \$6,000.00 and a motor car allowance of \$1,000.00. He is entitled to \$3,000.00 per annum in lieu of residence.

The Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons receives, in addition to his sessional indemnity of \$4,000.00, a salary of \$4,000.00, and an allowance in

lieu of apartments of \$1,500.00 and the expense allowance granted to all members of \$2,000.00.

The Deputy Chairman of Committees receives in addition to his sessional indemnity of \$4,000.00 an annual allowance of \$2,000.00 and an expense allowance of \$2,000.00.

Parliamentary Assistants to Cabinet Ministers receive, in addition to their sessional indemnity of \$4,000.00 a salary of \$4,000.00 per annum and an expense allowance of \$2,000.00.

The expense allowance of \$2,000.00 granted to all members of the House of Commons is not subject to income tax except in the case of Ministers of the Crown and the Leader of the Opposition.

In addition to the Governor-General's salary of £10,000, the estimates usually include an item for office salaries, printing, stationery and other allowances, and for travelling expenses.

The salary of the Lieutenant-Governors of the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec is \$10,000; of Prince Edward Island \$8,000; of the other Provinces \$9,000.

FEDERAL PARLIAMENT REPRESENTATION

The Parliament of Canada consists of the Senate and the House of Commons.

THE SENATE

Senators are appointed for life; must be Canadian Citizens or British subjects and 30 years of age; must own lands worth net \$4,000 in the province which they represent, and must be worth \$4,000 above all debts. They must be residents of the province for which appointed or of the electoral division in the Province of Quebec.

The Speaker is appointed by the Governor-General.

The Senate as originally constituted at Confederation consisted of 72 members. Through the addition of new provinces and the general growth of Canada it now has 102 members, the latest change in representation having been made at March 31, 1949, with the admission of Newfoundland to Confederation. By provinces, representation is as follows: Newfoundland 6, Prince Edward Island 4, Nova Scotia 10, New Brunswick 10, Quebec 24, Ontario 24, Manitoba 6, Saskatchewan 6, Albert 6, British Columbia 6; total 102.

THE HOUSE OF COMMONS

The members of the House of Commons are elected by the people. The ordinary legal limit of duration for each Parliament is five years, sitting at least once a year. The Speaker is elected by the House.

In the 21st Parliament, elected June 27, 1949, the House of Commons consisted of 255 members. A Redistribution Act, passed after each decennial census readjusts the representation in the House of Commons in accordance with rules laid down in Section 51 of the British North America Acts, 1867 to 1952.

By virtue of the Representation Act, 1952, membership in the House of Commons was increased from 255 to 265 effective at the general election held August 10, 1953.

Representation in the House of Commons for the 22nd Parliament is as follows: Alberta 17; British Columbia 22; Manitoba 14; New Brunswick 10; Newfoundland 7; Nova Scotia 12; Ontario 85; Prince Edward Island 4; Quebec 75; Saskatchewan 17; Mackenzie District, N.W.T. 1; and the Yukon Territory 1; making a total of 265.

Research and experimentation are carried out by the Science Service and the Experimental Farms Service; the maintenance of standards and protection of products by the Production Service and Marketing Service; reclamation and development by the Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Administration and the Maritime Marshland Rehabilitation Administration, while security and price stability policies are administered under the Prairie Farm Assistance Administration and the Agricultural Prices Support Board.

The results of work in these various fields and information on the policies of the Department in general are made available to the public.

THE FARMERS' CREDITORS

ARRANGEMENT ACT 1943

Director—C. A. Port, Department of Finance, Ottawa.

This Act was passed by Parliament July 21, 1943, and proclaimed as coming into force December 15, 1943, replacing The Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Act, 1934.

The legislation is designed with a view to effecting compromises or rearrangements of the debts of farmers with the object of retaining them on the land as efficient producers and also to simplify the operation of the Bankruptcy Act with respect to farmers generally. The compromise provisions are available only to farmers in the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. The simplified bankruptcy provisions are available to farmers in all ten provinces.

All Clerks of the County and District Courts throughout the Dominion are Official Receivers for the purposes of the Act. In districts where the Clerk of the Court was unable to act as Official Receiver, substitutes have been appointed.

A farmer may submit a proposal to an Official Receiver who calls a meeting of creditors and endeavours to effect an amicable settlement. If successful, he applies to the County or District Court Judge for approval. If unsuccessful, a request may be signed that the Court formulate a proposal binding on all parties, subject to appeal.

An Appeal Court has been constituted in each of the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

AUDITOR GENERAL'S OFFICE

The office of the Auditor General came into operation in 1878 (41 Vic. Chap. 7). Its duties include the auditing of expenditure and revenue of Canada, and the reporting thereon to the House of Commons. The Auditor General may be removed from office only on joint resolution of the Senate and House of Commons.

DEPARTMENT OF CITIZENSHIP AND IMMIGRATION

CANADIAN CITIZENSHIP BRANCH

The Canadian Citizenship Branch was organized during World War II on the advice of the Committee on Co-operation in Canadian Citizenship and, during the war, was interested primarily in securing the maximum war effort from the various ethnic groups in Canada. When the war ended, the Branch was transferred to the Department of the Secretary of State on November 1, 1945, and in January 1, 1950, became a part of the Department of Citizenship and Immigration.

The Branch is concerned with the promotion and co-ordination of citizenship training programmes, the preparation and distribution of resource materials such as language texts, publications, films and filmstrips, the preparation of a review of the foreign-language press in Canada, and the dissemination of information relating to ethnic and cultural groups and general citizenship, thereby assisting governmental and non-governmental agencies in their citizenship work.

CANADIAN CITIZENSHIP REGISTRATION BRANCH

The Canadian Citizenship Registration Branch was established under the title of the Naturalization Branch, Department of Secretary of State of Canada on January 1, 1915. When the Canadian Citizenship Act came into force on January 1, 1947 the title of the Branch was changed to the Canadian Citizenship Registration Branch, and it became a branch of the Department of Citizenship and Immigration on January 1, 1950.

Except for the duties and functions of the Canadian Citizenship Branch under Section 32 of the Canadian Citizenship Act, the Act is administered by the Canadian Citizenship Registration Branch, which is the custodian of all records under that Act and all Naturalization acts previously in force.

The Branch is charged with the determination of citizenship status; the examination of applications for citizenship; the preparation and the issue of certificates of citizenship; the procedure involving revocation and loss of Canadian citizenship; the registration of births of Canadian citizens outside of Canada; the guidance of some 375 courts across Canada dealing with applications for citizenship; and

generally all matters pertaining to the citizenship of persons in and out of Canada.

INDIAN AFFAIRS BRANCH

The administration of Indian Affairs was under the direct control of the Imperial Government until 1860, when it was transferred to the Province of Canada. By the British North America Act Indians and lands reserved for Indians, were placed under the Dominion Government. For six years after Confederation, Indian Affairs was attached to the Department of the Secretary of State. In 1873 it was transferred to the Department of the Interior, and in 1880 a separate Department of Indian Affairs was established. On Dec. 1, 1936, under the Department of Mines and Resources Act it was replaced by the Indian Affairs Branch of the Department of Mines and Resources. In January, 1950, the Indian Affairs Branch became a part of the Department of Citizenship and Immigration. The Indians today number approximately 145,000 and are located on some 2,200 reserves comprising approximately five and a half million acres of which about 300,000 acres are under cultivation. The department operates schools for Indians comprising both day and residential institutions, the latter being conducted in co-operation with various religious denominations interested in the work of Indian education. At the present time there are 460 in all of these schools

educating some 29,000 children. An important part of the administration is the Indian Trust Fund, which amounts to over \$21,000,000 and is derived from sales or leases of land, timber, and minerals, and from other miscellaneous sources.

DEPARTMENT OF DEFENCE PRODUCTION

The Department of Defence Production was established on April 1st, 1951 under the provisions of the Defence Production Act (15 George VI, Chap. 4) which gave it a statutory life of five years. Its task is to co-ordinate the effort that will be required of the Canadian economy in producing its share of armaments necessary to implement the terms of the North Atlantic Treaty.

Organized on a similar basis to that of the former Department of Munitions and Supply, the new Department is carrying out the task of co-ordinating the production and purchasing of the armed forces' requirements.

"Prize Courts"

Under the provisions of The Canada Prize Act, 1945, the Exchequer Court of Canada on its Admiralty side was given prize jurisdiction over all manner of captures, seizures, prizes and reprisals of all ships, aircraft or goods and it shall hear and determine the same and adjudge and condemn all such ships, aircraft or goods as are condemnable as prize.

This jurisdiction is exercisable by the Judges of the Exchequer Court on its Admiralty side in their respective districts.

DEPARTMENT OF NATIONAL HEALTH AND WELFARE

The Department of National Health and Welfare was established in October 1944, under the Department of National Health and Welfare Act, 1944. It is composed of three separate branches, Health, Welfare and Administration.

The Health Branch is divided into four directorates: Health Services, composed of a number of divisions dealing with different aspects of public health; Health Insurance Studies, which administers the National Health Program and in which departmental planning for health care is centred; Indian Health Services, which administers health services to Indians and Eskimos; and Food and Drugs. The Department is responsible for the administration of the Food and Drugs Act, the Opium and Narcotic Drug Act, the Quarantine Act, the Leprosy Act, the Proprietary or Patent Medicine Act, and those sections of the Canada Shipping and the Immigration Acts dealing with the care of sick mariners and the medical examination of immigrants. It administers the National Health Program, under which grants totalling \$49 million for 1953-54 were, or are, made available to the provinces for the improvement and extension of health services. In addition advisory and co-ordinating services are provided to provincial health departments and grants are made to a number of national voluntary health organizations. The Department has certain responsibilities in international health matters and provides information and assistance to the World Health Organization and other specialized agencies of the United Nations. It is responsible for the enforcement of any public health regulations made by the International Joint Commission concerning boundary waters between the United States and Canada.

A number of federal-provincial committees act in an advisory capacity to the Department on health matters. The most important of these, the Dominion Council of Health, is composed of the Deputy Minister of National Health, who acts as chairman, the chief health officer of each province and five persons appointed by the Governor-in-Council. Federal-provincial committees of a technical and advisory nature supplement the activities of the Council.

The Welfare Branch administers the Family Allowances Act, 1944 and the Old Age Security Act, 1951, and is responsible for administration of the federal aspects of the Old Age Assistance Act, 1951, and the Blind Persons Act, 1951. The Old Age Assistance Act and Blind Persons Act provide for Advisory Boards consisting of federal and provincial representatives. Under the Physical Fitness Act of 1943 a joint federal-provincial program of physical, cultural and recreational activities is conducted. The National Council on Physical Fitness acts in an advisory capacity on fitness matters.

Grants are made by the Department to a number of national voluntary health and welfare organizations.

The Department is also responsible for federal civil defence planning; the Civil Defence Co-ordinator reports to both Deputy Ministers.

The Administration Branch consists of divisions whose activities cover both the health and welfare fields, such as research and information services, legal and library services, and of divisions providing administrative and personnel services to the Department.

ALLOWANCES FOR THE BLIND

The Blind Persons Act, effective January 1, 1952, provides for federal reimbursement to the provinces for allowances to blind persons, payable by the provinces to needy blind persons age 21 to 69, subject to a residence requirement of at least 10 years. For an unmarried person without a dependent child or children, the maximum income is \$840 a year, and with a dependent child or children, \$1040 a year. For a married couple, the maximum is \$1320 where one is sighted, and \$1440 where both are blind. Indians are not excluded from the benefits of the Act.

Within the limits of the Act, the province is free to fix the amount of the maximum allowance payable and the amounts of maximum income allowed. The federal government contributes 75 per cent of \$40 a month or of the amount paid by the province, whichever is the lesser. Federal reimbursement is made through the Department of National Health and Welfare. Implementation of the program requires an agreement between the federal and provincial governments. The province must pass enabling legislation and provide for provincial administration of the allowances.

All provinces and the Northwest Territories have signed agreements with the federal government for the payment of allowances. In August, 1953, the allowances were payable to 8,224 persons at an annual rate of \$3 million of which the federal share was 75 per cent.

OLD AGE SECURITY PROGRAMMES

Social legislation concerning persons in the older age groups was greatly extended in January, 1952. The Old Age Assistance Act, passed by Parliament in June, 1951, provides for federal grants-in-aid to the provinces for old age assistance payments to persons in need, between the ages of 65 and 69. The Old Age Security Act, passed in December, 1951, provides for a universal pension scheme for persons 70 years of age and over. These two measures replace the former federal-provincial old age pension program under which pensions, subject to a means test, were payable at the age of 70 years.

Old Age Security

Under the Old Age Security Act, the federal government pays a pension of \$40 a month to persons age 70 and over, subject to a residence qualification of 20 years (or more in certain cases). The universal pension is the financial and administrative responsibility of the federal government, and is financed by a 2% sales tax, a 2% tax on net corporation income, and a 2% tax not to exceed \$60 a year on the net taxable income of individuals required to pay income tax. In August, 1953, pensions were payable to 700,711 persons at an annual rate of \$338 million.

The regional offices of the Welfare Branch of the Department of National Health and Welfare, which administer family allowances, are used for the administration of universal old age pensions. Application forms are available in all post offices in Canada. Application for the pension may be made to the Regional Director of Old Age Security in the capital city of each province. Residents of the Yukon Territory and the Northwest Territories are required to send their applications to the Regional Director of Old Age Security, Department of National Health and Welfare, Ottawa.

Old Age Assistance

The Old Age Assistance Act provides for federal reimbursement to the provinces for old age assistance, payable by the provinces to persons in need, between the ages of 65 and 69, subject to a residence qualification of at least 20 years. Indians are not excluded from the benefits of the Act. For an unmarried

person, the total income, including assistance, cannot exceed \$720 a year, and for a married couple, \$1200 a year. Where one of the spouses is blind, within the meaning of The Blind Persons Act, the total income of the couple, including assistance, cannot exceed \$1320 a year. Within the limits of the Act, each province is free to fix the amount of the maximum assistance payable, the amounts of maximum income allowed, and other conditions of eligibility. The maximum assistance established in all provinces, except Newfoundland, and in the Northwest Territories is \$40 monthly; in Newfoundland, it is \$30. The federal government's contribution is 50 per cent of \$40 a month or of the assistance paid, whichever is the lesser.

Implementation of the programme in a province is contingent on the province's passing enabling legislation and signing an agreement with the federal government. Old age assistance is administered and paid by the provinces with federal reimbursement through the Department of National Health and Welfare.

In August, 1953, assistance payable to 90,606 persons was at an annual rate of \$22 million of which one-half was the federal share.

DEPARTMENT OF NATIONAL REVENUE

From Confederation on July 1, 1867, until May 17 1918, Customs and Inland Revenue Acts were administered by two separate government departments known as the Department of Customs, constituted by statute (31 Vic. Chap. 43), and the Department of Inland Revenue constituted by statute (31 Vic. Chap. 49). On May 18, 1918, by Order in Council these two Departments were amalgamated and combined under the name of the Department of Customs and Inland Revenue and under one Minister of the Crown.

On April 1, 1921, the name Inland Revenue was dropped and the Department of Customs and Excise constituted (11-12 Geo. V. 26).

The collection of Income Tax was placed under the control of the Minister of Customs and Excise on April 1, 1924, and by the Department of National Revenue Act (17 Geo. V. Chap. 34) the name was changed to the Department of National Revenue.

CANADIAN BROADCASTING CORPORATION

The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation was created under the provisions of The Canadian Broadcasting Act, 1936 to be a single national authority to control, for purposes of co-ordination, all broadcasting in Canada and to carry on a national broadcasting service within the nation.

The Corporation is responsible to Parliament through a minister of the Crown: the present Minister is the Honourable Dr. J. J. McCann, Minister of National Revenue.

Policy is directed by a board of eleven governors appointed by the Governor in Council.

The Governors hold office for three years; terms rotate, three members being appointed each year. Members may be re-appointed at the expiry of their terms.

Executive functions are exercised by a General Manager and Assistant General Manager, appointed by Governor in Council on recommendation of the Board of Governors.

POST OFFICE

A postal service has been in operation since the earliest days of settlement on the North American continent. At Confederation a uniform system was introduced by the Post Office Act of 1867 (31 Vic. Chap. 10), (Chap. 161, R. S. 1927), (15 George VI, Chap. 57, R. S., 1951). At the end of the fiscal year 1952-53 there were 12,259 post offices, urban and rural. The amount on deposit in the Post Office Savings Banks was \$39,322,229 and the revenue from the sale of postage stamps etc., \$129,388,364. At the end of the fiscal year 1952-53 there were 5,239 rural mail routes in operation serving approximately 410,506 mail boxes.

CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION

The Civil Service Commission was constituted by the Civil Service Act of 1908 (7-8 Edward VII., chap. 15) which introduced the merit system in the administration of a portion of the personnel of the Civil Service at Ottawa. The jurisdiction of the Commission was extended in 1918, when practically the entire personnel of the public service was placed under its control. In 1918, also, the Commission was given additional responsibilities relative to the organization of departments and the classification of positions in the Civil Service. The classification system administered by the Commission is designed to provide an orderly means of designating the various positions and of achieving uniformity in the salary rates for work at equal levels of difficulty and responsibility.

There are now 68 trade commissioners and 34 assistant trade commissioners, including agricultural, fisheries and timber specialists, in 48 offices in 40 countries.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORT

The Department of Transport was established on November 2, 1936, pursuant to the provisions of the Department of Transport Act (Chap. 34, 1 Edward VIII) as-of that date proclaimed. The Department consists of the former Departments of Marine and of Railways and Canals, and the Civil Aviation Branch formerly administered by the Department of National Defence.

In addition to the administration of the Department under his direct control, the Minister of Transport is also responsible to Parliament in all matters affecting railways, and more particularly Canadian National Railways, also for such bodies as the Board of Transport Commissioners, the Air Transport Board, the National Harbours Board, the Canadian Maritime Commission and the Canadian Overseas Telecommunication Corporation, a crown company, each of which organizations is complete in itself, functioning in accordance with legislation duly made and provided.

Ministerial responsibility for the Trans-Canada Air Lines Act of 1937 is vested in the Minister of Trade and Commerce.

CANADA'S ARMED SERVICES

THE ROYAL CANADIAN NAVY

The Canadian naval forces are divided between the Royal Canadian Navy and the Royal Canadian Navy (Reserve). The strengths of the two forces as of June 1, 1953 were:

Cadets of the University Naval Training Divisions, an integral part of the RCN(R), numbered 1,269, making the total strength of the two forces, 22,179.

The RCN is composed of ten branches. They are: Executive, Engineering, Electrical, Chaplain Services, Instructor, Medical, Supply, Constructor, Ordnance and Special Branches.

The RCN(R) has the same branch divisions and is also divided between the Active and Retired Lists. Officers and men of the Active List undergo periodic training and may perform special duty or Continuous Naval Duty in the RCN in lieu of an officer or man of the RCN of like or higher rank, authorized by complement but not borne.

Officers of the Retired List and men of the Emergency List (its "lower deck" equivalent) are not required to undergo periodic training but may do so. They may also perform special duty or Continuous Naval Duty in the RCN under the same conditions as members of the Active List.

THE NAVAL ESTABLISHMENT

The RCN is composed of four Commands:

Headquarters Command, established in Ottawa, is the administrative headquarters of the RCN. Its establishment is commissioned as HMCS Bytown.

Atlantic Command is organized with headquarters in HMC Dockyard, Halifax, N.S., and is the operational and administrative authority, under naval headquarters, for the RCN ships and establishments in eastern Canada.

Pacific Command is organized on the same basis as the Atlantic Command with headquarters in HMC Dockyard, Esquimalt, B.C.

Commanding Officer Naval Divisions is responsible for the administration of all establishments, and the training of all personnel, of the RCN(R). The command headquarters is in Hamilton, Ont.

A list of RCN and RCN(R) shore establishments is included under "Naval Establishments, Department

of National Defence, Departments of Government", See Index.

There are 32 ships in commission or preparing for service; 41 ships in reserve; 9 ships on loan to other departments of the federal government, and 34 ships building or to be built under present plans.

There are also seven Fairmile patrol craft and 11 other ships in commission and approximately 200 lesser craft both in service and in reserve.

Ten days after the opening of Korean hostilities, three destroyers of the RCN sailed from Esquimalt, B.C., for the Korean theatre. Since that date, five RCN destroyers have been continuously committed to United Nations service; three on active service in the Far East, one returning from the war theatre and one preparing for war service. Eight destroyers completed 13 tours of duty in the first three years of the Korean war and more than 3,500 officers and men served with the UN forces.

There are 185 aircraft in the RCN of which 87 are in service and 98 in reserve. One hundred and eleven are anti-submarine aircraft, 46 are fighters and there are four helicopters.

ROYAL CANADIAN SEA CADET CORPS

Admiral of the Sea Cadets, Her Majesty the Queen.

Organized December 16th, 1895 by the Navy League of Canada, Sea Cadet Corps were subsequently organized in various centres across Canada and, up to and including June 1st, 1941, these Cadet Services were operated by the Navy League in association with the Department of National Defence, Army. Following June 1st, 1941 this association was transferred to the Navy, since which time the Royal Canadian Navy has assumed the responsibility of certain jurisdiction, training and supervision of Sea Cadet Corps, and the operation of summer training camps, with the Navy League being responsible

for administration and general operation of Corps and the providing of both summer camps and Corps training quarters.

Throughout the ten provinces of Canada there are 103 Sea Cadet Corps with an authorized complement of 10,000 Cadets. The age limit for Sea Cadets is from 14 to 18 years of age inclusive.

C. Kirkland MacLeod, Montreal, is the National President of The Navy League of Canada. Commander (SB) D. C. Elliott, R.C.N., is the Director of Sea Cadets for Naval Service, Department of National Defence, Ottawa.

THE CANADIAN ARMY

DEFENCE

The National Defence Act, the organizational portions of which were proclaimed to come into force on the first of August, 1950, provided for a Department of National Defence presided over by a Minister. The organization of and terms of service in the military forces of Canada, collectively called "The Canadian Forces", are prescribed in the National Defence Act Chapter 43, Statutes of Canada 1950.

Military Command and Administration of the Army is exercised by Army Headquarters, Ottawa, through five Commands: Western, Prairie, Central, Quebec and Eastern.

There are seven Areas within and subordinate to Commands.

ORGANIZATION

The National Defence Act provides the Canadian Army shall consist of:

(a) *The Active Force* consisting of personnel permanently employed and comprising field units and training, staff and service elements. The Active Force supersedes the pre-war Permanent Force.

(b) *The Reserve Force* consisting of personnel not enrolled for continuous service except in an emergency, but liable to undergo annual military training. The Reserve Force supersedes the pre-war Non-Permanent Active Militia.

(c) *The Supplementary Reserve* consisting of personnel not enrolled for continuous service except in an emergency and not obligated to undergo annual

training except as may be specially ordered. The Supplementary Reserve contains the pre-war lists of Reserve personnel.

(d) The Canadian Officers Training Corps consisting of contingents of officer cadets in Schools, Colleges, Universities and units. The Canadian Officers Training Corps is liable to undergo annual military training.

(e) The Cadet Services of Canada consisting of commissioned officers for the purpose of administration and training of the Royal Canadian Army Cadets. Such officers are liable to perform annual training.

(f) *The Reserve Militia*

Consists of such units as are named by the Minister. Training is voluntary.

Additional to but not an integral part of the Canadian Army as educational and training establishments are:

- (i) Officially authorized cadet corps.
- (ii) Officially authorized rifle associations and clubs.
- (iii) Such training centres as may be authorized from time to time by the Minister.
- (iv) Royal Military College.
- (v) College Militaire Royal de St. Jean.

ROYAL CANADIAN ARMY CADETS

Colonel-in-Chief: Her Majesty the Queen

Address—Directorate of Military Training, Army Headquarters, Ottawa, Ont.

The Army Cadet organization stems from the "Drill Associations" formed in Colleges and Schools during and after the American Civil War, 1861-1866. Such corps were first authorized by an Amendment to the Militia Act, dated 9th June, 1862.

In 1942, the Department of National Defence expanded the Cadet Movement, regularized the training, clothing and equipment, and began associating corps with the Reserve Force.

In 1948, the Department reorganized the Cadet Movement on a permanent peace time basis, authorizing a peak enrolment of 50,000 cadets.

In 1951, this establishment was raised to 65,000, and the training was aligned more closely with that of the Reserve Force. Nearly all corps are now affiliated with Army Units.

Cadets receive realistic pre-military and citizenship training. In addition, courses are conducted at summer camps for training about 3,500 selected cadets in a few Army trades or as cadet leaders.

The total strength of the RC Army Cadets, June, 1953, is 56,000 in 530 corps. Many of these corps are still sponsored by secondary schools. The uniform is khaki with the red Maple Leaf badge on the upper arm and either a beret or a wedge cap with a red flash.

THE ROYAL CANADIAN AIR FORCE

The Royal Canadian Air Force originated as the C.A.F. in 1920, was granted the title Royal in 1923, and was re-organized as a permanent force on April 1, 1924. Originally consisting of two components, Regular and Auxiliary, it was expanded during the war to include a Special Reserve, a Women's Division, and the Air Cadets. The pre-war strength of the Force was approximately 4,600 officers and men; during the course of the conflict the strength rose to a maximum of over 215,000, including more than 15,000 members of the Women's Division.

One of the R.C.A.F.'s most valuable contributions in the War was the development and administration of the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan, under which 131,553 aircrew personnel were trained in the Dominion for the air forces of Britain, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand. Of the graduates of the training schools over 55% were members of the R.C.A.F., 32% of the R.A.F., and the remainder came from the R.A.A.F. and R.N.Z.A.F. The B.C.A.T.P. agreement, which had been signed at Ottawa in December 1939 and extended in June 1942, expired on March 31, 1945.

Between September 1939 and May 1945 units of the home establishment, operating from bases on the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, in Alaska and the Aleutians, Newfoundland, Labrador and Iceland, were engaged in coastal patrol, convoy protection, anti-submarine and fighter duties. Overseas 47 R.C.A.F. squadrons served in the Western European, Mediterranean, Indian and Burmese theatres. Fourteen heavy bomber squadrons comprised No. 6 R.C.A.F. Group in Bomber Command; another was in the Pathfinder Force. Twenty day fighter, fighter-reconnaissance, fighter-bomber, night fighter and intruder squadrons fought over Western Europe as components of the 2nd Tactical Air Force and Fighter Command. Another day fighter squadron flew with the Desert Air Force in its campaigns from Egypt to Italy. In Coastal Command there were five R.C.A.F. units, including one based in Ceylon. Three transport squadrons carried troops and supplies in Western Europe and Burma, while three A.O.P. units worked with the Canadian Army in the Netherlands and Germany during the last weeks of the war. In addition to the personnel of these squadrons there were many thousands of R.C.A.F. aircrew and groundcrew who served with R.A.F. units overseas. Plans for the Force's participation in the "second phase" against Japan—in addition to the two transport squadrons and R.C.A.F. personnel serving in the Far East—were cut short by the termination of hostilities.

For a time the R.C.A.F. contributed a number of squadrons for the British Air Forces of Occupation in Germany and for transport work. The last of these overseas units was disbanded in June 1946.

PERMANENT FORCE

Control of the RCAF is carried out from Air Force Headquarters, Ottawa, and the permanent force is divided into 4 Commands and 4 Groups. Air Defence Command, with headquarters at St. Hubert (Montreal, P.Q.) has as its primary role the air defence of Canada with its attendant operational problems. Air Defence Command is also responsible for a subsidiary headquarters, 12 Air Defence Group, Vancouver, which is responsible for air operations on the west coast of Canada. Training Command Headquarters, located at Trenton, Ontario, has as its responsibility the basic training of air and ground personnel. 14 Training Group at Winnipeg is controlled by Training Command and administers the training units in Western Canada. Air Transport Command, with headquarters at Lachine, P.Q., directs and supervises the operation of RCAF transport and photographic activities. Air Materiel Command is located at Ottawa and is concerned with the logistics problems of the RCAF. Fundamentally, this involves equipment, supply, aeronautical engineering, construction engineering and aeronautical inspection. The problems and activities concerning the RCAF participation in Maritime warfare are the responsibility of Maritime Group, Halifax, N.S. Tactical Air Group at Edmonton is responsible for the formation of plans and policies related to airborne support of the Army and their coordination with Army requirements. Strength of the Regular R.C.A.F. as of June, 1953 was more than 41,000. Operational elements in existence include Fighter, Fighter Bomber, Photo and Transport Squadrons, Search and Rescue Flights and other special flying units.

RESERVE FORCE

Twelve Auxiliary Squadrons have been formed: Montreal, P.Q. - 2, Toronto, Ont. - 2, Hamilton, Ont. - 1, London, Ont. - 1, Winnipeg, Man. - 1, Saskatoon, Sask. - 1, Edmonton, Alta. - 1, Calgary, Alta. - 1, Vancouver, B.C. - 2. Reserve ground training is conducted by various types of units, including Radar and Communication Squadrons, Technical Training Units, are included in the Auxiliary with the flying squadrons; also part of the reserve scheme are the Reserve Squadrons at the universities and a refresher flying training programme handled for the R.C.A.F. by the flying clubs.

ROYAL CANADIAN AIR CADETS

Air Cadet activities in Canada are sponsored and administered by the Air Cadet League of Canada. The League is a voluntary civilian organization created solely for this purpose and was formed in 1940 to provide preliminary aviation training for potential members of the Royal Canadian Air Force. In peacetime the object of Air Cadet training is to produce better citizens through air-age education. The Royal

Canadian Air Force works jointly with the League and provides training personnel, syllabi and equipment.

During the war, the Royal Canadian Air Cadets reached a peak enrolment of 30,000. The peacetime strength is currently being increased from 15,000 to 22,500. The enrolled strength in June, 1953 was approximately 18,200 cadets in 240 squadrons.

THE CANADIAN SERVICES COLLEGES

Royal Military College of Canada, Kingston, Ont.

Royal Roads, Royal Roads, B.C.

Le Collège Militaire Royal de Saint-Jean,
Saint-Jean, Que.

The Royal Military College of Canada was founded in 1876 at Kingston, Ont. Royal Roads was established in 1941 near Victoria, B.C., as a school for naval officers. In September, 1948, both Colleges were constituted as the Canadian Services Colleges to provide a joint educational and training program for the three Armed Forces of Canada. Le Collège Militaire Royal de Saint-Jean was opened in 1952 at Saint-Jean, Quebec, as the third member of the Canadian Services Colleges.

The purpose of the Canadian Services Colleges is to instruct cadets in appropriate skills and to encourage the qualities essential to continued development after graduation as officers in the Regular or Reserve Forces of the Royal Canadian Navy, Canadian Army, or the Royal Canadian Air Force.

Courses of instruction are designed to develop character, to provide a balanced and liberal education in Arts and Sciences, and to provide a broad basic military education. The tri-service program at Royal Military College, Royal Roads and Le Collège Militaire Royal de Saint-Jean recognizes the fundamental qualities common to the training of officers whether for the Navy, Army, or Air Force, and thereby, seeks to weld a common understanding in matters of national defence.

On entry into one of the Canadian Services Colleges, applicants are enrolled as Regular or Reserve Force subordinate officers in the Armed Force of their selection. On graduation from the four year course, subordinate officers are promoted to Commissioned rank.

Candidates must have reached their 16th, but not their 21st, birthday on the first day of January preceding entrance with the exception of candidates for Le Collège Militaire Royal de Saint-Jean who must have reached their 16th, but not their 20th, birthday on the first day of January preceding entrance.

THE SUBSISTENCE ALLOWANCE

Granted whenever rations and quarters are not provided. A married man living with his family uses his subsistence allowance for their maintenance as well as his own.

SEPARATED FAMILY'S ALLOWANCE

If an officer or man who is in receipt of Marriage Allowance is posted and is authorized to move his dependents to his new place of duty but is nevertheless temporarily separated from them for any of various reasons, he may be entitled to Separated

Family's Allowance at a rate which is based on the circumstances (i.e. whether or not he has children, and whether or not his family is accommodated in married quarters.) Whether or not he is entitled to Subsistence Allowance at his new place of duty he may receive Separated Family's Allowance, subject to certain limitations which are governed by the reason for the family not joining him. If, however, separation is caused by posting to a place of duty to which dependents are not authorized to proceed, Separated Family's Allowance is payable for the entire period of such separation.

OUTFIT ALLOWANCE AND CLOTHING CREDITS

Officers receive a single payment of \$375 on appointment and Warrant Officers Class 1—\$225.00. Men receive a free issue of clothing when they join and thereafter a monthly clothing credit of \$10.

TRADE PAY (extra per month)

Trade Group 1, \$6; 2, \$15; 3, \$30; 4, \$40.

MARRIAGE ALLOWANCE

Men, \$30 per month; Officers, \$40 per month, subject to a reduction of \$10 a month where permanent married quarters are occupied or \$2.50 a month where temporary married quarters are occupied. All ranks may draw this allowance upon marriage provided the initial training period has been completed and the age of 21 has been attained by men and 23 by officers.

PROGRESSIVE PAY INCREASES

Are granted in amounts varying from \$3 to \$35 per month on completion of 3 years' service and 6 years'

service, to all ranks except Officer Cadets and 2nd Lieutenants, from Private 1st Class to and including Colonel. Captains receive an additional increase on completion of 9 years' service. Rates of increase are: Private 1st Class to Corporal—\$3, Sergeant to Warrant Officer Class 1—\$5, Lieutenant—\$15, Captain and Major—\$20, Lieutenant-Colonel—\$25, Colonel—\$35.

RISK ALLOWANCE

An officer or man actively engaged or undergoing training as a flyer, parachutist, or in a submarine in commission, is paid Risk Allowance at the rate of \$30 per month.

NORTHERN ALLOWANCE

Officers and men serving in Northern Canada are paid Northern Allowance at varying rates from \$31.67 to \$75.83 per month, depending upon circumstances.

CANADIAN FLAGS AND BADGES**FLAG OF GOVERNOR GENERAL**

In 1930 His Late Majesty King George V approved the design of a Flag for the Governor General of Canada which would be symbolic of the position of the Governor General as the Sovereign's personal representative. The Flag so approved is of the following description:

"On a blue field, the Royal Crest,—the Imperial Crown proper, thereon a lion statant-guardant or, "erowned proper—subscribed 'CANADA' in black on a yellow scroll."

THE UNION JACK

Is the Flag to be flown by British subjects on land and may be flown in all Her Majesty's realms. With the shield of the Provincial coat of arms it is the official flag of the Lieutenant-Governor of that province. The Union Jack may be flown on selected forts, armories, drill halls and other buildings occupied by the Canadian Army in Canada. (Refer also to paragraph "The Canadian Red Ensign").

THE CANADIAN RED ENSIGN

With the Shield of the Arms of the Dominion of Canada in the fly, was authorized by Admiralty Warrant of the 2nd February, 1892, to be used on board Canadian registered merchant vessels. Following the authorization of a new Coat of Arms for the Dominion of Canada in 1921, it was provided by Order in Council (P.C. 843, 26th April, 1922) that the Shield of the Arms of Canada appearing on the fly of the Canadian Red Ensign should be the Shield of the new Canadian Coat of Arms. In 1934, by Chapter 89 (1) of the Shipping Act, Chapter 44, Statutes of Canada, 1934, statutory provision was made for the flying of the Canadian Red Ensign on ships of Canadian registry.

The Canadian Red Ensign will normally be used

by the Canadian Army when stationed outside of Canada and may be flown at the discretion of the officer commanding a command on selected forts, armories, drill halls and other buildings occupied by the Canadian Army in Canada.

The Canadian Red Ensign as a National Flag

By Order in Council (P.C. 134, 26th January, 1924) the display of the Canadian Red Ensign was authorized from "all buildings owned or occupied by the Canadian Government and situated without Canada."

On Sept. 5, 1945, Order in Council P.C. 5888 was issued as follows:

"That, until such time as action is taken by Parliament for the formal adoption of a national flag, it is desirable to authorize the flying of the Canadian Red Ensign on Federal government buildings within as well as without Canada, and to remove any doubt as to the propriety of flying the Canadian Red Ensign wherever place or occasion may make it desirable to fly a distinctive Canadian flag;

Therefore, His Excellency the Governor General in Council, on the recommendation of the Prime Minister, is pleased to order and doth hereby order that the Red Ensign with the shield of the Coat of Arms of Canada in the fly (hereinafter referred to as "the Canadian Red Ensign") may be flown from buildings owned or occupied by the Federal government within and without Canada.

His Excellency in Council, on the same recommendation, is further pleased to declare and doth hereby declare that it shall be appropriate to fly the Canadian Red Ensign within and without Canada wherever place or occasion may make it desirable to fly a distinctive Canadian flag.

Nothing herein shall be deemed to alter in any way the provisions now in force with respect to the flying of the Blue Ensign with the shield of the Coat of Arms of Canada in the fly on Canadian Naval vessels and other government vessels, nor with respect to the flying of the Canadian Red Ensign on Canadian Merchant vessels."

THE CANADIAN BLUE ENSIGN

With the Shield of the Arms of the Dominion of Canada in the fly, is used on the Jack staff of all ships and vessels of the Royal Canadian Navy and has also been adopted as the official flag for vessels in the Canadian Government Service. Ships operated by provincial government departments, ships and yachts attached to Royal Yacht Clubs in Canada, and merchant ships carrying a specified number of naval reservists as part crew, may wear the Canadian Blue Ensign on authority of a Warrant to do so, issued by the Minister of National Defence.

WHITE ENSIGN

Under agreements made between the Canadian Government and the Government of the United Kingdom at the Imperial Conference 1911, Ships of War of the Dominion of Canada hoist at the stern the White Ensign as a symbol of the authority of the Crown.

NAVAL BOARD FLAG

In 1943, approval was given to a flag to be flown by the Naval Board of Canada. The design is: The Admiralty anchor in gold in the centre of the flag, on red and blue, bisected diagonally with the blue portion nearest the staff, and the red portion uppermost. The flag may be flown both day and night from Naval Headquarters and shall be flown both day and night in H.M.C. ships and establishments when (i) two or more members are present in their official capacities, or (ii) His Excellency The Governor General of Canada is embarked.

This flag, if flown at Naval Headquarters, shall only be struck at Naval Headquarters when the Board as a whole is absent.

R.C.A.F. ENSIGN

This was approved by King George VI, July 5, 1940. The flag is light blue. In the upper quarter next to the flagstaff the Union Jack and in the centre of the fly two roundels, white upon dark blue, and upon the centre of the white roundel a red maple leaf. Royal Canadian Air Force Orders provide that the Royal Canadian Air Force Ensign is to be flown daily at all Royal Canadian Air Force formations, units and detachments.

THE ROYAL CANADIAN NAVAL BADGE

It consists of an oval-shaped shield of deep blue upon which is a fouled anchor in gold. The shield is encircled by a wreath of ten golden maple leaves, five on each side, and is surmounted by the Royal Crown.

THE CANADIAN ARMY BADGE

A new badge for the Canadian Army was approved in 1947 by King George VI. This badge is for the use of the Canadian Army as a whole and will replace the present Coat of Arms on army stationery, publications, etc. The following is a description of the approved design: It consists of two crossed crusader's swords with points upward, blades and grips in natural colours and guards and pommels in gold upon which are three red hard maple leaves joined on one stem. Above, is the Royal Crown properly coloured.

THE R.C.A.F. BADGE

This was approved by King George VI in February, 1943. The official description of the badge is: within a dark blue circular band edged with gold and inscribed in gold the motto "PER ARDUA AD ASTRA," a light blue roundel. In front of the whole a gold eagle flying forward with head lowered and to its left with wings extended beyond the circular band. Beneath, a dark blue riband edged gold and inscribed in gold with the words "ROYAL CANADIAN AIR FORCE." The whole is surmounted with the Royal Crown.

NOVA SCOTIA FLAG

The official flag of the province of Nova Scotia is the blue cross of St. Andrew on a white field, with the Royal Lion mounted thereon. The flag was originally authorized by Charles I in 1625. In 1929, on petition of Nova Scotia, a Royal Warrant of King George V was issued, revoking the modern Arms and ordering that the original Arms granted by King Charles I be borne upon shields, banners and otherwise according to the laws of Arms. Since that time, the Nova Scotia Flag has been in continual use.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC FLAG

The official flag of the Province of Quebec was adopted by Order-in-Council No. 72 on January 1st, 1948. The flag thus adopted is generally known as the "fleurdelisé" flag. It is a white cross on a sky blue ground, with the fleur-de-lis in an upright position on the blue ground in each of the four corners of the flag.

ROYAL CANADIAN MOUNTED POLICE

Honorary Commissioner, HER MAJESTY QUEEN ELIZABETH II

In 1873 the North West Mounted Police was constituted (36 Vic. Chap. 35) to provide Police protection in the unsettled portions of the North West. In 1904 the title "Royal" was given to the Force. In 1920 the Dominion Police was amalgamated with this Force and the name changed to "Royal Canadian Mounted Police." The headquarters was moved from Regina to Ottawa and the Force may now be called upon to perform duties in any portion of the Dominion. In 1928 the Royal Canadian Mounted Police absorbed the Saskatchewan Provincial Police and in 1932 the Provincial Police Forces of Alberta, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island were absorbed in like manner. During the year 1932, the Force also assumed the administration of the Preventive Service Branch of the Department of National Revenue. On August 1, 1950, the duties of the Newfoundland Rangers and certain members of the Newfoundland Constabulary were taken over by the R.C.M.P., and on the 15th of the same month the British Columbia Provincial Police were similarly absorbed. These arrangements were made by agreements between the respective Provincial Governments concerned and the Federal Government. The term of engagement in the Royal Canadian Mounted Police is five years. Recruits are trained at Regina, Saskatchewan, Rockcliffe (near Ottawa), Ontario, and "Fairmont", Vancouver, B.C. At a recent date the Force had 157 horses, 14 Police Service dogs, 227 Sleigh dogs, 1,040 cars, 8 aeroplanes, and 61 ships and boats. The strength, including civilian clerks and reserves, was 5,800.

The northern portion of the Province of Ontario is divided into 11 Districts and the southern portion into 43 Counties. The union of the following counties, Leeds-Grenville, Northumberland-Durham, Prescott-Russell and Stormont-Dundas and Glengarry reduces the county administrations to 38 distinct units for local government. The districts, unlike counties, are not organized for municipal purposes and as a result, the 220 incorporated municipalities contained therein are not united for municipal administration.

With the exception of the 24 cities and the 8 separated towns which are located within counties, the remaining 672 local municipalities in counties are united for administration in the counties of which they form part. This relationship is for the purpose of the administration of inter-related interests such as education, roads, welfare and administration of justice. Members of the County Councils are composed of the Reeves of all the local municipalities within the county and in certain cases the deputy Reeves.

The 8 separated towns are: Brockville, Gananoque, Ingersoll, Prescott, Riverside, St. Mary's, Smith's Falls, Trenton.

POLICE VILLAGES

In addition to the organized villages listed elsewhere in the Ontario section of the Canadian Almanac, there are some 174 police villages.

A police village is run by a Board of Trustees elected by the residents. The Board of Trustees runs its local affairs, but cannot levy any taxes or make by-laws which involve the borrowing of money. It has to send in a requisition to the authorities of the township of which it is part for any finances it requires, such as for local improvements or lighting or village constabulary.

METROPOLITAN TORONTO

The municipality of Metropolitan Toronto, by act of legislature, Bill 10, controls the following utilities in 13 autonomous, contiguous municipalities and urban townships certain roads in Metropolitan Toronto, Toronto Transit Commission, Metropolitan School Board, Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board, Works Department.

The areas affected are: City of Toronto, Township of York, Township of North York, Township of

East York, Township of Scarborough, Township of Etobicoke, Village of Forest Hill, Town of Leaside, Town of Mimico, Town of New Toronto, Village of Long Branch, Town of Weston, Village of Swansea.

IMPROVEMENT DISTRICTS

In 1943 The Municipal Act was amended to provide for the incorporation of Improvement Districts having the municipal status of towns, townships or villages, administered by three trustees appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council.

DATES OF MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS

Municipal elections in Ontario are held at various dates provided for by The Municipal Act, Chapter 266, R.S.O., 1937, sections 64-71 as amended.

Section 64 provides that the nominations shall be held at noon on the last Monday in December except when the last Monday is Christmas day in which case nominations shall be held on the preceding Friday, and the date for polling shall be the first Monday in January; unless council under authority of section 65, not later than November 1st, passes a by-law fixing dates during the period November 15th to January 2nd both inclusive for nominations and elections, said dates to be other than a Sunday or the 24th, 25th or 31st of December and provided the day fixed for nominations is not less than seven days prior to the day fixed for polling in force until repealed, but no appeal or amendment after 1st of November of any year.

In addition, when new municipalities are erected, the Municipal Board may set the date for the holding of their first elections.

BOARDS OF COMMISSIONERS OF POLICE

There shall be for every city, and there may be constituted by the Council thereof for every town having a magistrate, a Board of Commissioners of Police.

The Board shall consist of the mayor, a judge of the county or district court of the county or district in which the city or town is situate, and the magistrate.

COURTS AND JUDGES—ONTARIO

The Supreme Court consists of two Branches, viz. The Court of Appeal and The High Court of Justice.

The Court of Appeal hears appeals from decisions of the High Court and of the lower courts.

The High Court of Justice hears various cases, criminal and civil, and has a wider jurisdiction than the lower courts. A trial judge sits several times each year in the various counties and judicial districts.

The next lower Courts are the County and District Courts and the Division Courts.

One of the County Court Judges in every County is also the Surrogate Judge. The Surrogate Courts deal with wills, and estates of deceased persons.

Appeals may be taken in certain cases, from the Supreme Court of Ontario to the Supreme Court of Canada, and from County, District and Division Courts to the Court of Appeal.

The Exchequer Court of Canada tries cases with which the Crown is concerned, admiralty matters, patents, copyrights, trade marks, Dominion Revenue, railways under the authority of the Parliament of Canada, and railways not wholly within one Province, and disputes between Provinces.

There is an Ontario branch of the Exchequer Court, known as the Ontario Admiralty District.

Supreme Court Judges have jurisdiction.

MATRIMONIAL CAUSES

Actions for divorce must be brought in the Supreme Court of Ontario, and are conducted according to rules passed by the Judges of that Court from time to time. The Court has power to grant divorce, annul a marriage, grant alimony and provide for custody and maintenance of the children.

TITLE TO REAL ESTATE

On a sale of land the owner is only required to show a good title for the preceding 40 years.

REGISTRATION OF BILLS OF SALE, ETC.

Bills of Sale and Chattel Mortgages must be registered in the Office of the Clerk of the County or District Court of the County or District in which the property sold or mortgaged is situated at the time of the execution thereof. The time for registration in the County is five days from the date of execution and ten days from that date in a District. In the provisional County of Haliburton, registration must be within ten days with the Clerk of the County Court of the County of Victoria at Lindsay.

Hire Receipts and Conditional sale agreements must be filed with County or District Court Clerk of County or District in which purchaser or hirer resided at time of hiring or sale. But this does not apply to a contract respecting manufactured goods, including pianos, organs or other musical instruments which, at the time possession is delivered have the name and address of seller or lender painted, printed, stamped or engraved thereon or plainly attached thereto, nor to a contract respecting household furniture other than pianos organs or other musical instruments.

Mechanics Liens must be registered in the Registry Office of the Registry Division, or the Land Titles Office, of locality in which the land affected is situated.

SEAT OF GOVERNMENT—WHITEHORSE

The Yukon was created a separate Territory in June, 1898. Provision is made for a local Government composed of a Chief Executive, styled Commissioner, also an Elective Legislative Council of five members with a three year tenure of office. The Commissioner administers the Government under instructions from the Governor-General in Council or the Minister of Resources and Development. The Commissioner in Council has power to make ordinances dealing with the imposition of local taxes, sale of liquor, preservation of game, establishment of territorial offices, maintenance of prisons and municipal institutions, issue of licences, incorporation of companies, solemnization of marriage, property and civil rights, administration of justice, and generally all matters of a local nature in the Territory.

SEAT OF GOVERNMENT—OTTAWA

The northwest Territories comprise all that part of Canada north of the Sixtieth Parallel of North Latitude, except the portions thereof within the Yukon Territory and the Provinces of Quebec and Newfoundland, and the islands in Hudson Bay, James Bay and Ungava Bay, except those islands within the Provinces of Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec. For administrative purposes the Territories were subdivided into the provisional districts of Mackenzie, Keewatin and Franklin by Order in Council of 16th of March, 1918. The Northwest Territories Act, Chap. 195, R.S.C., 1952, provides for the government of the Northwest Territories by a Commissioner (who is Deputy Minister of the Department of Resources and Development) under instructions given from time to time by the Governor in Council or the Minister of Resources and Development. The Act also provides for a Council consisting

of eight members, one of whom is Deputy Commissioner. Of the eight, three are elected by the people of MacKenzie District to represent three constituencies in the MacKenzie District, and five are senior federal officials appointed by the Governor in Council. Legislative powers are exercised by the Commissioner in Council on such matters as direct taxation within the Territories in order to raise revenue, maintenance of municipal institutions, licenses, solemnization of marriages, property and civil rights, administration of justice, education, public health and generally all matters of a local nature. The administration of the Territories under the Northwest Territories Act and the ordinances passed by the Commissioner in Council is carried on by the Northern Administration Division of the Northern Administration and Lands Branch of the Department of Resources and Development.

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ART GALLERIES AND MUSEUMS IN CANADA

THE NATIONAL GALLERY OF CANADA, OTTAWA

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Open every day except Christmas Day. Week-days, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., Sunday, 2 to 5 p.m.

Founded in 1880 by the Marquis of Lorne, Governor General of Canada, 1878-83, the National Gallery has developed by means of annual grants voted by Parliament and through gifts and bequests. It was first incorporated and provided with a Board of a maximum of five Trustees by the National Gallery of Canada Act, 1913 (3-4 Geo. V, c. 33). The new Act of 1951 (15-16 Geo. VI, c.16) increased the Board's membership to nine. The Gallery is charged not only with the care of the collection but also with the general promotion of art interest in Canada.

The permanent collections include European, British, and Canadian painting, sculpture, prints, and drawings, and other works of art. The most recent *Catalogue of Paintings* in the collection was published in 1948. Photographs and colour reproductions are available. At the National Gallery, special exhibitions, public lectures, classes for children and other students, and concerts are held.

An extensive national programme of travelling exhibitions accounts for some 200 showings annually throughout the country, ranging from small photographic displays to large collections, according to the requirements and facilities of the receiving centre. Besides collections of Canadian art, the National Gallery organizes and circulates in Canada, exhibitions of the art of other countries; and correspondingly it sends Canadian exhibitions abroad (see *Annual Report* for details of exhibitions and their itineraries). Extension work on a national scale also includes the publication of colour reproductions and their distribution to schools and other educational bodies, and to the general public; and loans of films on art, lantern slides, and prepared addresses illustrated with slides (see leaflet, Reproductions, Publications and Lending Collections). Radio broadcasts to schools, and experimental educational tours involving exhibitions, films, and the services of a lecturer, are methods evolved in recent years. The National Gallery, with other institutions, sponsors the magazine "Canadian Art". The Industrial Design Division of the National Gallery, which now maintains display quarters and offices at the Design Centre in the Laurentian Building, encourages Canadian design in industry by means of awards and scholarships, publications, circulating exhibitions and a photographic archive of all original Canadian design.

THE NATIONAL MUSEUM OF CANADA, OTTAWA

The National Museum of Canada originated in the Geological Survey of Canada, which was founded in 1842 by Sir William Logan, Authority to designate it the "National Museum of Canada" was given by Order-in-Council P.C. 2615 of January 5, 1927. Formerly it was designated the Victoria Memorial Museum.

The National Museum exhibits collections illustrating the natural history of the Dominion; its Geology, Mineralogy, Palaeontology, Biology and Anthropology.

The study collections are open to research by properly qualified students. They include over 225,000 sheets of plants, phanerogams and cryptogams, 19,500 mammals, 35,000 birds, 5,400 lots of amphibians and reptiles, smaller collections of fishes and marine invertebrates, 50,000 archaeological specimens, 20,000 ethnological ones and 1,000 in Physical Anthropology. Folk song collections include phonographic recordings of 3,000 Indian, 6,000 French-Canadian, and several hundred British-Canadian songs. Scientific and educational publications on these subjects are available for distribution.

ROYAL ONTARIO MUSEUM

100 Queen's Park, Toronto 5

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The Museum possesses large collections that show the primitive skills of the palaeolithic, neolithic, copper and bronze ages; the early grain civilizations are illustrated in galleries of Babylonian and Egyptian objects. An historical European sequence is contained in galleries devoted to the Greek and Roman collections, including a fine collection of Greek vases, and to the mediaeval and modern periods, including arms and armour, ceramics, silver and glass, woodwork and furniture, textiles, embroideries and lace. The Far Eastern collection is of great importance, with stress laid on Chinese bronzes and ceramics, and on Japanese material. There is a large Ethnological collection, especially of American Indian material. The Museum includes a collection of Japanese prints. In a separate building, 14 Queen's Park is housed the Sigmund Samuel Canadiana Collection.

ROYAL ONTARIO MUSEUM OF GEOLOGY AND MINERALOGY—*Professor* V. B. Meen, M.A., Ph.D., *Director*, Walter M. Tovell, B.A., M.S., *Curator of Geology*, Professor E. S. Moore, M.A., Ph.D., F.R.S.C., *Director Emeritus*; *Professor* A. L. Parsons, A.B., F.R.S.C., *Director Emeritus of Mineralogy*.

The museum occupies three galleries. The exhibits in the north galleries are partly arranged on an economic basis, sections being devoted to ores, fuels, ceramics, building stones, abrasives, refractories, etc. Especial attention has been directed to building and ornamental stones; copper, nickel, radium, silver and gold ores, Canadian coals, etc. The geology of famous mining regions is illustrated by mine models and suites of specimens. There are models of an oil field and oil well with working pump. Glacial geology has received much consideration; striated surfaces, striated stones, and tillites are represented from all the known Ice ages and from all parts of the world. Dynamic and Structural Geology are well represented by numerous specimens and models, and there is a large collection of water colour paintings of glacial features. These galleries are currently being rearranged.

The south gallery contains an unusually complete series of minerals from all parts of the world as well as a special collection of Canadian minerals; collections of cut gems, crystals, meteorites, rocks; and a special series to illustrate the mineral association found in deposits of gold, silver, lead, zinc, radium and nickel, as well as certain non-metallic series. Among the popular exhibits are a reconstructed crystal cave and a collection to show the fluorescence of minerals.

A large part of these collections has been presented by persons connected with the mining industry.

The portion of the Museum devoted to the study of Zoology has exhibits which are arranged in two galleries, one showing a representative series of animals foreign to Canada; the other, a fairly complete series of Canadian animals. In the introductory portion of the Canadian gallery special exhibits are arranged including realistic reproductions of scenes showing animals as they are found in nature.

Aside from the Museum's teaching exhibits, it possesses extensive study collections. These are richest in Canadian forms.

The portion of the Museum devoted to the study

of Palaeontology contains extensive series of Invertebrate fossils arranged to illustrate the anatomy and classification of the different zoological branches, and to indicate the important faunas of the geological ages. Vertebrate fossils are represented by numerous reptiles and by an excellent collection of mammals and fishes. The mounted skeletons of dinosaurs from Alberta are a feature of special importance. Fossil plants are shown by good series of Carboniferous, Cretaceous and Interglacial forms.

Much unique material is included in the exhibits, the numerous type specimens of particular value, e.g., Matthew's types of Cambrian fossils from eastern Canada and type dinosaurs from the Cretaceous formations of Alberta.

The walls of the galleries of invertebrate palaeontology are decorated with an elaborate series of paintings portraying successive stages in the development of the earth. They emphasize particularly the animals and plants of past ages.

DIVISION OF EDUCATION—*Norma Heakes*, B.A., *Supervisor*.

This Division has been organized to enlarge the Museum's service to the public in all fields. More extensive co-operation with schools is being put into effect, and an adult education program of afternoon and evening courses offered. Through this Division the Museum offers travelling collections to schools and other services to outlying parts of the Province.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE IN CANADA

The Church of Christ, Scientist, or Christian Science denomination, in Canada includes 76 churches; 4 in Alberta, 22 in British Columbia, 1 in Newfoundland, 4 in Manitoba, 2 in New Brunswick, 1 in Nova Scotia, 35 in Ontario, 3 in the Province of Quebec, and 4 in Saskatchewan. These regularly organized congregations are in the larger cities and towns, but there are many other Christian Scientists in Canada residing where churches have not yet been organized. As a whole, the Christian Science denomination in Canada is not separately organized. Each church is a branch of The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts, The Mother Church of the Christian Science denomination, but each church has its own self-government. In each province, there is a Christian Science Committee on Publication, while in the larger cities and towns there are public practitioners of Christian Science, the number of such practitioners in Canada being at present about 250. The Christian Science denomination has no ordained clergy, but each church has two Readers who are elected for stated terms from among the members, and who conduct its services. Each church also maintains a public Reading Room, where the authorized literature of the denomination may be found. In 1938 the first college organization in Canada was established and is known as "Christian Science Organization" at the University of Toronto. Christian Science college organizations are also located at the University of Manitoba in Winnipeg and the University of British Columbia in Vancouver. The total number of adherents in Canada, per Census 1951, was 20,795. Communications should be addressed to Thomas E. THE MENNONITES

According to the 1951 census, there were in Canada, 125,938 Mennonites. At present the number of Mennonites are 30,000 in Ontario and 90,000 in the Western Provinces, (Man. Sask., Alb., and B.C.). There is no central organization of the Mennonites, who are divided into 18 or more independent groups consisting of a number of congregations, with from 35 to 3,000 members in each and about 900 ministers.

In 1948 about 1,700 Mennonites, including children, emigrated from Manitoba to an unsettled country in Paraguay, South America. In the same year about 2,000 Refugee Mennonites entered Canada, and several thousand more since.

The Mennonites maintain schools of higher education: The Mennonite Collegiate Institute at Gretna, Man.; The Academy at Rosthern Sask; Two Bible Colleges at Winnipeg; and about 12 Bible Schools at other places.

Several periodicals are published in the interests of the Mennonites in Canada.

THE SYNAGOGUE IN CANADA

The Jews of Canada number 204,836 (Census 1951). There is no federation of synagogues in Canada. Each synagogue is autonomous, is responsible to no superiors, affiliated with no hierarchy. Any group of Jews may form a synagogue, which does not necessarily require the services of a rabbi, any individual being eligible to lead in the recital of prayers.

There are three tendencies evident in Judaism—orthodox, conservative and reform. The orthodox tendency parallels the fundamentalist movement in Christianity; the reform tendency is modernism in Judaism; the conservative tendency is the middle movement.

The Holy Blossom Synagogue of Toronto, the Temple Emanu-El of Montreal, and the Anshe Sholom Synagogue of Hamilton are affiliated with the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, the federation of reform synagogues. The Shaar Hashomayim Synagogue of Montreal, the Goel Tzedec of Toronto the Adath Israel Congregation of Montreal and Beth Israel of Vancouver are affiliated with the United Synagogue of America (conservative). Most of the Canadian congregations are unaffiliated with any parent organization. These parent organizations have no authority over their constituent members.

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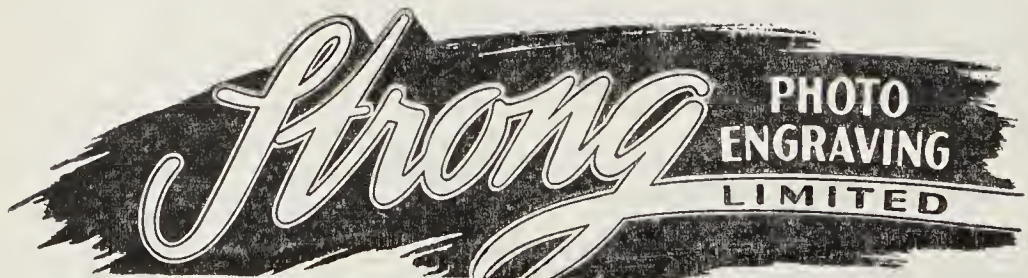

The President and Vice-President are elected for a four-year term (which ends at noon of January 20th) by a college of electors who are chosen by direct vote of the citizens in every state; the voting takes place on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November in every fourth (usually leap) year. Following this election the electors meet and give their votes at the respective state capitals on the first Monday after the second Wednesday in December. The votes of the electors are opened and counted in the presence of both Houses of Congress on the 6th day of January. In actual practice, however, the electors invariably vote unanimously for their political party's nominees for President and Vice-President although there is no

constitutional requirement compelling them to do so. As soon, therefore, as the popular votes in the November election are counted in each State, the results are made public, and thus the names of the President and Vice-President can readily be forecast.

The Statutory Salary of the President is \$100,000 a year; \$50,000 a year is also allowed the President for official entertainment expenses. The Salary is subject to statutory taxes.

Forms of Address.—The President is addressed in diplomatic correspondence: His Excellency; The Vice-President, Honourable. In ordinary correspondence: My dear Mr. President, or, more formally, To the President; or, Hon. ———, President.

UNITED STATES CABINET

The Executive power is vested in the President, who appoints the Cabinet.

THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS

The Legislative power is vested in the United States Congress which consists of two houses: the Senate and the House of Representatives. The Senate consists of two Members from each State, elected for six years, one-third retiring every two years. The House of Representatives is elected for two years, each State choosing one or more representatives according to population. The period of a

Congress is thus two years, a newly elected House of Representatives beginning its term and one-third of the Senators retiring at the same time. Congress must assemble at least once each year. Members of both Houses receive salaries of \$12,500 a year with \$2,500 expense account, plus allowances for travelling and clerical help. The last Congressional elections were held November 4, 1952.

CANADIANS TRAVELLING ABROAD

UNITED STATES IMMIGRATION REGULATIONS

The United States Immigration laws apply equally to all persons not citizens of the United States on each occasion of their entry into the United States.

Every person desiring to enter the United States for any purpose whatever, even for a limited time, must have (1) a passport or other travel document from the Government to which such person owes allegiance, and (2) a visa issued by an American Consular officer; excepting Canadians and British subjects having Canadian "Domicile" who may enter without passports or visas under certain conditions (for details see below).

Visas are of two kinds: (1) Immigrant visas, which are for permanent or indefinite residence in the United States, and (2) Non-immigrant visas, which are for temporary entry into the United States for definite short periods for business, pleasure, transit through as a student, crewman, et cetera.

In connection with an application for a non-immigrant visa at United States consular offices in Canada, all persons with the exception of Canadian citizens and British subjects with "landed immigrant" status must present a passport or other travel document valid for at least six months beyond the contemplated initial period of stay in the United States.

BORDER CROSSING REGULATIONS

Canadian citizens and British subjects with "landed immigrant" status are not required to present visas, passports or border-crossing identification when entering the United States temporarily from Canada or other foreign contiguous territory or adjacent islands. Satisfactory evidence of identity and citizenship may be required and would comprise Canadian or British passports valid or expired, "landed immigrant" cards, Canadian birth or baptismal certificates, or Canadian certificates of naturalization.

Canadian citizens entering the United States temporarily from other than contiguous territory or adjacent islands do not require visas but must be in possession of unexpired passports.

British subjects with "landed immigrant" status in Canada entering the United States from other than contiguous territory or adjacent islands are required to present passports and appropriate non-immigrant visas.

In addition, everyone should be in possession of evidence establishing that he is in fact a bona fide temporary visitor. Letters of reference from the applicant's employer or husband's employer, or bank manager if in business for self, are the most satisfactory. Those who cannot obtain one of the documents referred to above may call in person or write to the nearest U.S. Consulate or U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service Office for further information. American consulates are located in Canada at the following places: Calgary and Edmonton, Alta.; Vancouver, B.C.; Winnipeg, Man.; St. John, N.B.; Halifax, N.S.; Niagara Falls, Toronto, Ottawa, and Windsor, Ont.; Montreal and Quebec City, Quebec; and St. John's, Nfld. Offices of the

United States Immigration and Naturalization Service are located at the following places; Sidney, Vancouver, and Victoria, B.C.; Winnipeg, Man.; St. John, N.B.; Halifax N.S.; Toronto, Ont.; Montreal and Quebec City, P.Q.

American citizens do not require passports to re-enter the United States but must satisfy the immigration officials that they are in fact United States citizens.

CANADIAN PASSPORT INFORMATION

Passports are issued in Canada at the Passport Office, Department of External Affairs, Ottawa.

They are good for five years and are renewable for one period of five years. Fee for a passport is \$5.00 and for renewal \$2.00.

Any person in possession of an old passport, prior to January 1, 1947, should write the Passport Office, Department of External Affairs, Ottawa, for full information concerning renewal.

Canadians travelling to the United States for six months or less do not need a passport.

Canadians travelling to the United States for more than six months must have a visa from a United States Consul.

For the following countries Canadians do not require visas provided they intend to visit these countries for a reasonable period of time: United Kingdom, Norway, Tangiers, Austria.

No visas are required for the following countries if the visit is for a period not exceeding three months: The Netherlands, Sweden, Denmark, Germany, France, Switzerland, Italy.

No visa is required for Belgium provided the length of stay does not exceed a two month period.

Canadians travelling to other countries should communicate with a Consul in Canada representing the country to which they intend to travel.

Canadians wishing to travel to Germany should now make application for a German visa to the German Consul-General whose address is 580 Chapel Street, Ottawa. Canadians wishing to travel to Austria require no visas but enquiries concerning travel to Austria should be directed to the Austrian Consulate-General, 136 Queen Street, Ottawa. An Occupational Forces Travel Permit is needed by a Canadian proceeding to Vienna by road or rail and these permits may be obtained from the Passport Office, Department of External Affairs. Applications for entry to Japan should be made to the Embassy of Japan, 88 Metcalfe St., Ottawa, Ont.

British subjects, who are not Canadians should make application for passports or renewal to the High Commissioners for their countries in Ottawa.

Canadians in British Commonwealth countries may obtain passports or renewals at the Offices of the High Commissioners for Canada in the respective countries.

Canadians in other countries may present applications re passports to British representatives who will forward them to the nearest Canadian posts. In cases of emergency, United Kingdom or other Commonwealth representatives will renew or amend passports for short periods.

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According to the Census of 1951, there were in Canada 19,076 blind persons.

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There are no schools under the jurisdiction of the Department of Education. The Government, through the Education Department, arranges for the education of deaf and blind children in other provinces.

The Department of Education pays grants to assist School Boards with the operation of sight saving and hard-of-hearing classes.

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CANADIAN CUSTOMS AND EXCISE

EXCISE TAXES AND REGULATIONS

Excise Taxes and Regulations at at December 31, 1952

Whenever goods mentioned in Schedules One and Two of this Act are imported into Canada or taken out of warehouse, or manufactured or produced in Canada and delivered to a purchaser thereof, there shall be imposed, levied and collected, in addition to any other duty or tax that may be payable under this Act or any other statute or law, an excise tax in respect of goods mentioned

(a) in Schedule One, at the rate set opposite to each item in the said Schedule computed on the duty paid value or the sale price as the case may be;

(b) in Schedule Two, at the rate set opposite to each item in the said Schedule.

Schedule I

1. Automobiles adapted or adaptable for passenger use, with seating capacity for not more than ten persons each. 15 per cent

Provided that the tax on automobiles shall apply on the total price charged for such automobiles, which price shall include all charges for accessories, optional equipment, advertising, financing, servicing, warranty, or any other charges contracted for at the time of sale, whether charged for separately or not;

Provided further, that the tax shall not apply to automobiles imported under Customs Tariff items 702, 704, 705a, 706, 707 and 708.

2. Articles, materials or preparations of whatever composition or in whatever form, commonly or commercially known as toilet articles, preparations or cosmetics, which are intended for use or application for toilet purposes, or for use in connection with the care of the human body, including the hair, nails, eyes, teeth, or any other part or parts thereof, whether for cleansing, deodorizing, beautifying, preserving or restoring, and to include shaving soaps and shaving creams, antiseptics, bleaches, depilatories, perfumes, scents and similar preparations. 15 per cent

3. (a) Electrical appliances adapted to household use, viz. blankets; chafing dishes; coffee makers; curling irons or tongs; dish washers; food or drink mixers; food choppers and grinders; floor waxers and polishers; garbage disposal units; hair dryers; irons and ironers; juice extractors; kettles; portable humidifiers; razors and shavers; toasters of all kinds; vacuum cleaners and attachments thereof; waffle irons. . . 15 per cent

(c) Firearms and complete parts thereof and ammunition except for military or police purposes. 15 per cent

(d) Motorcycles and all other two- or three-wheeled motor drive vehicles including motors for attachment to bicycles but not including vehicles specially designed for carrying goods or for use by invalids. 15 per cent

(e) Golf clubs and golf halls. 15 per cent

(f) Fishing rods and fishing reels. 15 per cent

4. Devices commonly or commercially known as lighters, which produce sparks, flame or heat, whether or not in combination with other articles, on the separate or combined value as the case may be. . . 15 per cent

5. Cameras, Camera Lenses and unexposed photographic films and plates, except those sold for industrial or professional photographers' use; projectors for pictures except those sold for commercial, religious, or educational purposes. 15 per cent

6. (a) Phonographs, record playing devices, radio broadcasting receiving sets or any combination of the foregoing and tubes thereof; any apparatus or device that enables a person to hear programmes of music distributed by any means whatever or radio broadcasting programmes distributed by any means whatever; but this paragraph does not include any article coming within paragraph (b) of this section. 15 per cent

(b) Television receiving sets and tubes thereof; any apparatus or device that enables a person to see, or to see and hear, television programmes distributed by any means whatever or television radio broadcasting programmes distributed by any means whatever. 15 per cent

7. Coin, disc or token operated slot machines and vending machines; coin, disc or token operated games or amusement devices of all kinds. 15 per cent

Provided that the tax hereby imposed shall not apply to coin collectors used on pay telephones, turnstiles for collecting tolls or charges, coin operated locking devices, nor gas, electric or parking meters.

8. Trunks; suitcases, bags and luggage of all kinds; purses; wallets; billfolds; key and card cases; handbags; jewel cases; dressing and toilet cases; shopping bags, except paper bags; golf and other sports bags; all the foregoing whether fitted or not. . . . 15 per cent

Provided that the tax hereby imposed shall not apply to the goods mentioned herein when manufactured expressly for a customer for his use in the operation of his business or profession.

9. Ash trays; tobacco pipes; cigar and cigarette holders; cigarette rolling devices and other smokers' accessories, not to include lighters, matches or tobacco. 15 per cent

10. Fountain pens; ball-point pens; ink pencils; propelling pencils; desk sets and all other desk accessories. 15 per cent

11. Cigars. 15 per cent

12. Matches. 15 per cent

13. Tires and Tubes:—(a) Tires in whole or in part of rubber for self-propelled machines or automotive vehicles of all kinds, including trailers or other wheeled attachments used in connection with any of the said machines or vehicles. 15 per cent

(b) Inner tubes for use in any such tires. 15 per cent; the tax on the articles enumerated in paragraphs (a) and (b) of this section does not apply to the goods mentioned therein

(i) when used exclusively for the original equipment of such self-propelled machines, automotive vehicles, trailers or other wheeled attachments,

(ii) when used exclusively for replacement purposes on machinery designed for and used only for farm purposes, or

(iii) when designed and catalogued for farm machinery and used on farm trailers used exclusively for farm purposes.

14. (a) Clocks and watches adapted to household or personal use, except railway men's watches, and those specially designed for the use of the blind, and alarm clocks where the sale price by the Canadian manufacturer or the duty paid value of those imported does not exceed ten dollars. 15 per cent

(b) Articles of all kinds made in whole or in part of ivory, jet, amber, coral, mother of pearl, natural shells, tortoise shell, jade, onyx, lapis lazuli, or other semi-precious stones. 15 per cent

Provided that the tax on the articles enumerated in subsections (a) and (b) of this section shall not apply to the goods mentioned where the sale price by the Canadian manufacturer or the duty paid value of the goods imported, does not exceed one dollar.

(c) Articles commonly or commercially known as jewellery, whether real or imitation, including diamonds and other precious or semi-precious stones for personal use or for adornment of the person; goldsmiths' and silversmiths' products except plated table knives, forks and spoons; pewterware; Articles of cut glassware, crystal glassware, cut or not, etched glassware, or metal decorated glassware; Articles of china, porcelain, earthenware, marble, stoneware, or other pottery ware, except articles for use in the preparation or serving of food or drink or except where they are sold or imported for use exclusively in the manufacture of electric lamps. 15 per cent

Provided that the tax on the articles enumerated in subsection (c) of this section shall not apply to the goods mentioned where the sale price by the Canadian manufacturer, or the duty paid value of the goods imported, does not exceed fifty cents.

15. Carbonated beverages, aerated waters, unfermented fruit juice beverages (not including beverages at least ninety-five per cent of which consists of pure juice of the fruit) and imitations thereof and all other

compounded or mixed soft drinks and all mixtures or products advertised or sold for making soft drink beverages or imitations thereof, whether sold in liquid, concentrated or in dry form except where the mixture or product is advertised or sold for making soft drink beverages or imitations thereof for sale.15 per cent

16. Candy, chocolate, chewing gum and confectionery that may be classed as candy or a substitute for candy.15 per cent

Schedule II

1. Carbonic acid gas and similar preparations to be used for aerating non-alcoholic beverages.25 cents per pound

2. Cigarettes, manufactured tobacco and Canadian raw leaf tobacco:—(a) For each five cigarettes or fraction of five cigarettes contained in any package.2 cents

(b) For each pound of manufactured tobacco, including snuff but not including cigars and cigarettes, contained in any package.80 cents

(c) For each pound of Canadian raw leaf tobacco when sold for consumption in Canada.8 cents

This tax also applies to the fur content of imported garments.

Playing cards. For every fifty four cards or fraction of fifty four cards in each package imported or manufactured in Canada.per pack 20 cents

Wines. Wines of all kinds containing not more than seven per cent of absolute alcohol by volume.per gallon 25 cents

Wines of all kinds, except sparkling wines, containing more than seven per cent of absolute alcohol by volume but not more than forty per cent of proof spirit.per gallon 50 cents

Champagne and all other sparkling wines.per gallon \$2.50

SALES TAX

A Sales Tax is collected of 10 per centum on the sale price of all goods produced or manufactured in Canada, including the amount of excise duties when the goods are sold in bond, the tax to be payable by the producer or manufacturer at the time of the sale thereof by him, and of a like tax upon the duty paid value of imported goods the tax to be payable by the importer, or transferee who takes the goods out of bond at the time when the goods are imported or taken out of warehouse for consumption. Note—This tax is not payable on certain exemptions (see below and page 796).

EXEMPTIONS

(1) The said consumption or sales tax shall not be payable in the following cases, that is to say:

- (a) on goods exported; or
- (b) on sale by a licensed manufacturer or producer to another licensed manufacturer or producer of goods to be used in the production of articles for sale; or

(c) on goods imported by a licensed manufacturer if the goods are partly manufactured goods; or

(d) imported by a licensed wholesaler on importation; or

(e) sold by a licensed manufacturer to a licensed wholesaler; or

(f) sold by a licensed wholesaler to a licensed manufacturer if the goods are partly manufactured goods; or

(g) sold by a licensed wholesaler to another licensed wholesaler: Provided that if a licensed wholesaler sells goods to another licensed wholesaler at a price less than the value upon which the tax would be computed under paragraph (e) of the last preceding subsection, the vendor shall forthwith become liable to pay the tax upon the difference between such value and his sale price.

(h) used in the manufacture or production of goods in Canada.

Goods exempt from Sales Tax are indicated in the Tariff under Schedule A; also see list of goods exempt page 796.

SALES TAX LICENCES

Every manufacturer or producer shall take out an annual licence, for the purpose of this Part, and the Minister may prescribe a fee therefor, not exceeding two dollars.

The Minister may nevertheless direct that any class of small manufacturer or producer selling his product exclusively by retail shall be exempt from payment of consumption or sales tax on goods manufactured or produced by him and persons so exempted shall not be given a licence.

Such exemption may be withdrawn by the Minister.

A *bona fide* wholesaler or jobber may be granted an annual licence and the Minister may prescribe a fee therefor not exceeding two dollars.

Upon the cancellation or expiration of the licence granted to any licensed wholesaler, the tax imposed by section eighty-six shall be forthwith payable upon all goods then in the possession of the said licensee, which have been purchased free of tax by virtue of the said licence; the tax shall be paid at the rate in force when the said licence is cancelled or expires and is not renewed and shall be computed in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (c) of subsection one of section eighty-six.

SCHEDULE

EXCISE ACT

BEER, MALT, MALT SYRUP

Beer. Upon all beer or malt liquor:—
(a) brewed in whole or in part from any substance other than malt, per gallon.42c

Malt. Upon all malt brought into a brewery subject to such allowance or rebate in respect to waste as may be authorized by the Governor-in-Council, per pound.21c

SPIRITS

On every gallon of the strength of proof distilled in Canada, except as hereinafter otherwise provided, twelve dollars, and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof and for any less quantity than a gallon:

Established 1877

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2. (a) On every gallon of the strength of proof used in the manufacture of patent and proprietary medicines, extracts, essences and pharmaceutical preparations, one dollar and fifty cents and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof and for any less quantity than a gallon;
2. (b) On every gallon of the strength of proof used in the production of such chemical compositions as are from time to time approved by the Governor in Council, fifteen cents, and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof and for any less quantity than a gallon;
- (3) upon spirits sold to any druggist licensed under this Act, and used exclusively in the preparation of prescriptions for medicines and pharmaceutical preparations, the duty of excise shall be, on every gallon of the strength of proof, one dollar and fifty cents and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof and for any less quantity than a gallon;
- (4) spirits used solely in the manufacture of vinegar by a manufacturer of vinegar licensed under this Act shall be subject to no duty or excise.
- (5) spirits distilled from wine produced from native fruits and used in any bonded manufactory for the treatment of domestic wine are subject to no duty of excise.
- (6) spirits used directly in the manufacture of toilet preparations or cosmetics on which excise tax is applicable under schedule 1 of the Excise Tax Act, are subject to no duty of excise.

Upon imported spirits when taken into a bonded manufactory, in addition to any of the duties otherwise imposed, upon every gallon of the strength of proof, thirty cents, and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof and for any less quantity than a gallon.

CANADIAN BRANDY

On every gallon the strength of proof, ten dollars, and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof and for any less quantity than a gallon.

TOBACCO, CIGARS AND CIGARETTES

Manufactured tobacco of all descriptions except cigarettes, per pound actual weight, thirty-five cents.

Cigarettes weighing not more than two and one-half pounds per thousand, four dollars per thousand. Weighing more than two and one-half pounds per thousand, five dollars per thousand.

Cigars, one dollar per thousand.

Canadian raw leaf tobacco, when sold for consumption, twenty cents per pound.

SPECIAL CUSTOMS TARIFF TAXES

SCHEDULE A

SPIRITS, WINE, TOBACCO

1. There shall be levied, collected and paid on the following goods, whether dutiable or not dutiable, when imported from any country, the additional duties of Customs hereinafter specified:—

- (a) Whisky, brandy, rum, gin and all other goods specified in Customs Tariff Items 156, 156b, per gallon of the strength of proof. \$8.00
- (b) Ale, beer, porter and stout. per gallon 40c
- (c) Wines of all kinds, except sparkling wines, containing not more than forty per cent. of proof spirit. per gallon 42½c.
- (d) Champagne and all other sparkling wines. per gallon \$1.75
- (f) cut tobacco and manufactured tobacco. per lb. 15c.

The above special Duties came into force on the twenty-fifth day of June, nineteen hundred and forty, and applied to all goods mentioned in the foregoing resolutions imported or taken out of warehouse for consumption on and after that date, and to have applied to goods previously imported for which no entry for consumption was made before that date.

CANADIAN TARIFF OF CUSTOMS

NOTE—The rates given in this edition of the Tariff are assigned according to the best available authorities. We, however, disclaim all responsibility should the rates assigned not be verified as correct by the rulings of the Department.

EXPLANATION OF RATES OF DUTY

1. Rates of Duty are given in 3 columns; the first is the British Preferential Tariff, (see Note 11 following) the second is the most Favoured Nations rate, (see Note 2), and the third is the General Tariff (see Note 2). The rate of Duty is per cent. *ad valorem* except when otherwise specified. Where a single rate with 2 blanks is shown, (generally under Most Favoured Nations). example: —, 10%; —, the entry is an "extract" from the main item in the official Customs Tariff and is a special rate applying only to that column. When word "Free" is printed once only it applies to all tariff.

In addition to these rates the following taxes: Sales Tax 10% on duty paid value; and special Excise Taxes, beginning on page 680. See notes on pages 682-689.

Exemptions are shown against specific items.

MEANING OF TERMS USED

1. Unless the context otherwise requires:—
 - (a) The initials "M. ft." represent and have the meaning of the words "one thousand feet board measure;"
 - (b) The initials "n.o.p." represent and have the meaning of the words "not otherwise provided for;" and n.e.s. is an abbreviation of "not elsewhere specified."
 - (c) The expression "gallon" means an Imperial gallon;
 - (d) The expression "ton" means two thousand pounds avoirdupois;
 - (e) The expression "proof," "proof spirit" or "proof spirits," when applied to wines or spirits of any kind, means spirits of a strength equal to that of pure ethyl alcohol compounded with distilled water in such proportions that the resultant mixture shall at a temperature of sixty-two degrees Fahrenheit have a specific gravity of 0.9187 as compared with that of distilled water at the same temperature;
 - (f) "Hoop, band and strip" when applied to metals mean flat forms not more than fourteen inches in width and less than .1875 inch in thickness.
 - (g) "in diameter" when applied to pipes and tubes means the actual inside diameter;
 - (h) "plate" when applied to metals means a rectangle, circle or swatch as cut in a plate mill, more than fourteen inches in width and .1875 inch or more in thickness, with variations from such thickness not exceeding .015 inch.
 - (i) "sheet" when applied to metals means a rectangle more than fourteen inches in width and less than a plate in thickness. "Sheet" aluminum is any width over 4 inches.
 - (j) The initials "p.c." in any one of the Tariff Columns in Schedule "A" to this Act represent and have the meaning of the words "per centum, ad valorem;"
 - (k) The word "free" in any one of the Tariff Columns in Schedule "A" means that the goods opposite which the word appears, and to which the Tariff in said Column applies, may be imported and taken out of warehouse for consumption in Canada, without duty;
 - (l) The expression "iron" includes "steel."

11. BRITISH PREFERENTIAL TARIFF

UNITED KINGDOM-CANADA TRADE AGREEMENT

1. The rates of customs duties, if any, set forth in Column 1, "British Preferential Tariff," shall apply to goods the produce or manufacture of the following British countries when conveyed without transshipment from a port of any British country enjoying the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff into a sea or river port of Canada:

United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland; Union of South Africa; Australia; New Zealand; India; Pakistan; Ceylon; Eire; Newfoundland; British West Indies, including Bahamas, Jamaica, Barbados, Trinidad and Tobago, Antigua, St. Christopher-Nevis, Dominica, Montserrat, Virgin Islands, Grenada, St. Vincent, St. Lucia, Turks and Caicos Islands; Ascension; Bermuda; British Guiana; British Honduras; British North Borneo; Brunei; Basutoland; Bechuanaland Protectorate; British Solomon Islands Protectorate; Cyprus; Channel Islands; Cayman Islands; Cameroons, British Sphere of the; Cook Islands; Fiji; Falkland Islands; Gold Coast; Gambia; Gilbert and Ellice Islands; Isle of Man; Kenya Colony and Protectorate; Malay States, Federated; Malay States, Unfederated; Johore, Kedah, Kelantan, Perlis and Trengganu; Malta; Mauritius and Dependencies thereof; Northern Rhodesia; Nyassaland Protectorate; Nigeria Colony and Protectorate; New Guinea; Norfolk Island; Nauru, Mandated Territory of; Papua; St. Helena; Southern Rhodesia; Sierra Leone; Straits Settlements; Seychelles; Sarawak; Somaliland Protectorate; Swaziland; Tanganyika Territory; Togoland, British

Sphere of; Tonga or Friendly Islands; Uganda Protectorate; Western Samoa; Zanzibar.

Any other British Colony of Protectorate or Territory under British Trusteeship, admitted to the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff in Canada, in the manner hereinafter provided;

Provided, however, that goods entitled to the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff shall be accorded such benefits when such goods are shipped on a through bill of lading consigned to a consignee in a specified port in Canada when such goods are transferred at a port of a British colony or possession enjoying the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff, and conveyed without further transshipment into a sea or river port of Canada.

BRITISH CONTENT

Goods to enjoy the British Preferential Tariff are required to be 50% Empire material and labour unless specifically varied as per list following:

Every manufactured article to be admitted under the British Preferential Tariff must be bona fide the manufacture of a British country entitled to the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff, and a substantial portion of the value of the manufactured article must have been produced by industry in one or more of such countries.

In respect of the under-mentioned commodities, the requirement of one-half British content is reduced to the proportion indicated in each case:

N.B.—In invoicing the chemicals and drugs enumerated in the above groups, in addition to the name group number of each should be given if at all possible.

When the chemicals and drugs provided for in the aforementioned groups are sold under a trade name or description and are invoiced under such trade name or description, the invoice, in addition to giving the relative group number, should also give, if possible, the ordinary pharmaceutical or chemical name of each product.

Certificates of origin "B" on invoice forms "M-B" and "N-B" shall be altered where necessary to conform to the above changes in the British content requirement.

11a. TEN PER CENT ADDITIONAL DISCOUNT

The importer of goods entitled to the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff shall be entitled to a discount of ten per centum on the amount of duty computed under such Tariff, when such goods are conveyed without transshipment from a port of a country enjoying the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff into a sea or river port of Canada on importation and when such goods are shipped on a through bill of lading consigned to a consignee in a specified port in Canada, when such goods are transferred at a port of a British Colony or possession not enjoying the benefits of the British Preferential Tariff, and conveyed without further transshipment into a sea or river port of Canada.

Provided, however, that this discount shall not apply to duties on any of the following articles, viz.,

wines, malt liquors, spirits, spirituous liquors, liquid medicines and articles containing alcohol; sugar, tobacco, cigars and cigarettes.

Provided further that this discount shall not apply in the case in which the duty does not exceed fifteen per centum *ad valorem*, or, in the case of a specific duty or a specific and *ad valorem* duty combined in which the computed rate does not exceed fifteen per centum *ad valorem*, or to goods admitted into Canada which have the benefit of reductions provided for in the Canada-Wear Indies Trade Agreement, 1926.

Note—The 10% additional discount does not apply when the British preferential tariff is the same rate as Most-Favored-Nation tariff agreed to at Geneva.

Excise duties or excise taxes and customs duties shall be disregarded in estimating the market value of goods for the purposes of special duty when the goods are entitled to entry under the British Preferential Tariff or any other tariff.

11b. UNITED KINGDOM-CANADA TRADE AGREEMENT

This Agreement went into force on September 1st, 1937, assuring Great Britain various reductions which are embodied in the British Preferential Tariff column.

This Agreement also extends to goods from all the non-self-governing colonies and Protectorates, the mandated Territories of Togoland, under British mandate, the Cameroons, under British mandate, Tanganyika Territory and Palestine; with treatment not less favourable than that accorded to similar goods the growth, produce or manufactures of any foreign country.

12. MOST-FAVORED-NATION TARIFF

The rates of customs duties, if any, set forth in column (2), "Most-Favored-Nation Tariff", shall apply to goods the growth, produce or manufacture of any British or foreign country to which the benefits of such Most-Favored-Nation Tariff shall have been extended in the manner hereinafter provided or to goods the growth, produce or manufacture of any foreign country to which the benefits of the Inter-

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mediate Tariff applied on May 1, 1948, when imported into Canada direct from a country entitled to the benefits of the Most-Favored-Nation Tariff.

13. GENERAL TARIFF

3. The rates of Customs duties, if any, set forth in Column 3 "General Tariff" shall apply to all goods imported from any country not entitled to the benefits of the British Preference or the Most Favored Nations Tariff.

14. THE CANADA-WEST INDIES TRADE AGREEMENT, 1925

Given in part as it affects imports into Canada.

Agreement entered into dated sixth day of July, nineteen hundred and twenty-five, between the Government of Canada and the Governments of the Colonies, as follows namely:—

The Bahamas Islands	Jamaica
Barbados	Leeward Islands
Bermuda	Trinidad and Tobago
British Guiana	Windward Islands
British Honduras	

The Dominion of Canada, and the several Colonies agree as follows:—

Article I. Subject to the provisions of *The Customs Tariff, 1907*, and to the provisions of Article II hereof, the duties of customs on all goods (other than tobacco, cigars, cigarettes, and spirituous or alcoholic liquors) being the produce or manufacture of any of the Colonies aforesaid imported into Canada which are now subject to duty or which may be made subject to duty at any future time shall not at any time be more than fifty per cent of the duties imposed on similar goods under the General Tariff of Canada.

Article II. Subject to the provisions of *The Customs Tariff, 1907*, the Dominion of Canada grants to the articles enumerated in Schedule A being the produce or manufacture of any of the Colonies aforesaid when imported into Canada the preferential treatment indicated in respect of each such article in the said Schedule A. (see below).

Article III. The Dominion of Canada undertakes to withdraw the benefit of the British Preferential Tariff from any British country which produces cocoa beans if that country does not extend a preference satisfactory to the Governor in Council of Canada to goods the produce or manufacture of Canada over like goods imported into such country from any foreign country.

Article IV. Subject to the provisions of Articles V and VI hereof the duties of customs on all goods (other than tobacco, cigars and cigarettes) being the produce or manufacture of Canada when imported into any of the Colonies aforesaid which are now

subject to duty or which may be made subject to duty at any future time shall at any time be in the case of

- (a) the Bahamas not more than 75 per cent.
- (b) Barbados not more than fifty (50) per cent.
- (c) British Guiana not more than fifty (50) per cent.
- (d) British Honduras not more than sixty-six and two-thirds (66 2/3) per cent.
- (e) Jamaica not more than seventy-five (75) per cent.
- (f) Leeward Islands not more than sixty-six and two-thirds (66 2/3) per cent.
- (g) Trinidad and Tobago not more than fifty (50) per cent.
- (h) the Windward Islands not more than sixty-six and two-thirds (66 2/3) per cent, of the duties imposed on similar goods when imported from any foreign country.

The Bahamas will use their best endeavours to make their percentage fifty per cent. Bermuda will grant preferential treatment to all imports of Canadian origin except wines, spirits, malt liquors, cigars, cigarettes and tobacco by removing the ten per cent surtax now imposed.

Article V. The said Colonies grant to articles specified in Schedule B being the produce or manufacture of Canada when imported into any of the said Colonies the preferential treatment indicated in respect of each such article in the said Schedule B.

Article VI. In the case of the Bahamas the provisions of Article IV (a) shall not apply to wines, malt liquors, spirits, spirituous liquors, liquid medicines and articles containing alcohol.

Article VII. The Government of any of the said Colonies on giving 'six months' notice may provide that to be entitled to the concessions granted in Articles IV and V the products of Canada shall be conveyed without transhipment by ship direct from a Canadian port into such Colony or by way of one of the other Colonies entitled to the advantages of this agreement.

To enjoy the benefit of the tariff advantages conceded to the various Colonies by the Government of Canada the products of any of the said Colonies shall be conveyed without transhipment by ship direct into a sea or river port of Canada; provided, however, that transhipment shall be permitted at a port of any of the said Colonies.

Article VIII. Save as herein otherwise provided this agreement shall not interfere with any existing preference or with the granting of any future preference by the Dominion or by any of the said Colonies to any other part of the British Empire or with any existing preference or the granting of any future preference by the said Colonies among themselves.

The Customs Tariff of Canada shall be amended so as to provide that sugar above number 16 Dutch Standard in colour when imported by a recognized sugar refiner, for refining purposes only, upon evidence satisfactory to the Minister of Customs, shall not be subject to these duties, i.e., the duties on sugar over

number 16 Dutch Standard, specified in item 134 of the Canadian Tariff.

WEST INDIES TRADE AGREEMENT ACT

By Order-in-Council (PC. 2715) passed on the 20th October, 1936, it is provided that goods, the growth, produce or manufacture of those British Colonies which were parties to the Agreement set out in the Schedule to the West Indies Trade Agreement Act, 1926, shall enjoy, effective on and after the 15th November, 1936, on importation into Canada, tariff treatment not less favorable than that accorded to like goods the produce or manufacture of any foreign country.

The provisions of the Order-in-Council are supplementary to, and do not affect in any manner the extension of the British Preferential Tariff to the colonies referred to, or the provisions of the West Indies Trade Agreement Act, 1926.

15. SPECIAL NOTES RE TREATIES, ETC.

GOODS OF ENEMY OR PROSCRIBED ORIGIN

Goods of enemy or proscribed origin are subject to General Tariff rates, the Trade Agreements with enemy or proscribed territories being automatically terminated or suspended. Countries or territories to which the foregoing now applies are: Albania, Bulgaria, Danzig, Estonia, Russian Zone of Germany, Hungary, Italian Colonial Possessions, Japan, Japanese Mandated Islands, Karafuto, Korea, Kwangtung Leased Territory, Latvia, Lithuania, Manchuria, Memel, Roumania, and Zara.

AUSTRALIAN TRADE AGREEMENT

Under the Australian Trade Agreement Act of 1934. Goods set out in Schedule II. of the Act, the produce or manufacture of the Commonwealth of Australia when imported direct shall be admitted into Canada at the rates of duties as specifically shown in the following pages Schedule 'A' of the Custom Tariff starting on page 690

By Order-in-Council, 29th September 1937, for so long as the Trade Agreement between Canada and Australia remains in force, goods the produce or manufacture of the Commonwealth of Australia shall enjoy, on importation into Canada, tariff treatment not less favourable than that accorded to like goods the produce or manufacture of any foreign country.

Note: The provisions of this Order-in-Council are supplementary to, and do not affect in any manner, the extension of the British Preferential Tariff to the Commonwealth of Australia, or the provisions of the Australian Trade Agreement, 1931.

In 1937 the benefits of this Trade Agreement were extended to Papua and Norfolk Island.

NEW ZEALAND TRADE AGREEMENT

Products mentioned in Schedule "A" the product of New Zealand, when imported direct, without transshipment, to Canada, shall be admitted at the rates of duty as are specifically shown in the following pages starting on page 690

By Order-in-Council, 29th September 1937, goods the produce or manufacture of New Zealand shall enjoy, on importation into Canada, tariff treatment not less favourable than that accorded to like goods the produce or manufacture of any foreign country.

Note: The provisions of this Order-in-Council are supplementary to, and do not affect in any manner, the extension of the British Preferential tariff to New Zealand, or the provisions of the New Zealand Trade Agreement, 1932.

PROOF OF ORIGIN

4 Proof of origin, as prescribed by the Minister of National Revenue, shall be furnished with the bill of entry at the Customs House for goods admitted to entry under any of the Tariffs, and that the decision

of the Minister of National Revenue shall be final as to the Tariff or Surtax applicable in any case to imported goods by reason of their origin.

Provided, that goods for which entry is claimed under the Most-Favored-Nation Tariff shall be bona fide the produce or manufacture of a country which has been admitted to the benefits of such Most Favored Nation Tariff;

Provided further that every manufactured article to be admitted under the British Preferential Tariff shall be bona fide the manufacture of a British country entitled to the benefits of such British Preferential Tariff, and that a substantial portion of the value of the manufactured article has been produced by labor in one or more of such countries.

Note: See exceptions pages 684-685.

DUMPING CLAUSE

SPECIAL OR DUMPING DUTY

1. In the case of goods exported to Canada of a class or kind made or produced in Canada, if the export or actual selling price to an importer in Canada is less than the fair market value or the value for duty of the goods as determined under the provisions of the Customs Act, there shall, in addition to the duties otherwise established, be levied, collected and paid on such goods, on their importation into Canada, a special or dumping duty, equal to the difference between the said selling price of the goods for export and the said value for duty thereof; and such special or dumping duty shall be levied, collected and paid on such goods although not otherwise dutiable.

2. The special duty imposed by the preceding subsection shall in no case exceed fifty per cent ad valorem and the following goods shall be exempt from such duty:

(1) Goods of a class subject to duty under the Excise Act;

(2) Goods or classes of goods declared exempt by any order or regulation made by the Governor in Council.

Note—The following goods have been exempted under Order in Council, viz: common and colourless window glass,

3. Duties and taxes imposed in the country of export shall be disregarded in estimating the value for the purpose of the said special duty.

4. 'Export price' or 'selling price' in this section means the exporter's price for the goods, exclusive of all charges thereon after their shipment from the place whence exported direct to Canada.

5. If at any time it appears to the satisfaction of the Minister that the payment of the special duty by this section provided for is being evaded by the shipment of goods on consignment without sale prior to such shipment, the Minister may in any case or class of cases authorize such action as is deemed

necessary to collect on such goods or any of them the same special duty as if the goods had been sold to an importer in Canada prior to their shipment to Canada.

6. If at any time it appears to the satisfaction of the Minister that any person owning or controlling or interested in a business in Canada and also in any other country, or any person carrying on a business in any other country and owning or controlling or interested in a business operating in Canada, and by reason thereof is enabled to import goods for further manufacture or assembling or for resale, and while complying with the legal requirements on importation disposes of such imported goods, whether in the form as imported or as further processed, assembled or manufactured, at prices below the duty paid value thereof as entered at Customs plus, or including all charges upon the goods after shipment from the place whence exported direct to Canada, including sales, distribution and advertising costs, and plus if any, the cost of processing, assembling or further manufacturing in Canada, the Minister may declare that goods of such class or kind were and are on importation subject to an additional special or dumping duty not exceeding fifty per cent and authorize such action as is deemed necessary for the collection thereof.

7. If the full amount of any special duty of Customs as herein provided has not been paid on goods imported, the Customs entry thereof shall be amended and the deficiency paid upon the demand of the Collector.

8. The Minister may make such regulations as are deemed necessary for carrying out the provisions of this section and for its enforcement.

9. For the purposes of this section, goods may be deemed to be of a class or kind not made or produced in Canada where similar goods of Canadian production are not offered for sale to the ordinary agencies of wholesale or retail distribution or are not offered to all purchasers on equal terms under like conditions, having regard to the custom and usage of trade.

10. For the purpose of this Act goods shall not be deemed to be of a class or kind made or produced in Canada unless so made or produced in substantial quantities; and the Governor in Council may provide that such quantities, to be substantial, shall be sufficient to supply a certain percentage of the normal Canadian consumption and may fix such percentages.

RAISING PRICES: REMOVAL OF DUTY.

In the event of the producers of goods in Canada increasing prices in consequence of the imposition of any duty under the provisions of this Act, the Governor in Council may reduce or remove such duty.

22. PREPAYMENT OF IMPORT DUTY BY CUSTOMS DUTY STAMPS ON ADVERTISING MATTER

The following regulations are established by the Honourable the Minister of National Revenue under the authority of Tariff Item 178a:—

1. Customs duty stamps for the prepayment of import duties on advertising matter, price lists and catalogues, and other advertising matter specified in Tariff Item 178 may be obtained in denominations of one, two, five and ten cents each on application to the Deputy Minister of Customs, Ottawa, Canada, each application to be accompanied by a remittance by Postal or Express Money Order or certified cheque payable to the Receiver General of Canada. Customs duty stamps may also be obtained on application to the Secretary, High Commissioner for Canada, The Canadian Building, Trafalgar Square, London, S.W.1, England. Customs duty stamps are redeemable at the discretion of the Department.

2. The Customs duty stamps are to be affixed on each piece of mail matter for the amount of duty payable on the same, and should be affixed in accordance with the postal regulations of the country of despatch; e.g., in United States on reverse side of the piece.

3. Mail matter bearing Customs duty stamps shall be transferred to the Customs after arrival in Canada and before delivery to the addressees, to be checked for the proper payment of duty and to have the Customs duty stamps thereon cancelled by marking same with the Customs "Duty Paid" stamp, Customs dating stamp, or other cancellation stamp.

4. Item 178a of the Customs Tariff as amended, provides: "On the goods specified in Item 178 and dutiable under part (11) of the item when forwarded to Canada by mail, duties may be prepaid by Customs Revenue stamps under regulations by the Minister, at the rates specified in said item, except that on each separate package weighing not more than one ounce the duty shall be one cent under the British Preferential Tariff, two cents under the Intermediate Tariff and two cents under the General Tariff."

5. The articles specified in Tariff Item 178 are: Advertising pamphlets, advertising showcards, illustrated advertising periodicals; price books, catalogues and price lists; advertising almanacs and calendars; patent medicine or other advertising circulars, fly sheets or pamphlets; advertising chromos, chromotypes, oleographs or like work produced by any process other than hand painting or drawing, and having any advertisement or advertising matter printed, lithographed or stamped thereon, or attached thereto, including advertising bills, folders and posters, or other similar artistic work, lithographed, printed or stamped on paper or cardboard for business or advertisement purposes, n.o.p.

By Regulations under Tariff Item 178a, it is ordered that on advertising matter specified in Item 178 referred to in the preceding paragraph, when forwarded by mail, the Customs Duty may be prepaid by affixing Customs stamps thereon according to the following scales, viz:—

In no case shall the duty be less than 35%.

The above regulations do not apply to the following: Advertising matter entitled to the British Preferential tariff and relating to the products or services of such British countries, but not relating to Canadian products or services.

Printed advertising matter issued by railway systems in the British Empire (not including railway systems operating in Canada).

Advertising and printed matter in individual packages not exceeding \$1.00 in value and not specially designed to advertise the sale of goods in

Canada and when not imported for sale or in a manner designed to evade payment of customs duties, when imported from a country entitled to the Most Favored Nation or British Preferential Tariff.

Bona-fide trade catalogues and price lists not specially designed to advertise the sale of goods by any person in Canada when sent into Canada in single copies addressed to merchants therein, and not exceeding one copy to any merchant for his own use, but not for distribution.

The above items are free of customs duties when complying with the conditions mentioned.

The stamps are to be affixed on each package for the amount of the duty and in the case of packages mailed in the United States, these stamps should be affixed on the reverse side of the package.

FISH

Fish caught by fishermen in Canadian fishing vessels and the products thereof carried from the fisheries in such vessels, shall be admitted into Canada free of duty, under regulation by the Minister of Customs.

PROHIBITED GOODS

The importation into Canada of any goods enumerated described or referred to in Schedule "C" (See P. 787) is prohibited.

COMBINE CLAUSE

1. Whenever from or as a result of a judgment of the Supreme Court, or Exchequer Court of Canada, or of any superior court, or circuit, district or county court in Canada, it appears to the satisfaction of the Governor-in-Council, that with regard to any article of commerce there exists any conspiracy, combination, agreement or arrangement of any kind among manufacturers of such articles, or dealers therein to unduly promote the advantage of the manufacturers or dealers at the expense of the consumers, the Governor-in-Council may admit the article free of duty, or so reduce the duty thereon as to give to the public the benefit of reasonable competition in the article, if it appears to the Governor-in-Council that such disadvantage to the consumer is facilitated by the duties of Customs imposed on a like article.

MARKING OF IMPORTED GOODS

The Governor-in-Council may from time to time order imported goods to be marked so as to indicate the country of origin.

Under this provision, the following classes of goods imported into Canada, shall be thus marked or labelled in legible English or French words, and such markings shall be as nearly indelible or permanent as possible, viz.:—

Printed or lithographed matter of all kinds, including books and pictures.

Seals, tickets or labels, irrespective of dimensions when imported in packages or coverings or in strips, sheets or rolls, in quantities in excess of 100 units are subject to the general marking regulations and each seal, ticket or label is required to be marked

Seals, tickets or labels, exceeding one inch in their greatest dimension whether imported in packages or in strips, sheets or rolls, perforated or otherwise prepared for ready separation into single units, or intended to be used in such single units, must be marked with a satisfactory indication of the country of origin on each single unit. The above when not exceeding one inch, when imported in packages containing not more than 100 each, or in strips or rolls of not more than 100 units, may be marked with a satisfactory indication of the country of origin on the first package or on each strip or roll.

Decalcomania or dry transfers, not including ceramic or enamel transfer, are required to be marked with an indication of the country of origin as printed or lithographed matter. Such marking may be affixed on the back or carrier portion thereof, or on each sheet or roll, in the case of dry transfers, on the package in which such transfers are contained, when marking on the sheet or roll is impracticable.

Decalcomania transfers, imported for advertising and display, will be required to be marked with an indication of the country of origin on the face thereof as heretofore; marking on the back or carrier portion will not be accepted.

Decalcomania transfers known as toy transfers may be marked on each sheet, each book or package.

Imported ceramic or enamel transfers are not required to be marked with an indication of the country of origin.

Blind embossed or die stamped indication of the country of origin on printed or lithographed matter imported into Canada will be acceptable as satisfactory provided the marking otherwise complies with the requirements, particularly as to location, legibility, permanency and wording.

Ordinary printed or lithographed paper or other coverings, wrappers or containers, used merely to cover or contain shipments of goods consigned to Canada, are not required to be marked with an indication of the country of origin.

Printed or lithographed containers imported to contain goods for export, and printed or lithographed labels, stickers or wrappers, imported to be attached to goods manufactured or produced in Canada for export trade, may be exempted from the provisions of Section 16 of the Customs Tariff Act, provided the importer signs a certificate on the face of each entry as follows:

"The containers, labels, stickers or wrappers, described on this entry are imported bona fide by the undersigned to contain or to be attached to goods for export, and will be exported with such goods."

Imported containers, labels or wrappers, printed or lithographed, intended to be filled with or used upon domestic products may be marked in such a manner as to indicate the origin of the goods in their condition as imported, for example: "Label printed by John Jones, New York," thereby avoiding an improper imputation of origin in respect of the Canadian manufactured goods with which such imported containers, labels or wrappers are used.

Printed or lithographed matter, imported in single copies, unbound, for the use of the importer and not for sale, for religious, philosophical, educational, scientific or literary purposes, or for the encouragement of the fine arts, may be delivered without being marked with an indication of the country of origin.

Books may be marked on the inside or outside of the front or back cover, the first or last page, or the title page.

Writing, marking or drawing pencils of all kinds pen holders of wood, and fountain pens.

Blind embossed or die-stamped indications of the country of origin on wooden or fibre lead pencils and penholders will only be accepted (1) on plain unpainted pencils and penholders without any other lettering thereon, when legible (2) on plain painted pencils and penholders without lettering thereon, when the combination of colours used in the die-stamping and on the pencil or penholder does not result in an indistinct or illegible indication, and (3) on pencils and penholders with lettering or other printed matter thereon, when the indication appears on the pencil or penholder in the same coloured lettering as the other printed matter. The indication on pencils must not be within one inch of an end which is or may be pointed.

Crayons or chalk, covered with wood, paper or other covering as a holder or for protection, are each required to be marked. Uncovered crayons or chalk may be marked on the first or immediate container.

Fountain pens, and pencils other than wooden or fibre lead pencils, may be marked with blind embossed or die-stamped indications of the country of origin in accordance with the general regulations, provided such marking otherwise complies with the requirements, particularly as to legibility, location, permanence and wording.

Empty paper or paper board folding or set up boxes or cartons, and empty plain or corrugated fibre or fibre board boxes, for use as containers.

Toilet paper in rolls or interfold packages.

Brushes of all kinds.

Tooth brushes and tooth brush handles

Razor blades (safety type).

Razor blades may be marked by means of etching or die stamping.

Pen knives, jack knives, and pocket knives of all kinds; scissors and shears.

Boots, shoes and slippers.

Boots, shoes and slippers may be marked on one or both of each pair.

Ladies purses, in the form of handbags, not including bags made of beads, metal mesh or of a similar nature.

Artists' paint brushes.

Paper envelopes.

Paper envelopes are required to be marked on each envelope when imported in individual boxes containing more than 100 envelopes.

Envelopes in quantities of 100 or less with country of origin showing on the box or wrapper may be regarded as satisfactory.

Greeting cards imported in boxes or packages with envelopes in equal quantity to match, each greeting card shall be satisfactorily marked, envelopes not required to show the indication of country of origin.

Chinaware and porcelainware (not including sanitary or toiletware), decorated or undecorated, as follows:

(i) articles commonly used in connection with the serving of food or drink; or intended or designed for household use for ornamental or decorative purposes;

(ii) kitchenware and utensils;

(iii) heraldic and souvenir ware.

Chinaware and porcelainware must be marked on each piece, except in instances where a lid or cover accompanies a pot, bowl or dish, in which case the lid or cover need not be marked where the pot, bowl or dish itself bears an indication of the country of origin.

An indication of the country of origin will not be accepted as complying with the requirements as to permanency if, although otherwise satisfactory, the marking has been accomplished by means of painting or stamping after the articles have been kiln-fired in the process of manufacture.

With respect to chinaware and porcelainware, the Department will accept the name of the country alone as a satisfactory indication of the country of origin, and will also accept the name of the manufacturing or producing firm accompanied by the country of origin, without the inclusion of the city or province

in that country in which the manufacturer or producer is located. In the case of chinaware and porcelainware, the words "Made in," "Produced in," or words of similar import are not required. (See also paragraph commencing "Any goods," etc. under "Prohibited Goods," p. 787.)

Articles wholly of porcelain for electrical use

Articles of porcelain made for the purpose of being united with other materials so as to form a composite article, as well as small porcelain beads used by electricians, may be marked on the first covering or container in which imported.

Thermometers of all kinds, clocks and clock movements, Waxed paper in rolls or sheets, wrapped, banded, boxed, or packaged specially for household use.

Glazed wall and hearth tiles; and glazed or unglazed floor tiles over six square inches, and all sizes of ceramic mosaic tiles mounted on paper. The indication of the country of origin must be moulded or impressed in, or indelibly printed on, each tile, except ceramic mosaic tiles mounted on paper which may be marked by being indelibly printed on each square foot of paper to which the tiles are affixed.

Packages containing fresh fruit, vegetables or honey are required to be marked with a label or stencil of suitable size in proportion to size of the packages. In the case of bags; stencilled, printed, interwoven or a suitable tag attached.

Vacuum hottles, carafes, flasks, jugs, jars and other thermostatic containers and refills or inserts for use therewith.

REGULATIONS

- (a) When such vacuum hottles or other containers are being imported in the form of complete articles, the marking shall be accomplished by means of die stamping or other indelible impression on the metal or other container.
- (b) In the case of refills or inserts imported separately, the marking shall be accomplished by etching with acid or indelible printing.

Household furniture and other effects, brought in by a non-resident for the temporary equipment of a summer residence and to be exported within the season, and other unspecified articles, including revolvers and pistols, may be admitted after report on Form E-29, upon the Collector being furnished with a cash deposit of a sum equivalent to the duty and taxes payable thereon, the deposit to be subject to refund if the articles be identified and exported at the Customs port where reported inwards, or at another port, within eight months from time of entry.

DRAWBACK ON SHIPS' AND AIRCRAFT STORES

When consumable goods on which duties and/or taxes have been paid are delivered as ships' stores on board British and foreign warships, telegraph cable ships, transports owned, chartered or controlled by the British Admiralty, and ships proceeding on an ocean voyage outside of Canada, for use on board thereof, there may be allowed a drawback of ninety-nine per cent of the duties and/or taxes paid on the goods so delivered. Provided that the Minister of National Revenue shall define and limit the kind, quantity and class of goods which may be so delivered as ships' stores and that such stores or any part thereof shall not be re-landed, sold or disposed of in Canada, without due entry and payment of duty and/or taxes.

When goods on which duties and/or taxes have been paid are used in the manufacture of ships' furnishings or equipment or goods commonly known as ships' chandlery supplied to vessels hereunder described, or when imported ships' furnishings or equipment or goods commonly known as ships' chandlery are supplied to such vessels, viz:—

- (a) Plying on trans-oceanic routes;
- (b) Bound from a port on the Atlantic coast to a port on the Pacific coast and vice versa;
- (c) Regularly clearing for ports south of the line of the Tropic of Cancer; there may be allowed a drawback of ninety-nine per cent of the duties and/or taxes paid on the ships' furnishings, equipment or

chandlery so delivered or on the imported goods used in the manufacture thereof.

When goods on which duties and/or taxes have been paid are used in repairing or reconstructing an ocean going vessel, clearing for a foreign port, there may be allowed a drawback of ninety-nine per cent of the duties and/or taxes paid on the goods so used.

(1) The applicant for drawback shall be the person who has supplied such goods to the vessel or has done the repairs thereto or reconstruction thereof;

(2) The quantities of the goods so supplied or used and the amount of duties and/or taxes paid thereon, shall be ascertained;

(3) Notice, in form prescribed by the Minister of National Revenue, of intent to claim drawback shall be filed with the Collector of Customs and Excise at the time when such goods are supplied to the vessel;

(4) Claims for drawback submitted on and after the 1st April, 1937, shall not be paid unless the Customs duties and/or taxes involved have been paid within three years of the supplying or use of the goods nor unless the claims as presented are filed within six months of the first clearance of the vessel thereafter.

The above regulations also apply to Aircraft.

Drawback on tea, 6½c lb.; coffee roasted in Canada, 5c lb.

DRAWBACK ON GOODS USED IN THE ORIGINAL CONSTRUCTION OF SHIPS OR VESSELS BUILT IN CANADA

When imported goods on which Customs duties have been paid are used in the original construction of,

- (a) Ships or vessels having within themselves the power of independent navigation either by means of sails, steam or other motive power; or
- (b) barges or scows built of iron or steel and measuring over one thousand tons gross tonnage; there may, subject to certain conditions, be allowed a drawback of 99% of the Customs duties paid thereon;

The claimant for drawback shall be in all cases the builder of the ship or vessel.

Duties must have been paid on the goods within three years of the date of filing the claim.

UNITED STATES LEASED BASES IN NEWFOUNDLAND

- (a) Material, equipment, supplies or goods for use

in the construction, maintenance, operation or defence of the bases, consigned to, or destined for, the United States Authorities;

(b) Goods for use or consumption aboard United States public vessels of the Army, Navy, Coast Guard or Coast and Geodetic Surveys;

(c) Goods consigned to the United States Authorities for the use of institutions under Government control known as Post Exchanges, Ships' Service Stores, Commissary Stores or Service Clubs, or for sale thereto to members of the United States forces, or civilian employees of the United States being nationals of the United States and employed in connection with the bases, or members of their families resident with them and not engaged in any business or occupation in Newfoundland. Drawback of customs duties and taxes 99%.

DRAWBACK ON GOODS IMPORTED INTO CANADA AND EXPORTED THEREFROM

The following regulations have been established governing Customs and Excise drawback on goods imported into Canada and thereafter exported, effective on and from September 1, 1946.

When imported goods on which duties and/or taxes have been paid are exported from Canada, there may, subject to the following conditions, be allowed a drawback of ninety-nine per cent of the duties and/or taxes paid thereon:—

1. The drawback shall be paid to exporter of the goods.

2. Whole packages of goods as imported may be broken and part only thereof exported, but no use shall have been made in Canada of the goods exported;

3. The quantity and identification of such goods imported and exported and the amount of duties and/or taxes paid thereon shall be ascertained;

4. Claims for drawback submitted on and after September, 1, 1946, shall not cover goods exported for a period of more than twelve consecutive months and must be filed with the Collector and

complete evidence attached thereto within a period of six months from the date of the last export entry covered by the claim. Such drawback claims shall not be paid unless the duties and/or taxes have been paid on the goods within three years of the date of exportation thereof, nor unless the entered value for duty of the goods exported, on which claim is made, is in the aggregate more than fifty dollars;

5. Claims for drawback shall be made under oath before a Collector, Justice of the Peace or Commissioner for taking Oaths, in such form as the Minister shall prescribe and shall, before payment, be verified to the satisfaction of the Minister, who may require, in any case, the production of such further evidence, in addition to the usual averments, as he deems necessary to establish the bona fides of the claim. Nothing in these regulations shall be deemed to alter or amend the law, or to affect any discretion vested

in the Minister with respect to the payment or non-payment of drawbacks, and the Minister shall be the sole judge as to whether any claim for drawback shall be paid in whole or in part.

6. Upon the exportation of goods entitled to drawback, export entries, in triplicate, in the usual form (with the words "subject to Drawback" marked on the face), shall be filed with the Collector at the port of exit from Canada, naming the conveyance by which and the country or place to which the goods are to be exported and fully describing the kind and quantity thereof and also the marks and numbers on the packages.

7. The following documents shall be delivered with the claim for drawback:—

(a) A copy of the import entry showing payment of duties and/or taxes on the goods imported and exported, on which drawback is claimed. If a copy of the import entry, however, has been furnished with a previous claim for drawback, it will be sufficient to

"refer" to such copy and indicate the claim to which it was attached, without furnishing a further copy of the entry;

(b) A certified true copy of the export invoice;

(c) A copy of the export entry, duly numbered and certified by the Collector at the port of exit where the goods were entered for exportation from Canada;

(d) A certificate of importation, sale or transfer, in form prescribed by the Minister, when the claimant entitled to drawback is not the importer of the goods.

9. Drawback is not payable in respect of Customs penalties imposed on imported goods, nor in respect of goods referred to above which are returned to the country from whence imported.

SCHEDULE "C"

PROHIBITED GOODS

"Aspirin," so marked by trade name.

Books, printed paper, drawings, paintings, prints, playing cards, photographs or representations of any kind treasonable or seditious, or of an immoral or indecent character.

Bees, importation into Canada of bees, used or second-hand hives, or raw hive goods or products, except honey or wax. To prevent further introduction of foul brood and other diseases, combs, second-hand hives and bee supplies. Bees imported in combless packages, unless accompanied by certificate, stating that the food supplied and carried in the package is free from disease.

Reprints of Canadian Copyrighted Works, and reprints of British Copyrighted Works which have been copyrighted in Canada.

Coin, base or counterfeit.

Oleomargarine, butterine or other similar substitutes for butter, and process butter or renovated butter.

Tea adulterated with spurious leaf or with exhausted leaves or containing so great an admixture of chemical or other deleterious substances as to make it unfit for use.

Goods manufactured or produced wholly or in part by prison labour or which have been made within or in connection with any prison, jail or penitentiary; also goods similar in character to those produced in such institutions, when sold or offered for sale by any person, firm or corporation having a contract for the manufacture of such articles in such institutions or by any agent of such person, firm or corporation, or when such goods were originally purchased from or transferred by any such contractor. The Governor in Council may by regulation exempt any goods or class of goods to be further manufactured in Canada from the provisions of this item.

Animals suffering from any contagious disease.

Metallic trading checks in circular form.

Any goods— (a) which, if sold, would be forfeited under the provisions of Part VII of the Criminal Code; or, (b) Manufactured in any foreign state or country which bear any name or trade mark which is or purports to be the name or trade mark of any manufacturer, dealer or trader in the United Kingdom or in Canada unless such name or trade mark is accompanied by a definite indication of the foreign state or country in which the goods were made or produced:

Provided that for the purposes of this item if there is on any goods a name which is identical with or a colourable imitation of the name of a place in the United Kingdom or in Canada, or in any other British country, such name, unless it is accompanied by the name of the state or country in which it is situate shall unless the Minister decides that the attaching of such name is not calculated to deceive, (of which matter the Minister shall be the sole judge), be treated as if it was the name of a place in the United Kingdom or in Canada or in any other British country.

Automobiles and motor vehicles (used or second hand), all kinds, manufactured previous to the calendar year in which importation into Canada is

sought to be made. Tariff Items 702 and 705A, 706, 707 or 708 or under tourists' or travellers' vehicle permit; or forfeited or confiscated for any offence under the customs regulation; or left by bequest, or a bona fide settler on a first arrival, but not entitled to entry free of duty under Tariff Item 705A are alone exempt.

Used or second-hand aeroplanes and aircraft of all kinds:

Provided that this item does not affect in any manner aeroplanes and aircraft:

(a) Imported under tariff item 707 and 708, or engaged solely in international traffic, or brought in by non-resident tourists for temporary use under permit issued by the Department of National Revenue.

(c) Forfeited or confiscated for any offence under the customs laws, the air regulations or the laws of any province of Canada.

(d) Imported by the Department of National Defence for military purposes.

Posters and handbills depicting scenes of crime or of violence.

White phosphorus matches.

Perfumes imported for sale bearing thereon or on the containers thereof the name or trade mark "Coty" the autographic signature "Coty" or the word "Styx."

Common mongoose (*Herpestes griseus*) or mongoose of any kind;

Any bird of the starling family (*sturnidae*), except the European starling (*sturnis vulgaris*).

Any other non-game bird, except any of the following:—

(a) A domestic bird of a kind kept for food purposes.

(b) A bird intended solely for exhibition in a public zoological park;

(c) A bird intended solely to be kept in confinement in a cage or to be used for purposes of public entertainment.

Used or second-hand periodical publications:

Provided that this item does not affect in any manner periodical publications:

(a) Sent, gratis, to Canada for charitable purposes.

(b) Sent to persons in Canada as casual donations by friends abroad.

(c) Imported for personal or for institutional use, and not for resale.

(d) Imported by or for paper mills for use as stock in the manufacture of paper.

Used or second-hand mattresses or materials therefrom:

Provided, that this item does not affect in any manner:

(a) Mattresses imported under Tariff Items 704, 705, 706, 707, 708, or under tourists' or travellers' vehicle permits.

(b) Materials from used or second-hand mattresses, when imported after having been cleaned and fumigated, under such regulations as the Minister may prescribe, accompanied by such certificates as he may designate.

Vaseline—Goods imported for sale, bearing thereon or on the container the word or trademark "Vaseline."

Smoke screen apparatus for use on motor vehicles or on water borne craft of all kinds.

Aigrettes, egret plumes, or so called osprey plumes, and the feathers, quills, heads, wings, tails, skins, or parts of skins of wild birds, either raw or manufactured; but this provision shall not apply to:—

The feathers or plumes of ostriches,—

The plumes of the English pheasant and the Indian peacock,—

The plumage of wild birds of groups recognized as game birds in any Canadian game law, and for which an open season is provided thereunder,—
The plumage of birds imported alive, nor to specimens etc., imported under regulations of the

Minister of National Revenue for any natural history or other museum, or for scientific or educational purposes.

Goods imported for sale bearing thereon or on the containers thereof the name or trademark of the Parker Fountain Pen Company, Limited, and any pen or pencil having any one or more of the following features:

- (a) A pocket clip in the form and shape of an arrow;
- (b) The representation of an arrow on the nib of the pen;
- (c) A laminated barrel having alternating translucent and opaque laminations.

PACKAGES

The following Items show the approximate value for duty on packages of their respective goods, when value of packages is not mentioned on the invoice presented for entry.

ADDENDA

A selection of abridged notes to aid Importers and others with limited experience in Customs business.

Animals, pure bred, for improvement of stock, to be duty free, must be imported under strict Customs regulations

British Preferential. To secure the British Preferential it is necessary to note that:—

- (1) A separate invoice must be furnished for preferential goods.
- (2) Invoice must have certificate as to origin of goods.
- (3) Goods must be packed separately or not mixed up with other goods
- (4) Goods must come direct or have a through bill of lading.

Cash discounts are not allowed for Customs purposes. The terms of the cash discount should be shown on the invoice but deduction of the amount, and without evidence that the discount has been earned, dumping duty will apply.

Cattle for exhibition purposes over six months old entering Canada from the United States must have a veterinary certificate signed by a veterinary inspector of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry, stating that they have passed the tubercular test within the last six months, also an affidavit from the importer identifying the cattle entered. The importer is required to furnish a bond for security equal to the full value of the animals and articles entered, conditional upon the due exportation of the same, or the delivery to the Customs Collector the proper manifests for the transportation of the animals and articles in bond, or the payment of duty thereon, within three months from time of entry.

Deer, in the carcass or parts thereof, when shot for sport, under provincial or territorial authority in Canada, by any person not domiciled in Canada, may be exported at the customs ports of Halifax, Yarmouth, McAdam Junction, Saint John, N.B., St. Stephen, Montreal, Quebec, Sherbrooke, Bebe Junction, St. Armand, Fort Erie, Brockville, Kingston, Ottawa, Port Arthur, Prescott, Niagara Falls, Sarnia, Sault Ste. Marie, Toronto, Windsor, Ont., Emerson, Coufts, North Portal, Kingsgate, Waneta, B.C., White Horse, Y.T., all other customs ports and outposts in Canada on the frontier of the United States, and such other ports as shall from time to time be designated by the Minister of National Revenue for the export of deer.

An export entry in duplicate is required in respect of deer in the carcass or parts thereof shot under provincial or territorial authority and intended to be exported, and exportation may be permitted upon the exporter subscribing and attesting before a Collector of National Revenue or other officer of Customs a declaration to be annexed to said export entry.

In cases where a non-resident sportsman desires to leave Canada before the game arrives at a Customs Port of Exit, the Export Entry and declaration may be made by such sportsman and left with the Collector of National Revenue at the Port of Exit for use when the game arrives at the said port.

The exportation of deer in the carcass or parts thereof, being the property of a provincial government, may be permitted without the declaration provided in Section 4 hereof upon the Collector of National Revenue or other officer of Customs being furnished with a certificate signed by a duly authorized officer of the provincial government concerned to the effect that the deer or parts thereof proposed to be exported are the property of the provincial government.

Any person who wishes to export any carcass or parts thereof of deer raised or bred upon his own land, or upon lands owned by a Company or association of persons of which he is a member, shall make affidavit upon the face of the export entry to the effect that the deer, the carcass or parts whereof is so entered for exportation, was raised or bred upon his own

lands or upon lands owned or held by a company or association of persons of which he is a member (describing the location of such lands, and naming the association or company holding the same).

Where in any province or territory the right to sell deer in the carcass or parts thereof is prohibited or restricted, the same shall not be exported if sold in contravention of such law.

Dogs, pure bred. To obtain free entry the importer must produce a certificate of purity of blood signed by the breeder. He must also make an affidavit that the dogs imported are the identical animals described on the certificate.

Exports of Prohibited Goods. Transportation companies and others concerned are advised that, except when specially authorized, shipments may not go forward from interior points to the frontier ports of exit unless the required export license or permit accompanies the shipping document.

Firearms and dangerous and offensive weapons, restrictions on importation of:—

"Note that a permit (which may be known as a Police Permit) in Form 76a and 76b is required by everyone to lawfully have upon his person elsewhere than in his dwelling house, etc., or to carry, concealed, a pistol, revolver, sheath knife, etc., or other dangerous or offensive weapon, and that a similar police permit is required by every alien to lawfully have in his possession *anywhere* any firearm, or ammunition therefor, or any offensive weapon.

An alien, though a bona fide sportsman and hunter, passing through Canada having in his possession any revolver or pistol is required to have a permit. Note—Automatic and semi-automatic pistols are prohibited importation.

Firearm Exports Prohibited. In respect of Arms, Ammunition, Implements or Munitions of war, may not be exported without Arms Export Permit issued by Foreign Exchange Control Board.

Flying. The Defence of Canada Regulations prohibit the navigation of all civil aircraft over Canada or Canadian waters, except under specific permission granted by or on behalf of the Minister of Transport.

Fowls, pure bred, must have a certificate of blood describing the breed and signed by the breeder.

Goods damaged in transit. Collectors may permit an importer to abandon to the Crown any whole package of goods damaged in transit, and be relieved of payment of duty thereon, if notice is given within 14 days.

Gold export:—Collectors of Customs must not permit the exportation of gold whether in the form of coin or bullion, except upon the production of a license issued by the Deputy Minister of Finance for each shipment, such license to state the value or the approximate weight in ounces of the gold comprising the shipment. Provided that no such license shall be issued to other than a Canadian chartered bank or the Bank of Canada.

Goods perishable and breakable. Collectors are permitted to make no allowance for all damage in excess of 15% as certified to by the appraiser on perishable and breakable goods such as fruit, crockery and glass. Customs must be notified within 3 days on perishable goods and 14 days on breakable goods. If full duty has been paid, refund would be allowed.

Horses carriages and harness going into the United States by permit, may be re-admitted into Canada duty free if they are returned within the period specified on the permit without change of ownership. They must be reported outward in duplicate with such description as to be identified on return. Duty is to be paid on repairs, provided however, that the expense of compulsory repairs, rendered necessary as the result of an accident or other casualty, to enable the vehicle to continue the tour

and return to Canada shall be exempt from duty and taxes.

Machinery and articles when exported for repairs may be re-admitted by payment of duty on the repairs, only if returned within one year, provided further that application was made for outward entry and examination at Customs at time of export; provided the repairs cannot be made in Canada.

Meats:—All importations of potted, canned or preserved meats must be examined by an officer of the Department of Agriculture in addition to the certificate of purity that must accompany such goods. Pork, fresh or frozen, is prohibited importation except under license by the Minister of National Revenue.

Milk, Vegetable and Fruit Regulations: The containers of milk, vegetable and fruit products:—

- (a) Are to be marked with the initials, the surname and the address of the packer;
- (b) Must give a true description of the contents;
- (c) Must show the firm No. assigned to the establishment and must correspond otherwise with the label on the container;
- (d) Owners or managers of establishments shall supply to the Dairy and Cold Storage Commissioner duplicate copies of all labels, stencils or lithographed designs used in the establishments; no labels, stencils or lithographed designs shall be used unless they have been approved in writing by the said Commissioner. One copy shall be filed with the Dairy and Cold Storage Commissioner, the other copy to be retained by the owner or manager and shall be produced for the information of an inspector when required.

Perishable goods:—Arrangements have been made for the delivery of perishable goods prior to making the regular Customs entry. For this purpose, the importer may deposit with the Collector of Customs a bond or money sufficient to pay the duty and taxes, and the required entry must be completed within ninety-six hours. When arrangements have been made to deliver goods on this basis, the importer must present his invoice to the proper Customs Officer at the point of arrival, for checking purposes, and must be sure entry is made within the ninety-six hour period, otherwise the arrangement may be cancelled and the deposit seized. Perishable goods are considered to be fruits, vegetables, fish and such like goods that are subject to decay. Similar arrangements can be made for the delivery of newspapers and periodicals.

Poultry, Dressed:—No person shall import dressed poultry into Canada unless such poultry has been graded and packed and the boxes marked in accordance with the Regulation respecting the Grading and Marking of Dressed Poultry. No more than twelve birds shall be packed in any one box.

Perfecting entries. Sight entries must be perfected as well as entries on Form B1, on which duty is paid, pending production of certificate under Customs regulations for free entry of same, and for which a refund of duty is applied for. (See also Sight Entries on page 791.)

Pineapple, canned, grading below "Choice Quality" is prohibited except when imported in containers of not less than one half gallon capacity for re-manufacturing purposes.

Articles, when imported into Canada temporarily for repairs, adjustments or to be tested, may be admitted without duty or taxes; provided that the articles are such as can be satisfactorily identified and that a deposit or acceptable bond for double the amount of Customs duty and/or taxes be delivered to the Collector of Customs and Excise as security for the exportation of the articles under Customs supervision, or the due entry thereof for consumption, within six months from the date of importation.

Refund of Duty.—No refund of duty paid shall be allowed because of any alleged inferiority, or deficiency, or omission, unless reported to the collector within thirty days of the date of entry or

delivery or landing, and the said goods have been examined by the said collector or by an appraiser or other proper officer of Customs, and the proper rate or amount of reduction certified by him after such examination.

Refund on goods returned not according to order, must comply with the following conditions:—

- (1) Goods are to be identified by Customs.
- (2) And exported within six months of date of entry.
- (3) Proof of export furnished.
- (4) Must be accompanied by export entry in triplicate.
- (5) Delivered under Customs supervision.
- (6) Copy of waybill signed by carrier, also copy of export entry duly certified to by Customs officer at port of exit must be annexed to refund claim.

Refund on goods damaged in transit, duty having been paid on the entire shipment according to the invoice, it will be necessary to bill the railway or inland carriers for the amount of the duty in addition to the value of the goods. It will then be up to the railway to produce a short landing certificate from the ocean carriers if the goods are from overseas, or a proof that the goods were lost or destroyed beyond the confines of Canada. When this proof is produced it must be attached to the refund claim.

Samples, Travellers'—(1) Imported samples (not Canadian produce or manufacture) such as are carried by commercial travellers intended solely for use in taking orders for similar merchandise and not for sale, together with the trunks and other packages containing same (except when of "no commercial value") are subject to ordinary duty and taxes at each time of importation, but not to special duty in addition thereto; provided, however, that the trunks in which samples are contained may be admitted free after payment of duty and taxes on first importation, if identified to the satisfaction of the Customs Officer.

- (2) Commercial travellers are required to deliver to the Customs Officer for entry purposes a properly certified invoice or a statement in detail, showing the price (wholesale) of each sample as sold for home consumption.
- (3) Cards, portfolios, pasteboard boxes or other coverings containing articles obviously for use only as samples to sell by and having no commercial value, may be admitted free of duty and taxes.

Special Regulations Respecting Samples from British Countries and from Most Favoured Nation Countries.

When such commercial travellers' samples are imported temporarily direct by non-residents of Canada from any British country or from any country entitled to most favoured nation treatment in tariff matters by Canada, they may be admitted upon deposit of a sum equivalent to the duty and taxes thereon, such deposit to be subject to refund on the exportation of samples under Customs supervision within twelve months from the date of Customs entry. The importer shall make and subscribe to a declaration on the face of the temporary entry that the goods described therein are bona fide samples for use only in taking orders for merchandise and are to be exported within twelve months.

When the samples are marked by a Customs Officer for identification and the temporary entry duly completed, the Collector may issue his permission for the release of the samples upon receiving the required deposit from the importer.

If all of the samples are not exported a deduction shall be made from the deposit equivalent to the duty and taxes payable on the samples not exported.

Samples admitted to temporary entry on deposit under the special regulations respecting samples from British and Most Favoured Nation Countries may be taken to the United

States by the traveller and returned to Canada merely upon report at Customs at any time within twelve months from the date of the temporary entry. On their return the samples may be admitted without entry if, upon being checked by a Customs Officer against the copy of the temporary entry and invoice in possession of the traveller, the officer is satisfied that the samples are those referred to in such temporary entry.

TEMPORARY ENTRY OF CIRCUSES AND OTHER AMUSEMENT DEVICES

The equipment comprising the attractions specified hereunder may be admitted upon payment of the following fees, in lieu of Customs and Excise duties and taxes, for each month or portion thereof while in Canada.

- (1) Circuses, with or without menageries, but not including amusement riding devices, side-shows and concessions intended to operate outside of the circus and menagerie proper, and for which a separate admission is charged, moving in six or more railway cars or in twelve or more motor trucks. \$3,000
- (2) Same as (1) but when moving in five or less railway cars or in eleven or less motor trucks. . \$1,500
- (3) Amusement riding devices, being individual units of what is commonly known as a carnival or midway outfit, whether imported with a circus or otherwise, each. \$200
- (4) Same as (3) but designed for use exclusively by children. \$100
- (5) Amusement riding devices, to be operated as attractions at fairs or exhibitions held by any agricultural or other association, each. \$100
- (6) Same as (5) but designed for use exclusively by children. \$50
- (7) Side-shows and concessions, being individual units of what is commonly known as a carnival or midway outfit, whether imported with a circus or otherwise, each. \$100
- (8) Portable lighting units, including the vehicles by which transportation is effected, for the illumination of baseball and other grounds:
 - (a) With electric generators. \$200
 - (b) Without generators. \$100
- (9) Automobiles and motorcycles for competitive racing purposes are subject to the following fees in

lieu of Customs and Excise duties and taxes for each calendar month in any one year while in Canada:

- (a) Racing automobiles, each. \$10
- (b) Racing motorcycles, each. \$ 5

No refund of the above fees upon exportation from Canada. For regulations in connection with the above see your local Collector of Customs and Excise.

Imported tickets, advertising matter, programs, books, consumables, and articles for sale or to be distributed gratis, are subject to the regular duty and sales tax. For further particulars consult Dept. of National Revenue, Ottawa.

Sight Entry—If the importer or the person authorized, makes a declaration before the collector or other proper officer, that he cannot, for want of full information, make perfect entry thereof, the collector or officer may cause such goods to be landed on a bill of sight, by the best description that can be given, and to be seen and examined by such person and at his expense, in the presence of the collector or other proper officer, and to be delivered to such person, on his depositing a sum of money sufficient to pay the duties thereon.

(2) If the importer does not complete a perfect entry within the time appointed by the collector, the money so deposited shall be taken and held as duty accruing on such goods and a penalty equal to the amount deposited shall also be collected.

Valuation for duty on goods not sold for home consumption may, usually, be determined by ascertaining the total cost of producing the goods in condition ready for market and adding thereto the usual profits made on sales of a similar line of goods. Exporters shall show the amount on the invoice, the facts as to the following:

- (1) Freight prepaid and charged.
- (2) Freight prepaid and not charged.
- (3) Freight allowed to be deducted by the importer at settlement.

Waybills must show:—

- (1) Name and address of consignee.
- (2) Marks and number of packages
- (3) Description of the goods contained in each package.
- (4) When goods are in hulk, the number of pieces, bundles or bushels.
- (5) In case of agricultural instruments, number and description of each class of instruments.

CUSTOMS PROCEDURE, ETC.

EXPORTING TO THE UNITED STATES

The customs laws of the United States, governing the importation of goods, very materially differ from ours. They have no such thing as the manifesting system such as we have, and all merchandise is supposed to be entered at the first port of arrival. However, they have ports termed I.T. Ports (immediate transport ports) to which goods may be forwarded in bond, without appraisement at the frontier port. In this case the goods must be carefully marked "Forwarded in Bond."

Merchandise, in order to be entered under Immediate Transportation, without appraisement at the frontier, must be destined to a designated immediate transportation port, and *must* be billed via a port at which merchandise may be entered for transportation to another port without appraisement.

These ports *through which* goods must be billed and to which they must be consigned may be learned from the transportation company as the lists are too extensive to be given space here.

If goods are destined for a foreign country they are entirely under Transportation and Exportation entry in bond, in transit, for exportation from the seaboard port.

EXPORTING TO OTHER COUNTRIES

Exporters requiring information regarding invoice forms and Customs Regulations of other countries, applying to goods exported from Canada, should write to Department of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa.

GIFTS TO THOSE ON ACTIVE SERVICE

To be exported as gifts, addressed to members of the armed forces of the British Empire or their Allies, do not require a permit to export.

GOODS TO BE RETURNED TO THE U.S.

Merchants finding it necessary to return goods not according to order and wishing to obtain refund of duty will be required to make out four different forms to accompany the way bill when goods are shipped back. If shipment is over \$100.00 the forms are as follow:

1. "Foreign Owner's Oath" or "Oath of American Manufacture."
2. American Consular Certificate.
3. Export papers in triplicate.
4. One certified copy of Customs Incoming Manifest.

F.E.C.B. export permit—5 copies.

Where shipment is under \$100.00 the American Consular Certificate and Incoming Manifest are not required.

The intending consignee must send to the U.S. shipper for an affidavit on a prescribed form, mentioned above as the Oath of American Manufacture, declaring the goods to be of United States origin or manufacture, in order that the goods when returned may pass the U.S. Customs without duty.

When this affidavit is received it must be attached to the way bill by the transportation agent here and forwarded along with the goods. This will enable the United States Customs Officer at the frontier to recognize the goods as home manufacture and have them forwarded on to destination without duty. The original U.S. shipper may secure these forms at his Customs, but a better way is for the intending consignee to secure a copy from the local express agent here and forward same to the U.S. firm with all necessary explanation as to line of procedure and thus avoid possible delay.

The American Consular Certificate forms must be obtained from the nearest American Consul, who will

send blank forms in triplicate. These must be filled in as required and returned to the American Consul with his fee, when he will return one copy to the intending consignee, who will attach same to way bill with other documents mentioned.

Export entry, procurable from Customs Department, must be made out by consignee in triplicate and attached to way bill together with the Foreign Owner's Oath, Consular Certificate and Incoming Manifest. One copy will remain on file at the port of exit, the second copy goes to the Customs Department and the third copy will be returned by the Customs officer at the Canadian port of exit to the merchant who returned the goods. He will then attach it to the refund of duty claim along with a copy of the way bill as a guarantee that the goods have been returned.

Goods must be in Customs custody within six months of date of importation.

CURRENCY CERTIFICATE OF INVOICE

Importers should, when ordering goods from Britain or any foreign country, instruct the exporter or salesman to always give the value of the goods in the home consumption column of the invoice and to show the same in the currency of the country of export.

Internal taxes should be definitely stated.

The exporter should also be very carefully instructed to place on the invoice the currency certificate.

In respect of invoices of goods from Great Britain or from any country where the currency has not substantially depreciated, the certificate of the exporter, showing the relative value of the paper currency in standard currency is accepted.

In other cases where the currency has substantially depreciated, there must be furnished a certificate, signed by a Consul or a Canada Trade Commissioner, or of a Bank, in the following form:—

GOODS SHORT LANDED

In the case of goods duty paid and short received, delivery of same upon subsequent arrival can be obtained, without payment of duty anew, only when the following regulations are observed:—

(a) Notice of the short receipt of goods must be given to the collector in writing within thirty days of entry.

(b) If the goods have been omitted from the shipment, a declaration to that effect must be produced from the exporter.

(c) If a portion of the consignment has been delayed in transit by the carriers, a declaration to this effect will be required from the latter.

(d) No portion of a consignment of goods, duty-paid, in respect of which a short shipment occurs, is to be disposed of by the importer until the appraiser has had an opportunity of checking over the goods.

SETTLERS' EFFECTS ENTRY

Settlers' effects are admitted duty free, if actually owned abroad by the settler for at least six months before his removal to Canada, and subject to regulations prescribed by the Minister.

Provided that any dutiable article entered as settlers' effects may not be so entered unless brought by the settler on his first arrival, and shall not be sold or otherwise disposed of without payment of duty until after twelve months' actual use in Canada.

Settlers' effects, viz:—Machines and implements for agricultural purposes, moved by mechanical power, and motor vehicles valued at not more than \$1500 and boats for fishing purposes, if actually owned abroad by the settler for at least six months before his removal to Canada, are free subject to regulations prescribed by the Minister of National Revenue.

Provided that in respect to motor vehicles valued in excess of \$1500 duty shall be payable only on the amount in excess of \$1500.

Provided further that the said machines, vehicles, implements and boats may not be so entered unless brought by the settler on his first arrival, and shall not be sold or otherwise disposed of without payment of duty until after twelve months' actual use in Canada.

AUTOMOBILES IMPORTED BY NON-RESIDENTS FOR PLEASURE PURPOSES ONLY

1. Automobiles imported by non-residents for their personal transportation may be admitted without the payment of duty thereon, under Traveller's Vehicle Permit (Form E. 50) subject to the following regulations:

On arrival at the frontier Customs port of entry, the driver of the automobile shall report at Customs and apply for a permit. The applicant for a permit shall be a non-resident of Canada and a temporary visitor therein. He or she shall be the owner of the automobile, or a member of the immediate family of the owner, who is also a non-resident of Canada, or shall be able to produce written authority from the owner to use such vehicle.

The automobile shall be admissible only when imported for the use of the non-resident permit holder, for the transportation of such non-resident, his family and guests, and such incidental carriage of articles as may be necessary and appropriate to the purposes of the journey, but not to be used for the transportation of persons or articles for hire, nor in any case primarily for the carriage of articles. The use by any other person than the non-resident permit holder shall result in seizure and forfeiture of the vehicle.

No fee is to be collected for Customs attendance at any time in connection with the entry of travellers' automobiles.

2. *Temporary Admission, forty-eight Hours, at Ports and Outports on the Frontier Only*—In respect of automobiles entering Canada for a stay not exceeding forty-eight hours, when the Collector or Sub-Collector is satisfied that conditions of subsections (a) and (b) of Section 1 are complied with, he is authorized to permit entry upon the owner surrendering his State license card, which will be returned to him on the return journey. In such cases, the use of Form E. 50 may be dispensed with.

3. *Traveller's vehicle Permits for a Period not Exceeding Sixty Days*—In respect of automobiles entering Canada for a period not exceeding sixty days, the Collector, if satisfied that the conditions stipulated in sub-sections (a) and (b) of Section 1 are complied with, may admit the vehicle without formal entry and may issue a permit on Form E. 50 for a period not exceeding sixty days.

(a) Should a traveller who has been granted a sixty-day permit desire an extension for a further period up to six months from the time of original entry, he may, upon presentation of the permit before the expiry date of same, apply for such extension to any Collector or Sub-Collector of Customs and Excise, who, upon being satisfied as to the bona fides of the use of the automobile may issue a new Form E50 and retain the expired permit for cancellation.

4. *Traveller's vehicle Permits for a Period in Excess of Sixty Days*—If, on reporting at the Customs frontier port of arrival, the non-resident owner of an automobile desires a traveller's vehicle permit for a period in excess of sixty days, the Collector, if satisfied that the conditions stipulated in sub-sections (a) and (b) of Section 1 are complied with, may admit the vehicle without formal entry and may issue a permit on Form E. 50 for the period designated by the traveller, such period, however, in the first instance, not to exceed six months.

If, through accident, illness or other unusual circumstances, the exportation of the vehicle at the expiration of six months from the date of the original entry cannot be effected, the matter shall be reported to the Deputy Minister of National Revenue for Customs and Excise, Ottawa, who, if satisfied as to the bona fides of the application, may authorize the extension of the traveller's vehicle permit for such additional period of time as may be necessary, and may specify the conditions under which such extension may be granted, and with what security.

COMMERCIAL VEHICLES

5. *Carrying Passengers Only.*—Automobiles, motor trucks and other motor vehicles may enter Canada and return to the United States without payment of duty on such vehicles when employed in conveying passengers in transit across the frontier, provided they are employed only for through transportation of passengers (either or both ways) between a point or place in the United States and a point or place in Canada. After a careful examination and appraisal has been made of such vehicles to enable the Customs officer to identify them on leaving the Dominion. Commercial Vehicle Permit (Form E. 50-B) shall be issued by the Collector or Sub-Collector on his being furnished with:

(a) a cash deposit equivalent to the duty and taxes payable on the automobile, or

(b) a bond of an approved guarantee company on Form D-3½, or

(c) the special bond of an approved guarantee company on Form D3-A.

On exportation of the vehicle under Customs supervision within a period of thirty days, the cash deposit shall be subject to refund or the bond to cancellation. In default of proof of such exportation within thirty days, the cash deposit shall be taken to account as Customs duty and taxes, and the provisions of the bond enforced.

6. *Carrying Goods.*—Automobiles, motor trucks and other highway vehicles carrying goods (dutiable or not) for delivery to a point in Canada may be admitted under Commercial Vehicle Permit (Form E. 50-B), under the provisions of Section 5 above if proceeding to an interior port with a load (and under the same Section but without requiring a bond if the goods imported thereby are intended for delivery within the limits of the frontier port of arrival, provided the Collector is satisfied that security is not required), subject to due entry at Customs at the frontier port of arrival of all goods to be discharged in Canada, and the payment of all duties and taxes to which such goods may be liable, failing which, they must be forwarded in bond under manifest by railway to the port of destination. Provided, however, that goods arriving by highway vehicles entitled to entry on Form B 4 or B 4½ as settler's effects, and goods for bona fide exhibitions, or horses for racing purposes eligible for entry on Form B. 18, may be allowed to proceed to interior destinations under Commercial Vehicle Permit for the vehicle, and manifest Form A-8 for the goods, without convoy; the same privilege may be granted in respect of articles for special use, and horses for breeding purposes, if the report and deposit required under Memo D No. 23 (Revised 1942) and No. 5 respectively, are not made at the frontier, in which case the report, and deposit (if any) shall be made at the port of destination.

(a) The exemption from duty prescribed in these Regulations shall not apply to vehicles used by peddlers with goods for sale, in which case duty and taxes are to be collected, having due regard to the provisions of Tariff Item 1215.

(b) The term "local traffic" used in this Regulation, and in the bond forms established in connection therewith, and the term "through transportation" shall not be held to prevent motor vehicles of foreign origin and not duty paid brought in by non-residents of Canada and Used in the *International Conveyance of Passengers*—from, (i) discharging passengers at different points in Canada on the inward trip, provided such passengers are destined through direct from the point of embarkation to the point of discharge, or (ii) taking on passengers at different points in this country on the outward journey, provided the passengers so laden are destined through direct from the point of lading to a point in a foreign country; This not to include the privilege of taking on passengers at one point in Canada and discharging such passengers of another point therein.

7. *Arriving Empty to Obtain Load for Export at Frontier or Inland Port.*—Automobiles or motor vehicles of foreign origin and not duty paid, being driven into Canada to obtain a load for export, may be admitted under the provisions of Section 6 if proceeding to an interior port for a load, and under the same Section but without requiring a bond if obtaining the load within the limits of the frontier port of arrival, provided the Collector is satisfied that

security is not required. Export entries must be required in respect of all goods exported by motor vehicle.

8. Automobiles, trucks and other vehicles exported temporarily by residents of Canada.

(a) Automobiles, trucks and other vehicles of Canadian origin, or duty paid in Canada, whether travelling under their own power or transported by rail or ship, may be exported, temporarily, upon execution of Form E-60. This Form (which may be issued and verified at any Port in Canada) and the relative Provincial Motor Vehicle Permit, are required to be shown to Canadian Customs when departing from or returning to Canada. This means of identification permits the car and equipment to be admitted without payment of duty and taxes, except upon the value of repairs and equipment acquired abroad, as noted in paragraph (b).

(b) If it became necessary, because of an accident, to have repairs made abroad in order to enable the vehicle to continue the tour and return under its own power, the compulsory repairs so made shall be exempt from duty and taxes provided that such exemption from duty and taxes shall not be allowed on repairs exceeding \$200 in value, except with the authority of the department. In cases where no accident to the vehicle has occurred, but tire casings or inner tubes, or both, have been replaced in the ordinary course, exemption from duty and taxes may be granted under this regulation on one tire casing and one inner tube only.

(c) If additional equipment is installed and when the Provincial Motor Vehicle Permit expires, a new Identification Form E-60 is required.

9. *Vehicles Carrying Two-way Radio Installations, or "Mobile Telephones"*—Pending international arrangements whereby the apparatus may be utilized in either country, vehicles equipped with mobile telephones may be permitted entry into Canada under Traveller's Vehicle Permits or Commercial Vehicle Permits as the case may be, provided the installations are secured by Customs seals in such a manner as to prevent operation in Canada. After the installation has been placed under seal and noted on the permit form, the vehicle will be allowed to proceed. On report outwards the seal will be removed by the Customs Officer. Should the seal be found to have been broken or removed, the vehicle will be subject to seizure.

10. *Carrying Goods in Transit Only.*—Highway vehicles may enter Canada without payment of duty on such vehicles and return to the United States when employed in conveying goods (dutiable or not) in transit in bond through Canada from one point or points in the United States to another point or points therein, under the following regulations:

(a) Motor vehicle operators desiring to become bonded carriers as provided for in these regulations shall make application to the Department of National Revenue, Ottawa, for the privilege.

(b) Upon the application being approved, the applicant shall be required to submit to the Department the bond of a Guarantee Company acceptable to the Dominion Government in approved form as set forth in Appendix I hereof in a penal sum to be fixed by the Minister not to exceed \$80,000, the bond to remain in full force and effect for a period of twelve months unless revoked prior to expiration, and shall be subject to renewal thereafter annually with the approval of the Department.

11. *In Transit Movements by Highway Through the United States.*—Canadian highway vehicles may enter the United States and re-enter Canada without payment of duty on such vehicles when employed in conveying passengers and their baggage and/or merchandise in transit in bond through the United States from one point in Canada to another point therein under certain regulations.

For further regulations, Consult Collector of Customs at nearest port.

NON-RESIDENTS FOR PLEASURE PURPOSES
AIRCRAFT IMPORTED TEMPORARILY BY

1. Advance notice of arrival:

(1) Prior to departure for Canada from a foreign airport, advance notice of date and approximate time of arrival shall be given to the proper officer of Customs.

(b) Advice to Customs officers as to time and place of first arrival at a Canadian Customs airport shall be forwarded by mail, telephone or telegraph. If considered advisable, the tourist may request the Canadian Customs officer to furnish a reply, which can then be carried into Canada by the pilot. The importance of this will be realized when one considers the possibility of overflying the intended airport or landing, at another place by mistake, or making a forced landing, in all of which cases the reply from the Canadian Customs Officer will assist in establishing the bona fides of the tourist in making his report to Customs or the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, as the case may be. Without such a telegram the tourist's presence at a place where no advance notice of his arrival had been received might render him subject to suspicion.

(c) Advance notice as referred to above will not be necessary if first landing is to be made at Dorval Airport, Montreal, P.Q., at which point 24-hour service is maintained.

2. Formalities on landing:

(a) First alighting of the aircraft shall be made at a Customs airport or airfield designated as such by the Department.

(b) On arrival, the owner or pilot of the aircraft shall report to the proper officer of Customs.

(c) Provided he is satisfied that the aircraft is being imported and will be used by a non-resident for purposes of health and pleasure only and not for trade or profit, the Customs officer may issue Permit Form C-15 for a period not exceeding 3 months.

(d) Should subsequent landings be made in Canada prior to final departure, no report at Customs is necessary provided the owner or pilot is in possession of a valid Form C-15. However, he shall produce the same to Customs or airport officials, or police authorities, on request, as evidence of his right to alight without report at Customs.

3. Formalities on departure:

The owner or pilot of the aircraft shall, prior to the final take-off for departure from Canada, which shall be made from a Customs Airport or Airfield designated as such by the Department, report to the proper officer of Customs and surrender Permit Form C-15.

AIRCRAFT EXPORTED TEMPORARILY TO THE UNITED STATES, ALASKA AND NEWFOUNDLAND BY CANADIAN RESIDENTS FOR PLEASURE PURPOSES

4. In simplifying the requirements for the reporting of pleasure aircraft the Department has waived the necessity of the pilot (or tourist) furnishing written outwards and inwards reports in respect of aircraft under Canadian registry owned by residents of Canada and operated by them for purposes of private flying only and not for the transportation of goods or passengers for gain or hire. Departure must be made from, and the first landing on return must be made at, a Customs airport or airfield of entry and exit.

It is obvious that some means of identification of Canadian machines must be provided in order that the way may be open for their return without being liable to assessment of duty and taxes.

The Department has authorized a special identification form (Form E. 61) for this purpose. Particular attention should be paid to the fact as to whether or not the aircraft is supplied with heater, radio, etc. Note of the serial numbers of the tires, engine and propeller should be taken.

TOURISTS' OUTFITS

1. Articles of a character ordinarily classified as Tourists' or Sportsmen's equipment, imported into Canada by non-resident visitors, for temporary use, are admissible without payment of duty and taxes upon report on Temporary Admission Report, Form E-29, or, if no cash deposit is required, included on Form E-50 (Travellers' Vehicle Permit).

2. This authority for free entry is conditional on the imported articles being (a) imported for the tourist's personal use, (b) actually in the tourist's possession at the time of his arrival in Canada, and (c) reported to Canadian Customs for identification on report outwards, within six months from the date of entry, the Permit being surrendered at that time.

3. The concessions ordinarily granted to bona-fide tourists are extended to the personal effects of non-resident students entering Canada for the purpose of attending institutions of learning, the condition being,

however, that exportation shall be effected, under Customs supervision, immediately after the conclusion of the school term or course.

4. For the purposes of ready reference, the conditions of entry of the various articles ordinarily included in Tourists' Outfits are given below:

contagious disease; that the dog has not been exposed to the infection of rabies and that no case of rabies has occurred within a radius of fifty miles of the place in which the dog has been kept for a period of six months immediately prior to date of being enroute to Canada.

- (ii) A certificate signed by a licensed Veterinarian of Canada or the United States certifying that the dog has been vaccinated against rabies within a period of six months of the date of entry

Other regulations provide for dogs passing through Canada under certain conditions without certificate.

This certificate must be shown to the Canadian Customs officer at each time of entry of the dog into Canada.

TRAVELLERS' BAGGAGE

5. *General Provisions*—Wearing apparel, articles of personal adornment, toilet articles and similar personal effects of persons arriving in Canada may be passed free, without entry at Customs, as travellers' baggage, under the provisions of the Customs Tariff, but this provision shall include only such articles as actually accompany and are in the use of and as are necessary and appropriate for the wear and use of such persons for the immediate purpose of the journey and present comfort and convenience, and shall not be held to apply to merchandise or articles intended for other persons or for sale. *Merchandise for Sale, when brought into Canada as baggage, is subject to duty and to entry at Customs in the same manner as goods imported by freight or express.*

6. *Tools of Trade*—Usual tools of trade, occupation or employment of a workman, previously used by him, if imported for his personal use and actually in his possession at the time of his arrival in Canada may be admitted free as Travellers' Baggage.

RETURNING RESIDENTS' EXEMPTION \$100

7. Under the provisions of the Customs Tariff, free entry is granted in respect of "goods valued at not more than one hundred dollars included in the baggage accompanying residents of Canada returning from abroad after an absence from Canada of not less than 48 hours and acquired by them for personal or household use or as souvenirs or gifts, but not bought on commission or as an accommodation for other persons or for sale, under regulations prescribed by the Minister, provided that a resident of Canada shall not be entitled to the exemption herein granted within a period of four months from the date of the

last exemption allowed, nor shall the exemption be allowed on alcoholic beverages in excess of one quart, or on tobacco in excess of fifty cigars, two hundred cigarettes and two pounds of manufactured tobacco.

The following regulations have been prescribed by the Minister:

(a) All goods in respect of which exemption is claimed shall be declared in writing on Customs Declaration Form E. 24, in duplicate, unless the total value upon which exemption claimed does not exceed \$5.

(b) The exemption granted shall be limited to goods actually accompanying a returning resident of Canada and brought in by him as baggage at the time exemption is claimed.

(c) A person who has been allowed exemption of less than \$100 on a previous occasion shall not be entitled to add to the amount of a subsequent exemption the difference between the amount previously allowed and full exemption.

(d) Goods belonging to one person cannot be included in the exemption claimed by another.

(e) Returning residents must state in their declaration in Canadian currency the price actually paid for all goods purchased abroad in respect of which exemption is claimed, and must state a fair market value for all goods obtained abroad other than by purchase, such as gifts. The purchase price or value stated is not necessarily the value for duty, but must be declared in order to assist the appraising officer in arriving at the correct value for duty. To facilitate appraisal invoices or sales slips should be presented where possible.

(f) If personal effects or goods taken abroad be advanced in value or improved in condition while abroad by reason of repairs or alterations further than that necessarily incidental to wear and use while abroad, the cost or value of such repairs or alterations is subject to duty. Such cost or value may, however, be included within the \$100 exemption.

(g) In cases where goods for which exemption is claimed have a combined value of over \$100, exemption is to be applied, where practicable, to the goods subject to the highest rates of duty.

(h) All dutiable goods obtained abroad for which exemption cannot be allowed, must be entered at customs and duty paid in the ordinary course.

(i) These regulations shall not be construed to be applicable to any goods the importation of which is prohibited, except as specifically provided for in Tariff Item 703 (b).

REGULATIONS GOVERNING TEMPORARY ADMISSION OF ARTICLES FOR SPECIAL USE

1. (a) The Department has authorized the use of Temporary Admission Report Form E-29, under which certain specified articles may be permitted entry without payment of duty and taxes. Provision is made on the Form for a computation of the amount of duty and taxes properly payable, and a cash deposit of an amount equal to that sum is to be supplied, unless otherwise stipulated. The E-29 must be surrendered by the holder and exportation must be made within six months from the date of entry (unless otherwise provided for), and any cash deposit which may have been furnished will then be subject to refund, otherwise it will be taken to account as duty and taxes. The goods must be identified by a Customs Officer prior to exportation.

(b) Although the furnishing of a deposit may be required by the regulations, any Collector of Customs may, in his discretion, waive its collection if the imported articles entered under Form E-29, are to be used within the limits of his own port, under such precautions or provisions as he may consider necessary to secure the due exportation thereof immediately after such use.

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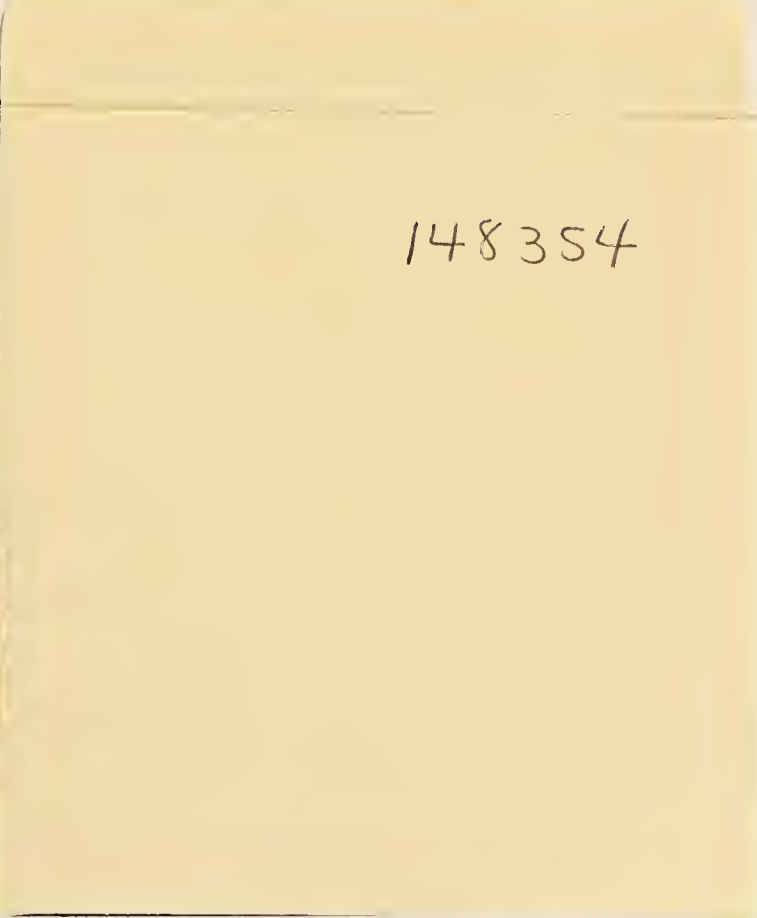
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
