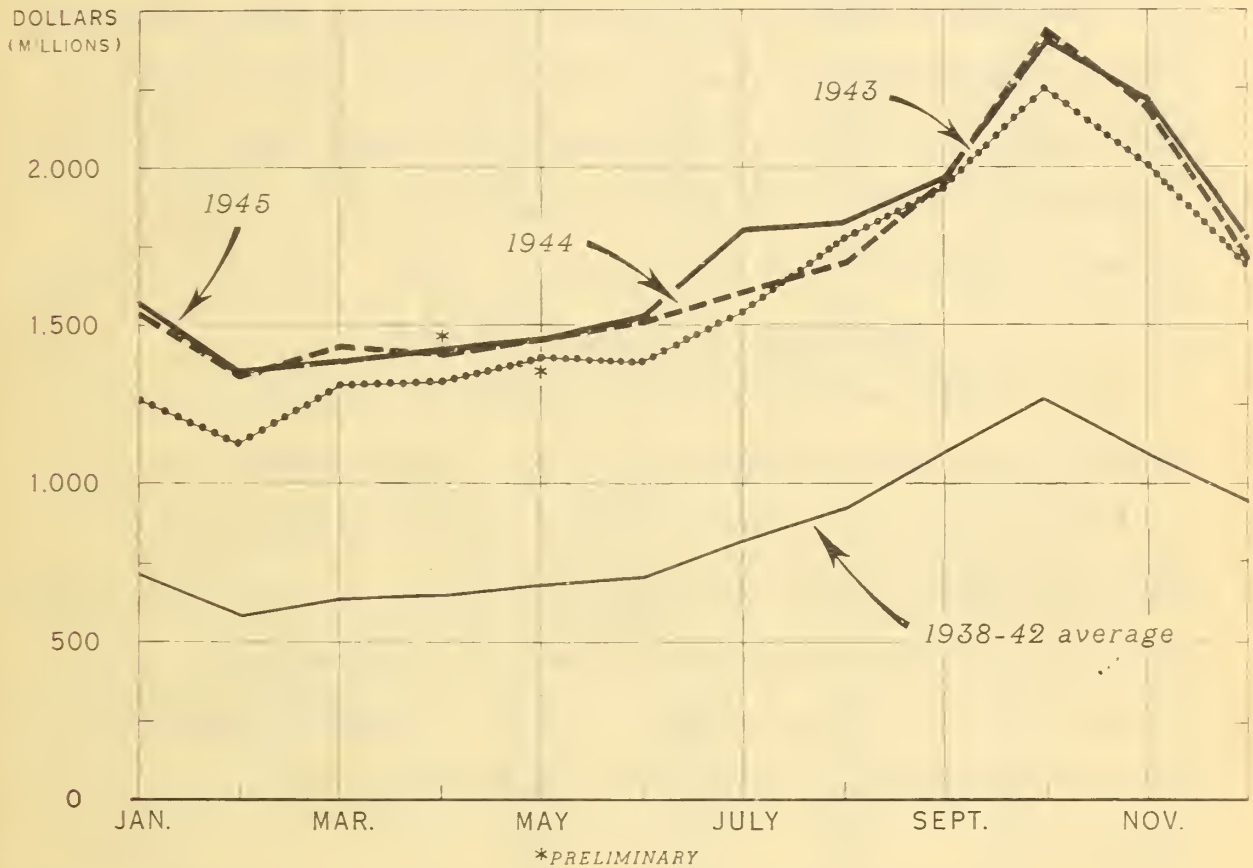

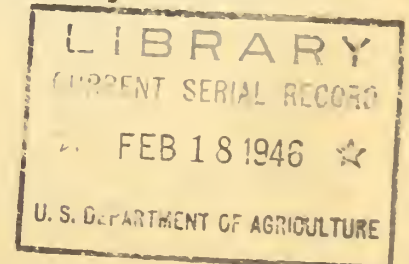
CASH RECEIPTS FROM FARM MARKETINGS, UNITED STATES.

During 1945 the level of total cash receipts from farm marketings by months was nearly the same as in 1944, with gains in July and December accounting for most of the increase for the year. Crop receipts in 1945 exceeded 1944 in all months except October and November; livestock receipts were less in 1945 than in 1944 in all months during the first half of the year, but with the exception of September, were greater than 1944 in the latter half of the year.

Preliminary Estimates for January

According to preliminary estimates, total cash receipts from farm marketings for January amounted to about 1,500 million dollars, 15 percent less than in December and 5 percent less than in January 1945. The decline from December was greater than during the 2 previous years. Marketings of most crops declined seasonally. Income from livestock and products decreased more than in recent years, with sales of meat animals in January reduced by the packers' strike.

Indications for February and March

Total cash receipts from farm marketings in February may be slightly higher than in February 1945, but about 10 percent lower than in January 1946, partly because February has fewer marketings days. The percentage decline in cash receipts from crops may not be any greater than the relatively small decrease a year ago, with receipts of cotton and tobacco held to comparatively high levels. Livestock receipts may not show any additional decrease from the relatively low level in January.

Cash receipts in March may be a little higher than in February and slightly above March of last year. Receipts from crops are not likely to show much change from February, but livestock and products are expected to be higher.

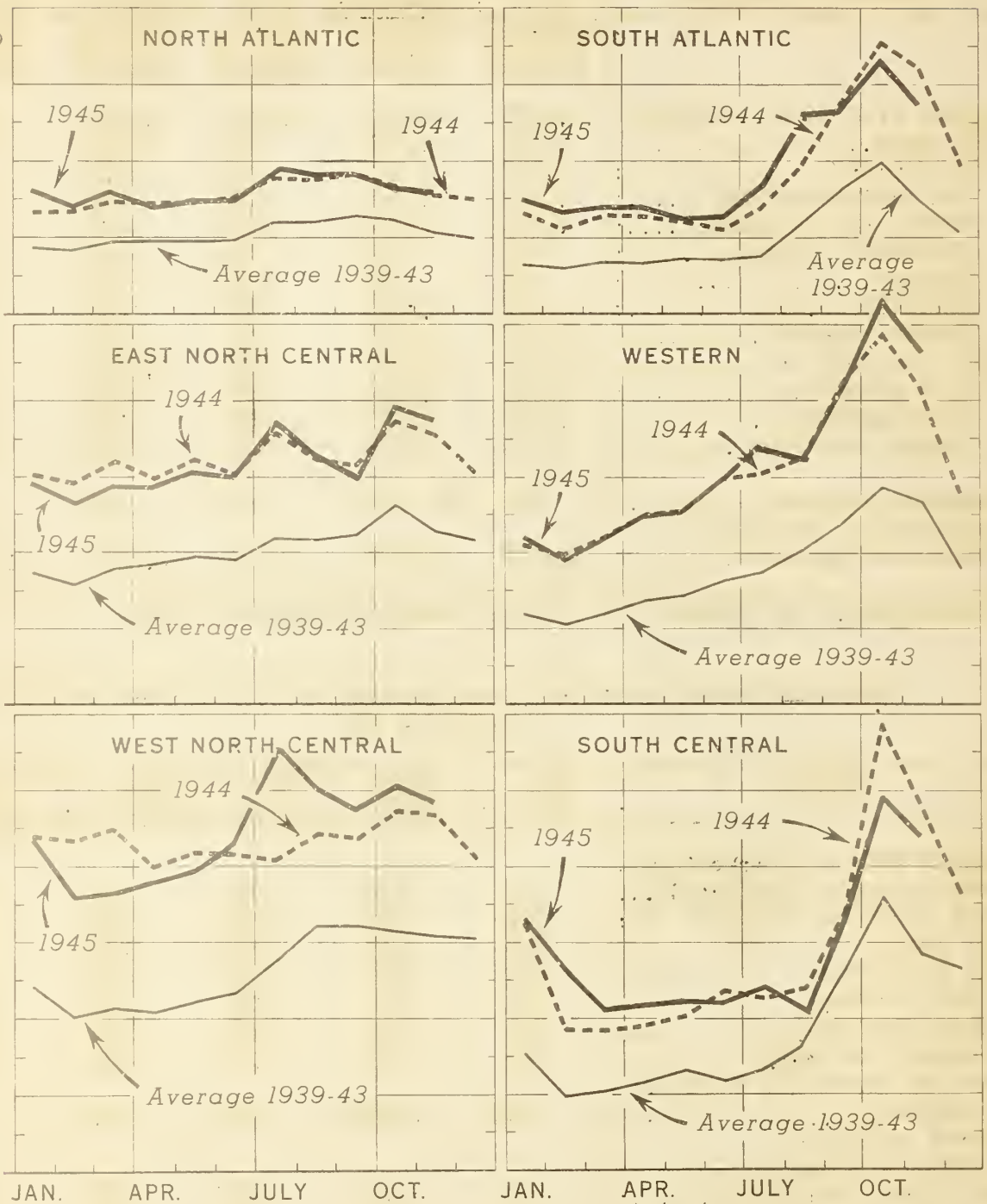

For January-November, total cash receipts gained 6 percent; crops increased more than livestock. Substantial gains in cash receipts from tobacco and truck crops were especially important in bringing about an increase of 8 percent in income from crops. A significant gain in cash receipts from poultry and eggs was nearly offset by the drop in income from meat animals, resulting in a relatively small increase in cash receipts from livestock and products as a whole.

South Central Region

In November, cash receipts from cotton dropped sharply from the level of November 1944, in nearly all States, and total income from crops in the region declined 12 percent. While cash receipts from poultry and eggs increased significantly, income from meat animals declined and cash receipts from livestock and products were only slightly higher. Total cash receipts from crops and livestock combined declined 8 percent.

Neither crops nor livestock made any appreciable change for the first 11 months as compared with last year. Definite gains were made in income from tobacco and truck crops, but marked decreases from cotton, cottonseed, and wheat. The acute decline in cash receipts from hogs was about offset by increases in all other major categories of livestock.

Western Region

Cash receipts from crops, livestock, and the two groups combined in November were all about 12 percent higher than a year ago. Outstanding increases were made in cash receipts from sugar beets, truck crops, cattle, and turkeys.

During the first 11 months, total cash receipts increased 5 percent. Cash receipts from fruits, vegetables, and wheat made significant gains, and total income from all crops rose 9 percent over 1944. A very slight decline occurred in cash receipts from livestock and products, as increases in income from poultry and eggs and dairy products nearly made up for declines in cash receipts from meat animals.

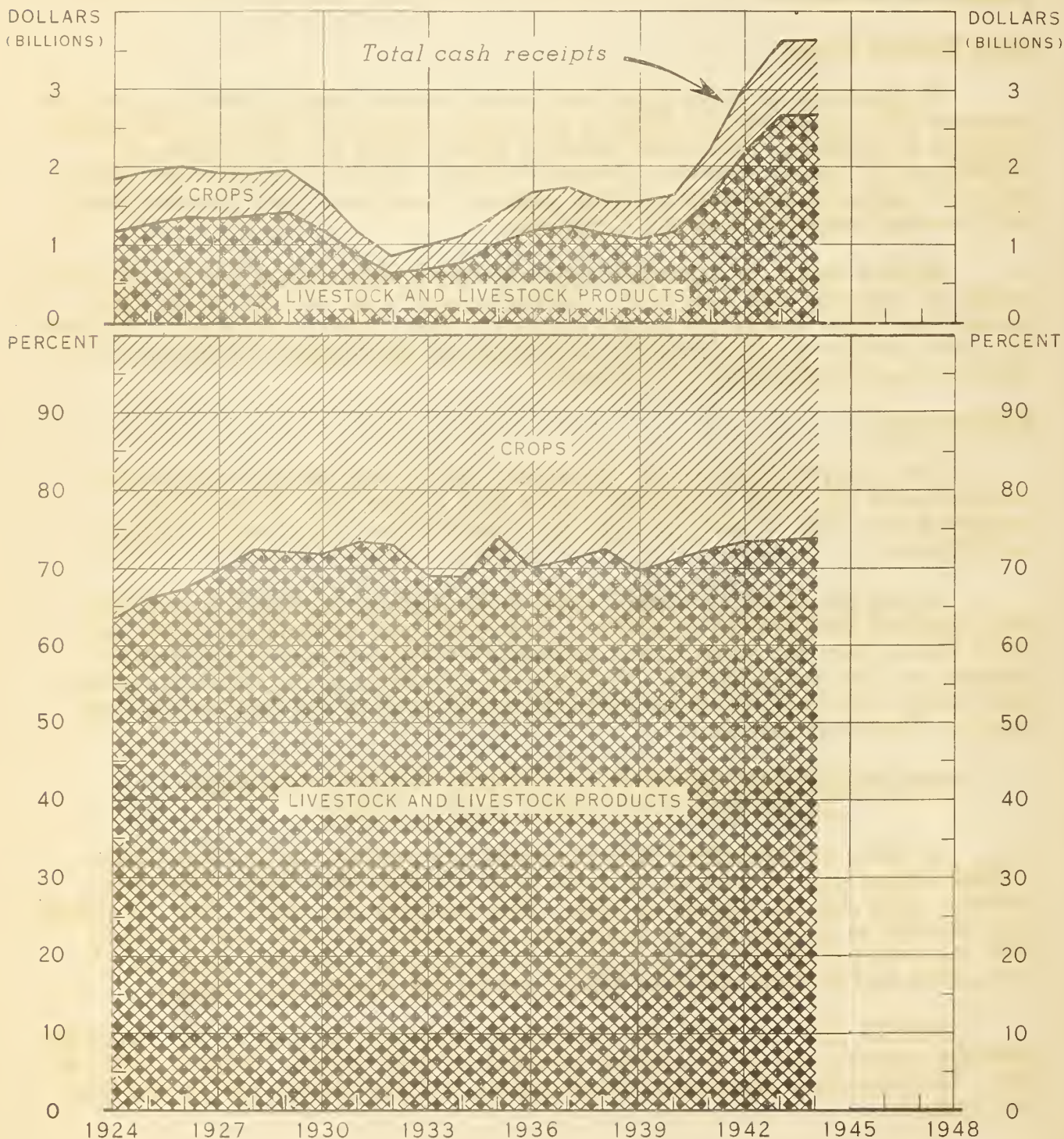
Cash Receipts from Livestock and Products Compared with Crops in the East North Central Region, 1924-44

In 1944, cash receipts from livestock and products in the East North Central Region were 74 percent of total cash receipts from farm marketings, compared with only 63 percent in 1924. This tendency for income from livestock and products to account for an increasing proportion of total cash receipts from all farm marketings has been shown in previously published analyses ^{1/} to operate in the North Atlantic Region and in the country as a whole.

Between 1924 and 1928, the percentage increased from 63 to 72, indicating that the largest part of the change occurred in that period. Between 1932 and 1941, the percentage fluctuated considerably, but has leveled off in the last few years.

The important changes in this region from 1924 to 1944 were the decreasing parts of total cash receipts attributable to grains and hay and the increasing share for hogs. In 1924, total income from grains and hay accounted for 23 percent of total cash receipts, but by 1931 it was down to 11 percent. During the subsequent depression years, there was a tendency for the share of grains and hay to fluctuate on a higher level. However, after 1940, the proportion dropped again and reached a new low of less than 10 percent in 1943. The percentage of total cash receipts accounted for by hogs, on the other hand, increased from about 16 percent in 1924 to 24 percent in 1942-44. Most of this change took place between 1935 and 1942.

Cash receipts from dairy products accounted for about one-quarter of total income, over most of the period. However, there was a tendency for this share to increase from 1924 to 1932, when it reached a peak of about 30 percent

The percentage share represented by income from poultry and eggs was about half that for dairy products, but changed in a similar manner. It increased from 12 percent in 1924 to a peak of 14 in 1931-32, but ended the period in 1944 at about the same level as in 1924. The low was less than 10 percent in 1940, after which the percentage tended to increase.

Schedule for Publication of Farm Income Estimates for 1946

The Farm Income Situation presents in its regular monthly issues estimates on a national basis for (1) total cash receipts from farm marketings, by commodity groups, and total Government payments for the 2 preceding months and cumulative totals for January through the preceding month; (2) index numbers of cash receipts and of physical volume of farm marketings for the 4 preceding months, by commodity groups. Estimates by States are presented for cash receipts from total crops and total livestock, for the second month preceding.

In addition to these regular monthly data, presentation of annual estimates is scheduled for various issues of the Farm Income Situation in 1946, as follows:

February

Annual estimates of cash receipts from crops, 1945 and revised 1943 and 1944, as follows: for the United States, by individual crops; by States, a breakdown by major groups and selected crops.

Government payments to farmers, by States, 1945.

April

Annual estimates of cash receipts from livestock and products, by States by individual commodities, 1945 and revised 1944.

Total cash receipts from farm marketings and Government payments, by States, 1945 and revised 1943 and 1944.

June

Annual estimates of value of home consumption, by total crops (1945 and revised 1943 and 1944) and total livestock (1945 and revised 1944).

Total cash receipts and value of home consumption, by States, 1945 and revised 1943 and 1944.

Estimates for the United States relating to net farm income and parity, including income of persons living on and off farms, parity income ratios, national income, gross and net income of farm operators, cash receipts from farm marketings, nonmoney income, production expenses, numbers of farms, and estimates of farm and nonfarm populations for 1945 and several preceding years. Also estimates back to 1910 for a few of the most important series.

July

Income of farm operators by States, 1945 and revised 1944, including estimates on an aggregate and a per farm basis for gross income, production expenses, and realized net income from agriculture and Government payments.

Annual index numbers of volume of production for sale and home consumption, by commodity groups, for the United States, beginning with 1909 and including preliminary estimates for 1946.

August

Government payments, by States, January-June 1946.

September or October

Outlook for cash receipts, gross income, production expenses, and realized net income of farm operators, 1947 compared with preliminary estimates for 1946.

December

Annual index numbers of volume of production for sale and home consumption, by commodity groups, for the United States, beginning with 1909 and including first revisions for 1946.
