Explanation of the Articles in the Calendar.

These pages are calculated for Toronto and Quebec, and for ordinary purposes will serve with sufficient accuracy for every city in Canada.

MOON'S PHASES.—This Table gives the times for the two meridians when the moon passes the geocentric longitudes of 0°, 90°, 180° and 270° east of the sun. It gives also the times of her greatest and least distance from the earth.

TWILIGHT.—In this table are given the times at which twilight begins in the morning and ends in the evening, &c., the times when the sun's centre is 18° below the horizon.

GREATEST ELONGATION OF THE POLE STAR.—This column gives the greatest azimuth of the Pole Star east or west from the meridian as observed at a place in latitude 45°. When the greatest elongation corresponding to any other latitude is required, the number given in the column should be corrected by means of the following table.

The 1st correction for the degrees of latitude is to be subtracted from the greatest elongation given in the calendar, or added to it, according as the degrees of latitude are less or greater than 45°.

The 2nd correction, which is always additive, is found by multiplying the number given in the third line of the table by the number of minutes in the latitude.

Thus for latitude 48° 20'...1st correction = - 4' 5"	2nd correction + 2.0 × 20 = + 40"

THE PLANETS.—The times of rising and setting of the five chief planets are calculated for Toronto, and are corrected for refraction. The times of culmination, although computed for the meridian of Toronto, will serve approximately for the whole of Canada. The meridian south distances, being designed merely to aid in finding the planets, have been given only to the nearest tenth of a degree, as seen from the latitude of Toronto.

When the planetary day is shorter than the mean solar day, and commences soon after the midnight of the preceding day, the planet will sometimes arrive a second time on the meridian before the expiration of the actual civil day. From analogous causes a planet will sometimes rise twice or set twice in the same civil day. When two culminations occur in the same day, or two risings or settings, the times of both are registered.

The times of the SUN'S RISING AND SETTING are given for the upper limb, and are corrected for refraction both for Toronto and Quebec.

The MOON'S RISING is given from full to change, and her setting from change to full.

The MOON'S MERIDIAN ZENITH DISTANCES are given to the nearest tenth of a degree for Toronto. They are not corrected for parallax or refraction.

The column SUN ON MERIDIAN gives the time that a watch should shew when the shadow of a sun dial is on the noon mark.

DECLINATION OF THE SUN AT APPARENT NOON.—This column gives the sun's declination at the instant he passes the meridian of Toronto.

MOON'S AGE.—This column shews to the nearest tenth of a day the Moon's age at Toronto Noon.

The column, MOON ON THE MERIDIAN, gives the mean time at which the moon's centre passes the meridian of Toronto.

The column, UPPER TRANSIT OF POLE STAR shews for every day the mean time at which the Pole Star makes its upper transit across the meridian of Toronto. It passes in the morning from April 9th to October 8th, and in the evening for the rest of the year.

The five last columns, although computed for Toronto, will serve with sufficient accuracy for the whole of Canada.

The time at which the lower transit of the Pole Star occurs may be found by adding 11 h. 53 m. 2 s. to the time of its preceding upper transit.

From the time of the upper transit of the pole star may be found the time of its greatest western or eastern elongation, by adding or subtracting the constants given in the annexed Table.

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From the times of the upper transit of the Pole Star may be derived, with the aid of the following table, the times of culmination, and of the rising and setting of the principal fixed stars that appear above the horizon of Toronto.

Star Table.

To ascertain when any star found in the following table will be on the meridian, add the number in the left-hand column of figures to the preceding meridian transit of the pole star given in the calendar. To find the time of rising of a star, subtract the number opposite to it in the right-hand column of figures from the time of its meridian passage. For the setting of a Star, add the same number to the time of its meridian passage. Those stars marked (.....) revolve in a circle of perpetual apparition, and do not rise or set at Toronto, or at places to the north of Toronto.

Eclipses.

In the year 1860 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon.

- I.—An annular Eclipse of the Sun, January 22, invisible in Canada.
- III.—A total Eclipse of the Sun, July 18, visible as a partial one in Canada.
- II.—A partial Eclipse of the Moon, Feb. 6, visible in Canada.
- IV.—A partial Eclipse of Moon, Aug. 1, invisible in Canada.

I.—ANNULAR ECLIPSE OF THE SUN, JANUARY 22.

The central line of this Eclipse passes very near the South Pole. The Eclipse is visible as a partial one from New Zealand, the southern part of South America, and from the greater part of the Southern Ocean.

II.—PARTIAL ECLIPSE OF THE MOON, FEBRUARY 6.

The first contact with the shadow occurs at 79° from the northernmost point of the Moon's limb towards the East, and the last contact at 32° towards the West.

Magnitude of the Eclipse (Moon's diameter = 1) 0.899.

III.—TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN, July 18, 1860.

The Eclipse is first seen at 0 minutes before Greenwich mean noon, from a point in North America in latitude 34° 43' N., and longitude 6h. 40m. W.; and it is seen last at 4h. 57m. Greenwich mean time, from a point in Africa in latitude 4° 16' N., and longitude 1h. 16m. E.

The line of central eclipse extends from a point near Vancouver's Island eastward across Hudson's Bay, the North Atlantic, the Bay of Biscay, part of Spain and of North Africa, and terminates finally in the southern extremity of the Red Sea.

From a point in or near Halifax in latitude 44° 44' N., and longitude 4h. 14m. 24s. W., a partial eclipse is visible.

The mean temp. of 1858 was 44.74°, being 2.01° higher than that of 1857, and 0.64° above the average of 19 years. The mean temp. of the four seasons was as follows:— Winter... 23.23° or 4.20° ovc. that of '57 & 2.08° above av'g. Spring... 39.60° or 2.25° " " 37 & 1.07° below " Summer... 67.21° or 3.88° " " 57 & 2.34° above " Autumn... 47.55° or 3.48° " " 57 & 0.68° " "

The mean temperatures of the several months were in eight instances above and in four below the averages for those months. July and Feb. were as usual the warmest and coldest months as compared with other months in the year, but estimated by the deviation of their temperatures from their respective averages, January was the warmest month and February the coldest.

The mean temperature of the warmest day, which was 79.98°, exceeded the nineteen years average by 2.56°. It occurred on June 26, which is 24 days earlier than the average date of the warmest day, but 32 days earlier than its normal date, or data derived from the normal curve of temperature for Toronto, or curve in which by the employment of five day groups accidental irregularities are eliminated. The mean temp. of the coldest day, which was +1.60°, exceeded the average by 1.8°. It occurred on Feb. 17, which is 22 days later than the average date of the coldest day, and 3 days later than the normal date of the coldest day.

The highest temperature of the year was 90.2°, or 0.5° lower than the average maximum of 19 years. It occurred on June 26, already mentioned as the warmest day, and 30 days earlier than the average date of its occurrence. The minimum temperature of the year was -7.3° or 3.8° higher than the average minimum. It occurred on Feb. 17, already mentioned as the coldest day, or 24 days later than the date at which, on the average, the absolutely lowest temperature has occurred. The range of temperature for the whole year, 97.5°, was less than the average by 4.2°.

Humidity.—The mean humidity of the year was 0.73, the greatest monthly humidity being in December, and the least in April, facts which conform very nearly to the experience of the past eighteen years, which give January and May as the dampest and driest months as regards the vapour suspended in the atmosphere. There were but three instances of perfect saturation, one in November and two in December, and the day when on the whole the atmosphere was most damp was March 15, when the mean humidity was 0.96. The instance of greatest atmospheric dryness was .08, at 4 p.m. of April 16; and the driest day on the whole was May 3, with a mean humidity of .39.

Clouds.—The extent of sky clouded was on the average 3.6ths of the whole hemisphere, and for nine months the sky was on the average at least half over-cast. December was the most cloudy month, and September the month most free from clouds. This harmonises with experience as regards December, but the month in which on the whole clouds usually prevail least is July.

Wind.—The resultant direction of the wind for the year

was considerably more from the west, and the resultant velocity as well as the mean velocity was much less than in the preceding three years. The most windy month was April, with a mean velocity 9.57 miles per hour, and the least windy month was June, with a mean velocity of 5.53. The most windy day was 21st March, with a mean velocity of 23.62 miles, and the most windy hour absolutely was from 3 to 4 p.m., on the same day, when the velocity was 35.4 miles. The most windy hour on the average of the year was from 2 p.m. to 3 p.m., with a mean velocity of 10.51 miles, the least windy hour from midnight to 1 a.m., with a mean velocity of 5.88 miles.

Rain and Snow.—The depth of rain, 28.051 inches, was 2.674 inches below average, and depth of snow 45.4 inches or 16.2 inches less than average. The total depth of rain and melted snow thus fell short of the average by nearly 4.3 inches.

May was the most rainy month, estimated by the quantity of rain that fell, but considered with reference to the number of rainy days, October and May were equally rainy. February was in both respects the least rainy month. The most rainy day was May 11, when the depth of rain was 1.590 inches, and the days on which the heaviest fall of snow occurred were February 1, and 13, on each of which days it fell to the depth of 6 inches.

The fall of rain was distributed over 131 days, and the fall of snow over 67 days, including some days enumerated as days of rain; and there were 173 days without either rain or snow. The rain occupied about 584 hours, and the snow about 277 hours in its fall, giving thus a total of 861 hours, or nearly 36 days, or nearly one-tenth of the year when either rain or snow was actually falling.

The hour when rain was most frequent through the year was 1 p.m. to 2 p.m., the hours at which snow was most frequent were from 10 a.m. to 11 a.m., and from 1 p.m. to 2 p.m.; and the hour most subject either to rain or snow was from 1 p.m. to 2 p.m. The hours most free from rain and snow considered separately, were from 10 a.m. to 11 a.m. and from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. for rain, and from midnight to 1 a.m. for snow; and the hour most free from rain and snow taken collectively was from midnight to 1 a.m.

Thunderstorms.—There were but 19 thunderstorms, reckoning as such those cases in which thunder or lightning occurred accompanied by rain or hail; but there were besides 31 instances in which thunder and lightning occurred separately or together, but unaccompanied by either.

Auroras.—Auroras were more frequent than during the preceding five years, and that of October 27 exceeded in brilliancy any that were observed within that period.

From the foregoing statements, as well as from the accompanying table, it would appear that 1858 was on the whole characterized as a moderate and average year, the most marked exception being the early date of the maximum of summer heat, the somewhat scanty supply of rain and snow, taking one month with the other, and its unusually large amount in the month of May.

15. Sir Edward Lugard relieved Azaughur, India.
16. A torchlight procession in New York in memory of Pierr and Orsini.
17. Dr. Bernard acquitted, verdict received with the people vociferous cheering, as well in the court as at the most vociferous cheering, as well in the court as at the people assembled outside.
19. Dr. Mackay, poet, Editor of the *Illustrated London News*, lectured in Toronto, on "Poetry and Song."
22. Steamer *Ocean Spray* burnt on the Mississippi, while racing; 20 lives lost.
24. American brig *New Era* boarded by English war Steamer, in search of slaves, and afterwards (May 18) fired at for not heaving to. These and similar events are characterized by Americans as "outrages."—Mr. James Nolan, Carlow, Ireland.
27. Two incendiary fires took place in Toronto.—Great fire at St. Katherine's Docks, London, loss \$500,000.
29. Meetings to adopt measures to detect and suppress incendiaries infesting Toronto.

May, 1858.

1. Convay Rope Works burnt in Montreal, 3 lives lost.—Dr. William Gregory, professor of Chemistry, University of Edinburgh, died.
2. Steamer *Anglo Saxon* arrived at Quebec, first of the season.

3. C. Widmer, M.D., died, aged 78.
4. A chimney of a house in course of removal in Toronto, fell, killing 1 man and severely injuring 2 others.
5. The Queen of Portugal arrived in England.
7. A young man, Fleming, brutally murdered by three brothers, named Bradin, in Township of Mornington.
8. His Excellency the Governor of Vancouver's Island, issued a proclamation forbidding all trading in Frazer River, the seat of the newly discovered gold mines, except through the Hudson's Bay Company.—Vieuxtemps and Thalberg gave a concert in Toronto.
10. A slight earthquake felt in Richmond, C. E.
11. A frightful accident on the New York Central Railroad took place this morning by the crushing of a bridge over the Saquoit Creek, near Utica, 9 killed, 52 wounded.—Ship *Grand Duchess* from New York to Liverpool, burnt, lat. 51, long. 16. Crew saved.
12. Mutiny among the Firemen of Hamilton, C. W., two members of the Brigade committed to gaol for arson.—A large mass of earth and rocks fell from Durham Terrace Quebec, to lower town, no lives lost.
13. The Legislature, at invitation of the Directors of the Northern Railway, made an excursion to Collingwood.—Ahmed Pacha, heir apparent to the Pachalia of Egypt, accidentally killed.
14. Suspended Banks in St. Louis, U. S., resumed specie payments.—Mr. Louis Paulson, completed his match of playing ten games of chess simultaneously without seeing boards or men, winning nine and drawing the tenth.
15. Last night a shocking accident occurred on the Lafayette and Indianapolis R. R. by an insecure bridge giving away, but three lives lost.—Breaking ground for the North West Railway at Fergus, C. W.—Hurricane in the Parish of Ste. Anne des Plaines, Terrebonne, 40 buildings, including 11 dwelling-houses, destroyed.—The Royal Italian Opera Theatre, Covent Garden, opened.
16. A violent storm on Lake Ontario this night.
17. Wm. H. Herbert, "Frank Forrester" author, committed suicide at his residence, Newark, New Jersey.
18. Fire in Chicago, by which 12 persons lost their lives.—Duchess of Orleans died in London, aged 49.
19. M. Alme Boupland, the naturalist, died at San Borja, Montevideo, aged 55.

7. A new Prohibitory Liquor Law ratified by the votes of the people of Maine, U. S.
8. The Oratorio of Judas Maccabeus performed for the first time in Toronto. 200 performers.
10. Grand Banquet at the Rossin House, in honor of Baron de Rottenburg, Colonel of the 100th, on the eve of his departure to join his Regiment.—The Atlantic Telegraph Fleet took its final departure from Plymouth.
12. The *New York*, screw steamer from Glasgow to New York lost in a dense fog off the Mull of Cantire, Scotland.
13. The steamer *Pennsylvania* on the Mississippi burst her boilers at 6 a.m., 154 lives lost.
14. A large body of rebels attacked at Nawabgunge by Sir H. Grant, and utterly defeated.
15. The Mahomedans in Jeddah, Arabia, rose and massacred the Christians.—The largest nugget yet discovered found at Ballarat; weight 225 pounds, value \$55,000.
16. A small shock of an earthquake felt at Kingston, Jamaica.—Dr. Jabez Bunting, a prominent leader of the Wesleyans, died in London, aged 80.
19. First detachment of 100th Regiment embarked at Quebec on *Indian* for England.—The Legislature, at the invitation of the G. W. Railway authorities, paid Detroit a visit.—Earthquake in the city and valley of Mexico, over 50 lives lost, and \$9,000,000 of property destroyed.

29. A slight shock of an earthquake felt in New Haven, Ct., and northward at 11 p.m.—Great fire in London Docks, loss about \$750,000.

July, 1858.

1. A frightful accident occurred on the London and South Eastern Railway.
5. The Atlantic Telegraph Squadron returned to Queenstown, having failed in laying the cable.
6. Railway celebration at Goderich of the opening of the B. & L. H. Railway; about 7,000 guests were present.—A gang of coiners discovered in London, C.W.; several arrested.
12. A riot took place in Toronto, between some Orangemen and Roman Catholics, which was quickly subdued.
14. The Union between the Grand Lodge of Canada, and the Ancient Grand Lodge of Canada of Free and Accepted Masons, was consummated this evening in Toronto.
15. Election of Grand Master of the United Grand Lodge, now the *Grand Lodge of Canada*, took place in the Masonic Hall, Colonel W. M. Wilson, of Simcoe, being unanimously chosen.—Foundation stone of the Crystal Palace, Toronto, was laid with honors by the Hon. P. M. Vankoughnet, Minister of Agriculture.
17. Telegraphic fleet again departed to attempt the laying of the Atlantic cable.
21. Severe hail-storm in Whitby and Pickering, doing immense injury to the crops.
26. Baron Rothschild took his seat in the House of Commons after being sworn, in conformity with the new Act, upon the Old Testament.
29. Canadian Ministry resigned, having been defeated by a majority of 14 on Mr. Piche's motion that Ottawa was not a fit place for the seat of Government of United Canada. Geo. Brown was called upon to form a new Ministry by His Excellency.—Atlantic telegraphic cable spliced in mid ocean, on this occasion, for the last and successful attempt.
31. Mr. Brown accepts the duty of forming a new Administration.

August, 1858.

2. Mr. Brown's ministry announced to the Lower House this afternoon and defeated in the evening on a vote of want of confidence by 71 to 31, and in the Upper House by 10 to 8.—The Imperial Parliament prorogued.—The House at Antwerp entirely destroyed by fire.—M. Alexis Soyer, the famous cook, died in England.
3. Mr. Brown advises the Governor to prorogue the House with a view to a dissolution of Parliament.
4. The Governor Sir E. Head, refuses to accede to his ministers advice in reference to a prorogation, we reupon his new cabinet immediately tender their resignations.—Mr. Galt sent for to form a new administration.—George Coombe, author of the "Constitution of Man," died, aged 73.—The Queen of England visited Napoleon at Cherbourg.
5. Mr. Galt declines the responsibility of the formation of a new cabinet.—The Atlantic Telegraphic cable landed on the shores of America from the *Niagara* at 6 a.m.—This day last year she laid the shore end from Valentia Bay, Ireland.—Jeddah in Arabia, bombarded by H. M. S. *Cyclops*.
6. Mr. Cartier, with Mr. J. A. Macdonald, late ministers, undertake to form a new administration.—The great annual cricket match Canada v. United States, played in New York, was lost by Canadians with 4 wickets to go down.
7. Opening of the Napoleon Dock of the military fort at Cherbourg, and launch of the *Ville de Nantes*.
14. The Cunard steamer *Arabia* came in collision with the *Europa* off St. John's, N. F., *Europa* much injured though no lives lost.—Disgraceful election riots at Iowa.
16. The Atlantic Telegraph in working order; the Queen's message from London, England, received by the President of the United States, at Washington, and his reply returned. The Governor General of Canada also congratulated Her Majesty from Toronto.—Universal rejoicings over the

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continent of America in the shape of bonfire illuminations and other demonstrations took place this evening.—The Canadian Parliament prorogued by the Governor in person.

17. Great festivities in New York in honor of the success of the Atlantic cable, the City Hall in New York burned during the celebration.

19. Rejoicing in Toronto in celebration of the laying of the Atlantic Cable.

24. A splendid meteor seen over Quebec at 7 p.m.

25. The Atlantic Telegraph brought intelligence of the receipt of China and Indian malls, and that a treaty of peace had been concluded with China.

26. The barque *New Brunswick*, of Chatham, C. W., lost on Lake Erie in a gale and five of the crew drowned.—Gen. Williams, the hero of Kars, entertained at Halifax.

28. Rev. Elizabeth Williams, the pretended Dauphin of France, died at Hogsburg, N. Y.

September, 1858.

1. The Quarantine Station, Staten Island, N. Y., attacked by a mob and several of the buildings fired.
2. Gold discoveries in Kansas; also in Buenos Ayres.
3. The Quarantine Buildings again attacked by a mob and wholly destroyed.
6. Yellow fever severe in New Orleans, deaths this day 80.
- The Hundredth or the new Canadian Regiment reviewed at Shorncliffe by the Duke of Cambridge.
9. A Mr. Thurston, of Adiran, Michigan, after making a balloon ascension was carried off by the balloon after the car was detached on its descent. The balloon was found near Baptist Creek, Canada, and the body of Mr. Thurston some considerable time after, on the St. Clair Flats.
- 11.—A revolt of the convicts at Portland, England.
12. Donati's comet, discovered in June, became plainly visible in Toronto.
13. Steamship *Austria* from Hamburg to New York burnt at sea, 88 saved out of 634 souls on board.—Frightful accident at the Music Hall, Sheffield, in consequence of a panic from some unknown cause.
17. Dr. Scott, a negro rendered famous by his suit for freedom, died at an advanced age.
25. Wm. McKay, messenger of Toronto Custom House, robbed in the Bank of Upper Canada of about \$4,000; the property recovered by Chief of Police a few hours after.
27. A negro servant and slave was forcibly abducted by the colored people of Chatham, C. W., from his master, a passenger on the Great Western Railway for Detroit.
29. The Palace of Industry, Toronto, opened formally by the Governor General for the purpose of holding the Annual Provincial Exhibition.—Powder Magazine at Havana, exploded, 112 killed, 119 wounded.
30. Second day of the Exhibition, about 20,000 visitors were present at the Palace.

October, 1858.

1. Any person landing Chinese emigrants in California after this date is subject to a fine of \$900.
4. The topmost stone of the University of Toronto building, laid by the Governor General with great ceremony.
5. New York Crystal Palace burnt with all its contents, loss estimated at \$1,500,000, supposed to have been the work of an incendiary.

10. Continued fighting in Oudea. A number of engagements about this time resulting in great destruction to the rebel forces.
12. The Welland Railway opened for business.
15. Toronto Boat Club gained the match over the Chicago Boat Club on the Detroit river, for a purse of \$1,000 and the championship of the lakes.—General Biance with an army of 1,500 Liberals attacked Mexico without success.
16. Sir William Williams, of Kars, arrived in Toronto this morning.—Fire in Kingston, Ven. Archdeacon's stables, and riot afterwards among firemen, causing the death of one of their number.

17. A man named Cunningham found shot dead in the streets of Toronto this morning, no clue to the murderers.
20. A fight between Morrissey and Hoeman for the championship of the American ring, took place at Long Point, in Canada, Morrissey the victor.
21. Public dejeuner in Toronto to Sir W. Williams, the hero of Kars.
22. Ira Stout, the murderer, executed at Rochester, N. Y.
23. Terrible hurricane in Bermuda, which lasted three days, causing an immense destruction of property.
26. A horrible tragedy in New York: a lad named Gouldy, attempts to murder his father and mother and the rest of the family, and then shoots himself.
27. Madam Ida Pfelfer, the famous traveller, died at Vienna, aged 61.
28. Count de Montalembert, prosecuted by the French Government for a bold political essay in the *Correspondence*.

November, 1858.

2. The new Court House, Kingston, opened by Judge McLean.
3. Wholesale poisoning at Bradford, England, by the sale of poisoned lozenges, about 20 lives lost out of 100 sufferers.
5. A new company formed to complete the equipment of the *Great Eastern* steamship.
6. Valuable lead mines discovered in the township of Bedford, C. W.
9. The Prince of Wales gazetted as a Colonel in the army.
10. A Spanish fleet of eight steamers sailed from Cadiz for Mexico, to enforce, it is said, certain Spanish demands.
11. Earthquake in Lisbon, the most violent experienced there since 1755.
12. James Rogers, aged 17, executed in New York for murder.
13. Unitarian church, Toronto, broken into and communion plate removed.—Two prisoners escaped from the Tolic dinner at the Rossin House, Toronto.
16. Chatham station, G. W. R., destroyed by fire.
17. Robt. Owen, the celebrated socialist, died in Wales, aged 86.
22. Isaac Newton, an extensive Hudson River steam-boat owner, died, aged 63.

THE MONETARY INSTITUTIONS OF CANADA.

Money is usually described as the medium of exchange, but may be more correctly defined as that single description of property which is always convertible into all other property at a fixed nominal price, and consequently the measure by which the relative values of all other commodities is ascertained.

In a rude state of society exchanges are made by bartering one article for another according to some kind of understood value. The unit may represent an ounce of gold, a bushel of wheat, or a bar of iron, and the exchange can be effected without the use of any medium whatever. As society advances, however, the inconveniences of this method of doing business become more and more apparent. One man setting out on a distant journey, and unwilling to burden himself with a cumbersome load of provisions, seeks out some article of great value and little bulk, which he can exchange on the way to supply his wants, or bury in the earth if overtaken by an enemy. Hence the precious metals became, at an early age, the principal medium of exchange among the Eastern nations. It is true many other commodities were successively employed for this purpose. In some countries cattle are said to have been the common instrument of commerce, and although they must have been a most inconvenient one, yet we find that in the

Roman Empire itself things were frequently valued according to the number of cattle that were given in exchange for them. "The armour of Diomedes," says Homer, "cost but nine oxen, while that of Glaucus cost one hundred." Salt is said to be the common instrument of commerce in Abyssinia; a species of shells in some parts of India; hides or dressed leather in some other countries; while we learn, on the authority of Adam Smith, that up to a recent period it was customary in a village in Scotland to carry nails instead of money to the baker's shop or to the alms-house.

While, however, in savage life and in the less advanced stages of civilization, the use of metals may not have become general, we find that they are, and ever have been, the recognised media of commerce in all countries laying claim to advanced civilization.

The use of gold and silver and the great value attached to them in proportion to their size and weight, necessarily led to the establishment of places for their safe keeping, and the "King's Treasuries" became the first repositories of the precious metals. As society advanced, the savings of individuals came to stand equally in need of a place of safety. But the hoarding of a hundred small sums required the constant watchfulness of a hundred individuals, while by putting them in the same strong box, they could

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The first Bank of which we have any authentic record, was that of Venice, established in 1171. It was a government institution and confined its operations to the safe keeping of all monies deposited therein, for which accommodation a small sum was paid by the depositors. It existed some six hundred years and afforded great conveniences to the commerce, not only of Venice but of a great part of Europe. The Bank of Amsterdam, a similar institution, was established in the Netherlands in 1609. It received on deposit all the coins then in circulation, however worn or dipped or alloyed they might be, ascertained by assay the true value of the same, and passed them to the credit of the depositor as so much "back money." This arrangement established a uniform standard of money, and conferred the greatest advantages upon the trade of Amsterdam. It continued its operations without interruption till the invasion of the French Army in 1795.

The Bank of Hamburg is another institution much like the preceding. It has ever been, and still is, strictly a Bank of Deposit, and has always adhered to its functions as such. It has never loaned any of its funds but maintained in all respects its integrity both to its depositors and the public. It is supported by a small commission paid by each depositor, but as its funds generally bear a premium, it virtually costs the depositors nothing, the charges falling at last on those who drain its specie for exportation.

Towards the close of the seventeenth century England began to assume that commercial superiority for which she is now distinguished, and while it must be admitted that the requirements of her immense trade called her Banking Institutions into existence, it is equally certain that to them she owes much of her present commercial greatness.

Banking in England is of more modern origin than in those countries already mentioned. "In the reign of William the Third," says Macaulay, "old men were still living who could remember when there was not a single banking house in the city of London. So late as the time of the Restoration every trader had his own strong box in his own house, and when an acceptance was presented to him told down the crowns and Caroluses on his own counter. But the increase of wealth had produced its natural effects, the subdivision of labour. Before the end of the reign of Charles the Second a new mode of paying and receiving money had come into fashion among the merchants of the Capital. A class of agents arose whose office was to keep the cash of the commercial houses. This new branch of business naturally fell into the hands of the goldsmiths, who were accustomed to traffic largely in the precious metals, and who had vaults in which great masses of bullion could lie secure from fire and from robbers. It was at the shops of the goldsmiths of Lombard Street that all the payments in coin were made. Other traders gave and received nothing but paper."

"This great change," continues the historian, "did not take place without much opposition and clamor. Old fashioned merchants complained bitterly that a class of men who thirty years before had confined themselves to their proper functions, and had made a fair profit by embossing silver bowls and chargers, by setting jewels for fine ladies, and by selling pistoles and dollars to gentlemen settling out for the Continent, had become the treasurers and were fast becoming the masters of the whole city. The usurers, it was said, played at hazard with what had been earned by the industry and hoarded by the thrift of other men. If the dice turned up well, the knave who kept the cash became an alderman; if they turned up ill, the dupe who furnished the cash became a bankrupt. On the other hand, the conveniences of the modern practice were set forth in animated language. The new system, it was said, saved both labour and money. Two clerks seated in one counting-house did what, under the old system, must have been done by twenty clerks in twenty different establishments. A goldsmith's note might be transferred ten times in a morning, and thus a hundred guineas locked in his safe close to the Exchange, did what would have formerly required one thousand guineas, dispersed through many tills, some on Ludgate Hill, some in Austin-Frirs, and some in Tower Street."

No sooner had banking become a separate and important branch of business, than the question of a National Bank began to be discussed, and resulted in the establishment of the Bank of England in 1694. This, the greatest Mone-

tary Institution that the world has ever seen, was projected by one William Patterson, an obscure Scotchman, and commenced its operations with a capital of twelve hundred thousand pounds, which was loaned to the Government at eight per cent. interest. The money thus lent was to carry on the war with France, and the interest was secured by a duty on tonnage. The Bank of England thus became, at its very commencement, a Bank of Discount as well as of Deposit, and afterwards becoming a Bank of Issue, embraced within the sphere of its operations the three distinct characteristics of Deposit, Discount and Circulation, in which it has been followed by nearly all modern Banking Institutions.

The establishment of the Bank of England led to the formation of many other joint stock banking companies in various parts of the United Kingdom, as well as in the Colonies, and such institutions may now be regarded as an essential element in the progress and development of a country.

Towards the close of the last century the requirements of commerce had led to the establishment of several banking companies in the United States, and the propriety of organizing a National Bank has been warmly discussed by contending political parties. But the failure of the Bank of the United States, a kind of national institution, in 1836, proved fatal to the success of this favorite project of the Whigs, as the Government of that country established, under the administration of General Jackson, the United States Treasury, in which the funds of the Government have ever since been deposited. The absence of a national bank has not, however, prevented our enterprising neighbours from forming many joint stock banking companies, and it is scarcely too much to say that there are more banks in the United States than in all the rest of the world put together. The latest returns show that in that country there are about fourteen hundred banks, with a capital of nearly four hundred millions of dollars.

Up to a recent period the system of banking pursued in the United States was of the most objectionable kind, and derogatory to the character of the American people. That system is now, however, almost entirely swept away, and the banks have been placed on a secure and satisfactory footing. The crises of 1837 and 1857 have taught them the value of sound monetary institutions, and the restrictions which their Banking Laws now put upon the operations of "speculative" bankers are fast ridding their country of this, the most dangerous class of "money-making" gentlemen.

The history of our monetary institutions is not characterized by any of those disastrous failures which have inflicted so much injury upon other countries. The preference which the French *Habitans* always showed for the precious metals rendered it a difficult task to convince them of the superiority of paper money. They knew the ring of the silver dollar and the golden doubloon, but were ignorant of the mysteries and did not appreciate the beauties of bank note engraving. Even at the present day the bills best known amongst them are those of the Banque Du Peuple, on which is engraved a fac-simile of the Spanish silver dollar. Such a people were not the class amongst whom the worthless financier could pursue his trade to advantage. Subjected to the closest scrutiny at every turn, and repeatedly rejected altogether, it was impossible for our Canadian bank notes to pass muster unless they were, like Cesar's wife, above suspicion. Originating under circumstances so well calculated to insure the most perfect security, the Canadian Banks have increased in number and importance without a single failure worthy of being recorded. For upwards of forty years have the oldest of our banks pursued the "even tenor of their way," undisturbed by commercial struggles on the one hand and political struggles on the other. It is true that by orders of the Government they suspended specie payments in 1838, but their ability to meet their engagements was never once questioned, and now, after two years of commercial embarrassment and depression, that confidence so honourably won, and so wisely maintained, remains unimpaired. The increase of banking capital has not certainly kept pace with the increase of the general business of the Province, nor, in view of our relative population and wealth, does it approach that of the United States. Still, in looking back over a period of forty years, we find that the institutions originated during that time have been developed in the most satisfactory manner.

There are now in operation in Canada fourteen chartered banks, whose united paid up capital is \$24,050,576, and two free banks with a capital of \$240,000, making a total of \$24,290,576. Of these banks, seven have their head

quarters in Upper Canada, six in Lower Canada, and one in London.

The first Bank established in Canada was the Bank of Montreal, which went into operation in 1817, with a paid-up capital of \$27,500, which has now risen to \$5,928,820, or nearly £1,500,000 currency. The order in which the Canadian banks were organized is shown by the following table:—

The smaller banks have consequently but few branches or agencies.

By a clause in the Act of Incorporation of most of the Canadian Banks, they are required to render monthly returns of the state of their affairs to the Government.

Under the head of "Assets," must be given coin and bullion, landed or other property, government securities, promissory notes or bills of other banks, notes and bills discounted, and other debts due, not included in the foregoing heads. Under the head "Liabilities," there must be given the capital authorized, the capital paid up, notes in circulation, bills of exchange in circulation, balance due other banks, and cash deposits.

The returns thus periodically supplied furnish the best index to the past and present condition of our monetary institutions, and the subjoined table compiled from those returns presents a general view of the extent of our banking operations during the last sixteen years.

The difference at different periods in the relative amounts of loans, circulation and deposits which this table presents, is a subject which has occupied a large share of the attention of monetary writers. It is not, however, our intention to discuss it in this place, but would simply point it out as one of the "mysteries of banking."

The management of a banking institution is attended with grave responsibilities, and the success of the Canadian

Banks may well claim for their managers a passing tribute at our hands. Nor should the public forget that, of all others, the stockholders themselves are by far the most deeply interested in their proper management. In common with the public at large they share the risks of bill-holders and depositors. They are further exposed to the loss of their stock, and not only so, but by a clause in the charters of nearly all our banks, every shareholder is liable to double the amount of his respective shares. With this fact before us, the necessity of exercising the greatest care in conferring banking privileges cannot be too strongly impressed upon the Legislators. Of late, charters have been granted with too much laxity and too little consideration. If it is desirable to increase the amount of our bank capital, it is still more desirable to sustain the high character of the Banks already in existence. Of this fact our Legislators seem to be oblivious, for within the last four years more charters have been granted than during the forty years preceding. Of these several have gone into operation, while others remain a dead letter. Among the latter may be named:

The Royal Bank, Toronto. The Eastern Townships Bank. The Union Bank, Hamilton. The St. Francis Bank. The Bank of Brantford. The Bank des Trois Rivieres, And some others,

The godfathers of these imaginary institutions have shown their discretion in allowing them to remain on the statute book, but it is neither creditable to them nor just to the country to find so many bank charters at present in the market and liable to be controlled by any party having the necessary amount of funds, or what is still more likely, the necessary amount of financial ability to put them in operation. There is now no excuse for this indiscriminate granting of bank charters, as the Free Banking Law of Canada provides for the organization of as many banks as the projectors can find means to put in operation. This law is based on the model of the New York Free Banking Act, and provides that any company or individual may commence the business of banking, by depositing Provincial Debentures with the Government to the extent of one hundred thousand dollars. Notes to the same amount are endorsed by the Government and may be put in circulation, but must be redeemed in specie on presentation. The Bank of British North America has availed itself of this Act to the extent of \$518,833, and has now in circulation under it \$137,670 in small notes, its Imperial Charter not permitting the issue of notes of a less denomination than four dollars. With such a law as this there can be little need of special charters being granted to a few speculative individuals, and if such privileges are granted only when the public good requires them, the legislator can have little difficulty in rejecting the great majority of the applications that come before it.

The question as to whether large or small banks are most secure in themselves, and most conducive to the public good, is one on which much diversity of opinion prevail. Whether a large number of independent banks with small capital and without branches, or a small number of large banks with branches scattered over the country, afford the greatest amount of accommodation or the most ample security, is a proposition regarding which much has been said on both sides. The experience of other countries would seem to indicate that large banks are the most successful. Yet, if large institutions are more able to sustain the pressure of a money panic, it is certain that they are at the same time more exposed to its force. The greatest security will probably be found between the two extremes, but it should never be forgotten that the only sure foundation on which a bank can be established is the wealth and respectability of its shareholders.

The fact that large banking companies with numerous agencies cause a stringency in every part of the country so soon as there is the least indication of a tight money market at head quarters, is often referred to in order to show the superiority of independent banks. It is well known, however, that the slightest change in the money market at the great commercial centres is immediately felt at the remotest parts; and even were it otherwise, it may well be questioned whether the policy that would check this harmony of action in the monetary affairs of a country would contribute to the general good. In the present circumstances of this Province large banks with numerous agencies are probably best calculated to accommodate its trade. Here the centres of industry change with the changing seasons. In winter, the lumbermen are busy in the forest; in spring, the merchant imports his stock; in summer, public works are engaged in, houses

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are built, and workshops hum with the sound of mechanical industry; in autumn, the farmer, the miller and the produce merchant are engaged in securing the products of the soil, and in preparing and shipping them to market. Each in his turn requires the use of a larger amount of means than a purely local institution could afford, while, by judicious management, the larger banks can accommodate alternately, and with much greater efficiency, the various branches of industry requiring their assistance. Thus, the Bank of British North America places one million dollars of extra capital at the disposal of the Toronto Branch, for the use of produce buyers, during the autumn months, and thus all the larger banks knowing where their capital can be best employed, have at their command the necessary agents for placing it to advantage.

Towards the close of the last century another class of monetary institutions, of a less pretentious character, was organized by a few benevolent individuals, and has since conferred immense benefits upon the poorer classes.—Savings' Banks, where the poor could deposit the smallest sums, have from small beginnings risen to occupy a respectable place among modern institutions. In the little State of Massachusetts, the amount of money deposited in the Savings' Banks is over \$31,000,000, or considerably more than the whole capital of the Canadian Banks. In Canada these institutions have not been attended with the same success. Those safeguards which the legislatures of England and the United States have thrown around them in their respective countries, have here been almost totally neglected, and even the little security that is afforded by our laws is rendered worthless by the general indifference to their success. By the laws of England and the United States, returns are regularly made to the Government of the condition of these institutions, but a similar law on our statute book is almost totally neglected. The result is, that with a few exceptions, the Savings' Banks of Canada are little else than private concerns, and the savings of the poorer classes are placed in jeopardy every hour. To this neglect on the part of the Government and Legislature may be ascribed the little progress they have made, and when it is remembered that the want of a secure place of deposit leads the working man to spend his surplus earnings instead of saving them, the indifference of which we complain cannot be too strongly condemned. Owing to the absence of any authorized statement of their affairs, we are unable to state the amount now on deposit in the various Savings' Banks in the Province. In justice, however, to those which comply with the requirements of the Legislature, we give a summary of the statements furnished by them:—

Those Savings' Banks which have failed to make returns to the Government should be called upon to do so, and in the mean time it would be well for depositors to see that the institutions in which they have placed their hard earned savings, make public the state of their affairs.

Another cause operating against the success of Savings' Banks in Canada was the failure of the Montreal Provident and Savings' Bank, in 1848. This Bank had in its Board of Directors some of the most respectable merchants in the city, and had obtained the entire confidence of the community. It ultimately paid many of its depositors in full, by conveying to them its securities, which consisted principally of real estate. Small amounts were paid in full in cash, and those who waited till the concern was wound up received 18s. 2d. in the pound. Notwithstanding these facts, the failure of this institution shook public confidence in every other Savings' Bank in the Province.

The absence of Savings' Banks is to a great extent, and particularly among the better class of depositors, supplied by Building Societies, which may now be fairly classed among our monetary institutions. Originally organized to aid the industrious classes in their efforts to procure homesteads, many of these societies have become, under the extended facilities granted by their Acts of Incorporation, the depositories for the savings not only of the working classes, but for the more wealthy portion of the community.

Building Societies, or more properly “ Mutual Loan and Investment Societies,” on the improved or permanent system, have a two-fold object: first, to secure to Investors a high rate of interest on their capital, free from anxiety as to its safety, or the regular certainty of their returns; and secondly, to provide a fund from which the owners of real estates may obtain loans on the security of their property. The success of these institutions, when properly conducted, is the best evidence of their utility and safety.

Among the most successful institutions of this class may be placed the “ Canada Permanent Building and Savings' Society,” incorporated in 1855, and having its head office in Toronto. The shares are fifty dollars each, and are paid up by instalments of one dollar per month for four years, or four dollars per month for one year, commencing from the time of entrance. These monthly instalments may be commuted by a single payment, a discount, or an equal credit for future instalments being allowed for prepayment. At the expiration of the time for which the share is taken, the stockholder will be entitled to receive back the amount paid in, with the accumulated profits, which, judging from the past history and present position of the Society, will not be less than 15 per cent. per annum. An important improvement recently made by the Legislature in the constitution of these Societies, confers on share-holders the right to reinvest their capital when the share becomes due, and afterwards to receive thereon a periodical dividend, which will be declared half yearly or yearly.

Members who wish to withdraw what they have invested on accumulating shares, are permitted by the rules to receive back what they have paid in, with compound interest thereon at six per cent. per ann. The Directors are, however, authorized to allow more than six per cent. and have from time to time added very materially to that rate, ten per cent. being now paid for shares in the older classes. As shares near their maturity a premium on withdrawing more nearly approximating to the actually realized profits may be relied on. The sums paid in are invested in loans on mortgages, under the supervision of a Board of Directors, chosen annually by the shareholders from among themselves; and in order to guard against the fluctuations to which property in this country is liable, a margin of from 50 to 100 per cent. and upwards is maintained in the value of real estate held in security. The last Report of this Society shows that the amount paid in on Shares was \$162,583 62; the realized profits, \$37,526 13; besides the sum of \$33,357 received on deposit as already mentioned. Looking at the advantages which such institutions confer upon the community at large, and particularly upon the industrious classes, it is to be hoped that the sphere of their operations will be greatly extended.

Another monied institution doing business in Canada but having its head quarters in London, is the Trust and Loan Company of Upper Canada. This company is incorporated by Act of Parliament, and is authorized to loan money on real estate and other securities at a rate of interest not exceeding eight per cent per annum. Its paid up capital is £250,000 sterling, but it has also borrowed on its Debentures £455,730 sterling. These sums, with its reserve fund of £18,000, form the sum of £723,730 sterling, which this company has at its disposal. Of this amount, its last half-yearly statement showed that it had invested in Canada:—

Or over three millions of dollars, on which was collected the sum of \$112,404 interest for the half year.

Before closing this account of the Monetary Institutions of Canada, it may not be out of place to notice the issue of Provincial Debentures in 1848-9 and 1850. The severe commercial depression that existed in 1848 had so far diminished the Provincial receipts that the finances of the Government became temporarily embarrassed; the Banks were unable or unwilling to grant the required relief, and in the emergency the then Inspector General (Hon. F. Hincks) determined to issue small Debentures, principally of the denomination of ten and twenty dollars, to meet the demands on the treasury. These debentures bore six per cent. interest, were payable twelve months after date, and were received in payment of all Government dues. The first issue took place about the middle of July, 1848, and by the 21st of that month the sum of £3,330 had been put in circulation. By the end of December of the same year £198,727 10s. had been paid out, of which £112,380 were returned in payment of debts due to the Government.

leaving in circulation the sum of £86,347 10s. By the 31st December, 1849, £570,637 had been issued, of which £402,562 10s. had been cancelled, leaving £168,075 in circulation. The last of these debentures were issued on the 10th of May, 1850, at which period £661,682 10s. had been issued, and £530,270 returned, leaving £131,412 10s. in the hands of the public. These debentures passed current outside the Banks, but were not received of from 24 to 5 were consequently often sold at a discount of from 24 to 5 per cent. The fact that Provincial debentures, bearing six per cent. interest and payable twelve months after date, were sold at a discount in the broker's offices in Montreal, sometimes within six months of maturity, is strong proof that money was much scarcer then than it is now, whatever may be said to the contrary.

The principal subject of discussion in connection with our monetary institutions, has been the repeal of the usury laws. Up to the summer of 1858, it was illegal for private individuals or banking companies to charge over six per cent. interest. Any charge over that rate could not be collected, and if paid could be recovered at law. But the Act of 1858 permits the banks to charge seven per cent., and leaves private parties to make their own terms.

The propriety of removing all restrictions from our Banks and the rate of interest charged by them, is now generally admitted in Western Canada, as the present law confines the Banks to first class paper and compels them to reject the most needy borrowers, who are thus driven into the hands of the money brokers, and more particularly in higher rate. In some quarters, it is true the repeal of these laws has been strongly opposed, but this appears to arise from a mistaken idea of the nature of money and of the causes which govern its price. It is true, many of our farming population, who are in debt to the country dealers, will find the interest increased on their overdue accounts; but if the pressure thus put upon them will arouse them to the danger of allowing themselves to run so deeply in debt, the result will be most beneficial, not only to them, but to the country at large. The practice so general in this country of keeping open accounts with the country merchants is fraught with the direst consequences and cannot be too strongly condemned. To this cause may be largely ascribed the great commercial depression of the last two years, for had the great majority of the people been free from debt, and living within their means, the partial failure of the wheat crop would not have produced the effects we have lately experienced. It would be well if the substitution of country traders on the agricultural community, for on them, more than on the unwholesome state must be laid the blame of fostering the ability of their customers to pay their accounts when due, the line of credit is generally measured by the value of the farm. Dollar by dollar the little bill accumulates till it becomes the promissory note, and after a time the mortgage. Meantime the storekeeper's own engagements fall to be met, and the whole business of the country is thrown into disorder. As the mortgage matures, the farmer is thrown upon the tender mercies of the money lender—and then commences that downward career, the result of which it is not difficult to foresee. No usury laws will then avert his fate. Money will command its price, or it cannot be had at all, and the unfortunate mortgagee delays the evil day by the payment of a high rate of interest. Sad indeed is the condition of the poor farmer whom cheap goods and twelve months' credit have involved in debt. He may spare a portion of his crop, the rust may leave many stems untouched, but the heartless usurer will take the last loaf from the mouths of his little ones, and finally drive him and them from that homestead which the best part of his life may have been spent in building up.

If, then, we condemn the restrictions on money as a needless and injurious interference with the course of trade, we are not the less alive to the evils inflicted upon the country by the practice of borrowing money at exorbitant rates of interest. But the remedy is not to be found in restricting the sale of money, but in good management and prudent living. It is frequently charged against our Banks that they do not sufficiently assist the farming population, but it is very questionable whether a farmer who is out of debt and of good character, when he does not require amount of assistance. Unfortunately, when he does give his obligation it is generally to settle an overdue account which he is no better able to pay in one shape than another, and when the Bank comes to demand payment it is put off with the consoling assurance that the drawer has plenty of means, but in these hard times is unable to realize.

Let it not be supposed that because the agricultural population are not the direct recipients of Bank discounts, that they are not largely indebted to them for many indirect advantages. Who supplies the wheat buyers and the lumbermen with cash to buy the farmer's produce? Who gives the means to carry on their business? Where, in a word, would our farmer find a market if the Banks withdrew their capital from our produce dealers and manufacturers?

We should never lose sight of the fact that bank capital can only be legitimately used as a *facilitator of commerce*, and cannot be sunk in real estate without risk to the bank and inconvenience to the community. Nor should it be forgotten that in no case is it safe for the farmer to allow large obligations to mature at the same time. The most valuable farm yields but a small return in a single year; and when the owner requires to borrow money, he should be careful to extend the term of payment over a long period. Inattention to this important truth has ruined many an industrious and otherwise careful man. The importance of this fact has long been recognized in Europe, and "Landed Credit Companies" have been established to assist the agricultural community. The principle upon which these companies are conducted is probably better suited to the circumstances of the farmer than that of any of those already mentioned. The sum borrowed is made payable by small annual instalments which form a sinking fund, and, being allowed to accumulate at compound interest, discharges the debt without any heavy drain upon the borrower. We are glad to notice the establishment of a "Landed Credit Company" in Canada, and having its head office in this city. Although yet in its infancy, the progress it has already made is the best proof of its suitability to the circumstances of this province. Our agriculturists have hitherto depended mainly upon the natural fertility of the soil, and have expended but little in increasing that fertility by improved methods of agriculture. The present system, however, cannot be long continued, and the Canadian farmer who would preserve his property from depreciation and his family from want must be prepared to adopt those means which have added so much to the agricultural resources of the parent country. To do so to advantage capital will be required, and unless that capital can be obtained at reasonable rates and on easy terms of payment, the remedy will be found worse than the disease. It is therefore of the highest importance to the agriculturist that when money is wanted money can be had, and that on terms which, while they afford the most ample guarantee to the lender, also afford the best opportunity to the borrower and other monetary institutions.

The history of our banking and other progress in a few lines furnishes no inapt illustration of our progress in this country. Forty years ago, when the Bank of Montreal commenced business with a capital of £87,000, the city of Toronto was scarcely as large as Yorkville, and certainly could not boast of any such private residences as are to be found there. Many of the finest townships, and even some of the best counties in Upper Canada, were unoccupied as the Journey from Montreal to Toronto then occupied as many days as it does hours at the present time, while the close of navigation completely arrested the transportation of merchandise from one point to the other. The postage of a letter, now carried for five cents, was over a quarter of a dollar; while the charge on a letter from England, now carried for a York shilling, was generally between two and three months. For these results we are no doubt vastly indebted to the assistance of our monetary institutions; and while blaming them for withholding, as they sometimes do, their assistance never forget the good they have accomplished and are daily accomplishing in the various branches of commerce, trade and manufactures.

While the merits of different systems of banking and of our various monetary institutions have been freely discussed, the "science of money" has been almost entirely overlooked. Men take gold and silver because their fathers did so, and paper money for no better reason. They rarely enquire into the nature of money or the laws which govern its circulation. The subject, however, must soon force itself upon the public mind. The immense quantities of gold annually brought from California and Australia, together with the increase of paper money and other means of facilitating the commerce of the world, must in a few years seriously interfere with our present standards of value, and lead to new investigations into the nature of money and the laws which govern its use.

DETAILED ACCOUNT OF MONEYS

Appropriated during the Second Session of the Sixth Provincial Parliament of Canada (22 Vic.), specifying whether the appropriation was made by Act of Parliament, or by Warrant upon an Address of the Legislative Assembly.

CAP. XII. An Act for indemnifying the Members of both Houses of the Legislature for their expenses in attending the Sessions thereof.

This Act authorizes the payment of \$6 per diem to each member of the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly for their attendance, if the Session do not extend beyond 30 days; but if beyond 30 days, a Sessional allowance of \$600 shall be paid to each Member, besides 19 cents

for mileage between the place of his residence, and the place at which the Session shall be held, reckoning such distance going and coming.

CAP. XIII. An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money required for defraying certain expenses of the Civil Government for the year 1859; and certain other expenses connected with the Public Service.

This Act authorizes the payment out of the Consolidated

Revenue Fund of the sum of \$2,000,130 30 cents for defraying the expenses of the Civil Government of the Province, and for other purposes, for the year 1856.

CAP. XVIII. To amend and continue the Laws relating to the Militia of this Province.

By this Act the Militia of this Province is more efficiently organized, and the allowances to non-commissioned officers and men of the Volunteer Companies, while on active service permanently fixed, with the allowance for horses, &c.

It also authorizes a certain payment to Captains of Companies for taking care of the arms and accoutrements where there are no armouries, and fixes the allowances for Inspecting Field Officers, for travelling expenses, when on a tour of inspection; and also, leaves it in the discretion of the Commander in Chief to amalgamate the Office of Deputy Adjutant General and Inspecting Field Officer of Militia in Upper or Lower Canada.

CAP. XXXI. An Act further to provide for the accommodation of the Courts of Superior Jurisdiction in Upper Canada, and for that purpose to amend, extend and continue certain Acts therein mentioned.

This Act authorizes the issue of Debentures to the amount of \$120,000, at a rate of 6 per cent. per annum, redeemable within 20 years, as a further aid to enable the Law Society of Upper Canada to erect buildings suitable for the accommodation of the Superior Courts of Law and Equity in Toronto. Provision is made for the payment of these Debentures by imposing a tax on certain Law proceedings in the said Courts authorized by this Act.

CAP. XLVIII. Seigneurial Amendment Act of 1859. This Act authorizes the payment out of the Provincial Funds of the balance of the Rentes representing the casual rights of the Seigniors,—after deducting the portion paid

by the appropriation under the Act 18 Vic. cap. 3. An amount equal to the said balance is also made payable for Upper Canadian purposes, and for the Townships of Lower Canada an amount proportionate to their population as compared with that of the Seigniories.

CAP. LXXXIX. An Act relating to the Northern Railway Company of Canada.

This Act authorizes the issue of Provincial Debentures (or otherwise) to the amount of \$60,000, for the purpose of putting that Road into working order and repair, and vesting the same in the Crown. The sum so expended on the Road shall be added to the claim of the Province on the said Company and Railway, and be a first charge upon the proceeds, in the event of the Road being sold on the 1st of August next, or on any day afterwards.

TARIFF OF CUSTOMS.

Synopsis of an Act to amend the Act relating to Duties of Customs.

22 VICTORIA, CAP. II.

[Assented to 20th March, 1859.]

The Preamble sets forth the expediency of amending the Tariff of Customs now in force.

SEC. 1, enacts that the Schedule to Act 22 Vic. cap. 76, intitled, An Act to amend the Law relative to Duties of Customs and of Excise, and to impose new duties; and a duty on Tavern-keepers, containing the Table of Duties of Customs Inwards, the Table of Exemptions and the Table of Prohibitions, shall be repealed.

SEC. 2 enacts, that instead of the Duties of Customs imposed by the Schedule and Act first above mentioned, and of all other Duties of Customs upon goods, wares and merchandise imported into this Province, there shall be raised, levied, collected and paid unto Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, the goods, wares and merchandise imported into this Province, or taken out of warehouse for consumption therein,—the several Duties of Customs respectively described, inserted and set forth in the Schedule to this Act annexed, intitled: Table of Duties of Customs inwards.

This Act shall not affect the Copyright Act, 13 & 14 Vic., cap. 6,—or any duty imposed under it.

SEC. 3, in amendment of 22 Vic., cap. 76, sec. 8, enacts, That the articles upon which, and the cases in which, any drawback shall be payable under the said Section, shall be those only upon and in which the Governor in Council shall, by the regulations to be from time to time made, declare such drawback to be payable.

SEC. 4, enacts, that the foregoing provisions of this Act shall be construed as forming one law with 10 & 11 Vic., cap. 31, intitled, An Act for repealing and consolidating the present Duties of Customs in this Province, and for other purposes therein mentioned, and the Acts amending the same, in so far as they are in force and consistent with this Act; And all words and expressions used in this Act shall have the meaning assigned to them in the said Acts, and all the provisions of the said Acts with regard to the duties imposed by them, or the regulations to be made under them, shall apply to the duties imposed by this Act, and the regulations to be made under it, except in so far as they may be inconsistent with this Act.

The following Articles are also permitted to be entered free, in certain circumstances or conditions, viz.

Agricultural Implements, Farming Utensils, and Seeds of all kinds—when specially imported by Agricultural Societies for the encouragement of Agriculture.

Apparel (Wearing), and other personal effects, and implements of husbandry (not merchandize) in actual use of persons coming to settle in the Province, accompanying the owner.

Apparel (Wearing) of British subjects dying abroad.

Arms, for Army or Navy, and Indian Nations—provided the duty otherwise payable be defrayed by the Treasury of the United Kingdom or of this Province.

Books, Maps, and Charts, imported not as Merchandise, but as the personal effects of persons arriving in

Canada to become *bona fide* residents of the Province.

Household Effects, that have been in actual use for one month or more, of persons coming to settle in the Province and under the charge of the owner.

Clothing—when donations for gratuitous distribution by charitable societies, or for the Army, Navy, or Indian Nations.

Models or Patterns of all kinds of Invention, Machinery, or Improvements in the Arts—provided the same be not put to actual use.

Military Clothing for H. M. Troops or Militia.

Military Stores, &c., for Provincial Militia, under such restriction and regulations as may be passed by the Government in Council.

Packages in which goods are imported, except the following: Spirits, Oil,

Wine, Beer, and Cider, and other Casks for containing Liquids. Baskets of every description. Trunks, Snuff Jars, Earthenware and Glass Jars. Barrels containing Grain, Seeds and Peas.

Tools (The) and Implements of Trade of persons arriving in Canada, when accompanied into the Province by the actual settler and for his own use, not for sale.

All importations for the use of H. M. Army and Navy, serving in Canada, or for the public uses of the Province.

The following Articles are prohibited to be imported, under a penalty of Fifty Pounds, together with the forfeiture of the Parcel or Package of Goods in which the same may be found:—

Books and Drawings of an immoral or indecent character; Coin, base or counterfeit.

LETTER RATES.

Letters posted in Canada addressed to any place within the Province pass, if prepaid, for 5 cents per 1/2 oz., but if posted unpaid such letters are charged 7 cents per 1/2 oz.

On Letters to Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward's Island, the rate is 5 cents per 1/2 oz., with optional prepayment.

MISCELLANEOUS CHARGES.

The charge on Parcels by Parcel Post to any place in Canada is 25 cents per lb. (with 5 cts. add'l if Registered.) One cent per oz., payable in advance by Postage stamp. is the rate on Printed Circulars, Prices Current, Hand Bills and other Printed Matter of a like character, and on Books, bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian Post Office addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The charge on Books, &c., by Book Post to England, is 7 cents on packets not exceeding 4 oz. in weight, 12 1/2 cents on 1/2 lb packets, and 12 1/2 cents additional for every additional 1/2 lb. These charges must be prepaid.

Newspapers published in Canada may be sent by post from the office of publication addressed to any place in Canada at the following rates, if paid quarterly in advance by either the publisher at the post office where the papers are posted, or by the subscriber at the delivering post office:

When the above rates are not paid in advance by either publisher or subscriber, such Papers are charged one cent each on delivery.

TRANSIENT NEWSPAPERS.

Transient Newspapers—that is to say, Canadian Newspapers posted otherwise than from the office of publication, and American or British Papers posted or re-posted in Canada, must be prepaid 1 cent each, by postage stamp, or they

cannot be forwarded—except only British Newspapers distributed to regular subscribers by Canadian Booksellers or News Agents—such papers pass free as they would do if received in the Canadian Packet Mails.

NEWSPAPERS BY MAIL FROM ENGLAND OR UNITED STATES.

Newspapers received from England by the Canadian Packet Mails are delivered free.

Newspapers from England by the Cunard Packet Mails are charged 2 cents each on delivery. (This is the American transit charge.)

United States Newspapers, brought by Mail into Canada, are charged one cent each on delivery.

PERIODICAL PUBLICATIONS.

The rate on Periodical Publications is, if not exceeding 3 ounces in weight, 1 cent; over 3 ounces, 4 cents.

If prepaid by postage stamps from the office of publication, Periodicals published in Canada, weighing over 3 oz., may pass for 2 cents each.

Periodicals, printed in this Province, other than Newspapers, when specially devoted to Education (both religious and general), to Agriculture, to Temperance, or to any branch of science, and addressed directly from the office of publication to be transmitted to any post office in this Province, are exempt from charge.

Transient Periodicals—including Canadian Periodicals not prepaid the commuted rate from the office of publication—nor exempted by the preceding clause, and all other Periodical publications posted in this Province, must be prepaid by Stamp, the full rate, at the time of posting.

Periodicals received in the Mails from the United States are charged with the rates named in the first clause of this section.

POSTAGE STAMPS.

Postage Stamps of the respective values of 1 cent for Newspapers; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial Letters; 10 cents for United States rate; 12 cents for Canadian Packet; and 17 cents for Cunard Packet, are provided for sale to the public.

PENAL CLAUSES.

The Act contains the following penal clause:—

To inclose a letter or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a Parcel posted, for the Parcel Post, shall be a misdemeanour.

To inclose a letter or any writing, or to make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to inclose any other thing in a newspaper posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers, (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspapers sent by them to their subscribers,) shall be a misdemeanour.

MONEY ORDERS.

Money Orders, payable at any Money Order Office in Great Britain and Ireland, can be obtained at any Canadian Money Order Office. The orders are drawn in Sterling, the commission chargeable being: for £2 and under, one shilling sterling; from £2 to £5, two shillings. No order can be drawn for more than £5, but any number of orders of £5 each may be procured.

JUDICIARY—UPPER CANADA.

Courts.

COURT OF ERROR AND APPEAL.—Constituted for the hearing of appeals in civil cases from the Courts of Queen's Bench, Chancery and Common Pleas; and appeals in criminal cases from the Courts of Queen's Bench and Common Pleas. From the judgment of this court, an appeal lies to Her Majesty in Privy Council, in cases over \$1,000, or where annual rent, fee, or future rights of any amount, are affected. *Judges*—Hon. Sir John Beverley Robinson, Bart., C.B., Chief Justice of Upper Canada; Hon. William Hume Blake, Chancellor of Upper Canada; Hon. William Henry Draper, C.B., Chief Justice of the Common Pleas; Hon. Sir James Buchanan Macaulay, Knt., C.B., Ex Chief Justice of the Common Pleas; Hon. Archibald McLean, Judge of the Queen's Bench; Hon. James Christie Palmer Esten, Vice-Chancellor; Hon. Robert Easton Burns, Judge of the Queen's Bench; Hon. John Godfrey Spragge, Vice-Chancellor; Hon. William Buell Richards, Judge of the Common Pleas; Hon. John Hawkins Hagarty, Judge of the Common Pleas. *Clerk*, Alex. Grant. *Reporter*, —

COURT OF QUEEN'S BENCH.—The jurisdiction of this Court extends to all manner of actions, causes and suits, criminal

and civil, real, personal and mixed, within Upper Canada, and it may proceed in such, by such process and course as are provided by law, and as shall tend with justice and despatch to determine the same; and may hear and determine all issues of law, and also with the inquest of twelve good and lawful men (except in cases otherwise provided for) try all issues of fact, and give judgment, and award execution, thereon, and also in matters which relate to the Queen's Revenue (including the condemnation of contraband or smuggled goods) as may be done by Her Majesty's Superior Courts of Law in England. *Chief Justice*—Hon. Sir John Beverley Robinson, Bart., C.B.; *Puisne Judges*—Hons. Archibald McLean, and Robert Easton Burns. *Clerk of the Crown and Pleas*—Chas. Coxwell Small. *Reporter*—Christopher Robinson. *Clerk in Chambers*—W. B. Heward.

COURT OF CHANCERY.—This Court has the like jurisdiction as the Court of Chancery in England, in cases of fraud, accident, trusts, executors, administrators, co-partnerships, account, mortgages, awards, dower, infants, idiots, lunatics and their estates, waste, specific performance, discovery, and to prevent multiplicity of suits, staying proceedings at law prosecuted against equity and good conscience, and may de-

erose the issue, repeal or avoidance of letters patent, and generally the like powers as the Court of Chancery in England possesses to administer justice in all cases in which there is no adequate remedy at law. *Chancellor*.—Hon. Wm. Hume Blake. *Vice-Chancellors*.—Hons. Jas. Christie Palmer Esten, and John Godfrey Spraggs. *Master*.—And'w Norton Buell. *Registrar and Reporter*.—Alexander Grant.

COURT OF COMMON PLEAS.—This Court has the same powers and jurisdiction as a Court of Record, as the Court of Queen's Bench. Writs of summons and capias issue alternately from either court. *Chief Justice*.—Hon. Wm. Henry Draper, C.B. *Justice Judges*.—Hons. William Buell Richards, and John Hawkins Hagarty. *Clerk of the Crown and Pleas*.—Lawrence Heyden. *Reporter*.—Edward C. Jones.

PRACTICE COURT AND CHAMBERS.—One of the Common Law Judges holds a Court during each Term, called the "Practice Court," for hearing matters relating to the adding or justifying bail, discharging insolvent debtors, administering oaths, hearing and determining matters on motion, and making rules and orders in causes and business depending in either of said law courts. Chambers are held each day in Law and Chancery by one of the judges of the said courts, for such business relating to suits therein as may be transacted by a single Judge out of court.

HEIR AND DEVISEE COURT.—Commissioners, the Judges of the Superior Courts, and such other persons as may be appointed by commission under the Great Seal. Their duties are to determine claims to lands in Upper Canada, for which no patent has issued from the Crown in favour of the proper claimants, whether as heirs, devisees or assignees. *Sittings at Toronto*, first Monday in January and July in each year. *Clerk of Commissioners*, W. B. Heward.

COUNTY COURTS.—Presided over by a resident Judge in each county. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed £50; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties or signature of the defendant, to £100; and cases of Torts to personal chattels, to £30; but not to cases involving the title to lands, validity of wills, or actions for libel, slander, crim. con., or seduction. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of Law. These Courts also possess equity powers, to the amount of £50, under 18 Vic. c. 119, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery.

SURROGATE COURTS.—These Courts are now regulated by 22 Vic. c. 93, and grant administration subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery. *Surrogate Clerk*, C. Fitzgibbon. Toronto.

COURTS OF QUARTER SESSIONS.—Chairman, the County Judge in each county, who, with one or more Justices of the Peace, holds a Court of Quarter Sessions in his county four times a year for trials by jury in cases of larceny misdemeanor and other offences.

RECORDERS' COURTS.—In the Cities of Toronto, Hamilton, London, Kingston, and Ottawa, the Recorders' Court takes the place of the County Sessions, the Justices for Counties having no jurisdiction in the Cities—the care of which is confided to the Recorder, Mayor, Aldermen and Police Magistrate of each. The City Sessions are held on the first Monday in January, April, July and November.

INSOLVENT DEBTORS' COURTS.—The County Judge in each county presides.

DIVISION COURTS.—For the summary disposal of cases by a Judge; but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contract amounting to £25; injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to £10; but not to actions for gambling debts, liquors drunk in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor, ejectment, title to land, &c., or any toll, custom or franchise, will or settlement, malicious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. con., seduction or breach of promise, or actions

against a J. P. for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Courts are held once in two months in each division, or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge. The Divisions are established by the Courts of Quarter Sessions.

Officers of the Courts.

CLERKS OF ASSIZE.—W. A. Campbell, Toronto; the Deputy Clerks of the Crown are ex-officio Clerks of Assize and Marshals in their respective counties.

DEPUTY CLERKS OF THE CROWN.—The Clerks of the County Courts will be ex-officio Deputy Clerks of the Crown and Pleas of their several counties as the present incumbents vacate by death or otherwise.

DEPUTY MASTERS AND REGISTRARS IN CHANCERY.—These officers are appointed by the Court, for each County, as occasion requires.

CLERK OF THE PROCESS.—For sealing and issuing (alternately) all Writs of Summons in the Queen's Bench and Common Pleas—Robert Pearson. The Deputy Clerks of the Crown in the several Counties also, in like manner, issue the writs for their respective counties.

Terms of the Courts.

APPEAL TERMS commence on the Thursday next after Hilary, Easter and Michaelmas Terms.

LAW TERMS.—Hilary begins first Monday in February, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week; Easter begins 3rd Monday in May, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week; Trinity begins Monday next after 21st August, and ends on the Saturday of the ensuing week; Michaelmas begins third Monday in November and ends Saturday of the ensuing week. Long vacation from 1st July to 21st August.

CHANCERY TERMS.—Examination Terms.—From 1st Tuesday of February to the Saturday after 2nd Tuesday of March; and from 1st Tuesday of September to the Saturday after 2nd Tuesday of October. Hearing Terms.—From 1st Monday in April until Saturday of the following week; and from 1st Monday in November until Saturday of the following week. The Court also sits every Tuesday (except during the regular vacations) throughout the year, for hearing motions for Decrees, motions for or to dissolve special injunctions, and appeals from the reports of the Master or Deputy Masters. Long vacation from the 1st July to 21st August.

COUNTY COURT TERMS commence on the first Monday in January, April, July and October, and end the following Saturday.

Circuits of the Courts.

LAW CIRCUITS.—The Circuits are held twice a year in each County, between Hilary and Easter Terms, and between Trinity and Michaelmas Terms, except in the County of York, where there are three in each year, commencing on the first Thursday in January, the first Monday in May, and the second Monday in October, in each year. There are six Circuits, as follows, viz.—The *Eastern*: Perth, Cornwall, Ottawa, L'Original, Brockville. *Home*: Niagara, Hamilton, Barrie, Owen Sound, Milton, Merrittville. *Western*: St. Thomas, Sandwich, Sarnia, Chatham, London, Goderich. *Midland*: Whitby, Peterboro', Cobourg, Belleville, Picton, Kingston. *Oxford*: Simcoe, Brantford, Guelph, Berlin, Stratford, Woodstock, Cayuga. *Toronto*: Toronto.

CHANCERY CIRCUITS.—For the Examination of Witnesses. (Home), Toronto; (Western), Goderich, London, Osham, Niagara, Hamilton, Barrie; (Eastern), Cobourg, Belleville, Kingston, Brockville, Ottawa and Cornwall.

COUNTY COURT AND QUARTER SESSIONS SITTINGS.—For the trial of issues of fact, and the assessment of damages, on the second Tuesday in March, June, September, and December, in each year.

Solutions to Problems in 1859.

PROB. I.—Edge of cube, 3.66 inches; thickness of globe, 2.006 inches.

PROB. II.— $121x^2 - 845x + 1473 = 0$.

PROB. III.—By taking the 12 intersections of three pairs of parallels in different positions, there are 7 distinct varieties of figure; by taking the 12 intersections of two pairs of parallels with themselves and two lines not parallel, there are other 7 distinct varieties: besides these, there is an infinite variety of unsymmetrical arrangements.

PROB. IV.—Distances required 16.48 chains.

PROB. V.—Distance from the nearest wall is 22.36 feet.

PROB. VI.—Time for train A, 15.70824 hours, for train B, 11.70824; pressure of steam, 46.275 lbs.; evaporation, .082 cubic feet per minute; number of bushels required, 20½; velocity, 21 feet.

[Mr. Oliver remarks that this Problem, and Problem I. (both proposed by Mr. McLellan) are taken verbatim from one of the earlier numbers of the *British Controversialist*.]

PROB. VII.—The transverse axis bisects the angle between the vectors.

PROB. VIII.—The station for E is the centre of gravity of the triangle ABC; the distances called are, A, 281.157 miles; B, 143.964; C, 425.121; D, 514.4.

PROB. IX.— $36^\circ 54' 55''$.

PROB. XI.—Latitude $22\frac{1}{2}^\circ$ nearly. (See Herschel's Treatise on Sound.)

PROB. XII.—Has no solution in whole numbers, and Prob. XIII, though presenting no analytical difficulty, could only be reduced to numbers by a greater expenditure of labor than it is worth. The authors have not sent their own solutions as requested.

PROB. XIV.—The series is 17, 80, 143, &c. Common difference, 63.

PROB. XV.—An infinite number of solutions. The most simple are:—A's rate, 4 miles per hour; B's, 5½; time of meeting $10\frac{1}{4}$ hours; here they meet at the starting point.

A's, 14; B's, 42; time, $\frac{1}{2}$ hour; here they meet at the opposite point.

PROB. XVI.—Generally, if n be the number of years, A each instalment, amount of mortgage nA , $100(R-1)$ the rate of interest per cent. per annum paid, $100(S-1)$ the rate to be made on the investment; then putting $\frac{1}{n} \frac{1-S^{-n}}{S-1} = e$, the sum to be given for the mortgage is $nA \left\{ c + \frac{R-1}{S-1} (1-c) \right\}$.

Here $n = 5$, $A = 100 \text{ £}$, $R = 1.06$, $S = 1.1$; sum required is £451.62.

PROB. XVII.—The sum of all the inner areas is 3 times the outer one.

PROB. XIX.—Taking the equation to the cardioid, $r = 2a \left(\cos \frac{\theta}{2} \right)^2$, that to the envelope is $r = 2a \left(\cos \frac{\theta}{3} \right)^3$,

and the area of its semi-pire is to that of the cardioid as 5 to 8.

PROB. XX.—Height of cylinder is to its radius as 1 to $\sqrt{2}$.

MEDICAL BOARD OF UPPER CANADA.—Meet for examination of candidates for Provincial License to practise Physic, Surgery, and Midwifery, on the first Mondays in January, April, July, and October of each year, and remain in session during the week following. PROVINCIAL LUNATIC ASYLUM, TORONTO.—2½ m. west from the City Hall, on Queen St. Property vested in the Crown. Government appoint Medical Superintendent, and Bursar, and Inspectors who frame by-laws for its government, thoroughly examine the Asylum, and report to the Governor General. The present building was designed to accommodate 264 patients; there are at present 483 in it and the Branch Asylum, University Grounds. The Institution is open to the public between the hours of 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. every day, Saturdays and Sundays excepted, by application to the Medical Superintendent at the Asylum. The admission of patients is regulated by the Act 16 Vic., chap. 188, which requires that the patient be examined by

three licensed medical practitioners, verified by Reeve or Mayor collectively, who certify to the insanity. From the over-crowded state of the house, admissions are at present made as vacancies occur, according to priority of applicants, or urgency of cases. Idiots, and persons afflicted with paralysis are inadmissible. Officers of the Institution: *Medical Superintendent*, Joseph Workman, M.D.; *Asst. Physician*, B. Workman, M.D.; *Apothecary*, J. A. Hascom; *Bursar*, J. McKirdy; *Steward*, C. S. Eastwood; *Matron*, Mary Ann Parker.

Note.—A Branch of this Asylum has been established in the old University Buildings under the same management. Robert Blair, Steward; Eliza Blair, Matron.

FORT MALDEN LUNATIC ASYLUM FOR CHRONIC PATIENTS.—Andrew Fisher, M.D. *Medical Superintendent*; there are at present (August, 1859) 20 patients in charge.

GENERAL HOSPITAL, TORONTO.—*Trustees*: Appointed by Government.—Jas. Healy; Geo. Herrick, M.D.; John Scott, M.D.; by Corporation, John O'Donohoe; by Board of Trade, Thos. Visitors are permitted to see their friends every day from 3 to 5 o'clock, p.m., except Saturdays and Sundays.

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land. Upper Canada College combines, therefore, all the advantages of a Commercial School, with facilities for obtaining a sound Classical training possessed by no other institution in the country. The College year commences with the Autumn Term. The Autumn Term begins Sept. 8; Winter do., Nov. 20; Spring do., Feb. 15; Summer do., May 1. Reports of the progress and conduct of the pupils are sent to parents at the end of each Term. Deducting the Vacations, the Terms are ten weeks each. The Tuition Fee is \$3 for one Pupil, \$7 each for two (Brothers), \$8 each for three (Brothers), \$5 each for four (Brothers); and the Fee for Boarders, inclusive of Tuition, is \$45 per Term. The many improvements made in the arrangement of the College Boarding House have been found to add very materially to the comfort of the boarders. A large paved Ball Court and a Gymnasium, fitted up with the most approved modern appliances, and a spacious play-ground and cricket ground afford ample facilities for out-door exercise and amusement within the College bounds. The Boarding House is conducted strictly as an integral part of the Institution, its disbursements paid out of, and its returns paid into, the general funds. Prizes of books and certificates of honor are given every year to those who distinguish themselves in any of the subjects taught in the College. His Excellency the Governor General offers annually a valuable Prize of Books for the best examination in the higher departments of Classics and Mathematics. At the Annual Public Examination in July Exhibitions are competed for, varying in value from \$100 to \$20 per annum. Competition for them all is open to the Grammar Schools of the whole Province. More than two thousand of the youth of the Province have received their education, in whole or in part, in Upper Canada College. It numbers now about 500 pupils. The Principal, the First, Second, and Third Classical Masters, and the Mathematical Master, were all of them pupils of the Institution; as were likewise the greater portion of the Medal-men, Scholars, and Honor men of our Universities.

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Knox College. — Principal and Professor of Systematic Divinity, Rev. M. Willis, D.D.; Professor of Exegetical Divinity, and Philosophy, Rev. G. P. Young, M.A.; Professor of Church History and Evidences of Christianity, Rev. R. Burns, D.D.; Chairman of College Board, Rev. W. Gregg; Secretary, Rev. W. Reid. Session opens on first Wednesday of October and closes in the beginning of April.

The Bellevue Seminary.—This Institution is the property of the Methodist Episcopal Church, but free to all denominations, no religious creed being taught in it, and students being received to attend such places of worship as their parents or guardians may direct. The institution is located in Belleville, Co. of Hastings, O. W. Ample accommodation is afforded for the instruction of two hundred students; both sexes are included in the provision, ladies being instructed in the ornamental as well as solid branches, and gentlemen being afforded a commercial, mathematical, and classical education. The institution was incorporated in 1857. The following compose the Faculty: Rev. G. Shepard; Rev. A. Carman, B.A., Professor of Mathematics, Moral Governor; _____, Prof. of the Latin and Greek Languages and the Natural Sciences, Treasurer and General Manager; _____, English Teacher and Assistant in the Department of Natural Science. Miss Eliza A. Deaver, Preceptor, and Teacher of Drawing, Embroidery, and the French Language; Mrs. Francis M. Crowell, Teacher of Music, both Melodion and Piano Forte. Besides the above, several others, not of the Faculty, are employed to teach in the institution. The academic year is divided into

two sessions; the first session, which consists of thirty weeks, or two terms, commences on the second Thursday in September, and ends about the middle of April following; the second session commences on the first Thursday in May, and continues fourteen weeks. There will be a vacation of a fortnight at the Christmas holidays, between the first and second terms of the first or winter session.

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Divinity Hall of the United Presbyterian Synod.—The Divinity Hall meets in Toronto on the third Tuesday in October, and continues in session till the second Thursday in April. Professor, Rev. John Taylor, D.D., M.D., D.D.

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Provincial Normal and Model Schools, for the Instruction and Training of Teachers—Normal School: T. J. Robertson, M.A., Head Master; J. H. Sangster, Second Master; Alex. R. Strachan, Teacher of Book-keeping and Writing; H. F. Sefton, Teacher of Music; A. Coulon, Drawing Master; Henry Goodwin, Teacher of Gymnastics and Callisthenics. Model Schools, in which the Normal School students practice the art of Teaching: J. Carlyle, Master of the Boy's School; J. O. Disher, First Assistant; A. Campbell, Second Assistant. Dorcas Clark, Mistress of Girl's School; Henrietta Shenick, First Assistant; Helen Clark, Second Assist.; and the Teachers of Music, Writing, Book-keeping, Gymnastics and Callisthenics in the Normal School. The Sessions of the Normal School commence on the 8th of January and 8th of August, and close on the 22nd of June and 22nd of December in each year.

Model Grammar School.—George R. E. Cockburn, M.A., Rector; Rev. J. Ambery, M.A., Classical Master; E. L. Checkley, Sch. T. C. D., Mathematical Master; B. F. Fitch, B.A., English Master; J. H. Sangster, Lecturer in Chemistry and Natural Philosophy; Emile Coulon, French Master; A. Coulon, Drawing Master; A. R. Strachan, Teacher of Book-keeping and Writing; H. F. Sefton, Teacher of Vocal Music; H. Goodwin, Teacher of Gymnastics.

Grammar Schools.—Each of these Schools is managed by a Board of Trustees appointed by the County Council.

There is one Grammar School in each County Town, which receives at least \$400 per annum, and where the funds will admit of it, others may be established in different parts of the County. Pupils attending these Schools are prepared for matriculation in the Universities and Colleges. There were 75 Grad. at Schools, with 4,469 pupils, in Upper Canada, in 1856.

Common Schools.—Each Township is divided into School Sections of a suitable extent for one School; and in each of these Sections three Trustees are elected to manage its School affairs. In cities, towns, and villages, they are managed by a Board of School Trustees, elected for the Municipality. There were 3,866 Common Schools, with 293,683 pupils, in Upper Canada, in 1856.

Public School Libraries.—Each School and Municipal Corporation, desirous of establishing Free Public Libraries, is aided by the Educational Department granting 100 per cent. on local appropriations, and supplying books from the Depository in connexion with the Department. Up to the end of December, 1856, about 307 Libraries had been established, containing more than 1100 sub-divisions, and 167,765 volumes.

The Total Number of Educational Institutions reported by the Educational Department as in operation in Upper Canada during 1856, was 4,257, attended by 806,386 pupils, and expending \$1,512,386 in their support.
