All Sonderegger trees and plants are carefully labeled, and true to name. However, in case of error, we shall replace any tree or plant that is not true to name, or refund purchase price. Claims to be made within 6 years from date of delivery. A stronger guarantee than most nurseries put out.

CARL SONDEREGGER 1856-Founder-1934

1856—Founder—1934 For 50 years the picture of Mr. Carl Sonderegger has been before the American home maker and tarmer, first as a young man, and then gradually the years stamped their marks on the face of the West's great pioneer nurseryman. Those final years—"his late 70's"— were unmistakably written on Mr. Carl Sondereger's picture. Born in 1856 in Heiden, near Lake Constance (Switzerland), Carl Sonderegger left his home at the age of 19. Perhaps no one told him, "Go West Young Man," nev-entheless he went West. The West was young then—homes, farms and owns were few and far apart. To devegger the Plains of Nebraska boked like the morning of a great day. He became a citizen, settled down and raised a family. He saw the country timberless, without a built tree or a hedge. He felt that someone should build up tree-life in the West. But who, and how? # YESTERDAY

The first crop of trees the Sonderegger Nurseries grew was sold in a quite simple way. Carl Sonderegger climbed on his wagon and started off to see farmers and home-makers; he traveled as far as he could and continued driving until he had his crop sold among the settlers. Mr. Carl Sonderegger told them what he had, how it should be planted, and he encouraged his prospects to plant something every year in order to get wind protection, fruit, wood, and game covers. In fact, sales



talk at that time consisted of nothing else but good, honest advice. Honest deal ings never fail to bring results. Carl Sonderegger's business grew.

The mail order business was something almost new in the '80's. Carl Sonderegger was one of the very first to sell trees through the mail. It worked. A catalog could travel cheaply, it could be written so as to contain all that could be told in advice to a planter. With this idea in mind, Carl Sonderegger mailed out what was perhaps the first tree catalog. It was small, but it contained everything the West needed-good, hardy fruit, forest trees, hedge plants. From year to year. as more customers made their purchases from the Sonderegger Nursery, new va rieties were added. The Winter Apples are those that ripen late, and keep well, some keep until late spring. The fall apples ripen earlier, and keep until December, in the North they ripen pretty late, and could be called winter apples. Summer Apples are early, they don't keep long. A few of them should be in every orchard, and near cities they pay pretty well, as the early apples sell at a good price sell at a good price.

### WINTER APPLES

Ben Davis One of the oldest apples known. The tree is very hardy, and the fruit is of fair quality for baking or cooking; it keeps well. Ripens here middle of October.

Arkansas Black A good apple for Arkansas, Oklahoma Arkansas Black And North to Southern Nebraska. Fruit medium to large, orange yellow, nearly covered with dark red, sometimes almost black. At picking time the fruit is hard, keeps well. I have bought Arkansas Black in stores as late as July, and the apples were in fine shape. Ripens middle of October.

**Red Delicious** I grow the dark red strain. Everybody apple, of excellent quality, the leading and best paid market variety. The trees are very hardy, and should be planted every-where; no orchard is complete without this wonderful apple. You can pick the apple when still hard-ripe, it keeps better, the color is perfect, red all over, just like shown on the front cover of this book. Ripens second week in October.

cover of this book. Ripens second week in October. Yellow Delicious This is the first year I am offering medium size, golden yellow, the flavor is good, resembles the pear flavor, sweet. The tree is perfectly hardy here, and prob-ably anywhere in the Middle West. It bears young; ripens first week in October. Add 15c per tree to prices as quoted. Franz My father brought this apple here from Switzerland. The trees commence to bear very young, and they are perfectly hardy. The fruit is good for home use, medium to large size, greenish with red, and keep fine. A wonderful apple for the North, ripens end of September. I have only 4-6 foot trees at 80c each; 3 for \$2.25.

### Planting Instructions

When you receive a bale or package of trees or shrubs from me, open it as soon as possible, check over the items. In case of any defect notify me at once, a card will do. Sometimes an item is booked for later delivery.




**Golden Winesap** The tree bearing quite young, and the fruit being of good size and beautiful golden color with red cheek, its excellent keeping qualities brought the Golden Winesap in great favor. My father used to say that there is no better apple made for baking. You can plant Golden Winesap anywhere, it is hardy. Ripens first of October.

October. Grimes Golden Hardy as far north as the middle of contains almost no acid, yet the flavor is rich, aromatic. A good market variety, and the tree is a healthy grower. I advise occasional spring pruning. Ripens end of September. King David The quality is almost as good as Jonathan, the apple is medium size, and is extra well colored. A good many of my customers ask for a late blooming apple. King David blooms later than other apples, and it ripens first of October. Add 15c per tree to prices quoted. McIntosh Red Large, red all over, flesh white, tender highly recommend MacIntosh for the North; it is much like the old Snow-apple. A good market variety, and keeps well. Ripens middle of October. Mammoth Black Twig, Paragon that bears well. Fruit dark red, large, firm, sub-acid and juicy; it is a good keeper. This apple really gets better the longer you keep it. Ripens middle of October.

**Missouri Pippin** This apple is not of the best quality, but it is better than no apples at all, and in Western Nebraska, Western Kansas and Eastern Colo-rado, Missouri Pippin is one of the few apples than can be grown successfully. Apple red, medium size, ripens in October. **Northwestern Greening** Extremely hardy and vig-orous grower. Fruit large, grenish-yellow when ripe. Good quality and a long keeper. I recommend it for the North and Middle West. Ripens middle of October. of October.

Paradise Winter Sweet Large creamy white with of October.
Paradise Winter Sweet Large, oblong, nearly covered bears well. Ripens in October.
Spitzenberg (Esopus.) Large, oblong, nearly covered with yellow, sprightly, sub-acid, aromatic and juicy. An old variety, good bearer, very hardy. In the Rocky Mountain district and New Mexico this tree is a success. In the Middle West also a good variety. Ripens middle of October.
Stayman's Winesap Large, color is often a dark red. Keep good and the apple is in strong demand for cooking. Ripens in October.
Switzerland Probably the most successful apple for the stripes, have a fine flavor and keep well. The tree grows in dwarf form with large leaves. It does well as far north as the middle of Nebraska. I advise my customers in the South to plant this tree.
Winesap Another old and tried variety, beautiful red color, the makes it a good apple for the Middle West. The tree is hardy most anywhere. Ripens middle of October.
York Imperial Thick skin. The apple is good, and it keeps good; however, runs about medium size or a little under, this makes it a good apple for the Middle West. The tree is hardy most anywhere. Ripens middle of October.

# Fall Apples

They ripen between the early **apples** and the late varieties, keep fairly good. In the extreme North they **are** considered winter apples.

Maiden Blush Try them, you will be pleased. For home use or market it is a good tree, bears young and regular; the apple is of good size and fine flavor, nicely colored.

**ES** Wealthy Does well most any-where, and is especially adapted for Minnesota and the Dako-tas as it is perfectly hardy. Here in Nebraska it bears well, makes a good eating and cooking apple and often used for drying. Fruit large, mostly covered with red, finely grained, juicy but a little sour. Also in demand as one of the best baking apples grown. I recommend Wealthy; few apples are so hardy and so productive. Ripens in September.

September

### SUMMER APPLES

The early eating and cooking varieties, but not so good for long keeping.

Duchess of Oldenburg Comes from Russia, extreme-ly hardy, medium size, green-ish yellow with red stripes. Bears heavily. Somewhat sour, fine for cooking, a couple of them should be in every orchard. Ripens in August.

**Early Harvest** In most years it is ripe by July 4. The apple is medium size, greenish-yellow, tender and juicy, a fine eating apple. The tree is hardy and a good bearer.

**Yellow Transparent** A little later than Early Har-Fruit is medium large, smooth, transparent, skin clear white, turning pale yellow when ripe. Flesh white, fine grained, aromatic and of splendid quality. Tree is vigorous, good bearer, three-year-old trees frequently produce fruit. Does well most anywhere, and is perfectly hardy. Ripens first of August. **Red June** Medium size, yellow with red stripes, very good quality, good bearer, it always sells well. The tree is hardy. Fruit ripens here end of July.

### The Turley Winesap

This fine apple is an improved Winesap. It bears even heavier than the Winesap, and the color is a deeper red. In quality it is also improved, the flavor being extra good. The apple keeps well until mid-winter. The trees of this variety have always been scarce; fortunately I have a good supply of these trees on hand now, and I am glad to be able to supply you with the true variety.  $3\frac{1}{2}$ to 5 foot very good trees, 80c each; 3 for \$2.25, postpaid.

### CRAB APPLES

Hardy and improved varieties of Crab Apples supply a much-needed want in all cold climates as in our extreme northern states and Canada where other apples are not hardy. But even in more favorable climates where other fruits are pro-duced Crab Apples are becoming more popular. The trees can be used for ornamental trees, for instance on the lawn, they make a good showing and furnish a lot of good fruit for canning and eating.

Yellow Siberian Crab usually canned with the stems. well. Ripens in October.

**Dolgo** There is a Dolgo Crab for years it produced f in e crabs. They are really excel-lent for jelly, in color as good as currant jelly, and the flavor is delicious. Tree very hardy, a strong, thrifty grower and so far has never blighted. Bears young; I recommend this tree.

Whitney Crab A good with smooth glossy green skin, striped red. Flesh firm, juicy and pleasant flavor. A good eating apple, raw or cooked. T r e e perfectly hardy. My brother Fred has a Whitney Crab right on his lawn, it makes him a nice shade and ornamen-tal tree besides furnishing large quantities of apples. A Whitney Crab should be on every place.



Put the roots of your trees or shrubs into cold water over night. This freshens them up and puts them in best shape for planting. You can put the roots into a bucket or tank.

# Delicious PEARS are easy to grow

Plant standard pears 20 to 25 feet apart, plant dwarf pears 15 feet apart each way. Pears, I find, will grow on most any soil except on wet land where the soil is saturated with moisture a good part of the year. Pears will pay you well, you can can them, some are extra fine eating fruits, some keep good, and any surplus will bring you a good price. Pears find a ready market.

### **Standard Varieties**

### LATE PEARS—For Canning or Keeping

**Bosc** Finest quality ate fall and winter pear. Extra large, long and tapering, russet, keeps well, therefore a good shipper. Tree vigorous and profuse bearer. Keeps until De-cember. Add 15c per tree to prices quoted.

Duchess of Angouleme This is my best seller. It has been known for a long time. The fruit is very large, of fine quality and juicy, keeps well in winter. For the Middle West a good tree in every respect. Ripens in October.

Flemish Beauty Large, handsome, sweet and melting, pale yellow, covered with russet. Hardy, vigorous, good bearer and of fair quality. They are grown successfully in Northern Nebraska, and does well any-where in the Middle West. Ripens in September.

**Kieffer** Profitable market variety. Large, nice shape, good for canning. Quality fair. The tree is hardy. 1 advise planting some other variety along with Kieffer, it bears better. Ripens in October.

**Lincoln** This high quality large yellow pear flushed with bright red makes a good fruit for eating or can-ning. Quality is very good. The tree is hardy in Nebraska and bears well, but I must say that it is one of the new varie-ties. It is becoming more and more popular every year. Just how good it does in the Northern states I have not been able to find out.  $2\frac{1}{2}$ -4 foot, 80c each; 3 for \$2.25. 4-6 foot trees, \$1.00 each.

### EARLY PEARS—Good Table Varieties

**Bartlett** One of the most popular pears. Fruit large, buttery, and melting with a rich musky flavor, white flesh. Tree grows erect, bears early and heavy. For years my father has experimented to find out just how far north Bartlett can be grown. I am quite certain that it will be a success anywhere in the Middle West, and in the Lake region. An occasional spray with Pestroy is advisable. Ripens in August.

**Clapp's Favorite** Tree is hardy, a vigorous grower and very productive. Fruit large, pale yellow and dull red with russet specks; flesh fine grained, juicy. melting and sweet. I would call it a little hardier than Bartlett, but the quality is not quite so good as Bartlett. August.

**Seckel** (Sugar Pear.) The fruit is small, but of finest flavor. The tree is a slow grower, but it is healthy, hardy and bears well. I have known Seckel Pear ever since my father raised Pears; Seckel was his favorite. Should be sprayed during the summer with Pestroy. Ripens in September.

### Planting Instructions

For any tree or shrub you plant prepare the holes plenty large. This is essential for a good growth. The holes should be d e e p enough to allow sev. eral inches of loose soil-on the bottom. and wide enough to allow the roots to spread out.

### QUINCE

Can be grown wherever Pears do well. It makes a desirable canning fruit. My father tried a number of varieties, and the Orange Quince was the only one that bore fairly regular. It is hardy here, but north of here I could hardly advise planting Quince, except on well protect-ed places. 3-4 foot trees, 75c each; 3 for \$2.00, postpaid.

GOOD KEEPING PEARS GOOD KEEPING PEARS While I am writing this (De-cember, 1935), there are still some Bosc pears in a local fruit store—in splendid shape and of fine quality. At the same time I still have some Duchess pears in my cellar; they would keep until Christ-mas, judging by their pres-ent condition.

A wet piece of burlap wrapped around the roots is Just the right thing. **Monitor** This is a Minne-sota Plum, and the best of the Minnesota varieties I have tried. The plum is dark purple, the flesh of the same color, size is medium with a small pit. Its quality is very good. good.

**Red Wing** This is a yellow with red, freestone, sweet, and of good quality. For raw eat-ing they are especially good, also for use like peaches with sugar and cream. Hardy most everywhere.



It stood a temperature of 18 degrees below zero and produced an abundant crop the follow-ing season. Fill in with good top-soil all around the roots and up to within a few inches from the surface of the ground. Then pour in a bucket full of water. Let the wat<mark>er so</mark>ak away. Lat<mark>er finish</mark> covering the hole with loose soil. The latter makes the best mulch.

### Planting Instructions

My 2-year-old grape vines are exceptionally well rooted. For this reason large holes are necessary. Spread the lower set of roots out evenly at the bottom of the hole, fill in enough top-soil to come up to the upper root-set. Spread the upper set of roots, then fill the hole.

### How to Train Grapes to a **T**rellis

Several systems are in use, the Kniffen system is probably the easiest to follow. I will de-scribe it to you. Posts are driven in the ground along the grape row. End posts are se-curely braced and anchored. Two wires No. 10 or No. 12 are stretched along the row. One wire about 30 inches above the ground, the other wire about 15 inches higher. Of each plant tie two canes to the lower wire, and two to the upper. Each branch to reach about 4 feet in one direction. These branches are the framework on which the fruiting wood will be produced each year. Every spring prune your grape vines before the sap comes up. On the next page I will tell you how to prune.

### How to Prune Grape Vines

You should bear in mind that from the framework of your grape vine grow canes, which make blossoms and set fruit all in one year. Therefore, most of the previous season's growth must be cut out, leaving spurs with one or two buds along the framework. Whenever the four vines making up the framework become too old to bear well, cut one out each year, and tie in its place to the wire a new cane coming from the main stem of the plant. If your g r a p e s need spraying, use Pestroy, mix 9½ tablespoonfuls to 1 gallon of water, and spray when the new shoots are 8 to 10 inches long. Again just before blooming, and right a f t e r blooming, and when the berries begin to touch in the cluster. See Pestroy, page 60.

(continued f r o m page 14) Now apply plenty of water. When the water is soaked away finish filling the hole with loose soil. Grape vines are planted so deep that the vines part at the surface of the soil, and each vine is then cut back to 3 or 4 eyes.







Ash, American White Fraxinus cana. Grows fine most anywhere, re-quires very little attention and makes a nice well-branched, spreading crown. Ex-ceptionally hardy and drought resisting, a good tree for park or street planting. In this and most any spreading shade tree a good plan is to plant the young trees in a row 15 feet apart. Then in a few years chop out every other tree to make large shade trees.

Birch, European White Betula Alba. A graceful tall tree, getting a white bark as the trees grow a few years. A fine ornamental tree at any place, and es-pecially in evergreen groups where the white bark shows up most effectively. Hardy as far north as the Dakotas and Minnesota.

**Box Elder** A c e r Negundo. A s h spreading habit and rapid growth. It is very hardy, resists drought well and suc-ceeds in most any soil. I recommend it where other trees are not easy to grow.

**Catalpa Speciosa** Hardy Catalpa. An effective rapid growing lawn tree of tropical ap-pearance with very broad, large leaves and purplish white blossoms in pyramidal clusters, sometimes a foot long. Does well in the Middle West and the Eastern states. Resists drought remarkably well and has hardly any insect enemies. Grows upright and up to 50 feet tall.

**Catalpa Bungei** Chinese Catalpa or Umbrella tree. A dwarf form, stem will not grow taller than it is originally. The low crown will develop densely, with its beautiful foliage growing to a most showy umbrella shape, without pruning. Elegant for parks, lawns and cemeteries. 

For tall backgrounds or in order to break up the monotony of an even skyline such trees as Bolleana Poplars create wonderful effects.

**Lombardy Poplar** The spire-shaped trees are They are striking features in the landscape. This Poplar grows surprisingly fast up to a height of 70 feet or more. Does well in Iowa and up to the middle of Nebraska Nebraska.

Nebraska. Volga Poplar This is another tall growing poplar. It is a little more spreading than the above varieties. It seems to me that it is hardier than the other column shaped va-rieties. I recommend it for quick shade, tim-ber and windbreak.

Linden, American Tilia Amer-icana. Bass-wood. Grows 60 to 80 feet tall. A splen-did tree for park and street planting, for the lawn or wherever you wish a large, spreading ornamental and shade tree. It has a good, healthy foliage, a little larger than the leaves of the European Linden. In my opinion the American Linden grows a little faster, and is probably a little hardier. I have seen some splendid trees of this kind here in the southern part of Nebraska.

(continued from page 27) Draw away several inches of soil all around the tree or shrub, thus forming a shallow basin. Fill this basin with water, allow it to soak away, then re-place the loose topsoil. Do this also in late fall before ground freezes.
